# Lamb let go on same bond; shoots at police minutes later

A Rockcastle County man who
has had numerous run-ins with the
law, is now being held in the
Rockcastle Detention Center, under
a \$500,000 bond, after apparently
shooting at police during a pursuit on
Monday

Vernon City police officer Barry Adams, Lamb ran from him on Monday afternoon, after Adams attempted to stop him, because he (Adams) knew that Lamb was driving on a suspended license. The pursuit began on U.S. 25 near Burr and ended on Calloway Hollow Road, after Lamb wrecked his 1982 Ford truck: Adams said that during all change first diven when the stop of his truck. Adams was one of the witnesses who

# Local man arrested for shoplifting: child taken into protective custody

A Mt. Vernon man, who was ar-rested on Tuesday for shoplifting at Rite-Aid Pharmacy in Mt. Vernon, was in Rockeastle District Court on Wednesday, facing a variety of charges, including possible abandonment of a child.

Mt. Vernon Asst. Police Chief Eddie Delaney arrested Scott Combs, 30, of Bluegrass Inn, Mt. Vernon. after he received a complaint from Rite-Aid employees that Combs was stealing wheel cleaner from the store.

Besides the shoplifting charge,
Delaney also charged Combs with
possession of methamphetamine, after the substance was found in his

The local department of Protec-tion and Permanency were also brought into the case, after it was discovered that Combs had left his 17-month-old daughter in a car, in the parking lot at Rite-Aid.

Bécauseithe child was abandoned in the hot car while her father committed a crime, she was placed in protective custody by department officials.

Rockeastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette srid that it was likely that child abandonment charges would be filed against Combs, who is being held under a SL2500, en percentbond, in the Rockeastle Detention Center.





Landscaping To Save On Energy, Use
As you sit in the air-conditioning wishing it weren's so hot outside...as you pay the electric bill and alment..ever consider that money spent on landscaping might ease the heating and cooling bill, over time, far beyond the initial cost of trees and other landscaping?

Smart landscaping an shade a home in summer, let the sunshine in the winter, block wind, channel breezes, etc. Plus trees are a good investment, raising real estate values. The blossoms trees show off, the changing leaf colors, or the dependable year-round evergreen needles are an eye pleasing bonus in the clorest to save on energy consumption. Reduce summer temperatures inside the home by shading the roof or wall facing the sun with medium to large deciduous trees (one shit medium to leaves in autumn) planted four to everny-five feet from the house, de-

door porches, patios, gardens by care-ful placement of big shade trees. If you prefer, or if you don't have time for a tree to grow large enough to provide useful shade--consider a per-gola, arbor, gazebo for covering with fast growing vines to create a cooler

Warming the home in the winter can be assisted by windbreak trees planted in the direction of prevailing cold winds.
