Worker falls to his death while painting tank

A man working on a water tower on KY 19 at Dog Walk died Sunday when he fell from a ladder inside the tank and plunged 100 feet through the stem of the tank.

James Grider, 34, or Louisville were died Sunday affermon at the select at the intersection of KY 39 and KY 618. Grider and fellow workers from Select Coatings of Louisville were painting the inside of the tank.

Lincoln Country Coroner Bill Demrow said that Grider was working atop a ladder inside the bowl of the water tank. The ladder base was against a lip formed inside the tower where the large pipe enters the center of the tank.

The coroner said Grider unhooked his safety harness to get down off the ladder and lost his footing on the way down. He slipped to the bottom of the ladder and into the center pipe, a 42-inch diameter cylinder that is full of water when the tank is in use. Internet auction fraud takes several forms:

Triangulation involves three parties the perpetrator, a consumer, and an online merchandit using stolen dientities and credit card numbers. In the last few minutes of the auction, the same buyer withdraws their high bids, only to purchase the item with their much lower bid.

Finally, shill bidding is intentional face bidding by the seller to drive up up for bid. This is accomplished by the sellers themselves making bids on their own items, and/or someone that is paid by the seller. Look in next weeks column for suggestions to help you avoid the pitfalls of Internet auction bidding.



Proper chemical storage a must on the farm

With the planting and growing season in full swing, farmers should make proper chemical storage a priority, according to the Kentucky Department of Agriculture.

"Chemicals are an important part of production. They enable growers to maximize their yields and their profits," Kentucky Agriculture Comissioner Billy Ray Smith said. "But farmers must make every effort to store their chemicals safely."

Among the Department's chemical storage safety tips:

"Keep your chemicals in a secured andgeosted storage facility away from seed and feed.
"Warm children never to play in or around chemical storage sares."

Store chemicals in their original containers with the labels clearly visible.
 Store chemicals at least 50 feet

from any well unless they are stored in secondary containment, which re-fers to structures built to contain

chemical spills.

* Develop an emergency response

chemical spills.

*Develop an emergency response plan in advance.

*Notify your local fire department of where chemicals are stored, what chemicals are being stored and the properties of those chemicals.

*Post the telephone number of the nearest poison control center in a convenient location. The telephone number for the Kennucky Regional-poison Center is 1-800-222-1222.






