Stewart released from Madison County jail after posting bond

An Orlando man who is facing murder charges in Rockcastle County and other criminal charges in Madison County has been released on bond. Davy Stewart, 32, was indicted in October by a Rockcastle Grand Jury. He is accused of killing Patty Clark, 25, of Conway on August 9 of last



Kentucky remains a largely white state that is leaving its rural roots and becoming more urban, according to the census. the census.

The greatest population growth during the last decade occurred along

during the last decade occurred along interstates and in the "Golden Tri-angle" area between Lexington, Lou-isville and Northern Kentucky, the

census shows.

The opposite occurred on the fringes of the state-the coalfields of Eastern Kentucky and the counties of far Western Kentucky-which lost thousands.

Overall, Kentucky's population nds at just over 4 million—up from million in 1990. That's a change 3.6 million in 1990. That's a change of nearly 10 percent during the last decade—and a jump from the 1980s, when the state grew less than one bercent.

"The good news is that we are growing...but the growth is occur-ring in urban areas," said Ron Crouch, director of the State Data Center in Louiseille.

Louisville.

The urban growth reflects a national trend, Crouch said, and it will have political and personal implications for Renucky's future as metropolitan areas attract a larger share of state and federal dollars.

Urban areas also will increasingly pick up political representation, while






