Vince Gill sang the song that has that chorus and I love being written by. If he didn't I'd love nothing better than credit the person who did and maybe apologize for taking advantage because that's the tune I've been humming for the last several days when I think about Wayne Stewart.  
Ever since I found out that Wayne had departed life on earth late last Wednesday night all I have to do is as alive as ever, smiling out loud at me and waving that skinny right arm and beckoning and throwing it across my shoulders and telling me that the world is a great place to be in and ain't I ever so lucky to be in it.  
I don't know that he ever used those exact words but that's the way he made me feel a thousand times more when I first moved from Letcher County down into the flatlands from what he called, "real Appalachia."  
"Real Appalachia" was the mountains east and deep south of Manchester and Hyden where a number of Rockcastle families had originated.

the highlands, the coal fields and Wayne Stewart had known a bunch of kids fresh from those hills whose families had migrated from the coalfields to the farmland with barely the shirts on their backs. He also knew and had deep respect for a few Rockcastle farmers whose roots ran straight to the Virginia line.  
I met Wayne in the Spring of 1973. I was working for a non-profit organization called Job Start that would eventually become Kentucky Highlands Investment Corporation and my job was to put together a base of community support that had some real accountability to the people of Southeastern Kentucky and, at the same time, avoided the perpetually corrupt political power trading that had some sort of control on every federal dollar coming into the region at that time.  
I don't remember who it was, but someone told me that I needed to go see Wayne Stewart because he was someone a person that both the politicians and the folks who despised politicians held in high regard.  
Wayne owned and was running Rockcastle Farm Supply at that time. He sold feed and seed and fertilizer to most of the farmers in the county and he had an old cooled wood floor

store on a back street in Mount Vernon that served as a business office and a showroom for washers and dryers and refrigerators and freezers and clock radios and the like. His prices were right and he sold on credit at zero interest. If a refrigerator was priced \$700 and Wayne trusted you, you could take it home for \$25 down and pay me when you can.  
"About everybody in the county loved him for that and the politicians had to respect him because everybody loved him."  
I'm sure it wasn't a plan. Wayne Stewart was born good hearted and kind and honest and loving and all the good adjectives I can think of. A lot of folks like that wind up teaching Sunday School and letting it go at that but Wayne had a higher calling.  
He was never elected, except for a term on the city council of Mt. Vernon, to public office as far as I know but he was constantly being pushed into taking responsibility.  
The best and maybe the only thing that I have ever done that made a difference for Southeastern Kentucky is talk Wayne Stewart into serving on the Kentucky Highlands Investment Corporation Board of Directors.

retorts and later sit in his office until 5 in the morning convincing him that he was the only logical candidate to chair that board.  
Wayne was my mentor, my rock, my confidante, my big brother, my father in many ways for more than ten years. He held the same esteem for all the presidents of KHIC and many of the staff right up until his death.  
Last Saturday morning, the day of his funeral, Fred Beste, one of those past presidents called me from Northern Kentucky fearing that I didn't know that Wayne was gone because I had referred to him in the present tense in an email the night before. I had said something to the effect that I hoped to live and be as vibrant as Wayne Stewart.  
And I do. Wayne Stewart's spirit is very much alive to me. I don't think that I will ever think of him in the past tense. Our neck of the woods has far too few heroes and Wayne Stewart is the best that I have ever known.  
Go rest high on that mountain but I swear you Wayne, your work on earth is not yet done. A bunch of us are left to carry on as best we can.

set the night it made its last appearance before disappearing for six months then dipped my feet in the Bering Sea. The trip to Maine was just as exciting. There I scrambled over the rocks below the pilot house and again wet my feet in the surf where the water from the Atlantic Ocean cooled them. So, an Atlas and dictionary were always close by to feed my interest and share the joys of reading and exploring with our grandchildren for they also loved maps.

A person's character is developed during childhood and I read somewhere in an old book that if we "Bring a child up in the way it should go, he will not depart from it." If parents will listen to this bit of advice and obey it, there will be better order in the schools, children will again respect and listen to their teachers, be better students and welcome guests wherever they go.

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# First Baptist Church opens Food and Clothing Mission

First came the vision, next came the prayer for guidance and help, immediately came the telephone call. Then came the work and more work mixed with more prayers. Finally the vision became a reality for the First Baptist Church when in October 2000 the door to a new food and clothing mission on Church Street was opened.

The youth at First Baptist, along with the former youth minister, Jesse Adkins, began feeling a real need for a large ministry that would encompass and bring physical and spiritual aid to those in need in our community. They began with a prayer that was answered the very next day with a call from James Lambert offering his vacant office building to the church for such a project.

The work began in the spring on the very old structure with many members pitching in to use their talents in the huge restoration. The many hours of labor on the project served also to bring the members closer as the building finally began to take shape. Since opening in October the mission has helped over 200 families. Co-directors Julie Ham and Kim Singleton envision later expanding to add discipleship classes, etc. Volunteers are at the mission each Monday-Wednesday and Friday from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

The mission statement that hangs on the wall reads: "Our mission is to physically and spiritually minister to the hungry and the thirsty based on the words and commands of Jesus in Matthew.

"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me." Matthew 25:35-36.

As in most volunteer projects, there are times when the pantry gets low on food and fresh volunteers are scarce but the faith of the directors and mission board remain strong that God will provide and with his help they can make a

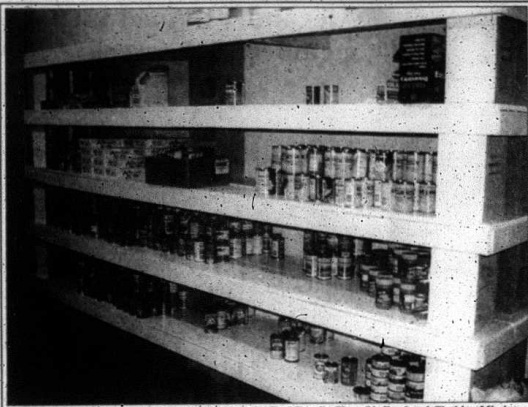
difference.

Our song was meant—God willed it so.



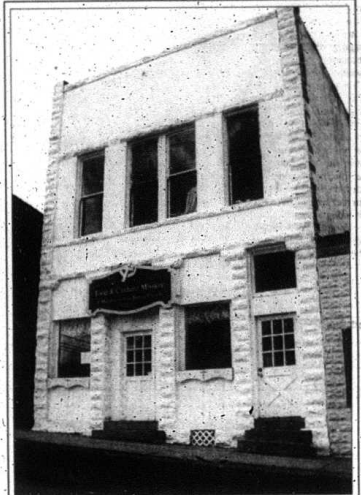

## Local education leaders focus on what helps children learn

How do teachers affect the ability of their students to learn? Can academic achievement be increased for all students? How will President Bush's education reform plans impact Kentucky schools?

While there's no single answer to any of these questions, Rockcastle County school leaders caught up on the latest in news and research on these and other issues during the 65th annual conference of the Kentucky School Boards Association (KSBA). Rockcastle County Superintendent Larry Hammond and board members Terry Burton, Mike Burdette, Martin Vanzant and Sam Stallworth were among the estimated 1,100 school board members, superintendents, school administrators and others who took part in the KSBA conference February 23-25 in Louisville.

Fifty conference sessions and workshops were tied to the theme, *Public education: striving for excellence...one student at a time*. The broad range of topics included tracking student achievement data, serving gifted and at-risk children, training classified staff in school safety techniques, working models for boards and school councils, increasing the supply of qualified schools administrators, and using technology for more efficient schools and expanded learning opportunities. Kentucky law requires school board members to receive annual professional development training. Many board members obtain a substantial portion of their training hours at the KSBA conference. KSBA members also received reports on bills before the 2001 General Assembly and from staff and members who recently met in Washington, D.C. with members of the Kentucky Congressional delegation. Participants in the 2001 KSBA Annual Conference also heard addresses by Kentucky Education Commissioner Gene Wilhoit, Wall Street CEO J. Mac Hoolley and Katie Haycock, executive director of the Washington, D.C. based Education Trust.

Jerry Nadeau, Gordon's teammate finished third and was leading the race until five laps ago.

"The car was tight. I was doing everything even losing the car in the turns to make it turn. The track got wet, we did everything we could, but we didn't have the car to win," said Nadeau.

After the race most drivers included Jeff Gordon and Dale Jarrett went over to the No. 3 pit and congratulated Richard Childress and his team, many of whom were in tears.

## Cleaning Float Trays

The greenhouse and float transplant production systems offer many advantages to tobacco transplant producers. However, a disadvantage of the float system is that it provides an ideal habitat for the development and spread of transplant diseases due to the constant presence of water. Therefore, a key to success with these production systems is keeping the pathogens causing diseases out of the systems.

A diligent sanitation program is a MUST! The media and water being used should be pathogen-free. All equipment and tools that come in contact with the system should be pathogen-free. That means either using new trays or re-used trays must be properly spayed and sanitized.

What is available to disinfect trays? Steam, methyl-bromide fumigation, chlorine bleach, and quaternary

ammonium chloride salts are available in Kentucky.

STEAMING the trays has been the most effective disinfectant, but, the cost is high and some items are damaged by steaming. Most studies indicate that the trays need to reach at least 160 degrees F. for 30 minutes, but this method presents problems for farmers in developing equipment to meet the temperature and time required.

FUMIGANTS: Methyl bromide with 1% chloropicrin has been almost as effective as steam in some of the tests. It provides excellent control of Rhizoctonia and other fungi on the surface of the tray. It will greatly reduce the level of Pythium, but has not been as effective as steam or proper bleaching in reducing Pythium, probably because a significant amount of Pythium is found embedded in the tray. It is important to have an airtight plastic seal, to pre-wet the trays, and to avoid large stacks of trays. Methyl bromide is heavier than air, so it sinks;

therefore, best results occur with long, short stacks rather than tall, deep stacks. We have found little control is provided at the low rates, so use the maximum labeled rates (3 lbs/1000 cubic ft.). Certain types of styrofoam trays appear to be more easily damaged with this chemical. Pay special attention to ALL label precautions related to safety.

CHLORINE BLEACH solutions have given a high level of control. Just dipping the trays in the solution and allowing them to dry is, not highly beneficial. We have found little benefit to using more than 10% solution. Without proper aeration and post-washes, salt residues can cause serious problems, especially with older trays that tend to soak up more material.

Bleaches work best when the trays are washed with soapy water, then dipped several times into clean 10% solution (1 gal/gal water), followed by covering them with a tarp or plastic to keep them wet overnight (24-48 hrs) with the bleaching solution. Afterwards, the bleach solution should be washed from the trays with clean water or water plus a

Q-salt listed below, followed by aeration to eliminate the chlorine and salts. Worker safety issues are also important with bleach. It is important that the bleach solution remain below pH 6.5 and that new solutions be made up every 2 hrs. or whenever it becomes dirty, whichever comes first. Organic matter will remove the active ingredients quickly.

Q-SALTS (Quaternary ammonium chloride salts): These are marketed under such names as Greenshield, Phasol, and Prevent or solutions containing 20% ammonium chloride. Many growers are

using them, but the effects are not as positive as some believe, based on UK testing. The greatest benefit is in the final wash and on exposed surfaces in the greenhouse. In all UK tests, Q-salts have always provided some control, as compared to using soap washes only, but have always been inferior to any of the above mentioned methods.

Bottom Line: Remove as much soil from the trays by using soap and water or high pressure washes. Completely soak the trays in 10% bleach solution, and cover with plastic for 24-48 hours,

followed by washing and airtight. Turn trays on their side for best air movement. Trays which are damaged allowing large amounts of last year's soil media to remain in crevices are candidates for being disposed of. Sanitation is very important. As trays are used more, more disease problems occur.

For products with DISEASE meters, an annual calibration is recommended. Contact the Extension Office if you would like to check your meters' accuracy.

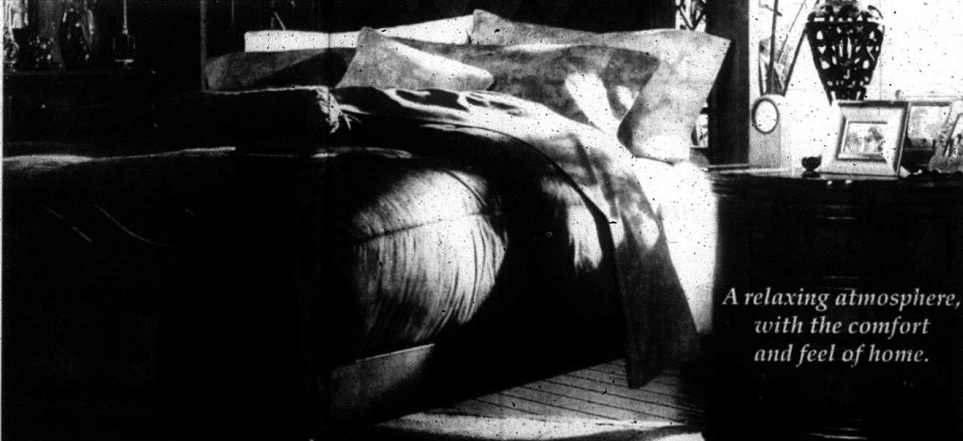

## A Tribute to Charles Holbrook

There are regular people who have regular and honorable lives. There are people however, that are different and live their lives in the spotlight, no matter where they are, or at what stage of life they are in. They leave an impression on you. They leave you with stories to tell, life stories, funny stories. The stories of your meeting. These people do not fear controversy; they thrive on it, and use it for social change, or simply for change of pace.

I knew a man who ran an election named Boom-Boom to run a monkey campaign. That monkey said things a person wouldn't say. Things about change, things about fun and things about other elected officials. In hindsight, the Boom-Boom character was a stroke of brilliance. The kids knew and loved him. They named a hamburger after Boom-Boom. Free statewide press picked up some of the antics and words, which were all a product of the mind of Charles D. Holbrook.

But you must look deeper to see the real Charles Holbrook who was more than an eccentric; he did most of those things to provoke conversations. He thrived on hearing the question of "why" he would do this, or do that. He pretended to be mad at you, simply to see you fluster, because he knew you desired his friendship and that you would ultimately make efforts to restore it. If you didn't, you could be sure he would come to you when you least expected it, with a fake Rolex watch, a real diamond ring, a pair of tennis shoes, a pocket knife or an offer of a deal of a lifetime.

Some of us received letters. Letters you could read over and over and get something new out of it each reading. Letters that you read and couldn't understand at first, then maybe later, he would give you clues about it. We have found letters written to him from state and national officials who had become his pen pals.

He was not afraid. He was a Veteran of Korea and had known adversity there, and seen death of friends.

He weathered the loss of his parents - whom he loved so much. He was a giver, and worked with social services. He was a teacher, and taught in the school system here. They would send him to the schools to help where kids were trouble and he would curp the problem. Some say they saw him in the woods with the boys digging graves. Probably.

He was a public servant. As Magistrate he fought for the needs of his district's people and his friends. Friends he had cultivated throughout the years. In school, in the community - and around the state. Written entries in the high school annual all consistently referred to Charles as a friend.

His friends knew him as Charles, as Boom-Boom, as Sleepy. And they visited with him often at the Dari Delite. He was a poet, a muse, a comedian and quite possibly a thorn to some; and oh how he loved to be your thorn. He seemed to be at his best when he had an issue to concentrate on, or when a fight was to be fought. He could gain media attention by doing what others would consider outrageous. He would chuckle at our reactions.

I remember bermauda shorts and cowboy boots, a half-shaved beard, different colored socks, funny hats and glasses without lenses. Roller-skates; red stockings, a shaved head, little cigars, ten watches on his wrists; funny shirts, scarves, gloves, rings, chickens in cages; greyhound racing dogs, turtles for the Rainbow people to eat, jumping turtles, rabbits, pictures and pocket knives. And a story to go with each.

He loved his brothers and sister. He would poke fun at Charlotte, but he had said she was his mother made over. He would fall in and out with them all, but Howell would always make sure he was all right. Howell tells of how when he would eat at the house, he would leave a handful of change in a box to cover the groceries. John Jr. would always marvel at Charles' antics and Charles always would remind him that it was not to

be understood - but to be enjoyed. That's why we called it "pulling a sleepy."

He would give you the shirt off his back, literally, he has done it. He would give you money if he had it - or you chose the right pocket. For Christmas you might get a present. It may be "used", but it was a gift. A pair of gloves, tennis shoes, whatever - it was from Charles.

As a friend - you were not called because of your financial situation - rich or poor, you were in with Charles. Been in jail, "so what, I've been there". Charles would say. No way people can believe he was nearing 70 years old - this guy was younger than that. Had to be. His mind was sharp "but I didn't know he had a college degree" they would say. I just thought he was sharp - some say brilliant, but he surely would not want you to think he was intelligent.

I can't say what all those things he did meant - he wanted most of it to be a mystery. I can't say if he was eccentric, or "out on" most of the time. How intelligent was he, the life record speaks to that - he accomplished goals, created change and conversation and taught us to laugh at ourselves. We are better for knowing Charles Holbrook - he made us think. He made us feel concern, and he caused us to try and have that twinkle in our eye.

So remember when you look into the eyes of his family, look closely - because you will see Charles there - and he's smiling.

### Still Trying to Change Your Family Members?

The first time I remember seeing my wife-to-be, she was playing Eliza Doolittle in the musical production "My Fair Lady." When she sang "I Could Have Danced All Night," I was entranced.

This is not a column about my wife of thirty years, however. It is about trying to change someone. In the play "My Fair Lady" Professor Henry Higgins tries to remake Eliza, a poor street woman, and pass her off as royalty at the ball. He bets his friend that he can succeed. (To find out whether or not he does, rent the movie starring Rex Harrison and Julie Andrews.)

In real life changing another person is a very difficult thing to do. In fact it is impossible, but that does not keep many people from trying.

Consider the case of Esmerelda. (All characters are fictitious.) Esmerelda was attracted to Herman because of his good looks and his charm. He was fun-loving and carefree in ways that had never been known to the old saying "opposites attract" has some truth to it. Esmerelda fell in love, and they were soon wed.

Obviously to those potential problems, she pressed on doggedly with her project to remake Herman the way she thought he should be. She

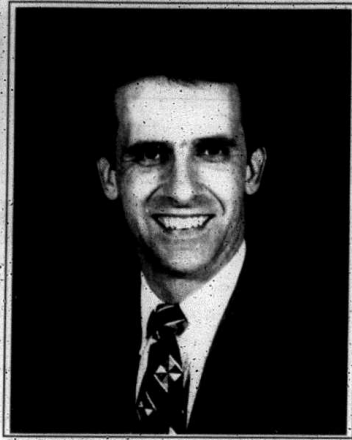
was trying to make him in her own image, quiet, sedate and responsible, when that is not what attracted her to him in the first place.

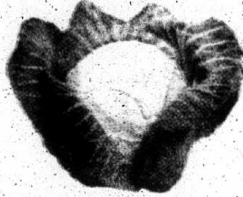

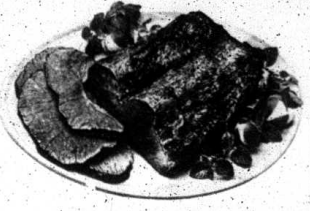

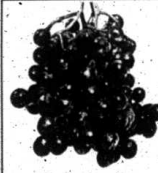

### Barley Tobacco

**Leasing of Quotas**  
April 2nd is the first date producers shall execute a lease for the 2001 quotas. Leasing will end on July 1, 2001. Any producer wishing to stop their name to the Tobacco Lease In or Lease Out Listing may do so now. You do not need to wait until April 2nd. If you are unable to come to the office you may notify the office staff to post the listing by calling 606-256-2525.

**2001 Barley Tobacco Quota**  
The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced the provisions of the 2001 barley tobacco program.

For each farm, the 2001 basic quota will be up approximately 34.4 percent from 2000.

The effective quota is expected to be about 352 million pounds, or 15.4 million pounds below 2000.

The barley tobacco no net cost agreement will be, in total, cents oneach pound of the 2001 crop barley tobacco that is marketed. According, as between the producer and purchaser of domestic 2001 crop barley tobacco, the net cost agreement will be one cent for the producer and one cent for the purchaser.

### DMLA-II Sign-Up

Sign-up for DMLA-II began February 26 and will end on March 30. Producers eligible for this sign-up include the following: Producers paid on less than 12 mo. base production under DMLA I or II, new dairy producers for calendar year 2000 and dairy producers who were eligible for DMLA I or II and never signed up. Producers should be advised the importance of the March 30 deadline. No late filed applications will be accepted.

### Farm Changes

Producers who have purchased or sold land need to contact the local FSA office for proper reconstitutions of farms. Farms enrolled with PFC have until the deadline of June 1st to file for reconstitutions of farms. Farms

not enrolled with PFC have until the deadline of July 1st. Remember to bring your deed and/or jo to notify the new owner to do so. Also notify this office of any and/or all address changes. REMEMBER: our records are only as current as producers inform our office.

**USDA advises farmers to check corn seed before planting**  
Jeffery S. Hall, Kentucky State FSA Executive Director, announced today that USDA recommends farmers should not plant any corn unless they are certain that the seed has been tested and found free of the protein Cry9c.

According to Hall, farmers should insist that seed companies verify that the seed corn has been tested for the protein Cry9c to ensure that only tested seed is planted this spring.

StarLink is the trade-name for corn genetically modified to be pest resistant by producing a protein called Cry9c. The protein acts as a pesticide and is able to protect the plant from pests, such as the European Corn Borer. The protein was developed by Aventis Crop Sciences, a subsidiary of the French company, Aventis S.A., sold through various U.S. seed companies.

Last week some seed companies reported finding isolated occurrences of extremely low levels of Cry9c in seed originally intended for sale this year. Based on aggregate information voluntarily provided by the American Seed Trade Association (ASTA), of those companies reporting, it is estimated that less than one percent of corn seeds for 2001 planting, may contain Cry9c protein.

Companies involved have recovered and taken control of all lots of hybrid corn seed found to have this protein. Seed companies routinely test their products for impurities and

many took steps to detect Cry9c before USDA recommended testing procedures on December 29, 2000.

Major seed companies have informed USDA of their intent to continue following recommended testing procedures designed to detect Cry9c, and USDA will monitor this activity. In the event Cry9c is found, these companies will not sell the corn seed for planting.

USDA continues to work closely on this issue with the Food and Drug Administration, the Environmental Protection Agency, Iowa State University, National Corn Growers Association, American Seed Trade Association, and Aventis.

## The Basics of Losing Weight

Whether you have 5 pounds to lose or whether you have 20, there's only one way to lose weight and that's to use up more calories than you take in. This means that you must either select foods containing fewer calories than you normally eat or you must increase your activity—preferably both. Generally, to lose one pound a week, you must either decrease calorie intake by about 500 calories a day or burn up those 500 calories by increasing physical activity. A steady loss of 1/2 to 1 pound a week is about right.

All calories count—regardless of the food they come from. But, some foods have more calories than others. The fat in foods and alcohol in alcoholic beverages have about twice as many calories as carbohydrates and protein.

Protein, vitamins, minerals, and some fat and carbohydrates too, are

essentials of a good diet regardless of its caloric content. The healthy approach in losing weight is to choose a variety of foods providing the nutrients needed, and to go easy on foods that supply mainly calories. Examples are sugars, sweets, fats and oils, foods that are high in sugars and fats and, of course, soft drinks and alcoholic beverages.

Nutrition scientists recommend that everyone avoid, too much fat, sugar, and alcohol. However, when trying to lose weight it's especially important to moderate intake of foods high in fat, sugar, and alcohol. They're often the source of "extra" calories.

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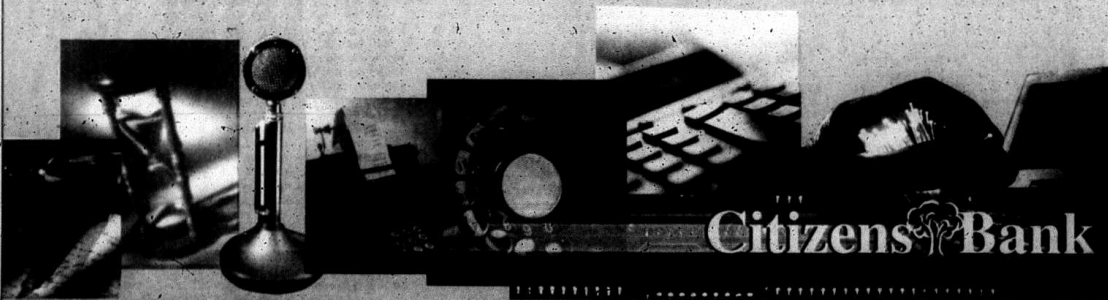
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
