

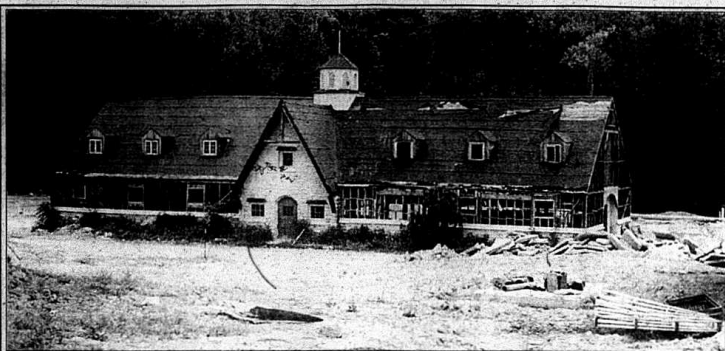

The Kentucky Country Music Hall of Fame at Renfro Valley

The Kentucky Country Music Hall of Fame at Renfro Valley is currently under construction. Funding for the \$3.7 million dollar project was secured from the Kentucky General Assembly by State Representative Danny Ford, with the blessing of Kentucky Governor Paul Patton, who left the money in the 1998 and 2000 budgets. The Hall of Fame is scheduled to open in May of next year. There will be twelve inductees in the first class to enter the Hall of Fame, which is expected to draw thousands of tourists to the county each year. The 15,000 square foot Hall is located at Renfro Valley on some of the former John Lair property. Lair founded the Renfro Valley Barn Dance in 1939 and his daughter Ann Lair Henderson is very involved in the development of the Hall of Fame. The first twelve inductees will be announced in November, during a visit by Kentucky country music legend Loretta Lynn. Above is the former Lair stables, which will serve as a vestibule to the Hall, once renovated. Two other large connections are also being built, one of which will show the time line of country music in Kentucky.

Woman with local ties convicted of killing seven in head-on wreck

An Indiana woman, who has ties to Rockcastle County, was sentenced to 215 years in prison on June 15. Judy Kirby, 32, of Indianapolis, was found guilty in May of seven counts of murder, four felony counts of neglect and one count of aggravated battery. Kirby was charged with murder last year after she intentionally drove her Pontiac Firebird head-on into the path of a Plymouth van on State Route 67 near Martinsville in Morgan County, Indiana. According to police reports from the Indiana State Police, Kirby's intentional acts caused the deaths of three of her own children and a nephew, who were passengers in her car and the deaths of three people in the van. Police said that when the two vehicles collided they were traveling a

combined speed of 160 miles per hour. Kirby's three children, Jordan, 12, Joney, 9, and Jacob, 5, and her nephew, Jeremy Young, 10, died in the wreck. Thomas Reel, 40 and his two teenage children, Jessica Reel, 14 and Brad Reel, 13 also died in the crash. During the 13-day trial, prosecutors presented evidence in the case portraying Kirby as a drug dealer who was afraid her ex-boyfriend had made a deal with federal agents in Kentucky. More specifically prosecutors alleged that Kirby was trying to commit suicide because she knew she would be indicted in federal court, after members of a Rockcastle County family were arrested in February of 2000, five weeks before the horrific high-speed collision. Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane, who testified during the

13-day trial said that the case involved the arrests of several members of the Lovell family, but that Judy Kirby's name never came up in any discussions or during the investigation by Kentucky State Police, FBI and DEA and that led to the arrest of 15 people on February 15, 2000. Judy Kirby has a sister living in Mt. Vernon. During sentencing on June 13th, Kirby got three consecutive 65-year sentences for her murder convictions on May 10th for the deaths of 40-year-old Tom Reel, 14-year-old Jessica Reel and 13-year-old Brad Reel, who were in the van Kirby's Pontiac Firebird rammed head-on. She received an additional 20-year term for her conviction for aggravated battery for permanent injuries suffered by 13-year-old Richard Miller, a rider in the Reel van. (Cont. to A12)

Davy Stewart found guilty in federal court

Davy Stewart, 33, of Orlando who is accused of a Rockcastle County murder last August has been found guilty in federal court in Lexington of drug and gun charges. Stewart, who still faces charges of murder, burglary, robbery, assault and wanton endangerment, was convicted last Wednesday in U.S. District Court. Stewart faces up to 70 years in prison and \$1 million in fines when he is sentenced on September 7. The federal drug and gun charges stem from an August 22 incident in Madison County, when Stewart was shot by police, after he tried to steal a vehicle. Federal prosecutors contended that Stewart used a machine gun in the attempted carjacking in Madison County. Stewart was arrested on the federal charges on April 13, when he showed up for a court appearance on the murder charge in Rockcastle Circuit Court. A complaint filed with U.S. Magistrate James Todd in Lexington alleged that Stewart broke in the Madison County home on August 22 and tried to take the resident's vehicle as well. Police testified that Stewart was armed with a fully automatic AK-47 rifle, which police testified that he pointed at a Kentucky State Police Officer, who had responded to the 911 distress call, from the Moberly Road residence, about three miles east of Richmond. According to court records, Sgt. Joey Barnes shot Stewart once in the chest. Stewart was indicted on murder charges in Rockcastle County last fall, after he allegedly killed Patty Clark, 25, and shot Sally Hoskins, also 25, on August 10, 2000. Hoskins led police to Clark's badly decomposed body about two weeks after the shooting. Stewart is accused of shooting Clark after she refused to pray for her life. Hoskins supposedly did pray for hers. The incident took place at Cove Branch near the McNew Cemetery. Stewart was out on a \$100,000 cash bond and \$50,000 when he was arrested by Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane. The \$10,000 bond had been set by Circuit Judge William Jennings and the \$50,000 property bond had been set by Rockcastle Circuit Judge William Cain. Stacy Akers, an assistant in Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery's office, said this week that no trial date for the murder charge had been set. Mrs. Akers said that the Commonwealth Attorney's office was awaiting lab results from blood samples before they sought a trial date. Stewart is currently being held by federal authorities, until his September 7th sentencing. (Cont. to A12)

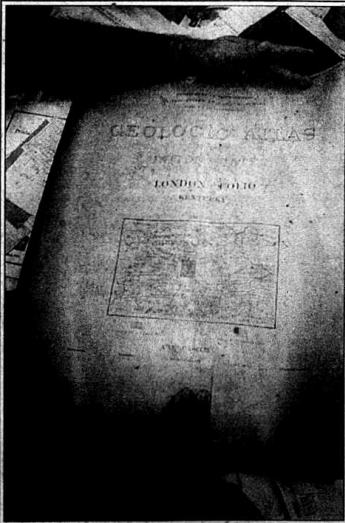
Interviews for middle school job Thursday

A U.S. Geological Atlas dated 1897, which was found in Kansas City, KN earlier this year, has been sent to Rockcastle County. Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolfts received the map earlier this year because it includes a detailed map of the County, which was part of the London Ky. Folio. The map was found in the belongings of a deceased surveyor, who was related to some of Carlolfts' family. The map shows the Rockcastle County of 1897 and includes sites that we still know today, such as Livingston, Mt. Vernon and Brodhead. But it also shows places like Moberly Branch, which is now Gauley Branch and White Oak and Sutton Nob. Brush Mountain was near Quail and the L & N Railroad was the fastest means of transportation. The Railroad split at the Sinks and the Central Division portion, traveled the same route it does today. From the Sinks, to Mullins, to Withers, Orlando, Langford, Mullersville, Wilder, Roundstone and Conway. The other line went from the Sinks to Pine Hill, Cook, Mt. Vernon, Mareburg, Brodhead and Gum Sulphur. Copies of the map can be obtained from Carlolfts by calling (606) 256-2856.

I was up in Harlan County one hot day last summer one of those combination business and running around the trips where you try to get your own business done as fast as you can so you can get out and stick your nose in somebody else's.

Actually there's nothing I hate worse than somebody coming along when I'm planting my garden or doing a carpentry project and saying stuff like, "I've never seen cucumbers planted in a row like that," or "if it was me, I'd put them onions in a raised bed," and then they feel obligated to give you a thirty minute lecture on how much better your veggies will fare if you do it their way or how much prettier your pipe stand would be with walnut instead of cherry stain.

I swear that I would rather walk on hot coals and listen to a politician lie at the same time than have some know it all give me gardening advice in my own garden. And if I need any

advice on my pipe stand I'll call Rufus Harrison whose taste in wood stain is the only one on earth that I trust more than my own.

Anyway I figure that if I'm polite enough to put up with unsolicited advice, I am, likewise, entitled to dole it out from time to time.

I wound up in the head of a little hollow near Wallins with a colleague who was there to inspect the construction progress of a home that the company I work for is financing and I noticed that the neighbors were out in the back yard of the house next door sharpening machetes. My colleague had already made it abundantly clear that he knew precisely what he was looking for and needed not a smidgen of assistance in determining the quality of the construction from yours truly. So I snapped a couple of pictures and walked over to visit with the neighbors.

First of all, the three guys looked like my kind of people and secondly

I was curious as to what it was they might be getting ready to attack.

They were passing around a bastard file and comparing the edges they had on their respective blades when I walked up. I told them I was from neighboring Leitcher County, that I was taking pictures of the house and when I further explained that I'd grown up about 12 miles from Whitesburg they agreed that that was far enough away from town to keep me or my camera from being dangerous.

Right off I wanted to know if they had ever used one of those little grid stones that you can put in an electric drill to sharpen their stuff.

The guy with the file, squirted out a long stream of amber from his chaw and allowed that he could sharpen three blades with a file in less time than it would take to find his drill. The other two nodded to indicate that their drills were also in parts unknown. Already it was obvious that I was going to have to try harder if I was to be of any assistance to these lads.

What do you all aim to do with the machetes once you get them sharp," I asked, figuring that maybe they might be headed down to the river and needed to hack their way through the stinging weeds so they could get to a fishing hole. I mean I've had a machete all my adult life and chopping stinging weeds is the only practical utility I've ever made of it.

The guy with the chaw of Red Man in his cheek nodded and squinted another stream toward the side of the hill and that's when it dawned on me that kudzu was climbing up the posts on his back porch. In fact, there was nothing visible from the backside of the house for as far up the mountain as I could see except a thick blanket of kudzu. I could tell that there were trees underneath it but you couldn't actually see them.

"We're gonna wage war on that stuff," he muttered and then took a few vicious swings at the leafy vines while his buddies spread out a few steps on either side and went about the chopping and hacking as though they were, in fact, waging war.

"Why don't you just mow it," I wanted to know.

One of the other guys looked me over and grinned. "Are you plumb shore you didn't grow up right in downtown Whitesburg," he answered with a question of his own? "Turn that mower up and look under it."

I raised the lawn mower deck off the ground and couldn't see the blade because a huge coil of kudzu vine had been wound around the spindle so tightly that the underside of the mower looked like it had been stuffed with one of those grapevine wreaths that are popular among the home-making set these days.

"How bout weed killer?" I hear that new Spectracide Brush Killer will work on about anything. Sure get the poison vine off my rock fence," I ventured.

Red Man (that's what the other guys called him) shook his head and motioned me over. "He held his machete by the tip of the blade, pointed the handle at me and nodded at the vines. By this time sweat was pouring off his brow.

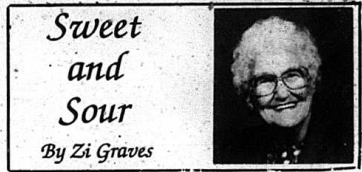
I took the big knife, rubbed my thumb over the hone and allowed that it was sharp as a razor. I chopped a few minutes by which time we had rendered a strip of kudzu about six feet wide and maybe forty feet long into mulch. "There's for to be a better way," I said.

"When you get back across the mountain you can tell them that you learned the only way there is to fight kudzu," he said. "He stared up the mountain at the mid-high and several-miles-wide kudzu thickets.

Next time I go to Harlan County I'm going to take my machete and I'm going back to a wallins creek. I'm not going to say a word but I'm going to fall in behind the first person I see hacking kudzu and when the blade gets dull I'm going to ask if anybody has a file.

Has time changed the way our children acted, or reacted to the problem of being a teenager, or has the life style of families with young people seeking a way out of the world of littered pots and entering a new world of strange, and unfamiliar emotions, privileges and lack of privileges never allowed before, parents, who once were kind and gentle, suddenly their worst enemy, or so it seems, cause he change in so man of the modern kids?

I would like to put the blame on society, the world we live in and shape by our own actions. I am speaking about those of us who must work for a living and raise our offspring at the same time. Or the parent that puts pleasure before love of the children. We have both kinds of parents and it is they who are responsible for the kids on the streets and often the cause of, or ignorance thereof, their child's misbehavior when he/she stumbles or falls during their trying time of their life. Training for this time in their life begins at birth and you are not finished till they are old enough or capable enough to prove they can handle the results of their own decisions.

None of us are, or claim to be perfect. Therefore do not say, with truth anyhow, that we raised perfect children. If anyone has "please hold up your hand" and I will salute you. Yet there are a few that have every right to be proud of their offspring, more praise than complaints followed them through grade school and high school, was taken in stride and the struggle of adolescence was simply another step toward responsible adulthood. We lived in the country; and, as many of my neighbors at that time would have described it, "a purty far piece out." It was seventeen miles from Mt. Vernon, with no connecting roads; twenty-two miles to Somerset; sixteen miles to London, plus two miles from our house to Hwy. 80. Playmates for my oldest two lived at least a mile away and the one room schoolhouse they had to walk to was a couple of miles. Polly also went to the Buffalo one room school when her time came. So, a big part of their time was spent doing chores or finding something interesting to do alone. Judy spent time helping me do the canning, cooking and household work. She learned the hard way to be good at all of them. Rod watched his dad work on the truck. Mat was a good mechanic, along with his other talents, so Rod

was learning about man's work at the same time he was learning how to strike a bow and arrow for his treks into the woods to target shoot. Since we were not hunters, he never shot to kill. When they entered school in Ohio during the war years, their grades were good and they continued that way after we moved back to the one room school at Buffalo, then graduated from Shippville High with honors. So, Judy, Rod and Polly didn't have many of the temptations and problems of the children in today's world where rooms crowded with children from every walk of life and drug abuse abounds can interfere with the ability to think or do ones lessons.

Our children had another advantage over many of the other children. We were lovers of reading and had good books in our home. Mat owned a big old fashioned dictionary that was used till it fell apart. And we had most of his old school books, plus educational books on everything from mechanics to advanced carpentry and surveying and Mat was a perfectionist in all. The talk at the dinner table wasn't idle chatter. It covered everything from history to math problems. His collection included classics and western novels also the complete Five Foot Shelf of Harvard Classics. Our dinner was often disturbed by one of the kids waving to run into the next room where the bookcase was to look up the answer to some question we were discussing. Or Mat gave Rod a tricky math problem that needed a bit of time to solve.

I guess my wonderful visit with Rodney and wife Helen this weekend awakened a few memories and opened the door to a part of the past I haven't peeped into for awhile. When I hear the familiar voice of one of the children saying, "Mom, I'm home," it arouses memories of a time when there were five of us and the quiet of my present life is transformed into a time of constant chatter with Mat's voice dominated the occasion with his knowledge of the past, present and predictions for the future. Then, when a pause came, a young voice would break in to add a fresh thought or question to the discussion. Now, I brush the cobwebs from my mind and enjoy the pleasure of a familiar voice.

This was one of those occasions. My article last week about Rod and his dog Stubby, opened the door to an evening filled with the antics and love-by, and from, a little boy and his dog. One story was how Stubby would wait for him at the top of the

overall growth rate of your plant—but it will reward you with a more attractive shape.

For taxis, junipers, prune now, and again later if necessary to keep them looking neat.

Burning bushes should be hedge trimmed. Some more dwarf plants or fruiting plants, should be selectively pruned one branch at a time. Remove thick, (crowded), weak, or dead limbs, shorter other limbs about 1/4 inch above a visible bud to encourage sound branching patterns about 1/4 inch.

Cutting back mock orange, noshall bushes, honeysuckle all the way to

the ground will encourage new shoots, (should not be done in dry hot weather).

The hollies need tipping back. Daffodils can now be cut down with no damage, but wait till July or August to cut iris, and till fall to cut peonies.

Think of pruning as correcting a plant. You discipline a child so it will grow to adulthood and behave in the way that will make a parent proud. Or to quote scripture, "when the Lord loveth, he corrects."

Your plants will do you proud if you spend a little time "correcting" their natural growth.

How did Mrs. Hopkins walk 1,475 miles? "I walk in the morning before I go to work on my treadmill. On my lunch break at work, I walk on the treadmill at the hospital, and then I walk outside when I get home!" She states that she started walking years ago as an outlet to relieve stress.

Another success story of the Walking Program is Gayle DeBorde, of Brodhead, who walked a total of 1,427 miles! Over the 24 week program, Mrs. DeBorde lost 10 pounds, one inch off her arms and hips, three inches off her thighs, and one and a half inches off her calf!

Gardening & Landscaping Tips

With the humid weather the lawn gets hairy almost overnight, and the shrubbery seems to have grown a foot in a week!

Now is a good time to do some pruning (though some plants can wait till fall or winter).

Spring-blooming plants that have the flowers on hardened wood (azaleas for instance) should be pruned now if you haven't already done so. Clip the dead blooms and tip out new growth. Cut among old big branches

to re-invigorate an older plant.

Even if you want to allow young plants to get taller before trimming them, pinching or cutting the tips will help more branching take place lower on the tree or shrub.

Maybe a tree should be "limbed up" unless it is a clump-forming tree; most smaller woody plants should be encouraged to put out additional lower limbs by cutting back part of the new growth before it fully hardens.

To help headache sufferers recognize the headache they are experiencing may be a migraine,

Rockcastle Community Walking Program

Sue Ann Hopkins, of Crab Orchard, employed by Rockcastle Community, exemplifies the success of the Community Walking Program sponsored by the Rockcastle County Health Department. Over the 24-week program, Mrs. Hopkins walked a total of 1,475 miles!

"Participants in the Walking Program agreed to walk a minimum of three times a week for 30 minutes for 12 weeks in the fall and 12 weeks in the spring. Approximately 130 people registered at the health department for the program. Each person had the following measurements taken at the beginning of the program: height, weight, blood pressure, pulse, and blood cholesterol. In addition, for

those who so desired, we also measured the circumference of hips, thigh, calf, waist, arm and bust. At the end of the program, the measures were repeated to allow participants to see the benefits of a consistent exercise program. Each walker was supplied a walking log journal, a sports water bottle and other goodies, and received a t-shirt when their walking logs were turned in and follow up measures were completed.

Herbal Supplements in Food?

Have you thought about drinking one of those herb-booster beverages? Well the FDA would like for you to think again. Three manufacturers of drinks supplemented with ginkgo biloba, Siberian ginseng, and echinacea have been notified that their products violate federal regulations governing what can and cannot be added to foods. While some herbs may offer medicinal benefits, their effectiveness and safety is far from proven. And medicinal herbs

probably do not belong in the food supply. Some herbs, such as ginkgo biloba, may present health hazards to consumers. If these herbs are present in the conventional food supply, you might unintentionally consume much more than you bargained for in that glass of iced tea or fruit drink. If you want to drink something with proven health benefits, try tomato juice, orange juice, lowfat milk or tea. You'll find these beverages to be readily available and much more affordable than the herb-spiked variety.

affected trees? Best control will occur during the dormant season. When possible, first prune out blighted twigs by pruning at least 4 inches below infected areas and destroying the clippings. Completely cover the dormant tree with a copper sulfate spray. Use 4-5 pounds copper sulfate per 100 gallons of water. This should help reduce over-wintering bacteria.

For home gardeners who wish to do something as they see the effect of Fire Blight, two things may help.

When possible, prune out blighted limbs. Prune at least 6-12 inches below affected areas and clean pruning tools between cuts. Sterilize tools between cuts by using 70% alcohol or 10% chlorine bleach solution. The second step, when possible, is to spray trees with antibiotic streptomycin (Agricultural

Streptomycin at farm stores). Use 4 oz. of 21% streptomycin sulfate per 100 gallons water at 4-5 day intervals during bloom and again weekly during past bloom period as long as shoots continue to elongate. Streptomycin is best applied just before sundown due to the sun's ability to break this product down. Pruning and spraying large trees may be impractical for some home owners. In this case, seek out qualified helpers who understand that Fire Blight can inadvertently be spread if proper pruning and sterilizing tools are not used.

Fire Blight is a bacterial disease affecting apple, pear, and flowering crab apple trees, to name a few of the more common trees. Home gardeners take notice this time of year when blossoms and leaves of infected limbs wilt suddenly and then turn dark brown to black as if scorched by fire.

Where does Fire Blight come from? Bacteria over-winters on infected trees in cankers formed during the previous year. Primary spread is accomplished by insects, wind, rain and movement of bacteria within the plant. The year of initial infection may see only a few scorched limbs, however the bacteria may be building up for a much larger infection the following year. Bacterial infections are generally favored by high humidity and temperatures between 65-70 degrees F. Bacteria gain access to trees through wound sites, or natural

openings such as flower parts, leaves and shoots.

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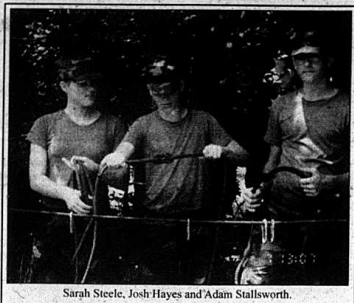

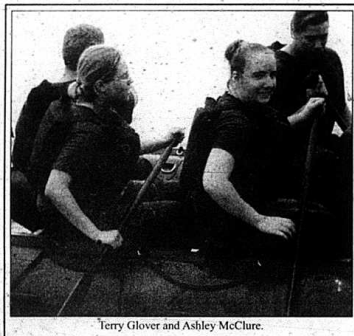

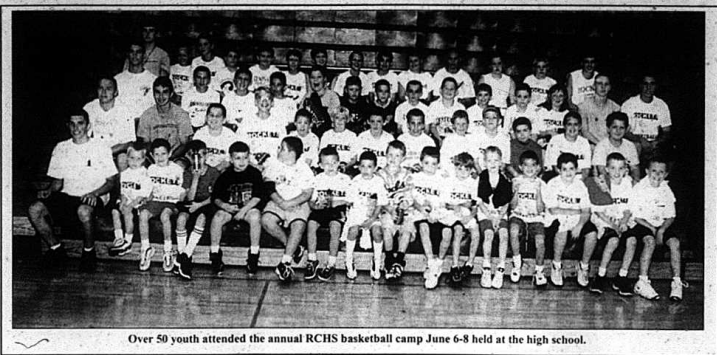

Tony Stewart wins at Sears Point

Tony Stewart held off Robby and Jeff Gordon to win Sunday's Dodge/Save Mart 350 at Sears Point Raceway. Stewart got the lead, and eventually his first career Winston Cup road-racing victory, with a quick move past Robby Gordon on Lap 102 as Gordon battled to keep Kevin Harvick's car a lap down.

It was his first career victory in five career road course races and his second victory in 2001 and 11th career victory in 84 career races. This was Stewart's first top-five finish on a road course. However, in his five

career road course races Stewart has scored four top-10 finishes. Stewart led the final 11 laps of the 112 laps raced. He did not lead the most laps. Jeff Gordon led 55 of the 112 laps raced. It was the sixth time in 2001 that he has led the most laps in a race. In the last four races Jeff Gordon has led 665 of the 912 laps raced (73 percent).

Robby Gordon (second) scored his career-best NASCAR Winston Cup finish. Jeff Gordon (third) extended his point lead by 90 points over second place Dale Jarrett. Gordon has finished first, second or third in six of the last seven races this season. While he ended a three-race win streak at Sears Point, Gordon has finished third or better in six of his last seven races at the California road course.

Ricky Rudd (fourth) scored his ninth top-10 finish in 13 races at Sears Point Raceway. Rudd remained third in the NASCAR Winston Cup point standings, just 15 points behind second-place Dale Jarrett.

Rusty Wallace (fifth) scored his ninth top-10 finish in 13 races at Sears Point Raceway. It was his fourth top-10 finish in 2001.

Some of the "hired guns" that replaced several drivers for the road race fared well at Sears Point: No. 7 Robby Gordon (2nd), No. 77-Boris Said (11th), No. 33-Scott Pruett (12th), No. 01-Dorsey Schroeder (25th), No. 87-Ron Fellows (38th) and No. 90-Mark Simo (42nd).

This was the second win for Pontiac in 2001, both by Stewart. Ford and Chevrolet have each won seven races and Dodge remains winless. Chevrolet leads the manufacturers' point race 112-111 over Ford. Pontiac has 70 points while Dodge has 58.

Transportation bill includes \$2 million for US 25 at Renfro

A major federal spending bill, authored by U.S. Representative Harold "Hal" Rogers of Somerset, passed the House overwhelmingly Tuesday night. The measure includes significant funding for transportation projects across Kentucky and within the 5th Congressional District, which Rogers represents.

The bill contains \$482.4 million for highways and transit project in Kentucky, including an estimated \$40.3 million for Appalachian re-

gional highway corridors and an additional \$45.2 million for targeted transportation projects in the 5th District. The measure passed the House on a vote of 426 to 1.

The bill also includes \$2 million for continued work on a project to three-lane US 25N in Rockcastle County to provide for increased traffic at the new Country Music Hall of Fame at Renfro Valley.

"The House of Representatives has put its stamp of approval on this important bill, which provides a major federal investment for our region's transportation network," Rogers said after the vote. "We have secured funding for vital transportation needs in Kentucky-projects which are at the heart of our campaign to strengthen the economy of our region, enhance tourism and create jobs for our people."

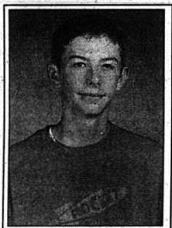

And she received 55 years each for four other murder convictions: Her own children Jordan, 12, Joney, 9 and Jacob 5, plus 10-year-old nephew Jeremy Young, who was in her care.

Those four sentences were ordered by the Judge to be served concurrently both with each other and with the three murder convictions for the Reels.

It amounted to a total of 215 years, with credit on each sentence for the 14 months she had spent in the hospital and Morgan County, Indiana jail after the crash.

The time-served credit reduces the sentence to about 210 years, and under Indiana law, she would be eligible for release after serving half her time on good behavior.

But that's 105 years, when Kirby would be dead or 137 years old.

The only possibility for reducing that time would be a successful appeal for clemency or commutation of the sentence, something that Kirby

could seek after serving 20 years.

Kirby appeared impassive as the sentence was read and was immediately taken away for transport to the Indiana Department of Correction.

Kirby has five other living children.

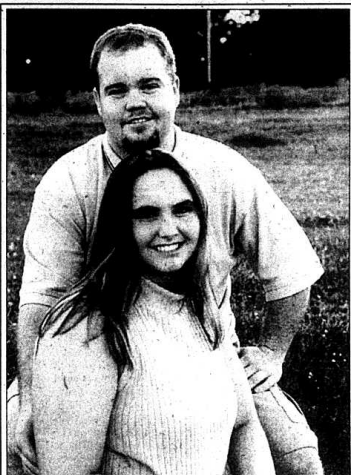

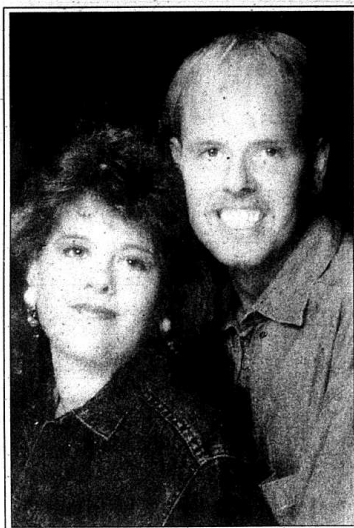

Agricultural News

July 2nd Deadline

July 2, 2001 is the deadline to sign all burley tobacco leases/transfers and sale/purchases. Producers are reminded all signatures must be obtained and on file by July 2nd for the FSA 375, Lease & Transfer and the FSA 375, Sale & Purchase, to be approved. Any producer wishing to post their name to the Tobacco Lease or Lease Out may contact the office in person or by calling 606-256-2525.

Required Crop Reports

New legislation requires all farms with an effective quota greater than zero report acreage planted to burley, including zero acres no later than July 16th. Reports filed after July 16th will be subject to a late file fee.

Marketing cards will NOT be issued without a crop report on file.

Farms with an effective burley quota that will not plant burley or lease quota from the farm MUST report a zero acreage for burley tobacco, or the farm will be subject to quota forfeiture for the applicable burley marketing quota next established for the farm, unless the State Committee and the County Committee determine that the reduction is not applicable.

We strongly urge producers to call 256-2525 ext. 100 and request an appointment.

Harvester Leasing

Farmers who will suffer a burley tobacco disaster loss must file a report with FSA Prior to Harvest to retain eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provision. The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to producers that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to lease and transfer or the transferring farm must file a crop report with FSA, have planted acreage sufficient to produce the farm's current year effective quota, provide a workman like manner for the crop production, suffer more than 30% crop loss and meet all price support eligibility requirements.

Warehouse Designation-A Must in 2001

Beginning with the 2001 marketing year burley tobacco farmer op-

erators will be required to file an initial designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market their burley. The initial designation period for the 2001 marketing season will begin June 1, 2001 and end on August 1, 2001.

Farmers are required to inform FSA of their tobacco. The initial designation period for the 2001 marketing season will begin June 1, 2001 and end on August 1, 2001. Producers must be aware of signing the warehouse designation form prior to the approval of all leases. Warehouse designation forms list only those pounds effective for the farm as of the date of the designation form. Therefore, if you have leases not approved you will need to come back to the FSA office and file the FSA 808 for the lease signings.

Farmers not signing the FSA 808 will be eligible to re-designate pounds and sale locations during the re-designation periods of: October 1-5, 2001, October 29-November 2, 2001, December 3-7, December 28, 2001-January 4, 2002 and January 28-February 1, 2002.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office. This listing shall be available through March 31, 2002.

Beware of Undermarketing

Producers in years past have been eligible to carry forward under marketed pounds to one year. Beginning with the 2001 crop, we are now advising producers to market as much of the effective quota as possible. We also would like to advise producers not to "lay out" tobacco for one year hoping to have a larger quota the next year. Here is our reasoning: Beginning with the 2001 Burley tobacco crop, if you sell less than 100 percent of your effective quota, the amount of quota that can be carried forward to the next crop year will be subject to reduction. Reductions in the

carryover of undermarketings will come in effect when the total burley undermarketings exceed 10 percent of the national basic quota.

REMEMBER-LEASE OR MARKET 100 PERCENT OF THE FARM'S EFFECTIVE QUOTA TO AVOID A POSSIBLE REDUCTION OF POUNDS!

Loans for Socially Disadvantaged Persons

Jeffery J. Hall, State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Kentucky, wishes to remind farmers that funds are reserved each year to make loans to socially disadvantaged applicants to buy and operate family-size farms. A socially disadvantaged farmer is one group whose members have been subject to racial, ethnic, or gender prejudice because of their individual qualities. For the purpose of this program, socially disadvantaged groups have been defined as women, African Americans, American Indians and Alaska Natives, Hispanics and Asians and Pacific Islanders.

Individuals, partnerships, joint operations, and cooperatives primarily and directly engaged in farming on family-size operations may apply

for the loan. A family-size operation is considered to be one that a family can operate and manage itself.

Operating loans may be used for various short and intermediate type credit needs, such as the purchase of livestock and equipment and annual operating expenses. Farm ownership loans may be used for the purchase and/or improvement of farmland and buildings.

Dates to Remember

- CDP (Crop Disaster Program) begin January 18th.
- Enrolling farm in PFC after reconstruction: 30 calendar days after FSA 476 notice.

- Requesting farm reconstruction for non-PFC farms: July 2nd
- Tobacco Leasing: April 2nd through July 2nd.
- Crop Reporting for row crops, hay and pasture by July 2nd.

- Crop Reporting: required for All burley tobacco farms by July 16th.
- Designating payment shares on PFC and meeting signature requirements: August 1st.
- Designating Burley Tobacco Warehouse for Marketing: July 1st through August 1st.

Jan was an otherwise healthy twenty-six year old who had recently married her longtime boyfriend. She reported that the marriage was wonderful and that she was very happy. "We've had a few adjustments to make, but it's been very good." Her panic attacks had begun a couple of weeks before the wedding.

"The first one surprised me more than anything," she said. "My chest got tight and I had trouble breathing. It quickly went away and I thought nothing about it. Then about a week later it happened again."

"I went to the doctor after the second one," she continued. "and had a complete physical. She said I was in great shape. When the attacks continued, I went to another doctor who told me the very same thing. They have done EKGs, stress tests and everything else under the sun, and it all comes back normal. But something is very wrong!"

"What's wrong Jan is that you are having panic attacks," I told her. She looked stunned. "That's what my doctor told me," she said, "but I'm not crazy. These attacks are real!" "They are very real," I agreed. "This doesn't mean you are crazy, and there are some things you can do to help." "Why me? Why now?" she

wanted to know. "My life is going so well."

"Has anyone else in your family ever had these attacks?" I asked. "Now that you mention it, Mom told me she used to have something like this when she was younger," Jan remembered. "She said it was awful." The tendency to have panic attacks does seem to run in certain families," I told Jan. "Add to that family history the stress of getting married and then there is a panic attack."

Jan and I did several things to help her fight the attacks. It was hard work and she occasionally wanted to give up. Jan learned how to breathe slowly and deeply and help herself relax. She learned to distract her mind when the attacks began. (She counted backward from 100 by threes. Try it sometime.) She reluctantly agreed to take some medication that her doctor had prescribed. It was an antidepressant that often helps in cases of panic attack.

After several months Jan was much better. The attacks still came, but not as often and not as forcefully. "I'm finally getting help," she said. "This was one battle I could not fight by myself."

"My doctor says there is nothing physically wrong with me," Jan told me, "but I'm afraid I'm going to die!" Obviously distressed Jan had come to her first counseling session in a desperate mood. (All characters are fictitious.)

"It happens almost every day now," she continued. "I get knots in my chest and stomach. My chest gets so tight I almost can't breathe. My heart beats faster and I begin to perspire."

"How long has this been going on?" I asked Jan. "Too long!" she told me emphatically. "It began about six months ago and keeps getting worse."

"I'm almost afraid to go into a store anymore," Jan continued. "My husband has to do all the grocery shopping. When I go into a store, I feel as if the walls are closing in on me. It's embarrassing to have to run out the door and leave a full grocery cart in the checkout line. I'm getting so I don't want to go anywhere."

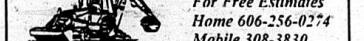


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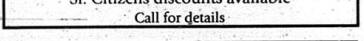

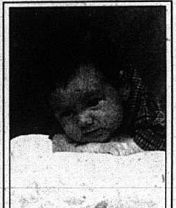
