Federal money made available to fight straight line pipe use

Rockeastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis announced yesterday that millions of federal dollars will go to poor Eastern Kentuckians, in-cluding Rockeastle residents, to help eliminate straight pipes and to for-give loans already used to build sep-

give loans already used to butto sep-tie systems.

Carloftis and Solid Waste Coor-dinator Don Coyle attended a meet-ing on Tuesday morning, in which the program was taid out in detail by U.S. Congressiman Harold Rogers and Kethicky Natural Resource and En-vironhenial Protection Cabinet Sec-retary James Bickford.

The money will be allocated through PRIDE, a government-spon-sored environmental organization started by Rogers in 1957 to help bean up 40 Kentacky countes, in-cluding Rocketauthe.

samed by Roges in 1997 to help-clean up 40 Kentacky counties, in-cluding Rockcastle.

"As of today, no one has an ex-case for dumping their individual sewage in a nearby creek. Rogers said during a teleconference to an-nounce the fanding.

Carlotis told the court that 59 million in grant money will help bu-income people replace straight pipes, which allow rim sewage to go di-rectly from homes to waterways.

Those who qualify will get sep-tic systems or be hooked to sewer systems.

ne systems or be noticed to sever systems. Said that Rogers did not say what the maximum amount would be the maximum amount would be the said that the said that the really did not say how much money the federal government would allow to be spent on any one certain system. Carlottis said.

Over 36,000 straight line pipes and failing septic systems have been identified in 40 counties in eastern Kenucky.

The Judge said that the 36,000 problems were located by the gov-ernment via satellite, but that he would not know until Friday, how many of the 36,000 systems are in Rockcastle County.

Another \$15 million in grants will go to such systems to extend (Cont. to A8)



Autoliv, a Swedish m of safety equipment, madé a formál proposal in early May to car owners, drivers and NASCAR officials to focus on improvements to the driver mpartment. The company invited all of the

major racing feams in the sport to near its initial presentation in May in Charlotte, N.C., though only a dozen

Charlotte, N.C., mough only a dozen showed up.
While all of the things Autoliv demonstrated would contribute to lowering the injury value numbers, there is no rush to incorporate them into the present NASCAR safety re-quirements.

Teams simply haven't budgeted for safety testing, and NASCAR isn't ready to order any design changes to

ready to order any design changes to the cars.

"In the past, there hasn't been any formalized process, even though there's been a tremendous emphasis on safety," said Jim Hunter of Lowe's Motor Speedway. "Everybody has

been out sort of doing their own thing. NASCAR's role in this process is to formalize it and figure out who pays and how much." Meanwhile, NASCAR has yet to mandate either of the driver head-re-straint devices, even though 75 per-cent of Winston Cup drivers are now using one.

A new school year is beginning and Mt. Vernon Police Chief Will-iam Mink and the Blue Grass Auto Club Safety Foundation remind mo-torists that "School's Open-Drive Carefulus." Carefully.

Since 1988, 237 school-age pedestrians have died in school bus-related crashes, half of them between ages of 5 and 7, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety

Parents are trying to get to work and set their children in oschool on time. Often, hey're distracted and may not set the children to school on time. 

Community Walking Program Cumberland Valley District Health

The Community Walking Program is for all residents of Rockcastle County who are interested in improving their health. The goal of the program is to walk a minimum of three days a week for thirty minutes or ideally, five days a week for thirty minutes. The program will have a 12-week fall and a 12-week spring session. Participants who complete the program and turn in their walking logs will exhibite, are given representations.

Participants will register at the Rockcastle County Health Department. Each person will receive a registration packet with and a walking log-book to track their time or minage. "At the time of registration, walkers can have their flight, weight, blood pressure, and pulse recorded. In addition, optional body measurements, such as: circumference of waist, higher and thighs, and arms can also be recorded. These body measurements in provide the walker valuable information and encouragement as you see positive changes in your body with a consistent exercise program. Follow-up measurements will be offered at the end of the program. Walking will be done at each individual's convenience, wherever he or she desires, and a treadmill is acceptable or walkers will be invited to walk as a group with a health department staff member at announced locations. Mileage or time will be documented on the honor system. At the end of the program, walkers that complete the program will be eligible to receive incentives and recognition for their outstanding effort!

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
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2001 Rockets have a lot to live up to



Except for the Washington County game, all regular season games will begin at 7:30


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
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
