We've been eating catfish here at 249 Charlie Brown Road in Paint, Lick for a week now. We started last Sunday when we had a house full of company and I thwashed out the mess of fish that Michael (I still call him Mikey but you probably shouldn't) Leger brought to my house in late July.

Michael and my son, Christopher Richter, started kindergarten together at Paint Lick Elementary and graduated together at Garland County High School two years ago. They were on the same soccer team for four years in high school but while Chris had musical tastes that ran toward the far extreme of "alternative rock," Mikey was more at home with an old flat top guitar, beating out the chords to "Rock of Ages Clef for Me" (Let me hide myself in thee). (And I might add, the sorta-kid you sort of dream of even though they are one in a billion.)

Chris is not a hunter/gatherer. Unless you call bringing in a box of HoneyNut Cheerios a gathering feat. Chris's idea of a successful hunt is to bone steaks at \$8.99 a pound on the clearance rack at Winn Dixie. Michael figures that venison is leaner, contains far less cholesterol, tastes better in the long run and is cleaner slaughter than a 30.06 caliber rifle and a hunting knife than a beef steer electrocuted and hung upside down before it is mechanically turned into steak and burger.

Which is okay by me. I still want the bone and rib-eye and New York strip steaks to be red and cool in the middle and brown on the outside and if they ain't saying moooo and they don't have a pulse, I really don't care about the killing of the cow.

"Yeah, yeah, yeah, so when are you going bring me some proff...."

And the very next night Michael brings over to my house a two-gallon zip-lock bag full of water and catfish filets. The bag weighed 17 pounds. I figured 15 pounds of that was water. I was wrong.

Fifteen pounds of that was catfish. Inch-thick, and twelve-inch long flat head catfish filets, more precious than the finest cut of beef ever known to man and frozen into a single block. Proof, they frozed in the sink of proof, they frozed in the sink

before my eyes. And so, last Sunday, I broke out a 6 ounce bottle of Holland House White Cooking Wine and I cut up four filets into eight pieces, and sauteed them in the cheap cooking wine, a cup of butter milk, and a root of chopped ginger for about 3 hours I let them soak.

Then I rolled the filets in Martha White Corn Meal Mix and fried them in inch-deep, extremely hot, (400 degree) olive oil for about three minutes on each side. (you gotta flip em).

And if you know John and Celeste, that is a remarkable recommendation.

Patrykins and I have had catfish fried, broiled and or had baked everyday for lunch this week and we are ready to go out and catch something else. Patty has even eaten catfish for breakfast.

Patty went back to Maryville, Tennessee, this week to spend a week at home with her mother. I had an email from her tonight.

"Mikey was here earlier in the and asked about you," I told her, "Please," she said, "Please, please tell Michael to not bring catfish when I get home."

"Pizza," I asked? "Not even pizza," she said. "Mikey will put catfish on it."

Necessary Room "Or Toilet"

Happy Birthday wishes to Rodney, Graves and Polly Abney. My only son Rod and youngest daughter, Polly were blessed with the same birthdate August 13, but nine years apart. Sorry kids you can't share the usual birthday cake today, but Mom's arms won't reach that far. Non-the-less, I'll be remembering each of you, just as I am right now. And hope both of you have a happy one although 400 miles separate you.

Do you, the readers of Sweet and Sour, remember the little "necessary house out back"? I am sure my three kids do. So do the kin folks from the city who enjoyed the hospitality of Mat and Zoi for a week or so at a time but hated that little "out house" out back. Come rain or snow, when one had to go, the path to the "out house" was used. In case no one else knows what I am talking about it is about time you learn about the "necessary room," "out house" or commonly known as the "toilet" from one who learned about them the hard way.

When I was child, we lived in a little town without the conveniences of plumbing and bathrooms, but there was a small building out back that served the same purpose. It was called a toilet, or "out house" and was usually equipped with a wood bench across the back wall with two neatly cut out holes, a space beside each large enough to hold a Sears Roebuck catalog, a door with an open space above it out in the shape of the half moon and a handle attached to a small bar to slide over the frame for closure. A deep hole underneath that was prepared to catch the waste so the surrounding area was not contaminated. It was my job as child to clean the toilet every Saturday. And when mother said clean, she meant the spider scrubbed, floors scrubbed and spider webs removed from the rough walls. Saturday was the day it had to be done. I guess, because someone usually spent a big part of the day on Sunday at our house and Mom didn't want this "necessary room" to be found like it had been used by teenage boys and a hassle of kids that didn't care where the pages of the catalog landed or the dirt from shoes, lately tramping in mud, were scraped. I was eight, my sister eleven, but we papered that toilet with left-over wall paper to brighten it up a bit.

Looking back eighty years to that little necessary room we took pride in keeping clean, can bring back so many other memories it is hard for me to concentrate on writing. I want to stop and savor a memory one of mom making clothes for Katherine, "Katie" her last baby. I want to remember going to school in the big red school house at the top of the hill above us. I want to remember my response to dad, "here Dad, let me try it again," when he scolded me for not holding my fork correctly when he was trying to show me who to cut a piece of steak. I would like to watch "my two big brothers strut off to go courting, and my pretty sister primp with her hair when she saw her "feller" coming down the street. I want to hold and cuddle little red haired Katherine, "Katy" or push fat little two year old Buddy around the yard in the little red wagon I'd use to deliver his papers in. Or call Thema and Herb to join me in a

game of marbles or hopscotch or listen to our next door neighbor, "old man Leatherose," tell about his escapades with the Indians. He could tell some hair raising stories of witnessing a raid and them scalping a man while he was still alive.

Time, and getting this article out before that time runs out, bring reality to my dream world and I use the old procrastinators phrase, another time Z1, wait till you can sit and dream about the past without worrying about today's task and dreaming about what life used to be.

It wasn't long till Dad changed jobs and we moved to another location where things were quite different and our new home was a bit more modern. We now had electric lights and running water which meant we had a bathroom instead of a "necessary room" in the backyard and running water instead of a pump. We were close to the Ohio River and I was sure I could smell the scent of

river water when I turned a faucet on to fill the big white tub in the same room with a toilet and wash basin. This was a luxury I had never experienced or dreamed of. Now I no

longer had to scrub with lye to make the floor and toilet seat white. The walls were plastered and papered all over with matching paper. No one (Cont. to A7)

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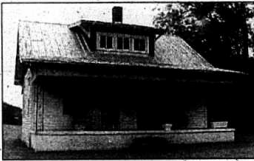

Jeff Gordon gets record road course win

Jeff Gordon's victory in Sunday's Global Crossing at The Glen gave him seven road course wins, more than any other Winston Cup driver in the history of the series.

His seven career wins moves him ahead of Rusty Wallace, Bobby Allison and Richard Petty, who each have six. Gordon, who qualified 17th, gained the lead from Jeff Burton on lap 78 of the 90-lap event. One lap later, Jimmy Spencer lost an engine in his No. 26 Kmart Ford and spilled a lot of oil on the track. When green flag racing resumed, there were only 7 laps remaining.

On the restart lap, there was a chain reaction of cars that bumped and spun near turn 7, bringing out the fifth and final caution of the race.

Gordon was first, followed by Burton, Boris Said and Jeremy Mayfield on the next restart.

The cars of Mayfield and Rudd passed Said immediately after the restart, but Gordon had checked out on the rest of the field. Burton tried to close the gap, but lacked the power, and had to settle for second.

"We had a good chance to win this today," Burton said. "We got beat by the fastest car and we were the second-fastest. He got by me, I got back by him and then he got back by me again. It was just damn good racing. It was an awesome move to have to get by me. I would have loved to use that track position on some of those caution restarts."

Dale Jarrett, the pole sitter had problems during the race twice in turn 11. Each time he spun out and had to be pulled back on to the track by a wrecker. He finished 31st, and severely damaged his title hopes as he dropped to third-place, 265 point behind Gordon.

Robby Gordon, who has been subbing the last three races for the injured Mike Skinner in the No. 31 Lowe's Chevrolet, appeared to have the strongest car, but during a pit stop, a fire erupted in the car's cockpit, forcing him out of the race.

Will NASCAR investigation lead to safer race cars

NASCAR's report on their investigation into the death of driver Dale Earnhardt is expected to reveal safety problems in the design of the race cars.

NASCAR officials, including president Mike Helton refused to discuss claims this past week by the Orlando Sentinel, that NASCAR, Busch and Winston Cup cars lack sufficient crush resistance in the front to effectively protect drivers from severe head-on crashes.

But in spite of the fact that almost everyone in the NASCAR organization feels there is an increased need for more protection, teams are reluctant to commit money for driver protection.

Autoliv, a Swedish manufacturer of safety equipment, made a formal proposal in early May to car owners, drivers and NASCAR officials to focus on improvements to the driver compartment.

Autoliv's proposal invited all of the major racing teams in the sport to hear its initial presentation in May in Charlotte, N.C., though only a dozen showed up.

While all of the things Autoliv demonstrated would contribute to lowering the injury value numbers, there is no rush to incorporate them into the present NASCAR safety requirements.

Teams simply haven't budgeted for safety testing, and NASCAR isn't ready to order any design changes to the cars.

"In the past, there hasn't been any formalized process, even though there's been a tremendous emphasis on safety," said Jim Hunter of Lowe's Motor Speedway. "Everybody has

been out sort of doing their own thing. NASCAR's role in this process is to formalize it and figure out who pays and how much."

Meanwhile, NASCAR has set to mandate either of the driver head-restraint devices, even though 75 percent of Winston Cup drivers are now using one.

NASCAR's formal results into the death of Dale Earnhardt, is scheduled for release Aug. 21. Hopefully, by the beginning of the 2002 season, additional driver safety related measures could be in place.

Season finale leaving Atlanta

New season, for the first time since 1986, Atlanta Motor Speedway will not host the finale race of the Winston Cup season.

Atlanta's fall Winston Cup race in the 2002 season will be held on Sunday, Oct. 27, three weeks earlier than usual.

Currently, NASCAR's Grand National Series ends its season at Homestead-Miami Speedway. Having the Winston Cup season end the same weekend would provide for a "championship weekend" of sorts.

The loser of hosting the final race of the season has been lost in recent years as drivers clinched their Winston Cup titles before the series reached Atlanta. The last driver to clinch a Winston Cup title at Atlanta was Jeff Gordon in 1997, when he won his second championship by 14 points over Dale Jarrett.

NASCAR has not released the official 2002 Winston Cup schedule, but most of the tracks have been given their 2002 schedule. The season will start Feb. 10 with the Budweiser Shootout at Daytona, followed by the Daytona 500 on Feb. 17, Darlington (Feb. 24), Las Vegas (March 3), Atlanta (March 10), Texas (March 17), Bristol (March 24), Talladega (April 7), Martinsville (April 14), Rockingham (April 21), California (April 28), Richmond (May 4), Winston all-star race in Charlotte (May 11), Coca-Cola 600 at Charlotte (May 26), Dover (June 2), Pocono (June 9), Michigan (June 16), Sears Point (June 23), Daytona (July 6), Chicagoland (July 14), New Hampshire (July 21), Pocono (July 28), Indianapolis (Aug. 4), Watkins Glen (Aug. 11), Michigan (Aug. 18), Bristol (Aug. 24), Darlington (Sept. 1), Richmond (Sept. 7), New Hampshire (Sept. 15), Dover (Sept. 22), Kansas City (Sept. 29), Talladega (Oct. 6), Charlotte (Oct. 13), Atlanta (Oct. 27), Rockingham (Nov. 3), Phoenix (Nov. 10), Homestead (Nov. 17).

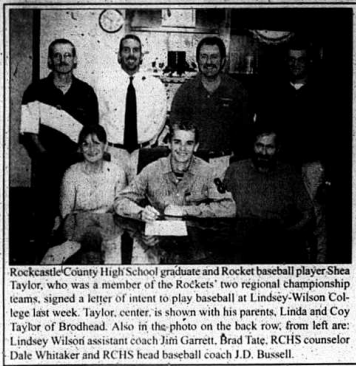

had to go to the "out house" in snow or rain to use the pot.

For me the worst thing about it was there was not room for two of us to use that one hole at the same time. We two older girls had always gone to the outside toilet together. That was where we could talk, titter about funny things, complain about too much work or the mean tricks our brothers played on us. I guess that was where and when I learned what a wonderful sister I had. My big sister, Polla, giggled as she taught me how to pull up my drawers over the long underwear we had to wear till the first day of May. And how to keep my long Stockings up over the same long underwear. Her caring and always ready guide made everything easier. The sound of her voice, especially when she was singing, could calm a fretting child or charm a fussing bunch of siblings into order. We all loved her dearly and obeyed her every wish.

Now that we were big girls we enjoyed the new found privacy of being alone when we undressed and bathed. Mom had not been well since Katie was born so Polla was big sister and mother to the rest of us and I was second mate. A few short years

later Polla got married and I grew up. Dad got a promotion and again the family moved, this time to Cincinnati, Ohio. Other chapters in my life were yet to come.

I finally met and chose the man I would love honor and fuss with till death do us part, as it did in 1983. Madison S. Graves, "Mad" was born and bred in Kentucky and as most everyone knows, any one who has ever had their feet dirtied with Kentucky soil can never be free of it, so when Judy, our first born, was five months old we loaded up an old Ford truck and headed for, what is known by all those who tried city life for awhile, HOME. To Mt. Mat meant Buffalo, in Rockcastle County. To me it meant a strange new place to make a home, make a family and learn how to make do with things I had never dreamed of before. When one pioneers an area in what to me was a wilderness, there are none of the things one believed to be necessary. Water had to be located from what would later be called the spring, then carried to the house in a bucket. The tumbling down log cabin had to be emptied of the collection of filth left by stragglers passing by and cleaned before we could even put a bed to sleep in. And there certainly was no "necessary room" out house, or toilet to be found anywhere. But there was space aplenty under the bushes. To my amazement many of the local people were still in that phase of living.

We built our house that summer and moved into it. It took awhile, before, and with the help of my brother, Bud, visiting from Ohio, we had a nice little "necessary room," built with a bench, two holes and a door for privacy. It also had a rack for toilet paper and space for a Sears catalog, if and when needed. I felt like I had stepped up one rung of the ladder to a more civilized life style. Since we were now living in the new house we built from scratch and a necessary room at the end of the path

leading past a clump of bushes that would soon be cleared for a garden. I had neither goal, a bathroom. But first we must get the electric company into getting lines to the farm, a well drilled to furnish more water and money to do all with. With some coaxing and explaining the need for electric we got it and not only for us, but for the whole community. I got a job so the well was drilled. First thing was a water line to the wash house and we had a shower installed. About thirty years later when Mat was building an addition onto the house we finally had a bathroom. My goal had been reached.

The old toilet, out house, or necessary room, built 50 years ago, along with memories of earlier days when it was a blessing to me but dreaded by those who had never used or seen one before has long been gone, but not forgotten.

So the house, in its place is a pile of ashes covering the memories and heartbeat of the family born and raised under the roof that sheltered them all their life. Now there is a new "John" in almost the same place as the old toilet and still serving the same purpose. Chuck and Polly built it when they turned the old wash house into a retreat for their use when they want to get away from the lights and confusion in town. They spend few nights on the porch and listen to the night birds go to bed, watch the humming birds feed and frets flicking their wings on and off the eaves.

The renovation of their lights on electricity for things that need it, but because of regulations not allowing water pipes to the house till the septic tank was rebuilt they still carry water from the well and use the "john" or "necessary room" out back. It is located at the end of a well worn path, in the shade of young trees that frame it with a glorious mixture of color when the cool breezes of autumn blow the summer sun away.

sure of lands via standard signs like those used in upstate New York "Wildlife Safety Zone" areas where citizen patrolling is in effect. Any anonymous donor offered to design and pay for standard yellow signs and give those to cooperating landholders in the affected region.

Organizing efforts through existing organizations such as the local

Rockcastle River Rebirth and, if necessary, to take legal action to see that enforcement occurs. This has been suggested by several state environmental groups who had representative present.

Work with the state tourist agencies to show that the leakage (amount of money going outside a targeted tourist area) is one of the highest in the country and especially in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Leakage means that little money is coming into the region through outside ORV riders because equipment and much of the supplies are purchased outside of the area. Dwayne Singleton, 37, of Mt. Vernon, entered a plea of guilty in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

According to Montgomery, on April 4, of this year, Singleton was attempting to elude Mt. Vernon Police Chief Bill Mink on Richmond Street, when he struck a vehicle being driven by Garner Mink, also of Mt. Vernon, head on. Immediately following the impact, Singleton exited his vehicle and began to run in an attempt to flee from police officers. Singleton was captured by officers and charged with several felonies. He was later taken to the hospital for treatment and while being treated at the hospital, Singleton once again fled from officers.

After several days of eluding police officers Singleton turned himself in at the Rockcastle Sheriff's office.

lines to unserved areas, Rogers said. The goal is to eliminate more than 15,000-40 percent of the 36,000 documented straight pipes.

Another 40 percent of the state's straight pipes already have been targeted by a combination of previous PRIDE loans, the Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers, officials said. Straight pipes usually are installed by people who can't afford septic systems - which cost about \$2,500 - or who live on land where installing a system or hooking on to a public sewer system is difficult.

Under the new program, homeowners can contact their local health department to begin the grant application process. If their income falls under HUD poverty guidelines, they will be eligible for grants to cover the cost of installing a septic system, according to Carroll.

In another action announced yesterday, officials said an undetermined amount of money will be used to forgive loans already made to people to install septic systems.

Since April 1999, PRIDE has awarded more than \$7 million in low-interest loans to more than 3,000 homeowners. The average monthly payment ranges from \$12 to \$30, but half of the loan recipients are currently in default because they can't afford the payment, Rogers said. Some of those loans were made in Rockcastle.

"We've got to help the poorest of the poor," Rogers said. "That burden will soon be lifted."

Under the program, those who are current on their payments will have their loans forgiven. Home owners who are behind on payments can have their loans forgiven once they catch up on their payments.

PRIDE officials will be contacting those eligible for the program. Meanwhile, Kentucky's top environmental official said the state will start cranking down on those who have straight pipes.

"We are not going to back off on anybody for any reason," said Bickford, Kentucky Natural Resources. "Folks, we're not going to tolerate it any more. It's going to stop."

Beef tour to Montana

Nineteen Rockcastle County Beef Cattle Association and Young Farmers Association members visited ranches in Montana July 17-22 to learn about beef cattle production in Big Sky Country. At Leachman's, which is noted as the world's largest seed stock producer, the group looked over 1200 bulls available for sale. This fall over 5000 will be grouped in Leachman's feed yard and auctioned in their special sale. A visit to the Bridger USDA Plant Materials Center allowed the group to see forage and wildlife plots. Beef cattle production, as well as tourism from hunting, is a big source of income in Montana and the Center research develops plans for both.

A visit to Bearfoot International Angus Ranch in Harrison, Montana found a Kentucky connection. Farm manager, John Carroll, showed the group an Angus bull used at Boyd's Angus in Maysville last fall and shipped back to Montana for the spring-breeding season. A visit to the High Country to see cows and calves, found 3 cowboys holding 300 momma cows plus their calves standing in a 600 to 800 acre mountain pasture. John showed the group calves from several of their top bulls.

At Willow Creek, the group visited Cooper Hereford to see a herd with a breeding line which has been closed since the mid 1940's. To everyone's surprise, this horned Hereford ranch

had some of the best cattle our group viewed. Just looking at the call crop and replacement heifers showed how serious Montana beef producers are about improved genetics.

Bobby Sitz at Sitz Angus gave a tour of the cow herd as well as sharing information on bulls they have placed in 4 different AI studs.

Sitz is the third largest seed stock producer in the U.S. and, as do most of the ranches visited, have special sales to market their top bulls and replacement heifers. Farmers on the tour found that with an Internet connection, viewing livestock for sale and sale catalogs are just a click away.

A visit to Ed and Beverly Billingsly's commercial operation topped most everyone's list as best stop. Setting under cottonwood trees in the Billingsly's back yard, Ed shared how water rights and irrigation changed the Montana desert land into farm land. Ed discussed the day-to-day farm activities he and the local ranchers do in their cattle operation.

Other sight seeing included a tour by Extension Agriculture Agent, Cameron Clark around the tobacco root loop, Virginia City and Enis. The group caught a rodeo in Cody, Wyoming and one day in Yellowstone National Park to round out a once-in-a-lifetime trip.



County Committee Election Coming Soon

Coming August 1, 2001 the local FSA office will begin accepting nominations for the upcoming election to be held December 3, 2001.

Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. They help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will run. They make FSA agricultural programs fit the needs of local producers.

Nomination forms must be received in the local FSA office by October 29th.

Missed the Deadline??
New legislation required all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to file an initial designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market their tobacco from FSA 808 by the deadline of August 1, 2001.

The next designation period for the 2001-2002 marketing season will begin October 1, 2001 and end on October 1, 2001.

Farmers are required to inform FSA of the warehouse number where they will market their tobacco. Please note the FSA 808 will indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the marketing card, you must return that card to the FSA office and request another marketing card. Remember, the marketing cards are warehouse specific.

2001 Phase II Compensation Plan
The 2001 Phase II Compensation Plan will be based on USDA-FSA records of quota ownership as of July 1, 2000. OR the final lease and transfer date as determined by USDA-FSA, and based on the number of quota pounds owned for crop year 2000.

Compensation for the growing farm and grower/tenant portion will be limited to those individuals who had a vested interest in tobacco production in 1998 and/or 1999 and/or 2000, and defined in previous compensation plans. Compensation from the Trust would be made only for the years in which an applicant had a vested interest in tobacco production, as defined under previous compensation plans.

Application should be mailed to crop year 2000 farm operators on or about August 6-10 with the applica-

tion deadline of September 15th. UK College of Agriculture has a Phase II Payment Estimator software website at <http://www.uky.edu/Agriculture/TobaccoEcon/settlement.html>.

Producers who need help in the completion of these forms should contact the local County Extension Office or the Farm Service Agency.

GRAZED 2001 WHEAT, BARLEY, OATS (GRAZE-OUT)

The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000 provides "LDP-like" payments on grazed acreages. Crop year 2001 producers of wheat, oats and barley on a farm with a production flexibility contract who graze the acreage will receive a payment under the same terms and conditions as a producer who harvests a crop and applies for a loan deficiency payment.

GRAZE-OUT is available to producers who are otherwise eligible for marketing assistance loans and LDP's producers enrolled in the Production Flexibility Program (PFC), graze 2001 crop acreage planted to wheat, barley or oats, do not harvest the same crop on the same acreage.

Regulations for GRAZE-OUT are available on the FSD home page at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/dlp/pnd>.

The deadline for accepting applications for GRAZE-OUT is August 31, 2001.

Becoming a Non-Smoker is Difficult

"I want you to help me stop smoking," Gene told me. (All characters are fictitious.) Gene had smoked for thirty years and was up to 2 packs per day. "I've tried to quit on my own," he confessed, "but I can't seem to do it."

I told Gene that I needed more information before I would know if I could help. "Tell me about the stress in your life these days," I asked him. He began to paint a picture for me of a man under a tremendous amount of pressure. Here is a partial list of what Gene told me:

1. His oldest child (a daughter) has just left home to attend college.

2. His wife is going back to school after fifteen years at home.

3. The business that he owns is growing by leaps and bounds.

4. His father (to whom he had always been very close) died three months ago.

5. His youngest child (a son, 15) is angry and resentful most of the time.

6. He and his wife have talked of divorce for the first time in their marriage; and

7. His mother-in-law has moved in with them because she can no longer take care of herself.

Gene recounted the list very quietly and without much emotion. As I listened to Gene I am certain my face showed amazement and I (hope) sympathy.

"Did you realize how much stress you are under?" I asked him when he finished. "You are the most stressed out man I have talked to in months! No wonder you are smoking more."

"I guess I have never really made a list of my stresses before," he re-

sponded. "I didn't realize how long the list was."

"Finding a way to decrease your stress level," I continued, "will help you stop smoking. Which of these things is causing you the most stress?"

"My wife and my mother-in-law," he answered quickly. "My wife thinks she wants a divorce, but now she's moved her mother into our house. She didn't really ask me what I thought, she just did it. But I don't see anything that will help. She's not going to move her mother out just because I say that I'm feeling too much stress!"

I suggested to Gene the possibility of marriage counseling. He was reluctant at first. "I would feel really awkward talking about my marriage with my wife and a stranger," he said. Later he decided counseling was worth a try. "I'm desperate!"

"Reducing your stress level," I promised Gene, "will help you to quit smoking."

Gene is not alone in his struggle to stop smoking. The struggle can be a very difficult one. Smoking is a habit and an addiction. It becomes a part of the social fabric of the smoker's life.

The reasons for quitting, however, are stronger than ever. More and more research acknowledges the role smoking plays in disease. Even the tobacco companies are admitting that smoking can contribute to illness.

Lowering his stress level will help Gene quit, but that will probably not be all the battle. Medical help, such as the patch or Zyban, group support, hypnosis and behavior modification techniques may also help him quit.

Quitting is hard and Gene will need all the help he can get.

During the intensive one-week session students took classes in engineering, computer networking, video production and web page development. They received etiquette training to learn which fork to use and ballroom danced their way through a

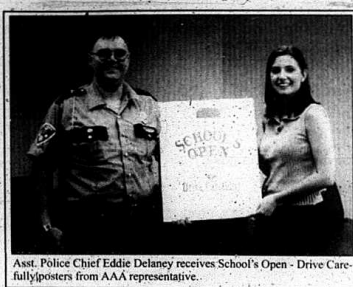
formal dinner. Students also participated in entrepreneurial training sessions, planned projects to take home to take communities and met with some of the most influential and interesting people of our time.

Since 1988, 237 school-age pedestrians have died in school bus-related crashes, half of them between ages of 5 and 7, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

"It's up to motorists to take extra precautions when driving in areas with school age children," says Lilla Mason, director of the AAA Blue Grass Safety Foundation. "Some of these kids have very little experience in traffic situations."

"The opening of school is very hectic for everyone," said Mason. "Children are excited to be going back to school and to their friends. Parents are trying to get to work and get their children to school on time. Often, they're distracted and may not be focused on traffic safety."

AAA's annual School's Open-Drive Carefully campaign alerts motorists to the special risks to school-age children. In the campaign, AAA emphasizes that driving carefully becomes even more your driving way.

"The key is to expect the unexpected," says Chief Mink. "There could be kids walking or biking to school, right behind you as you back

out of your driveway. When driving in school zones, near playgrounds, or in neighborhoods where children play, expect a child to dart out into the roadway. That way, you'll never be taken by surprise and be able to stop in time."

AAA reminds drivers that children are not small adults. It's difficult for them to judge traffic situations because their peripheral vision is one-third narrower than an adult's. Children may also mistakenly assume that if they can see a car, the driver can see them.

To help protect children, AAA urges motorists to follow these safety tips:

- Slow down in or near school and residential areas.
- Drive with your headlights on, even during the day, so kids and other drivers can see you.
- Look for clues such as School Safety Patrols, bicycles and playgrounds that indicate children could be in the area.
- Scan between parked cars and other objects for signs that kids could dart out into the road.
- Practice extra caution in bad weather.
- Always stop for school buses that are loading or unloading students.
- Remember, back to school means back to basic driver safety," concluded Mason. "School's open, drive carefully."

Health and safety tips for back to school

The school buses are rolling again throughout Kentucky as students return to classes.

The Cabinet for Health Services wants to make sure all children have a healthy and safe school experience. One of the best ways to help children be healthy is to make sure they have health insurance.

"A child's health is a major factor in the success in school," said Gov. Paul Patton. "The KIDS NOW initiatives aimed at the early childhood years are improving the health of Kentucky families and are benefiting children across the state."

The cabinet offers a health insurance program for uninsured children. The Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program - KCHIP - provides health coverage for uninsured children up to age 19 based on family income and size. Children in a family of four with annual income of \$35,300 or less can qualify.

The application process is easy and applications can be obtained at your local health department, your local Family Resource and Youth Services Center, or the local Department for Community Based Services office. You can also have an application mailed to you by calling toll-free 1-877-KCHIP-18. For the hearing impaired call 1-877-KCHIP-19. Spanish-speaking callers may call 1-800-662-5397.

Here are some other back-to-school tips that can help keep your children healthy and safe.

- Make sure your child's immunizations are up to date. August is National Immunization Awareness Month. Immunizations protect your child and others from serious, life-threatening infections. Starting this year, children ages 19 months to 7 years old who attend school or day care are required to have the Haccella (chickenpox) vaccine unless they've already had the illness. Also, sixth grade students must have at least three doses of Hepatitis B vaccine.

(Note: Because of shortages of tetanus vaccines, children who are

scheduled to get tetanus/diphtheria boosters of the fourth dose of diphtheria/tetanus and pertussis may have them deferred until 2002. If so, provisional certificates will be issued for this school year.)

A state program, part of the governor's Early Childhood Initiative, called KIDS NOW, helps pay for vaccines for children whose insurance does not cover immunizations.

- Watch for drastic changes in grades or behavior. Be on the lookout for drug use or other inappropriate behavior. If you think your child is using tobacco, try to get them to stop. Most importantly, talk to your child about school and other parts of their life.

- If your child walks to school or rides the bus, make sure they know the safety rules about where to cross the street and appropriate behavior on the bus. When you drive near a school, obey the traffic laws and be on the look out for children.

- Eye exams are required for those students entering school for the first time. There is a state program, part of the governor's Early Childhood Initiative called KIDS NOW, to assist families to pay for these exams if your insurance does not cover exams and you fall within certain income guidelines. For more information call the Commission for Children With Special Health Care Needs at 1-800-232-1160.

- Be sure your child knows his or her phone number (including area code) and address, your work number, the number of another trusted adult, and how to use 911 for emergencies. Make sure your child has enough change to make a phone call or they carry a telephone calling card.

- If your child has an allergy to a food or drug, please notify the school and ask that this information be placed in his/her records and inform the teacher.

RHRCC offering free cholesterol tests

If you've been wondering about your cholesterol levels, now is the time to find out where you stand. Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, Inc. is offering free cholesterol tests at the hospital lab August 27-31.

No appointment is necessary, but participants should fast at least 12 hours before their test. Results will be sent to participants' primary care doctors if they are affiliated with RHRCC. Participants whose physicians are not affiliated with RHRCC will need to pick up their results. The

free test is a \$70 value.

"It's important to understand how cholesterol affects your health," said Lee Keene, RHRCC president. "That's why we're also offering information on cholesterol from the American Heart Association total welcome in for a free test."

Although there is plenty of information available about cholesterol, it can be confusing. The basic principle is simple - too much cholesterol in the blood is among the top factors for heart disease. The other three are smoking, high blood pressure and lack of exercise.

Cholesterol is a soft, fat-like substance that is found in all body tissues. Blood cholesterol levels are determined by genetic makeup and by the amount of fat in the diet.

The two types of cholesterol that most often make the news are low-density lipoprotein (LDL) and high-density lipoprotein (HDL). LDL is considered "bad" cholesterol because it slowly builds up in the artery walls. Together with other substances, LDL can form plaque, a thick, hard deposit that restricts blood flow through the arteries, which can result in a heart attack or stroke.

HDL is called "good" cholesterol because it not only carries cholesterol away from the arteries and back to the liver, where it's removed from the body, but it also sweeps away the bad cholesterol.

According to the American Heart Association, approximately 52 percent of adult Americans have borderline high blood cholesterol and 20 percent have high cholesterol levels. The American Heart Association recommends the following guidelines for keeping cholesterol levels low:

"If you are a healthy adult over 20, test your blood cholesterol levels at least once every five years.

"Eat no more than 300 milligrams of cholesterol a day. (One egg yolk has about 213 milligrams of cholesterol.)

Limit your total fat intake to less than 30 percent of calories, with less

than 10 percent coming from saturated fats. You can accomplish this by choosing more fruits, vegetables and whole grains; eating fish, poultry without skin and lean meats; and consuming low-fat or skim milk dairy products.

Community Walking Program

Cumberland Valley District Health Department

The Community Walking Program is for all residents of Rockcastle County who are interested in improving their health. The goal of the program is to walk a minimum of three days a week for thirty minutes or ideally, five days a week for thirty minutes. The program will have a 12-week fall and a 12-week spring session. Participants who complete the program and turn in their walking logs will be eligible to receive incentives or prizes.

Participants will register at the Rockcastle County Health Department. Each person will receive a registration packet with a walking log-book to track their time or mileage. At the time of registration, walkers can have their weight, blood pressure, and pulse recorded. In addition, optional body measurements, such as: circumference of waist, hips and thighs, and arms can also be recorded. These body measurements can provide the walker valuable information and encouragement as they see positive changes in your body with a consistent exercise program. Follow-up measurements will be offered at the end of the program. Walking will be done at each individual's convenience, wherever he or she desires, and a treadmill is acceptable or walkers will be invited to walk as a group with a health department staff member at announced locations. Mileage or time will be documented on the honor system. At the end of the program, walkers that complete the program will be eligible to receive incentives and recognition for their outstanding effort!

Kids, however, are excited to be out of school. As frustrating as it may be, keep your temper. Being two minutes late for dinner won't kill you or anyone else. Rushing just might.

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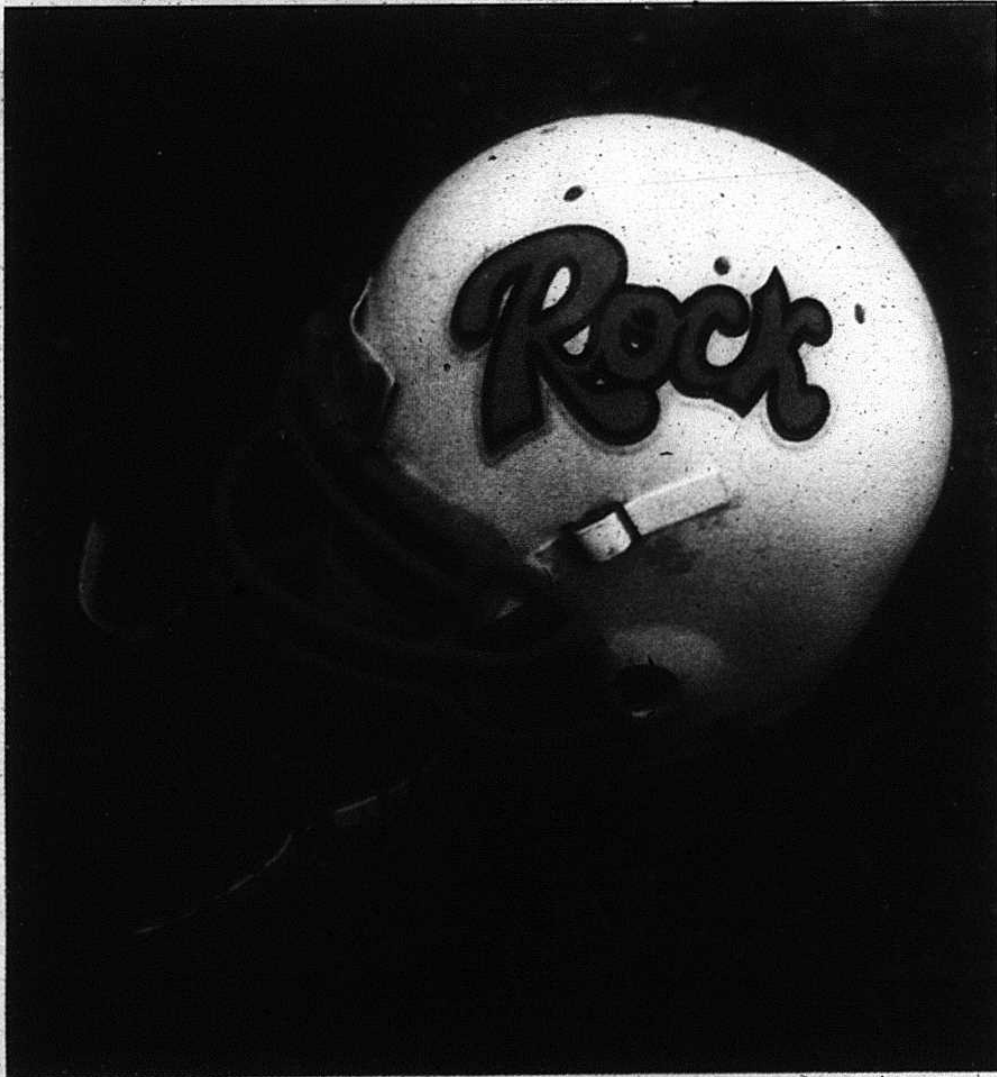

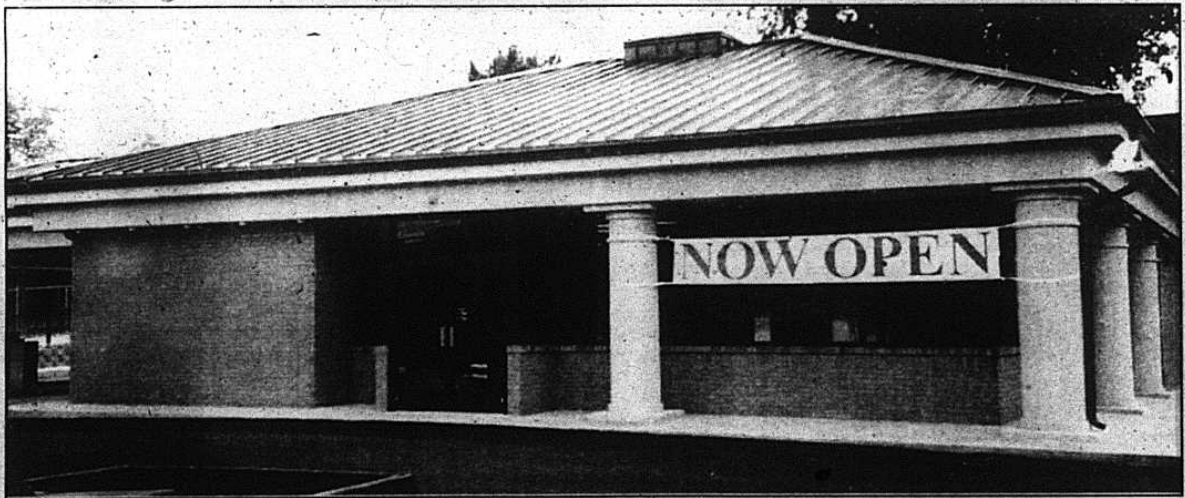

How hard will it be for the Rockcastle County Rockets of 2001 to repeat as Regional Champs - win 13 straight games and make it to the final four teams in Class 3A?

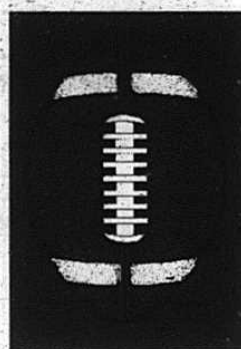

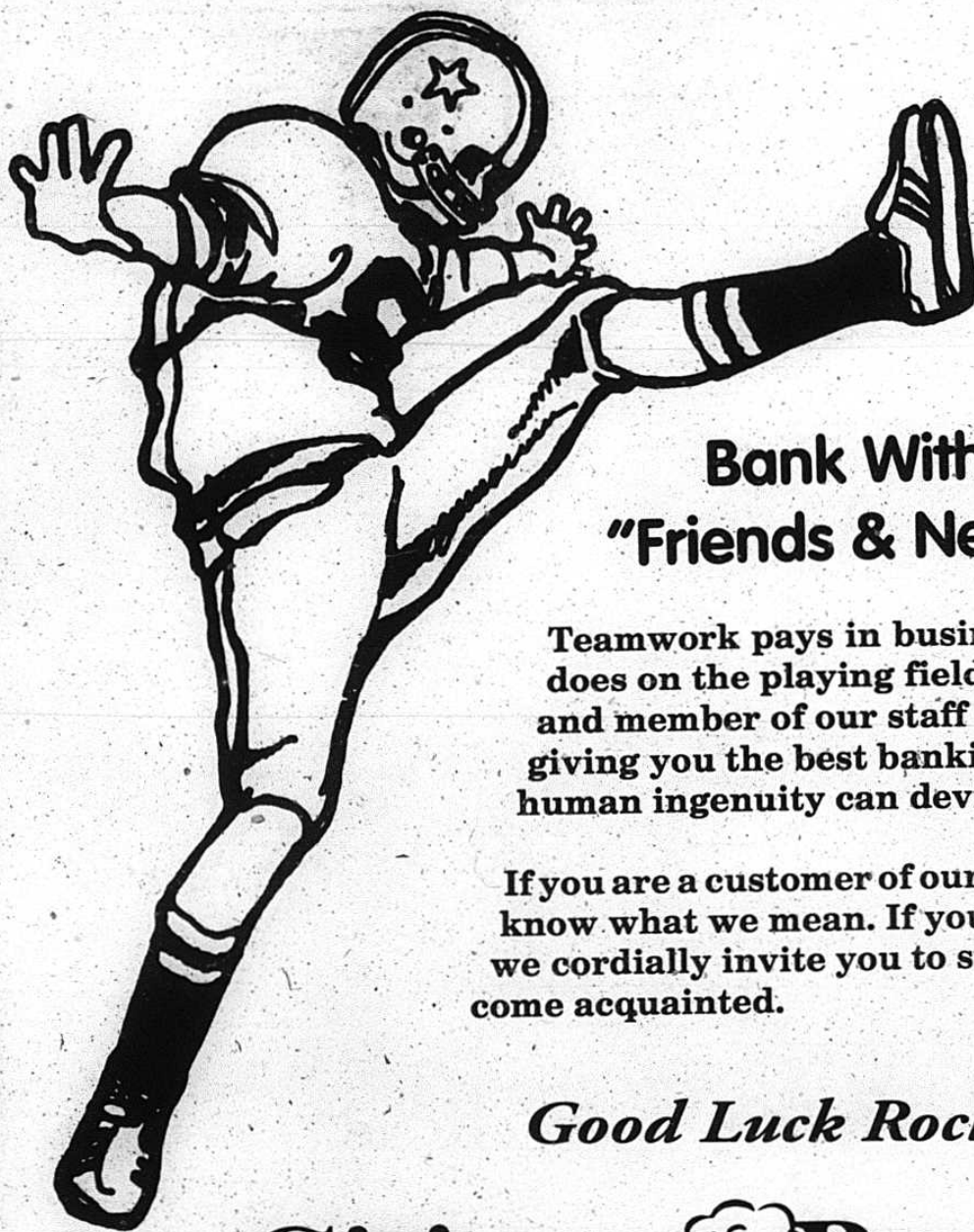

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Early games will be toughest part of Rocket schedule this season

The Rockcastle County Rockets of 2001 have a lot of questions to answer on both sides of the ball.

And they have a lot to live up to if they are going to even come close to the mark the team set a year ago.

After the first weeks of the season the Rockets will have a very good idea how they are going to stack and most of the unanswered questions will be penciled in.

"It is always tough up there, and with it being a Bowl game - we will have our work cut out for us," Larkey said.

The Bobcats are also a passing team, who throws the ball more than they run it in most contests.

It will be the first time the Rockets have hooked up with Breathitt County.

Week four the Rockets will return home to take on Lincoln County in the Renfro Valley Boreore Bowl.

The Rockets defeated Lincoln County last year in a game played in Stanford on opening night 24-14.

The Rockets defeated Lincoln County last year primarily because they were in better physical condition, but Lincoln County is a team that usually plays themselves into shape and with it being week four-

the Rockets will have their hands full.

Week five the Rockets will return to Estill County where they will take on the Engineers.

Except for a couple of seasons in the past the Rockets have dominated the Engineers

and last year they totally dismantled them on their own homecoming night.

Saylor said that Estill would be much improved because they were so young a year ago and because they have some

new members on their coaching staff.

One of those members is former Rocket player and assistant coach Johnny Poynter, who has taken over the defense, at Estill.

Week six the Rockets are open and on week seven they will begin district play when Knott County Central comes to the ROCK.

Rockcastle defeated them by 80 points last year.

The Rockets will travel to Perry County Central in Hazard on week eight.

Perry County Central has replaced Whitley County in the Rockets' district and should be a fairly easy opponent for the ROCK.

Week nine the Knox Central Panthers come to the ROCK.

Knox Central has been down for several years, but Saylor said they should be better this year because they too had a lot of young players last season.

Cawood will be the last home game of the season in week ten on Oct. 19th and should be much better than they were a year ago.

"Cawood had a new quarterback and some new members on their coaching staff as well," Saylor said.

The Rockets will find themselves in Middlesboro the last week of the season to take on Bell County.

The Rockets defeated Bell County last year at home, but they have never beaten Dudley Hilton, the Bell County coach who left for a few years and

went to Bourbon County.

Hilton has returned to the Bobcats and they should be Rockcastle's toughest district opponent.

Rockcastle has been picked to win the district by most, but according to Larkey, no one knows what will happen during the eleven weeks of a high school football season.

"We've just got to work hard and take each opponent one game at a time," he said.

Larkey said that he also felt like the other teams in the Rockets' region, Sheldon Clark, Lawrence County, Ashland, Greenup County, Magoffin County, Boyd County, Johnson Central and Rowan County were much improved from a year ago.

Except for the Washington County game, all regular season games will begin at 7:30 p.m.

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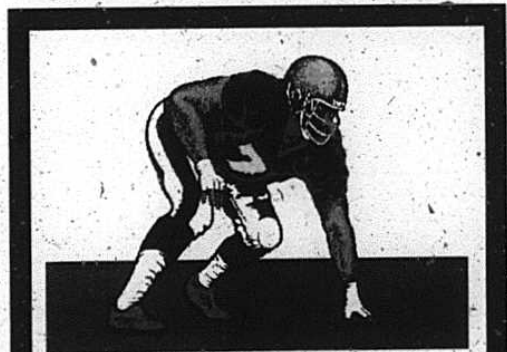

sophomore Devon Bussell will play at tight end.

Junior P.J. Rowe and Hale will also play in the Rocket backfield from time to time.

Senior Coty Reams will also spell Hale at wide-receiver and will play that position when Hale is in the backfield.

On the defensive side of the

ball, coach Saylor has to replace an all-state defensive back in Derrick Bussell and the school's all-time leading tackler in middle linebacker, Travis Ingram.

Besides those two, both outside linebackers, Sean Smith and Greg Harper must be replaced and defensive lineman Dackery Larkey is also gone.

Saylor has made some adjustments and moved some people around on his defensive

squad.

Saylor will have three new linebackers when his squad takes the field against Washington County.

William Blair has moved from nose guard to middle linebacker.
