

# **Brodhead** area hit hard by flooding

Mrs. Bonnie Rose, who owns and
operates the store with her husband
Luther, said that at one point two feet
of water stood in their grocery and
restaurant.

The store re-opened on Tuesday, after four days of cleaning up after the flood.

Mrs. Rose said that their restaurant will re-open on Thursday (to-day)

The flooding at Rose's caught the attention of Lexington television stations and CNN and the Weather Chandra at the sale of the sal nel also carried stories about the flood-ing, which featured the flood damage

Mrs. Rose would not put a dollar figure on the damage, but said Wednesday that at this point, all of the equipment, including the gas pumps were operating.

However, the Roses lost a lot of inventory in the flood and had no flood insurance.

A building next door to the greery and owned by the Roses was also damaged by the flooding and clean up on that building had began on Wednesday.

was called in to move the mud generated by the flood from Rose's parking lot back into Dix River.



How to participate:(1) Triple rinse pressure rinse all containers when or pressure rinse all containers who emptied. Remember, it is best to rinse containers immediately after they are containers immediately after they are emptied. Some pesticide residues solidify quickly, and become diffisolidify quickly, and become diffi-cult to remove from the container if left in the jug. (2) Dispose of the posticide caps and remove sleeves and labels from containers. The pes-ticide caps are made of a different plastic material that cannot be cur-nettly recycled. (3) Bring all prope-ertly rinsed, five gallon or smaller, plastic containers to the listed collec-tion sites on the dates and times speci-fied for our county. Keep empty con-tainers in a dry, secure place until the collection date. Each empty pesti-cide container returned will be in spected to ensure it has been properly rinsed. Unrinsed containers will NOT be accepted.

Mileage or time will be documented on the honor system, the end of the program, walkers that complete the program will be eligible to receive incentives and recognition for their outstanding effort!


