State inspectors give approval Brodhead students will go to school on Monday morning

Rockcastle County School officials announced Wednesday afternoon, that school would start at the county's newest elementary school on Monday.

Finance officer Richard Bray said that state building inspectors had given the school system a temporary certificate of occupancy, after an inspection of the new building on Wednesday morning.

School was delayed eight school days at Brodhead because construction on the \$6 million facility was not completed.

Students will begin classes on Monday morning.

Teachers and other personnel have been working in the facility since school began for the rest of the system last week.

"We've still got a lot of work to do before Sunday when parents and students are invited to the school - but we will be ready for school at Brodhead on Monday," Bray said.

Brodhead Principal Caroline Graves cautioned Brodhead area residents that Sunday was not an open house.

"It is simply an event for parents, students and teachers," she said.

Mrs. Graves said an open house at the school would be held later in the school year - when the building

was completely finished.

"Just about everything, except for the gymnasium is already completed at the school," Bray said.

"We've mainly just got some loose ends to finish before Sunday," he said.

Superintendent Larry Hammond said that Brodhead students would not be required to go eight days longer than other students in the system, because Brodhead already goes a longer school day than they are required to by law.

The extra time in Brodhead's daily schedule will allow for them to make up their eight days during the school year and get out next Spring when everyone else does.

Renfro Valley is "Ky's Best Kept Secret"

When the world famous Stutler Brothers take the stage at Renfro Valley on Thursday night - they will be one of many big name acts who have entertained there this year.

But Renfro Valley has much more to offer than just big name acts such as the Stutler Brothers, George Jones and Loretta Lynn.

They also provide a stage for area artists, who show off their talents in the historic Barn Dance and Jamboree shows held each week in the Valley.

The two shows are the best known by far to visitors in the valley and to the many local residents who go to the valley on a regular basis, but over the years the Renfro Valley staff has also developed other entertaining shows.

From May to October, MASAL (Music, Singing and Laughter) is held on Wednesday nights at 7:00 p.m.

April through October the CLASSIC Country Show is held on Thursday night's at 7 p.m. and, of course, March through November the Barn Dance and Jamboree Shows are held.

Gospel music is also a big attraction in the valley with the Saturday Mountain Jubilee being held March through December. There are also numerous special gospel concerts held each year, with the biggest frames

in Gospel Music showing off their talents in the Valley.

"We like to say we are Kentucky's best kept secret," said Jane Thorne, General Manager in the Valley for the past several years.

"We have a lot to offer the public, entertainment-wise, but we also have a lot of other things to be proud of as well," she said.

Renfro is in its 62nd year and crowds are better than ever.

Besides the weekly entertainment, Renfro Valley also offers historical tours, shopping, a full-service RV Park, facilities for picnics, meetings and even a wedding chapel.

Tours of the Bittersweet Historical Cabins are also available. The authentic Kentucky Log Cabins recapture the charm of Appalachia and give visitors a first hand look at the lifestyles of early settlers.

Renfro Valley is in its first year of new management and Thorne believes the Hall of Fame board, which now operates the Valley, has done a very good job of continuing to move the Valley in a positive direction.

Thorne is also proud of the number of quality shops that are located in the Village.

The Village shops are open at different times, but some of the stores are open seven days a week.

Apply now for free septic systems

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has received federal grant applications for a new program that will pay 100 percent of the cost of installing and replacing septic systems in the county.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carlofitis said the program is part of the PRIDE program, which is headed by U.S. Congressman Harold Rogers of Somerset.

The goal of the new program is to replace inadequate systems and to build new systems to replace straight line pipes which allow raw sewage to run into the ground.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court wants an assessment of the number of homes wanting the free septic systems by October 5.

Carlofitis said priority would be given to homes that are grouped closely together in the first round of funding.

The determination of who will be picked and who will not will be made by the PRIDE office in Somerset. \$9 million has been set aside for the first round of funding.

Blood Drive

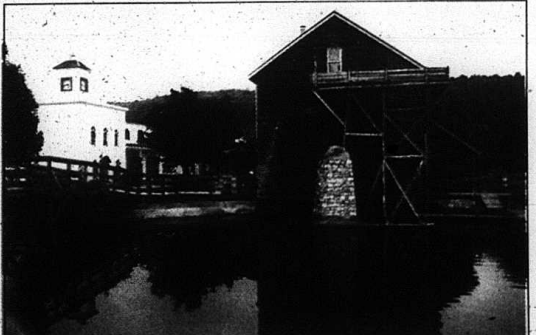

Use proper garden crops to can homemade salsa

Do you want to carry the delicious taste of vegetables fresh from the garden into the cold winter months? One easy way is to use tomatoes, green and banana peppers, and onions from the garden to make salsa your family can enjoy all year. Homemade salsa is low in calories and has no fat. Plus, you can use it in a variety of ways - baked over pork, chicken or fish, as a marinade for these grilled entrees, or a dip for vegetables and chips.

- Making canned salsa is quick and easy.
- Canned Salsa
- 10 cups (about 6 pounds) peeled, core, chopped red-ripe tomatoes
- 2 cups (about 2 pounds) seeded, chopped green peppers
- 2 cups (about 1 and 1/2 pounds) chopped onion
- 1 1/4 cups (about 1/2 a pound) seeded, chopped banana peppers
- 1 1/4 cups (about 1/2 pound) seeded, chopped hot peppers
- 1 1/4 cups cider vinegar
- 2 tablespoons cilantro, minced
- 3 teaspoons salt

a boiling water bath. Yield: six pints. Nutritional analysis: 25 calories, 1 gram protein, 6 grams carbohydrates, and 0 grams fat per one-fourth cup.

To increase the hotness, or bite, of this mild version of salsa, replace banana peppers with hot peppers. You also can add one teaspoon of hot pepper sauce.

Remember to always wear rubber gloves when working with hot peppers because they contain a chemical that causes a burning sensation on the skin surface when exposed to air. If you forget gloves, these procedures might help:

- Soak your hands in warm soapy water for 30 minutes. Then soak them for 20 minutes in a solution of one cup vinegar and one quart of cold water. If you still have a burning sensation on your hands, coat them with vegetable oil or spray with a benzocaine or Xylocaine preparation. If neither procedure alleviates the burning, run cold water over your hands to keep air from getting to them. Time really is the only cure for the burning sensation felt from this common mistake.

Recycling Committee. Even during the busy season the few extra minutes it takes to rinse empty containers is time well spent.

Rockcastle kicks off Rinse and Return Recycling Program

The Rockcastle County Conservation District recently announced the 2001 kick-off for the Rinse and Return Plastic Container Recycling Program. They encourage all farmers, farm supply dealers and other pesticide users to participate in this exciting recycling program.

The Conservation District has scheduled collection dates and times for this year. The collection dates for Rockcastle will be September 6, 2001 at the USDA Service Center from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Individuals are encouraged to bring in their rinsed plastic pesticide containers where they will be inspected, run through a chipping machine and the material will be shipped to a facility to be reused in the manufacture of new pesticide containers.

How to participate: (1) Triple-rinse or pressure-rinse all containers when emptied. Remember, it's best to rinse containers immediately after they are emptied. Some pesticide residues solidify quickly, and become difficult to remove from the container if left in the jug. (2) Dispose of the pesticide caps and remove sleeves and labels from containers. The pesticide caps are made of a different plastic material that cannot be currently recycled. (3) Bring all properly rinsed, five gallon or smaller, plastic containers to the listed collection sites on the dates and times specified for your county. Keep empty containers in a dry, secure place until the collection date. Each empty pesticide container returned will be inspected to ensure it has been properly rinsed. Unrinsed containers will NOT be accepted.

*Proper rinsing of pesticide containers is easy to do, saves money and helps protect the environment," says Sandy Whitaker, local coordinator of the Rockcastle County Container

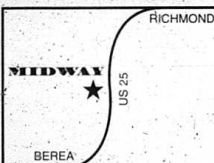

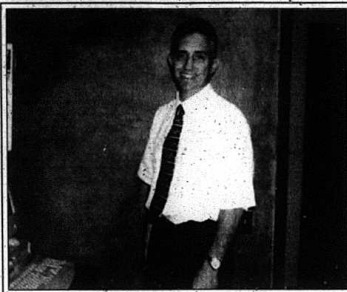

Local educators participate in National Curriculum Institute

Terry Parkey and Jason Coguer represented the Rockcastle County School system at the 2001 Summer Curriculum Alignment Institute sponsored by the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB). SREB, the nation's first interstate compact for education, was created in 1948 by Southern governors. SREB helps educational and governmental leaders work cooperatively to advance education and, in doing so, improve the region's social and economic life. The Summer Curriculum Alignment Institute was one of a series of professional development opportunities for educators participating in SREB's Making Schools Work school improvement initiative. Making Schools Work is designed to support schools in preparing all students to meet higher standards. Twenty-five school systems from seven states participated in Making Schools Work during the 2000-2001 academic year. The North Carolina Center for the

Advancement of Teaching (NCAT) in Cullowhee, North Carolina, was the site of the Mathematics Curriculum Institute. The Institute leaders were members of the SREB school improvement staff and Project 2061 of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) of Washington, D.C., an organization providing professional development for educators in the knowledge and skills they need to help their students meet the highest standards in science, mathematics and technology.

The purpose of the Mathematics Curriculum Institute was to provide time for educators to thoroughly examine their local school curriculum to make sure it supports high academic standards. Participants created a curriculum map and calendar, model lessons, sample assessments and a host of ideas for student assignment. The team representing Rockcastle County School system formulated an action plan for sharing this process with other faculty members.

Kyle W. Kirby has graduated from the Army Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) Advanced Camp at Fort Lewis, Tacoma, Washington. At the camp, cadets complete a five-week course of intensive military leadership training and evaluation exercises in communications, management and survival training. 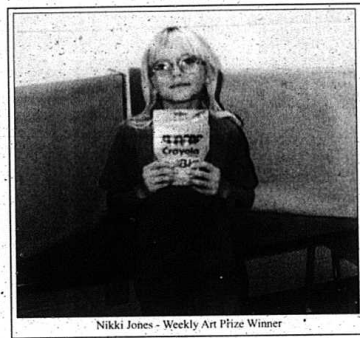

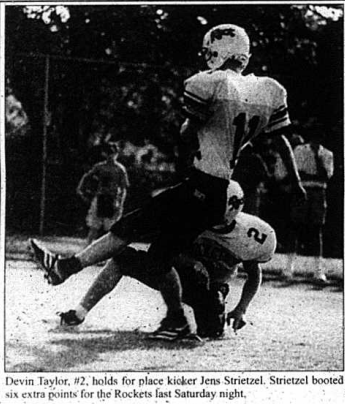

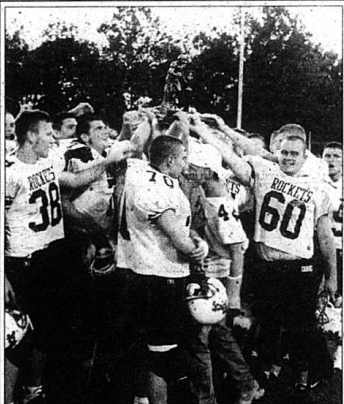

Rockets roll in opener 48-0 over Washington

The Rockcastle County Rocket football team began their 2001 campaign on Saturday night with an impressive 48-0 win over Washington County.

The Rockets used an explosive offense and a smothering defense to completely dominate the Commanders in the Pig Skin Classic at Danville High School.

The Rockets scored four times in the first half, three of those in the second quarter to take a 28-0 lead into the dressing room.

They struck again early in the third quarter leaving the final score as the only thing in doubt about the

bowls game. The Rockets added two more scores in the fourth period and the Rocket defense allowed only seven total yards and one first down for the contest, making for the lopsided score.

Senior Josh Hale was named offensive MVP in the game.

Hale caught eleven passes for two touchdowns and 171 total yards.

Hale caught a touchdown pass in the second quarter which covered 13 yards and he grabbed another touchdown pass early in the third quarter this time for 40 yards.

Junior cornerback Marty Reagan was named defensive MVP.

Reagan had one interception, which he returned for a touchdown and four tackles.

He also scored twice on offense on runs of four yards and 15 yards.

Senior Clay Dooley scored in the second quarter on a run of 18 yards and junior J.T. Lovell scored in the fourth period on a run of two yards.

Junior quarterback Aaron Anderkin completed 13 of 20 pass attempts for 184 yards and two touchdowns.

Rocket placekicker Jens Strietzel hit six extra point attempts. The only extra point the Rockets did not convert was a mishandled snap.

Head coach Tom Larkey used 17 players on offense in the first half alone and defensive coach Tony Saylor also substituted frequently, helping the Rockets to stay fresh.

"I was somewhat surprised on our performance - we did a great job containing Washington County's speed and on offense we executed very well," he said.

Larkey gave a lot of credit to his offensive line for opening holes for the running and for giving Anderkin, who was not sacked, time to throw.

"We have a lot of depth on offense, especially in the line and it showed Saturday night," he said.

Coach Saylor has had praise for his defensive unit, which has consistently shut down opponents over the years and Saturday night was no exception.

"Our young kids did a good job of picking up the flow of the game early and we did a really good job of containing their bigger, faster backs," he said.

His first cousin, defensive lineman Steve Blair also had five tackles in the contest as did outside linebacker P.J. Rowe.

The three led the Rockets in tackles on the night.

Reagan had four tackles, as did fellow junior cornerback James-Michael Bussell.

Junior Tanner Abney, junior Stephen Boreing, senior Clay Dooley, senior Matt McClure and sophomores Nick Thomas and Jason Leger all had three tackles. Leger also recovered a fumble in the contest.

Senior Adam Childress, junior Benny Northern, junior Cletl Swinney, sophomore Caleb Blair and sophomore Brandon Campbell all had two tackles.

Hale, Junior Michael Hayes, junior J.T. Lovell, sophomore Devin Taylor and sophomore Brad Wesley each had a tackle.

On the ground Reagan led the Rockets with 53 yards on ten carries. Dooley had 44 yards on five carries and Lovell had 32 yards on eight carries.

Senior Josh Taylor picked up 14 yards on four carries and Swinney and Campbell each had six yards.

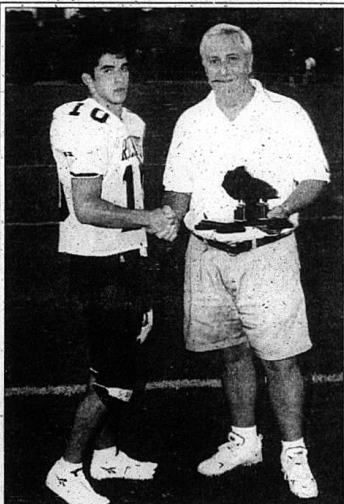
Hale, Junior Michael Hayes, junior J.T. Lovell, sophomore Devin Taylor and sophomore Brad Wesley each had two yards on one carry.

Dooley caught one pass for seven yards and Reagan caught one for six yards.

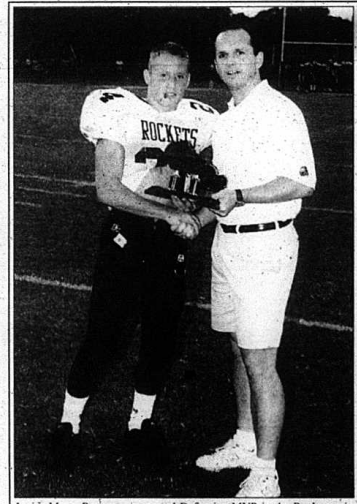
The Rockets will host South Laurel in their home opener on Friday night.

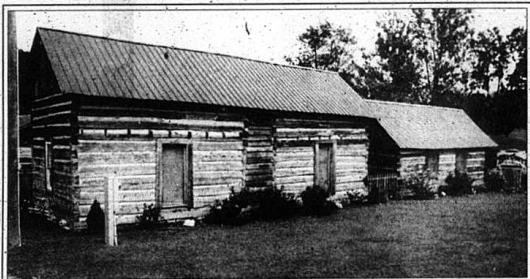

A brief history of the Reinro Valley Barn Dance

Dreams can be elusive things. But sometimes perseverance, determination and hard work can make even the most elusive appearing dream come true.

Reinro Valley founder John Lair

had such a dream.

After serving in World War I, Lair returned to the Reinro Valley area of Rockcastle County where he had grown up. The next year he found himself running the family farm following the death of his father.

In the evenings, following a hard day of tilling the fields, Lair would sit on a rock on a hilltop and dream the kind of ambitious, seemingly impossible, maybe even foolish dream of a young man looking down the road at his future.

Lair's dream was to own the beautiful valley stretched out before him and to preserve there the values of uncompromising honesty and sturdy independence and the spirit of neighborliness exhibited by the pioneers who had settled, not only Reinro Valley, but the rest of America.

Lair described his dream in 1957: "My dream was not one of conquest and advancement such as had led the early settlers in Reinro Valley to work hard to build up a settlement and dream of progress and growth. My dream was, in a way, to move backward across the years almost to the very beginning."

It was Chicago that would ironically open the door to his dream. And music would provide the vehicle that would eventually lead John Lair back to Reinro Valley.

Although not musically talented himself, Lair had always respected the ability of others to play music and had been fascinated by the old folk ballads that he had heard as a boy.

So when he began listening to the hillbilly music that was just catching

hold on Chicago radio station WLS, Lair knew he had something to offer.

Closely studying the audiences from week to week noticed that a great many folks who attended came out of town, apparently combining the show with a trip to the city, and a general outing for the party.

This set him to thinking that it might work the other way around, that city folks might enjoy a trip to the country to see a show. Right then is when the idea of coming back to Reinro Valley and building a barn to broadcast from and hold shows in began to take on the semblance of a possibility. Which is exactly what John Lair did.

Today, Reinro Valley continues

Mr. Lair's dream by offering folk down home, clean family entertainment in a country setting for all to enjoy.

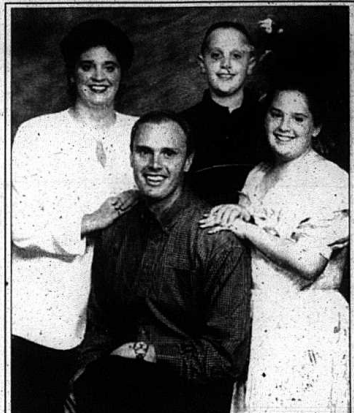

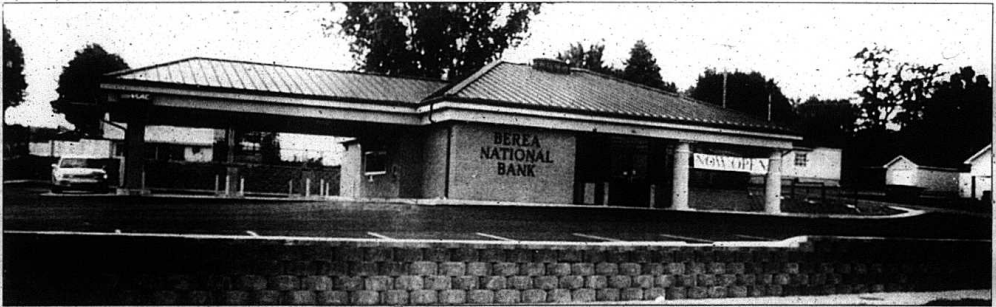

Agricultural News

County Committee Election Coming Soon
Coming August 1, 2001 the local FSA office will begin accepting nominations for the upcoming election to be held December 3, 2001.

Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. They help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will run. They make FSA agricultural programs fit the needs of local producers.

Nomination forms must be received in the local FSA office by October 29th.

Missed the Deadline??
New legislation required all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to file an initial designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market their tobacco form FSA 808 by the deadline of August 1, 2001.

The next designation period for the 2001-2002 marketing season will begin October 1, 2001 and end on October 1, 2001.

Farmers are required to inform FSA of the warehouse number where they will market their tobacco. Please note the FSA 808 will indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the marketing card, you must return that card to the FSA office and request another marketing card. Remember, the marketing cards are warehouse specific.

2001 Phase II Compensation Plan
The 2001 Phase II Compensation Plan will be based on USDA-FSA records of quota ownership as of July 1, 2000. OR the final lease and transfer date as determined by USDA-FSA, and based on the number of quota pounds owned for crop year 2000.

Compensation for the growing farm and grower/tenant portion will be limited to those individuals who had a vested interest in tobacco production in 1998 and/or 1999 and/or 2000, and defined in previous compensation plans. Compensation from the Trust would be made only for the years in which an applicant had a vested interest in tobacco production, as described under previous compensation plans.

Application should be mailed to crop year 2000 farm operators on or about August 6-10 with the application deadline of September 15th.

UK College of Agriculture has a Phase II Payment Estimator software website at <http://www.uky.edu/Agriculture/TobaccoEcon/settlement.html>.

Producers who need help in the completion of these forms should contact the local County Extension Office or the Farm Service Agency. Grazed 2001 Wheat, Barley, Oats (Graze-Out)

and barley on a farm with a production flexibility contract who grazes the acreage will receive a payment under the same terms and conditions as a producer who harvests a crop and applies for a loan deficiency payment.

Graze-Out is available to producers who are otherwise eligible for marketing assistance loans and LDP's

producers enrolled in the Production Flexibility Program (PFC), grazed 2001 crop acreage planted to wheat, barley or oats, do not harvest the same crop on the same acreage.

Regulations for GRAZE-OUT are available on the FSA home page at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/rlap/pd/>. The deadline for accepting applications for GRAZE-OUT is August 31, 2001.
