Local man kidnapped

A Missouri couple who had apparently gained the trust of a local man, kidnapped him Monday night and drove him to Caryville, Tennessee before he was able to escape.

Mike Jones, 54, of Mt. Vernon was apparently kidnapped by Justin Lillard, 22, and Ruth Ann Morris, 29, both of Missouri, after they asked Jones if they could test drive a pickup truck he had for sale.

Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane said that Jones agreed to the test drive and went along with the couple, who also had a fifteen-month-old baby with them. Lane said that after Jones got in the truck, Lillard got in the middle of the S-10 truck and Morris drove, while Jones sat in the passenger's seat.

Apparently after Morris had driven a short distance, Lillard pulled a roofing knife and got Jones in a head lock, pressing the knife against his throat.

After Morris stopped in Caryville, Lillard turned to attend to the child and Jones attempted to escape when a struggle broke out.

Jones managed to get away from Lillard and Morris, who drove off in the pickup. Jones was treated at a Caryville hospital for minor cuts. He reported the incident to police, after he went to the hospital.

The incident occurred at 6:20 p.m. at the home of Mike's mother, Mary Ida Jones, on West Main Street in Mt. Vernon, according to Lane.

Lane said that Jones had left the truck at his mother's to make it more visible to potential buyers.

Lane said that Jones was not reluctant to go with the couple because he had become acquainted with them while they were staying at Ashlee's House, a homeless shelter on Main Street in Mt. Vernon, which is located next to his mother's store.

The couple and infant child had been staying at the shelter since April 2nd.

After Jones escaped the couple left Caryville traveling south on I-75 in the red S-10.

No arrests had been made as of press time.

Migrant program helping over 300

 Migrant Advocate for the Rockcastle County School System, Charles Napier told the Rockcastle County School board Monday night that the main focus of the program he heads is to solve problems.

The federally funded Migrant program has been in operation in Rockcastle County for the past eight years.

Currently, the program serves 319 people in Rockcastle County, 216 of those children enrolled in Rockcastle

County Schools.

76 are children too young to attend school and 27 are those under age 21, but not in school, for whatever reason.

Napier told the board that the Migrant program dealt with a variety of problems ranging from families being homeless and hungry to children needing clothing or something as simple as a cap and gown for graduation.

Napier said that his staff, which

includes recruiter Tabatha Denny, part-time advocate Linda Osborne and program assistant Kim Hamp-

Indictments for rape, drugs returned

 The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down a total of fifteen indictments on Friday for crimes ranging from rape to possession of Cocaine while in possession of a firearm.

Wayne Everett Hawkins, 41, of Bowling Ridge Road, Brodhead, was indicted on two drug related charges.

He is accused of possession methamphetamine (meth) and marijuana on April 12th.

Carl Eugene Ruppe, Jr., 22, of Castle Village Apartments, Brodhead, was charged with possession of meth, marijuana and drug paraphernalia on April 13th.

Darrell L. Renner, 33, of Carter Drive, Mt. Vernon was indicted on five counts involving drugs.

Renner is accused of possession of chemicals to make meth, possession of meth, marijuana, Xanax and drug paraphernalia while in possession.

Cox bound over to local Grand Jury

A preliminary hearing was held Monday in Rockcastle District Court related to recent felony charges against Clayton Cox, 26, of Orlando.

Cox was charged with Rape First Degree, Manufacturing of Methamphetamine and possession of a controlled substance.

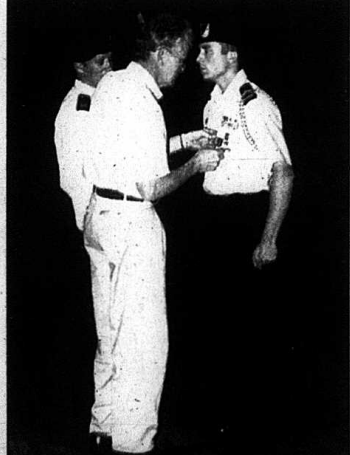
Rockcastle County Attorney Jeffrey T. Burdette, who handled the hearing, stated that the court formed probable cause for the felony charges

and bound Cox over for consideration by the Grand Jury. Bond remained at \$75,000 cash or property.

Cox was accused of holding his wife, Helena Cox at knife point while he raped her and made several threats to kill her.

Upon arrival and investigation by police of the domestic violence call, officers located general items consistent with manufacturing methamphetamine.

McFarland was in the process of building a landfill by his property at Little Clear Creek earlier this year when several citizens and the Rockcastle Fiscal Court objected.

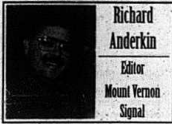
Although McFarland had received permission from the state to build the landfill he agreed not to do so, if the county would clean up four

Agricultural News

Required Crop Reports

Legislation requires all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to report acreage planted to burley, including zero acres no later than July 16th. Reports filed after July 16th will be subject to a late file fee.

Marketing cards will NOT be issued without a crop report on file.

Farms with an effective burley quotas that will not plant burley or lease quota from the farm MUST report a zero acreage for burley tobacco, or the farm will be subject to quota forfeiture for the applicable burley marketing quota next established for the farm, unless the State Committee and the County Committee determine that the reduction is not applicable.

Burley Tobacco Designation

Beginning with the 2001 marketing year burley tobacco farmer operators will be required to file an initial designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market their tobacco. The initial designation period will begin June 1, 2001 and end on August 1, 2001.

Farmers will be eligible to re-designate pounds and sale locations during the re-designation periods of: October 1-5, 2001, October 29-November 2, 2001, December 3-7, December 28, 2001-January 4, 2002 and January 28-February 1, 2002.

Farmers selling at traditional auction warehouses will receive a marketing card similar to cards they have used in recent years. These cards will indicate the producer's designated warehouse. Marketing cards for producers selling at non-auction sites will be issued by thermal bar coded card. These cards will indicate the designated buyer.

Burley Tobacco Lease Date

Burley Tobacco Leasing will end on July 2, 2001. Any producer wishing to post their name to the Tobacco Lease In or Lease Out may contact the office in person or by calling 606-256-2525.

Tobacco News On The Way

Tobacco farmers all over will soon be receiving information concerning the tobacco changes taking place with the current crop year. The Tobacco FACT sheet will be mailed from Kansas City and should arrive shortly to any and all producers who have received a 2000 Tobacco Acreage Report, Disaster Lease and Transfer, Marketing Designation, Carryover

Tobacco Marketings and Owner Designation of Quota. The sheet will also include an important date section. Watch your mail for forthcoming news!!

Burley Tobacco Acreage Reports

New legislation requires all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to report acreage planted to burley, including zero acres.

Farms with an effective burley quota that will not plant burley or lease quotas from the farm MUST report a zero acreage for burley tobacco, or the farm will be subject to quotas forfeiture for the applicable burley marketing quota next established for the farm, unless the State Committee and the County Committee determine that the reduction is not applicable.

FY 2001 AMTA Reminders

The deadline to designate payment shares and meet PFC signature requirements for FY 2001 is August 1, 2001. FY 2001 PFC payments may not be issued on a farm, unless all producers and owners meet the PFC signature requirements by August 1, 2001.

In addition, for an individual producer to receive a payment for the fiscal year, all supporting documents such as CCC 502, AD 1026 and FSA 507 must also be met by August 1, 2001, to be eligible for FY 2001 PFC payments. After payment shares are designated, any changes in the farming operation, including, but not limited to payment shares and change of operators, must be reported to FSA on or before August 1, 2001.

Failure to report changes by August 1, 2001, may result in all producers on the farm being ineligible for FY 2001 PFC payments.

Spousal Power of Attorney

Spouses may sign on behalf of each other for FSA and CCC programs in which either has an interest, unless written denial is on file in the FSA Office.

Dates to Remember

- CDP (Crop Disaster Program) began January 18th.
- Sign up for the Grazo Out Program May 14th through August 31st.
- Crop Reporting: Small Grains (WHEAT) by May 31st.
- Requesting farm constitution for PFC payment farms: through June 1st.
- Enrolling farm in PFC after re-constitution: 30 calendar days after FSA 476 notice.

Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,

In April, we observed Child Abuse Awareness Month. But this observance went widely unnoticed. As pediatric critical care nurses, we call attention to some issues. When we take care of any child who has been abused, we hurt for them. As we look into their eyes and see a blank stare, we think of all of the things they will never see. As we give them nutrition through a tube, we think of what they will never be able to eat. As we change their diapers, we realize they will always be dependent on

someone else to take care of their basic needs.

Child Abuse is here - every day! When people hear the words "Child Abuse," most turn the other way in denial because "that doesn't happen here." But, we must not deny this problem in our community. Last year 430 children were seen in the Kosair Children's Hospital-Emergency Department, with suspected abuse. Through April this year, there have been 19 child abuse cases severe enough to warrant admission to our Critical Care Center. That's more

than one child critically injured from abuse each week! Child abuse affects all segments of society and knows no socioeconomic, cultural, ethnic or religious boundaries. We see a full physical, emotional and sexual abuse as well as neglect.

It is devastating to see these children with broken bones, fractured skulls, burns and a child locked and emotional scars to live a lifetime. How could anyone willingly shake a baby to a jangling, vegetative state? Who could place a child in the stomach so hard that it causes a lung internal bleeding? Who would take the ragged abuse as nothing says clear.

Abuse occurs for a number of reasons. A lack of understanding of child development can result in the creation of probable abuse. Children for

FUN SUMMER FOOD

Warmer weather is here and it will soon be summer. What does summer fun mean to you? Maybe it means going swimming or playing outside with the kids or just sitting in a lawn chair relaxing in the yard. Whatever it is, enjoy the summer.

What summer foods do you enjoy? Make a list of fun summer foods. Remember, summer brings hot weather and food safety issues. A lot of people enjoy homemade ice cream in the summer. Its cool summer taste reminds us of a cool summer breeze. But could your homemade ice cream be making you sick? Uncooked eggs, sometimes used in homemade ice cream recipes, contain germs that can make you sick. You should never use uncooked eggs in your ice cream. Pasteurized eggs are at the grocery store and can be used instead of fresh eggs in uncooked recipes.

Grilling outdoors is a fun summer activity many families enjoy. Always use clean utensils. Don't use the same plate for cooked and raw meat. Keep hands clean and wash them often.

Summertime is a good time to enjoy the contrast between hot and cold food. Hot food tastes best when eaten hot. Cold food tastes best when eaten cold. To really enjoy summer food, eat it before it

has sat out long enough to become lukewarm. In addition, germs grow fast when on warm food. To slow down this growth of germs, put foods in the fridge quickly.

Try this summer recipe:
Summer Chicken Salad
2 cups cabbage, coarsely chopped
1 pkg chicken flavored Ramen noodles, broken up, uncooked
2 cups cooked, chopped chicken
1 can (11 oz) mandarin oranges, drained (save juice for dressing)
1/4 cup green pepper, chopped
Dressing
1 seasoning packet from chicken

flavored Ramen noodles
2 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons white vinegar
2 tablespoons oil
Juice from canned mandarin oranges
(Cooks note: 4 tablespoons Italian dressing can be substituted for the 2 tablespoons oil.)

Wash hands. In a large mixing bowl, add all salad ingredients. In a small mixing bowl, add all dressing ingredients and stir together. Add dressing to salad and toss.
Refrigerate leftovers, fast. Makes 10 servings. Per serving: 140 calories; Fat 6g; Total Carbohydrate 12g; Vitamin C 15%

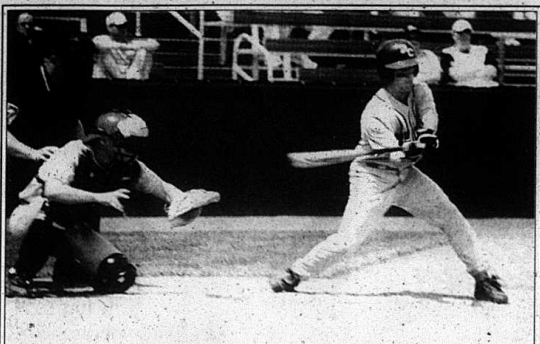

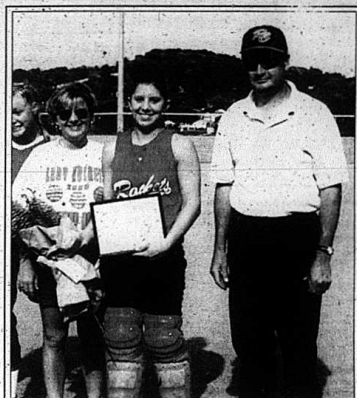

ably the best pitcher in the state in Jeremy Sowers from Ballard.

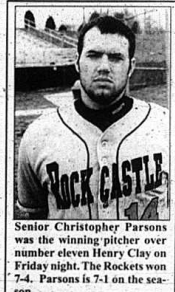
Sowers struck out 14 batters for the number one ranked team in the state and fifteenth in the nation. The only Rocket hit was a double by Senior Greg Harper.

The Rockets defeated McCreary Central on Tuesday night 17-4 in the final home game of the season.

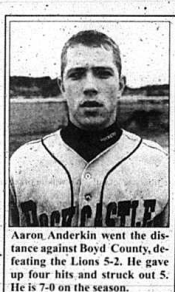
The Rockets are currently 28-3 and will play Lexington Catholic on Saturday in Lexington at 11 a.m.

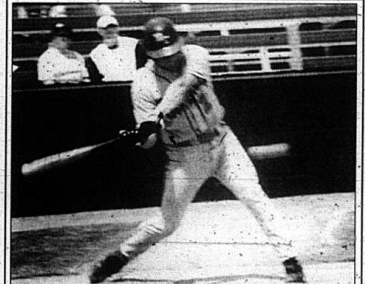
The championship game of the district will be at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday because Oneida does not have any lights on their field.

son, deal with children in their program on a one to one basis.

"Love, food, clothes and most importantly caring about the children are things that we provide- it seems to really make a difference when children think someone cares about them," Napier told the board.

Napier told many stories of tragedy and many stories of horrible situations for children and he also told stories of children who had overcome their situation with the help of the Migrant program to prosper.

Napier related one story in which a family was basically homeless and had a school age child, who overcame all of the obstacles to eventually make straight A's in school.

Recruiter Tabaha Denny said that the majority of those helped are people looking for work in agricultural or already working in the agricultural field.

Those admitted to the Migrant program must also be new to the county and once a student enters the program they are allowed to stay in it for a three year period.

But Napier admitted that if a family moves across county lines and stay a couple of months they are allowed to go back into the program, if they move back to the county.

Napier said that Ms. Denny visits each school two to three times a week to check on new students and find out some information about them to see if she should conduct an interview with the family to see if they qualify for the program. Ms. Denny also places flyers throughout the county explaining the Migrant program.

Napier said that the Migrant program has worked with several other local agencies such as the Christian Appalachian Project and Daniel Boone Development to find housing for homeless families but today there is currently one family Napier knows of that is still basically homeless because they do not have electricity, running water or sewer, "but we are working on it," he said.

Napier also said that home visits with parents and children are a big part of his program and that the Migrant Program keeps a close watch on each individual in the program throughout the three years.

Napier said that although the Hispanic population wasn't as high here as in some counties he thought the program would need a Bi-lingual staff member in the very near future.

"Rockcastle currently doesn't have a large Hispanic population because we don't have enough housing for the very low income families- but it is going to become a problem," he said.

The Migrant Program offices are located on Richmond Street across from the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

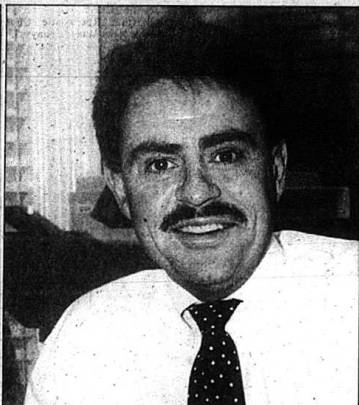

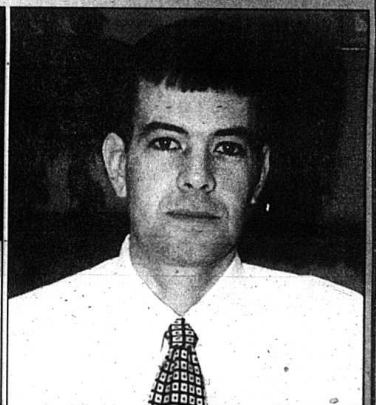

thousands of dollars on their own to build the shelter, but they could never come up with enough money to finish the project.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court also had agreed to help in the construction and to provide money on a monthly basis and also provide labor at the shelter.

However, that still was not enough, so the court and RAAP applied for a state grant which would have helped to complete the project.

But then the state stepped in and said the only way a grant could be approved was if the county owned the property.

On Tuesday, the court and RAAP agreed that the county would take over ownership of the property, apply for another grant and finish the project.

The court also agreed to lease the animal shelter back to RAAP for \$1 a year and to also provide a monthly stipend of \$500 as well as labor from the Rockcastle Detention Center to help run the shelter.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlottis said the county would apply for approximately \$70,000 to help with the completion of the construction of the shelter, but that even if the grant wasn't approved the county would have to go on with the project in order to meet state guidelines.

The county's animal shelter is located on Old Signon Road. The property was donated by Mrs. Virginia Branscum and Steve Bullen.

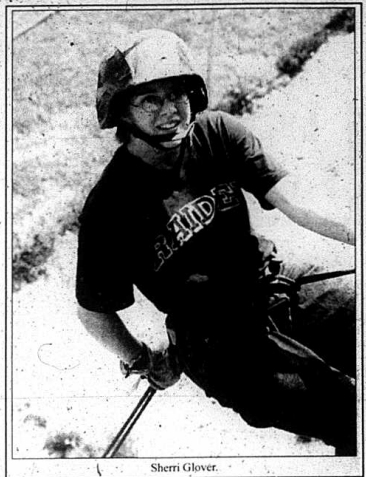
JROTC goes on rappelling trip to EKU

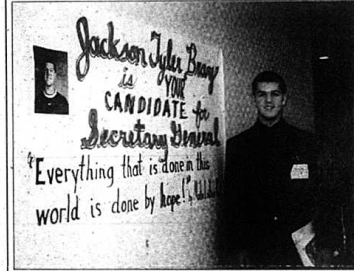

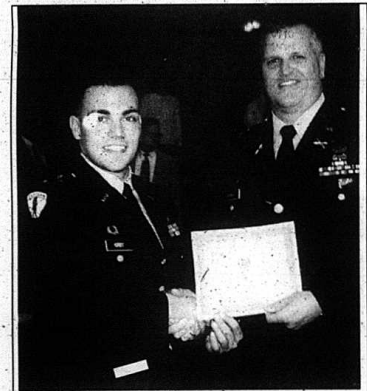

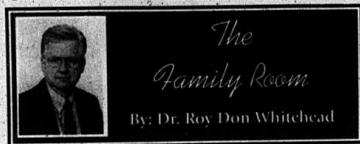

Affirm Yourself
Do you talk to yourself? Most of us do. The problem for many of us is that we do not make positive statements to ourselves. Check yourself sometime and monitor the conversation that is going on in your head. Sometimes this conversation will not be contributing anything positive to your life. Often you will not even be aware that this conversation is going on.

The negative words we say about ourselves vary from person to person, but there are certain similarities. "You will never amount to anything"; "you are stupid"; and "no one wants to be your friend" are examples of the messages we give to ourselves. Usually these messages have a part for a moment for a long time.

Take a lives for you and put down your newspaper. Close your eyes and listen to the thoughts going through your mind. What do you say to yourself as you look to the future? Do you regard yourself positively or negatively? The first step toward changing those negative thoughts is to be aware of them.

You have heard the old line, "If you can't say something nice, don't say anything at all." We apply that mostly to our dealings with other people.

I suggest that it is time to apply this to ourselves as well. If you can't say something nice about yourself, don't say anything at all.

Better still, replace those negative thoughts with affirmations. An affirmation is a positive statement that you make to affirm yourself and your life goals. It is especially useful when you are trying to change.

Here are some sample affirmations that I know have helped

people change:

"I am happier, healthier and trimmer each and every day of my life." (for someone trying to shed some pounds); "I enjoy breathing fresh, clean air into my lungs" (used when quitting smoking); and "I am a more positive person in all parts of my life."

You can write your own affirmations. There are only three rules in the creation of your affirmation: keep it simple, make it positive and use present tense. It must be simple so that you can remember it easily. Do not use negative words. Rather than saying "I do not want chocolate anymore," use the thought "I am eating what is good for my

body." And use present tense. Do not describe a change that you hope will happen in the future. Describe that change as if it has already begun, because it has! You might say "I am thankful that I now speak positively about other people."

My current affirmation is "I am open to all that the world is giving me." And use present tense. Do not describe a change that you hope will happen in the future. Describe that change as if it has already begun, because it has! You might say "I find that when I can relax and not worry so much, my needs are filled."

You would think I would have learned that by this point in my life, but I am still working on it. Take time now and write an affirmation for yourself. Over the next weeks say it repeatedly to yourself. Anytime you hear those negative thoughts begin, replace them with your affirmation.

Write or type your affirmation twenty-five times a day. When I first

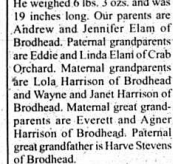
heard this suggestion, I thought it was a foolish requirement. I trust me it is not. This is a part of reprogramming the computer that is your mind.
