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Bullock gets four year probation

The highly publicized criminal case of a local farmer and land developer has come to a close.

Last Friday, Benton Bullock, 53, of Mt. Vernon, who had been indicted for receiving stolen tobacco and for bribing a witness, both felonies, was sentenced to four years probation and ordered to pay a \$3,000 fine.

In December, Bullock was indicted after he allegedly admitted to knowingly buying stolen tobacco from two local men. The tobacco had been stolen from a farm owned by Kenneth Stewart of Wildie.

According to police, Bullock paid \$40 for twenty bales of tobacco on Sunday and admitted to the crime on Monday. The tobacco was still in Bullock's garage and all twenty bales were returned to Stewart.

And last month Bullock was indicted for allegedly trying to bribe Stewart, concerning the case.

At the recommendation of Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery, Bullock will participate in a Pre-trial Diversion program during the four years he is on probation.

If Bullock successfully completes the program, all charges against him will be dismissed, and the case will be expunged from the record.

Besides the fine and probation, Bullock will not be allowed to carry a gun and must meet regularly with a parole officer.

Montgomery said that his office made the recommendation for the diversion program because Bullock is 53-years-old and has "absolutely no criminal record."

He said that Bullock cooperated fully with police from the beginning and that the diversion program is a very stringent program. Montgomery said that he thought the recommendation was fair and that he did not think Bullock should be treated any differently than anyone else.

"He is the type of defendant for the diversion program was created for," Montgomery said.

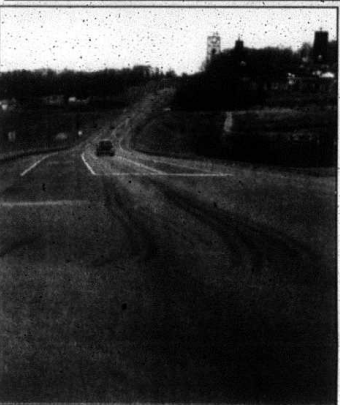
Wednesday morning employees and work release prisoners cleaned up an entire truck load of household garbage which had been illegally dumped along OH-461.

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Dangerous stretch of highway

A Rockcastle County High School senior escaped serious injury Friday in a two vehicle collision at the traffic light on the Hwy. 461 by-pass in front of Rockcastle County High School. According to police, Jennifer Woodall, 18, of Broodhead, turned her Chevrolet Cavalier into the path of a Taylor's Producers truck, around 2:20 p.m. Ms. Woodall was attempting to turn left into the high school. The intersection has been the site of several accidents, two of which were fatal. Last month, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court passed a resolution asking for help with the intersection from the state's Transportation Cabinet. On Monday night, Mt. Vernon councilman Gene Cromer will present the same petition to the council. CenterNet grand opening

The world gets a little smaller for Rockcastle County on Monday, March 5 at 10:00 a.m. EST. That's when a grand opening ceremony to kick off its CenterNet site takes place. CenterNet is a regional network created by The Center for Rural Development in Somerset, which brings in new telecommunications capabilities to counties in Southern and Eastern Kentucky.

Each site features two-way videoconferencing for large groups with the capacity to connect participants from all parts of the world. Locations also include public access computers loaded with software to

do everything from business plans to Internet searches.

Farmers vote for current program

Burley Tobacco farmers voted 98 percent to two percent in favor of leaving the current federal tobacco program in tack for the next three years.

Votes were counted in all Farm Service Agencies last Wednesday. That means that production marketing quotas and the price support program are still in place.

Tobacco farmers will also be able to grow 34.4 percent more tobacco in 2001 than they did in 2000.

The increase is the first in years for tobacco farmers and ends a run of cuts in tobacco quotas.

Two federal indictments

Two Rockcastle County men were indicted last week by a federal grand jury, according to a news release from the Department of Justice.

The indictments were returned by a federal grand jury in London, against, Jonathan E. Cromer, 21, of Mt. Vernon and Johnny Lee Bullock, 53, also of Mt. Vernon.

According to the indictment, Cromer is accused of having over 17 grams of methamphetamine, 95 tablets of the powerful pain killer OxyContin and marijuana in his possession on March 2 of last year.

Cromer is also accused of having OxyContin in possession on March 3, of last year. The indictment alleges that Cromer intended to distribute the drugs.

Bullock is accused of having 50 grams of methamphetamine in his possession earlier this year.

The maximum sentence in Cromer's case is 40 years in prison and a \$2 million fine.

In Bullock's case the maximum penalty is life in prison and a \$4-million dollar fine.

State turns down grant for shelter

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and the Rockcastle Adoption Agency for Pets got some bad news this week, when they were notified that a grant request to the state had been turned down.

In January, the county and the adoption agency applied for a \$65,000 grant, which would have been used to help build an animal shelter at Roundstone, which RAAP had already begun construction on.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carlifus said the grant request had been turned down by the state's Department of Agriculture for several reasons.

First, he said the Agricultural Department pointed out the lack of financial support from the county throughout the years for dog control.

He said that the county does not actually own the property and proposed shelter and the department pointed out that in order to receive the grant money, the county must own the property.

The Judge also said that only 53 dog licenses were sold last year in Rockcastle County, which the state says was an insufficient number to qualify for the grant.

The county is running a public

notice in this week's newspaper concerning the purchasing of dog licenses.

According to state law, each year the owner of any dog of the county in which he or she resides, must obtain a Kentucky Dog or Kennel License.

Locally, dog licenses can be purchased at the Rockcastle County Veterinarian Clinic on School Street in Mt. Vernon.

According to the notice being published by the county, those not complying with the law can be fined up to \$100 and be sentenced to six days in jail.

Obviously, the county has never enforced the dog license law and it is unclear, whether they will begin to do so or not.

Carlifus did say that he may instruct the dog ward to pick up dogs that do not have a license, but he admitted that too may be difficult because the county doesn't have a current shelter.

This week's news is bad for the county's on-going lawsuit with the Trixie Foundation, a watch dog agency, which sued the county last year because of the way they handle the animal population in the county.

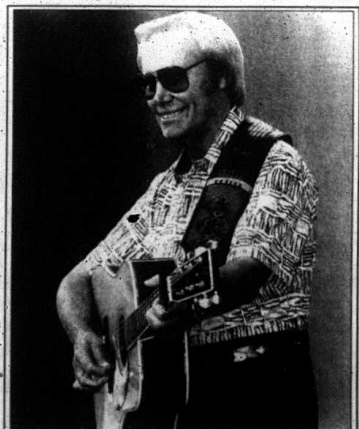

There is a desperate need to get rid of the predatory lenders who suck away the lifeblood of our more economically distressed families and, instead, help them find ways to deal with debt and desperation.

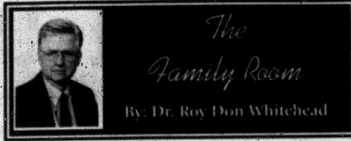

Is It Shyness or Social Anxiety Disorder?

"I have been offered the promotion," John told me, "and it is a good one with a nice raise, but I can't take it. It means I would have to speak in front of groups. I can't do that. I get too nervous." (All characters are fictitious.)

"Why can't I talk to guys?" Lisa wanted to know. "I can make conversation with women or the elderly or young people, but when I get in a conversation with a guy, I freeze up. I don't know what to say, and I know I look stupid. No wonder I never have any dates."

Marcia was afraid to talk to people of any age or gender. Her anxiety had become so bad that she now stayed at home most of the time. She went to work and came home, avoiding stores and people as much as possible. She lived by herself and did not want anyone around.

Social anxiety is "the tendency to be nervous or uncomfortable in social situations, usually because of fear about doing something embarrassing or foolish, making a bad impression, or being judged negatively by others."

For some people only specific social situations bring anxiety. The specific situation may be speaking before a group, talking to a member of the opposite sex or having a job interview. For others the anxiety includes all contact with other humans, no matter what the situation.

Social anxiety can be crippling, as can be seen in Marcia's case. Her life is restricted to home and work. Or it can restrict a person's relationships or job, as it is doing in the lives of Lisa and John.

For many people social anxiety produces physical symptoms. These may include quickened heartbeat, dizziness, sweating, chest tightness, shaking, difficulty swallowing, blushing, nausea, tearfulness and dry mouth. These symptoms make the anxiety worse, as the anxious person fears that others will notice the symptoms.

ful in treating the anxiety. Counseling is also helpful in treating anxiety, particularly a kind of counseling called Cognitive Therapy. Cognitive Therapy works to change the thought processes that cause the anxiety. Lisa, who has trouble talking to men her age, does not even realize what she is telling herself to cause the anxiety.

When Lisa analyzes her thoughts, she realizes that she is saying to herself, "Guys will think I'm stupid. They will laugh at me. No one will ever ask me for a date. I'm better off just being quiet."

In working with a counselor Lisa can come to realize that many of her fears will never come true! She can also realize that even if they do come true, this will not be the end of the world. What if one guy to whom she is attracted does not ask her out. While that may be somewhat disappointing, it will not devastate her. (The quote above is from *Shyness and Social Anxiety*, a book by Martin Anthony and Richard Swinson. I recommend it.)

There are two treatments for social anxiety that seem to help: medication and counseling. There are antianxiety medications that work to be a beta-blocker (propranolol) that is sometimes helpful for performers who have "stage fright." Some antidepressants have been shown to be effective in helping anxiety. Paxil is the one antidepressant that has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration for the treatment of anxiety.

... No one but a physician can determine if any of these would be helpful.

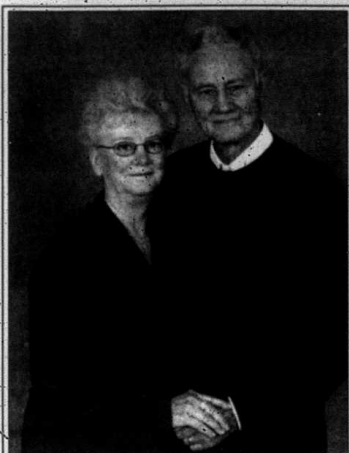
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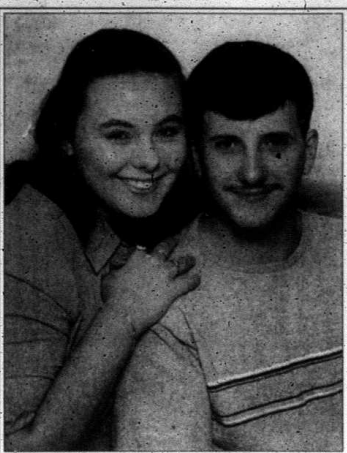
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50th Wedding Anniversary

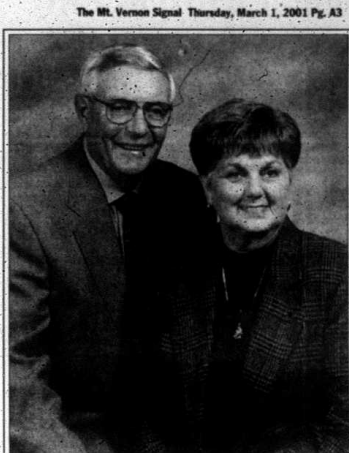

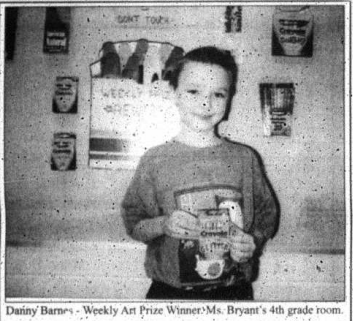

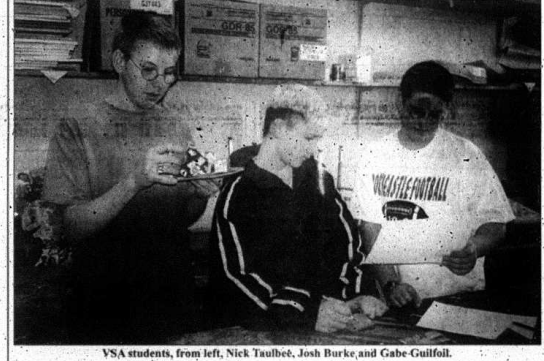

The Rockets finished the season with an excellent mark of 18-8, but it was the first time in four years they have not advanced to the regional tournament.

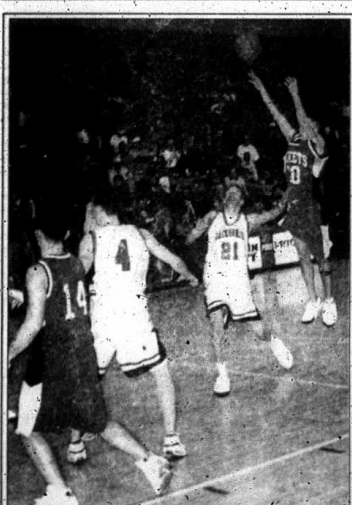

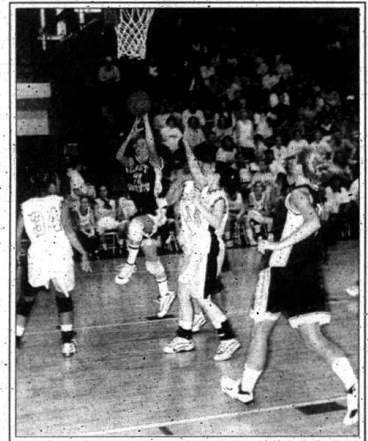

Steve Park soothed a lot of pain and hurt among Dale Earnhardt fans as he drove the No. 1 Pennzoil Chevrolet owned by Dale Earnhardt Inc. to Victory Lane in the rain-postponed Dura Lube 400, Monday.

It was the second consecutive win for a DEI team. The other win came last Sunday when Michael Waltrip drove the No. 15 NAPA/Chevrolet to victory in the Daytona 500.

Park led 165 laps and held off a late charge to win by .138 seconds over Bobby Labonte who finished second.

"Dale (Earnhardt) is the one that taught me how to drive in this place," Park said. "He told me to stay off of the brakes. I did and I won. Thank God it was Bobby (Labonte) that was behind me, and he drove me clean."

Labonte moved into second spot with 15 laps remaining in the 393-lap race. He caught Park with three laps to go, but was unable to get by. Both cars wiggled coming out of turn four on the last lap, and Labonte lost ground.

Polesitter Jeff Gordon, who finished third led 171 laps, the most of any driver.

Blame, Blame Who's to Blame?

Several new twists have developed in the cause of the death of Dale Earnhardt, who was killed Sunday, Feb. 18 during the last lap of the Daytona 500. Thursday, NASCAR officials disclosed the left side of Earnhardt's safety harness had either broken or was cut.

Friday, members of the organization seemed to point a finger at the harness maker, Simpson Safety Products. Others said the failure was a result of alterations to the harness ordered by Earnhardt.

During a press conference at North Carolina Motor Speedway Friday, Winston Cup director Gary Nelson said the nylon webbing on Earnhardt's lap belt broke, not the metal parts.

"In 52 years of NASCAR racing, this is the first time we've seen this happen," said Nelson. "The integrity

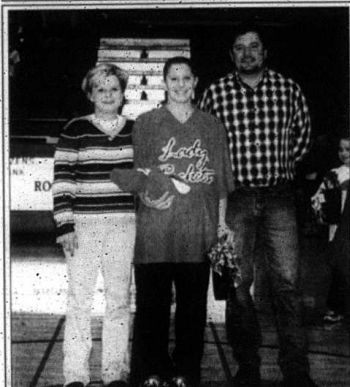

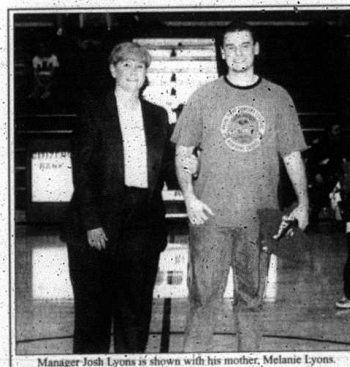

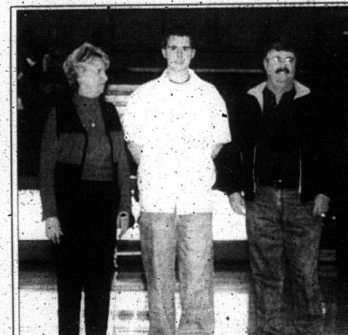

of the restraint system was severely compromised by the webbing separation."

The left side of Earnhardt's belt broke, allowing his chest and chin to slam violently into the steering wheel.

NASCAR officials refused to offer any further information on why they thought the seat belt broke.

There have been several reports by unnamed sources that said the manner in which the seat belt was installed led to its failure. Most drivers make changes to their harnesses for comfort. Earnhardt's preferred seat position was lower and in more of a reclining position than most other drivers, who sit higher and upright.

"The Simpson Company was not responsible in any way, shape or form for this accident," said Bill Simpson, owner of Simpson Safety Products. "It's a tragedy of the first magnitude, but our belt was not at fault."

While the real culprit may never be known, several more lethal incidents, including the No. 9 Dodge team driver by Bill Elliott are taking another look at the head and neck restraints system after the death of Dale Earnhardt.

"We're working on it (HANS) and trying to get it incorporated into our system, but you've got to change a lot of stuff to accommodate it," Elliott said. "You have to totally reconfigure the seat. You just can't put it on and wear it. It isn't that simple. I tested with it at Talladega just about all day, and once you get used to it, it isn't all that bad. Some people say it's uncomfortable, but they're just using that as an excuse. We just haven't had time to get it incorporated into the car. I'll take several weeks to get it right. It's not like a helmet. You can't just throw it on and jump in the car."

"I don't know if it's what we need now or not. I have more questions than answers right now. It sure ain't going to be the same out there without Dale Earnhardt. It's going to be hard to go to the track, and it's going to be hard to accept that Earnhardt isn't there. We all miss Adam Petty, Kenny Irwin and Tony Roper, too. We've got to take everything that's happened, analyze it and hope that it can help us."

Earnhardt was the highest profile guy in the sport, but we should look at his death no differently just because he was so well known. I don't know how we can look at this and not make some changes. Something's got to be done, but I don't have the answer. It was just a bad deal. What happened to the 3 at Daytona overshadowed everything else that happened down there. All it takes is that one time, that one hit.

We need all the help we can get right now with safety issues, and I think the HANS is definitely something we need to look at."

The criminal cases against the two men who allegedly sold Bullock the tobacco, Trenton Owens, 32, and Jason Burkhardt, 24, are still pending in Rockcastle Circuit Court. Montgomery said that Burkhardt had other charges against him as well, but that Owens may also be a candidate for the diversion program.

UNCLE HENRY FISH TELLS OF HIS VISIT WEST
Bliss, Oklahoma, December 18, 1907. For the benefit of my legion of relatives and friends in old Rockcastle who might want to know something as to my whereabouts, I write this brief description of my travels since I left. In all I have traveled 1675 miles stopping first in Arkansas, next to Central Missouri, then on to North Missouri, then to Kansas City, Lansing Kansas, thence to this place, where I have been nearly four weeks. I have met many old friends and a few relatives along the line, and am now stopping at one of my kinsman. I am now on what is known as the 191 Ranch, owned by the Miller brothers, and to say it is a big thing does not do justice. It is a little world in itself. Mrs. Miller and her three sons own and control nearly 10000 acres of as nice land that ever lay outdoors, all fenced with the calibrating lands fenced off in fields to itself, which is about 12000 acres. They have 1800 acres in wheat, 1000 acres in alfalfa and are preparing to put out 3000 acres of cotton next spring. The Ranch home is equipped with every convenience, all kinds of mills, modern machinery, electric plants, in fact almost everything that heart could want or money could buy. They are selling for \$40.00 to \$50.00 per acre. As the Indians die off, the Miller boys have succeeded in getting hold of pretty much all the land within the ranch that can be bought at all. Their ranch extends 22 miles North and South and 4 to 6 miles East to West. They have 1600 head of cattle, 500 head of horses and mules, 300 hogs and 20 buffaloes. They sold \$5000.00 worth of cotton a few days ago and have \$4000.00 yet to sell. Mrs. Miller was born in Rockcastle County and is related to the Fish, Carson and Poyner families. She is a genuine type of old Kentucky domestic woman. She spends most of her time fussing with her poultry, pigeons, etc. She has just completed a pigeon house and jennery connected at a cost of \$700.00. It is a hundred and fifty feet long, and one side is built of glass. She has 500 chickens, and geese by the hundreds. The geese are so large that it takes one hand to hold it down while she picks it. She has about 1000 Homer pigeons which are the most beautiful things on the ranch. To de-

scribe this ranch in detail would take up too much time and space. I have stood my trip just fine and am feeling tip top. I will leave here about next Saturday for Oklahoma City to meet William Jennings Bryan according to promise. Will let you hear from me later. Yours very truly, J. Henry Fish.

The Public Has the Right To Be Informed...
Much has been said about the issue of the condemnation of the Oscar Isaac Road, since the petition to condemn was filed on August 30, 2000. However, the most important issue pending at the present is the ownership of the property upon which the road was built. The county claims ownership and title to this property by and through a deed dated by Oscar Isaac in 1976. Ask the reader to simply consider what the chain of title reveals on the issue. Once you have reviewed the information, then you decide for yourself. Also, an important question remains unresolved in my mind: How can you deed away property for which you do not have a title?
Heretofore fifty deeds of title to this land, by deed from Oscar Isaac to Charlie Isaac, a 20 acre tract of land in 1943, granting a 15 foot right of way for a distance of 720 feet and 25 land (2145) from a set stone just north of the Copper Creek Road running Northeast to below the first curve in the Oscar Isaac Road next to Karen Ramsey's property - end of right of way, Charlie Isaac and his dad, Albert Isaac, built a private road on the newly purchased land in 1943, running to meet the James Sparks' driveway where Charlie Isaac then owned a house, end of private road. Charlie Isaac sells this 20 acre tract, no exception of the private road, to Walter Miracle in 1944. Walter Miracle deeds 12 acres of the 20 acre tract to Bill Sparks in 1945 and the remaining 8 acres to James Sparks in 1946. Upon the death of Bill and Eva Sparks, the 12 acres fell to the Sparks' heirs. Then in 1967, the O'Neals, Denver and Margie, bought the property belonging to the Sparks' heirs, along with two other tracts, tract #1 and tract #2, also previously owned by Walter and Myrtle.
The O'Neal's tract #3, consisting of 12 acres, came from the Oscar Isaac chain of title. The reason this is important to note is because it is the tract that Charlie Isaac built his private road on in 1943.
My tract of land joins the O'Neal's property at or near the first curve in the Oscar Isaac Road, which calls into question the rightful ownership of the 2145' deeded section as a 15 foot right of way to Charlie Isaac. In 1943, Oscar Isaac, The 2145 has the appearance of being a private road, belonging to Bill Sparks, a road Bill Sparks used to get to a small house on the west side of the now called Oscar Isaac Road. The road built by Charlie Isaac, 1943, lies directly into the private road of Bill Sparks based on the observation of a 1950 aerial picture.
Again, I Karen Ramsey, ask the question: How can you deed property to anyone without having a title showing ownership of the land?

2001 Burley Tobacco Quota

The Secretary of Agriculture has announced the 2001 national marketing quota for burley tobacco (type 31) is 332 million pounds, of which Kentucky's quota is 164,073 pounds. The 2001 national quota for burley tobacco reflects a 34.4 percent increase from the 2000 crop. The 2001 quota of burley tobacco was allocated to producers from the local FSA office on Thursday, February 8th. Sales after January 25th are not included on these notices. Therefore, if you had sales after January 25th you will receive a corrected notice after March 15th when the office receives late sales listings.

Burley Tobacco Leasing of Quota

April 2nd is the first date producers shall execute a lease for the 2001 quotas. Leasing will end on July 3, 2001.

Burley Tobacco Referendum Results

Hampion Heaton, Jr., State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency, today announced the preliminary results of voting by burley tobacco growers in Kentucky on whether to continue poundage-marketing quotas and price support for the next three years. Burley tobacco farmers voted in the final referendum between February 12 and 16. Votes were counted in all local FSA County Offices on February 21.

The results for Kentucky show that 85.4% of the 86,954 eligible producers who voted in the referendum, or 98.5% voted to keep quotas and price support for the next three years.

Marketing Cards

Producers who have sold the current year's crop of tobacco are encouraged to return their marketing card to the FSA as soon as possible. Marketing cards not returned to the FSA are not used for marketing and are not recorded for accuracy. Failure to return marketing cards promptly could result in producers receiving incorrect information for the 2001 quota, scheduled to be released February 8th.

USDA appoints Hall to Kentucky Post

The USDA has announced the appointment of Jeffrey S. Hall to serve as the state executive director of USDA's Farm Service Agency in Kentucky. Hall, from Louisville, is an advisor to the Dean of the College of Agriculture at the University of Kentucky. He served on the staff of Kentucky Senator Mitch McConnell from 1988 to 1994 and was with the Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation from 1984 to 1988. Hall is a graduate of Purdue University with a degree in Agriculture.

FSA ensures the well-being of American agriculture, the environment and the American public through efficient and equitable administration of farm commodity programs; farm ownership; operating and emergency loans; conservation and environmental programs; emergency and disaster assistance; domestic and international food assistance and inter-

national export credit programs.

DLMA-II Sign-Up
Sign-up for DLMA-II will begin February 26 and end on March 30. Producers eligible for this sign-up include the following: Producers paid on less than 12 mos. base production under DLMA I or II, new dry producers for calendar year 2000 and dry producers who were eligible for DLMA I or II and never signed up. Producers should be advised the importance of the March 30 deadline. No late filed applications will be accepted.

Kentucky 2001 Crop Review Report

The Risk Management Agency (RMA), which administers crop insurance, and the FSA State Office will conduct a joint effort to carry out crop review inspections throughout Kentucky this year. This combined effort is directed to maintain and improve the integrity of USDA programs that comprise a part of the safety net for agricultural producers. The RMA, Southern Regional Compliance Office and the Kentucky State FSA Office together will conduct these on-site growing season crop review inspections throughout crop year 2001. Producers who have received crop insurance indemnities under USDA crop disaster assistance will be selected by RMA for the review. The crop reviews will be conducted both after planting and again before the harvest.

This combined plan continues the efforts of each agency to identify and eliminate fraud, and waste and abuse of USDA programs. The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000 called for joint efforts by RMA and FSA to improve efficiency and integrity of program benefits.

Fair Changes

Producers who have purchased or sold land need to contact the local FSA office for proper reconstructions of farms. Farms enrolled with PFC have until the deadline of June 18 to file for reconstructions of farms. Farms not enrolled with PFC have until the deadline of July 1st. Remember to bring your deed and/or to notify the local FSA office to do so. Also notify this office of any and/or all address changes. REMEMBER: our records are only as current as producers inform us of.

Redesigned Web Site

FSA has announced the introduction of a redesigned FSA web site at www.fsa.usda.gov. The redesign includes user-friendly features and easily accessible online FSA forms. Producers now receive county loan deficiency payment rates and expanded program information directly from the web site. With new online forms, farmers, ranchers and ranchers can download program and disaster assistance forms when it's most convenient for them.

and the UK Children's Hospital—for their health care, including 4,571 Rockcastle County residents.

"UK continues to be a powerful force in Kentucky in a variety of ways. The university's professors provide advice to state officials on many diverse subjects of vital importance, ranging from building roads at lower costs to helping revenue officials evaluate tax rates," said Mark Boger, a UK economics professor and advisor to governors.

"UK's impact is so pervasive that people have come to take it for granted. They often don't realize how far UK reaches into their communities...and even into their own homes," he added.

In Rockcastle County, for example, local residents consulted with UK's Cooperative Extension agents on a broad range of issues on 29,786 occasions, seeking information on more health dinner recipes, household budgeting and weather precautions important to both farmers and homeowners. Across Kentucky, families using this service - the nation's third largest Extension service - reduced their health-care costs by \$24 million. Meanwhile, farmers saw their revenues rise from \$25 million.

Business people in Rockcastle County made five inquiries for information about better methods of calculating future profits and improving competitiveness. The advice offered by consultants of UK's Small Business Development Centers resulted in an average annual increase of sales, by its clients of nearly \$180,000.

Rockcastle County's men and women who work in manufacturing plants may have benefited from reduced job opportunities created by improved efficiency and productivity, if their employer used the consulting services of UK's Industrial Extension Service. This program, and UK's Lean Manufacturing Institute, advises nearly 350 companies a year on ways to heighten profitable operations, and most of these companies are in Kentucky.

UK's far-reaching economic impact will extend into Rockcastle County, as coming generations seek their degrees both on the campus in Lexington and on the Internet via Kentucky's Commonwealth Virtual University. Better earnings, a more educated work force and a higher tax base - the evidence of real prosperity - can be expected.

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Report to the People

By State Senator Albert Robynson

As we are now past the halfway point in the 2001 session of the General Assembly, I want to bring you up to date on what the Senate is doing to make sure that law-abiding citizens are safe from crime and that criminals are punished according to their actions.

Three bills that have recently been debated in the Senate deal with crime and punishment (a fourth bill, one that I introduced, passed the Senate and is now being considered in the House).

I voted for Senate Bill 83 this week, helping it pass the Senate unanimously. This bill will allow prosecutors to charge a person with kidnapping if the kidnapper intends to "raise the child as their own." This new kidnapping law grew out of a 1985 case in Marion County in which a woman stole a baby from a hospital and tried to convince her boyfriend that it was their child. Under current law, that person can only be charged with custodial interference, which is a misdemeanor.

Senate Bill 101 deals with a disturbing problem in our culture—the use of "date rape" drugs. This legislation increased the penalty for Robynson, known on the street as a "roofie." The drug is not FDA approved, cannot be sold legally in the United States, and is ten times more potent than Valium.

Perhaps the scariest threat about the drug is its ability to render a victim unconscious for up to eight hours with just one small tablet, which is usually less than \$5. This legislation increases the penalty against sexual predators who use Robynson to a Class D felony and increases the penalty for trafficking in the drug to a Class C felony. Both offenses are currently misdemeanors.

Another bill that is long overdue, and one I have long supported, is Senate Bill 157, also known as the "wrongful death" bill. This bill will allow the recovery of damages whenever the death of a person results from an injury inflicted by the negligence or wrongful act of another.

In this new law, "person" is defined as any living human from fertilization onward. This will give family members legal recourse in the event that their child is killed due to negligence. This bill received bipartisan support in the Senate and will now go to the House for consideration.

It is important that the citizens of the Commonwealth are safe from crime.

The passage of these bills allows us to protect our citizens and charge those who violate the law with tough penalties.

Along those same principals, I am currently watching closely the fate of my bill, already passed in the Senate, that will more severely punish those who steal flowers and other items from gravesites, and those that actually dig up a body for the purposes of stealing something of value.

One of my chief objectives during every session of the General Assembly is to bring the concern of my

constituents to Frankfort, certainly, protecting the rights of the grieving is something that's been on the minds of many of you because of several high profile incidents in recent weeks regarding gravesite theft. That legislation is in the House of Representatives now, and I am doing all I can to make sure it becomes law.

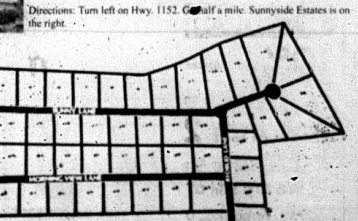
