The highly publicized criminal case of a local farmer and land developer has come to a close.

Last Priday, Benton Bullock, 53, of Mt. Vernon, who had been indicated for receiving stolen lobacco and for bribing a witness, both felonies, was sentenced to four years probation and ordered to pay a \$3,000 fine.

In December, Bullock was indicated after he allegedly admitted to knowingly, buying stolen tobacco from two local men.

## Two federal indictments

Two Rockcastile County men were indicted last tweek by a federal grand jury, according to a news release from the Department of Justice. The indicinents were returned by a federal grand jury in London, against, Jonathan E. Cromer. 21, of Mt. Vermon. According to the indictment Cromer is accused of having over 17 grants of methamphetamine, 95 tablets of the powerful pain killer Cromer is accused of the proper of the powerful pain killer. Senate Bill 101' deals with a distribution problem in our vulture-the

Senate Bill 107 deals with a dis-turbing problem in our culture-the use of "date rape drugs." This legis-lation imageases the penalty for Rohypnol, known on the street as a "roofie." The drug is not FDA ap-proved, cannot be sold legally in the United States, and is ten times more potent than Valium.

United States, and is ten times more protent than Valium.

Perhaps the scariest thing about the drug is its ability to render a victim unconscious for up to eight hours with just one small tablet, which is usually below SS. This legislation increases the penalty against sexual prediators who use Rohypnol to a Class D felony and increases the penalty for trafficking in the drug to a Class Class Good, Both offenses are currently misdemeanors.

Another bill that is long overdue, and one I have long supported, is Senate Bill 157, also known as the "wrongful death" bill. This bill will allow the recovery of damages whenever the death of a person results from an injury inflicied by the negligence or wrongstul act of the results.

In this new law, "person" is de-ned as any living human from ferfined as any living human from fer-tilization onward. This will give fam-ily members legal recourse in the event that their child is killed due to negligence. This bill received bipar-tisan support in the Senate and will now go to the House for consider-

penalties.

Along those same principals, I are currently watching closely the fate of my bill, already passed in the Senate, that will more severely punish those who steal flowers and other items from gravesites, and those that



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
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
