Worker falls to his death while painting tank

A man working on a water tower on KY 39 at Dog Walk died Sunday when he fell from a ladder inside the tank and plunged 100 feet through the stem of the tank.

James Grider, 34, of Louisville, died Sunday afternoon at the scene at the intersection of KY 39 and KY 618. Grider and fellow workers from Select Coatings of Louisville were painting the inside of the tank.

Lincoln County Coroner Bill Demrow said that Grider was working atop a ladder inside the bowl of the water tank. The ladder base was against a lip formed inside the tower where the large pipe enters the center of the tank.

The coroner said Grider unhooked his safety harness to get down off the ladder and lost his footing on the way down. He slipped to the bottom of the ladder and into the center pipe, a 42-inch diameter cylinder that is full of water when the tank is in use.

With no water in the cylinder, there was nothing to break his fall and

Grider plunged the full height of the pipe, more than 100 feet, according to Demrow.

He died from massive injuries suffered when he hit the ground.

The tank is part of the Western Rockcastle Water Association system, which serves parts of eastern Lincoln County and thousands of customers in Rockcastle County.

Davidson is choice at Mt. Vernon

The Site Based Council at Mt. Vernon Elementary School chose fifth grade teacher Leon Davidson as the new principal.

Davidson, who has been in the education field for the past 21 years, has taught nine years in the focal school system.

Before that, he taught seven years in the Jackson County School system and before that he taught five years in Georgia.

Davidson is replacing Rose Brown, who has taken a job at the Central office.

Davidson and his wife Janice, who teaches Kindergarten at Mt. Vernon, have two children Drew, a seventh grader and Devin, a fourth grader.

Mrs. Davidson will be relocated to another position in the school system because under the guidelines of the Kentucky Education Reform Act, Mrs. Davidson cannot work at school where her husband is principal.

Hammond gets raise from board

Tuesday, members of the Rockcastle County Board of Education toured the new Broadhead Elementary School with the school's architect before the board's regular monthly meeting.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond said that board members were told the school would be ready for occupancy when school starts in August, although not every item will be completed.

Workers are already taking the asbestos out of the old school and demolition is scheduled to begin next week.

Hammond said that everyone has been assured that the building will be in such condition that a certificate of occupancy can be obtained from the state, something the school system must have before children can go into the building.

During their meeting after the tour, the board voted to give Hammond a \$2,000 a year raise, bringing his total annual salary to \$88,000.

The only dissenting vote was from newly elected board member Mike Burdette.

Former Livingston man charged with murder

Tuesday the Kentucky State Police arrested Jeffery L. "Birdseed" Allen, 38, formerly of Livingston and Madeline M. Hannaford, age 34 at their residence in the Rockholds Community approximately six miles north of Williamsburg in Whitley County.

Both have been charged with the murder and robbery of Larry Goins, 39, of Rockholds who had been missing since May 9th.

Police say Allen had lived in Whitley County for only a few months.

Larry Goins was reported missing to the Kentucky State Police in May by family members. On Tuesday, June 5, the Kentucky State Police were able to obtain information as to a possible location of the body. Upon receiving the information the Kentucky State Police began searching the Colonel Hollow area in

Rockholds. The search of the area has located the remains of the body, which has tentatively been identified as Larry Goins. The remains will be taken to the Kentucky State Medical Examiners office in Frankfort for positive identification and further investigation as to the cause of death.

Kentucky State Police Detective Colan Harrell is conducting the investigation and is being assisted by Kentucky State Medical Examiners office and the Corbin City Police. Investigation is continuing.

Mahaffey indicted

Rockcastle Circuit Judge William Cain has unsealed an indictment against a local woman, who prosecutors thought might be a risk flight.

Doris L. Mahaffey, 28, of Livingston was indicted on four counts of possession of narcotics, methamphetamine, Xanax, marijuana and drug paraphernalia.

She was also indicted on one count of trafficking in narcotics while in possession of a handgun.

Prosecutors say the case also involves a large amount of cash that would have given Mahaffey the ability to flee.

She is currently free on bond.

Girls' Track team finishes runners-up in Class 2A State Championships

The RCHS girls' varsity track and field team recently competed in the 2001 KHSAA Class 2A Outdoor State Track and Field Championships held at the University of Kentucky in Lexington. The girls finished the regular season as the top-ranked team in the state in Class 2A. At the state competition, RCHS hoped to improve upon their 12th place finish from last year and make a run at their first ever state championship. The girls faced many excellent schools and programs, with their toughest challenge coming from eight-time state champion Paducah Tilghman. Other top contenders included former state championship teams such as Russell High School, Fleming County, Western Hills, Highlands, and twelve-time state champion Fort Campbell. During this past indoor season, the RCHS girls finished as indoor state runner-up to Paducah Tilghman.

The RCHS girls had their greatest state competition ever and finished as Class 2A State Runners-up behind powerhouse Paducah Tilghman. Paducah won the state championship defeating Rockcastle 96.33 to 65. The average grade level of the RCHS girls' team is around 9.4, while Paducah's team is slightly older and more experienced with an average grade level of 10.9. Despite the difference, RCHS made a great run at the state championship with many outstanding individual and relay performances. This also represented the best state championship finish that any RCHS sports team has ever had, matching the two indoor state runner-up finishes that the girls' track team has enjoyed the past two seasons.

Preliminary competition began on Friday. RCHS got off to a great start in the meet with an awesome performance from the 3200-meter relay team. The team consisting of senior Cheyenne Carmack and seventh graders Kayla Hayes, Jessica Asher, and Danielle Arnold ran a spectacular race and finished sixth overall in the state with an awesome time of 10:27.25. Cheyenne ran an awesome second leg of the race, passing more than ten runners throughout her 800. This marked the first time an RCHS team had ever qualified for the 3200-meter relay at the state level. By placing sixth, the girls medalled in the event.

Senior Rachelle Hammond and eighth grader Heather Hammond competed in the long jump competition. For Rachelle, this was her third straight trip to state in the event. Heather qualified in the event for the first time. Both girls jumped extremely well in preliminaries and made it to the finals. Rachelle finished the competition in spectacular fashion. She had her best performance ever at the state competition. Rachelle leaped an incredible 16' 2" and finished fourth overall. Heather also scored with an awesome jump of 13' 5.75". She placed eighth overall and earned a medal for her efforts.

Junior Clarissa Hubbard qualified for the discus state championship. She threw very well in preliminaries and easily made the top nine throwers for the finals. Clarissa threw an amazing 107' 1" and finished third in the event - unprecedented for an RCHS female competitor.

The remainder of the evening, RCHS female competitors spent an attempt to qualify for the finals of both individual events and relays. Their challenge was met with great success as every individual and relay team qualified for Saturday's state finals.

Freshman Sheena Swinney qualified for the 100-meter dash finals with an exceptional performance in preliminary competition. She ran an awesome race and finished as the fourth ranked qualifier with an awesome time of 12.97 seconds. Sheena also qualified in the 200-meter dash with a spectacular preliminary race. She finished third overall with an awesome time of 26.71 seconds.

In the 400-meter dash preliminaries, Heather Hammond sought to

qualify for Saturday's finals and did so with a tremendous effort. She easily won her heat with an impressive time of 1:00.62, putting her in great position for the finals.

The 400-meter relay team consisting of seniors Tara Abney and Mindy Bullock, as well as eighth graders Chere' Embs and Johanna Abney, ran an awesome qualifying race. The girls sprinted their way to a sixth place finish with a great time of 54.4 seconds, easily making Saturday's finals.

The 800-meter relay team also ran a superb race and finished with the fifth best qualifying time. The team of Rachelle Hammond, Chere' Embs, Johanna Abney, and Sheena Swinney blazed their way to the finals with an awesome time of 1:51.23.

The 1600-meter relay team had really high expectations due to their number one ranking in the event in the final regular season standings. The team of Cheyenne, Sheena, Rachelle, and Heather easily won their heat and qualified for the finals with a new RCHS record time of 4:09.87, shattering their previous record by almost three seconds.

After the first day of competition, the RCHS girls trailed defending state champion Paducah Tilghman by only three points - 18 to 15. The RCHS varsity boys' team also qualified for the state championships in the 1600-meter relay, while junior Andrew Hammond made it to state in high jump. The relay team consisted of juniors Josh Hale and Andrew Hammond, as well as seniors Jeremy Neeley and Jeremiah Myers. The boys ran a spectacular preliminary race and qualified for the finals on Saturday in spectacular fashion with a gutsy race and a time of 3:41.19.

Andrew performed equally well in the high jump competition. When all was said and done, he had cleared an amazing 5' 10", two inches more than his regional effort. His performance earned him a seventh place state finish overall in the event, as well as a medal for his efforts. This was the first time in six years that an RCHS male competitor had scored in the high jump competition.

Saturday's finals would prove to be extremely exciting as the RCHS girls sought to continue to challenge a strong Paducah team for the state title. The RCHS boys also were seeking their first ever state championship race in the 1600-meter relay, as well as the school record in the event.

The first event on the girls' agenda was the 100-meter dash finals. Sheena Swinney ran an awesome race and sprinted her way to a sixth place finish in the event with an awesome time of 13.11 seconds. This represented the best ever 100-meter dash finish in RCHS track and field history.

In the 200-meter dash, Sheena performed even better. Lined up directly beside last season's 200-meter champion, Sheena was up to the challenge and ran a spectacular race. She finished fifth overall with an awesome time of 26.72 seconds, the best finish ever for an RCHS competitor in the event.

Eighth grader Heather Hammond faced a daunting challenge in the 400-meter dash with the defending indoor state champion and former Class A champion from Paducah

standing between her and the state title. Heather accepted the challenge and led the race from start to finish. She blazed her way to the 400-meter dash state championship title with an awesome time of 59.9 seconds, defeating Paducah's best by seventenths of a second. Heather became the first RCHS competitor to ever win an outdoor state title in any event. She earned a gold medal and ten points for her spectacular effort, not to mention the attention of the Lexington Herald-Leader who interviewed her shortly thereafter.

Senior Cheyenne Carmack sought to defend her indoor 800-meter state title and had an excellent opportunity to win her first outdoor state championship in the event. Cheyenne had made a miraculous transition from sprinter to mid-distance runner this season and has quickly challenged the state's best with her consistency and continuous improvement. Having already run the fastest 800-meter time in Class 2A this season, Cheyenne entered the event as the clear favorite, despite her inexperience in the event. Cheyenne put together an awesome effort with a spectacular race, but got boxed in twice during the 800-meter course. She fought her way through the pack of competitors and sprinted toward the finish, narrowly missing the first place win. She finished as state runner-up in the event with an awesome time of 2:23.51.

Seventh graders Jessica Asher and Danielle Arnold competed in the grueling 1600-meter run. The girls finished first and second in the region and gained the opportunity for their first individual event experience at the state level. Both Jessica and Danielle came through with great performances. Jessica placed 10th overall with an awesome time of 5:43.83. Danielle also ran a great race and finished 15th overall with a great time of 5:59.15.

In the 3200-meter run, Jessica Asher had an inspiring performance against several older, much more experienced competitors. She shattered her own RCHS record by fourteen seconds with a spectacular time of 12:27.79. More importantly, she placed seventh overall in the state in the event, earning a medal, as well as two points for her team.

The 400-meter relay team of Tara Abney, Mindy Bullock, Chere' Embs, and Johanna Abney ran an exciting race. Already touted as the greatest 400-meter relay team in RCHS history with the record to prove it, the girls combined great baton passes with awesome speed and sprinted their way to a seventh place finish in the event with a time of 54.62 seconds. This represented the team's best-ever finish in the event in state competition and the first time that the team had placed in the top eight.

The 800-meter relay team performed even better and finished sixth overall in the state finals. Rachelle Hammond, Chere' Embs, Johanna Abney, and Sheena Swinney put together a very fast race with great baton exchanges. They finished with an exceptional time of 1:51.6. This represented the best RCHS finish ever in the event and also earned the team three very valuable points.

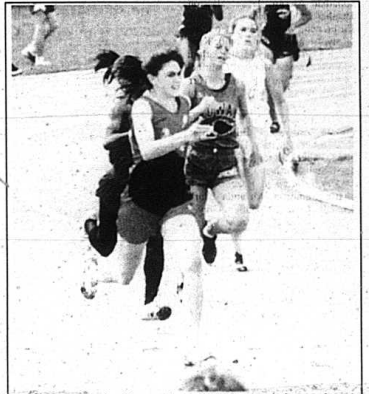
Heather Hammond came into the high jump competition as the favor-

ite having won the regional championship a week earlier. She was also ranked number one in the state for the entire season. Heather's best attempt came at the height of 5' 0". She narrowly missed 5' 2" while attempting to jump into a strong wind. She finished as state runner-up in the event. Overall, Heather led Rockcastle with an amazing 21.5 points in state competition. Teammate Mindy Bullock also qualified and put together a string of impressive jumps. She finished 12th overall with an awesome time of 4' 8". This was the third straight year that Mindy had qualified for the state finals in the event.

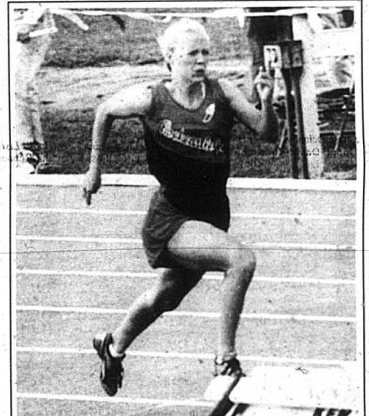
In the triple jump competition, Rachelle Hammond looked to have her best performance ever at the state level. Rachelle also qualified for the triple jump competition last season. She performed exceptionally well and leaped an incredible 32' 10.5" and finished in ninth place overall, just out of medal contention. She has won both triple jump and long jump at the regional level the past two seasons.

The shot put competition proved to be very exciting as junior Clarissa Hubbard looked to add an outdoor title to the indoor state title she won

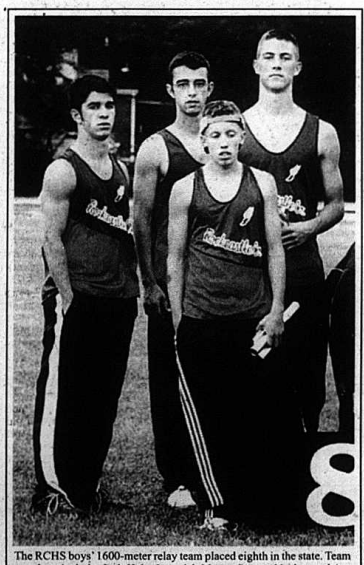

Shea Taylor, Christopher Parsons, Billy Hackworth, and Devin Taylor each had doubles in the game.

Aaron Cash and Brandon McIntosh each had singles.

The Rockets left seven men on base and got caught stealing twice.

Now the next step to the final four sends the Rockets to Hindman in Knott County.

The Rockets are in the sectional with Hazard, Paintsville and Boyd County.

The Rockets played Hazard at 6 p.m. on Wednesday night.

Boyd County and Paintsville play the second game on Wednesday night.

The championship game is scheduled for 7 p.m. on Friday.

Harper was scheduled to pitch on Wednesday and if the Rockets advance, Anderkin is scheduled to throw on Friday.

The only team in the sectional the Rockets have faced is Boyd County.

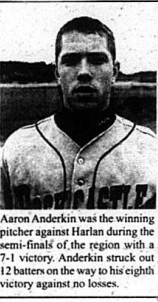
Boyd County defeated the Rockets in the first game but the Rockets got the measure of them in the Fayette County Invitational 5-2.

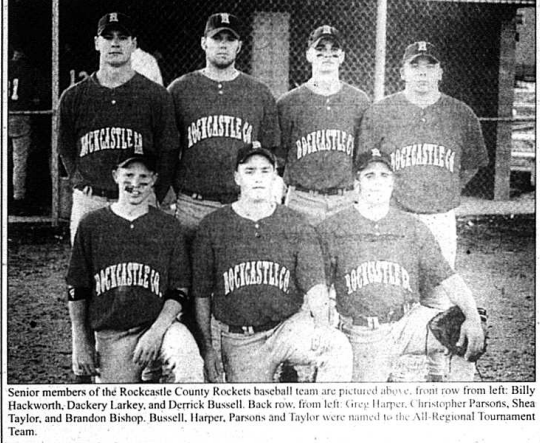

a year ago. Charissa had quite a bit of difficulty throwing due to continuing back pain that has plagued her nearly the entire season. She still managed to throw very well and finished 13th overall with an exceptional effort of 28' 11".

The last event of the day for the girls was their best team event, the 1600-meter relay. The girls came

into the finals with the fastest qualifying time of any team in Class 2A.

They had also ranked first in the state in the event nearly the entire season. Several very good 1600-meter relay teams would challenge RCHS.

Cheyenne Carmack got the race off to a great start and ran her best split ever (58.7). She easily got the girls out in front by making up the stagger in the first lap. Sheena Swinney took the handoff and ran an excellent second leg, keeping RCHS out in front.

Rachelle Hammond kept the lead during the third leg and extended the margin coming into the final 100-meter stretch. Heather Hammond overcame a difficult hand-off and sprinted an awesome final leg of the race.

She cruised the last 100 meters and anchored the team to their first state championship in the event with a new school record time of 4:06.67.

This was just over three seconds away from the all-time Class 2A state record in the event.

The RCHS boys' team of Josh Hall, Jeremiah Myers, Andrew Hammond, and Jeremy Neely came through with an awesome performance in the 1600-meter relay finals.

The boys' sought the first-ever RCHS boys' track state title, as well as the school record, in the event. Josh got the race off to a blazing start with an excellent first leg. Jeremiah Myers took a great baton pass and sprinted an awesome second leg of the race.

Andrew ran very well in the third position, keeping RCHS close to medal contention. Jeremy finished the race with a solid anchor leg and crossed the line in eighth place. This earned the team medals, as well as a point.

The group narrowly missed the school record with an awesome time of 3:39.98, less than four-tenths of a second away. Nevertheless, the team could easily be regarded as the greatest mile relay team ever at Rockcastle due to the number of sub-3:40 races they ran this season. Their consistency was evident from meet to meet in this particular event.

The girls' performance capped off the greatest season in team history. They finished with a combined meet

record of 165 - 2, losing only to eight-time state champion Paducah Tilghman at state and five-time, defending Class A state champion Bishop Brossart at the Pulaski County Invitational. This season also marked the end of an era for Rockcastle as six girls that have participated for as many as eight years in the track program have graduated, including Cheyenne Carmack, Tara Ahney, Rachelle Hammond, Heesa Chisum, Mindy Bullock, and Ashley Lawson. Over the past four seasons, these girls, along with the rest of their team, have enjoyed their share of success. The team has finished as regional runners-up twice, regional champions twice, indoor state runners-up twice, outdoor state runners-up, as well as middle school state champions the past two seasons. The team has had twelve individuals win twenty-one regional championships, the past four seasons with nineteen of those coming in the past two years. The team has also enjoyed three individual indoor state championships, two outdoor state championships, five indoor state runners-up, and three outdoor state runners-up, as well as four middle school state champions and one runner-up.

Every RCHS female track and field record belongs to members of the current team. In addition, several of the athletes have been named all-state academic in track-and-field multiple times. Cheyenne has been named to the track and field all-state first and second team the past two seasons. With their success at state this season, Cheyenne and many of her teammates should be named to the all-state team.

Several senior boys will also be looking to graduation including Eric Denney, Jeremiah Myers, Stephen Hopkins, Jeremy Neely, and Stephen Carrera. These boys have accomplished a great deal at Rockcastle in their many years of

competition. Jeremy has firmly established himself as the greatest distance runner in RCHS history with new records in the 800 and 1600-meter runs. Eric has solidified his position as one of the top two throwers in RCHS history with his consistency over the years.

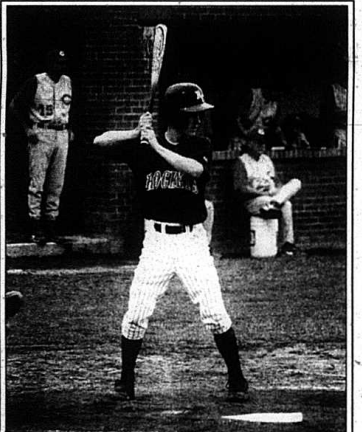

This year, the Project Graduation committee at RCHS, which raised more than \$35,000 spent the money they raised locally.

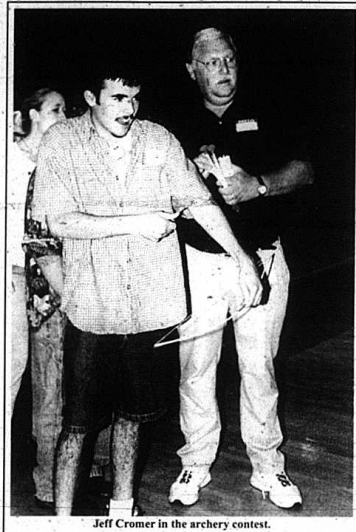
In the past, much of the money spent has gone out of town, especially to Wal-Mart in Berea, but that is not the case this year.

Agricultural News

Disaster Leasing

Farmers who will suffer a burley tobacco disaster loss must file a report with FSA PRIOR TO HARVEST to retain eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions. The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to producers that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to disaster lease and transfer, the transferring farm must file a crop report with FSA, have planted acreage sufficient to produce the farm's current year effective quota, provide a workman like manner for the crop production, suffer more than a 20% crop loss and meet all price support eligibility requirements.

Beware of Undermarketings

Producers in years past have been eligible to carry forward under marketed pounds for one year. Beginning with the 2001 crop, we are now advising producers to market as much of the effective quota as possible. We also would like to advise producers not to "lay out" tobacco for one year hoping to have a larger quota the next year. Here is our reasoning: Beginning with the 2001 Burley tobacco crop, if you sell less than 100 percent of your effective quota, the amount of quota that can be carried forward to the next crop year may be subject to reduction. Reductions in the carryover of undermarketings will come in effect when the total burley undermarketings exceed 10 percent of the national basic quota.

REMEMBER LEASE OR MARKET 100 PERCENT OF THE FAMS EFFECTIVE QUOTA TO AVOID A POSSIBLE REDUCTION OF POUNDS!

Required Crop Reports

New legislation requires all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to report acreage planted to burley, including zero acres no later than July 16th. Reports filed after that date will be subject to a late file fee.

Marketing cards will NOT be issued without a crop report on file.

Farms with an effective burley quota that will not plant burley or lease quota from the farm MUST report a zero acreage for burley tobacco, or the farm will be subject to quota forfeiture for the applicable burley marketing quota next established for the farm, unless the State Committee and the County Committee determine that the reduction is not applicable.

We strongly urge producers to call 256-2525 ext. 100 and request an appointment.

Warehouse Designation-A Must in 2001
Beginning with the 2001 marketing year burley tobacco farmer op-

erators will be required to file an initial designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market their tobacco. The initial designation period for the 2001 marketing season will begin June 1, 2001 and end on August 1, 2001.

Farmers will be eligible to re-designate pounds and sale locations during the re-designation periods of October 1-5, 2001, October 29-November 2, 2001, December 3-7, December 28, 2001-January 4, 2002 and January 28-February 1, 2002.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office. This listing shall be available through March 31, 2002.

Farmers selling at traditional auction warehouses will receive a marketing card similar to cards they have used in recent years. These cards will indicate the producer's designated warehouse. Marketing cards for producers selling at non-auction warehouses will be issued a thermal bar coded card. These cards will indicate the designated buyer.

Burley Tobacco Lease Date

Burley Tobacco Leasing will end on July 2, 2001. Any producer wishing to post their name to the Tobacco Lease In or Lease Out may contact the office in person or by calling 606-236-2525.

Know the Laws

Kentucky farmers will enter into contracts this year with foreign workers through a certification and recruitment process operated through the federal government. The involved workers will be used to help these farmers harvest crops by hand. If a farmer fails to live up to his part of the employment agreement, enforced by the U.S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division, the costs can be very high.

Contractual violations can result in civil money penalties of up to \$1,000 for each worker and for each violation.

Farmers need to know what the law requires in order to avoid heavy penalties.

Dates to Remember

- CDP (Crop Disaster Program) began January 18th.
- Enrolling farm in PFC after reconstitution: 30 calendar days after FSA 476 notice.
- Requesting farm reconstitution for none PFC farms: July 2nd
- Tobacco Leasing: April 2nd through July 2nd.
- Crop Reporting for row crops, hay and pasture by July 2nd.
- Crop Reporting: required for ALL burley tobacco farms by July 16th.

Internet auction fraud

Internet auction fraud is currently the number one fraud committed over the Internet. A market research company, eMarketer, in a recent study estimated auction fraud entailing 87% of all online fraud in 2000. The Internet Fraud Complaint Center (IFCC) alone has received over 4,000 complaints from January 2001 through April 2001 on auction fraud. The average loss per complaint amounts to \$776. This number may be much higher from the victims that do not report the fraud. Internet auction fraud takes several forms:

- *Non-delivery - the item is never delivered to the buyer after he/she purchases the item. Additionally, if the buyer pays by credit card, the seller obtains their name and credit card number.
- *Misrepresentation occurs when the seller's purpose is to deceive the buyer as to the true value of an item.
- *Triangulation involves three parties: the perpetrator, a consumer, and an online merchant. The perpetrator buys merchandise from an online merchant using stolen identities and credit card numbers. Then, the perpetrator sells the merchandise at online auction sites to unsuspecting bidders. Nest, the

- perpetrator has the buyer wire transfer him the money and then sends the merchandise to the buyer. Later, the police come, question the unsuspecting buyer, and collect the stolen merchandise to keep for evidence.
- *Fee stacking involves the seller adding hidden charges to the item after the auction is over to obtain more money. Instead of a flat rate for postage and handling, the seller adds separate charges for postage, handling, and the shipping container.
- *Subjects are also offering black-market goods for sale on Internet auction sites. These goods include copied software, music CD's, videos, etc.

- *Some subjects use multiple bidding to buy an item at a lower price. This occurs when a buyer places multiple bids (some high and some low) on the same item using different aliases. The multiple high bids scare off other potential buyers from bidding. In the last few minutes of the auction, the same buyer withdraws their high bids, only to purchase the item with their much lower bid.
- *Finally, shill bidding is intentional-fake bidding by the seller to drive up the price of his/her own item that is up for bid. This is accomplished by the sellers themselves making bids on their own items, and/or someone that is paid by the seller.

Look in next weeks column for suggestions to help you avoid the pitfalls of Internet auction bidding.

Proper chemical storage a must on the farm

With the planting and growing season in full swing, farmers should make proper chemical storage a priority, according to the Kentucky Department of Agriculture.

"Chemicals are an important part of production. They enable growers to maximize their yields and their profits," Kentucky Agriculture Commissioner Billy Ray Smith said. "But farmers must make every effort to store their chemicals safely."

Among the Department's chemical storage safety tips:

- Keep your chemicals in a secured and unobstructed storage facility away from feed and feed.
- Warn children never to play in or around chemical storage areas.

- Store chemicals in their original containers with the labels clearly visible.
- Store chemicals at least 50 feet from any well unless they are stored in secondary containment, which refers to structures built to contain chemical spills.
- Develop an emergency response plan in advance.
- Notify your local fire department of where chemicals are stored, what chemicals are being stored and the properties of those chemicals.
- Post the telephone number of the nearest poison control center in a convenient location. The telephone number for the Kentucky Regional Poison Center is 1-800-222-1222.

For more information about proper chemical storage or the Department's pesticide collection or Rinse and Return recycling programs, contact the Division of Environmental Assistance at (502) 564-4386.

Grants for Farmers' Market available

Frankfort, KY-The Kentucky Department of Agriculture for the fourth year is offering grants of up to \$500 for community farmers' markets across the Commonwealth. Agriculture Commissioner Billy Ray Smith said.

Eligible farmers' markets can be reimbursed for facility improvements, conducting market promotions, or advertising. A minimum cost-share of 30 percent of the project

must come from local funds. A total of \$25,000 is available.

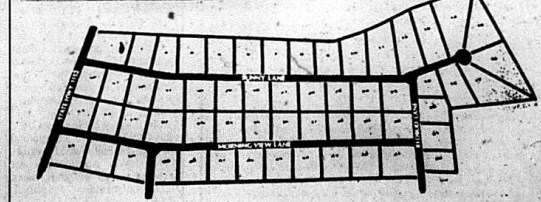

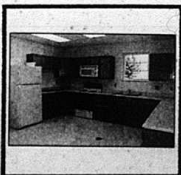
