Pine Hill man jailed after threat to Judge

A Pine Hill man was arrested on Tuesday after he apparently threatened the life of a Circuit Judge.

Rockcastle Sheriff's Deputy Joe Rush arrested Frank Bond, 34, of Pine Hill, after he apparently threatened the life of Circuit Judge Debra Lambert.

According to Rush, Bond made his threat after he was in Lambert's court concerning a domestic dispute with his wife, Martha.

Lambert had ordered Bond to undergo counseling, where he apparently made his threat.

Frank Bond was arrested around 5 p.m. in the courthouse parking lot.

Rush said that Frank Bond's wife Martha, 20, was arrested earlier in the day on a civil contempt of court charge.

Rush said that Martha Bond was apparently belligerent to Judge Lambert during a domestic hearing in her court.

Martha Bond was also charged with promoting contraband when she was taken to the Rockcastle County Detention Center.

According to court records, Martha Bond had drug paraphernalia in her possession when she was being admitted to the detention center.

Frank Bond's problems started on Monday night when he was shot in the leg with an AKS assault rifle at his residence around 2 a.m.

State police detective Gary Lane said that Bond was grazed in the left leg by a shot fired by Clarence Bradley, 39, of Mt. Vernon.

Lane said that Bond told him that the shooting was accidental and that no charges were filed.

Lane said the investigation into the shooting continues.

Two plead guilty in federal court

The U.S. Attorney's office in London announced Tuesday that Jason Bullock, 19, of Quail, entered a guilty plea to conspiring to manufacture over 500 grams of methamphetamine and Gary T. Elliott, 34, of Mt. Vernon, entered a guilty plea to attempting to manufacture approximately 188 grams of methamphetamine.

The indictment against Bullock alleged that beginning in January 2000, through April 4, 2001, he conspired with other persons to manufacture over 500 grams of methamphetamine in Rockcastle County. The same indictment charging Elliott alleged that on or about February 12, 2001, he aided and abetted by others, attempted to manufacture approximately 188 grams of methamphetamine.

The pleas were entered before Judge Jennifer S. Coffman in United States District Court in London.

Bullock and Elliott are scheduled to be sentenced on April 12, 2002 in London.

Farmers-Businessmen Banquet 2001 County dismissed from dog suit

On October 26th, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court was dismissed from an appeal to the Attorney General's Office related to an open records request by the Trivette Foundation and country music star Ricky Skaggs.

Skaggs and the foundation are animal activists that are involved in ongoing litigation with Kentucky counties and county officials regarding the failure to provide dog pounds and dog wardens as required by state statute.

For a second time in three years the fiscal court was dismissed from open records appeals with the Attorney General's office by Skaggs and his foundation. The county was represented by County Attorney Jeff Burdette.

Burdette stated that he was pleased with yet another release from the fiscal court from an appeal to the Attorney General's office. "The credit belongs to the fiscal court

clerk, Mrs. Anna Mullins and Mary Jane French," Burdette said. "They accumulated the documentation which included a grant package and recent approval, they took photographs of the dog pound location and reviewed years of court minutes to comply with this request," he said.

City of Mt. Vernon threatened with legal action by local resident

A local man is threatening legal action against the City of Mt. Vernon after an encounter with Mt. Vernon police last week.

Michael Sheliga of West Main Street, Mt. Vernon, says in a letter to Mt. Vernon Mayor Karen King that he was unnecessarily detained by police in the Fairground Hill area of Mt. Vernon around 6:45 p.m. Tuesday, October 30th.

Apparently a local citizen had called police to complain about Sheliga's presence in the area.

Sheliga wrote in his letter to Mayor King that while carrying an apple and bag of rice he was detained by four Mt. Vernon City Police officers.

Sheliga says he had been to see a sick church friend, went to Save-A-Lot to buy some groceries and about an hour after stopping at his friends house he was stopped and questioned by Mt. Vernon city police.

In Sheliga's letter to the Mayor, he said that during the conversation with the four officers he was repeatedly threatened with arrest and jail for various legal activities including being in the Fairground Hill section of Mt. Vernon, knocking on any house door and eating unpuffed rice.

Sheliga also alleges that officers searched his grocery bags and pockets and subjected him to a lengthy, wide-ranging interrogation on subjects including his eating habits and neighbor's dog.

Sheliga said that during the interrogation that officers told him that the activities he had been involved in that day were not permitted with the "war going on and not in this climate."

Sheliga also alleges that one officer tried to intimidate him by standing six inches in front of his face and that one officer would not allow him to speak during the interrogation.

In his letter to Mayor King, Sheliga requested what he calls a constructive solution to the officers' actions.

They include: Assistant Chief of Police Eddie Delaney receives a written reprimand to be placed in his permanent employment file for detaining Sheliga without good cause, his threats of arrest/jail for legal actions, and as the officer in charge of the scene, not limiting the actions of officer Doan.

Officer Brian Doan receives a written reprimand to be placed in his permanent employment file for his purposeful acts of intimidation.

The City of Mt. Vernon, on behalf of its police department issues a written apology to Sheliga for its

actions on October 30th.

Officers Barry Adams, Doan and Delaney receive additional training, through a professional training organization, on how to appropriately interact with citizens.

Officer Adams receives a written reprimand to be placed in his permanent employment file for detaining Sheliga without good cause and his threats of arrest/jail for legal activities.

Sheliga receive full compensation for all legal and clerical fees incurred.

A minimal (\$50) settlement is paid by the City. The City will donate this money to Ashley's House in Sheliga's name.

Sheliga receive a written acknowledgment for his right to walk to Fairground Hill and elsewhere in public areas of Mt. Vernon.

Sheliga receive a written acknowledgment of his right to knock on people's door, under normal circumstances, for purposes including but not limited to asking directions, saying hello to church friends, proselytizing, campaigning and informing citizens about the actions of their police department.

Sheliga receive a written acknowledgment of his right to possess and consume unpuffed rice.

The City of Mt. Vernon send a courtesy letter to the original complainant in this matter asking her or him to take sensible steps to reasonably determine the facts of the situation before making excessive, inaccurate claims to the police department.

Asst. Chief Delaney said Tuesday that he had seen the complaint and that he could not comment, except to say that Sheliga had not been charged with any crime.

Several attempts to reach Mayor King for comment were unsuccessful.

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"What Saith the Scriptures"

One of the important topics in the word of God is the subject of the nature of man. In 1 Thessalonians 5:23 we read, "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Notice that Paul describes 3 parts of man: spirit, soul, and body.

Man's body is made from the dust of the ground. Staying warm while hunting

Spending time outdoors in cold weather can be a lot of fun. Or it can make you miserable. Jackie Bushman, the host of the Buckmasters television series, knows that all too well. He loves the outdoors and hunts in all types of winter weather throughout North America. Over the years, he's developed a system for staying warm regardless of the location or the weather.

"I'm one of the coldest natural people around," Bushman says, "and while I spend as much time outdoors as I possibly can, I have to stay warm in order to enjoy it and concentrate on what I'm doing. For the TV series, concentration is especially important. When I'm hunting for pleasure, I can go back to the cabin if I get cold. But, if we're taping a hunt, I have to stay put until we finish shooting."

Bushman's TV hunts can last from before sun-up until after sundown. On some of the hunts in northern states and Canada, it can be dangerously cold. On hunts in warmer climates, concentration is especially important. When I'm hunting for pleasure, I can go back to the cabin if I get cold. But, if we're taping a hunt, I have to stay put until we finish shooting.

"I probably wear more clothes than most people when I go hunting," Bushman says, "but I've worked out a system that allows me to hunt comfortably regardless of the weather. Some of the stuff I wear might not look very 'cool' but I'd rather dress for warmth than for looks."

"I buy clothing in sizes bigger than I ordinarily wear so I can wear layers and still be comfortable and have freedom of movement," the founder and CEO of Buckmasters says. I often wear three pairs of thermal underwear. One pair is large, the next is X-large and the third is XX-large. And I always wear a Scent-Lok suit. My jacket size will be XX-large so I can get extra clothes under it. My pants will be a 38 waist instead of my normal 36. The outer layer will be 6-pocket pants or bib overalls at least a size larger than my other clothes."

"Keeping my hands warm is important, but for safety reasons, when I take a shot, whether it's with a bow,

rifle or shotgun, I want to touch my trigger or my release with the flesh of my hand," he says. "I wear finger mittens that can be worn as a complete mitten or folded back to expose the fingers."

Bushman wears rubber-soled boots with different insulation levels, depending on the temperature. "Rubber-soled boots don't leave as much scent where I walk, and they're ideal for wading in water."

"The main thing," he emphasizes, "is to wear clothes that are comfortable and allow you to move comfortably or sit still in any kind of weather. It's better to have too many clothes than not enough. You can always take a layer off if you get hot."

"When I'm hunting in bitter cold, I have chemical heat packs stuck everywhere. They make a real difference when it's bitter cold. I wear a multi-stuff hand warmer around my waist. It has zippered pockets for my knife and other hunting items. I keep a heat pack in there to warm my hands. I can also put a heat pack in the pouch of the mittens that covers my fingers."

He wears a hunting brace belt for lower back support that has pockets to hold heat packs against his kidneys.

"One of the most important things I do to stay warm," Bushman says, "is to wrap a heat pack in a bandana and tie that around my neck. I lose body heat if my neck is exposed, so I layer it using the bandana with a heat pack, a turtle-neck shirt, and a skiing dicky. The heat pack also helps keep my neck from getting stiff so I can turn my head and keep a sharp watch for deer. I learned a long time ago that I can't expose my skin, particularly my neck, to severe cold and sit still for 8 hours."

For headgear in cold weather, Bushman wears a reversible toboggan—camouflage on one side and blaze orange on the other. He also carries two dense, one-inch-thick, rubber seat cushions. "One keeps me from sitting on a cold, hard metal treestand, or on the cold ground," he says. "I put the other on the footrest of the tree stand to prevent the cold metal from sucking the

warmth out of my boots." If you don't have a rubber seat cushion, Bushman recommends using some camo fleece. "It will keep your feet warm and keep the noise down."

Bushman also uses a well-stocked backpack on hunts. "It's great for organizing gear," he says. "By keeping all my essential equipment in the backpack, I know where it is all the time. A rain suit is one item that always goes into my backpack," he adds, "along with a saw, flashlight, extra cartridges, snacks, water, cover seats, attractant scents, first aid kit, scent cushions, matches—you name it. If I'm hunting in unfamiliar country, I throw in an aerial photo, a topo map, or a GPS unit. And, if the temperature warms up, I'll shed a layer

of clothes and stuff them in the backpack."

When picking out a backpack for hunting, Bushman suggests considering one made of the newer fleece materials that won't make a lot of noise when you brush up against a limb while walking through the woods. "You never know when a big buck might hear some noise he doesn't like and decide to go the other way."

"Hunting should always be fun," Bushman says. "But it's only fun if you're comfortable. A little advance planning can make all the difference in enjoying a day in the woods. I figure we get too few days in the outdoors in this life, so I try to enjoy every minute of every one."

The very thought brought a tear to my eye, I dropped to my knees and started to cry.

The soldier awakened and I heard a rough voice, "Santa don't cry, this life is my choice."

I fight for freedom, I don't ask for more, my life is my god, my country, my corps.

The soldier rolled over and drifted to sleep, I couldn't control it, I continued to weep.

I kept watch for hours, so silent and still, and we both shivered from the cold night's chill.

I didn't want to leave on that cold, dark night, this guardian of honor so willing to fight.

Then the soldier rolled over, with a voice soft and pure, whispered, "Carry on Santa, it's Christmas day, all is secure."

One look at my watch, and I knew he was right, "Merry Christmas my friend, and to all a good night."

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Rockets beat up Greenup Co. 55-0

The Rockcastle County Rockets are still on a path to a state title after a 55-0 win over Greenup County in the first round of the playoffs on Friday night.

The Rockets will face Ashland Paul Blazer this Friday night, a team sporting a U.K. recruit and a team that is 8-3 on the season.

The 2001 Rockets had another first for a RCHS team in the 17 years that head coach Tom Larkey and head assistant Tony Saylor have coached together at RCHS.

Saylor, who has never missed a

game in his seventeen years still had not missed one officially, but on Friday night he was not able to coach from the sidelines, after undergoing surgery on Friday for a bad appendix.

Saylor did manage to get to the field and into the locker room before the game, but there was no coaching.

Earlier this year, Larkey underwent surgery for prostate cancer and he too missed his first game. Larkey's test results since his surgery have been very positive and he is expected to fully recover as is Saylor.

Friday night the Rockets racked up 524 yards of total offense, 328 through the air and 196 on the ground. The Rocket offense got off to a

slow start for a second week in a row, scoring only once in the first quarter. However they made up for it in the second quarter by putting up four scores to take a 35-0 lead into the locker room at halftime.

Marty Reagan scored the only touchdown in the first period on a 12 yard pass from Aaron Anderkin.

In the second period Reagan scored again on a two yard run.

Josh Hale scored on a 14 yard pass from Anderkin and Reagan finished the first half scoring on a two yard run.

In the third period, Hale scored again, this time on an 11 yard pass from Anderkin and Reagan scored on a four yard run.

In the fourth period, Josh Taylor finished off the scoring with an 11 yard run.

The Rocket defense held Greenup County to just eight yards of total offense.

Greenup County had a minus 10 yards rushing and 18 passing.

Senior P.J. Rowe had three sacks and Josh Hale had an interception to lead the Rocket defense.

Rowe also had six tackles and assists as did junior Stephen Boreing, who turned in an excellent performance from his linebacker position.

Senior William Blair had five tackles and assists and senior Clay Dooley had four tackles and assists.

James Michael Bussell had three tackles and assists, Jason Leger had one, Hale had two, Steve Blair, two, Adam Childress, one, Josh Taylor, one, Tanner Abney, two, Nick Thomas, one and Reagan, four.

On offense Anderkin was 22 for 28 through the air for 328 yards. He also had 13 yards on two carries.

Hale caught eleven passes for 129 yards.

Reagan rushed 12 times for 52 yards and he caught five passes for 126 yards.

Dooley had nine yards on two carries, Clell Swinney had 27 yards on four carries and Josh Taylor led the Rockets in rushing with 73 yards on seven carries.

Devin Taylor caught four passes for 54 yards and he rushed once for 15 yards.

Senior Coty Reams caught one pass for nineteen yards and Brandon Reams and Chris Croucher each had a carry.

Unfortunately, for the Rockets Reams will be sidelined for at least three weeks because he broke his collarbone on that 19 yard reception.

Statistically, the Rockets ended the regular season last week as the number one ranked defensive team in the state, allowing a minus four yards per game and 39 yards passing.

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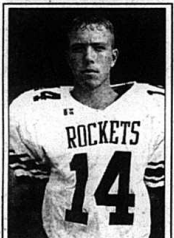

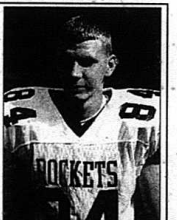

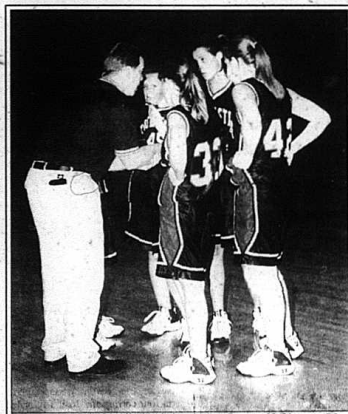

Winter Weather Awareness Week

The National Weather Service offices in the state of Kentucky have designated November 12-16th as Winter Weather Awareness Week.

Winter Weather Awareness Week is intended to encourage people to review the hazards and safety precautions of winter so that they are prepared for the upcoming winter season. The National Weather Service will broadcast winter weather safety information on its NOAA Weather Radio all during the week of November

12, with each day focusing on a different winter weather hazard.

Every year, Kentuckians will experience the disruptions that occur from snow storms, ice storms or severe cold spells. Last year, the state experienced a rather cold start to the winter, December was the coldest on record for many locations. Temperatures warmed and for the rest of the winter near normal temperatures were experienced. For a third year in a row that area recorded below normal amounts of snowfall. Other recent winters serve as reminders of the severe conditions that can affect our

area. In January 1996, a two day storm brought widespread one to two feet of snow to eastern Kentucky, and in January 1994, a snowstorm blanketed much of the same area with over a foot of snow. The January 1994 storm was followed by record cold, with widespread temperatures of 20 to 30 below zero.

Do not let severe winter catch you off guard. Monitor NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio and television for the latest winter weather watches, warnings and advisories. Be prepared BEFORE a winter storm strikes, and stay safe this coming winter season.

A farewell win for Joe By Gerald Hodges

Joe Nemecek led 196 laps of the NASCAR Winston Cup Pop Secret 400 at North Carolina Speedway on Sunday, and for the second time in his Winston Cup career the victory lane celebration was also a farewell party.

Nemecek had announced he would leave the No. 33 Chevrolet owned by Andy Petre at season's end, a race that has no sponsor and no driver signed for 2002.

He got the lead from Kenny Wallace on Lap 225 and built his advantage to six seconds before making a pit stop on Lap 269. He was more than seven-seconds behind leader Kurt Busch when he got back onto the track, but he made the distance within 30 more laps to regain the lead.

Nemecek said he knew from the run to the first pit stop that Sunday was going to be a good day.

"The car was just so balanced that I could go to the top or the bottom, wherever I wanted to," Nemecek said. "That was the difference.... Early in the runs I couldn't run quite as quick as the other cars, but I was just trying to conserve the tires early. This is a place where if you spend the tires early in a run you pay for it later. Believe me, I've had that lesson taught to me a few times."

Johnny Benson finished third in his No. 10 Valvoline Pontiac.

"It was a pretty good day for us. We're not going to complain with third at all. But, it was pretty hard to compete. The '11' and the '33' were pretty strong all day. We did what we could."

"At the beginning of the race I thought we were a lot better than we were at the end of the race. Once the track got real slick, we just couldn't get a hold of anything, especially with the front of the car. We just pushed and pushed, but we're real happy to finish third."

Dale Jarrett was the fourth-place finisher and represented the highest finishing Ford.

"A good race car is how you go from 31st to fourth and good pit

stops. The guys did a great job in and out all day. We got the car a lot better and had a good car, but we just never could get the track position that we needed. First of all, let's congratulate Joe Nemecek and Andy Petre. As many people know, Andy built the first race car I ever drove, so I'm awfully happy for him and that race team.

Jeff Gordon has now built a 326-point lead over Ricky Rudd and unless the earth opens up and swallow him, he will win his fourth Winston Cup championship.

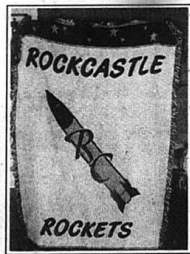

Forest fires continue, firefighters tiring

Forest fires continue burning in eastern and southeastern Kentucky today despite light rainfall last week. Since January 1, there have been 1,664 fires, burning 97,494 acres. 2001 is shaping up to be a serious fire occurrence year.

Hundreds of firefighters have been fighting fires for several days and in some areas, weeks. They are beginning to tire and become frustrated. Many of the fires brought under control by firefighters are often reset by arsonists. In order to assist the division in controlling the number fires, most counties in eastern and southeastern Kentucky have issued outdoor burning bans. The Kentucky Division of Forestry urges everyone to abide by the bans and be on the lookout for suspicious activities near fire areas.

"We need the public's help in putting a stop to this crisis," said Leah MacSwiggan, director of the Kentucky Division of Forestry. "If you see any suspicious in your area, please call the Target Arson Hotline at 1-800-27-ARSON, the local Kentucky Division of Forestry office, or your local law enforcement agency. The Target Arson program offers a cash reward of up to \$1,000 for information leading to an arrest and indictment of an arsonist. Callers may remain anonymous. Arson is a felony and is punishable by fines of \$1,000 and up to five years in prison. Arson fires destroy more valuable timber; they often threaten homes and lives.

If wildfires threaten your home you can take several steps to reduce the risk of property damage.

- Clear brush and debris down to bare soil in a 10-foot-wide path around all structures. If water is available, wet down the area. All leaves, limbs, twigs and debris should be raked and removed from your yard and under structures. Gutters and chimneys should also be cleaned of leaves, limbs and debris.

- Remove dead branches that extend over the roof, prune tree branches and shrubs within 15 feet of stoves/pipes and chimney outlets. Keep grass mowed and remove dried vines from the walls of your home.

- Dispose of newspapers and trash at approved sites, store gasoline, oily rags and other flammable materials in approved safety cans. Place cans in a safe location away from the base of buildings.
- Stack firewood at least 100 feet away and uphill from your home. Keep fire tools like rakes, axes, hand-saws or chainsaws, buckets and shovels handy in case fire threatens your home.

The Kentucky National Guard continues to provide air and ground assistance. The division continues to use correction crews from the Bell County Forestry Camp, Otter Creek Correctional Complex, Big Sandy Detention Center and Morgan County Detention Center. "Without their assistance, the division could not possibly deal with this many fires at one time," said MacSwiggan.

Restrictor plate meeting termed successful

NASCAR held a meeting last week with Winston Cup drivers, crew chiefs and car owners to discuss potential restrictor-plate ideas for the 2002 season. The meeting, which was held at Joe Gibbs Racing, lasted approximately 90 minutes. Almost all participants expressed

relief that NASCAR was at last trying to do something to resolve their complaints over restrictor-plate racing at Talladega and Daytona.

"I think everybody knew that we don't want the current rule," said Tony Stewart. "NASCAR said they don't want the current rule and we all left and decided on a seven-eighths restrictor plate and a 55-degree rear spoiler and a six-and-a-half-inch tall rear spoiler. I asked the question, 'Where is the air dam?' And they said, 'We've got to work on that one - three-and-a-half to four-inches.' So, it was good. It was real productive. It was a real happy. I'm not leaving upset about anything and I don't think anybody in the room ought to be."

"Safety was a topic and the manufacturers are in that too, but there was not much at all. It's one of the nicest meetings I've ever been in. I think everybody was pulling for one cause -- to have great races and safe races."

Dale Jarrett didn't start life as a racer

Dale Jarrett, the 1999 NASCAR Winston Cup Champion had other things on his mind early in life besides driving a race car.

Even though Dale's father won two championships (1961 & '63) and was very successful in the mid-'60s, not much of that rubbed off on Dale initially. He just thought it was fun to go to the racetrack and play with other drivers' children there, such as Kyle Petty, Richard Petty's son. He never dreamed it would become his vocation.

In fact, Jarrett wasn't sure what the heck he wanted to be after graduating high school. He was sure about what he loved playing sports. He was the star quarterback at Newton-Conover High School and first forward on the basketball team, star shortstop on the baseball team, and star golfer.

"I knew that he was going to be a professional athlete of some sort because he had so much God-given talent," Ned Jarrett said. "I really thought he was going to be a pro golfer more than anything else."

Ned Jarrett had good reason to think that. His son was offered a golf scholarship to the University of South Carolina but turned it down because he "wasn't much interested in studying," as Ned put it. Instead, Dale got married and had his first son, Jason, when he was only 18, then got a job at Hickory Motor Speedway because his dad owned the track. He got divorced shortly thereafter.

Dale did odd jobs at the track, including taking tickets, selling popcorn, driving the pace car and mowing the lawn -- which wasn't one of his fortes. He even convinced his father once to buy a few goats so they could eat the grass on the side of a hill. That way, Dale wouldn't have to mow it. The plan backfired, though, when the goats opted to eat the dashboards and seats of old demolition derby cars stored nearby.

"You could say I lacked direction," Jarrett said. "Every day during lunch, I'd set up my little driving range behind the racetrack and hit balls into an empty parking lot. I was really into golf before racing came along."

Racing didn't come along, surprisingly, until Jarrett was 20, and he

he wanted to drive race cars for the rest of his life. He sprained up to his parents inside the press box to tell them the news -- but they already had a feeling it was coming.

Ned Jarrett lights up when he tells the story of that night, smiling wide when he recounts how 1970 Winston Cup champion Bobby Isaac ran down pit road to talk to Ned after he raced in the event.

"Bobby said, 'I thought you said Dale was going to be in that car tonight,'" Ned Jarrett said. "And I said, 'He said.' Then Bobby shook his head and said, 'Can't be. Can't be. He was too smooth.'"

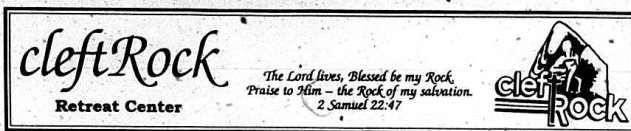
Dale Jarrett loves telling that story too. And he loves remembering the feeling he had that night, the night he figured out he wanted to focus his athletic abilities on becoming a race-car driver. Since then, he says, it hasn't been easy -- but it has been gratifying. At first, he was broke just trying to make a name for himself. Then he met Kelley, and the two started a life together.

While they always expected to remain in Hickory near their families, they never thought life could be this good. They did, however, think racing would always be a part of it. He would work on his race car at the shop until 9 or 10 at night, and I just couldn't understand why he wasn't coming home for these home-cooked meals," said Kelley, who was a fifth-grade teacher back then.

"Well, I realized right then we weren't going to be June and Ward Cleaver." At that point, Dale was doing all he could to make a living as a driver, relying on Kelley's income to get them by. He drove in his first Winston Cup race in 1984, then went to the series full-time in 1987. While he won the Daytona 500 in 1993 and 1996, only the past four seasons have been blockbuster years. Driving for Robert Yates Racing, Jarrett has finished third in the championship twice and second once, in 1994 when he lost to Jeff Gordon by only 14 points.

"My racing career has been a struggle because I never had any money, so it has been one slow step at a time," Jarrett said. "But I'm a believer that things are brought to you when you're ready for them. It's just taken me a long time to be ready for it."

September 11 Had Far-reaching Effects

On September 11 I was in Rochester, Minnesota at the Mayo Clinic for medical tests. (For my friends who might worry, do not. I am fine.) Because I had no appointments that day, I slept late and walked to the corner drugstore for a newspaper. It was on the television screen mounted high on the wall of that store that I first saw the Twin Towers and learned what was happening in New York.

After eating a quick breakfast, I returned to my room and getting in front of the TV. Except for going out to get food, I watched all day. It was scary and fascinating, and I could not stop. The next day I spent every spare moment glued to the television, taking breaks only for meals and to have some tests done at the hospital. By Wednesday evening, I was depressed. All I could see in my mind were images of that second plane crashing into the World Trade Center. I was feeling blue and defeated. I was lonely, being 700 miles away from family. I finally had to quit watching. I knew it was getting to me.

That evening I had the worst headache I have ever had in my life. I seriously considered going to the emergency room until I discovered that hot towels on the back of my neck gave me enough relief that I was able to sleep.

How did September 11 affect you? Depression, anxiety and posttraumatic symptoms are showing up in many Americans these days. I am teaching the seminar "You Can Beat Depression" on November 12 at 7:00 p.m. at the Center for Rural Development in Somerset. You are invited.

I will discuss the effects of the terrorist attacks and give you concrete ideas for dealing with those effects. To register call 679-4134 or 1-877-PASTOR-8. The fee is \$20.

Here are some of the things I did to fight my depression brought on by September 11.

1. I stopped watching television. Continued exposure to a horrifying event is depressing. As I watched the second plane hit the tower, I imagined what the passengers on that plane must have gone through during the moments before impact. That was a very depressing thought. I had to limit my exposure to the replay to get it out of my mind.

2. I looked to my faith. The ministerial association in Rochester organized an interfaith worship service on Tuesday evening. Word spread quickly and a large crowd gathered. As a stranger in a city where I knew no one, I was comforted to be with others who shared my faith.

3. I turned to my family. Being away from home during these days was no fun. Because the airports were closed, I had no idea when I could come home. Finally on Friday, the planes started flying again. I was one of the first to fly out of the Rochester airport, and seven hours later I was home. I was very glad to see my family.

I cannot tell you that doing these things has eliminated all my depression and anxiety. The continual coverage by the media of the terrorist attacks, the anthrax scare and the war in Afghanistan have many of us concerned. As someone said, "Only a fool is not afraid in wartime."

However, the steps I took have helped. I recommend them to you.

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Parent and teacher discussion project created

A parent and teacher discussion project created by the Prichard Committee for Academic Excellence will be established in the Kentucky Tech school system beginning the first of 2002.

The discussions, called "Parents and Teachers Talking Together" (PT3), are a structured yet informal process that helps the two groups, parents and teachers, better understand each other, exchange ideas about improving education and accomplish specific goals to make those improvements.

Principals from the Kentucky Tech school system, comprised of 52 high school area technology centers and administered by the Cabinet for Workforce Development's Department for Technical Education, are learning about how the PT3 process works during a strategic planning meeting this week in Georgetown.

Robert F. Sexton, executive director of the Prichard Committee, said the collaboration between his agency and the Cabinet for Workforce Development is an important step in Kentucky's technical educational system.

"This partnership between the Prichard Committee and the Cabinet for Workforce Development offers both parties an opportunity to improve technical education for high school students across Kentucky," Sexton said. "We view this as an important step in our overall efforts on behalf of students, parents and teachers. We're excited about work-

ing with the cabinet."

Cabinet for Workforce Development Secretary Allen D. Rose, concurred with Sexton.

"We are pleased to enter into this project with the Prichard Committee," said Rose. "Not only are we proud to be associated with an organization synonymous with academic excellence, we are eager to see this project implemented for the benefit of the department's primary focus - technical school students in Kentucky."

The Prichard Committee provides PT3 training for local facilitators, an overall format and discussion questions, a checklist and directions for organizers and supplemental materials needed to hold a session.

PT3 sessions involve no more than 30 participants each and are sponsored by local groups such as Prichard Committee community groups, family resource centers or school councils.

The Prichard Committee for Academic Excellence is a non-profit, independent group that advocates for improved elementary, secondary and higher education.

The Department of Technical Education's 52 Kentucky Tech area technology centers of high school students hands-on training and education in a wide range of technical fields, including health and human services, construction technology, business and graphics technology, manufacturing technology and computer networking and repair.

For 78 years, the week before Thanksgiving has been celebrated by communities across the country as American Education Week, a special time to honor the teachers and school staff who educate the nation's 53 million school children every day.

This year, American Education Week (AEW) will be observed November 11-17, providing the nation an opportunity to recognize the critical role public schools serve by caring for their children, and imparting American ideals.

"This year, it is fitting to acknowledge the importance of teachers and school staff who year after year teach generations of native-born and immigrant students to understand and respect America's core values," said National Education Association (NEA) President Bob Chase. "I urge the country to commemorate AEW by honoring America's educators for their vital role in reclaiming our nation's spirit."

"In the wake of September 11, teachers, school support professionals and other staff have bonded together to help children cope with overwhelming events, while experiencing their own shock and grief," Chase explained. "School staff across the nation have channeled feelings of anxiety into service, raising funds for relief efforts and sharing valuable lessons of hope and healing."

The NEA and the American Legion established American Education Week in 1921 as a way of highlighting the value of public education. Today, AEW has grown to include the 12 leading national education organizations, such as the PTA and groups representing principals, school boards and administrators.

The 2001 theme, "Together: Mak-

ing Public Schools Great for Every Child," reflects that when the partnership between school, staff, parents and students is successful, a quality education is nearly guaranteed.

The theme also points out that everyone has a role to play in making public schools great - parents, neighbors, business, government, as well as teachers, principals, bus drivers and all other school staff.

For this reason, the Wednesday of American Education Week (Nov. 14) is designated "Educational Support Professional Day" to salute the unique role played by school support staff. 75 percent of whom live in the same neighborhoods as their students. Their shared socioeconomic class, race or ethnicity leads to powerful bonds with youngsters.

"No matter what their job at school - whether it's teaching math or typing attendance reports - school professionals impart lessons about respect, diversity and responsibility," Chase said. "These ideals will help students throughout life."

American Education Week activities span from poster contests and PTA hosted suppers to student gifts of handmade cards, personal essays, and other "thank you's" to school staff. Parents participate in read-ins, principals produce daily morning quotes about the value of education, and communities hold events to celebrate the good work being done in the nation's classrooms.

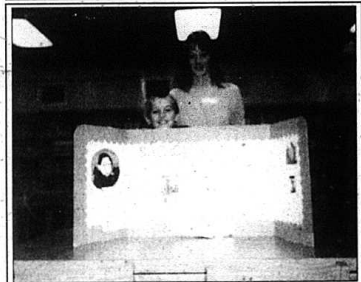

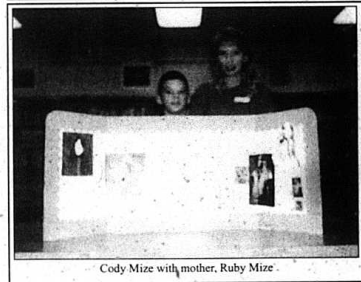

No P&CP Signup For TLAP00
During fiscal year 2000, FSA provided payments through the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program 2000 (TLAP00) to quota holders and producers to help them defray income losses in the 2000 crop year because of quota reductions. One of the eligibility requirements for TLAP00 was that a farm must have received Planned and Considered (P&CP) credit for the 2000 crop year. This statute has been amended to provide that TLAP00 payments may be made to person(s) who are otherwise eligible without regard to whether the quota

was used for the production of tobacco during the 2000 crop year. Applications will be accepted starting November 1, 2001 through December 14, 2001. Late file applications will not be approved. Eligibility requirements include:
• Any person who owned, operated or produced eligible tobacco on a farm for which a quota reduction from the 1999 crop year to the 2000 crop year occurred.
• Any farm which was not approved for a payment during the initial TLAP00 signup because there was no P&CP.

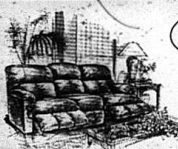
Eligible types of tobacco includes: burley, type 31; flue-cured; types 11-14; dark fire-cured, type 21 and cigar binder types 54-55.
Payments will be based on FY2000 information with rate the same as those in the initial TLAP00 signup. All eligible persons or entities must agree on the division of payments before the application form, CCC-950, can be approved.
REMEMBER: The application signup period is November 1-December 14, 2001.
Marketing Cards
Rockcastle County producers who have received marketing cards are reminded to carefully check their card for complete and accurate information. Please compare the farm number, warehouse number and pounds listed on the card to the information

provided on the notification letter mailed with the card. If you find an error return the card immediately to the office for correction(s).
Remember: You are responsible for the information listed on the card.
Changing Burley Tobacco Designation
November 2, 2001 was the final date to change marketing designation under the regular redesignation period. Changes made by November 2nd under the regular redesignation will be effective November 12, 2001. Farmers will not be able to use the marketing card until the effective date. The next regular redesignation period will be December 3 through December 7, 2001.
"If a farmer wants to change their

sales location after November 2nd, the marketing card will not be effective until December 17th under regular redesignation. This is the first year all marketing cards have not been effective when issued. Jeffrey S. Hall, Kentucky State Executive Director, states that December 13th is the final auction sales date in Kentucky for Burley tobacco prior to the Christmas break.
Farmers with a question about their tobacco marketing card or sales designation should contact their local FSA County office.

Here's terrific news for people who want to help their children or grandchildren with education costs. Two major changes in the tax law will go into effect starting January 1, 2002.

Up to this point, the Education IRA (now called Education Savings Accounts) only allowed a maximum annual contribution of \$500. Starting in 2002, the Education IRA is upping its contribution limits to \$2,000 with the same benefits that

have been offered since its inception in 1997. Also starting in 2002, withdrawals from the State 529 plans (known in Kentucky as THE KENTUCKY SAVINGS PLAN TRUST) will not only be free of state income tax, but also of federal income taxes. For more information, go to the following websites:
