Becky Smith giving Uncle gift of life-insurance company not so generous

How much is one man's life worth? The insurance carrier for Donnie Warf, says it is only worth \$10,000 to them.

Warf, 51, a former Rockcastle County resident and Mt. Vernon High School graduate is suffering from cirrhosis of the liver, due to contracting hepatitis C sometime in the '70s when he worked as a lab technician for the United States Military.

Warf's insurance will not cover all of the costs for an expensive rare surgery that will allow his niece, Becky Smith of Brodhead, to donate a lobe of her liver to him.

The problem is that Becky's insurance will not pay for any of the expenses connected with the surgery

and her uncle's insurance company has said it will only pay \$10,000 of her expenses. The cost of the surgery could exceed \$70,000.

Mrs. Smith is an eighth grade teacher at the Rockcastle County Middle School and she is assistant girls' basketball coach at Rockcastle County High School.

Her father, Ronnie Warf, and her Uncle Donnie are twin brothers.

Donnie also has a sister, Jane Jones, and another niece Janelle Jones, who is a member of the Rockcastle County High School Dance Team.

The dance team will hold a benefit yard sale on August 4 and a benefit car wash on August 11 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Wendy's Restaurant

in Mt. Vernon.

"I just thought, if I could help in any way . . . your family, you just help them," Smith said.

"Becky's sort of our angel," Warf said. "She comes bearing the gift of life," he said.

When Warf, his wife Irene, and their two sons, first learned of Smith's intentions, Warf told her to think it over.

"My first response to her was, 'Oh, Becky, you don't have to do that. This is not small thing you're doing,' Warf said.

"He never asked," Smith said. "He's been overwhelmed by it, I believe," Smith said.

Accepting Smith's gift will alleviate waiting for a cadaver organ

donation - a process that can take months or years.

While Warf is class three on the organ donation list - the least severe - he said his condition would continue to deteriorate if he had to wait for an organ donation.

"People need to be aware of how many people are waiting for organs," Warf said.

Every day, 15 people die waiting, while another 60 are saved through transplants.

Nearly 18,000 people need liver transplants. In total about 80,000 people are awaiting some kind of transplant.

While Warf is fortunate to have a family member who can help him,

Rogers recognizes Roundstone School on House Floor

U.S. Representative Harold Rogers of Somerset recognized the accomplishments of Roundstone Elementary School during remarks on the House Floor last month.

Rogers particularly pointed to Roundstone's award as a Title I Distinquished School" by the U.S. Department of Education and the National Association of State Title I Directors.

Rogers saluted the students, teachers, parents and administrators at Roundstone for their achievement. It was the first time a county school had been recognized on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives.

"At Roundstone, a small elementary school in rural southeastern Kentucky, the students are achieving results and exceeding expectation," Rogers said.

"This is a result not only of the students' hard work, but the dedica-

tion of their teachers. They realized that the first step toward success was creating an environment in which all students, no matter their ability, can effectively learn.

Second, they have designed a curriculum in which students are encouraged to learn and think critically, to delve into science and mathematical problems, and to write creatively. Lastly, the parents of the students are involved throughout the process. It is critically important that parents have proper consultation on their children's curriculum, and the parents at Roundstone have been integral to the program's success."

Rogers says the achievement is particularly important for Roundstone, at a time when Americans are seeking results and accountability in their schools. He told his House colleagues that Roundstone has proven it can serve as a model for

Ten local indictments returned Friday

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down ten indictments on Friday - including one against a local man accused of raping his wife.

Clayton Cox, 26, of Rt. 1, Orlando, was indicted on three counts in connection with a May 6th incident in which police reportedly found a Methamphetamine Lab at his residence.

Cox's wife Halona, also filed a complaint of rape against her husband.

Cox is being held in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$75,000 bond. He will appear in Court later this month.

Lloyd Adkins, 64, of Hwy. 21, Berea, was indicted on five counts in connection with a February 9th break-

in at Carter's Laundromat in Mt. Vernon.

He is accused of damaging property in excess of \$1,000 and having a burglary tool in his possession when he was arrested.

His bond was set at \$10,000. Gerald Dean McGuire, 56, of U.S. 421, was indicted on five counts of rape, five counts of sexual abuse in the first degree and five counts of sodomy.

He is accused of engaging in sexual intercourse with a minor girl under the age of twelve for a nine year period from 1980 to 1989.

McGuire has not been arrested.

Troy Reed, 25, of Mt. Vernon, was indicted on one count of trafficking in a controlled substance by having Oxycodone in his possession on

May 10th.

Delbert Mullins, 33, of Rt. 2, Mt. Vernon was indicted on one count of possession of Methamphetamine, while in possession of a handgun. The incident allegedly occurred on May 10, 2001.

Mark Anthony Miller, 40, of Cox Lane Mt. Vernon, was indicted on one count of possession of a handgun by a convicted felon.

Bobby Caldwell, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on one count of cultivating marijuana. He is accused of growing more than five marijuana plants on April 26th.

George W. Bradley, 24, of Meife Road, Mt. Vernon was also indicted on one count of cultivating mari-

juana over five plants on June 14th.

Byron D. Cole, 27, of Livingston was indicted on one count of trafficking in Methamphetamine on May 4th.

John L. Fain, 29, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on one count of being a persistent felony offender.

State identifies insecticide

State officials still do not know how it got there, but they have identified an insecticide, which is responsible for the deaths of several animals in the Mullins Station area of the county.

State inspector Bill Belcher said the insecticide with the trade name of Furadan was found in tested samples near the dead animals in the "Sinks" of Roundstone Creek.

Last week local officials were notified as to a possible contamination in Roundstone Creek, by two Berea women who were walking a

dog in the creek bed.

The dog apparently drank from a small pool of water in the creek and died.

Local officials found several other dead animals in the general area around the pool.

Belcher said that Furadan is an extremely powerful insecticide whose toxic properties can be passed from the carcass of one animal to another on three to four succession.

Belcher said that someone may have used the insecticide to bait coyotes in the area, but that was only a

theory.

An unidentified barrel that was located on railroad property near the site has not been determined to be the cause of the chemical violation, according to Belcher.

Belcher also said that state officials were sure that ground water in the area had not been contaminated and that all well water in the area was safe to drink.

County employees used a backhoe to bury all of the dead animals, which were located in the area.

Berea Funeral Director Drowns in Grayson Lake

Berea Funeral Home Owner, David Williams, 45, apparently drowned in Grayson Lake on Sunday night.

According to the Carter County Coroner's office Williams was pronounced dead at midnight.

Major David Casey of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife said the department is investigating the drowning and a complete report will be available pending autopsy and other results.

Casey said that life jackets were in the board but Williams was not wearing one at the time of the accident.

Williams owned and operated Williams Funeral Home in Berea and Carter County Funeral Home in Olive Hill.

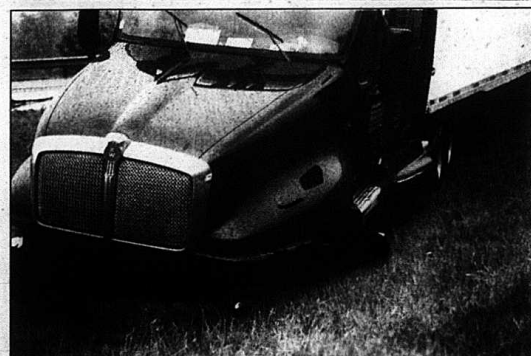
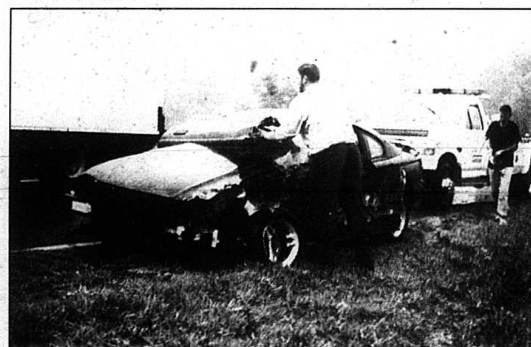

Dear Editor:

I am writing this letter concerning Parkes Seal's closing of the Berea Plant.

I have worked at Parker Seal since June 14, 1966 (35 years). On May 4, 2001, General Manager Kurt Keller announced the Plant would be closing as of September 30, 2001.

The reason he gave was, the economy is bad, the Plant is old, and they have bought some other companies that can handle the work that we have. He did not mention that even though they have cut us down to less

than one hundred employees, the Plant is still making money.

I would say that over the years the Berea Plant has produced a good portion of the money to expand and buy other companies.

But, now the employees have reached the average age of 55, and most have worked 30 years or more. Their benefits are costing more than the new companies they have bought.

It seems we have helped them to make money, but now they don't want to share their profit with us. The inducement pay they are going to give us is a joke! The average is about \$3,800, per employee before taxes.

We can buy COBRA for 18 months. That would put some of us at the age where no one will insure us. And if they would we couldn't afford it.

If I buy the COBRA, when it stops I will be without insurance for almost 4 years before I can get Medicare.

In 1988, the company tried to reword the Union, but failed. The word was, they would get us. So the Berea employees feel the reason for closing is age and Union.

The Plant may be 50 years old, but it is in better shape now than it ever was.

In 1996, when the Tornado almost wiped us out, Bo Bullock and the employees went to work and cleaned up and kept on making O-Rings at a profit. Bo rebuilt the place like new.

That says a lot for the employees working together to make it work. We have a new Banbury, a new Mill-on Work Cell and a new Ryker Room, and lots of room for other machines. We are prepared to make O-Rings and make a profit. So the old building couldn't be the reason.

One paper stated that we made the O-Ring in the shuttle that blew up. That has nothing to do with the closing. Parker wasn't held responsible for it.

The city of Berea and the businesses in Berea should try to help keep this plant here. It will be a great loss for them when it is closed.

I don't think Parker's Board of Directors realize the experience they will be losing, and how many "Help Jobs" we do for the other plants. This move will hurt the company more than they realize.

We often forgot to recognize the importance of men and women who volunteer for emergency services that benefit our communities. We on the fiscal court recognize the value of these fire departments and records show that we have greatly increased the funding from the County given to the departments over the past several years. While we recognize the importance of the departments and admire the selfless volunteerism for our communities, we also realize the funding we provide is really not adequate to meet all the needs of the local departments. Because the state directs so much of our County's funding, we have severe limitations on how much we can support our local departments.

I was very surprised to read that the County had provided no assistance, however, in the Mullins Station Road chemical incident. After all, I personally directed Bonnie Roark, the CSEPP director at that time for Rockcastle County and my employee, to respond to the concern. The County and this office responded within three minutes after having received the call.

The County had a presence on site 24 hours a day, Bonnie Roark was the paid County employee on duty who had received state training for just such incidents. I was surprised, therefore, when Sam Stallsworth wrote in his letter that the County had provided no assistance. Bonnie Roark was the representative for the County on site, and as such, was the person in charge. I agree that she is a valuable person. I would not have hired her for this important job had I thought otherwise.

I am pleased with our County's response to this incident and am very proud of the volunteer firemen and others who gave their time without compensation. I was also pleased with the County employee's commitment during the emergency.

Tobacco blooms in June

Gary Palmer, Extension Tobacco Specialist with the University of Kentucky, reports that tobacco around the State is blooming early with two separate situations. The first is premature bloom with no usable leaves on plants that are ready to bloom. There are many ideas why tobacco might be prone to bloom prematurely. One thought is that the plant is old enough to bloom. For example if it has been in the float system for a long time, it may be time for it to bloom. This is an incorrect assessment of the situation. I like to use the story of Raymond Thompson, County Extension Agent for Russell Co. He started some tobacco seeds in December as a trial run to the normal seeded season the first year that he experimented with float plants. Raymond called me in May and described the plants as yellowed, and certainly old and wondered what would happen if he set these plants. I told him that they would do fine, but asked if he had others that were at the ideal stage to plant and he said yes. I asked him to transplant both sets of plants and to observe the response. He commented later that in bloom but he could not tell old plants from new plants. When tobacco is transplanted to some extent the clock is reset.

From extensive research by Dr. Kasperbauer in the late 60's and early 70's we know that light and temperature has an important role in early flowering. When conditions in a plant bed mimic those of fall approaching, plants are programmed to set a floral bud. Cool, overcast weather in April and May certainly meet these conditions and induced plants to bloom early. In fact, Kasperbauer's work be determined that larger plants were more likely to be induced. However, in float systems plants may be fairly uniform in size and could potentially have a higher percentage of plants induced to bloom.

In the past percentages in fields have been low, certainly within the 10% range, with higher percentages seen in dark tobacco types. A few cases of 30 to 40% bloom have been reported where producers want to see seedmen for getting off-types mixed in with regular seeds. This is not the case, although plants do look abnormal due to the floral induction and it effects on leaf development. Plants will be strappy and will fall to produce any normal leaves. Once

plants have been induced to bloom, what can be done to correct the problem? The answer is nothing. There are many "home remedy" type solutions out there. However, most could not correct the problem. A common one is to plow deep and close the plants, "turn them on the hill". While I can see why people thought this way, it does not help. Since usually only a percentage of the plants are induced to bloom, no more plants will bloom after "turning plants on the hill". However, no more would bloom anyway. Producers may think that the bloom is a progressive thing that will continue to develop, but, even prior to bloom, all plants that have been induced to bloom can be easily detected by their strange growth habits.

There are other stories where crops that were showing premature blooms were cut off to one sucker and produced a 3600 lbs/crop. I don't believe that this ever happen either. A producer who did this on a half-damaged crop indicated a more normal response. He recalls a yield of approximately 2100 lbs which is much more believable. Prior research has indicated a 600 to 800 lbs/crop reduction in yield from a sucker crop. Cutting the plants off may not improve those that have abnormal growth pattern and a cut off plant may not develop a single dominant sucker, but sucker wildly with multiple suckers.

A second pattern that has already developed in some fields, especially in KY14 X L8 is early blooming. These plants will have normal leaf development, but leaf numbers are low. These plants may top out at 14 or fewer leaves and the crop may be extremely irregular in bloom. Cool, wet soils early may have contributed by reducing availability of phosphorus for plant uptake. The result is shortened internodes or distances between leaves. The first several leaves will be clustered at the bottom and will never make it to the barn. This makes the plant appear much shorter and reduces usable leaf numbers. However, cool, overcast conditions in May may have induced blooms earlier than normal, but not as drastic as that of premature blooming plants. Topping and suckering will be more difficult in such an irregular crop. Early blooming plants can be topped and treated with a fatty alcohol until the rest of the crop catches up.

Summertime is a great time for serving fresh fruits and vegetables. Both fruits and vegetables are in season and less expensive to purchase. Fruits and vegetables are loaded with Vitamins such as A, E, K, some B vitamins, folate and Vitamin C.

Fresh fruits and vegetables are available at the local farmers markets. The Farmers Market is at the Broadhead Fairgrounds on Wednesday mornings and at the Renfro Valley field on Saturday mornings. WIC recipients can use their fresh fruit and vegetables vouchers at the Farmers Market.

Fruit and vegetable salads are an excellent way to use these foods and add interest to a meal. Here is an Oriental Salad recipe that will feed the whole family. Diabetics may use a sugar substitute instead of the sugar in this recipe. If you would like a free leaflet of other fruit and vegetable salads, call the Extension Office at 256-2403.

ORIENTAL SALAD
1 (16 oz) pkg of pre-cut beef stew 2 packs of Ramen Noodles (beef flavor)
1 bunch of green onions
1 head of broccoli
Sunflower seeds, optional
Combine cold slaw mix, chopped onions, broccoli, and sunflower seeds. Crush Ramen noodles but don't cook them. Add them to the salad about 10-20 minutes before serving with the dressing.
DRESSING:
Flavor packets from Ramen noodles
1/2 cup sugar
1/3 cup vinegar

2/3 cup vegetable oil
Combine sugar and seasoning packets. Add oil and vinegar. Mix well and stir into salad.

Non-Insurable Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP)
Authority for NAP is the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996 as amended by the Agricultural Risk Protection Act, 2000.

NAP was designed to reduce financial losses that occur when natural disasters cause a catastrophic loss of production or prevented planting of an eligible crop by providing coverage equivalent to CAT insurance. A limited number of crops are eligible for crop or agricultural commodity, except livestock, for which CAT is not available and is produced for food or fiber. Thus, NAP excludes corn and tobacco.

Producers who wish to file an application for coverage are required to pay a \$100 service fee per crop or an amount that is the lesser of \$100 per crop or \$500 per producer per county, but not to exceed a total of \$900 per producer. The administrative service fee requirement is waived for limited resource producers. A limited resource producer is a State producer with either of the following: an annual gross income of \$20,000 or less derived from all sources, including income from a spouse or other members of the household, for each of the prior 2 years OR less than 25 acres aggregated for all crops, where a majority of the producer's annual gross income is derived from such farm or farms, but the producer's annual gross income from all farming operations does not exceed \$20,000.

To qualify for assistance under NAP, production losses must be related to a natural disaster that causes catastrophic losses. A natural disaster is damaging weather, adverse natural occurrence, or a related condition which must occur before or during harvest.

Eligible producers must file in the FSA administrative office serving the county or counties where their acreage is located no later than the application closing date. For 2001 crops for which the coverage period could normally have begun before or within 60 calendar days after publication of the regulation in Federal Register (FR), a producer must submit a 2001 crop application and pay the applicable service fee (2) certify the 2001 crop year production for the crop if available.

The Deadline Is Almost Here!!!

New Legislation requires all farms with zero to file an initial designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market their tobacco for FSA 808. The initial designation for the 2001-2002 marketing season will begin June 1, 2001 and end on August 1, 2001. Farmers are required to inform FSA of the warehouse number where they will market their tobacco. Please note the FSA 808 will indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the marketing card, you must return that card to the FSA office and request another marketing card. Remember, the marketing cards are warehouse specific.

Disaster Leasing Eligibility
Burley tobacco regulations list five eligibility conditions for Burley Tobacco Disaster Lease and Transfer (leases filed after July 1st due to a natural disaster). To be eligible the

transforming farm must have: (1) FSA 578, Crop Acreage Report, on file certifying the planted acreage of tobacco for the current year. If the certification was not filed in a timely manner, a late fee will apply. (2) Filing an acreage sufficient to produce the farm's current effective quota. (3) Made reasonable and customary efforts to produce the effective quota during the previous 3 years. In the current year, expected production is less than 80 percent of the farm's effective marketing quota because of a natural disaster. (3) Met all price support eligibility requirements.

Please note item 3 reads "Made reasonable and customary efforts to produce the farm marketing quota." The Kentucky State FSA Committee has recommended the following policy disaster lease and transfer:

If the cause of loss is black shank then the County Committee may: (1) Approve the loss if this is the first year for a loss due to black shank (2) If black shank has been a cause of loss in any of the previous 3 years the loss may be approved if evidence is available to satisfy the County Committee that a no tobacco has been planted in the field (3) where the loss is claimed during the 3 previous crop years. AND B. proper sanitation, chemicals and appropriate varieties have been used to limit black shank losses.

Producers who suffer a burley tobacco disaster loss must file FSA 574 immediately upon determination by the producer that production has been reduced by more than 20 percent in all cases BEFORE THE CROP IS

HARVESTED FROM THE FIELD.
The producer filing the FSA 574 shall provide deposit to cover the cost of the farm visit. The deposit shall be kept by the County Office until after the farm visit and eligibility is determined. The deposit shall be returned to the producer who is determined eligible.

All farms with losses due to black shank will be a mandatory growing season inspection in the following year.

County Committee Election Coming Soon
Coming August 1, 2001 the local FSA office will begin accepting nominations for the upcoming election to be held December 3, 2001. Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. They help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will run. They make FSA agricultural programs fit the needs of local producers.

Nomination forms must be received in the local FSA office by October 29th.

AN OPEN LETTER TO NEIGHBORS AND FRIENDS OF ROCKCASTLE COUNTY:

Recently, I was issued a Notice of Violation for violating Kentucky State Laws regarding the improper handling and disposal of household garbage. Other people in our county and across the state have been caught and fined for the illegal dumping of garbage.

PLEASE BE AWARE OF THE FOLLOWING FACTS:

1. First, all waste items including household garbage, household appliances, tires, automobiles, and automobile parts, construction and demolition debris, or any other item you consider to be garbage, must be disposed at a state permitted facility.
2. You cannot bury household garbage - even on your own property. Placing garbage in a sinkhole or throwing it over an embankment is not only illegal but it contaminates our environment and may cause drinking water for you or your neighbors or pollute creeks and rivers.
3. You cannot burn household trash such as plastics and metals.
4. All household garbage must be disposed at a permitted landfill, a garbage transfer station, or picked up by a garbage collection service.
5. You need to sign up for regular garbage collection from a county-licensed hauler. Keep your receipts so you can show proof if your garbage somehow ends up in an illegal dump.

If you are not currently subscribing to a collection service or have any other general questions about proper garbage disposal, you should contact the Rockcastle County Solid Waste Coordinator, Scott Berryman, at (606) 256-5315.

Be aware if you are caught illegally disposing of your garbage, you can be fined from \$100.00 to \$5,000 dollars and be required to clean up the dump site. If you witness illegal dumping, call toll free 1-888-NODUMPS and report it to state officials.

Please join me in creating a clean and healthy environment for Rockcastle County.

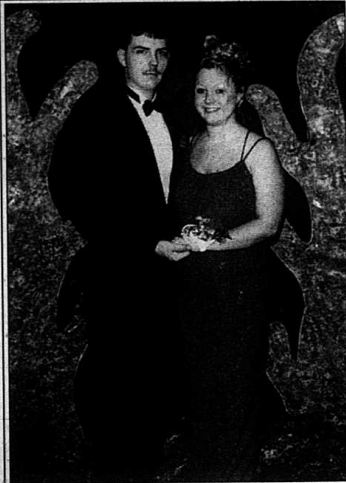

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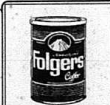

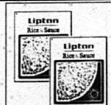

Who Cares Why He Changes?

"I want him to change because he wants to," Norma told her counselor, "not because I want him to." (All characters are fictitious.)

As a counselor who helps couples who have marriage problems, I have heard some form of Norma's statement many times. Diane told me that her husband never brought her little gifts nor even said, "I love you." When I suggested she tell him what she would like for him to do, she objected: "No. If I have to tell him what to do, then it doesn't mean anything if he does it."

Vernon wanted his wife to spend more time with him and the boys. "She works such long hours," he complained, "that she never has time for us." Again when I suggested he ask his wife to set aside one night a week as family night, he didn't want it. "I want her to stay home with us, be-

cause she wants to," he told me, "not just because I ask her to."

When I talked to Vernon's wife, she had no idea that Vernon wanted her to stay home more. She felt that she was balancing work and family very well.

The only way she would know about Vernon's request was the told her.

Gardening & Landscaping Tips

Fieldstone Walks, Terraces, Patios

Occasionally I discover a house with a walk or a terrace/patio made from concrete. Not even built with brick, or gravel, or cobblestones. Stonework is a welcome sight to the eyes. (Concrete is a great material but not the only one).

It is a treat to have the opportunity to build one of these fieldstone paths or patios (walks with flatting areas behind them too).

Rocks can cost two or three hundred dollars a ton if you must buy them. (And what the average garden center stocks may be smaller than desired). But if you have rocky land, or access to construction sites where unwanted rock must be hauled away or buried, fieldstone can be had just for the time collecting them requires.

Big rocks may be too much for the average person. But renting a small skidsteer loader or small backhoe can ease the physical strain.

Small stones need sand or similar material for leveling. (Or concrete if you prefer). Big flat stones weighing over a hundred pounds aren't going to move too much even if placed just on the soil.

Sand or mulch between stones will eliminate most weeds. But some spots will almost beg for a little soil. In those, plant creeping thyme, ajuga, or other low growing perennials that

can tolerate some light foot traffic. The thing about a concrete walk, especially in a well planted yard with lots of blooming flowers, is we tend

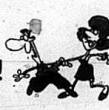

Ratings soar over NASCAR controversy

The Pepsi 400 at Daytona was a winner for NBC, which reported that the race was the highest-rated prime-time NASCAR race in history.

But while the ratings for racing under the lights was a boost for the network, NASCAR has had its share of criticism over controversy about just how legitimate Dale Earnhardt Jr.'s victory was.

NBC officials covered NASCAR events since 1993, it is difficult for me to believe this race could have been "fixed" in any manner. With the points leadership at stake, it simply does not make sense that drivers and owners would allow any driver to win in order to create the most interest and emotion possible.

However, I do think NASCAR should be more careful about the impression they leave when some of its races and scenarios are staged for the benefit of television.

Last week, the Dallas Morning News reported that NBC officials met with team publicists prior to the Pepsi 400, and asked them to relay the message to their driver "to have the winning driver show plenty of emotion in Victory Lane."

NBC officials also attended a drivers' meeting on Friday and told the drivers to remove their helmets if they finished in the top-five so they could be interviewed with a full view of their face, which they hoped would include a smile.

All this does suggest that NASCAR racing is getting to be as

much about sports exhibition as it is sports competition.

I think NASCAR should take steps to limit just how much control and direction television should have in influencing drivers.

Television is paying big bucks to televise NASCAR events. Reportedly, they are working on a \$2.8 billion contract and people will see a lot of principles for that kind of money.

Dale Earnhardt Jr. said he felt confident going into the race, partly because he knew his team had worked hard and partly because of things he'd learned from watching his father race in restrictor-plate events at Daytona and Talladega.

"I learned a lot from him," Earnhardt Jr. said. "I always kind of got toward the front and then it was always him who was the one pulling the tricks on me that made me fall back... I was always worried about where he was."

"Without him in the race this past weekend, I felt invincible. I had everything that he had, knowledge and confidence, what he had and what he took to those races he had. I just felt like I couldn't be touched."

Earnhardt Jr. said the crowd's initial reaction Saturday night as he pulled into the infield grass at Daytona let him know just how big his victory was.

"It was just an awesome feeling to be that close to the race fans," he said. "When you're in Victory Circle you're disconnected from all of that... To get out there in front of the fans, they tell you just exactly how important that race was."

"No matter what controversy or questions you have, that initial reaction is... one I will always be able to take with me. Those people knew then and there it was real and that it was genuine. I feel like I will always have that."

To date, Soccer is the team sport with the largest registration with 354 teams representing 6,372 players. Softball is the second largest team sport with 314 teams or 5,024 team players.

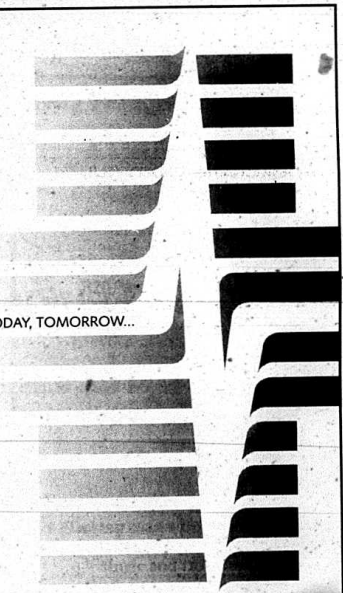
Other team sports and their registrations so far are: Basketball, 89 teams; Tee-ball, 38 teams and Volleyball, 36 teams.

Times Square church meets Appalachia

Members of the Times Square Church came from far reaches—from Kenya to Puerto Rico, Trinidad to Tobago, Barcelona to Brooklyn. No matter what part of the globe they originate from, they have one thing in common—the desire to serve God.

While driving 16 hours to Mt. Vernon and to the hollows of Eastern Kentucky, members of this non-denominational church of 103 nationalities, which is based in the center of Times Square in New York City, prepared themselves to work with Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) volunteers and employees in constructing the first new home for a CAP Housing Program participant in Rockcastle County. This project was made possible by the partnership between Daniel Boone Development, who provided materials, and CAP, who provided labor.

“One of the most interesting revelations about this project has been learning the importance of standards, rulers, and measurements, and how you must follow guidelines in order for the foundation to set straight and the construction to be stable. It’s also like that with faith—you must stay in the boundaries, follow the rules, and remain in the borders of Biblical teaching,” commented Gary Shaboy, construction worker.

This group of multi-lingual, multi-cultural New Yorkers set up camp with the Faith Harvest Fellowship in Mt. Vernon, a relatively new church that opened their arms to a band of eager servants.

During their stay with CAP and Faith Harvest Fellowship, the members of the Times Square Church collaborated with Faith Harvest Fellowship in their Wednesday night church service. Combining their talents, the group celebrated the time of fellowship with dinner, a puppet show, and skits.

Faith Harvest Fellowship is led by Rev. Mike Bryant, a former social worker and police officer. Bryant founded the church on the basis of serving the downtrodden, overlooked, indigent, and forgotten. His ministry serves various areas of the community and includes the following: prison outreach at the local jail, a women’s group, a men’s group, cell ministry, and a number of other programs just getting launched. In an interesting parallel, the Times Square Church is similar to Faith Harvest in that it was founded by David Wilkinson and seeks to reach out to runaways, drug addicts, and the

churches wanting to host groups coming to work in the community. It is CAP’s hope that the churches and local agencies will soon discover the benefits of partnering with CAP to help families through these projects.” CAP Volunteer Houses Program Manager Sherry Allen said.

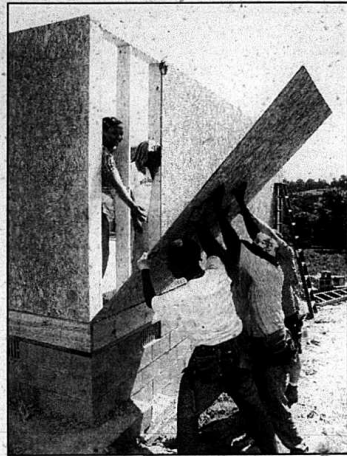
