It's probably safe to say that I've given up squirrel hunting. Part of my disinterest has to do with the fact that it's not much of a challenge to kill a mess of squirrels this day and time if you know how to load and shoot a 22 rifle. Here in the Highlands, at least, every little patch of woods has a sizable population of squirrels that have no apparent fear of human presence.

It was not that way when I was growing up and we hunted with shotguns for the most part. The squirrels of my youth were wary and normally when you did see one he had already seen you, in which case he was not prone to be still long enough for you to take a fine bead on his noggin. Most of the time he was leaping from limb to limb as though he were already 15 minutes late for an important appointment in the next county and it required some skill with a shotgun to bag him.

I can't remember anyone on Blair Branch who didn't have a designated squirrel hunter in the family and most boys, from the time they were 11 or 12 years old, either owned or had access to a shotgun. From mid-August when season opened until the leaves were long gone, we hunted on evenings and week-ends and most often then not, came home empty handed even though the woods were miles wide and deep.

I can't remember anything from my youth that tasted any better than squirrel gray poured over baked sweet potatoes and served with a big piece of hot cornbread. By the time squirrel season came in my family was tired of chicken and it was too early in the year to butcher a hog. For that matter, most of the chickens we'd hatched off in the spring had already been eaten and squirrel was an important source of meat, if we wanted it in our diets.

It wasn't unusual for a gang of teen age boys to pile into a car and drive more than a hundred miles on a Friday night to the National Forest to camp out and hunt all week-end where the human population was not so dense, the trees were taller and the mountains not so steep as they were

in Leitcher County. The squirrels were also much more plentiful and normally everybody in the crowd killed a few.

Before I was old enough to be allowed to own a gun myself, I frequently got permission to borrow Uncle Willie Adams's .410 gauge shotgun. It didn't kick very hard but,

on the other hand, it didn't have much range. For two years I hunted with that gun and took several shots without killing a squirrel. Finally I became brave enough to borrow his old Iver Johnson 12 gauge, single barrel, a gun with a legendary reputation.

If a squirrel was close enough to see, that old shotgun would put it on the ground. Trouble is, it had a reputation for killing on both ends. Numerous of my cousins who were tougher than I ever even aspired to be killed their first squirrels with that old shotgun and they would pull back their shirt collars to show ugly bruises on their shoulders put there by its recoil. It kicked like a mule in a yellow jacket nest and twice as hard.

Late one evening after school when I was in sixth grade I logged the old gun to the very top of the point behind Lawson Brown's mine where stood a little patch of hickory trees and long before I got to them I could hear the patter of nut shells raining down through the leaves. There must have been half a dozen squirrels feasting on the ripening nuts and I only saw one.

Without thinking about the recoil, I pulled back the hammer, aimed and fired and in an instant I was on my back.

Joe Frazier nor Ken Norton nor Ali ever threw a harder punch. I picked myself up, dusted off, found the gun maybe ten feet away and noticed that squirrels were jumping through the limbs in every direction. But it never even occurred to me to reload. I felt around on my shoulder to see if any bone fragments were poking through because I was sure it was broken in numerous places.

Then I saw the squirrel lying on the ground and the pain went away instantly. I whooped and came tra-

ving off the mountain with it in one hand and the gun in the other.

I probably showed it to every kid on the hillier and it didn't get skinned until after dark.

Neither Davy Crockett nor Daniel Boone could possibly have been any prouder of their first bear.

In the years to come I would learn to hold Uncle Willie's old gun snugly and relax to the recoil so that shooting it was almost second nature.

I would also own more than a dozen good shotguns and nearly as many rifles, most of which I have since traded or even given away to

nephews or youngsters that that I took a liking too.

I still have a decent old .22 though and the more I think about that squirrel gravy and sweet potatoes, the more I have a notion to go buy my hunting licenses after all. In fact, I think I'll call up Molly Helton and tell her to get the kettle-hot come opening morning. Maybe I'll go to my recently deceased pal, Junior Helton's, woods. That would be a fine way to remember him appropriately because we hardly missed an opening day there together for more than 20 years.

A Pounding

For those who associate pounding, as in driving nails with a hammer, beating steak with a mallet, or beating your friend, or foe, on their back, either in anger for a mishap or congratulations for a job well done, there is another kind of pounding that has become almost obsolete. That is the one of welcoming the new minister and his family into the church, the community, the parish and, most of all, our hearts, by helping them through the rigors of moving to a new parish, with contributions of "a pound of this, a bundle of that, a few boxes of whatnots, all tied together with a ribbon of love and appreciation of having a Man of God such as Brother Eddie Nation, filling the pulpit of the First Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon.

He has requested the simple salutation of Eddie, when speaking to him, so, Eddie preached his first sermon Sunday morning, sometimes from behind the pulpit, just as often, in the aisle where he could speak more directly to his audience. I'm sure there was some soul searching going on during his problem with the microphones when he got too far from them but it did not lessen the impact of the message he gave about serving God. I, and those I talked to later, went home perfectly satisfied with the new preacher.

After the night service, and an-

other good sermon, everyone was invited to the new auditorium where Bro. Eddie and family would be "pounded." He, laughingly, said he probably deserved a good pounding literally for the fumbling with the with the microphones in the morning service. Personally, I prefer the voice of a preacher or singer, if they speak and pronounce their words clearly in their own natural voice to that of a disguised voice by mechanical means.

I am not good at remembering names, not even those of friends I have known for years, so my welcome to the Nation family will have to be WELCOME, YOU ALL, TO MT. VERNON FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH. I will try to remember the names of Mama, wife, son and daughter soon.

It seems summer has grown wings since we watched the leaves appear and gardeners sprouting with tender new plants. Now they are being harvested and almost every kitchen is filled with beans, tomatoes and corn being either canned or frozen for the cold months ahead. This has always been a busy time for the womenfolk, especially those of us living on a farm, who realized it was up to us to supply good wholesome meals for the family, and the only way to do it was by planting, hoeing, harvesting and canning it. At one time, I counted fourteen dozen jars, including several dozen half gallon-ones, filled with

beans, dozens of quart size of a variety of vegetables, plus shelves full of pint size jelly, jam and apple butter. You can bet it took a heap of sweat and backaches to fill that cellar so anyone visiting the Graves family that winter would not have to leave hungry. And, many of those visitors left with a quart jar of blackberries or a couple jars of pickled beets, balanced on their arms with pints of apple butter or jam. Mat did the plowing and most of the planting. We all shared in pulling weeds and hoeing. I'm sure many of the readers remember my complaints of picking up rocks in the garden when we moved to Rockcastle county. Well, that chore was never completed so, along with hoeing, there were always rocks to pick up. They are still there. I don't mean the ones we picked up but a new layer is always waiting for willing hands.

Harvesting the toil of our labor, then preparing it for canning was another chore that taxed the patience and strength of all. Beans were picked by the bushel, taken to the spring to be thoroughly washed, carried back to the house where they were strung and broken into small pieces, ready for cooking when they were opened. Beets were pulled up when they were ready for canning,

tops cut off and the rest taken to the spring for washing. They were first cooked till they were semi-tender, then finished by pickling on the kitchen stove. Tomatoes were scalded to remove the skins before being packed in the jars. This was all time-consuming and hard work. There was much more, but I am sure you get the picture of what farm life was like back in the forties and fifties.

Jellies, jam and apple butter were made in the kitchen. Now remember, there was no such thing as air conditioning then. Windows were opened wide so as to catch a breath of cool air if a breeze sprung up. The cold packing, which took several hours cooking, was done in the yard where a fire was built between a frame work of rocks to hold the large kettles, often big wash tubs that would hold enough jars at once to catch a bushel of beans, or beets to be later pickled. If women of today's culture think they have a rough time cooking frozen food from the freezer in a microwave oven, make salad from already sorted and washed fresh vegetables, pop a package of canned or frozen biscuits in a toaster oven, grab a frozen dessert from the freezer then announce supper is ready, I would like to introduce her to another period of time and tell her WE HAVE COME A LONG WAY BABY.

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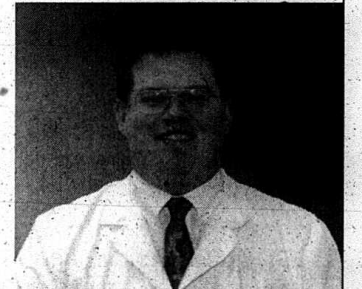
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Agricultural News

Committee Election Coming Soon

Coming August 1, 2001, the local FSA office will begin accepting nominations for the upcoming election to be held December 3, 2001.

Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. They help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will run. They make FSA agricultural programs fit the needs of local producers.

Nomination forms must be received in the local FSA office by October 20th.

Non-insurable Crops Disaster Assistance Program (NAP).

Authority for NAP is the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996 as amended by the Agricultural Risk Protection Act, 2000.

NAP was designed to reduce financial losses that occur when natural disasters cause a catastrophic loss of production or prevented planting of an eligible crop by providing coverage equivalent to CAT insurance. State limits NAP to each commercial crop or agricultural commodity, except livestock, for which CAT is not available and is produced for food or fiber. Thus, NAP excludes corn and tobacco.

Producers who wish to file an application for coverage are required to pay a \$100 service fee per crop or an amount that is the lesser of \$100 per crop per county or \$300 per producer per county, but not to exceed a total of \$900 per producer. The administrative service fee requirement is waived for limited resource producers. A limited resource producer is a producer with either of the following: an annual gross income of \$20,000 or less derived from all sources, including income from a spouse or other members of the household, for each of the prior 2 years OR less than 25 acres aggregated for all crops, where a majority of the producer's annual gross income is derived from such farm or farms, but the producer's annual gross income from all farming operations does not exceed \$20,000.

To qualify for assistance under NAP, production losses must be re-

lated to a natural disaster that causes catastrophic losses. A natural disaster is damaging weather, adverse natural occurrence, or a related condition which must occur before or during harvest.

Eligible producers must file in the FSA administrative office serving the county or counties where their acreage is located no later than the application closing date. For 2001 crops for which the coverage period normally have been before or within 60 calendar days after publication of the regulation in Federal Register (FR), a producer must within 30 days after the publication of the FR: (1) submit a 2001 crop application and pay the applicable service fee (2) certify the 2000 crop year production for the crop if available.

Missed the Deadline??
New legislation required all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to file an initial designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market their tobacco from FSA 808 by the deadline of August 1, 2001.

The next designation period for the 2001-2002 marketing season will begin October 1, 2001 and end on October 1, 2001.

Farmers are required to inform FSA of the warehouse number where they will market their tobacco. Please note the FSA 808 will indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the marketing card, you must return that card to the FSA office and request another marketing card. Remember, the marketing cards are warehouse specific.

Disaster Leasing Eligibility
Some producers of barley tobacco may have suffered a loss in their tobacco crop due to the recent heavy rainfall. If this is your case and you feel you will be at least 20% short we want to recommend you file the FSA 574, Disaster Credit Request, which may enable farms to be eligible for disaster lease and transfer.

Producers who suffer a barley tobacco disaster loss must file FSA 574 immediately upon determination by the producer that production has been reduced by more than 20 percent in all cases. BEFORE THE CROP IS

HARVESTED FROM THE FIELD. The producer filing the FSA 574 shall provide deposit to cover the cost of the farm visit. The deposit shall be kept by the County Office until the farm visit and eligibility is determined. The deposit shall be returned to the producer who is determined eligible.

Barley tobacco regulations list five eligibility conditions for Barley Tobacco Disaster Lease and Transfer (lease) filed after July 1st due to a natural disaster). To be eligible the transferring farm must have: (1) FSA 578, Crop Acreage Report, on file certifying the planted acreage of tobacco for the current year. If the certification was not filed in a timely manner, a late fee will apply. (2) Planted an acreage sufficient to produce the farm's current effective quota. (3) Made reasonable and customary efforts to produce the effective farm marketing quota. (4) In the current year, expected production that is less than 80 percent of the farm's effective marketing quota because of a natural disaster. (5) Met all price support eligibility requirements.

2001 Phase II Compensation Plan
The 2001 Phase II Compensation Plan will be based on USDA-FSA records of quota ownership as of July 1, 2000. OR the final lease and transfer date as determined by USDA-FSA, and based on the number of quota pounds owned for crop year 2000.

Compensation for the growing farm and grower/tenant portion will be limited to those individuals who had a vested interest in tobacco production in 1998 and/or 1999 and/or 2000, and defined in previous compensation plans. Compensation from the Trust would be made only for the years in which an applicant had a vested interest in tobacco production, as described under previous compensation plans.

Application should be mailed to crop year 2000 farm operators on or about August 6-10 with the application deadline of September 15th.

Producers who need help in the completion of these forms should contact the local County Extension Office or the Farm Service Agency.

Grazed 2001 Wheat, Barley, Oats (Graze-Out)
The Agricultural Risk Protection

Act of 2000 provides "LDP-like" payments on grazed acreages. Crop year 2001 producers of wheat, oats and barley on a farm with a production flexibility contract who graze the acreage will receive a payment under the same terms and conditions as a producer who harvests a crop and

applies for a loan deficiency payment.

Graze-Out is available to producers who are otherwise eligible for marketing assistance loans and LDP's producers enrolled in the Production Flexibility Program (PFC), graze 2001 crop acreage planted to wheat,

barley or oats, do not harvest the same crop on the same acreage.

Regulations for GRAZE-OUT are available on the FSD home page at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/dafp/psd/>. The deadline for accepting applications for GRAZE-OUT is August 31, 2001.

Pesticide Recycling Program kicks off

The Rockcastle County Conservation District recently announced the 2001 kick-off for the Rinse and Return Plastic Container Recycling Program. They encourage all farmers, farm supply dealers and other pesticide users to participate in this exciting recycling program.

The Conservation District has scheduled collection dates and times for this year. The collection dates for Rockcastle will be September 6, 2001 at the USDA Service Center from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Individuals are encouraged to bring in their rinsed plastic pesticide containers where they will be inspected, run through a chipping machine and the material will be shipped to a facility to be reused in the manufacture of new pesticide containers.

How to participate: (1) Triple rinse or pressure rinse all containers when emptied. Remember, it's best to rinse containers immediately after they are emptied. Some pesticide residues solidify quickly, and become difficult to remove from the container if left in the jug. (2) Dispose of the pesticide caps and remove sleeves and labels from containers. The pesticide caps are made of a different plastic material that cannot be currently recycled. (3) Bring all properly rinsed, five gallon or smaller, plastic containers to the listed collection sites on the dates and times specified for our county. Keep empty containers in a dry, secure place until the collection date. Each empty pesticide container returned will be inspected to ensure it has been properly rinsed. Unrinsed containers will NOT be accepted.

"Proper rinsing of pesticide containers is easy to do, saves money and helps protect the environment," says Sandy Whitaker, local coordinator of the Rockcastle County Container Recycling Committee. "Even during the busy season the few extra minutes it takes to rinse empty containers is time well spent."

The Rinse and Return program was started in 1990 to encourage farmers, retail farm supply dealers, and other pesticide users to recycle their

properly rinsed plastic pesticide containers. Last year 87 Kentucky counties participated collecting over 95,000 pounds of plastic chips representing approximately 155,000 plastic containers.

The Rinse and Return Plastic Pesticide Container Recycling Program is a cooperative project between Rockcastle County Conservation District, the Kentucky Fertilizer and Agricultural Chemical Association, the Kentucky Department of Agriculture Division of Pesticides, the Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation, and the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service.

Drug Courts receive funding

The Administrative Office of the Courts, Division of Drug Courts has been awarded federal grant monies totaling \$842,876 to fund the continuation and expansion of drug courts. The federal funding is awarded through the Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Formula Grant Program, and administered by the Kentucky Justice Cabinet.

Chief Justice Joseph E. Lambert oversees Kentucky's drug courts. The citizens of Kentucky will be well served by this continuing commitment to the justice system. With additional funds available for Kentucky's drug courts, we can continue working to break the cycle of drug addiction that is at the root of many of society's problems," said Lambert.

Drug Courts integrate substance abuse treatments, sanctions and incentives with case management to place nonviolent drug involved of-

fenders in judicially supervised rehabilitation programs. Program length is 12-24 months and consists of a multi-phase program including intensive treatment, random and frequent drug testing, maintaining full time employment or school, and court appearances.

The funding will be divided among existing drug court programs located in Christian County, Fayette County, Jefferson County, Kenton County, Campbell County, Warren County, Pike County, and the combined location of Lincoln, Rockcastle and Pulaski Counties.

In Lincoln, Rockcastle and Pulaski Counties, Drug Court is conducted by Circuit Court Judge Debra Lambert.

1. Principal Anthony Coffey called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

2. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as read.

made the council aware that Mrs. Regina Little had expressed a desire to move to one of the seventh grade Language Arts positions and that Mr. Joe Cope wished to move to Mrs. Little's position of sixth grade Language Arts teacher on the Adventure team. Mr. Coffey also made the council aware of the transfer of the Practical Living teacher to the high school and that Mrs. Judy Brock will be moved from her eighth grade language arts position into the Practical Living job at the middle school. Mr. Coffey also made the council aware of the switching of the SB and FMD rooms due to student numbers and the request of Gina Nicely to be moved to a large resource room beside the new room addition in the Enterprise's team area and that Brenda Ballinger will be moved to the new room. The council agreed by consensus to go ahead with these changes.

Mr. Coffey also discussed with the council the loss of the five instructional assistants at the middle school due to the loss of the Title I funding. Mr. Coffey stated that he had approached both Mr. Hammond and Mr. Bray about money from the board for any of these positions to be rehired, but it had been expressed

that there was no money available for this. Mr. Coffey also expressed that one assistant could be rehired from SBDM allocation and one from allocation for an instructional assistants for the FMD class at the middle school. Local educators participate in National Curriculum Institute

Nancy Russell, Jennifer Mattingly, Susan Norton, Christina Rose, Regina Burton, Tammy Miller and Jason Coguer represented Rockcastle County at the 2001 Summer Curriculum Alignment Institute sponsored by the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB). SREB, the nation's first interstate compact for education, was created in 1948 by Southern governors. SREB helps educational and governmental leaders work cooperatively to advance education and, in doing so, improve the region's social and economic life.

The Summer Curriculum Alignment Institute was one of a series of professional development opportunities for educators participating in SREB's Making Schools Work school improvement initiative. Making Schools Work is designed to support schools in preparing all students to meet higher standards. Twenty-five school systems from seven states

participated in Making Schools Work during the 2000-2001 academic year. Berea College in Berea, was the site of the English/Language Arts Curriculum Institute. The Institute leaders were members of the SREB school improvement staff and the Council for Basic Education of Washington, D.C., an organization promoting curriculum that is strong in the basic subjects for all children in kindergarten through grade 12.

The purpose of the English/Language Arts Curriculum Institute was to provide time for educators to thoroughly examine their local school curriculum to make sure it supports high academic standards. Participants created a curriculum map and calendar, model lessons, sample assessments and a host of ideas for student assignments. The team representing Rockcastle County formulated an action plan for sharing this process with other faculty members.

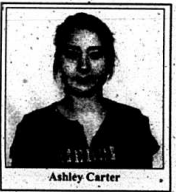

Jeff Gordon's victory in the Brickyard 400 on Sunday may very well propel him to a fourth Winston Cup championship.

Gordon, who celebrated his 30th birthday on Saturday, also increased his lead in the points standings of a day when Ricky Rudd, 45 points behind coming in, finished 39th after suffering early mechanical problems that dropped him 179 behind Gordon.

Dale Jarrett, who fell 107 points behind last week with at Pocono, hoped a four-tire change on his final pit stop would help him become the first-time winner of this race. He went the other way, however, fading from seventh on the restart to 12th at the finish and now sits 160 back of Gordon in the season's standings.

In each of the past three seasons, the winner of the Brickyard 400 has

gone on to win the championship. Gordon, who started 27th, made little progress in the early stages of the 160 lap race as he fought an ill-handling car.

"It was an incredible day," said Gordon. "At the beginning, we were way off. We took two tires there at the end and it was absolutely the right call."

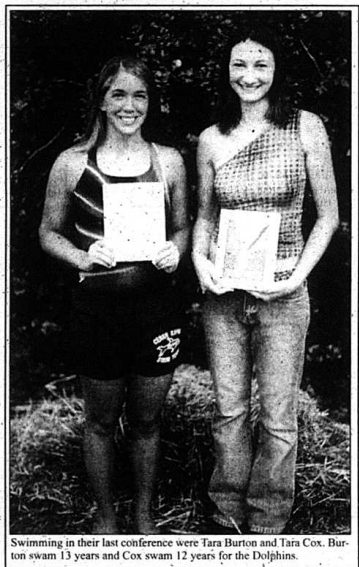

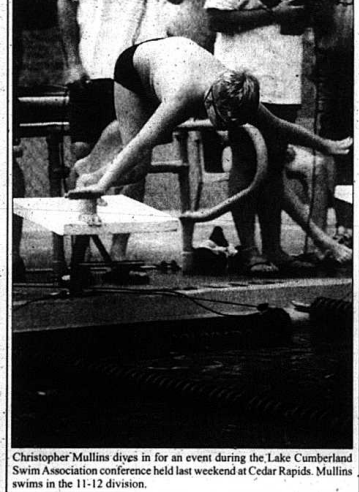

first degree. According to Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney David L. Dalton, who prosecuted the case, on September 24, 2000, Danny McKinney, owner of "Snash Your Stuff" storage in Rockcastle County, encountered the defendant in his storage buildings on Hwy. 150. According to testimony given at trial, Miller fled from the scene and was eventually apprehended by Pulaski County Sheriff Sam Catron.

According to Montgomery, prior to the burglary in September of last year, Miller had already been convicted in six prior indictments, from the counties of Jessamine, Mercer, and Woodford, for crimes ranging from theft and burglary to sexual abuse.

Based upon the prior convictions, Dalton asked the jury to enhance the defendant's convictions. After over an hour of deliberation, the jury returned an enhanced verdict of 15 years imprisonment as punishment for his newest offense. According to Montgomery, this is one of the largest jury verdicts ever in this area for this manner of burglary.

Montgomery said he was pleased Dalton for his handling of the trial. Montgomery also thanked the jury for a verdict he called, "clearly well reasoned and fair."

Combs charged with first degree criminal abuse

A Mt. Vernon man who is accused of leaving his 17-month-old child in a hot car while he was committing a crime, has been charged with first degree criminal abuse and bound over to the grand jury. Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette, said that Scott Combs, 30, of Bluegrass Inn Apartments was charged on July 24th with shoplifting, after employees at Rite-Aid saw him steal wheel cleaner.

During a hearing on Monday, Burdette asked that Combs be held on a high bond because he had been using Methamphetamine and had it in his possession when he was arrested for shoplifting.

Burdette said that Combs had also put his child in great danger by leaving it unattended in a hot car. The child was taken into protective custody at the time of Combs' arrest. Combs remains in the Rockcastle County Detention Center under a \$25,000 cash or property bond.

Economic success was important because that meant "good clothes," which in those days consisted mainly of jeans, tee-shirts and penny loafers. Bobby's clothes were definitely not up to par. Both he and his sister reflected the family's lack of income. It is an indictment of me and my classmates that we sometimes laughed at Bobby and his sister. That is not, something I am proud to report.

I do not remember making fun of them myself (or have I conveniently forgotten?), but I did nothing to stop it. Bobby did not seem bothered by all this, but it must have hurt him. I do not believe I ever saw him get upset at someone for the way he was treated. He did not fight back with his fists but with his mind and his achievements.

My feelings about what is important have changed quite a bit since high school (thank goodness!). As I remember Bobby now, I do not think of him as someone who did not have the right clothes. Instead I admire him for fighting to make it in a sometimes-hostile world.

I know nothing about his home life. There may have been alcohol or abuse, and there certainly was poverty. Any one of those is enough to break the spirit of a child. But Bobby didn't break. While home may not have been a good place, one would

never know that from what he said or how he acted. He always was the same calm person no matter what.

I wonder what he is doing today. Did he make it even without a lot of help? Is he working? Does he have a career? Is he still as strong as I remember him? Is he still fighting to make it in a hostile world? Does he have a family? What kind of father is he to his children? What kind of husband is he?

I remember the page in our high school yearbook that featured the "most popular" students. Bobby's picture was not among those favored ones. "For what it's worth, Bobby, I think we did you an injustice by not featuring you in that group. And not just for what you missed, but for what we missed. There was a lot you could have taught us about life if we had only stopped to see and listen.

If you are out there, Bobby, I would love to hear from you.

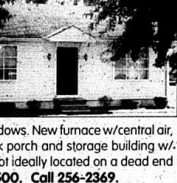
