

Lane said that Cameron's estranged giffriend, Linda Rogers, with measurement of the control of the c

Lane said that Cameron and Rogers had been having trouble and that he had been waiting on her to return home, when the two of them began to talk, around 8 p.m. last Monday.

New council members will receive at least six hours of training to prepare them for their role on the council


