Lamb let go on same bond; shoots at police minutes later

A Rockcastle County man who has had numerous run-ins with the law, is now being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center, under a \$500,000 bond, after apparently shooting at police during a pursuit on Monday.

Woodrow "Woody" Lamb, 24, of Calloway, has been charged with attempted murder, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, possession of marijuana and possession of methamphetamine.

He was also charged with several other counts including fleeing and driving on a suspended license, according to his arrest warrant.

Lamb also had body armor in his possession at the time of his arrest.

According to Mt. Vernon City police officer Barry Adams, Lamb ran from him on Monday afternoon, after Adams attempted to stop him, because he (Adams) knew that Lamb was driving on a suspended license. The pursuit began on U.S. 25 near Burr and ended on Calloway Hollow Road, after Lamb wrecked his 1982 Ford truck.

Adams said that during the chase, Lamb fired two shots from a 12 gauge shotgun, through the sliding glass rear window of his truck.

One of the shots hit Adams' cruiser, although Adams did not return fire.

After Lamb wrecked, he left his vehicle and ran into the woods, where Officer Adams and Rockcastle

Deputy Sheriff Ronnie Roark, apprehended him.

Lamb had been in Rockcastle District Court earlier in the day, facing other charges including possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, wanted endangerment, terroristic threatening, possession of a controlled substance, possession of marijuana and no insurance.

During his hearing on Monday, Adams was one of the witnesses who testified against Lamb and he was bound over to the Rockcastle Grand Jury on two of the charges.

However, District Judge Mike Henry objected to an increased bond for Lamb.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette argued for the higher bond

because he said that Lamb was a serious danger to society and should be held under a high bond until other court proceedings took place.

Judge Henry disagreed and Lamb was released on the same \$7,500 cash or property bond that he had previously filed.

"A lot of people watched him

leave the courthouse and get into his truck - they knew he did not have any license or any insurance, but he drove off anyway," Adams said.

Adams said that he was traveling north on U.S. 25 when he spotted Lamb driving the '82 Ford truck.

Adams pursued Lamb as did Mt.

Local man arrested for shoplifting; child taken into protective custody

A Mt. Vernon man, who was arrested on Tuesday for shoplifting at Rite-Aid Pharmacy in Mt. Vernon, was in Rockcastle District Court on Wednesday, facing a variety of charges, including possible abandonment of a child.

Mt. Vernon Asst. Police Chief Eddie Delaney arrested Scott Combs, 30, of Bluegrass Inn, Mt. Vernon, after he received a complaint from Rite-Aid employees that Combs was

stealing wheel cleaner from the store.

Besides the shoplifting charge, Delaney also charged Combs with possession of methamphetamine, after the substance was found in his pockets.

The local department of Protection and Permanency were also brought into the case, after it was discovered that Combs had left his 17-month-old daughter in a car, in the parking lot at Rite-Aid.

Because the child was abandoned in the hot car while her father committed a crime, she was placed in protective custody by department officials.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette said that it was likely that child abandonment charges would be filed against Combs, who is being held under a \$12,500, ten percent bond, in the Rockcastle Detention Center.

Delaney said that the windows were down in the vehicle.

Brodhead woman dies after three car accident

A Brodhead woman died after a three car crash around 10:30 a.m. in Berea on Thursday.

According to Berea police, Betty Sue Holcomb, 65, of Brodhead, was a passenger in an RTEC van, when it collided with a vehicle, which had been struck by another vehicle.

According to police, the fatal accident occurred on U.S. 25 north, in the city limits of Berea, near Britton Chevrolet.

Police said that Lavanja H. Phillips, 39, of Mason Lake Road, Berea, caused the accident when she pulled from the North Side Shell, into the path of Larry Sparks, 47, of Hughes Ave., Berea, striking Sparks and causing him to cross into the path of the RTEC vehicle, which was traveling north on U.S. 25.

Police said that Mrs. Holcomb was in a wheelchair in the back of the van and was enroute to Patie A. Clay Hospital for treatment when the wreck occurred.

Apparently, Mrs. Holcomb's wheelchair came loose from its restraints during the accident.

Mrs. Darlene Harris, 42, of Brodhead, was the driver of the RTEC van and Barry Lamb, 23, of Berea, was a front seat passenger.

Both Mrs. Harris and Lamb were treated for minor injuries at Berea Hospital and released.

Phillips and Sparks were also treated and released from the Berea Hospital.

Mrs. Holcomb was taken to Berea Hospital for treatment, transferred to Fair set to start on August 4th

Thank God my family has recovered from this terrible ordeal and we are patiently waiting for Dad to return home.

We also would like to thank the people who supported my family through this difficult time of embarrassment and shame. Those of you who knew Dad stood by his side and it really meant a lot to all of us. If this can save one family from experiencing what we went through then it is all worth it. Dad is well now and is learning to deal with his illness. There is a family out there who needs advice on this please feel free to write to my Dad or myself.

Dear Editor:

My name is James Bowman and I presently reside at the Federal Medical Center in Lexington. I am serving 51 months for bank robbery. First I would like to apologize to all my family and friends for the embarrassment I have caused them. I would like to explain why a 59-year-old man would and could rob two banks when he has never done illegal acts like this before. I have two daughters and a wonderful wife who have stood by me through all of this and I would like to tell them and my friends I thank them for their support and understanding without them and God I don't think I could make it. I also wish to apologize to the bank employees.

My problems started when I began playing the lottery and won a few big tickets. I then started the losing phase and desperation phase. I bankrupted our family, lied, borrowed and finally stole to feed my addiction. I was arrested and went to jail. While there my daughter found the Custer

Center in Indianapolis, Indiana and I admitted myself to them for treatment. I stayed 27 days in a lock down facility and went through major counseling and therapy. The Custer Center saved my life. I then went back to court and pled guilty and here I am. I am writing this not for sympathy but in hopes to help someone who reads this before they too hit rock bottom. Pathological (compulsive) Gambling is a progressive disease that devastates not only the gambler but everyone with whom he or she has a significant relationship.

1) In 1980 the American Psychiatric Association accepted pathological gambling as a disorder of impulse control-it is an illness that is chronic and progressive but can be diagnosed and treated. Robert L. Custer, M.D. identified the progression of gambling addiction as three phases:

- 1) The winning phase.
 - 2) The losing phase.
 - 3) The desperation phase.
- In the winning phase we experience a big win or series of wins that leaves us with unreasonably optimism that our winnings will continue, we then feel the loss of excitement when gambling and we begin to increase the amount of our bets.

In the losing phase we often begin bragging about wins we have had-start gambling alone-think more about gambling-borrow money (legally or illegally) we start lying to family and friends-Become irritable, restless and withdrawn. Home life becomes unhappy and we are unable to pay off debts-we then begin to cheat our losses believing all the time we must return soon as possible and win back our losses.

During the desperation phase there is a marked increase in the time spent gambling. This is accompanied by remorse, blaming others and alienating family and friends-we eventually engage in illegal acts to finance our gambling. We may experience hopelessness, suicidal thoughts and attempt suicide, arrest, divorce or an emotional breakdown. Current estimates suggest that three percent of the adult population will experience a serious problem with gambling and when we hit rock bottom the devastation can be far greater than for those of alcoholics or others. The reason has to do with money-an alcoholic can get sober and see hope almost

Who benefits most when we obey the law and dispose of all the accumulation of papers we receive in the mail? And what about the containers, especially plastic bags and heavy cardboard boxes? Who should be responsible for their disposal? We, the users of the contents or those who cause the build up of things we once threw away or burned? The post office is responsible for junk mail I must pay to have hauled off. Gallon size milk, bleach and vinegar jugs fill the 30 gallon trash bag that costs \$1.50 to be picked up. This is double jeopardy for those caught in the trash-trap.

It surely is a problem that needs to be looked into. There was a time when hogs were fattened on the leftovers from the dinner table as well as the dogs and cats. Now there are garbage disposals. Is that do the same thing so sewage is taken care of, and supposedly purified, before it goes back into a lake or stream. It is against the law to burn trash that contains plastic. Papers can only be burned at certain hours of the day and in a container made for that purpose. Now where does that leave the average household of ordinary citizens? How many of us own the space and equipment to take care of the necessities of getting rid of the excesses of normal living? If we live in a community that has pick up service there is a charge that many low income people can't afford. If we don't have this service where can we unload the accumulation of paper and garbage? If we live in the country, which many of our citizens do, and have been used to burning anything that will burn, feeding leftovers to the dogs and cats, throwing scraps to the birds, crush tin cans and bury them in an isolated

spot and go on with our business. Not so now since the law and the explosion of the population has changed the legal and safe way of disposing of our garbage. We buy food for the dogs, cats and birds, stack the papers in plastic bags, empty the contents into a bigger plastic bag then store them in the garbage can until the collector comes by to pick them up before he or she takes them to some mysterious place to dispose of his collection. Are they buried or burned or left on a vacant hillside so nature can take over? If buried what happened to the contents of medicine bottles, some perhaps dangerous, and the plastic containers which do not rot? If burned, was the smoke contaminated by the many plastic containers which has become a daily necessity since everything from milk to hair spray, including laundry soap, toothpaste, hand lotions and medicine is packaged in them.

Now, just who is benefited by this conglomeration of throw away every household is burdened with? Garbage collector? I don't think so. The clerk that puts the groceries in the bag? Huh-uh. The shopper searching for bargains? Hardly so. Drugists who use the boxes and tubes to fill your prescription? Hmmmmmm! I wonder if he/she has ever complained to the supplier about the big fat tube holding expensive medication is only partly full and unless the customer is aware of it, the medication will be left in the tube. Kentuckians soon will receive federal tax refund checks resulting from a change in the structure of federal marginal tax brackets. Single taxpayers should receive a \$300 refund; couples, about \$600, and heads of household, about \$500.

Checks will be mailed the week of July 23 through the week of September 24, in staggered mailings based on your Social Security number. If you're planning to move in the next few months, notify the Internal Revenue Service so your check won't be delayed.

Now is the time to make plans for wise use of this money because it could have a significant effect on your future financial security. Below are several ideas to invest the federal tax refund for your future.

Undoubtedly your best investment choice is to repay consumer debt such as outstanding credit card bills. If you're in the 28 percent tax bracket, paying off an 18 percent credit card bill is the equivalent of earning a 25 percent return. This is because you'd have earned 25 percent return on savings to be left with 18 percent after taxes. Unlike stock and bond investments, your return on repaying debt is guaranteed and tax-free.

If you have no outstanding consumer debt, consider investing the return. Many low-cost investment alternatives are available, including mutual funds requiring \$100 or less to open an account or stocks with direct purchase plans. In addition, U.S. Treasury bills, notes, and bonds are available in \$1,000 increments, as are unit investments

and corporate bonds.

If you don't believe a \$1,000 investment will really matter, think again. According to the Rule of 72, with an eight-percent return, your money will double in nine years. At the end of 20 years, your one-time \$1,000 investment will have grown to \$4,660. For more investment ideas, check out this web site: www.investing.rutgers.edu.

You also could use the federal tax refund to pay for part of your 2001 Individual Retirement Account. Talk to an accountant or investment advisor to determine whether a traditional or Roth IRA is a better choice based on your age, planned retirement date, and marginal tax bracket. You are allowed to contribute a maximum \$2,000 to any IRA or combination of IRAs. From 2002 through 2004, the maximum contribution will increase to \$3,000 and eventually will rise to \$5,000 in 2008 and later.

Another good option is to invest in yourself or, as economists like to say, "build your human capital." Take a course or other job training to improve your knowledge and skills. It could eventually lead to a raise or promotion and pay back your tuition payment many times over. Two good places to continue your education are community colleges and professional or trade associations related to your occupation.

Gardening & Landscaping Tips

Landscaping To Save On Energy Use

As you sit in the air-conditioning wishing it weren't so hot outside... as you pay the electric bill and lament... ever consider that money spent on landscaping might ease the heating and cooling bill, over time, far beyond the initial cost of trees and other landscaping?

Smart landscaping can shade a home in summer, let the sunshine in the winter, block wind, channel breezes, etc. Plus trees are a good investment, raising real estate value. The blossoms trees show off, the changing leaf colors, or the dependable year-round evergreen needles are an eye pleasing bonus in the efforts to save on energy consumption. Reduce summer temperatures inside the home by shading the roof and wall facing the sun with medium to large deciduous trees (ones that lose leaves in autumn) planted four to twenty-five feet from the house, depending on the tree species. Reduce temperatures of the out-

door porches, patios, gardens by careful placement of big shade trees. If you prefer, or if you don't have time for a tree to grow large enough to provide useful shade—consider a pergola, arbor, gazebo for covering with fast growing vines to create a cooler nook to relax in.

Warning the home in the winter can be assisted by windbreak trees planted in the direction of prevailing cold winds. Trees planted for this purpose do not need to be close enough to also serve as summer shade (but if so, large evergreen trees should not be planted so close as to keep winter sunshine from reaching the roof and walls of your home). Cool colors like green, white, blue and purple also "look cool" to the mind and eyes even if it is hot. (Likewise, reds, oranges, yellows can make a pattern day "feel" warmer).

Creating shade, changing wind patterns around your home, carefully selected trees can moderate your energy bills while adding beauty and value to your home paradise.

Momentum returns to Dale Jarrett

A late restart with three laps to go and a slight bump to teammate Ricky Rudd gave Dale Jarrett the win in Sunday's Winston Cup New England 300 at New Hampshire Speedway. Rudd was leading the race when a caution came out on lap 292 after Jerry Nadon, driver of the No. 25 Hendrick Chevrolet hit the outside wall coming out of turnfour. When green flag racing resumed on lap 296 of the 300-lap event, the leaders were Rudd, Jarrett, and Jeff Gordon. Rudd didn't get a good start, and as the lead came out of turn two, Jarrett was right on the bumper of his teammate. It appeared the rear end of Rudd's No. 28 Texaco Ford slipped and nearly bumped the wall. After gaining control, the 28 car was then touched by the 88 UPS Ford of Dale Jarrett and Jeff Gordon were able to get by Rudd, who never regained momentum.

Dale Jarrett dedicated the win to Adam Petty and Kenny Irwin, two NASCAR drivers that were killed in accidents at the New Hampshire track in 2000.

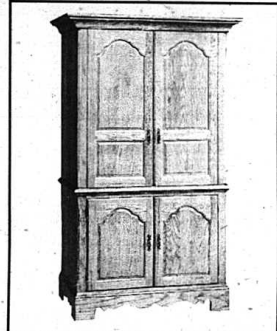
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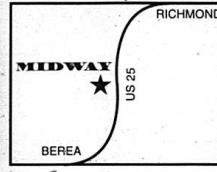


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Rockcastle FFA attends Leadership Training Center July 9th - 13th

received an Outstanding Leadership Award during the week. We also had Heather Adams and Jamey Robinson receive Excellent in Athletics during the week.

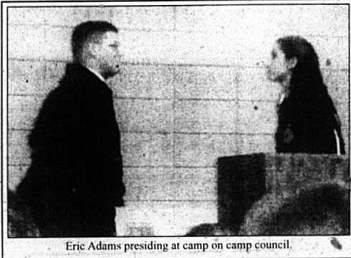
