## Coffey chosen as new principal at middle school

Saturday the Rockcastle County Middle School Site Based Council selected a new principal.  
By a vote of 3-1, the council selected Anthony Coffey, over the two other applicants, Tammy Miller and Jason Coguer.  
Coffey will replace John Hale, who is the new principal at the Rockcastle County High School. Hale replaced Ruth Allen-Hamilton, who retired on June 30.  
Coffey, 32, taught in the Rockcastle school system for seven years, he was the principal at Shopville Elementary School for one year and last school year he was director of the middle school's 21st Century Learning Center.  
But Mrs. Terry Parkey, a teacher at the middle school and chairperson of the selection process, said Tuesday that she had sent a copy of the site based council's policy on hiring a principal to the state department.  
Charles Edwards, who is Director of School Based Decision Making Councils at the state department, said that he had talked with Mrs. Parkey about the school's by-laws.  
Edwards said that he told Mrs. Parkey what the council's options were, but Mrs. Parkey said that Edwards actually made a ruling in the case and that the council was "bound by his decision."  
Edwards said that he never saw a copy of the middle school's by-laws, but Mrs. Parkey said that she e-mailed him a copy of the school's policy on hiring a new principal.  
Mrs. Parkey also provided the Signal with a copy of the council's policies, which included a paragraph stating that "if unanimous agreement cannot be attained, consensus has been reached when only one member of the council cannot agree to the proposed action."  
Edwards said that if a council has a quorum, which is a majority of the members, then it was his opinion that all policies would apply, such as a 3-1 majority in hiring a principal.  
Saturday was the final day in office for the 2000-2001 council at the middle school.  
If the council could not have reached a decision, the task would have fallen to the new council, which took office on July 1.  
None of the current teacher members, Mrs. Parkey, Charlotte Bullock or Mrs. Miller were re-elected to the council last Spring.  
Parent member Ray Hensley is the only member of the old council, who remained on the new council.  
Mrs. Brenda Cline, who voted for Mrs. Miller on Saturday, did not seek

The Signal was informed last week by a central office employee that according to the school's by-laws the vote to hire a principal had to be 4-0, because Mrs. Miller was a member of the council, but of course she could take no part because she was also an applicant for the job.

## Court applies for grant for shelter

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court cleaned up some unfinished business during a special called meeting on Thursday.  
The main item of business was the final reading of the county's \$6.5 million budget for the coming year, but the court took several other actions.  
It was also the first year in several that the county has a positive balance in each of their sixteen accounts.  
The court voted to apply for a \$65,000 state grant, which would be used to help them finish an animal shelter at Roundstone.  
The court is the new owner of the building and property that had once been owned by the Rockcastle Adoption Agency for Pets.  
The court reached agreement earlier this year to assume ownership of the property and to finish construction on the project.  
The court plans to use county employees and work release prisoners to help in the construction of the facility and to use work release prisoners to help operate it, once it is completed.  
Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carolifus said the court should know in about six weeks if the grant application has been approved by the state's department of agriculture.  
The state has set aside \$500,000 for animal shelters in the year 2002.  
A six member board will decide who gets approved for the grants.  
The court agreed to employ Don Coyle, as the new solid waste coordinator, who will take the job on a three month trial basis at his request.  
The court also laid off former Solid Waste Coordinator and Work Release supervisor Scoty Berryman.  
The court also hired Bobby Bishop, Jr., owner of Bishop Tire as

the new Director of the county's Emergency Management Agency.  
The director of EMA is a part-time position, which will pay \$10,000 a year, including benefits.  
The court also agreed to hire James Renner, former owner of Renner Garbage Service as Work Release Supervisor.

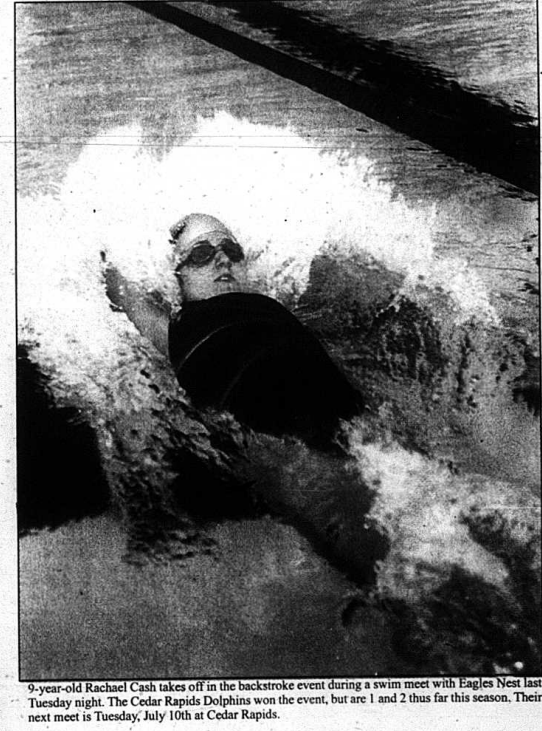
## Two held on \$50,000 cash bond in drug case

Two Rockcastle County men are being held in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$50,000 cash bond each, after both were charged with manufacturing methamphetamine, (Meth).  
The charges came on June 25, after Mt. Vernon police officer Barry Adams stopped a vehicle operated by Shawn Davidson, 21, of Rt. 1, Mt. Vernon.  
According to police reports, Davidson was wanted on outstanding warrants when Adams spotted him driving his Chevrolet on Hwy. 461.  
Davidson and his passenger, Phillip Falin, 26, of Orlando, were both charged with manufacturing meth in the first degree.  
Davidson was also charged with operating a motor vehicle on a suspended license.  
Davidson will appear in court on July 7. Falin is scheduled to appear on August 20.  
Falin, who is currently on parole, pled guilty in August of 1997 to setting fire to officer Adams' vehicle on January 6, 1997.  
Falin was sentenced to five years in prison on August 27th of 97, but has since been released on parole.  
Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette said he asked for such high bonds in the case, because of the seriousness of manufacturing meth.  
"It is becoming a growing problem in our county and we must do something to try and deter its manufacturing and use," he said.

Rockcastle is eligible for the grant

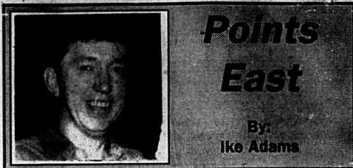
## Cedar Rapids beats Eagles Nest

I just got back from the grocery store where they had pig tails and feet for sale at over 2 bucks a pound. I was afraid to pick up a pack of pork chops because I might damage them, in which case I would have had to take out a second mortgage on my house or pay for them in installments.

If they'd had the squeal I still wouldn't have been able to afford it. T-bone steaks were priced anywhere from \$10 to \$14 each. By contrast, a handsome new Tuxedo watch with a genuine silver-cased, wrist-to-flex band guaranteed to run three years before it needed a battery change was \$8.99 at the jewelry and small good counter.

Amazingly, if I wanted a watch or a bottle of cologne I had to call a clerk over to unlock the shatter proof glass cabinet they were stored in. They have the chops and steaks lying right out in the open. Seems to me that the store's priorities need some re-examination.

Any day now I expect a guy in a trench coat to motion me over in the parking lot and offer me a deal. "Take a look at these babies pal," he'll mumble and when he opens his coat some choice rib-eyes, t-bones and filets will be dangling from the lining. "Your choice for ten bucks," he'll say with a whisper.

"I'll give you 20 for three," I will reply and the clandestine act will be completed even though I know that he has a couple of ner-do-well high school drop outs lifting his stock in trade from the meat case at Winn Davis.

My nightmares even involve meat these days. Over the week end I dreamed that I was grilling out and that I had my big ribeye cooked just the way I like it. It was not saying moo and had no detectable pulse.

Just as I lifted it off the coals the neighbor's big yellow Labrador Retriever came tearing round the corner of the house, snatched it from the tongue, and high tailed it across the back pasture. I awoke trembling and in a cold sweat.

Since then I've tacked a note on the refrigerator door to remind myself to call my neighbor and make sure the dog is fed securely the next time I load out. I'm still going to have a cooked shotgun handy just in case.

In the meantime I'm feasting on deer steak. Don't yell at me Fred, I spelled it correctly. Dear old biology.

I was telling a friend on the Internet over the weekend that when I was growing up my Mom would order white leghorn cockerel chicks a hundred at a time from some mail order place every two weeks from about the first of February until the end of May.

Now, back to reality and what has been happening to my life. A phone call from Rodney last week wasn't the simple, greetings and "How are you" his first question alerted me to more than that, it was, "Do you have plans for this weekend? If not, Helen and I have found a break in our schedules and want to spend time with you. Of course, I didn't have plans for the weekend any more than I have plans for all the others. I could go into all the reasons I have practically quit cooking since my incidence with the overheated oil, fire in the kitchen and smoke everywhere, but you have already heard that story, so I will have to confess to the frailest of "oldage" keeps the hen in the barn yard, dumplings unmade, apples unpeeled for a cobbler, and all other chores it takes to prepare a meal like I did when the kids came home from college or to show off the new babies. Time does go on and adult grandchildren bring reality to white hair, arthritic aches, and stumbling feet. But an adult child coming home is just as exciting as if he was coming home for a weekend from college. Lola and I had developed a very close relationship when we were younger so when she took sick until death she asked me to stay with her till it was over. I did. She left me the legacy of love from her two grown sons and I tried to fill the void she left in their lives with my love for them. We are still enjoying that relationship, when I hear a voice I recognize as that of Jimmy or Jerry I feel as if one of my grandsons has come home. Each one are grandparents now. Today, I haven't purposely ignored their wives, Jimmy's Marilyn and Jerry's Janice, for I love them both, but today was their husband's day.

A lot of clients have died from there and they go down to four clients. I would be glad to sign up to make five so they could stay at Brodhead.

Whoever voted to move them to Mt. Vernon, I don't like you very much. We had fun out there. I don't go to many places, but I always enjoyed being out there. If I was sad, they brightened up my day.

Whoever voted to move them, I hope you're satisfied. How would you like to be uprooted from your center and moved into a crowded place. I will miss them terribly.

## The Family Room

### Where Is The News We Really Want to Hear?

A recent news release reported that eating large quantities of broccoli and cauliflower helps to prevent prostate cancer. The report stated that men who took twenty-eight servings per week of these vegetables decreased their risk of this common cancer.

Ho-hum. I doubt that many men are rushing to the produce aisle, frantically searching for more broccoli and cauliflower. I doubt few of us are grilling broccoli and cauliflower instead of steak and hamburgers.

Nutritional news is almost always the same: FOOD THAT TASTES HORRIBLE WILL PREVENT CANCER (OR PMS OR HEART DISEASE OR WHATEVER). Where are the nutritional break-

throughs that we would really like to see? Where is the food news that would make us jump for joy? Scientists of the world, pay attention! Here are the news reports we want to see in the future.

A new study by scientists at the prestigious Moo Institute proves conclusively that ice cream prevents all types of cancer. The lead researcher, Arnold Mootoni explained, "The more ice cream you eat, the less the chance you have of developing cancer. ### What Is Normal?

"Is it normal to be angry?" Yes, anger is a normal human emotion. Everyone gets angry at times. If this seems unbelievable to you, consider how you would react if someone attempted to harm one of your children. More than likely you would be angry, a very normal response.

"Is it normal for couples to fight?" The answer to this question depends on what is meant by "fight?" All couples have disagreements and tense times. This is normal. Two people cannot live together and always be in harmony. Not all couples however fight physically. Nor do all couples verbally cut each other to shreds with angry words and accusations. That is not normal.

"Is it normal to cry?" Yes, God gave you the ability to cry so that you might rid yourself of painful emotions. Grieving sadness and loss are best expressed with tears. Tears help to wash away the pain that you feel inside. What is not normal is the absence of tears in very sad situations.

When you go for a month after the death of a loved one and shed not one

tear, something is not going right. "Is it normal to talk to myself?" "Is it normal to answer myself?" Yes and yes. Talking to yourself does not make you crazy. Talking to yourself

and from women who are victims of domestic violence. Yes, it is normal to think about hurting the one who hurt you, but it is not normal to act on those thoughts. While it may be OK to think about revenge, actually hurting someone only puts you on their level. As the victim works through the feelings of being abused, the desire for revenge usually goes away.

"Is it normal to want to be happy?" This may seem a strange question to some, but I have been asked. It is often accompanied by the comment, "Maybe I should just be satisfied with my unhappy life." Yes, it is normal to want to be happy. No one need feel condemned to misery.

Richard Petty won his 200th NASCAR Winston Cup race at Daytona International Speedway on July 4, 1984. There have been four caution-free NASCAR Winston Cup races at Daytona: the 1959 Daytona 500, the 1960 Firecracker 250, the 1961 Daytona 500 and the 1962 Daytona 500.

## Good and fast pit crew members needed

Brian Ferry is the pit crew coach and Jimman on the No. 92 Kodak Dodge Intrepid RT with driver Stacy Compton. The 30-year-old native of Madison Heights, MI has been with Melling Racing for a year and works as a shop mechanic during the week. He also works with the pit crew three times a week on pit stops and conditioning and has resorted to some creative methods to find potential pit crew members.

Some teams have changed as many crew members as engines this season. An experienced over-the-wall crew member's stock has risen faster than an over-the-counter IPO. The single-car teams, a vanishing breed on the NASCAR Winston Cup circuit, have found it tough to compete with the bigger outfits for experienced crewmen. Ferry talks about competing with multi-car teams and how difficult it is to find and keep quality pit crewmembers.

"Most of the good guys who have been working on pit crews for four or five years have gone with the big teams like Gibbs and Yates' and Hendrick.

Some of those guys are really good, and make I'd say between \$700-\$1,200 on Sundays. They're guaranteed that kind of money if their car makes a lap or not. If they get off the plane and their car doesn't complete the first lap, they still get paid. Quality pit crew guys can make good money. A Busch team has paid me \$500 just to be the jackman on their car. Most of the pit crew guys are weekend warriors, but some of them work at the shop full-time, too.

"The ones who don't work at the

shop usually have good, secure full-time jobs. We put a wand ad in (NASCAR) Winston Cup Scene for pit crew guys. I went around to fire departments and police departments looking for guys who were doing what they wanted to do during the week but wouldn't mind making a few extra bucks and having some fun at the same time on weekends. I'd say 90 percent of the policemen and firemen like what they're doing, and you know they're going to be in fairly good shape.

"Some of them came out and watched our pit practice, but so far none has wanted to pursue it. Most of them say they're glad they came out and saw what it was all about, and then they say, 'thanks, but no thanks.'

"A person has to have a high desire to win to work on a pit crew. We've probably been through eight or 10 changes on our pit crew this year, but I think we've finally got it where it needs to be. Chad (crew chief Knuts) has been changing front tires the most couple of races, and that's not what he should be doing, even though he's really good at it. He used to be one of the Rainbow Warriors, and he's a great tire changer. He's got pit crew championship rings, but he needs to stay on the wall and see who is and who isn't pitting. He needs to be up on the box overseeing everything that's going on.

We're going to have Shane Westenberg back at Daytona to change the front tires. He's been off a couple of weeks, but he's coming back and hopefully we'll be able to leave everything intact for the rest of the season.

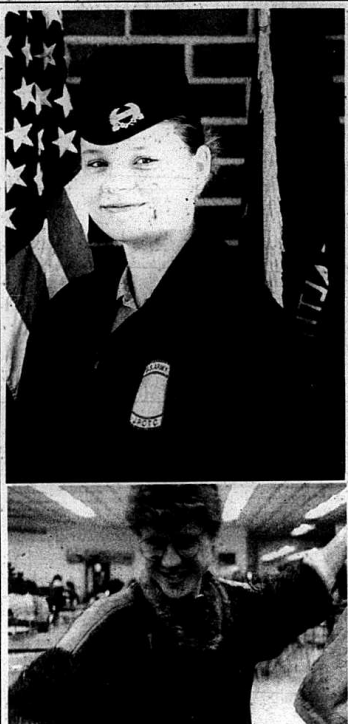

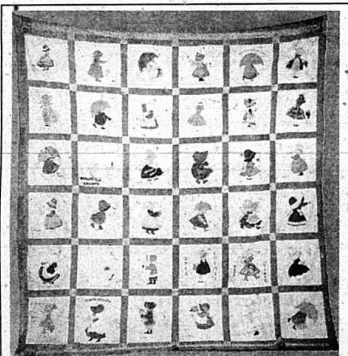

because it is considered one of the 33 economically distressed counties in the state.

"We will use that money to develop a professional long range development plan with the help of a third party independent facilitator," Towery said.

The grant application and the subsequent long range plan are the result of a two day visit from a team of economic development specialists from the state's economic development cabinet, which visited the county on February 12 and 13.

"The Cabinet selected Rockcastle County for an assessment team visit in an effort to help citizens of the county continue the progress the county has made in trying to attract new industry and more jobs to the county," Towery said.

Prior to the visit in February, the Assessment Team sent surveys to local leaders in an effort to get their views on a range of topics important to effective economic development.

Towery presented the findings of the assessment team to a group of local citizens during a special meeting of the Development Board on June 25.

The meeting was sponsored by the Renfro Valley Entertainment Center.

Ed Morrison, an international economic development consultant, facilitated the two day visit by the assessment team February.

Towery said that the assessment team listed the top three assets the county has for attracting new industry and they also listed the top three liabilities the county has to overcome.

Towery said the assessment team pointed out the fact that Rockcastle County did not have a three year strategic plan for economic growth.

They also found in their assessment of the county that there is a limited leadership base when it comes to attracting new industry and that more young leaders need to get involved in the process.

The team also found Rockcastle's agencies who are involved with economic development to be too fragmented in their efforts.

Towery said that the development of the strategic plan would correct that problem by bringing leaders together when developing the plan, but he admitted that attracting new young leaders has been difficult.

As for the county's assets, the assessment team pointed out the Rockcastle Hospital, the Rockcastle County Technology Center and the Rockcastle County School system.

Towery said that the assessment team concluded that Rockcastle County has enormous undeveloped potential and a solid foundation on which to build.

"We must develop a long range plan that will help us to attract good high paying jobs to the county - a solid plan will make sure that everyone is on the same page and the Cabinet for Economic Development in Frankfort seems ready and willing to help in any way," Towery said.

Towery said that it should take six to ten months to develop a plan.
