Rockets will play for state championship

The Rockcastle County Rocket football team will make history on Saturday when they play in the championship game of the Kentucky Class 3A play-off.

Rocketstall who is 14 and 0 this season, will face Boyle County, a team that hasn't lost a game in high school football in three years and a team that has won two straight state titles.

Rockcastle advanced to the state championship game with a 17-14 win over Covington Catholic on the road on Saturday.

Covington Catholic racked up 25 yards more on offense than the Rockets did, but they made three costly mistakes, which eventually cost them the game.

First, a defensive holding penalty wiped out an interception by the Colonels, which the Rockets turned into a 39 yard field goal by place-kicker Jens Strietzel.

The kick, which came on the last play of the half, gave Rockcastle a 10-7 lead at half-time and quieted a very loud Covington Catholic crowd.

"That was big, but the referees made the right call, they (Catholic) grabbed the jersey of one of our receivers as soon as the ball was snapped," head coach Tom Larkey said.

There were two more Colonel turnovers, which helped drive the nail in the Colonel coffin.

The Colonels missed a field goal with 7:26 to go in the third quarter, but the fatal dagger came in the fourth quarter with two minutes to go in the game.

Junior Stephen Boring picked off a Colonel pass inside the ten as the Colonels were threatening to score. "I was just trying to tip it and knock it down - but then I caught it after the tip," he said.

In some other big games for the Rockets they have made some mistakes they could not overcome - but on Saturday the Rockets actually recorded none, which was probably the key to their advancing.

"I would have never dreamed it - we've got a good football team and a bunch of good kids, but it is hard to believe we are going to play for a state title on Saturday," said head assistant Tony Saylor.

Larkey and Saylor have been together at RCHS for the past 17 years and have had only one losing season - that was their first year.

Saturday will mark the first time the Rockets have made it to a state championship game, although the Rockets have been well respected for many years in the high school football community.

The Rockets scoring went as follows:

After falling behind 7-0, the Rockets scored on a 17 yard pass from junior quarterback Aaron Anderkin to senior Josh Hale.

With time running out in the half, Strietzel, a foreign exchange student from Germany, kicked his second field goal of the season to give the Rockets a 10-7 lead.

And the final scoring blow came with 5:26 left in the game.

Two arrested after police find meth lab

On Friday, the Kentucky State Police at London received information of a possible lab in Rockcastle County used in the manufacturing of methamphetamine.

Troopers from the State Police and officers of the Mt. Vernon Police Department responded to the report at the residence of Johnny Dooley on Dooley Road off Chestnut Ridge approximately 2 miles south of Mt. Vernon in Rockcastle County.

After arriving, officers contacted the Rockcastle County Attorney's office and obtained a search warrant. During the search, troopers discovered a working methamphetamine lab along with the components used in the production of methamphetamine, according to a news release from the KSP.

Johnny Dooley, age 39 and Fredrick Scott Combs, age 30, both of Mt. Vernon, were arrested at the scene and lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail and charged with Manufacturing Methamphetamine 1st.

Trooper Lafe Owens is conducting the investigation and was assisted at the scene by Trooper Jason McCowan, Mt. Vernon City Police Officers Barry Adams, members of the State Police Special Investigation and the Rockcastle County Attorneys Office.

Investigation is continuing.

Saturday wreck claims lives of 21-year-olds

Two Rockcastle County young people were killed in a single vehicle accident on Saturday morning.

According to Kentucky State Police in London, Miranda Ginter, 21 and Robert E. Allen, 21, both of Mt. Vernon were pronounced dead at the scene by Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

she was driving as the vehicle was crossing a bridge. The vehicle left the roadway striking a tree and came to rest overturned in Brush Creek.

Seatbelts were apparently not in use at the time of the accident and alcohol is suspected to have contributed to the accident, according to police.

The accident occurred at approximately 6:00 a.m. on KY 1912 approximately 10 miles east of Mt. Vernon.

According to State Trooper Staci Dixon, Ginter was driving west on KY 1912 when she apparently lost control of the 1989 Chevrolet Z-24

An autopsy was performed on Ginter, but results have not been released.

Members of the Rockcastle County Fire Rescue and the Rockcastle County EMS assisted Trooper Dixon at the scene. The investigation is continuing.

Last Wednesday morning on an Interstate Highway near Asheville, North Carolina, going 70 miles an hour, the Colonel's heart gave out on him. He gasped, "Oh God," and Betty thought he was talking about the traffic until she noticed him slumping over the steering wheel.

Somewhat she managed to get the van into the emergency lane and thought to stop and she still wonders why her own heart didn't stop shortly after her husband's.

"An act of God," she says matter of fact. "He was ready for Paul at that very moment and I'm positive that he got us off the road safely because there is no way I could have done it by myself and I'm not even sure how it happened."

On his way to a bluegrass festival, smack dab in the middle of a part of the country he loved so well, Colonel Matt Paul was wrenched up to Heaven in the twinkling of an eye. And I'd bet my last nickel that the angels weren't playing harps. I have no doubt that the instruments included flat top guitars and mandolins and five string banjos and fiddles and dobros and at least one upright bass. Because that's the kind of music Matt Paul expected in Heaven. Perfect high tenor harmony and a perfect sound system. And I'd be willing to bet the same nickel that the first he asked after the show if you're running up and down his arms was, "Where are you guys playing next weekend?"

When I moved to Berea in 1975 and moaned around to my friends that there was no Bluegrass Music to be found in the Bluegrass, someone finally suggested that I tune into a radio station on Wednesday and Saturday nights because this eccentric guy named Matt Paul had a radio show that I might find interesting.

And so I did. And my life found joy in music that I'd never experienced before.

It was solid entertainment. None of the commercials were taped and the DJ/MC sort of made it up as he went along. Some poor advertising agent might go out and get 5 minutes of sponsorship from, say a hardware store to be scattered in slots between 6 and midnight. Matt would play a record and talk for five minutes about a hammer he'd just bought at the store and how he'd busted his thumb with it. An hour later it was a hand saw, and a good one mind you, until he nearly sawed off the thumb he'd earlier hit with the hammer.

He'd talk about all the stuff a grocery store had on sale and then it would occur to him that if you put several of them together you could make one heck of a meal loaf and then he'd get into the details of how to fix it. "You need a couple of eggs that aren't on sale but get a dozen and go up to the counter and tell 'em I sent you." I swear he could wink on the radio.

I also swear that I've gone to stores and bought stuff I didn't even need just so I could tell the proprietor that I was a faithful fan of Matt Paul's Bluegrass Express show. I have at least a dozen sets of mandolin strings from a music store in Nicholasville to prove it. Heck, I had six sets of strings before I even had a mandolin and I can't play a note on it. I figured that with so many strings I might as well have a mandolin.

If you read this column very much, you know that Matt Paul not only ran the best Bluegrass Radio

show on the air every Sunday evening but he eventually became an icon for the Bluegrass Music Industry. I've been to festivals, where his only job was to walk out on stage and introduce the next band, and the crowd would give an ovation to the MC. Every member of every band knew him on a first name basis.

And he knew them.

That's why we've had top quality live Bluegrass right here in our backyards every weekend. The bands showed up because it was a smart thing to do if you wanted your record

to get some air time. But mostly they showed up because they loved him the way he loved the music.

At first I thought the music would die when I learned that he had gone to greener pastures, but Betty assures me that the show will go on. Dale Evans is the headliner this Friday night along with River Bend and Cumberland Grass. On Saturday night it's Dale Ann Bradley (be still, my heart) & Coot Creek along with Unlimited Grass. On Sunday night tune in WCYO and listen to Bluegrass Express.

You can still stay up to date on Bluegrass happenings in the region by going to www.mattpaul.com. Old Matt's ashes may be in the wind but we're not about to let all his good over come us to Route 1016 just outside Berea on the north end on weekends, tune in on Sunday nights. We're gonna have a prize for the person who can pick up the signal the farthest away this weekend. I doubt that you can get it in Allentown, Fred but Pittsburgh is not out of the question. It's 100.7 on your FM dial.

Folks, we couldn't be happier! Business is great, come on in and see why!

Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,

It seems like over the past few weeks that the Mt. Vernon Police have really been getting kicked around some. I sorta figured that the people writing the articles may have been exaggerating or maybe just didn't like authorities in particular. Folks often get mad at an officer when he tries to do his job. Especially if he has to make an arrest. Sometimes people make their own way hard by themselves just do and then sometimes others just won't let you live down the past. I have always believed that if you have a whipping coming to you that you ought to take it, but if you haven't done anything then that's another story. With the exception of a state trooper that works up there, I have always been treated fairly in person or on the phone by the Mt. Vernon Police Department.

Let me explain. My daughter at the age of three had seven stitches across her eye. I'd go to stitch back the top of her left ear and 40 some across her forehead not to mention the holes and puncture wounds in the back of her head all from a supposedly friendly dog.

On Friday, November 23, 2001, I watched the neighbor's big tall dog

chase my niece through the yard, across the fence and into the house. I tried to call the owner but reached an answering machine. Meanwhile the dog continues to come to mother's knees and on the porch. Worried about this dog and thinking of what had happened to my daughter, my mother asked me to call the Sheriff's Department to see if maybe they might could advise or assist in some way.

I called and asked who I was speaking to. They refused to tell me their name and rudely shouted, "Well who's this?" I began to tell them about the dog and how it had chased my niece. I told them where my mother lived and the dog owner's name. They strangely acted rude in their tone of voice. Then they asked for my phone number. I tried to explain that it was mother's number and she paid to have it unlisted, and that he didn't have to talk so smart to me. Then in a completely different tone of voice, he went from being helpful to sarcastic and said, "Well thank you and have a nice day," without any mention of the situation at hand.

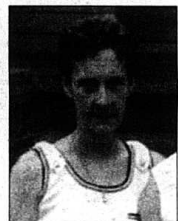

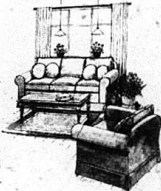

Stretching the hay supply

Dry weather during October and most of November has slowed the normal growth in fescue pastures allowing beef cattle to completely consume feed on many farms. This shortage of pasture is forcing many farms to start feeding hay much earlier than normal. Farmers taking inventory of hay supplies now and calculating winter hay needs from past experiences, may find the hay supply to be short. Decisions now may help stretch hay supplies before winter weather sets in.

If the hay supply appears to be short, should farmers purchase additional hay or some other feed? First look at the type animal present on farms. Dry cows which have calves sold off this fall are at their lowest energy needs. However, fall calving cows or those which calved in late summer, along with their calves, are at a point of great energy needs.

Dry cows can meet their nutritional needs with just about any hay made before July 4th. The critical period of 30 to 60 days before calving is when their energy needs increase. So, for most dry cows at this time of year, the decision comes down to: Do facilities exist for feeding limited grain or is hay for sale close by? Moving hay long distances could turn out to be as expensive as buying grain.

For the fall calving beef cow or a late summer calving beef cow with calf at side, the pasture shortage is a much greater problem. The nutrient needs are greater than most good quality grass hay can provide. Purchasing alfalfa grass hay would be the only way to meet the nutrient

needs with hay.

What other options are available and what are their cost. Shelled corn or by-product feeds are probably the best option. However, many farmers do not utilize this because of limited feeding facilities.

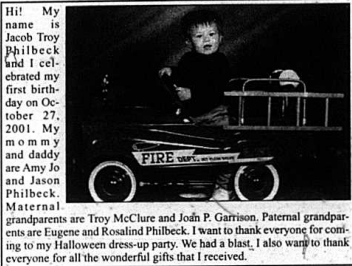
Shelled corn fed to mature cows does not have to be ground. Cows will actually get over 80% of the nutrients from whole corn. At \$2.25 to \$2.30 per bushel, shelled corn is 4 cents per pound. Three to four pounds per head per day would run 15 to 16 cents per head per day.

Corn gluten feed is 18 to 21 percent protein which is more than double the protein present in shelled corn. Gluten is only 80% of the energy of shelled corn but would be similar if whole shelled corn were fed. Gluten is high in phosphorus, which is the most expensive mineral when purchasing mineral mixes. Corn gluten at \$100 per ton is 5 cents per pound. Again, 3 to 4 pounds per head per day, or 15 to 20 cents per day.

Most hay available is 5' x 4' large round bales and a common price of \$15 per roll. Looking at past experience, you can calculate how many cows one bale will feed per day but the cost will be just under 75¢ per head per day. If hay is going to be short this fall or winter, the question becomes, Do I get more for my money buying hay or feeding grain supplements? Using grain supplements, along with hay that is on the farm, may be a way to make the hay supply last longer and feed the cow better for less money.

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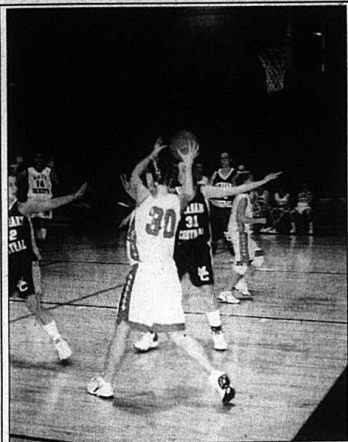

The Lady Rockets outscored the Raiders 13-3 in the first quarter and never looked back.

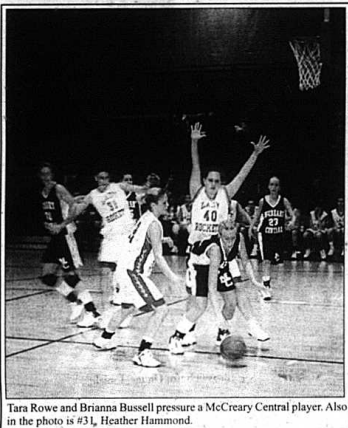
The Lady Rockets equalled their first quarter output in the second quarter to take a 26-10 lead into the locker room at the half.

McCreary Central managed only 18 points in the second half while the Lady Rockets poured in 30 more.

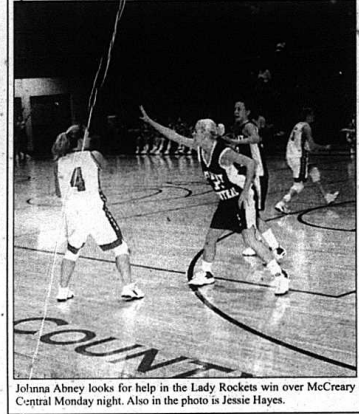
Freshman Johnna Abney led the Lady Rockets with 16, Katie Parsons

Tara Rowe and Brianna Bussell pressure a McCreary Central player. Also in the photo is #31, Heather Hammond.



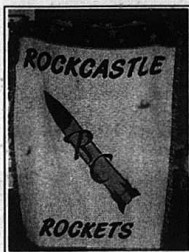

By Gerald Hodges Robby Gordon gets first win at New Hampshire

LOUDON, N.H. — Robby Gordon won his first Winston Cup victory in last Friday's New Hampshire 300. Two bumping incidents with Jeff Gordon, this year's champion, left fans with plenty to talk about over the sport's off-season break.

Robby Gordon bumped Jeff Gordon from behind in traffic on Lap 285, knocking Jeff Gordon's car into the No. 12 driven by Mike Wallace, who was one lap down.

As Jeff Gordon tried to regain control, Robby Gordon passed him for the lead. As the cars slowed under the ensuing caution, however, Jeff Gordon sped past all of those who'd gone by him and ran into the rear bumper of Robby Gordon's No. 31.

Jeff Gordon was given a black flag and assessed a one-lap penalty that sent him to the 2001 Winston Cup champion, who led 257 of 300 laps to a 15th-place finish.

Robby Gordon, meanwhile, kept the lead and scored his first career Winston Cup victory, becoming the fifth first-time winner on the circuit this year and the 19th different winner overall. Sterling Marlin was second and Robby Gordon finished third.

"That's what they call racing," Robby Gordon said. "I got into him a little bit, but I didn't spin him. I just moved him up the race track a little bit. I had to go. I didn't mean to get into him. I think the 12 car got sideways and then he got on the brakes. I got into him but I didn't hit him hard."

Understandingly, Jeff Gordon said it differently. "I didn't expect anybody to take me out," he said. "That's just a shame. We had an awesome car today. He and I had the best cars out there at the end. It was going to be a heck of a battle, but you don't need to do that with 15 laps to go. You just have to hit somebody. I just wish we would have passed me fair and square like I did a few laps before."

Tires were a problem for most of

the teams. Goodyear, expecting cold track temperatures, brought a soft tire to the track for use. But when it heated up to over 50 degrees during the race, the compound was all wrong and the rubber began blistering.

Gil Martin, crew chief on Robby Gordon's car had saved a batch of the same tire code Goodyear had made for a race at Martinsville in October.

"We started bolting those on the last three stops," Martin said. "Those tires didn't really blister like everyone else's did and I think that was the difference in our day."

Indeed, many teams battled blistered tires - with pieces of rubber pulling away from the surface of the tire as they ran - on a day that turned out much warmer than Goodyear had planned when it decided to bring the softer Martinsville tires here for this race. As the tires Martin had saved sat around for several weeks, they got slightly harder and stood up slightly better on a sunny day when the race temperature was 46 degrees and the high crept into the 50s.

No P&CP Signup For TLAP00
During fiscal year 2000, FSA provided payments through the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program 2000 (TLAP00) to quota holders and producers to help them defray income losses in the 2000 crop year because of quota reductions. One of the eligibility requirements for TLAP00 was that a farm must have received Planted and Considered (P&C) credit for the 2000 crop year. This statute has been amended to provide that TLAP00 payments may be made to person(s) who are otherwise eligible without regard to whether the quota was used for the production of tobacco during the 2000 crop year.

Applications will be accepted starting November 1, 2001 through December 14, 2001. Late filed applications will not be approved. Eligibility requirements include:
• Any person who owned, operated or produced eligible tobacco on a farm for which a quota reduction from the 1999 crop year to the 2000 crop year occurred.
• Any farm which was not approved for a payment during the initial TLAP00 signup because there was no P&C.

Eligible types of tobacco include: Burley, type 31; flue-cured, types 11-4; dark fire-cured, type 21 and cigar binder types 54-55.

Payments will be based on FY2000 information with rate the same as those in the initial TLAP00 signup. All eligible persons or entities must agree on the division of payments before the application form, CCC-950, can be approved.

REMEMBER: The application signup period is November 1-December 14, 2001.

County Committee Election Coming Soon

The Rockcastle County FSA Committee election will be held on November 21st through December 3, 2001 for the area of LAA #1 Community A. This area is the western section of Rockcastle County bound by Pulaski, Lincoln and Garrard County. Highway boundaries are Hwy. 70, Hwy. 150, I-75 and Hurricane School Road. Eligible voters may vote for one candidate by placing an "X" in front of the candidate's name for which you wish to vote, signing the ballot and returning to the FSA office postmarked by December 3, 2001.

Names of the candidates in order as they appear on the ballot are as follows: Clarence Raymond Brown, Lloyd Cain, Robert H. Crawford and Tina Hasty.

All farm owners, operators, tenants and shareholders of legal voting age can vote if they are eligible to take part in any FSA program. If you feel you are eligible to vote and do not receive a ballot, please contact the FSA office.

Voicing in the county committee election is your voice in USDA programs. Get involved today and make a difference. **VOICE!**

No person shall be denied the right to vote because of race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation or marital or family status.

Marketing Cards
Rockcastle County producers who have received marketing cards are reminded to carefully check their card for complete and accurate information. Please compare the farm number, warehouse number and pounds

listed on the card to the information provided on the notification letter mailed with the card. If you find an error return the card immediately to the office for correction(s).

Remember: You are responsible for the information listed on the card.

Warehouse Designation
Legislation now requires all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to file a designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market tobacco by filing a form FSA 808t.

Producers who have not designated or those who have designated and wish to change their designation are reminded the next designation period is December 3rd through December 7th.

If producers miss this deadline they must wait until the next designation period of December 28 through January 4, 2002.

Stolen Tobacco
Producers are reminded according to regulations pertaining to stolen tobacco, a police report must be filed within 15 days of the theft and be submitted to the County FSA Office. Filing the police report according to regulations will possibly avoid a penalty and/or a reduction of the next year's quota.

Production Flexibility Contract Payments

The Agricultural Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, provides procedures the option to receive Production Flexibility Contract (PFC) payments for FY2002, as either 20 or 50 percent payments or 100 percent payment prior to August 1, 2002.

Once designated, any changes to the farming operation, including, but not limited to, payment shares and changes of operation must be reported to FSA, and applicable forms completed by August 1, 2002. Failure to report and complete changes by August 1, 2002 may result in all producers on the farm being ineligible for payments.

Producers are reminded all PFC payment shares and necessary signatures must be obtained on the PFC and received in the county FSA office by August 1, 2002.

Conservation Reserve Program Payments
The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that the Commodity Credit Corporation will begin issuing payments of more than \$1.5 billion to eligible producers under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). The program will pay an average of \$4,307 per farm and \$45.63 per acre on more than 539,747 contracts to 355,910 farms.

Under the CRP, producers voluntarily retire environmentally sensitive cropland for 10 to 15 years. In return, CCC makes annual rental payments to producers and shares the cost of establishing approved conservation practices. Land to be enrolled must exist on a highly erodible, contribute to a serious water quality problem, provide important wildlife habitat, or provide substantial environmental benefits if devoted to certain specific conservation uses.

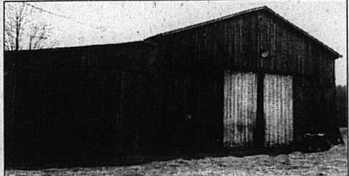

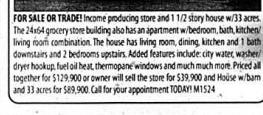

Should You Take Advantage of Low Interest Credit Card Offers?

Before you switch to one of the many credit cards that offer an initial 0% annual percentage rate (APR), check out all the other features. The APR is irrelevant for people who pay off their balance in full each month, but here are some other things to consider:

Does the new card have a grace period that allows you between 10 and 15 days to make your payment? Some of these low interest credit cards no longer offer a grace period at all - you are charged from the first day you make a purchase. Also, some of them have reduced the length of the grace period.

While the grace periods are shrinking on many of these new

credit cards, the late-payment fees are rising. Late fees are often as high as \$29, while your old credit card might only charge \$10.

Is this low interest just a teaser for a short period of time before a higher, permanent rate kicks in? The introductory rates on most of these cards are in effect for 6 months or less. And, the minute you make a late payment, the rates jump to a higher one, usually ranging from 14% to 21%.

These are some of the changes you need to be aware of. Before you switch, compare the new card with your old one feature by feature.

RCMS selected to participate in study

Rockcastle Middle School was selected as one of nine high-performing middle schools from across the nation selected to participate in an evaluative study sponsored by the US Department of Education and conducted by the Charles A. Dana Center at the University of Texas at Austin.

This project sought to understand the characteristics of turnaround middle schools as well as how these schools improved performance. In order to be selected, each school had to meet the following criteria:

- score at or above the state average in both reading/language arts and mathematics on state specified tests;
- show some growth rates in both reading/language arts and mathematics for a multi-year period; and
- be recommended by experts in middle grade education as a school that is a good place for students.

Three project members conducted a four-day site visit to the

school between November 13 and 16, 2001. During the site visit, the team interviewed principals, teachers, district administrators, and community members to capture (a) the essential features of turnaround middle schools, and (b) the essential features of the change process that facilitates the evolution of improved schools.

The Dana Center will use this information to produce an in-depth case study of the school, as well as contribute to a cross-case analysis that emphasizes the nine schools' common practices and policies. This report, which will be released in December 2002, by the US Department of Education, will inform schools attempting similar reform efforts as well as policy makers and interested parties about what practices and procedural knowledge are necessary for school change to be successful. It will provide information and recommendation that can be

used in understanding and improving education services for students in middle schools.

The Charles A. Dana Center at the University of Texas at Austin works to support education leaders and policymakers in strengthening education for all students. Our studies

on successful schools and districts have been widely cited and has resulted in nationally acclaimed reports such as the 1997 study *Successful Texas Schoolwide Programs* (www.starcenter.org/promise/research.htm) and, more recently, *Hope for Urban Education*, published by the U.S. Department of Education in 1999 (www.ed.gov/pubs/urbanhope). These studies' findings inform our work with school districts to strengthen their education systems.

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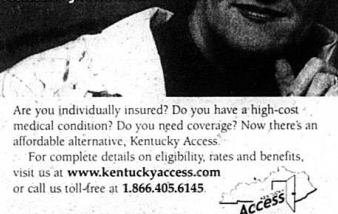

Too Much Anger May Signal Depression

John was an angry man. (All characters are fictitious.) He screamed at his children when they did not move as quickly as he thought they should. He screamed at his wife when she upset him. He kicked the dog when it got in his way. He even screamed at the lawnmower when it refused to start. A couple of times he had become so angry that he put his fist through a wall.

John did have a conscience and he felt bad after an episode of anger. "I don't know what causes me to do that," he tried to explain, "but it's like I can't help myself. My dad was the same way. Maybe I learned it from

him." David (also a fictitious character) had a different problem: he did not care about anything. When he was not at work, he spent most of his time on the couch watching television. At one time he had been an avid fisherman, but he had not had his boat in the water in six months. He did not want to go anywhere. It was all he could do to get himself to work each morning. His wife tried to interest him in family activities, but to no avail. "I don't feel like it" was his answer to every invitation.

David and John do share one thing in common: they are both depressed. Depression in men does not always look the same as in women. Sadness

does not always accompany depression in males. Two of the most common symptoms of depression for men are anger and apathy.

According to an article in a recent issue of Reader's Digest, 20 percent of all women suffer from depression and 10 percent of all men. Some question that latter figure, because men are more reluctant to seek help when depressed. There may be more men suffering from depression who have never been counted.

What causes depression in males? Some of the same things that cause depression in women: neurotransmitters (chemicals that relay messages from one brain cell to another), hormonal imbalances, negative life experiences, such as losing a job or childhood abuse, and alcohol. Major league pitcher Pete Harnisch became depressed when he quit chewing tobacco.

Depression can be fatal. Mike Wallace, CBS news correspondent for "60 Minutes," had suicidal thoughts when he became depressed. He checked himself into a hospital and was treated with antidepressants.

Depression can also shorten men's lives. A study by Johns Hopkins University found that men who have suffered from depression have twice the risk of heart disease as other men.

The anger that comes from depression can cause a tremendous amount of pain for the family. Harold (a fictitious character) was physically and verbally abusive to his wife. He would hit and kick her until she would bleed. She made several trips to the emergency room. Harold was depressed, and it was only when he got help that the abuse ended.

Treatment for depression is available and very effective. Medication, counseling and exercise are three treatments that are proven to help depression.

Men who seek help get better. Men who see depression as a sign of weakness and do not seek help continue to suffer.
