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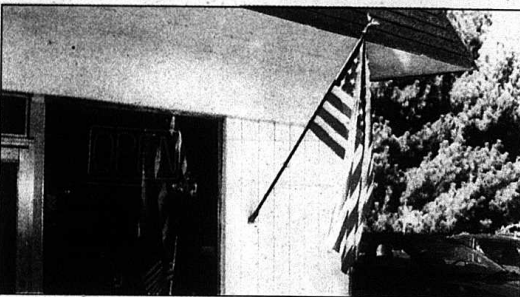

Four indictments returned

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury returned four indictments last week. Indicted were Ashley Ross Jasper, 26, of Mt. Vernon, Jason Northem, 23, of Mt. Vernon, Woodrow Lamb, 24, of Rt. 2, Mt. Vernon and Daren Kidd, 18, of Pine Knot.

PRIDE hands out grants

PRIDE (Personal Responsibility in a Desirable Environment) announced Wednesday that it has awarded \$11,540 in grants this school year targeted at helping Rockcastle County educators teach school children and adults more about their environment and how to protect it.

Two area schools and a local retreat for the blind will receive funds, benefiting some 1,626 students, according to a news release from the PRIDE office in Somerset.

Broadhead Elementary School will receive \$3,170 to construct an outdoor classroom.

Mt. Vernon Elementary School will receive \$4,950 to build a greenhouse and construct an outdoor classroom.

Christ's Outreach for the Blind, near Pine Hill, which is headed by Mike and Lori Gates will receive \$3,420 to construct an outdoor classroom.

PRIDE will award a total of 109 grants in 33 counties in Southern and Eastern Kentucky, reaching more than 47,000 students. Of the 109 grants, 96 will go to schools while the remainder will benefit groups such as conservation districts, 4-H and watershed watch organizations.

Man held after trying to use fake identification

A Guatemalan man, who was apparently trying to obtain a fake identification card, was arrested last week in Rockcastle County.

According to Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette, Pedro Lucas Ramos, 23, attempted to get a fake identification card at Rockcastle Circuit Clerk Teresa Vanzant's office last Thursday.

Burdette said that chief deputy clerk Brenda McKnight notified authorities when she realized that Ramos was trying to use a birth certificate and social security card which belonged to a three-year-old child from Texas.

Jasper is accused of driving his truck into Wendy's Restaurant on September 5 and causing \$25,000 damage. He is also accused of endangering the lives of eight Wendy's employees.

Jasper was indicted on one count of third degree sexual abuse and two counts of unlawful transaction with a minor first degree.

Jasper is accused of having sexual contact with a minor on August 19 and giving another minor a controlled substance on different occasions.

Lamb was indicted on two counts of attempted murder, fleeing or evading police and being a persistent felony offender.

Lamb is accused of shooting at Mt. Vernon police officers Bill Mink and Barry Adams on July 23rd, after they tried to stop him on Hwy. 25.

Graves enter guilty plea

The U.S. Department of Justice announced this week that Bill R. Graves, 49, of Bee Lick Road, has pled guilty to possession with intent to distribute and the distribution of Percocet.

Graves was charged in the summer of 1999 with distributing approximately 50 perocet tablets.

U.S. Attorney Frances E. Cairon said that Graves could receive a maximum penalty of 320 years in prison and a \$1 million fine.

Graves will be sentenced on February 1, 2002.

Williams says: Probably no great danger from nerve gas at Army Depot

In the wake of this month's terrorist attacks on the United States many local citizens are wondering about the deadly chemical weapons, which are stored at the Bluegrass Army Depot near Richmond.

The Louisville Courier-Journal newspaper reported last week that the depot was probably the fifth most likely target for terrorists in Kentucky.

Deadly nerve gas is stored at the depot. A terrorist attack at the depot which could result in the gases being released into the air certainly would cause havoc in Madison and surrounding counties, including Rockcastle.

The good news for all citizens is that there is an evacuation plan in place to deal with such a disaster.

The Message Emergency Re-

sponse Plan has been in place for many years and is updated on an annual basis, according to Craig Williams, who heads the Chemical Weapons Working Group in Madison County.

Williams' foundation is a citizens group heavily involved with the process which would ultimately destroy those chemical weapons.

The bad news is that not many people are educated as to details of the evacuation plan.

Williams said that if people were educated, something he says should take place - especially now, the plan would probably work.

However, in Williams' opinion the risk of such a release of gas at the depot is highly unlikely.

Williams said that only in very

Message from Judge

"The Chemical Stockpile Emergency Response Plan is a vital standby in case of an unexpected chemical release at the Blue Grass Army Depot. Each of the public facilities (including schools and hospitals) has a plan designated by the state director in case of an emergency. In addition, the plan relies heavily upon the coordination of emergency services by the local fire departments and law enforcement officers," said Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis.

There are fewer than forty counties in the entire United States (out of more than 3,300 counties nationwide) that are in what is known as a

Protective Area Zone (PAZ). Northern Rockcastle County is one of those in a PAZ.

"According to all computer generated scenarios, Rockcastle and Garrard counties are perhaps at the least risk for chemical contamination. This is because wind direction would have to change from normal flow at the actual time of an emergency before Rockcastle's PAZ would be affected," he said.

"In case of an emergency declared by the governor or other authorities, residents in the PAZ are to remove from their homes to the Rockcastle County Middle School, which is

Points East

Early in the summer of 1986, for lack of nothing better to do and with an abundance of spare time, I hooked up with a couple of nonprofits and a local school system and convinced a bunch of responsible adults that the thing I was most cut-out to be was a role model for Appalachia's poor and destitute teenagers.

After all, I had grown up "poor," a fact that I never realized until somebody finally explained poverty to me in my early twenties, and also, as a matter of fact, destitute, because my parents had never been able to afford indoor plumbing and I had grown up taking a weekly bath in a number two wash tub and trekking fifty yards through all kinds of weather to an outhouse complete with the requisite Sears, Ward's, Penny's and Spiegel's catalogues and last week's issues of Grit and The Mountain Eagle whenever an urgency of the bowels or bladder came upon me.

Somewhere along the line I learned that you could use two semi-colons in a single sentence and I'm sure they both could have been used above but the great thing about being over 50 is that most folks don't grade your English and if they do you can snicker out loud if they give you an F. Same thing for commas. Remarkable qualifications, I believed at the time, to give professional guidance and counsel to Appalachia's troubled youth.

So early in the summer of '86 I took it upon myself to straighten out a bunch of misbehavior, functioning out-of-pool "at risk" teenagers I'd never met and put them on the path of righteousness and responsibility. I knew practically every business owner in the county on a first name basis. The Superintendent of the

school system was a close and personal friend and he made sure that I could come and go through the halls of the high school with more freedom afforded most of the teaching staff. In short order, the high school principal and I became acquainted but he was too busy for me to ever become bosom buddies.

But in shorter order I became a Pied Piper of sorts. Word got out that if you needed a little help after school or a place to have a little fun without spending any money, the thing to do was hook up with Ole Ike because I insisted that the Mister Adams stuff be done away with right off the bat.

The Christian Appalachian Project made available a building of maybe 2,000 sq. feet of flat space it had been using as a thrift shop broom factory and provided, besides putting me on their payroll, up to \$500 in renovations of the place. The best estimate I could get to put toilets in separate rooms was just over \$2,000 and the place still needed painting. There was a city ordinance (I checked) about outhouses and porta-johns on the property and they were not allowed. So we went to the bathroom next door. Or ran two blocks to a drive in restaurant, or if it was after dark, we washed some tires.

In short order, CAP came through again. I came to work one afternoon and there lay sheets of dry wall and several dozen 2x4's and paint in five-gallon buckets. The paint had been donated by some big builder and so had several dozen, six-inch wide brushes. That evening the kids and I painted the place, walls and ceilings, from smoky yellow to hospital white and then decided we actually liked it better the other color. Next day car-

penters showed up, mad that we had broken into the paint but none-the-less, in short order, they had bathrooms walled up and pipes for commodes run in.

Two local hardware stores sent folks up to take a look and decided that our original paint job was a good

primer for other colors and agreed to mix colored paint for us at no cost. They gave us stuff to get all the paint we had dropped on the floor removed and even came in to supervise. And all of a sudden kids who had been written-off by the merchants and business folks of one little town had

some credibility. When the bathrooms were finished and the floors cleaned upwards of fifty kids between 12 and 18 had a place they had helped build that they could call their own.

I could give you their names. I could rattle off name after name of

kids who show up at my house on Sunday afternoons because they consider me some sort of Godfather for their own kids or better yet; a father figure. I could also tell you about a few with whom we feuded and the

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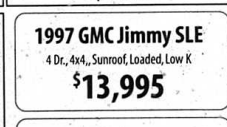

Here are some of my thoughts about the recent terrorist attacks upon our country.

American Under Attack
On September 11, 2001, four airplanes were hijacked by 19 terrorists. The first one crashed into one of the towers of the World Trade Center at 8:45 AM. About 15 minutes later a second plane crashed into the second tower of the World Trade Center. About a half hour after that, one of the planes crashed in the Pentagon. For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away." I wonder how many thoughts as they got up that morning, went to the airport, went to work at the World Trade Center, or went to the Pentagon, that that would be the last day of their life? Who has a guaranteed promise of life tomorrow? Do any of us have a "lease on life"?

Run for Safety. In watching the video on TV, of people in the area when the building collapsed in New York, you could see people running, trying to escape the dust and smoke as it would come around a building like a huge monster. Then the dust came from another way, and the

people turn to run in a different direction. Yet they did not escape. This is a perfect illustration of the return of Christ. When the Lord comes back the second time, there will be no escape from this event. As Paul said, "For when they shall say, Peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them, as travail upon a woman with child; and they shall not escape." (1 Thess. 5:3)

Islam Scares Me. I think it will prove out, that a group of Muslim religious fanatics who think they were serving God, was behind these evil deeds. I would imagine that they had been falsely taught, that if they die for "Allah and his prophet Mohammed" that eternal glory awaits them. If we could borrow the words of Jesus, "They shall put you out of the synagogues; yet, the time cometh, that whosoever killeth you will think that he doeth God service." (Jn. 16:2. Islam scares me, because when you have the kind of error that these folks got off into, they go about seeking to kill and destroy innocent lives as seen in the events of 9-11-01. Now when you have folks going into denominationalism, they are just as wrong religiously, but they don't go around hijacking planes and crashing them into buildings.

False Teachers Heyday! I figured when these events were happening that the premillennialist who see "signs of the times" in just about every event that happens, that they would have heyday about these incidents. Some said they thought the rapture had taken place. The "Left Behind" series of books have taught that when the rapture takes place, airplanes and cars will be crashing into things, because the pilots and drivers were raptured long ago, and the unbelievers are left behind in a chaotic world. I got an e-mail asking last week "Is this the end?" Someone asked Luke at the store, if I had any comment about the events of these terrorists, they said I would say this was in the Bible. Yes, "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God; because many false prophets are gone out into the world." (1 Jn. 4:1. There are NO signs of the times, 1 Thess. 5:1-2.

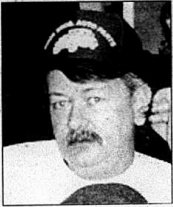

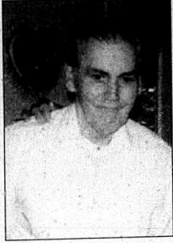

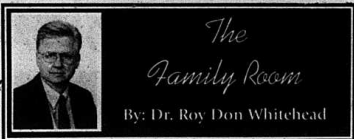


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Teach Tolerance

It's the job of the Savior. He only can say who will go with him on the Judgment Day.

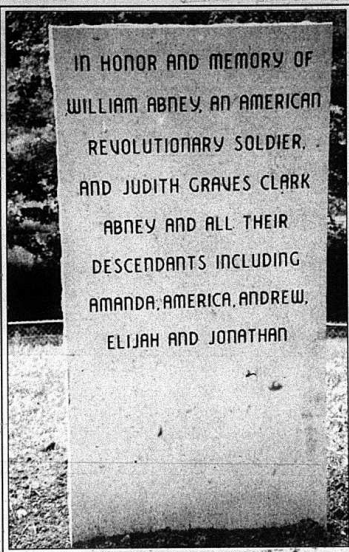
Chorus

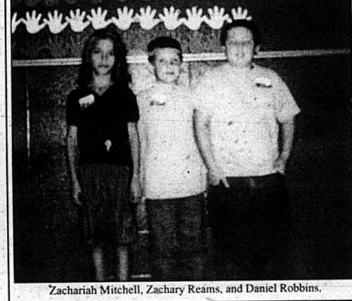

"Choosing the right place to continue an education is an important decision," Byrn said. "We believe Spotlight Day gives students a feel for the special atmosphere of our University."

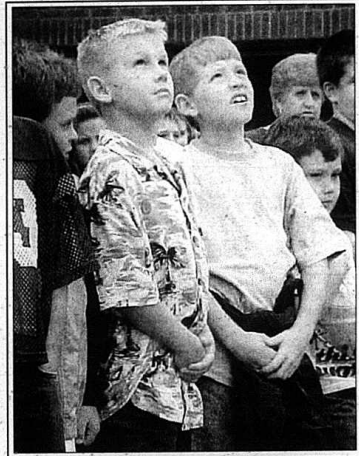

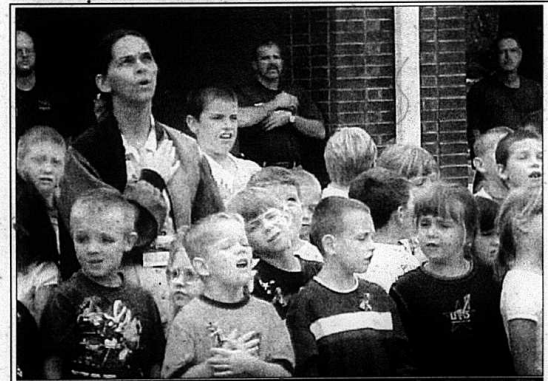
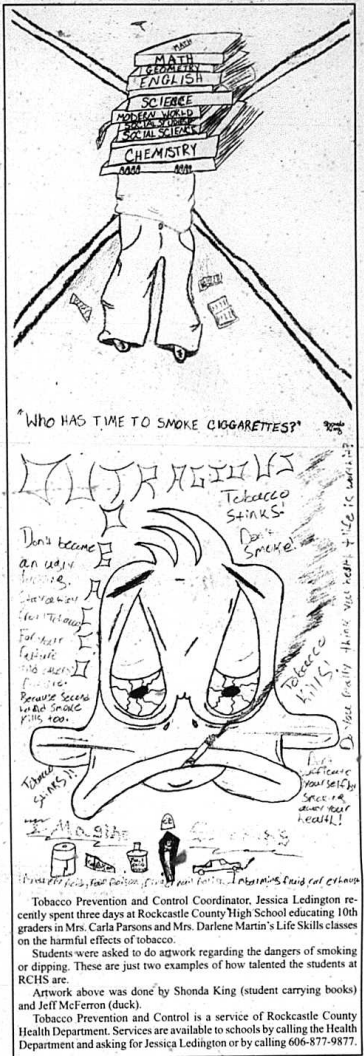

Use your seatbelts



Several years ago when the Kentucky General Assembly passed the mandatory seat belt law, I, like many Kentuckians resented the fact that the government was telling me I had to wear a seat belt or face a fine. It was a simple matter of just not wanting to be told what to do in my own vehicle.

Of course after time, it became habit to put it on and really a very small inconvenience.

Because of the many horrible wrecks I have seen over the years I realize that seat belts are of the utmost importance - but still I did not like the fact that I was being told to do something by our elected officials in which I should be able to choose to do.

After Monday morning, I am very thankful that the law was passed, which ultimately led to us using seat belts without thinking about it or fussing about it.

My son, Aaron, had a wreck Monday morning on the Marebark road around 7:30.

He was sick and began throwing up and lost control of the car and veered off the right side of the road.

He sideswiped a telephone pole, took out a barbed wire fence and hit two trees.

The car caught on fire immediately, but the good news was that he had his seat belt on and, of course, the airbags deployed.

Basically, the only thing hurt was his ego, and the car (and who cares about the car).

However, had he not had his seat belt on the thoughts of what could happen are more than most parents want to ever think about.

I am thankful for the seat belt law because without it - I am not sure that I would become so accustomed to wearing it and us requiring him to wear it.

I would like to personally thank Karen Powell, Rosemary Noe and James Blanton for their kindness at the scene.

We appreciate the quick response of the Mt. Vernon fire department and especially Josh Whicker, who was the first on the scene.

The entire point of this is that we all should wear seatbelts and it would be our opinion that all of us parents should try every way in the world to make sure our children wear seat belts.

worse case scenario could any gas be released or stolen.

"With the beefed up security at the depot I think it is unlikely that any of the gas in the concrete igloos, which are also underground will ever be released into the atmosphere," he said.

"Not to say that it couldn't happen, but if I was a betting man - I'd bet against it," he said.

Williams said that even if an airplane crashed into one of the igloos and set off an explosion there would be, of course, a huge fire, which would in itself burn up most if not all of the gas before it could do any harm.

"Except for possibly trying to steal some of the gas, I don't think the depot is a high priority for terrorists," he said.

And if terrorists have that in mind they will find it much more difficult to steal the chemical weapons, now that the armed services has taken measures.

Tuesday 200 troops from Fort Campbell were deployed to guard the chemical weapons depot in Rich-

mond. The deployments marked the first announced troop movements from Fort Campbell in response to the September 11 terrorist attacks.

One company-sized unit from the 101st Airborne Division will augment security around the depot, said Army spokesman George Heath.

The depot is about 30 miles north of Mt. Vernon. A huge concrete barricade blocked direct access to the main gate Tuesday night, but there was no visible sign of the troop deployment.

Earl Chasteen, who lives across the street from the depot, said he heard several helicopters land around noon. He said he was glad additional troops would be guarding the depot, but wasn't concerned about a terrorist strike there.

"I'm kind of hoping the terrorists don't know about this place and don't find out," he said. "It's kind of out of the way here."

Heath said the deployment was "indefinite" and was not in response to a specific threat.

designated reception center, where they will be advised by federal and state personnel on the condition of the emergency," he said.

"For decades, Rockcastle County (along with others) have been fairly unconcerned about the possible dangers of the chemical weapons stored at the Blue Grass Army Depot simply because we have been among the least affected by possible dangers. Citizens in eastern Madison and Estill counties are most possibly affected," he said.

"Unknown to most Rockcastle County citizens, the emergency response and law enforcement personnel, school system, hospital, cities and county judge's office (among others) have been participants in local disaster emergency drills on an annual basis," he said.

"Again, it is highly unlikely that an emergency would involve Rockcastle County due to its southern location in relation to the depot. Let me assure you that, although many of our citizens have been fairly unconcerned about the toxic weapon storage in Madison County, the federal and state government apparatus has kept the local governments informed of impending dangers and safety measures," he said.

The judge said more detailed information about the evacuation plan would appear in next week's Signal.

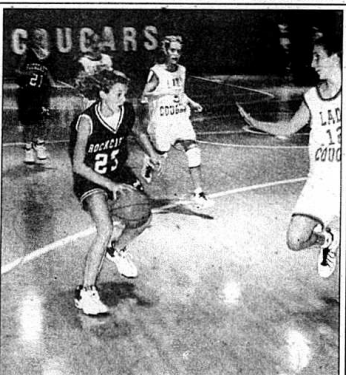

Using Alternative Cleaning Products to Protect Indoor Air Quality

Some cleaning products can have a negative impact on the indoor air quality in your home by releasing chemicals into the air during product use or as it dries. Household products that might create indoor air quality problems include disinfectants, waxes, air fresheners and cleaners.

To reduce the potential exposure to harmful air pollutants, consider using alternatives containing chemicals that are relatively toxic free. You probably have the basic ingredients for many safer alternatives. For example, vinegar, juice, liquid, baking soda, salt, ammonia, vinegar, chlorine bleach and borax.

Here are some ways you can use relatively toxic-free alternative cleaning products in your home. Although these alternatives contain less toxic chemicals, be sure to follow directions for safe use.

To freshen your home, sprinkle baking soda or put activated charcoal in odor-producing areas. Put an open box of baking soda in the refrigerator to absorb food odors. Grind leftover lemon or orange peels to freshen the garbage disposal.

Scrub bathrooms with washing soda or borax. To remove mildew or other stains from wallpaper, apply to the surface a mixture of one-half cup of chlorine bleach and one cup of water; let stand for five minutes

and rinse with clear water. For a ceramic tile cleaner, mix two tablespoons of trisodium phosphate (TSP) in a gallon of water and apply to tile and grout with a brush or cloth. Rinsing isn't necessary. TSP is available at hardware stores or pharmacies.

Scrub baked-on grease and oven soot with a paste of baking soda, salt and water. Another method is to sprinkle with dry baking soda; let it stand for five minutes, and scrub with a damp cloth. Do not let baking soda touch wires or heating elements.

Make it easier on yourself by wiping up grease and spills soon after each oven use. Don't allow them to set. Use a non-metallic bristle brush for charred spills.

To clean toilet bowls, pour in one-half cup liquid chlorine bleach; leave at least 30 minutes and scrub with a long-handled brush. You also can use a borax-lemon juice mixture to clean toilet bowls.

Several products commonly found in the home will clean windows and mirrors. Add two tablespoons vinegar to one quart water and apply with wadded-up newspaper. Another good solution is three tablespoons of ammonia, one tablespoon white vinegar and three-fourths cup water put in a clean spray bottle.

To remove rust or lime deposits from outside windows, mix one-fourth cup cornstarch, one-half cup ammonia and one cup of vinegar in a jar. Since vinegar is acidic, it

might be necessary to wear gloves when applying this mixture. For more information, contact your Extension Service at 256-2403.

Tobacco Supplemental Payments Issued

Jeffery S. Hall, State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Kentucky, has announced that FSA is now in the process of issuing supplemental 2000 Tobacco Loss Assistance Payments. The 2001 Agricultural Economic Assistance Act, signed by the President on August 13th, authorized the Secretary to use \$129 million of Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) funds to make a supplemental payment to persons who previously received a payment under TLAPO.

Payment rates are: \$0.106645 (Owner Part B); \$0.085931 (Contractor Part C); \$0.085932 (grower/ Tenant Part D). Total Payment: \$0.278508 (Based on 2000 Quota).

Supplemental payment rates are thirty-seven percent of the payment made in October 2000. Under the initial TLAPO payments, 148,145 payments were issued to Kentucky farmers totaling \$137,210,322.

Warehouse Designation A Must

Farmers are required to inform FSA of the warehouse number where they will market tobacco beginning with the 2001 crop. This is required by completing the form FSA 908, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold. The warehouse number will then be indicated on the marketing card, therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the card, you must return that

card to the FSA office in the specific time period to request another marketing card.

Producers who failed to complete or wish to change may designate pounds and sale locations during the 2001 redesignation periods of October 1, 2001; October 29-November 2, 2001; December 3-7, 2001; December 28, 2001-January 4, 2002; and January 28-February 1, 2002.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses for public notice and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office available through March 31, 2002.

Stolen Tobacco
Butley tobacco producers are reminded according to regulations pertaining to stolen tobacco a police report must be filed within 15 days of the theft and be submitted to the county FSA office. Filing the police report according to regulations will possibly avoid a penalty and or a reduction of the next year's quota.

Spousal Power of Attorney
Spouses may sign on behalf of each other for FSA and CCC programs in which either has an interest unless written denial is on file in the FSA office.

Payments Made to Producers
Rockcastle County producers participating in programs have recently received payments for Production Flexibility Contract (corn program). Marketing Loss Assistance (supplemental payments to PFC) and the Tobacco Loss Assistance Supplemental payments (2000 crop year). All payments have been issued.
