A Rockcastle man was killed in a single vehicle accident on Hwy. 70 Thursday afternoon. Monroe Brown, 68, of Quail, died at the scene from massive trauma, after the four-wheel drive truck he was driving landed on him, according to Rockcastle County Coroner

PRIDE (Personal Responsibility in a Desirable Environment) announced Wednesday that it has awarded \$11.540 in grants this school year targeted at helping Rockeastle County educators teach school children and adults more about their environment and how to protect it.

"The grants - up to a maximum of
\$5,000- are an invaluable residence in
our efforts to support activities that,
thelp young people understand the
importance of a clean environment
and in promoting both personal re-

help young people understand the importance of a clean environment and in promoting both personal responsibility and community pride," said U.S. Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers "The PRIDE Environmental Education grant program is a significant investment in the long term future of our region," he said. Since 1997, 313 PRIDE Environmental Education Grants totaling over\$13 million have been awaded. The grants have been used for the

construction of 173 outdoor classrooms, 19 nature trails, the imple-mentation of 20 school recycling projects, the purchase of various re-sources for classrooms and other projects at schools throughout the 40-county region PRIDE serves.

Using Alternative Cleaning Products to Protect Indoor Air Quality

Some cleaning products can have a negative impact on the indoor air quality in your home by releasing chemicals into the air during produce use or as it dries. Household products that might create indoor air quality problems include disinfectants, waxes, air fresheners and cleaners.

To reduce the potential exposure to harmful air pollutants, consider using alternatives containing chemicals that are relatively tock free. 
