When the final prayers were said and his immediate family had begun making their ways back to their cars, I stood by beside his coffin, touched it one last time and plucked a bright red rose off the family spray.

I clutched it to my chest thinking to myself, that it was something I could keep. Maybe I could freeze dry and shrink wrap it and put it in my tackle box. Maybe, somehow, that rose could keep Junior alive and with me the next time I went fishing.

Alex Helton, Junior's best friend, was with me in almost every sense of the word since 1983. We were not blood related, but when my own Dad died

in December of that same year and word got out in the community, Junior was the first to call. Dad was 150 miles away. Junior was maybe two miles away but on Harmon's Lick that's about the same as being next door.

"I'll be around there in a minute," he said and he hung up.

And maybe five minutes later, he rolled up into the driveway with his big Ford pickup and for two or three hours he listened to me talk about my life, and I had taken against an old basketball goal post.

I had been helping Junior harvest tobacco all fall, the hardest, hottest, back-breaking work I've ever done in my life, and I had taken noon meals with Junior and his wife, Molly, almost every day. I needed the hard work to sweat out the poison in my system and get back into physical shape.

Stripping the tobacco off the stalk and being it at night for the market in December was almost like a bonus for having helped with the barn work and that's what we had been doing the night before I got the news of my Dad.

I'm not sure how it happened or why, but I know that I was nothing more than casual hired help for the Heltons up until that day.

For weeks after Dad's funeral, Junior checked on me every single evening.

"Hello Young Man. How is the weather on your end of the road? What are you doing tomorrow? Would you care to ride down to London with me to look at whatever? Where do you reckon the fish are biting?"

In short order I had him involved in my photography business and for several months we spent every day together driving all over central Kentucky.

Junior and I bonded because he was worried about me at first and then because we had so much in common. We both loved to fish and hunt. We were both from the highest hills in Kentucky and we understood each other. And even though I had no love for the labor of tobacco farming, we became as close kin as family even though we shared no common blood.

I often tell my friends Junior and Molly raised me after I moved back to the flat lands. And it's the truth. To call us close is an understatement. Over the last fifteen years there has

been a lot of things that have happened. I've moved into a new house with two T.V.s, one each for the bedroom and living room, then came Charles Saylor and helper with three mattresses, two for twin beds and one queen size for the master bedroom. Polly and Chuck were here to help get the bed frames from the garage where they had been stored since the fire, so they also had to be cleaned and readied for the mattresses. And, I thought I was moving back to a newly redecorated and ready-to-live-in house. I guess I could call it my surprise home welcoming party for I certainly was surprised by the incomplete and not ready to live in condition of everything. Just last week, two of the helpers came over and put in the light over the sink, door bells, pulls on some of the overhead lights I couldn't reach and the coat rack. Yesterday, the back porch carpet was laid and, hopefully, next week, the edging around the bathroom carpets will be finished. Oh yes, the carpenters (they call themselves cabinet makers), did come and lower the cabinets two inches and it helped a little, two more would have been better for me. Now I have all these beautiful cabinets lining my walls but the most I can store in them is AIR. Thank goodness my niece, who was helping me, is tall. It was she that discovered the cabinets were built ceiling high without making allowance for a lower shelf. So, she adjusted the set to highest one in each cabinet within reaching distance for me. The contractors could have them all lowered and bring the additional shelves - which have not arrived.

There are still boxes and bags of who knows what all to go through and enough yarn was hidden in some of them to keep me busy crocheting for several years. New curtains have been hung but no drapes, a couple of pictures but no wall decorations till I

can sort through them and decide on which ones to keep, etc. So, I am not fully settled in, but things are looking like a woman is finally living here, even though some boxes of decorative plates and stacks of pictures are evident along the baseboards and the old lady responsible for it all would like to be able to call the front office or restaurant across the drive and say, "I'm ready for a cup of coffee and my morning paper." (I am always looking back on the "good" days). 





If your child will be a Rockcastle County High School student next year, please consider this important opportunity to help make our school even stronger than it is today!

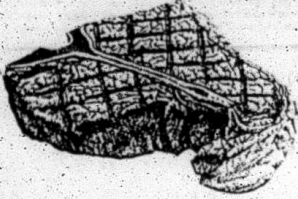

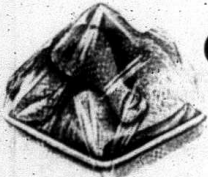

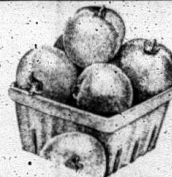

It wouldn't be quite fair to "Sweet and SOUR" if I didn't open a little window toward the new Berpa Bank, which is being built between my house and Richmond Street because they have cut down the beautiful trees I have watched put forth their green leaves in early spring, shade the sidewalk and lawn in the summer with their canopy of full grown leaves, watched them sway in the breeze when the wind was whispering or head to the ground with the weight of a heavy rain during a storm, glorify the whole street in the fall with their magnificence colors, starting with a small patch of faint yellow in the very top and gradually adding to it

it deeper yellow, orange and red until they would blend and become as flames, licking and leaping from limb to limb when a breeze gently moved them under a street light. Either of them would have been worth a fortune if an artist could have captured and transferred onto his/her canvas the exquisite beauty I have been watching from my kitchen window for 10 years. And, that wasn't the last of their beauty. When nature tapped them and said, "It's time for your nap," they obediently let loose and fluttered to the ground beneath where a bright carpet was spread until nature sent another cover of white.

not been a Christmas or Thanksgiving Dinner go by that they were not at each other's home.

Sometimes we ate at both places. I haven't had a cookout, birthday party, or whatever event gave cause for a meal in the last three years, sometimes twice or three times a month, that I wouldn't have canceled if Junior and Molly couldn't make it or I couldn't get a plate to them.

Last week, just hours after his death, I sat down with a legal pad intending to list all the times Junior and I had been fishing together. In less than thirty minutes I came up with more than a hundred places, not times, places. The list was approaching four pages. The trips would number over two thousand. Because hardly a week went by, even in cold weather, that we didn't find an opportunity to wet a line.

Mostly we fished the lakes and streams and rivers and farm ponds of central and eastern Kentucky. We ventured into Tennessee a few times and even Virginia and Indiana but mostly we fished the fryng pan within a few miles of home. We have been out in May and June under circumstances that would make a Japanese horror movie producer gasp. We talked and dreamed, year-round, of long treks to Alaska and Northern

Canada or going to the Gulf or Atlantic Coasts. I made several trips to Florida and North Carolina to fish off Chatter boats and long piers and literally grieved that Junior was not along to share the fun.

I would come home and give him a report and it was always, "When are we going back?" And the answer was always, "Soon. Soon. Junior.

Soon. We have to do this together because it ain't no fun without you," and he would laugh and his eyes would twinkle.

Junior Hehous would laugh in the eye of a hurricane if he ever saw one. "Let her rip!" He didn't seek adversity but it never caused him to blink an eye. He played the cards the way that they were dealt and never flustered at the dealer.

One night we were fishing on

Laurel Lake maybe an mile from where we had dumped the boat in and the trout were biting and they were big. We were leaning on one end of the lake and our truck was on the other and along about midnight the fish quit biting. Fog had rolled in like cotton candy when we decided to come off the lake.

Three hours later, we had humped into the same buoy marker three times and it was maybe three hundred yards from where we had started when we decided to go home and the fog was getting thicker. We could hardly see each other from one end of the boat to the other.

I had ceased until I was out of breath and I finally killed the boat motor and let her drift for a minute. "Junior," I said, "We are @#\$%&\*&# lost!!!!!!"

"Why Son, I know exactly where

we are so settle down," he said.

"So where are we then," I went to know thinking that maybe he had a clue.

"We're on the upper end of Laurel Lake," he said. "But our truck is lost. How many nightdrivers do we have left?"

I couldn't see his eyes but I know they were twinkling. Last week, when I announced his death to my friends on the Internet, I had half a dozen replies that mentioned the twinkle in Junior's eye. Always the twinkle in his eye.

Tonight when I drove across Silver Creek between Richmond and Paint Lick, my heart became suddenly heavy because there is no way that I will ever wet a hook in that most excellent smallmouth stream again without thinking of Junior.

And then it occurred to me that

there is nothing wrong with that. I need to find a younger fishing buddy to mentor like Junior did me and when I see Junior's reflection in the ripples I need only walk back to know that all is well.

If you've up there reading this week's paper, Junior Hehous, I hope the fish are biting and that they all are keepers. I miss you pal but somehow I know that you'll always be with me. Thank You for the good times.

Thank you for the ones to come. Thank you for the opportunity to sit down beside a buddy and tell him, "One time me and Junior came to this hole and-----" You know the rest of the story.

And God knows I love you from the bottom of my heart and with ever fiber of my being for making it possible for me to do the telling.

neurotic behaviors and resort to cannibalism and tail-biting. Pigs are dunked in tanks of scalding water after they are stunned to soften their hides for skinning. Since pigs are frequently stunned improperly, they often die from being scalded and drowned.

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# ROCHS girls' track team wins Lake Cumberland Classic

The ROCHS girls' and boys' varsity track and field teams recently competed in the 25th Annual Lake Cumberland Classic Track and Field Meet in Somerset. Twenty-five teams were on hand for the annual competition of some of the state's best track and field teams.

Those players spanned a twenty year period, in which Rader had coached more players than anyone else in the Little League program.

A lot of coaches have put in their time and money over the years, but no one else loved the game more than Rader and loved being around his players more than he did.

Many of us have coached - but only while our children were involved, but Rader came back year after year and was a fixture in the program.

He coached many of the players who now play at the high school and who are ranked third in the entire state.

It would be enjoying this season as much as anybody - and who knows, maybe he is.

**Hamilton wins caution-free Talladega**

Bobby Hamilton, driver of the No. 55 Square D Chevrolet, made a move on leader Tony Stewart with two laps to go in Sunday's Winston Cup race at Talladega 500 and then outpaced the remainder of the field for his first victory for car owner Andy Petree.

When asked what strategy he used to win, Hamilton replied, "I watched that 3 car last year and how he came from the outside. When I saw Joe (teammate, Joe Nemechek), come up behind me, I knew everything was going to be all right."

Hamilton drove the same car Kenny Wallace drove to a second place finish last year.

Crew Chief, Jimmy Elledge was ecstatic over his driver's win. "It's unreal," he said, "Lobby got messed up on that last pit stop, but after he got four tires, he did the rest."

Hamilton only led three laps, but two of them were the last two, and the ones that counted. The win has his first in 101 races.

Sterling Marlin led the most laps (53), but he finished 23rd, Tony Stewart narrowly beat Kurt Busch to the stripe for second.

"When I saw him getting the run I knew he was going to get it by me. My concern was not falling all the way back to 20th," said Stewart.

The race was caution-free and it was the third-fastest Winston Cup event in NASCAR history. There were 36 lead changes among a Winston Cup record-tying 26 different leaders. Mark Martin's win in May of 1997 was the only other caution-free race at Talladega.

**Fanfare: Pit Strategy**

Pit stops and pit strategy can give a driver a win or take away a possible one.

"I don't know how they are getting on pit road so good. We've been losing three or four seconds a pit stop. We're losing out 14- and 15-second stops and getting beat. Between our poor pit stops and getting in and out of pit road is how we lost the race," said Ward Burton after last Sunday's Southern 500 at Darlington. Spencer who was leading the race when he pitted for tires along with all the other drivers. But after a 17-second pit stop, he was fifth.

The road where all the cars come down for repairs, tires and fuel after they leave the track is called pit road. In the late 1980's one of Bill Elliott's crew was killed after being hit by another car. In 1989, NASCAR set a speed limit (which is different at each track) and initiated penalties for drivers that speed in or out of it.

Knowing when to pit is as essential as having a fast car. Near the end of races teams who are near the front don't like to stop to take on new tires because they would have to give up track position. With most front-running Winston Cup cars almost equal in horsepower, one or two seconds in the pits can mean the difference between a win and a fifth of sixth-place finish.

Teams gamble whether they should pit for fresh tires or stay out on the track. It's called "pulling the dice." Normally if the leader pits late in a race all other cars on the lead lap will follow. The cars that remain on the track are either out of sync on their pit-stops, or they have no hope of winning if they pit.

By remaining on the track while the leaders pit means they gain a better track position towards the front of the field. Sometimes pit-stop gambles don't pay off, and someone who didn't have the dominant car wins.

Usually teams spend the first half of the race adjusting and tweaking the car so their driver can make a run for the lead late in the race. A bad or long pit stop can ruin all their efforts.

The teams were faced with another variable this season. Goodyear reduced the number of different tires they furnish. Teams had to throw away all of their old notes and start over. Normally the tires are never run over 65 laps, but teams usually stop earlier.

The crew chief must decide how much air pressure should be in the tires. Too little, or too much pressure, and the car won't handle right.

During the last race of 2000, Jerry Nadeau took on only two tires while to

Dale Earnhardt and Bobby Labonte got four fresh ones. Seemingly, Nadeau was at a disadvantage but he held them off to win the Cracker Bar-

rel 500.

"We got down a couple times, but the caution and taking on two tires helped us," said Nadeau.

The next time you hear a driver in Victory Lane thanking his pit crew you will understand why.

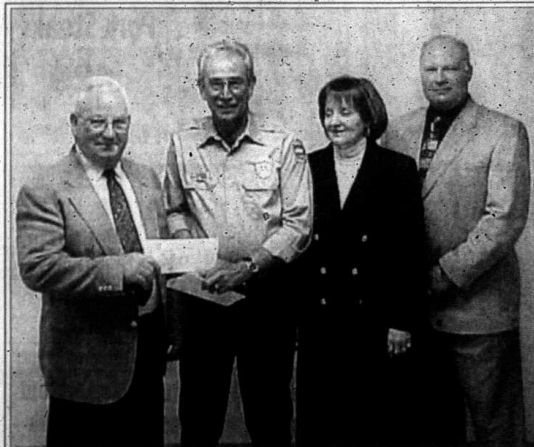

## Farm News

**Caterpillar  
Invasion**

Seems that over the past 10 days everywhere you look tree branches are covered with white silk-like insect nests. This is the annual invasion of Eastern Tent Caterpillars. Although entomologists indicate this insect will not kill trees, most homeowners cannot stand the thought of their tree being food for thousands of caterpillars.

Tent caterpillars will strip the leaves off trees. The larvae feeding period last 4 to 6 weeks or until they are about 2 inches long. As caterpillars mature to a length of 2 inches, they stop eating and start crawling in search of a rough surface to spin a cocoon in which to pupate. The adult or moth will emerge in a few weeks but there will not be another generation of this insect until next year.

Home owners overreaction can

actually damage trees more than the caterpillars. Do not burn or use petroleum products which will damage the tree bark.

For caterpillars which are still feeding, one of the safest products to use is Dipel or BT. This is the same product home gardeners use on cabbage and broccoli. Dipel is a biological control product which is very safe for humans to apply. When caterpillars have stopped eating and are on the move, fast-acting "knock down" residual formulations of synthetic pyrethroids are best. Examples are Ortho Home Defense, Spectracide, and Bug Stop. Pyrethroids are likely to be more satisfactory than Sevin, malathion or diazinon.

### Relax and Cope with Stress

Being a "good" parent, or a "good" spouse takes a lot of time and energy. In our good moments, we can be strong and supportive of family members. But at other times, relationships can be stressful.

It makes sense to nurture positive feelings about ourselves. When we take good care of ourselves, we can cope more easily with normal family hassles and the stress of everyday living. Stress can be managed if we learn to develop ways to cope with it. Here are some ways you can relax and cope with stress.

Enjoy 20 minutes of uninterrupted quiet. Sit comfortably with your eyes closed. Try activity that relaxes you (music, walking, reading, a nap, or a hobby).

Have some fun. Reduce monotony in your life by doing something different—a hobby, a sport, or music lessons. Balance work with play each day, if possible.

Take one thing at a time. When

you're tense you may see a mountain of problems and tasks in front of you. Choose just one thing and deal with it. Chances are others things can wait.

Learn to say no to requests that you can't reasonably handle, and don't feel guilty about it. Don't bottle up anxiety or anger. Talk it over with someone you feel comfortable with.

Set reasonable goals and expectations for yourself. Revise them often. Stress, anxiety and depression can last a long time, keeping you from functioning effectively. If this happens, get help from a mental health professional.

Know your community and the resources it offers. Maintain good friendships so that you will have a support system to share your joys and help you through the tough times.

WHEREAS, Section 82.082 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (KRS) authorizes cities to perform any function and exercise any power within their boundaries that is in furtherance of a public purpose of the city and not inconsistent with a constitutional provision of statute; and

WHEREAS, cities are authorized by KRS 65.150 to expend public funds to insure their officers, employees, and properties against any liability or property damage and to associate with other public agencies pursuant to the Kentucky Interlocal Cooperation Act, KRS 65.210 to 65.300, for insurance purposes; and

WHEREAS, KRS 65.210 and 65.300 authorizes cities to jointly exercise with other public agencies under an interlocal cooperation agreement any power or powers, privileges or authority exercised or capable of exercise by cities, and further authorizes the parties to an interlocal cooperation agreement to create an administrative entity which may be delegated powers for conducting and administering joint and cooperative undertakings on behalf of the participating public agencies; and

WHEREAS, the elected officials of this city have determined that it would be in the best interests of the city to join with other cities, urban-county governments, and public agencies for the purpose of taking joint and cooperative action to create and establish the Kentucky Municipal Risk Management Association (KMRFMA) as a separate administrative entity, and through KMRFMA to create and administer various self-insurance, insurance, and investment programs to provide self-insurance and third party insurance coverages against all types of liability and property damage, and to establish programs for the investment of public funds; and

WHEREAS, the elected officials of this city have been provided copies of the Interlocal Agreement to Establish the KMRFMA and the Articles of Association and Bylaws of the KMRFMA and have reviewed these documents and found them to be acceptable:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF BRODHEAD AS FOLLOWS:  
Section 1. The city hereby approves the joint and cooperative program for self-insurance, insurance, and the investment of public funds as set forth in the Interlocal Agreement to Establish the KMRFMA.

Section 2. The Mayor and the City Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute the Interlocal Agreement to Establish the KMRFMA on behalf of the city.

Section 3. The city hereby approves and ratifies the Articles of Association and Bylaws of the KMRFMA, as amended.

Section 4. It is understood by the city that by executing the Interlocal Agreement to Establish the KMRFMA the city shall incur no liability for the payment of any funds, and that it shall be necessary for the city to take further action before becoming a participating member of any of the self-insurance, insurance, or investment programs which may be created and operated by KMRFMA.

Section 5. The city's current workers' compensation insurance coverage is due to expire on June 30, 1993. Under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, the city is required to maintain workers' compensation insurance coverage for its employees. It is understood that KMRFMA will begin operating a workers' compensation self-insurance group effective July 1, 1993, which will enable the city to obtain the necessary workers' compensation insurance coverage. However, unless the city acts immediately to enact this ordinance, there will be insufficient time for the city to take the steps necessary to become a member of KMRFMA and a participant in the workers' compensation self-insurance group to be operated by KMRFMA. Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist by the legislative body of the city. This ordinance shall become effective after its first reading and upon the affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the legislative body.

Section 6. The city clerk shall cause this ordinance to be published in accordance with KRS 83A.060(6) and KRS Chapter 424 within ten (10) days of its enactment by the legislative body.

INTRODUCED, SECONDED, GIVEN FIRST READING, AND APPROVED by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the city legislative body at a duly convened meeting held on the 9th day of May, 2001.

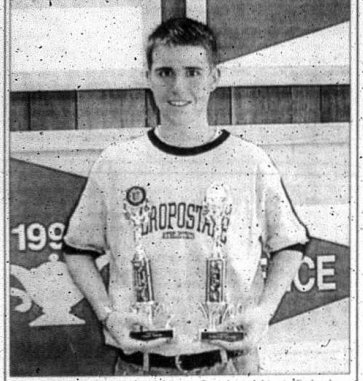

**Forgiveness Is for the Forgiver**

"I will never forgive him," Patty told me. (All characters are fictitious.) "He hurt me so badly that he messed up the rest of my life."

She learned that she did not have to put up with being treated abusively. She began to stand up for herself, and her husband began to treat her a little better. "It will never be a good marriage, but at least it is bearable," she told me.

As with many of my clients, after she dealt with her present situation, Patty began to explore her past and how that was affecting her. Her story

was a difficult one to listen to, because it was so painful.

Her father had been an alcoholic for as long as she could remember. He physically and verbally abused her mother. "I can remember when he would come home drunk," Patty told me, "all of us kids would hide. He would start in on Momma, and we could hear her screaming as he beat her. I would hide under the covers with my little sister, and we would cover our ears and sing songs to try to drown out the screams. After he left, we would get up and help Mom clean herself up. Sometimes we would have to go to the neighbors to get help."

This part of her story would have been more than enough pain for any child to bear; but there was more. "Daddy would come into my bedroom at night and lie down between me and my sister," she tearfully remembered. "He would touch me and do things to me that I knew weren't right, but I let him. I hoped that if he

did it to me, then he wouldn't bother my sister. As I got older, he did more and more, until he began having sex with me regularly when I was eight."

Patty cried and cried as she told her story for the first time. The hurt and anger that she felt as a little girl began to tumble out with her words. "He made my life miserable for five years," she said bitterly, "and what he did to me still affects me. Do you know that I am forty years old and still have not had a normal relationship with a man? Every man I find abuses me in some way, and I know that is because of what my father did to me."

Patty and I worked on her feelings for many months. She was doing much better, except that she could not let go of her anger at her father. This anger was coming out at others in her life and causing problems in her relationships.

I began to talk with Patty about

forgiveness, but she did not want to hear it. "Forgiveness is not for him," I explained. "Forgiveness is for you. Forgiveness is a way for you to get loose of the anger and get on with your life."

"But he doesn't deserve to be forgiven," Patty argued. "He's never even said he was sorry."

"The question is not whether he deserves forgiveness," I explained. "The question is whether you deserve it. Forgiving him can set you free from the anger that is making you miserable. To forgive him does not mean that you condone or approve of what he did. To forgive him doesn't take away his responsibility for what he did. Forgiveness means that you make a conscious decision to go on with your life and to stop letting him control you."

(Some of these thoughts are in the book *From Anger to Forgiveness* by Earle Larsen.)

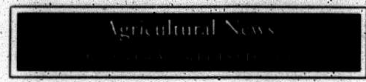
**Burley Tobacco Designation Announced**

Jeffery S. Hall, State Executive Director of the Kentucky Farm Service Agency, has announced that Burley tobacco farmers will be required to report to FSA the pounds and specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer where they intend to market their tobacco this season. The initial designation period will begin June 1, 2001 and end on August 1, 2001. Farmers will be allowed to re-

Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act 2001 (the 2001 Act) enacted on October 28, 2000 provides for Grace-OUT payments instead of Loan Deficiency Payments (LDPs), for the 2001 crop year only, to eligible producers who elect to use acreage planted to wheat, barley, or oats, for the grazing by livestock and agree to forgo any other harvesting of the commodity on such acreage during the 2001 year.

Grace-OUT is available to producers who are otherwise eligible for marketing assistance loans and LDPs according to regulations 16-8-LP, grace 2001 crop acreage planted to wheat, barley or oats, do not harvest the same crop on the same acreage.

Applications for GRAZE-OUT begin on the first day of mechanical harvest, May 14th, as determined by GOC and ends on August 31, 2001. Producers may file an application for GRAZE-OUT anytime during this

If a large number of producers are attending, we will meet at the Rockcastle County High School.

**Burley Tobacco Lease Date**  
April 2nd is the first date producers shall execute a lease for the 2001 quotas. Leasing will end on July 1, 2001. Any producer wishing to post their name to the Tobacco Lease In or Lease Out Listing may do so now. You do not need to wait until April 2nd. If you are unable to come to the office you may notify the office staff to post the listing by calling 606-256-2525.

**Burley Tobacco Acreage Reports**  
New legislation requires all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to report acreage planted to

designate pounds and sale locations at various times throughout the marketing season.

The Burley Tobacco Advisory Committee, established by the Secretary of Agriculture, recommended on June 14, 2000, that a method be developed that would enable a better allocation of tobacco graders and warehouses sales opportunity. Warehouse designation has been in place for Flue-Cured tobacco for several years.

FSA is making this change in the tobacco program in response to a request from Burley tobacco growers and the industry. Hall said. Beginning with the 2001 marketing year all Burley tobacco marketing cards will be issued for the specific pounds and selling location designated by the farmer. Only those pounds designated on the marketing card to a specific buying location may be presented for sale at that location, Hall said.

Farmers selling at traditional auction warehouses will receive a marketing card similar to cards they have used in recent years. These cards will indicate the producer's designated warehouse. Marketing cards for producers selling at non-auction sites will be issued by thermal bar coded card. These cards will indicate the designated buyer.

**USDA Announces Programs**

USDA can now begin payments to eligible producers who elect to use acreage planted to wheat, barley, or oats to graze livestock and give up any other harvesting. The payment will be determined using the loan deficiency payment rate in effect as of the date of the agreement.

The new deadline date for filing WAMPLAP II applications is extended to May 4, 2001. THE WAMPLAP II sign-up period provides extended time for producers who produced and sheared wool and mohair during the 2000 market year to sign applications for payment.

USDA announced that payments of more than \$1.1 billion is now available under USDA's Crop Disaster Program (CDP).

To be eligible, farmers must have suffered at least 35 percent loss to one or more of their 2000 year crops due to natural disasters. Eligible farmers will receive payment soon after approval of their application.

Sign-up for the CDP began on January 18, 2001 and the deadline to file an application will be announced later.
