Two arrested after police find meth lab

On Friday, the Kentucky State Police at London received information of a possible lab in Rockcastle County used in the manufacturing of methamphetamine.

Troopers from the State Police and officers of the Mt. Yermon Police Department responded to the report at the residence of Johnny Dooley on Dooley Road off Chestnut Ridge approximately 2 miles south of Mt. Vermon in Rockcastle County.

After arriving, officers contacted the Rockcastle County Attorney's office and obtained a search warrant. During the search, troopers discovered a working methamphet-

Saturday wreck claims lives of 21-year-olds

Two Rockcastle County Juang people were killed in a single vehicle accident on Saturday morning. According to Kentucky State Police in London, Miranda Ginter, 21 and Robert E. Aller, 21, both of Mt. Vemon were pronounced dead at the scene by Rockcastle County Coro-ner Bill Dowell.

The accident occurred at approxi-mately 6:00 a.m. on KY 1912 ap-proximately 10 miles east of Mt. Vernon.

According to State Trooper Staci
Dixon, Ginter was driving west on
KY 1912 when she apparently lost
control of the 1989 Chevrolet Z-24

she was driving as the vehicle was crossing a bridge. The vehicle left the roadway striking a tree and came to rest overtured in Brush Creek. Seatbelts were apparently not in use at the time of the accident and alcohol is suspected to have contrib-uted to the accident, according to police.

Members of the Rockcastle County Fire Rescue and the Rockcastle County EMS assisted Trooper Dixon at the scene. The Investigation is continuing.

An hour later it was a hand saw, and a good one mind you, until he nearly sawd off the thumb.

He'd talk about all the stuff a grocery store had on sale and then it would occur to him that if you put several of them together you could make one heck of meat loaf and then he'd get into the details of how to fix. 





RCMS selected to participate in study

Rockcastle Middle School was selected as one of nine high-perform-ing middle schools from across the nation selected to participate in an evaluative study sponsored by the US. Department of Education and conducted by the Charles A. Dana Center at the University of Texas at Austin.

This project seeked to understand the characteristics of turnaround middle schools as well as how these schools improved performance. In order to be selected, each school had

*score at or above the state average in both reading/language arts and mathematics on state specified tests;

be recommended by experts indide grade education as a school that is a good place for students,

Three project members conducted a four-day site visit to the

school between November 13 and 16, 2001. During the site visit, the team interviewed principals, teachers, district administrators, and commercial control of the change process that facilitates the evolution of improved schools. The Dana Center will use this information to produce an in-denth

The Dana Center will use this in-formation to produce an in-depth case study of the school, as well as contribute to a cross-case analysis that emphasizes the nine schools' common practices and policies. This report, which will be released in December 2002, by the US Depart-ment of Education, will inform schools attempting similar reform efforts as well as policy makers and interested parties about what prac-tices and procedural knowledge ar-necessary for school change to le-successful. It will provide informa-tion and recommendation that can be

used in understanding and improv-ing education services for students in middle schools. The Charles A, Dana Center at the University of Texas at Austin works to support education leaders and policymakers in strengthening edu-cation for all students. Our studies

on successful schools and districts have been widely cited and has re-sulted in nationally acclaimed reports such as the 1997 study Successful Texas Schoolwide Programs such as the 1997 study Successful Texas Schoolwide Programs (www.starcenter.org/promise/research.htm) and, more recently, Hope for Urban Education, published by the U.S. Department of Education in 1999 (www.ed.gov/pubs/urbanhope). 


