The best action may even occur on Thursday, the 17th when selected, pre-auditioned new bands from all over the country will be showing up for a prestigious new-entrant contest. No, I will not be an entry. They paid me handsomely not to.

Not only is this festival tented, but it will be held at Off-Kentucky Campground just outside Berea which is covered by the campgrounds and concert site. Jim also has the cheapest gasoline in Madison County most of the time because he gets out at 5 in the morning and drives all over the place then comes back and lowers his pump prices to a penny less than what anybody else is charging.

Let me also mention that the Kentucky Guild of Artists and Craftsmen will also be holding their big Spring Fair starting on the 18th in case you get tired of Bluegrass, and maybe you'd better be looking about checking for lodging in Richmond, Mt. Vernon or Renfro Valley after all. Berea is going to be a popular place the third week end in May.

In any event, the festival will be super easy to find. You don't have to drive/hang around and it's within 100 miles and almost within eyeshot of exit 76 off I-75. Otherwise, come to Paint Lick on 52 and go east on 21.

I'd invite you take the night with me and actually you can do that if you want because I'll be hanging around the festival all night from start to finish; come rain or shine.

Listen folks, in three days tickets to this festival is only \$35.00 at the gate. You may be able to save a couple of bucks by calling 859-986-1194 or 986-2923 for advance tickets, but I recommend paying the gate admission and saving yourself the time and trouble. Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,

The treasurous dealings with the Red Chinese over the Clinton years have come home to roost. A Chinese interceptor aircraft has collided with one of our surveillance aircraft over international waters causing our EP3 aircraft to have to make an emergency landing at a Chinese base. Since they have released our 24 crewmen, no doubt they have entered the air-traffic surveillance aircraft with highly sensitive and secret equipment, an intelligence coup which would be of immense harm to our national security, and keep the aircraft as well.

To put this in perspective: All major powers collect intelligence information on potential adversaries. Our EP-3 aircraft was over international waters. When a fighter aircraft collides with a heavy aircraft such as the EP-3, it is the fighter which has caused the accident.

Red China was given permission by Bill Clinton to inspect American security installations and in his "open skies" policy, to over-fly American bases throughout the US. He defined them as our strategic ally, since they have threatened twice since 1996 to target the US with nuclear weapons, and their senior intelligence personnel teach in their service schools that war with the US is inevitable. Additionally, Clinton tried to give the Red Chinese the closed Long Beach Naval Base in California; he made American supercomputers (which immensely accelerate the de-

velopment of nuclear weapons) and much other formerly strategically embargoed technology available to the Chinese (including guidance technology which is a million dollar campaign contributor). Bernard Schwartz of Lorai Aerospace Corp. gave to the Chinese, resulting in the virtual elimination of their 40% launch rocket failure rate; he turned the Panama Canal over to a company controlled by the Chinese Army, based on an invalid treaty negotiated by Jimmy Carter (invalid because the treaty Panama signed was not the same as the one the US so ratified); during his term in office, the Red Chinese stole the plans to every nuclear weapon in our inventory (and they now have at least 20 ICBMs mostly targeted on the US). For all this the Chinese paid millions in campaign cash.

Congress should hold hearings on canceling China's Permanent Normal Trade Relations status. Their favorable trade balance with us is closing in on \$100 billion a year; they have been using this money to develop powerful modern military forces, and they are not going to want to lose it. National Safe KIDS Week is May 5-12th

Americans have made great progress over the decade in preventing children from being injured by cars. Parents who did not know how to use a child safety seat - and perhaps not even a seat belt - now understand that these protections can save their children's lives. Preliminary results from a recent survey, conducted by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), showed that by 1998 the use of passenger restraints for children is increasing for all age groups.

Restraint use among infants less than one-year-old had reached 97 percent (up 14 percent from 1995); Restraint use among toddlers among 1-4 increased to 91 percent (a dramatic increase of 31 percent from 1995); Restraint use among youth ages 5-15 increased to 71.8 percent (up 7 percent from 1996).

Other NHTSA research shows that the leading cause of death for all children ages 5-15, as well as for older children and young adults. In 1998, there were 573 motor vehicle occupant fatalities among children under five years of age. About half of the children under five who died were badly injured. In that same year, child safety seats or seat belts saved the lives of an estimated 279 children. NHTSA estimates that 173 more lives could have been saved if all motor vehicle occupants under five years old had been correctly restrained in child safety seats.

To emphasize the importance of

the issue of child passenger safety, the Richlands County Health Department will be observing National Safe Kids Week from May 5-12, 2001.

Lake Cumberland Regional Medical Center approved for Open Heart Services

Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital (LCRH), Somerset, has received notification that the Cabinet for Health Services approved their Certification of Need Application to provide Adult Open Heart and Therapeutic Catheterization Services.

This good news is the culmination of a fairly long and involved process to bring this vital service to the people of the Lake Cumberland Area Development District, stated Ryan Smith, Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital COO. "We would like to thank the physicians and community leaders from throughout the Lake Cumberland area for their many expressions of encouragement for this project," continued Smith. "Their letters of support were an certainly important component of our successful application.

The need for open-heart surgery services in the Lake Cumberland area was the driving force behind the hospital's application to provide the services. During the year 2000, 564 patients had to be transported out of the district for open-heart surgery. During the same time period, an additional 1256 people found it necessary to travel out of the district for therapeutic cath procedures. The long distance from home not only made the coordination of procedures with local physicians more difficult, it also was a hardship on family members. The addition of the program in Somerset will make this procedure an easy drive for family members and friends, and will help eliminate the cost and inconvenience of long distance travel.

The program will also only be a matter that the availability of providing this service to people in the region, but will help to provide the same quality of care as the Lake Cumberland area. In addition to the

35-40 employees who will be employed by the hospital to support the program, there will be a number of health-related jobs associated with the new physicians coming to the area.

In preparation for the new service, LCRH has already signed three new interventional cardiologists who will be establishing their practice in Somerset during the next three to six months, according to Clay Holdeman, LCRH Director of Physician Relations. In addition, over 35 cardiovascular surgeons have applied to help establish the program. Only surgeons with three to five years of experience with proven positive outcomes, from well-respected and established cardiac programs will be considered for the Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital program. A well-known physician from Lexington's Cardiovascular and Thoracic Associates, Dr. Shiv Saha, will lend his expertise by assisting LCRH with education, development and surgical recruitment for their new program.

"We believe this Open-Heart program will complement our recent service line expansions created to make healthcare services more convenient and easily accessible for the people of the area," stated Smith. "The new outpatient Imaging Center, Sports Medicine and Wellness Center, as well as the Ambulatory Surgical Center, which is under construction, have enhanced our ability to deliver the kind of healthcare services our patients want and deserve."

Anticipated opening of the new Open-Heart Surgery Program will be during the first quarter of 2002.

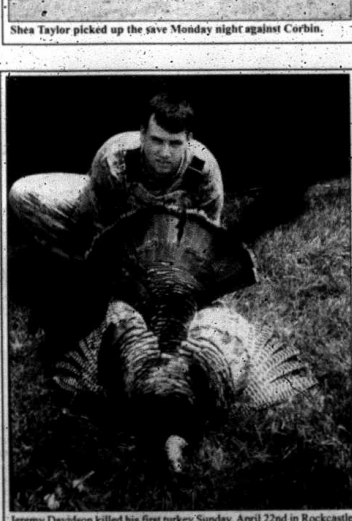

With one out, Hamilton tripled and later scored on a wild pitch and Jessie Hayes dove the ball to the wall in left center for her first home run of the season.

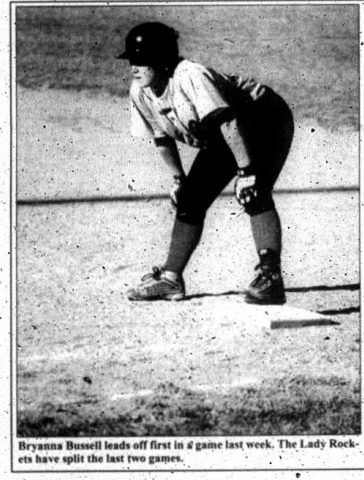
The Trojans picked up three more runs in the fifth on one hit and two Rocket errors but the Rockets scored five runs in the fifth to stay ahead 16-8.

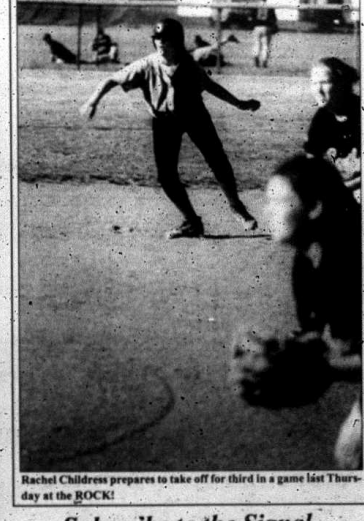
Monticello's sixth proved worrying for the Rockets as they came back to score five runs on four hits and one error to close the gap to 16-13.

Loss of Corco Gordo, North Carolina area. "When a car wins, what percent of the purse does the driver, owner, crew chief and pit crew get?"

"NASCAR teams are like any other employer. Each employee hired agrees to or signs a contract before going to work. Driver's contracts are rarely divulged. There can be clauses in driver contracts that pay them in excess of \$1 million. Normally, a driver will get a set annual salary, plus bonuses for things like the number of races won, and for his finish in the final points standings. Some drivers get a basic salary plus a percentage of each racing purse."

"I can only guess, but Jeff Gordon probably the highest paid Winston Cup driver, because in 1999, Rick Hendrick cut a lifetime deal with Gordon giving him part ownership in the No. 24 Dupont team. In my opinion, all the drivers that run in the top-10 earn in excess of \$1 million. Some earn considerably more. A fill-in driver that signs on for a one-race deal may get as little as \$5,000 a race or a percentage of the purse."

Crew chiefs usually have the same type of bonus arrangements as driver, but their pay is less.

All Winston Cup teams have two crews; a shop crew that works during the week and a race crew that only works at the track on Sunday. The weekday or shop team is skilled in engine development, body and chassis engineering, and many other technical skills.

The Sunday teams are hired for their quickness and the ability to work under pressure. You won't see any older guys on the Sunday crews because speed is one of the most important assets for a Sunday crew member. The older guys have the brains, but there is no substitute for youth when quickness is required.

The lesser players are paid by variable scales. A shop engine builder probably earns between \$25,000-\$50,000 per year. Those that have mastered the trade and work for the larger teams earn more. Fabricators,

the ones who build the bodies and put the sheet metal on take home considerably less. There are many shop employees that do less technical jobs, that probably earn more than \$300-\$500 per week. Practically all the guys that are still learning. These are the guys that Winston Cup teams work in excess of 50 hours per week, some 60-70.

Sunday only crew members receive from \$200-\$750, depending on their skills. Tire changers are usually the best paid. Their pay is in direct proportion to their speed.

Many fans ask where the money comes off. There are three primary sources and it all is funneled to the car owner. From there it drips down to pay expenses and employees.

Each team has a primary sponsor. This can bring in pay in the range of \$1 million. There are usually several associate sponsors on each team that range from \$50,000 up to several million.

Each team that makes the field for a race receives a percentage of the purse. If they don't make the field, they go home empty-handed. NASCAR's policy is to give teams 65 percent, track, 35 percent, and they keep the other 10 percent.

There is a formula that NASCAR uses to distribute the 65 percent to owners. In the April 22, Talladega 500, rookie, Kurt Busch, who finished third, received \$1,077,780. Fourth place driver Mark Martin received \$126,126, while fifth-place finisher Bobby Labonte took home \$128,842.

Doesn't that seem fair, does it? But that's the way NASCAR's program works. Teams that are higher in the points get a larger share of the split. Defending Winston Cup champion also get proportionately more.

At the end of the season NASCAR splits up the television revenue the same way 65/35/10. However, not all teams share in this. NASCAR has a formula that hands out this money to the top-20 teams. This is to insure the continuance of the top teams and drivers. Years ago, tracks would pay cash to the big-name drivers in order to use them as a drawing card for their race. This is basically what NASCAR continues to do. The big get more and the lesser get none.

There are also certain awards and points money teams receive if they use a particular manufacturer's product that figures into the money scheme; but it is minor in comparison to the television revenue.

We might not be 100 percent accurate on everything we have stated, but we have presented a basic layout of how the big money is divided and who gets what.

named Lloyd Jennings who killed Smith. Jennings was a newly-wed and was supposedly caring for the house with Thaddeus Drew, then the owner, was away.

Other assorted legends, maybe true, maybe not, have sprung up around the house. Some say that Ulysses S. Grant stopped at the coach house and had lunch while heading south with his troops. Some say that the ghost of Sally Cranberry haunts the house. Mrs. Cranberry died in the coach house in 1831 during childbirth. She is however, buried less than a mile away.

Wally's youngest son, Clyde "Butch" has also had some famous people to his father's home.

Butch Phillips played in entertainer George Jones' band and Jones visited the homeplace from time to time.

However, Wally lived in the house 70 years and said he had never seen a ghost.

Whatever is or isn't true about Wally Phillips' house, the legends are good to hear. They are about our own people and are our heritage.

But if you ever go and stand for a moment in the attic of that ancient structure, you will almost visualize Tom Jim and some drivers sitting around the barrel playing cards.

Wally Phillips served as Rockcastle County Jailor and as magistrate for many years.

He and his wife Belle Drew Phillips raised seven sons at their Red Hill home.

Charles "Toad", John and "Butch" are still living.

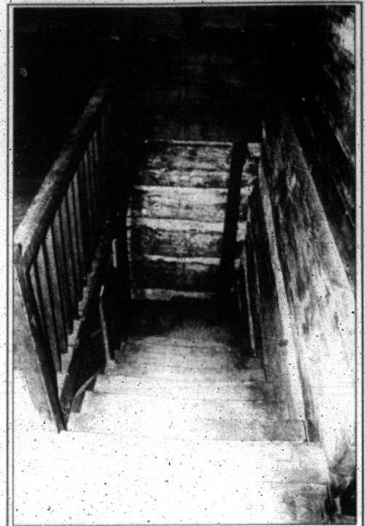
Coy, Charles, Clint and Sherman are deceased.

Stanley Phillips said that he was

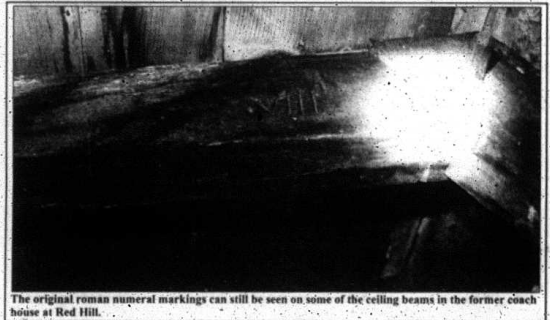
simply restoring the house to the way it appeared as a coach house - in an effort to preserve one of Rockcastle's most historical sites.

NRCS hosts Farm Field Day at Bullen farm

The Rockcastle County Conservation District and the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) hosted a farm field day on high tensile fencing, Wednesday, April 25th, at the William T. Bullen

Farm, which is located in the Roundstone community of Rockcastle County.

There were approximately 30 people in attendance. During the field day, Glenn Abney, Resource Con-

servationist with USDA-NRCS from Mt. Sterling, demonstrated different techniques for installing high tensile fencing. High tensile fencing, when installed correctly, is a less costly and a more efficient alternative to bar-

wire and woven wire fences. Mr. Abney discussed what types of tools, equipment and hardware needed for a successful installation of a high tensile fence. Many landowners from around the county tried their hand at learning some of the different techniques for tying high tensile wire.

Randall Templeman, District Conservationist, informed field day guests

of cost share programs that are available to landowners for the purpose of reducing soil erosion and improving water quality on their farms. Many of the practices available for cost share were viewed on Mr. Bullen's farm such as streambank stabilization, stream crossings, riparian buffers, high tensile fencing, pipeline and a front free stock-water fountain. Partners for Fish and Wildlife helped with \$10,000 in cost share funds to establish much of the aforementioned practices on Mr. Bullen's Farm.

Tommy H. Mink, Conservation District Board Member, demonstrated the use and safety of using a post driver for fencing.

A no-hill tree planter, on loan from the Harrison County Conservation

Wildlife for making this field day possible.

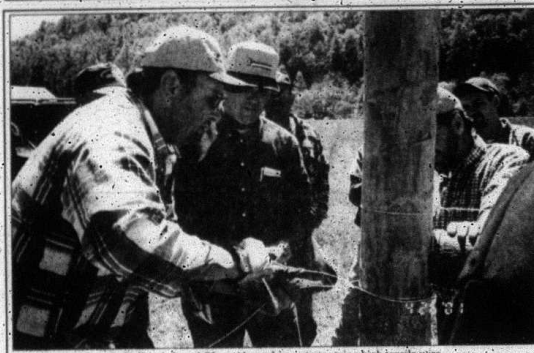

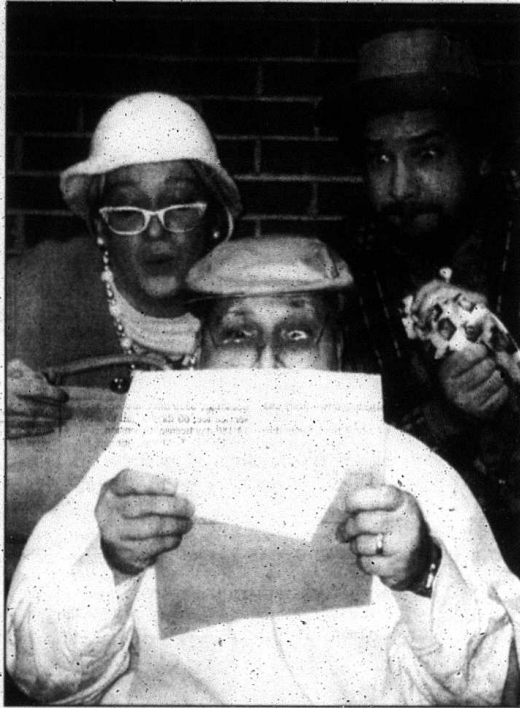

The Victim Blames Himself
John was twelve when the abuse began. (All characters are fictitious.) "The man was a teacher and the coach of my football team," John told me.

"When he started asking me to stay after practice and help carry equipment, I was thrilled. I thought I was special. Later I figured out that was just his way of getting close to me."

John had come for counseling at his wife's request. "Just because I don't want to make love as much as she does, she thinks I'm depressed," he told me during his first session. As John and I talked, I began to see that his wife was right.

Of the information sheet that my clients fill out prior to their first session, there is the question, "Have you ever been abused?" John answered, "No," but I have learned not to believe everything I read. When I asked him in our second session about abuse, he looked down and did not answer. This spoke volumes.

It was not until the third session that John told me about the abuse. "Coach began taking me home after practice," John remembered, "and buying the ice cream. Then one day he began to touch me in ways I knew weren't right."

I jumped out of the car as quick as I could when we got to my house.

point, Doc," he said after a moment. "If I wouldn't blame my son, then why do I blame myself?"

At this point John began to be aware of the anger that he felt toward the man who abused him. "If he was still here, I'd confront him," John said angrily. "He ought to have to pay for what he did."

Shame is one of the worst leftovers of abuse for many victims. "It's hard to explain exactly," John said, "but this feeling comes over me sometimes that I know I am not as good as everyone else. When that happens I want to get away from people and be by myself."

"Telling your story will help to get rid of the shame, John," I explained. "In telling, there is freedom."

I was afraid to tell Mom or Dad, so I just went to my room. I felt dirty and took two showers trying to get clean."

"After that first time, I tried to stay away from Coach," John continued. "But he would get me alone and try to do things wrong. I would protest, but it never did any good. Finally I just let him do what he wanted to get it over with. I asked Dad if I could quit football, but he gave me a long lecture about not being a quitter, so I kept on playing. Coach did things to me all season long. I keep wondering what I did to cause this. I must have done something."

While victims of robbery or assault do not blame themselves, sexual abuse victims usually do. "You did not do anything to cause this," I assured John. "What happened was your coach's fault, not yours. He was an adult, and he took advantage of an innocent child."

Getting victims to stop blaming themselves is a difficult task. Sometimes I succeed by asking them a question about their own children.

"John, what would you do if someone did this to your son?"

John did not even hesitate but looked me straight in the eye and said, "I'd kill him."

"Would you blame your son?" I asked. "No way!" John nearly shouted. Then he paused. "I see your

Agricultural News

Meeting Scheduled
The Rockcastle Co. FSA Office has scheduled a meeting for 6:00 p.m. Monday, May 14th in the community room of The Community Trust Bank on Hwy. 461, Mt. Vernon. The meeting will review the recent changes to the tobacco program. The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000 (ARPA) enacted on June 20, 2000, and the Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2001 (the 2001 Act), enacted on October 28, 2000. A short question and answer period will follow. We encourage all burley tobacco producers to attend. Please call our office at 256-2525 by May 4th to inform our office of those planning to attend.

Burley Tobacco Lease Date
April 2nd is the first date producers shall execute a lease for the 2001 quotas. Leasing will end on July 1, 2001. Any producer wishing to post their name to the Tobacco Lease In or Lease Out Listing may do so now. You do not need to wait until April 2nd. If you are unable to come to the office you may notify the office staff to post the listing by calling 606-256-2525.

Burley Tobacco Acreage Reports

New legislation requires all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to report acreage planted to burley, including young acres.

Farms with an effective burley quota that will not plant burley or

lease quotas from the farm MUST report a zero acreage, for burley tobacco, or the farm will be subject to quotas forfeiture for the applicable burley marketing quotas next established for the farm, unless the State Committee and the County Committee determine that the reduction is not applicable.

Burley Tobacco Designation Announced

Jeffery S. Hall, State Executive Director of the Kentucky Farm Service Agency, has announced that Burley tobacco farmers will be required to report to FSA the pounds and specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer where they intend to market their tobacco this season. The initial designation period will begin June 1, 2001 and end on August 1, 2001. Farmers will be allowed to re-designate pounds and sale locations at various times throughout the marketing season.

The Burley Tobacco Advisory Committee, established by the Secretary of Agriculture, recommended on June 14, 2000, that a method be developed that would enable a better allocation of tobacco graders and warehouses sales opportunity. Warehouse designation has been in place for Fine-Cut tobacco for several years.

"FSA is making this change in the tobacco program, in response to a request from Burley tobacco growers and the industry," Hall said. Beginning with the 2001 marketing year all Burley tobacco marketing cards will

be issued for the specific pounds and selling location, designated by the farmer. "Only those pounds designated on the marketing card to a specific buying location may be presented for sale at that location," Hall said.

Farmers selling at traditional auction warehouses who receive a marketing card similar to cards they have used in recent years. These cards will indicate the producer's designated warehouse. Marketing cards for producers selling at non-auction sites will be issued by thermal bar coded cards. These cards will indicate the designated buyer.

Grazed 2001 Wheat, Barley, Oats (Graze-Out)
The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000 (ARPA) enacted on June 20, 2000 and the Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act 2001 (the 2001 Act) enacted on October 28, 2000 provides for Graze-Out payments instead of Loan Deficiency Payments (LDPs), for the 2001 crop year only, eligible producers who elect to use acreage planted to wheat, barley, or oats, for the grazing by livestock and agree to forgo any other harvesting of the commodity in such acreage during the 2001 year.

Graze-Out is available to producers who are otherwise eligible for marketing assistance loans and LDPs according to regulations to 8-LP, graze 2001 crop acreage planted to wheat, barley or oats, do not harvest the same crop on the same acreage.

Applications for GRAZE-OUT begins on the first day of mechanical harvest, May 14th, as determined by

COC and ends on August 31, 2001. Producers may file an application for GRAZE-OUT anytime during this application period.

USDA Announces Programs and Deadlines

USDA can now begin payments to eligible producers who elect to use acreage planted to wheat, barley, or oats to graze livestock and give up any other harvesting. The payment will be determined using the loan deficiency payment rate in effect as of the date of the agreement.

The new deadline date for filing WAMP applications is extended to May 4, 2001. THE WAMPL II sign-up period provides extended time for producers who produced and sheared wool and mohair during the 2000 marketing year to sign applications for payment.

USDA announced that payments of more than \$1.1 billion is now available under USDA's Crop Disaster Program with special provisions for producers. To be eligible, farmers must have suffered at least 35 percent loss to one or more of their 2000 crop due to natural disasters. Eligible farmers will receive payment soon after approval of their application.

Signup for the CDP began on January 18, 2001 and the deadline to file an application will be announced later. For more details on these and other USDA programs, contact the USDA Service Center or local Farm Service Agency.

Spouses may sign on behalf of each other for FSA and CCC programs in which either has an interest, unless written denial is on file in the FSA Office.

- Tobacco Leasing: April 2nd through July 1st.

- Crop Reporting: required for ALL burley tobacco farms by July 1st.

- Enrolling CAB's released from CRP: April 2, 2001 for CRP-Ty that expired in FY2000.

- Enrolling farm into PFC after reconstruction: 30 calendar days after FSA 476 notice.

- Requesting farm constitution: June 1, 2001.

- Designating payment shares on PFC and meeting signature requirements: August 1, 2001.

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 7 through May 21, 2001. Under the supervision of the real property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2001; assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 2001 will be due about September 15, 2001.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:00 and 4:00.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator:

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.
