

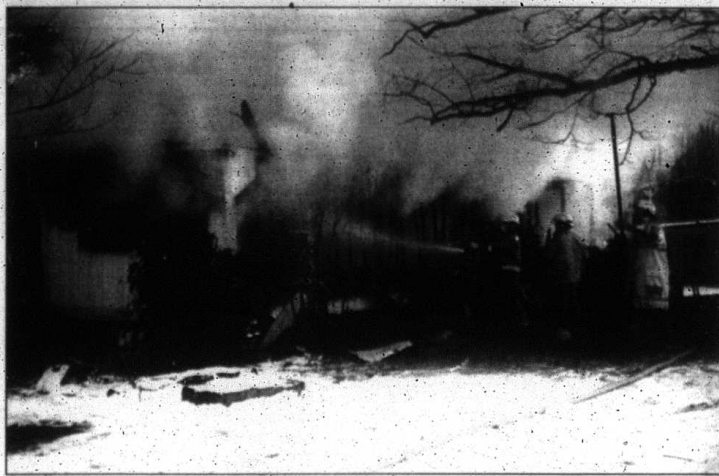

2000 filled with good, bad news

As in the past 113 years of the *Mount Vernon Signal* there was good news for many county residents and very bad news for others in the year 2000.

The year started off with more talk of a payroll tax for workers in the city limits of Mt. Vernon.

David Tapp announced he would seek the office of Commonwealth Attorney and the CenterNet project at the Rockcastle County Courthouse was approved.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court discussed the possibility of placing a monument on the courthouse lawn.

with the Ten Commandments inscribed and Mike and Lori Gates announced they would build a retreat for the blind and disabled on their property at Pine Hill.

Debra Lambert filed for the office of Family Court Circuit Judge. Danny Ford filed for re-election to the state house and the city of Mt. Vernon passed a half percent wage tax by a vote of 3-2.

Governor Paul Patton announced a proposed increase in gas taxes and Mike Duncan filed his candidacy for Family Court Circuit Judge.

Teresa Yarnall filed for re-election to Circuit Clerk and county leader

David Lovell pleads guilty

A Burr man pled guilty last week in Rockcastle Circuit Court to a charge of murder.

David Lovell, 33, pled guilty to the murder of Charles "Toddy" Baker, of Mt. Vernon who was shot to death in 1997.

Rockcastle Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery recommended a sentence of 20 years on the guilty plea.

Lovell's former wife Barbara had already pled guilty to assault in connection with the murder and had given testimony against her former husband.

Both David Lovell and Barbara Lovell have also been convicted of drug related crimes in federal court.

Montgomery said that Lovell's sentence for murder will likely run concurrent with his sentence in federal court.

Formal sentencing for Lovell will be held on January 25.

Contractor building landfill

A local contractor says he will use a landfill on his property in the Clear Creek area of Rockcastle county to dump construction materials generated by his own business.

D.L. McFarland said the landfill, which is being approved by the state, is on his own property and will not be for public use.

McFarland has submitted an application to the state for a permit for a landfill less than one acre.

Court accepts \$1,727,327 bid for Hall

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court accepted the lowest bid for construction of the Kentucky County Music Hall of Fame at Renfro Valley during a special meeting last Thursday.

The low bidder on the project was Hacker Brothers Construction Company from Corbin. Their bid was for \$1,727,327.

Hacker Brothers was the lowest bidder of six.

According to Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlofitis, the Hall of Fame board recommended that the fiscal court accept Hacker's bid.

Construction on the project is slated to begin soon, weather permitting.

The court also discussed the Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Program with local Disaster and Emergency Service's coordinator Bonnie Roark.

Roark has served as part-time DES Director, but as of January 1, Roark took over as full-time director of the emergency services agency.

Mrs. Roark is also assistant 911 director and has been involved in helping to map the county for enhanced 911.

Carlofitis said that Roark has agreed to help 911 with the mapping process for six more months and she has hired Mrs. Willametta French, to help with duties in her DES position. Mrs. French will work ten hours per week.

The court also voted to reimburse the Rockcastle County Development board \$25,000 received from the state for the technology center at the courthouse.

The board had spent their own money to help the project get off the ground.

Flat Gap man killed Tuesday in accident

A Flat Gap man was killed instantly Tuesday in a two vehicle collision on US 25 in southern Madison County.

According to Madison County Coroner Jimmy Cornelison, Johnny G. Baker, 70, of Flat Gap Road, died after his 1985 Ford pickup was struck in the left front by a van driven by Clifford E. Lewis, 37, of RL 3, Mt. Vernon.

According to Kentucky State Officer R.D. Stamps, Lewis crossed the center line, 1.5 miles from Berea as he traveled north and struck Baker's vehicle, which was traveling south.

Stamps said Lewis told him he had been sick and was coughing when the accident occurred.

Lewis and a passenger in Baker's vehicle, Goldie Tudor, were treated and released at the Berea Hospital.

The accident occurred at approximately 2 p.m.

County still out of salt

The Rockcastle County road department is still without salt for county roads.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlofitis said salt had been ordered but still not received.

The Judge said the county was buying sand from a Jackson County company at Clover Bottom, and spreading it on county roads while they wait for the salt to arrive.

Students in the Rockcastle County School system have already missed eight days of school because of inclement weather.

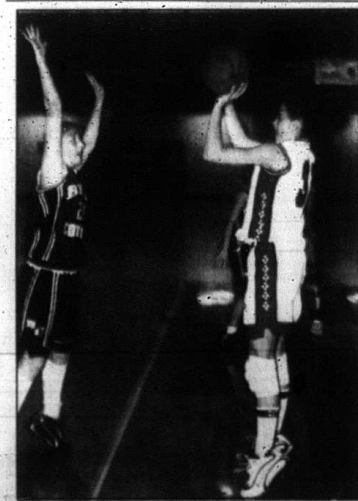
School was dismissed the three days before Christmas break and there has been no school since Christmas break.

The low temperature so far this winter was recorded Wednesday morning at the Cox Funeral Home weather station, where the mercury dropped to 0.

The high in January has been 25 on New Year's Day and the high in December was 59. The low in December was 2. On December 23, six inches of snow was recorded at the weather station in December.



Because of the inclement winter weather the county has been experiencing, several wrecks have occurred in the county over the past week. 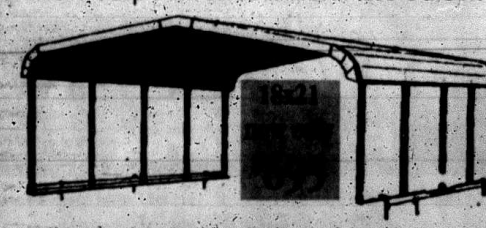

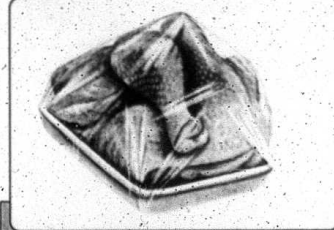

The students who participate in

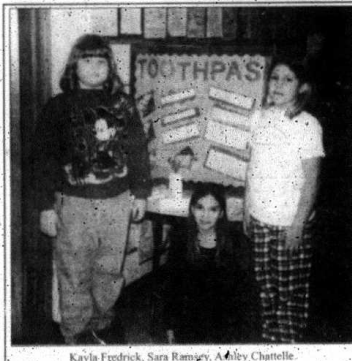

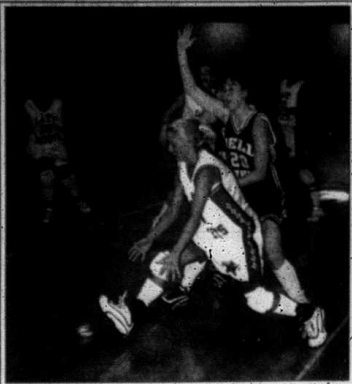

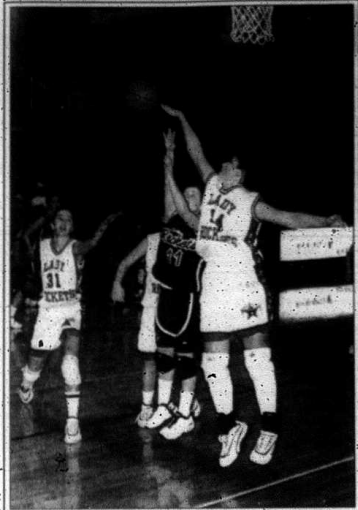

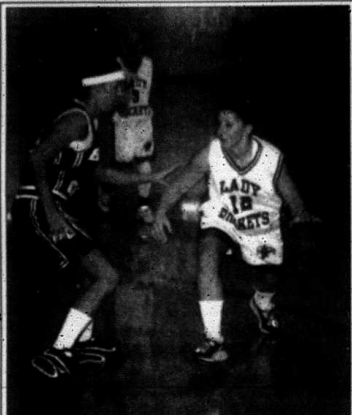

The tournament was set up in the pool form with the Rockets taking their pool, Anderson Co. Tenn. winning theirs and a very young Monticello team winning the third pool.

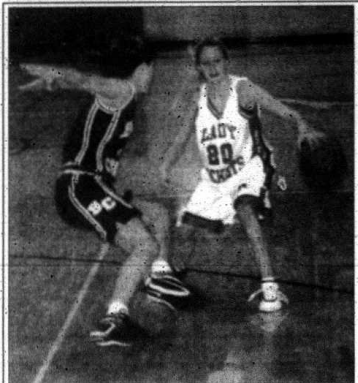

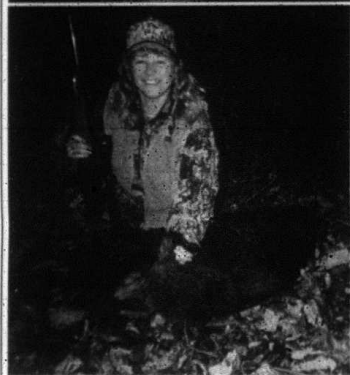

The Rockcastle County Board of Education gave final approval to a new school building at Broadhead and the county learned they would be sued over the Toddy Payne Road.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carlisle announced that the county may take over the ownership of the former Livingston school property and Kentucky Supreme Court Chief Justice Joe Lambert ruled against kicking Venter and Montgomery off the Lovell murder case.

A Michigan man was killed in an

accident on Hwy. 461 and work began on a new building in the Rockcastle Industrial Park for Integrity Mold and Die.

In April, the RCCHS Rifle team won the state competition in air rifle shooting and the Rockcastle County Rockets traveled to Florida where they defeated a highly touted Boyd County team.

Broadhead Mayor Walter Cash showed off the city's park, which had been totally renovated and Ronnie McClure finished fifth in a major bass tournament.

Athletes at RCCHS learned they would be drug tested and John Hoffbrook was named Democrat County Chairman.

\$1.5 million was put in the state

budget for the Kentucky Country Music Hall of Fame at Renfro Valley and Mrs. Ann Abbey was presented the Children's Service Award.

Caroline Graves was chosen as the new principal at Broadhead Elementary and the county learned they would lose \$50,000 in road funds from the state.

In May the county voted to file suit over the Oscar Isaac Road in northern Rockcastle County and a project sponsored by the fiscal court and soil conservation service netted 800 used appliances.

The annual Broadhead High School Alumni Banquet was held and three new people were elected to the site base council at RCCHS.

Most members of the Lovell family, who were arrested in February for selling cocaine pleaded guilty in federal court and Eddy Montgomery easily defeated David Tapp for Commonwealth Attorney.

108 seniors graduated from RCCHS and the Rockets won the district baseball championship.

Also in May probably the biggest story of the year in the county occurred when Renfro Valley Entertainment complex owner Warren Rosenthal gave his historic business to the Kentucky Country Music Hall of Fame Board.

In June, the county unveiled its largest budget ever at \$6.8 million

and the Rockets won their first ever regional baseball championship.

A Corbin man was killed in a logging accident and the RCCHS Girls Track Team won the regional championship.

A Livingston man, Ronnie Johnson, who was convicted in February of drug trafficking, but granted a new trial, killed himself before he stood trial a second time and Boyd

County ended the Rockets runs at state title. The Rockets finished in the top eight teams in the state.

The local 9th board voted to spend \$180,000 on new equipment and dedication ceremonies were held for the new section of Hwy. 421 at Big Hill.
