

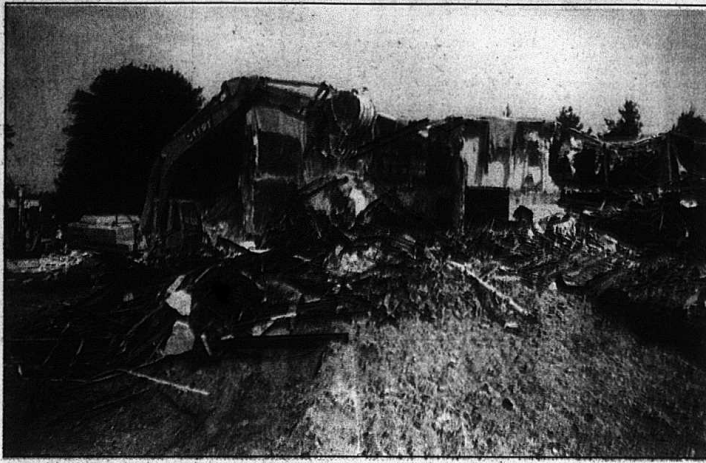

## New school construction at Brodhead on schedule

The only portion of the old Brodhead School building still standing as of press time Wednesday was the gymnasium.

But it was coming down quickly. Where the old school stood will be mostly parking for the new 60,000 square foot facility, which is being built at a cost of approximately \$6 million.

The \$6 million dollar figure includes everything from construction to new equipment.

Doug Mullins, Director of Buildings and Grounds for the Rockcastle County School system said the project is basically on schedule.

"They are laying tie right now, and as soon as a classroom becomes available, it is going to be set up for the coming school year," Mullins said.

Mullins said that school officials are hoping that they can get a certificate of occupancy from the state around the first of August, which would allow students to enter the building.

"If we have classrooms, bathrooms and the cafeteria ready, we shouldn't have any problem getting what we need from the state," he said.

"There will no doubt be some small items still not finished when school starts, but it shouldn't present any problem," he said.

The new facility will have 28 classrooms, a gymnasium, cafeteria, media center and administrative offices.

Currently approximately 400 students attend the school.

Much of the equipment and furniture in the old school building will

be used in the new facility. Mullins said that the majority of those things are being stored in a warehouse on the Taylor's Produce property near the school.

"The Taylor family has been very helpful and we really appreciate it," Mullins said.

The school system has set up a make shift office in a trailer at the home of Brodhead Principal Caroline Graves to assist parents and students during the summer months.

Mrs. Graves' office is located on West Street approximately one block from the school.

The school's phone number is also still the same, (606) 758-8512.

Brodhead High School was actually the first public high school to open in Rockcastle County.

It opened in 1909.

Many students from Scaffold Cane to Copper Creek have graduated from Brodhead School over the years.

At one point, Brodhead had an enrollment of 1,150 students in grades one through twelve.

The late Mr. D.A. Robbins is probably the best known former principal of the school.

Mr. Robbins began his tenure as head of the school in 1936 and served until 1943, when he was drafted into World War II for two years.

After World War II he returned to the school as principal and held that position until 1974.

Mr. Robbins served longer than any other principal at Brodhead, a total of 36 years.

After Robbins there were Bigge Towery Jr., Garland Cummins, Tom Payne, Mark McKinney and now Caroline Graves.

Carlotis said that Denny's three year term had expired and that state law does not allow board members to succeed themselves.

Mrs. Meadows joins Dr. John Parsons and Charles Saylor on the board.

"The board of appeals decides whether or not a person's property tax assessment is fair or not.

## Mt. Vernon approves \$2.2 million city budget

The Mt. Vernon City Council approved their final budget for the coming fiscal year at a called meeting on Monday night.

The city's budget for 2001-2002 is approximately \$2.2 million.

Just less than \$1.35 million will be spent out of the water and sewer fund and the city plans to spend \$380,000 in the police department fund.

\$307,500 of the police department budget is going to be spent on salaries and health insurance for the department's eighth full-time officers and two part-time officers.

The city says they plan to take in approximately \$193,000 from their

payroll tax, which went into effect last year.

The city's budget for the coming year also includes a ten percent across the board raise for the city's 28 employees.

## Cost to hold juvenile may exceed \$36,000

Juvenile crimes cost - if you don't think so just ask the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

An eighth grader at the Rockcastle County Middle School, who has been charged with murder is being held in the Boyle County Juvenile Detention Center, while he awaits court proceedings.

Every day the young man is locked-up it cost the county \$100 plus his medical expenses.

Before the eighth grader was charged earlier this year, the county had budgeted \$8,000 from the jail fund for juvenile detention.

The county has now budgeted \$30,000 for juvenile detention costs,

because of the eighth grader, but even the \$30,000 will not cover the cost of keeping him in a juvenile detention center for a year, which will cost the county \$36,200.

The juvenile is currently under going a psychiatric evaluation, which may determine whether he is certified to stand trial as an adult in the

My back is out again. I needed to get the concrete lid off a cistern Sunday afternoon. Instead of waiting for someone to help me lift it, I fastened on my trusty back support which seems to be modeled after an old whalebone corset and then proceeded to lift with my legs the way half a dozen physical therapists have taught me.

I got the lid up but now I'm down and the only way I can get any relief is to stay pretty much folded up and feel contemptuous. This growing old business is not something that I am inclined to do gracefully.

But I am making, at least, a half-hearted attempt. The fact that I am in pain and there are other people in the house going about their business normally instead of trying to avoid being on the same floor with me is testament to my successful determination to avoid making every body else as miserable as I am.

I spent half an hour on the front porch watching the shadows lengthen and the birds wind down their day. I don't have a bird bath as such but in the garage I found one of those big bowl shaped things that kids use in the snow.

I placed it a few feet from the porch and sprayed it about half full of water. By the time I got back to the steps half a dozen fat robins were sloshing water in all directions. There are even a couple that will walk about the garden when I'm spraying

it down so that they can get wet too. After the robins left, three pairs of eastern blue birds, took a dip.

I am now determined to purchase at least two of those big concrete bird baths. The plan is to get them loaded at the garden store and then block the driveway and refuse to move until somebody unloads them and erects them in the front yard on spots that I plan to mark with lime first thing tomorrow morning.

I wonder what it would take to get the dozens of barn swallows to take a bath. They swoop and dive about the yard and garden and ever once in awhile right through the porch so close that my instinct is to dive under the wing.

Occasionally, I will see mosquito or moth wings wafting down to the grass. The swallows catch them in mid air, and chomp the victim's carcasses from between its wings.

On Swallows!  
I just wish they would slow down long enough and close enough to be admired. Maybe the bird baths will do that trick.

These last days of June when the days are near the longest they will be all year are perfect when the wind is still and the sun is dipping low and the air is still just cool enough for the height of comfort.

At this time of day most of the folks on Charlie Brown Road are watching television and it may be an hour before a car goes by.

The quiet, at first, seem almost unnatural until I realize that this may be as natural as it ever gets here on Lowell Branch.

Too often folks get bored with these nothing evenings but if you watch closely it's far more entertaining than anything happening on the boob tube.

And even though the spell may

only last a few short minutes, I find myself literally "getting away from it all" without ever leaving the front porch steps.

And for half an hour tonight I did just that. If my back was hurting then, I never noticed.

But now it is and you're going to have to settle for this meager helping that I hope your editor will call a column.

They, (the whole staff) went that extra mile to insure her comfort to and from dialysis, made sure she was monitored carefully, stopped in between cities when her blood pressure dropped, brought her home and carefully CARRIED her to bed. Try if you will, but we don't think you'll find caring people like these in the big city.

It's good to know that our ambulance service is there to serve, but it's better to know we have people there who will give beyond our expectations

of what a public service should do.

God bless and keep each and everyone in this caring service, and know that if no one else cares, we know family of Tennessee Northern do.

And you all quickly became a part of our family. We love each and everyone of you from the bottom of our hearts. Once again, God bless you all.



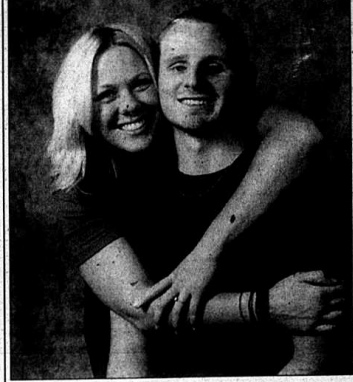

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## Cornett certified "Facility Manager"

Tammy Cornett, a local farmer, was selected to attend the first training class for a new agriculture enterprise in Kentucky. She is the first woman to be certified as "Facility Manager" for Kentucky's new Mobile Processing Unit (MPU) for small livestock species.

The MPU will allow independent Kentucky farmers the opportunity to raise, process and market several species of small livestock. Poultry processed in the MPU will receive a seal from the Kentucky Department for Public Health and will be available for sale anywhere in the state of Kentucky. This is currently the only way a farmer can legally direct market their poultry.

The Mobile Processing Unit will allow farmers to take advantage of, as well as test, the small but growing niche market for pastured poultry, rabbits and aquaculture. While this

market will never threaten the conventional livestock industry, it may provide profitable marketing opportunities for small farmers and satisfy a growing number of consumers looking for farm fresh chicken.

"This was a very intense, information packed, two day hands on training at Kentucky State University Research Farm. The first day was spent learning all the requirements and regulations, and the second day processed 100 chickens. The chickens weighed about 5 pounds. Most of them were priced about \$15.00 each and were already sold to patrons of the Lexington Farmers Market. I think this MPU could be of great benefit to local farmers wanting to raise and sell chickens, shrimp and rabbits," Cornett said.

The MPU has taken almost five years and the cooperation of a lot of

people to actually get built. The MPU cost over \$80,000 and was primarily paid for with Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education grant money. The Heifer Project International, Kentucky Department of Agriculture and Department for Public Health, Kentucky State University, Partners for Family Farms and U.K. have all been involved in bringing this mobile unit to fruition.

The MPU has been granted an exemption from federal poultry inspection by the USDA Food Safety Inspection Service. This exemption is based on the fact that Kentucky's Department for Public Health has agreed to serve as the inspecting entity for the MPU. This is a pilot project for the Kentucky Department for Public Health and will be evaluated after the first year to determine if it is acceptable to continue this process.

## Inmates at Rockcastle Jail complete GEDs

"I feel much more capable of speaking out about education and want to do more for inmates involved with the work release program," stated James Burton, a state inmate at the Rockcastle Jail, completing a three year sentence for stolen property and also graduating with a GED, through the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP).

James Miller, jailer for Rockcastle County, was instrumental in first contacting CAP about having an instructor teach GED courses to the state inmates lodged there, as the inmates themselves had expressed an interest in completing their education. State inmates are provided various services and programs, such as recreation, church and education.

As the inmates proceeded into the courtroom, in traditional cap and gown, to a musically uplifting triumphant procession, their presence in front of the witness stand was under very positive circumstances, as opposed to previous visits to the bench.

"Working in the prison system in the past, I know what a boost it was to accomplish something, with the recidivism rate being so high, so if a GED can help turn a life around it's worth it," stated Linville Rose, of CAP Human Services.

"When the GED was field tested among graduating high school seniors across the country, 40% of the students failed, so take pride in your success," continued Linville during the commencement address.

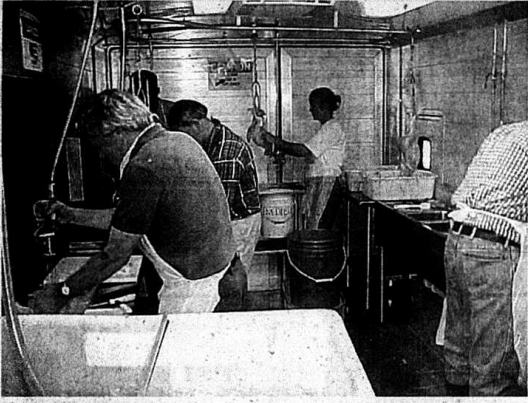
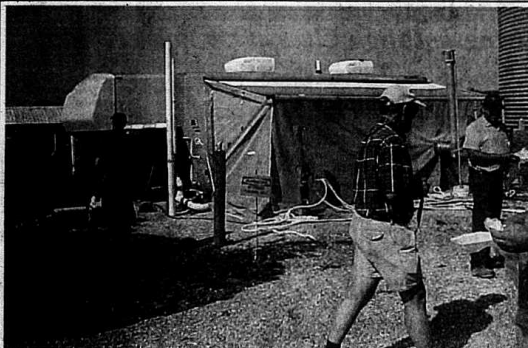
Thirteen inmates received diplomas and some of those had completed their sentences or made parole prior to the actual graduation ceremony.

"It really gives a great sense of pride to these guys who accomplish this and I realize how important it is to them," said Keith Gilbertson, instructor for CAP's Adult Learning Program. Keith met and taught classes with the inmates each week.

"How long it takes them, depends on how hard they're willing to work to complete the course study," continued Keith, "and some of them commented that they appreciated the teacher's patience with the material."

The Christian Appalachian Project is an interdenominational, nonprofit Christian service organization,

committed to serving people in need in Appalachia by providing physical, spiritual and emotional support through education, crisis intervention and community development. With more than seventy programs and services, CAP's efforts reach people through the thirteen Appalachian states.



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In Hebs 4:14-16 we read, "Seeing then that we have a great high priest, that is passed into the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our profession. For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. 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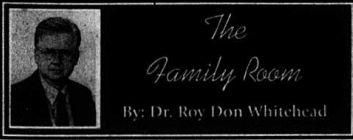
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## The Family Room

### A Need to Control Hurts the Marriage

John controls Mary. (All characters are fictitious.) Mary is not even aware that this is happening, and John would deny it if anyone pointed it out to him. Even though the two are not aware of this, their marriage is being damaged by John's need to control.

How does John control Mary? 1. He controls the money. Though Mary works, she gives her paycheck to John and he deposits it in their joint account. It is a joint account in name only because John carries the checkbook and writes all the checks.

When Mary asks questions about their finances, John tells her, "Trust me, honey. Everything is OK." John gives Mary an allowance each week and, if she needs more, she has to ask him for it. "Sometimes I do feel like an eight-year-old," she admits.

2. John also controls who Mary's friends are. If he does not like one of her friends, he lets her know that, "I know he doesn't like my friend Sheila," Mary says. "Every time I come home from being with her, he gives me the silent treatment. That is hard to endure, so I have been seeing Sheila less and less." John's method of control is subtle but effective.

3. He also tries to control the amount of time Mary spends with her family.

"I don't see my mother and sister as much as I used to," Mary acknowledges. "John is always angry with me after they call or when I visit them, so it is easier for me to not go than to put up with his anger."

John is never violent. When angry, he may be silent and emotionally withdraw or may make sarcastic comments. He does not have to be violent in order to control Mary.

4. Mary is intimidated by John, and this adds to his ability to control her. John is six feet four inches tall and weighs 225 pounds. Mary is five feet six inches tall and weighs 135. When John raises his voice to her, which he does occasionally, she is scared of him. "I don't really think he would hurt me," she says, "but he sure does seem scary when he is like that."

Mary's mother also had a loud voice, and she feels the same way with John that she felt as a little girl with her dad: scared.

5. John is very critical of Mary, and this also adds to his control. She feels so bad about herself that she has no confidence. She believes she needs someone to tell her what to do, and John happily obliges. "You don't have any common sense," John told her when they were shopping for her a car, so he sent her home and made the decision himself. "You talk too much when other people are around," he tells her, therefore she keeps quiet when company comes. "Other people aren't interested in what you have to say," John tells her.

6. John makes all the major decisions for the family. He decides what car to buy and in which house they will live. When Mary wanted to register her daughter for Girl Scouts, she had to ask John's permission. "He would have been mad if I had done it without asking him," she reports. John decided where they would attend church. "I don't really like the church," Mary confided in a friend, "but John is happy there so that is where we go."

With put-downs and intimidation John keeps Mary in line. They have been together ten years, but how much longer can this marriage last?

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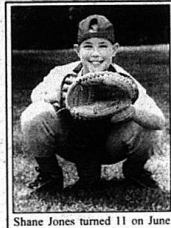

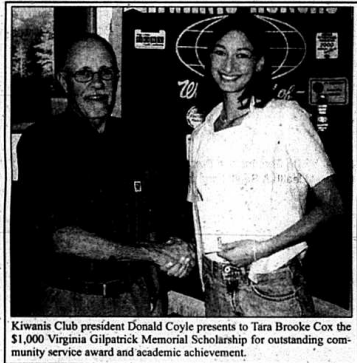

and I never found chewed up socks or the remains of snacks left on the table scattered around the house. And his bed was a throw rug next to Rodney's. I have a feeling he did not sleep on the floor but on the bed close to his buddy. When Rod went for a walk in the woods, which he loved to do, he was never alone for Stubby, with his short little legs doing double time to keep up, long silky ears flopping and stubby tail wagging, was close by his side. They had many a tramp through the endless woods that surrounded our place.

Now I, as the caretaker of the house, had made it clear that dogs and cats were nice to have around, especially on the farm, but I meant "around" not inside. The outside was where they belonged. The barn loft had plenty of hay for cat beds, hens nests, plus enough for cow feed. The porch was good enough for the dogs. That was where I fed them and a bed was made close by for a dog to guard their domain. That is what I had been

taught as a child and I guess my thinking was, "what was good enough for Maw, is good enough for me." I soon found out she was wrong and maybe I had better change the record my memories had been stored on.

Rod had named him stubby when he found out the stub beneath a wisp of long curly hair was all he owned for a tail. But that little stub could get attention as quick as a long furry one. He was so cute when he tried to wag his tail and his whole rear end could just wiggle. And, if he could have laughed, I am sure he would have giggled at the sight. He was blond and his hair just beginning to curl into waves over his body and his ears were long enough to make a frame around his face. He was truly a very pretty young dog with a personality to match. And, even though we were all his family and keepers, he knew Rodney was his buddy and master. Mat was headmaster, I the cook and Judy another buddy he could always depend on to feed him bits of leftovers and play with him when she was free to do so. Oh, yes, HE DID become a house dog and his

favorite place to sleep, was upstairs next to Rod's bed. Stubby learned early not to touch anything such as a dish of candy or snacks left on the coffee table (are today's children as well trained?) By this time, Polly had joined our family and did her share of coddling him through his ordeal. She has always been gentle and caring of animals and maybe her gentleness and special care gave him the will to live. He survived by wasn't out of the house much for a long time. So, when he had to leave the dining room, he took a long look at the living room, a glance at the stairs, a long peep into our bedroom, another glance back at the cleaning pail I was carrying then slowly walked through the living room. He stopped at the foot of the stairs, looked into the bedroom and back to the cleaning pail, another look upstairs and began the painful climb up the stairs to Rod's bed. He knew without a doubt, I wouldn't be cleaning up there and he could nap as long as he pleased.

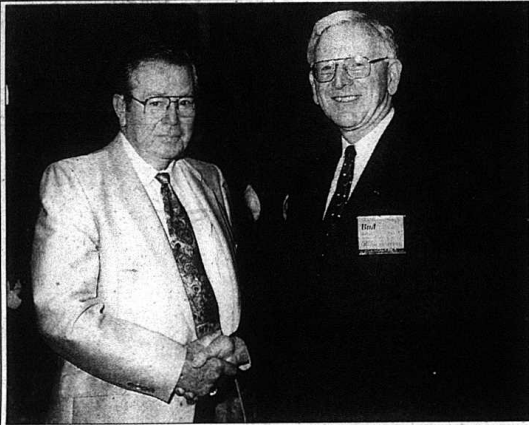

When we arrived, he told us the story of how he had walked the streets all night with pain from a tooth he had filled that day and an air pocket had been caught beneath it causing pain that medicine couldn't stop. When daylight came, he had gone to the hospital and was still groggy from something the Doctor had prescribed.

Stubby began to falter when he tried to follow Mat to the barn or chase a rabbit out of the garden. So once again, Mat took him to a vet. The vet thought it was time to put

him to sleep but Polly, a young teenager now, didn't think so. She began to use her weepson, tears, to get us to let her keep him a while longer. They brought him home and he improved enough that Polly had the joy of tending to him till she entered high school. Then, one day, Mat came in carrying a box and laid it down on the porch. I knew something was wrong and looked up into eyes brimming with tears. "Stubby is dead," Mat said, "I am going to bury him." He had wrapped him in a coat and placed him in the box. Evidently he had a heart attack.

How could I tell Rod his beloved buddy was gone? I wrote him with tears staining the page I was writing on, then looked at the pap box casket and said a tearful goodbye to Stubby. I then laid a flower from the vase on it and watched as Mat carried him to a spot in the back yard that would be the beginning of the pet cemetery.

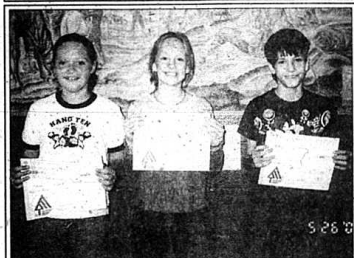

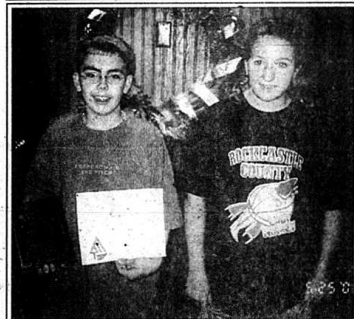

## Required Crop Reports

New legislation requires all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to report acreage planted to barley, including zero acres no later than July 16th. Reports to be filed after July 16th will subject the farmer to a civil fine.

## Marketing cards will NOT be issued without a crop report on file.

Farms with an effective barley quota that will not plant barley or lease quota from the farm MUST report a zero acreage for barley to tobacco, or the farm will be subject to quota forfeiture for the applicable barley marketing quota next established for the farm unless the State Committee and the County Committee determine that the reduction is not applicable.

## We strongly urge producers to call 256-2525 ext. 100 and request an appointment.

**Barley Tobacco Lease Date:** Barley Tobacco Leasing will end on July 2, 2001. Any producer wishing to report their name to the Tobacco Lease In or Lease Out may contact the office in person or by calling 606-256-2525. Producers are reminded all signatures must be obtained and on file by July 2nd for the lease and transfer to be approved.

## Disaster Leasing

Farmers who will suffer a firey tobacco disaster loss must file a report with FSA. Prior to Harvest to retain eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions. The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to producers that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to disaster lease and transfer, the transferring farm must file a crop report with FSA, have planted acreage sufficient to produce the farm's current year effective quota, provide a workman like manner for the crop production, suffer more than a 20% crop loss and meet all price support eligibility requirements.

## Warehouse Designation-A Must in 2001

Beginning with the 2001 marketing year barley tobacco farmer operators will be required to file an initial designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market their tobacco. The initial designation period for the 2001 marketing season will begin June 1, 2001 and end on August 1, 2001.

Farmers are required to inform FSA of the warehouse number where they will market their tobacco. Please note the FSA 808 will indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the marketing card, you must return that card to the FSA office and request another marketing card. Remember: the marketing cards are warehouse specific.

Producers must be aware of signing the warehouse designation form prior to the approval of all leases. Warehouse designation forms list only those pounds effective for the farm as of the date of the signed form. There-

fore, if you have leases not approved you will need to come back to the FSA office and file the FSA 808 for the lease pounds.

Farmers not signing the FSA 808 will be eligible for re-designate pounds and sale locations during the re-designation periods of: October 1-5, 2001, October 29-November 2, 2001, December 3-7, December 28, 2001, January 8-10, 2002 and January 28-February 1, 2002.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office. This listing will be available through March 31, 2002.

## Loan Deficiency Payment

Producers who retain beneficial interest in a commodity eligible for a loan or a loan deficiency payment (LDP) are eligible for payment if all of the following remain with the producer:

- Control of the commodity
- Risk of loss
- Title of the commodity

FSA realizes that many farmers may begin feeding thus the loss of beneficial interest occurs. Anyone who has lost title, risk and or control of the 2001 crop, has lost beneficial interest and is currently not eligible for benefits.

Once the eligibility requirements for 2001 Loans and LDPs is the crop must have been produced on contract acreage (AMTA), exclusion to soybeans.

For further information on the LDP program contact the local FSA office.

## Grazed 2001 Wheat, Barley, Oats (Graze-Out)

The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2001 provides "LDP-like" payments on grazed acres. Crop year 2001 producers of wheat, oats and barley on a farm with a production flexibility contract who graze

the acreage will receive a payment under the same terms and conditions as a producer who harvests a crop and the lease pounds.

applies for a loan deficiency payment.

Graze-Out is available to producers who are otherwise eligible for marketing assistance loans and LDPs producers enrolled in the Production Flexibility Program (PFC), graze 2001 crop acreage planted to wheat, barley or oats, do not harvest the same crop on the same acreage.

Applications for Graze-Out begins on the first day of mechanical harvest, May 14th as determined by COC and ends on August 31, 2001. Producers may file an application for Graze-Out anytime during this application period.

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

### Cut Large Round Bale Hay Losses

Some twenty years ago, hay harvest in square bales was the common practice and most barns were designed for humans moving small bales. Today Rockcastle County, like much of Kentucky, has adopted round bale hay as the principle harvesting method. Large round bales require tractors for moving and many barns do not allow access where square bales were once stored. Even when access is allowed, round bales just do not stack as efficiently.

A majority of large round bales are stored outdoors and face weather damage from the elements. Decisions now on where and how large round bales of hay are stored will determine how much and what quality this winter's feed supply will be. One should also look at the financial consideration for using

round bales by measuring hay losses.

Studies on the weathering effects of hay stored in different ways show some interesting facts. A round bale that is 4.5 feet in diameter and 4 feet wide occupies a total volume of 64 cubic feet. Even though 4 inches is only 7% of the bale diameter, a weathered layer 4 inches deep over the entire surface of the bale, including ends, would contain 39% of the total package volume. Even a layer that was only 2 inches deep over the surface would occupy 22% of the bale volume. Losses on the ends of exposed round bales do not penetrate as far into the bale as on the outer circumference of the bale. When losses on the end of the bale are disregarded, a 4 inch deep layer contains 28% of the total bale

volume. Since the ratio of surface area to volume decreases with increasing bale size, larger round bales should have smaller storage losses on a percentage basis.

With these facts in mind, what can be done to save hay? Whenever possible, store hay inside. Better quality hay and alfalfa hays should be stored inside first. Long stem fescue will bale tighter and shed water better.

Bale storage sites should be well drained. Any method such as crushed stone, poles, tires, and pallets which will keep round bales off the ground will prevent damage from ground water. And don't forget the obvious. Store hay so that weeds and trees do not prevent good air movement for drying. Bale storage areas located under trees or allowed to grow up in woods will have even higher losses than reported earlier.

New bale tarps are on the market that allow large stacks of hay to be covered. Special pockets allow pipes and ropes to secure the sides to prevent wind damage. Farmers find, with care, that bale tarps last up to 5 years and store hay just as well as barns. Tarps run just over \$175, and cover 54, 5'x4' bales. A 5 year tarp life would mean 65 cents per bale storage cost to prevent \$5. hay loss.

One might look at hay loss like a mowing machine or rake that left 25% to 30% of the hay in your field. Most farmers would not stand for a shoddy job, but accept

large bale storage losses as unpreventable.

## Cooking can destroy nutrients

Many fresh fruits and vegetables are more plentiful this time of year. Since fruits and vegetables are an important part of a healthy diet, don't let nutrients go up in steam as you cook these foods. You can reduce nutrient loss by following some basic guidelines.

When foods are cooked at high temperatures for a long period of time, the greatest vitamin loss occurs, especially with some water-soluble vitamins, notably C and some B vitamins, that also are heat sensitive. So use fast-cooking methods such as microwaving and steaming.

Cooking vegetables in a microwave oven preserves nutrients because this method cooks rapidly and requires little or no added water. You can reduce nutritive loss by using the microwave oven to reheat leftovers or to cook frozen or canned foods.

Another way to reduce vitamin loss is to cook vegetables and fruits in as little water as possible. For this reason, steaming is preferable to boiling. Steaming foods helps retain nutrients because it requires a short cooking time and little water. Vegetables lose 50 percent less minerals during steaming than when boiled.

Stir-frying also destroys fewer vitamins than conventional frying, because you cook foods at a lower temperature and use less liquid.

If you decide to boil vegetables, remember Vitamin C, all B vitamins and many minerals leach into water so use as little water as possible. Don't dice or cut vegetables into tiny pieces because this increases the surface area, allowing more water-soluble nutrients to leach out. Wait until water reaches a full boil to add vegetables and put a lid on

the pot or pan during cooking. This cuts cooking time and decreases time food is in the water, reducing nutrient loss.

You can use nutrients that are leached out by putting the water from boiling or steaming into soups, gravies and stews. Cook vegetables whole and unpeeled. A major portion of the vitamins is in the peel of vegetables, such as potatoes and carrots. And avoid buying pre-cut produce because it's often peeled, which decreases its nutrient content. Pre-cut produce loses some vitamins because more surface is exposed to air.

To reduce nutrient losses, do not soak fruits or vegetables in water prior to cooking. And cook foods as close to serving time as possible because the longer food sits in liquid, the more nutrients are lost.

Total nutrient loss depends on several other factors, including how the food was handled and stored before you bought it and its freshness when purchased. To get the most benefit, buy only as much fresh produce as you'll use in a few days. Don't be tempted to buy wilted vegetables offered at a special low price. Buy fresh produce, or use frozen or canned products. For more information on family nutrition, contact your Extension Service at 256-2403.



Special hay tarps help farmers prevent weather damaged hay. Tarps are heavy weight material with UV protection to prevent sun breakdown. Special pockets on the edges allow pipes or rebar to be secured by plastic rope placed under bales as stacking takes place. The picture above is a tarp rolled back on two-year-old hay.

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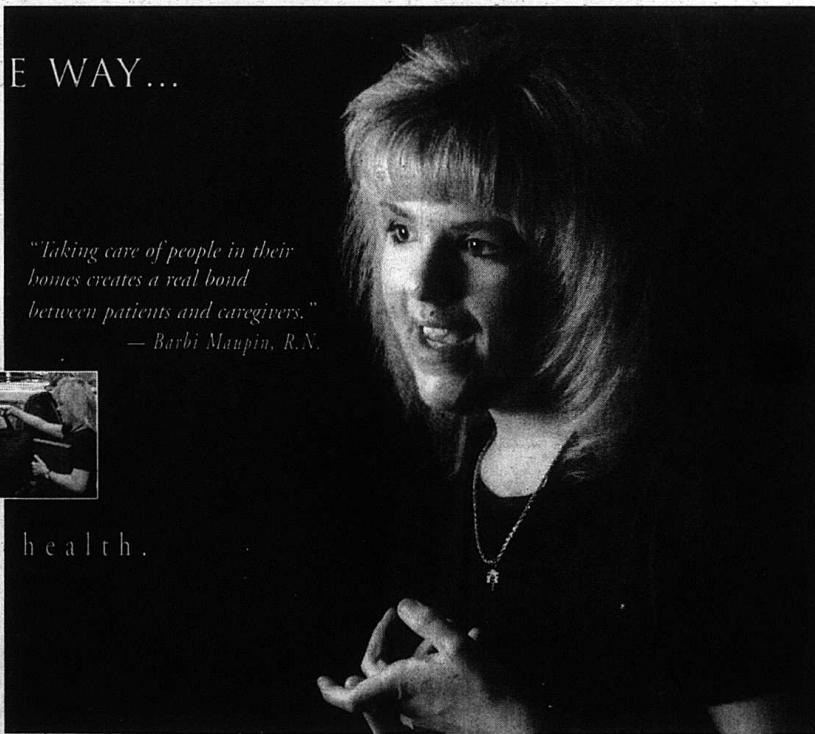


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
