Rockcastle receives grant for shelter

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and the Rockcastle County Adoption Agency for Pets got some good news this week when they learned that the Kentucky Department of Agriculture had approved a \$62,000 grant for a new animal shelter.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotto announced the grant at Tuesday's Rockcastle County Fiscal Court meeting.

The grant will enable the county to finish a job started by RAAP last year.

RAAP and the county reached an agreement earlier this year for the county to take over the construction project at the animal shelter, which is located in the Roundstone area of the county because they were having trouble obtaining funding.

The county took over ownership of the property and applied for a \$65,000 grant from the state to help finish the animal shelter.

The county will lease the property back to RAAP, who will operate it with the help of the county.

"I think we were pretty fortunate to get a \$62,000 grant, since only \$50,000 was allocated statewide," said third district magistrate Bill McKinney.

"I want to publicly thank Anna Rose Mullins and Mary Jane French, two of our dedicated employees for their work on the grant proposal," said Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotto.

"Some people will probably think we should spend that money on roads, but we have an obligation by law to provide an animal shelter in the county," Carlotto said.

In order to help keep down costs, the county is going to use work release prisoners from the Rockcastle County Detention Center to help with the construction and operation of the animal shelter.

Mrs. Virginia Branscum and her brother Steve Bullen donated the property where the animal shelter is being constructed to RAAP last year.

In other business, the court approved the fifteen member Rockcastle County Development Board.

Those serving next year will be Doug Brock, Larry Carter, John Clontz, Martha Cox, Corey Craig, Gadliff Craig, Larry Hammond, Lee D. Keene, Karen King, Tommy Harold Mink, Keith Smith, Willard Whitaker, David Woodall, Judge Carlotto and magistrate John Holbrook.

Besides Carlotto and McKinney, magistrates Fred Mullins Jr., Jack Bradley, Donald Bullock and John Holbrook were in attendance at Tuesday's meeting.

Test scores show schools apparently doing well

Rockcastle County School Board member Martin Vanzant presented some of his own calculations to the Rockcastle County School Board on Tuesday night, which showed an overall good school system, if you are just looking at test scores.

Vanzant took an in depth look at the results of the CATS test, which were released by the state last week.

Vanzant's research showed that Roundstone Elementary School had the 12th best scores in the state out of 755 elementary schools.

They are in the top 15 percent, with 743 schools scoring lower.

Brookside Elementary School had the 123rd best scores in the state and are in the top 16.3 percent.

Mt. Vernon students were 203rd out of 755 in the state and are in the top 26.9 percent of elementary schools.

Rockcastle County Middle School students had the 20th best scores in the state out of 206 middle schools and are in the top 7.7 percent.

Rockcastle County High School students had the 13th best scores in the state out of 231 high schools and are in the top 5.1 percent.

Vanzant's researched show that Roundstone had a gain of 9 points from a year ago, the middle school

Rockcastle man jumps fence at local jail house

A Rockcastle County man, who had been on the lam for several months before he was arrested last week, escaped from the Rockcastle County Detention Center on Wednesday.

According to police, Johnny W. Denny, 39, of Mt. Vernon escaped around 3 a.m. after he scaled a fence in the recreation area outside the detention center.

Police had been looking for Denny for several months, after he was charged with Intimidating a Witness, First Degree Burglary, Criminal Mischief, Criminal Littering and parole violations.

Several of the charges against Denny are felonies.

When police finally got Denny last week in the Johnetta area of the county, it took several agencies to get him, including the Rockcastle Sheriff's office, Mt. Vernon City Police, Kentucky State Police and the Putnam County Sheriff's office, which provided a helicopter for use in the arrest.

Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Trevor Hensley said that Denny was hiding in a cold air return under the floor when police apprehended him.

Three other people, including Denny's girlfriend Jaqueline Goforth, were arrested at the same time as Denny and charged with harboring a fugitive.

Rockcastle County Jailor James Miller said that according to video tapes it took about two minutes for Denny to scale the fence.

Another inmate, Dallas Clifford Jr., was with Denny in the recreation facility, but Miller said that he did not try to escape.

Miller issued a statement on Wednesday which stated that, "the recreation area is now closed until razor wire is added to the ceiling portions. An internal investigation is presently underway by the Detention facility that will focus on the video surveillance tape, timing and ability of Denny to avoid detection in scal-

ing the fence," he said.

Miller stated that all on-duty deputies will be interviewed, and the Department of Corrections is working in cooperating with the Rockcastle Detention Center to reinforce the recreation facility.

Miller said that even though the jail had no non-compliances when the jail was inspected last month, unforeseen circumstances can always occur, and we will not rest and the area will not open until that part of the center is reinforced beyond what even the regulations require.

The recreation area is utilized randomly around the clock, due to the number of prisoners in the jail, and since Denny's arrest last week he had only had one hour of recreation time."

Miller said trying to explain why Denny was allowed to go into the recreation area at 3 a.m.

Also the recreation area had razor fencing across the top of the chain link fence when it was first installed, during the expansion and remodeling of the jail last year.

Miller said that he was considering putting that razor fencing back.

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Board informed about Learning Center at RCMS

The Rockcastle County Middle School 21st Century Learning Center was the main topic of conversation at the monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education Tuesday night.

The board held their monthly meeting at the Middle School.

21st Century Director Jason Cogger told the board of education that the 21st Century Learning Center has had 2,100 student visits so far this school year and 400 adult visits.

The 21st Century Learning Center offers a variety of programs, including enrichment for students in Language Arts, Social Studies, Science and Math. There is also tutoring available for students in those areas as well.

Those four classes are part of what Cogger called a survivor program, with that idea being taken from the hit television series.

"We provide a fun, interactive, safe and drug free environment where students have access to educational and recreational opportunities," he said.

"We try to offer services or programs that benefit our community and the people by doing this we can improve school/community relations," Cogger told the school board.

The after school programs are offered Monday through Thursday at the middle school from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. Transportation is provided on Monday and Tuesday.

Cogger said there were also weekend programs and 21st Century is also in the process of creating their own television station at the school.

21st Century also publishes a newspaper for the school.

21st Century is funded through a federal grant, which was given to the

school system a year ago.

The three year grant was worth \$1.6 million to the local school system.

The board also discussed the second month attendance report, which showed that Brookfield and Mt. Vernon had the highest attendance at 96.5 and that the Alternative School had the lowest at 83 percent.

The overall attendance for the district in the second month was 93.8 percent, down from 95.7 percent the previous month.

The school system receives their money from the State Department of Education based on the number of students who attend school on a daily basis and if the attendance figures stay as low as they were in the second month of school, it could mean a lot of lost revenue for the school system.

Finance officer Richard Bray said the central office was in the process of correcting the attendance problem in the district and especially at the Alternative School.

The board also voted to purchase four new school buses at a cost of \$211,721 and to accept an offer from the state of \$42,680 for their technology program.

The school board must match the \$42,680 when they accept the offer, but annually the school system spends approximately \$300,000 a year on technology.

Track and Cross Country Coach Mark Brunnett was also honored by the school board for being named State Track Coach of the Year by his peers.

All five board members, Dr. G.W. Griffith, Terry Burton, Martin Vanzant, Sam Stallworth and Mike Burdette were in attendance, as was School Superintendent Larry Hammond.

I didn't know for sure who lived there but for the last four years I have been admiring the robust vegetable garden that flourishes right beside Old Railroad Grade about a mile down the road from my house. I see beans, a row or two of sweet corn, a few tomatoes and it's obvious that whoever lived in the neat little cottage alongside the garden was planting what they like to eat and not wasting space on exotic, expensive, habenero peppers and lemon cucumbers the way I tend to do.

Along about the first of August, year in and year out, this neighbor has cleaned up the garden, re-tilled it and sown it with massive amounts

of turnips and mustard greens.

Last Friday evening, an hour or so before dark, I drove by and turned as green as the greens with envy.

When your eyesight is failing as much as mine, it's difficult to tell from the road whether you're looking at turnips or mustard or kale or all three mixed together. All I could tell for sure was that the greens were nearly knee-high and as picturesque as anything you'll ever see on the cover of a seed catalogue.

I was on my way to Uncle Tom's Grocery to get a quart of buttermilk to make a pie of cornbread because that's what I was craving and those greens got on my mind. On the way

back to the house I stopped right in the middle of the road in front of garden and commenced drooling. And I began thinking to myself that the cornbread was not going to satisfy my hunger unless I had a mess of greens to go with it.

I tried driving on up the road toward home and made it maybe 20 yards before I put the truck in reverse and backed up to look that patch of greens over one more time. That's all it took for my stomach to get the best of my brain and there was really no contest.

I decided, then and there, that it was high time I got personally acquainted with these gardeners and see if I couldn't negotiate my way into a poke-full of greens to take home.

So I pulled up into the driveway, got out and knocked on the door. I told the lady who answered the door my name and stated my business-which was that I only had ten or twelve dollars in my pocket and would that be enough to get a mess of greens.

Doradean Finely introduced her husband and allowed that her husband, Dock Finley, was growing the greens but she didn't think they would be ready until the end of the month.

"They're turnips," she said, "and

they've got a few weeks to go, but you come back around the first of November, and I'm sure we'll have plenty."

"I'm not interested in the turnips in the ground," I told her. "I just want the greens right now."

"In that case, you'll have to talk to Dock," she said and it was pretty clear to me that Doradean didn't want anybody out there in her garden messing up the way her greens looked unless they knew what they were doing.

I told Dock that if he would take my word for it, the plants of which I wanted to pinch the greens would make bigger turnups down the line and Dock confided that he didn't care because he always raised way more turnups than he could eat anyway and he asked me to help myself to the greens.

So next I begged a plastic Walmart poke of Doradean and made my way around the turnip patch until I had the bag crammed full of succulent turnip greens. I thanked the Finley's and I came on to the house.

I made my corn bread and put it in the oven. I took a kettle of pork ribs, that I'd previously boiled, out of the fridge and skimmed off the lard,

but leaving the juices, and put the meat in a bowl and I commenced slicing up those greens right into the kettle until it got so full I had to boil for a few minutes to shrink them down by putting a big five pound ceramic plate on top to hold in the steam and then I'd put in a big bunch more and I cooked those greens down in pork rendering until the very aroma would bring you to your knees and have you hanging onto your tongue with both hands to keep from swallowing it.

And that's what I had for supper and lunch and dinner and lunch and

dinner in that order from Friday evening through Sunday night. Oh I had some fall beans to go with the greens commencing Saturday night and some latatoes and peppers and onions all but of the garden and I even have some leflobers. But the cornbread is all gone and I have a big piece in the oven right now.

It's supper time here in Paint Lick. It's all out of the garden. I may even fry up a few slices of green tomatoes. Thank you Dock and Doradean Finley for fattening me up! Maybe it's been too long since I had them but those turnip greens were the best thing I've eaten in years.

Phase II Update
Phase II applications were to have been completed and returned to the Tobacco Trust Settlement on September 15, 2001. The FSA office has received the 2001 Phase II Payment Register and producers should have received their letters of certification for payment.

Producers who wish to dispute or amend their applications should do so by (October 15, 2001) completing the Disputed or Amended application for the 2000 crop year. These forms are available at the local FSA office.

Warehouse Designation
Legislation now requires all farms with an effective quota greater than

zero to file a designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market tobacco by filing a form FSA 808.

The current designation period began October 1st and will end October 5, 2001.

Producers who have not designated or those who designated and wish to change their designation are reminded to do so by October 5th. If you miss this designation period you must wait until the next designation period which begins on October 29th.

County Committee Election Coming Soon
The FSA office would like to announce the deadline for accepting COC nominations for the upcoming election will be October 29, 2001.

The nomination form signed by the nominee is needed to nominate a farmer-candidate. The form includes a statement that the candidate agrees to serve if elected.

Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. They help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers serving on the committees help decide the kind of programs the county will have and how they will run helping to make FSA agricultural programs fit the needs of local producers.

The election will be held November 21 through December 3, 2001.

Spouses may sign on behalf of each other for Farm Service Agency and Commodity Credit Corporation programs in which either has an interest, unless written denial is in file in the FSA office.

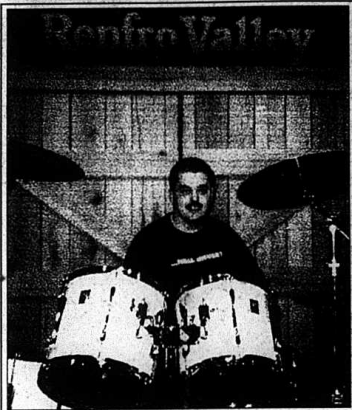

Flu and pneumonia vaccines available October 15

Under the best of circumstances, the influenza virus is a serious disease that can knock you off your feet for days. Fever, cough, chills, sore throat, headache, and muscle aches are common symptoms. For the elderly or those in poor health, the flu can cause a significant health risk. Even more of a concern is pneumococcal disease—it is fatal for one out of every 20 people who get pneumococcal pneumonia.

Fortunately, there are vaccines that are safe and effective in preventing these illnesses for most people.

Kimberly Cornelius, M.D., is encouraging all area residents at high risk to get their vaccines early this year. Her office expects to have a good supply of the preventive vaccine by October 15.

"Taking a few minutes to get a flu shot each year in October or November is probably the easiest thing you can do to protect your health," she said. "It's very important that the elderly and anyone with a long-term illness obtain appropriate vaccines as soon as they are available."

To make the process even easier, Cornelius is opening her practice to walk-in patients, which means no appointment is necessary. Vaccines will be available daily 9 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.

The vaccines are covered by Medicare, Medicaid, and most health insurance plans. In addition, Cornelius said she will give a vaccine to anyone who is at risk of getting a serious case of or complications from influenza or pneumococcal disease, whether or not they have health insurance coverage.

High Risk Characteristics
Influenza: People who fall into one or more of the following categories are at higher risk of contracting and having complications from the influenza virus: (who could develop Reye Syndrome if they catch influenza).

Everyone 50 years of age or older. Residents of long-term care facilities, which house people with chronic medical conditions.

Anyone who has a serious long-term health problem with heart disease, lung disease, asthma, kidney disease, metabolic disease, such as diabetes, anemia and other blood disorders.

Anyone whose immune system is weakened.

Anyone six months to 18 years of age on long-term aspirin treatment. Women who will be past the third month of pregnancy during the influenza season.

Physicians, nurses, family members, or anyone else coming in close contact with people at high risk.

Some people should talk with a doctor before getting an influenza vaccine. These include anyone who has ever had a serious allergic reaction to eggs or to a previous dose of influenza vaccine or have a history of Guillain-Barre Syndrome (GBS). If you have a fever or are severely ill at the time the shot is scheduled you should usually wait until you recover before getting influenza vaccine. Talk with your doctor nurse about whether or not to reschedule the vaccination.

Pneumococcal disease: Those who should get the Pneumococcal polysaccharide vaccine (PPV), which protects against 23 types of pneumococcal bacteria, include the following:

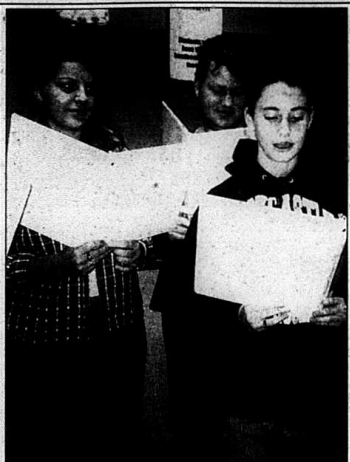
All adults 65 years of age or older.

Those over two years of age who have a long-term health problem such as: heart disease, sickle cell disease, alcoholism, leaks of cerebrospinal fluid, lung disease, diabetes and cirrhosis.

Those over 2 years of age who have a disease or condition that lowers the body's resistance to infection.

Those over 2 years of age who are taking any drug or treatment that lowers the body's resistance to infection.

any neat items that would fit in a show box. We will also be collecting money to cover the cost of shipping the items. The homerooms collecting the most items will receive a popcorn party.

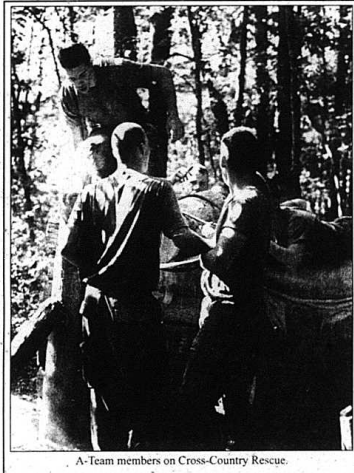
Our monthly SBDM meeting will be held on Wednesday at 6:30 in the library. Beginning at 5:30, the RCMS PTG will meet.

Throughout the week students dressed up to show their support for

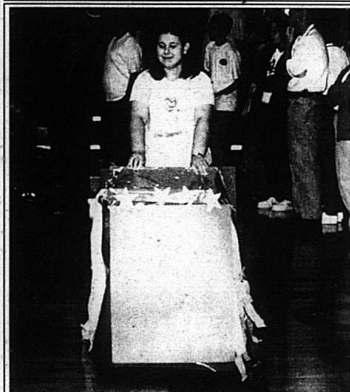

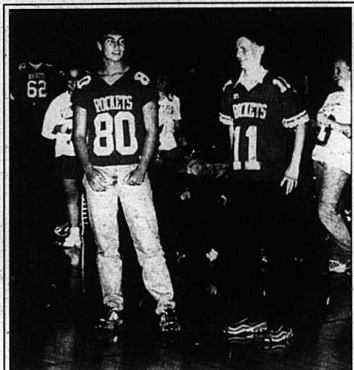
Homecoming was truly special this year and we look forward to the festivities next year.



Brianna Bussell pulling the French Club float with the special "Frenchie-Cycle". Ashley Cottrell balances the Eiffel Tower.

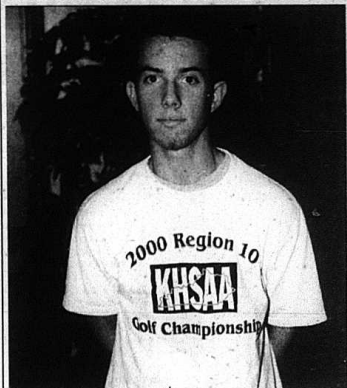


Amanda Cummins pushing the RCHS Y-Club's float in the Spirit Parade.

The Rockets girls varsity volleyball team finished off their regular season with an exciting win over Corbin.

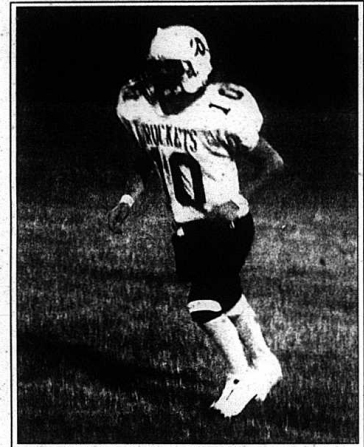

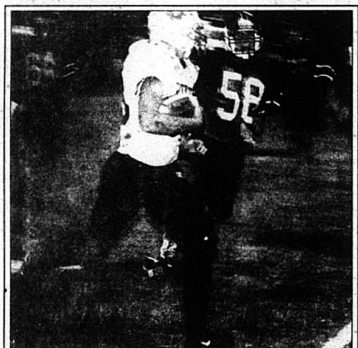

And it was his third of the game. Then Max Saylor scored on a three yard run.

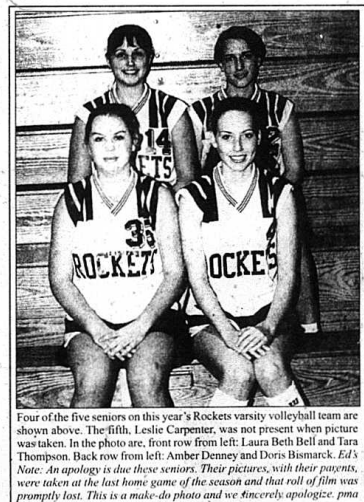

Marlin gets second Dodge win of season

Steering Marlin gave Dodge its second Winston Cup victory of the season in Sunday's UAW-GM Quality 500 at Lowe's Motor Speedway.

Marlin, who's No. 40 car was strong on long runs, took the lead from Tony Stewart for the final time with 68 laps remaining in the 334-lap event, then built an incredible 6.7-second lead en route to his first career win at LMS, the second victory of the 2001 campaign, and the eighth win of his career.

"This is the same car we won with at Michigan," said Marlin. "I knew that if I was patient and was able to keep the fenders on, we would do good."

Stewart's No. 20 Home Depot Pontiac was the dominant car in the middle stages of the race, leading 130 laps, but as the race moved into the final stages, Marlin's car was clearly the strongest.

Both Jeff Gordon and Ricky Rudd, the first and second-place driver in the points standings had poor showings. Gordon finished one lap down in 16th, while Rudd was two laps farther back in 21st.

Early in the race, it seemed Dale Earnhardt Jr. might be able to dominate, but he lost position during the middle and late stages, and came in fourth.

"We had a pretty good car," he said, "but we got a couple bad sets of tires and couldn't do anything. We've had good tires all year and during practice, but those today were a hand full."

Polesitter, Jimmy Spencer finished 11th.

The last driver to win with a Dodge at Charlotte was Richard Petty in the World 600, May 29, 1977.

Where Can I Find a Mate?
Lydia was lamenting the lack of places in her home town to meet single men. (All characters are fictitious.) "There is nothing to do here in (fill in the blank)," she told me sadly. "How am I supposed to meet a decent man my age?" Lydia was 35.

Paul was in the same situation. "I want to meet a woman who shares my religious faith," he said. "But at my church, there is no woman my age, and I'm certainly not going to find her in a bar, so what do I do?" Paul was 42.

Both Paul and Lydia seem ready for a new relationship, but what advice could I give them? As their counselor I had been single for

thirty years. I certainly did not know much about the world of singles. I gave them the assignment to find places in the community where they could meet other single people. Both just knew that they would find nothing, but they were surprised. What follows is a partial list of opportunities they found.

Paul had become even more convinced that a bar was no place to find his true love. One bar in a nearby town advertises itself as the place "Where the big dogs roam." Lydia replied, "If I were looking for a big dog, I guess that's where I'd go, but I had some other kind of guy in mind."

Both Paul and Lydia suggested church as one place to meet other singles.

"Even if there are no singles in my church," Paul added, "my church can get together with other churches for special activities."

Another opportunity that they strongly suggested was, "Take a course." "We were both surprised at how many educational opportunities there are in surrounding communities," Lydia reported. "There are college classes available at Somerset Community College (606-679-8501) and its other campuses (McCreary Co. and Laurel Co.). Kentucky Technical College (606-677-4049) offers training in a wide range of vocations. And most counties have an adult education center where you can earn your GED, if you have not already graduated from high school."

"And that's only the beginning!," Paul chimed in. "Health departments, county extension offices, hospitals, Red Cross, YMCA and other organizations offer classes of one sort or another. Now we don't guarantee that you will find your mate if you take a class, but what better place to be looking than among people who are trying to better themselves educationally?"

The counselor adds a point here, "Don't go to classes looking for a mate. Go to improve your skills, to learn and to grow. Along the way you might find someone with whom you can share the journey."

Paul strongly suggested joining a group that focuses on one of your interests. "In the paper today," Paul pointed out, "there were announcements of group meetings for Republicans, Democrats, bird watchers, history buffs, those committed to ethical government, church groups, Christian cowboys, and many self-help groups, such as SODA (Survivors of Domestic Abuse)." If you look for it, you will find some group out there that interests you."

Volunteer work was another area they discovered. "I can help Habitat for Humanity build houses," said Lydia. "And I can be a Big Brother or coach a team at the YMCA," Paul added.

Both Paul and Lydia concluded that there were more things to do in their counties than they had ever thought possible.

Have any of these things ever happened to you? **SLAPPED, SHAKEN, PUNCHED, BEATEN, BITTEN, PUSHED, PINCHED, KICKED, HAD OBJECTS THROWN AT YOU, DENIED PROPER MEDICAL CARE, CALLED DEMENTED NAMES, FORCED INTO UNWANTED SEXUAL ACTS.**

If any of these have happened to you or another woman, then you are a victim of what is usually called "spouse abuse." In addition, your abuser may do other things to you that you don't think are abuse, but they are.

Abuse is scary. You know that physical abuse includes actions like being hit. But did you know that lots of other things can also be abuse? Have any of the following ever happened to you? **THREATENED, HUMILIATED IN PUBLIC, CONTINUALLY CRITICIZED, CALLED DEROGATORY NAMES, HAD YOUR THOUGHTS AND FEELINGS CONTINUALLY IGNORED, DENIED ACCESS TO FINANCIAL RESOURCES OR THE OPPORTUNITY TO PARTICIPATE IN FINANCIAL DECISIONS.**

HAD VALUABLE PROPERTY DESTROYED, YOUR CHILDREN HAVE BEEN ABUSED TO PUNISH YOU, ACCUSED UNJUSTLY AND CONTINUALLY OF HAVING AFFAIRS OR FLIRTING, PREVENTED FROM SEEKING WORK, LOCKED OUT OF THE HOUSE, ISOLATED FROM FAMILY AND FRIENDS, ABANDONED IN DANGEROUS PLACES, DENIED AFFECTION AS PUNISHMENT, MANIPULATED WITH LIES AND CONTRADICTIONS.

These are not "normal." While you may not have been beaten, if any of these have happened to you, you have been abused.

It's Your Money

This month, the first hearing of my new Commission on Personal Savings and Investment, co-chaired by Sen. Brett Guthrie and Rep. Susan Westrom focused on the issue of women and savings.

Why women and savings? As the Covington hearing illuminated, women earn less and receive fewer retirement benefits than men, are more likely to be single parents and more often will take off time to raise their children. Further, consider simple

genetics: women live longer than men and therefore have longer to worry about issues like retirement and long term health care.

At the hearing we learned that these problems are particularly acute for Kentucky women. Kentucky ranks 41st among the 50 states for the percentage of women above the poverty level. Even worse, we rank 49th, in the number of women with a four-year college degree.

Fortunately, our Commission hearing yielded a potential source of financial planning assistance to thou-

sands of Kentucky women. My colleague and friend, Ohio State Treasurer Joe Detert, testified about an exciting program he had led for two years. Ohio's Women and Money seminars have involved more than 2,500 women in six cities, where they learned about saving money, budget and retirement planning and debt management. Best of all, these seminars are offered free to the public and at a negligible cost to Ohio taxpayers.

The Commission was very interested in the idea of replicating Ohio's success on this side of the river. A working group is being formed to study the idea more closely and develop recommendations for organi-

zation, curricula and scheduling. My goal is to have at least a model program up and running by next summer.

The Commission's second hearing will take place on December 12 at the University of Louisville. There, members will focus on the need for more financial literacy among Kentucky students from preschoolers to post graduates. At the hearing the Commission will receive testimony on existing programs that help educate Kentucky youth about financial planning and determine what needs are not being addressed. Additionally, the members will consider the need for legislation to regulate the predatory practices of some bad actors, which result in students building mountains of debt even before they enter the workforce.
