## Father, son charged with murder

A former Rockcastle County resident and his son were arrested on Christmas Day and charged with murder.

According to a news release from the Kentucky State Police at London, Larry Siddham, 50, of London and his son, James Siddham, 26, of Brodhead were charged with the murder of a Clay County man on December 17th.

According to police, Steven Marcum, 37, of Goose Rock, was murdered in Clay County at a residence on Billig's Branch.

The Siddhams were arrested without incident in the Sweetwater area of the county, approximately eight miles north of Mt. Vernon.

Both men were taken to the Rockcastle Detention Center and later transferred to Clay County where they are still being held on \$100,000 bonds.

## Constable arrested

Fifth District Constable Tommy F. Bullen, 44, of Mt. Vernon, was arrested during the early morning hours Sunday, after police found cocaine, marijuana and money at his residence.

Bullen was charged with trafficking in cocaine, a Class C felony and trafficking in marijuana, less than five pounds, a Class D felony, after a large quantity of suspected cocaine, marijuana and cash were found at his residence, according to police reports.

Mt. Vernon Police Officer Barry Adams conducted an investigation that led to the issuance of a search warrant through the Rockcastle County Attorney's Office. Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette requested the sealing of the information in the search warrant while the investigation is pending.

"The investigating officer has stated to my staff and I that evidence obtained is significant enough to lead to other potential arrests, so the investigation will continue in cooperation with other law enforcement entities," Bagdette said.

According to sources, Bullen, who was elected constable in 1999, has not been known to ever officially exercise the duties of the office, other than holding it. His bond was set at \$10,000 cash, which was made by Bullen and he was released. The matter is expected to be presented to the Rockcastle Grand Jury in February.

## Local farmers to share \$425,000

Doug Smith, president of the Rockcastle Beef Association and Roy Reynolds, president of the Rockcastle Agriculture Development Council are pleased to announce that local farmers will be eligible to share in \$425,000 from the Phase I tobacco settlement funds.

Three proposals from the Kentucky Agriculture Development Board have been approved as projects local producers can apply for. They include a Forage Improvement program, Genetic Improvement program and Cattle Handling Facilities.

Applications for the Forage Improvement program will start Wednesday, January 2, 2002, and continue through Thursday, January 31, 2002. Applications will be available at Adams Feed Supply, Dabney Feed Supply, and Rockcastle Feed Supply during normal business hours.

The Forage Improvement program covers three areas: Pasture improvement, which provides reimbursement at approximately 50% for certified white clover seed, lime and fertilizer according to U.K. soils test. Limits are 20 acres or \$1,500. See the application for complete details.

Hay Improvement, which provides reimbursement at approximately 50% for certified red clover seed, lime and fertilizer according to U.K. soils test. Limits are 20 acres or \$1,500. See the application for complete details.

Alfalfa Improvement, which provides reimbursement at approximately 50% for certified alfalfa seed, lime and fertilizer according to U.K. soils test. Limits are 20 acres or \$1,500. See the application for complete details.

Forage Improvement programs or combinations can not exceed the total limit of \$1,500 of Phase I money. Soils test should be taken and results available by the January 31, 2002 deadline. Applicants will require producers social security

number and FSA farm number for fields being seeded. Farmers applying will be notified of approval following the February 5, 2002 work session.

The Genetic Improvement program will allow beef and dairy producers to purchase superior EPD bulls or semen. Applications will be available January 15 through February 15, 2002. All applicants will be required to attend a 2-hour producer meeting on EPD's prior to approval. Cost-share will be approximately 50% up to \$1,250 Phase I money. See application for complete details.

The Cattle Handling Facilities program will assist producers in

improving their herd health program. This includes head gates, alley ways, crowding pens, etc. Cost share will be at 2 levels with both being approximately 50% reimbursement.

At the first level, producers are required to become Beef Quality Assurance certified by attending a two hour producer meeting. This qualifies for the \$1,000 level. Producers who complete Beef Quality Assurance, plus market a group of CAP-45 calves, will qualify for the \$2,500 level. See application for complete details.

The Kentucky Agriculture Development Board has limited any one producer to \$5,000 in cost-share payments.

## Rockcastle awarded federal funds

Rockcastle County has been chosen to receive \$9,019,000 to supplement food and shelter programs in the county.

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and consists of representatives from the Salvation Army, American Red Cross, United Jewish Communities, Catholic Charities USA, and National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA; and United Way of America which will provide the administrative staff and function as fiscal agent. The Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.

A local Board made up of the Rockcastle County Judge Executive Bizz Carlottis, local Community Action Agency, etc. will determine how the funds awarded to Rockcastle County are to be distributed among

the emergency food and shelter programs run by the local service organizations in the area. The local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local organizations chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary nonprofit or units of government; 2) have an accounting system; 3) practice nondiscrimination; 4) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs; and 5) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying organizations are urged to apply.

Rockcastle County has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously with Daniel Boone Development Council. This agency was responsible for providing 630 nights

## Renner files for Mt. Vernon Mayor, Sam Stallworth files for Sheriff

Filings for county offices in the upcoming May Primary continue this week.

Rockcastle County school member Sam Stallworth, 49, of Livingston has filed for the Republican nomination for Sheriff.

Stallworth, who has been Chief of Livingston fire department for the last eight years and a member of that department for the last 18, has served on the school board for the past three years.

Mt. Vernon council member Jackie Renner, 49, has also filed for the office of Mayor in next fall's general election.

Renner has served on the city council for four terms and served a vice-mayor for two terms.

"I am running for Mayor of Mt. Vernon with a forward look; while mindful of our rich heritage," Renner said in a written release.

"I hope to serve as a Mayor the city can be proud of, as I hold the office with dignity," he said.

Also filing this week were Randy Stewart, 42, of Orlando for district five magistrate.

Former Livingston police officer Billy M. Hammons, 67, of Otawa has filed for Sheriff. Hammons has sought the office before, but was unsuccessful.

Billy Mullins, 51, Mt. Vernon has filed for fifth district magistrate. The second Democrat to file for office is Larry Newcomb, 34, of Brindle Ridge. He is seeking the Democrat nomination for magistrate in the first district.

Newcomb and incumbent first magistrate John Holbrook are the only two Democrats to file thus far.

Other hopeful candidates to file so far are:

Mt. Vernon council member Clarence Kirby, who will also run for Mayor.

Those wishing to run for city offices have until August 13. All city races are nonpartisan.

Other candidates to file so far are:

Well known businessman Howard Saylor for County Judge, Incumbent Sheriff Shirley Smith, Wayne Lear, Sr. for Sheriff, former Deputy Darrell Dean for Sheriff and John H. Kemper for Sheriff.

Also filing previously are incumbent district two magistrate Jack Bradley and William Depney. District three magistrate Bill McKee is the only one to file as of date. He is an incumbent. In District four, incumbent district two magistrate Jack Bradley and William Depney.

## Waddle dies

The first person ever to sue the state of Kentucky in an effort to make solid waste collection mandatory has died.

Jerry Waddle, 57, of Livingston died Monday.

Waddle was the first person in the state to bring suit against Kentucky Governor Paul Patton and the Cabinet for Natural Resources for failure to enforce state laws against illegal dumps.

"Jerry was a very good friend to the public," said Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carlottis. Waddle also was the person who started the Rockcastle River Rebirth, which has been instrumental on the local level in bringing attention to cleaning the Rockcastle River and its tributaries of illegal dumps.

He was also founding member of the Kentucky Waterways Alliance, which has had thousands of volunteers.

## Brodhead man indicted in connection with possible scam

A Rockcastle County man was indicted in federal court in Florida.

Michael Berry, 47, of Brodhead is accused of participating in a \$20 million dollar scam against McDonald's Restaurant. Originally 21 people were indicted

in September for the theft and distribution of the high-value game pieces from McDonald's promotional games such as *Monopoly* and *Who Wants to Be a Millionaire*.

It was reported that Berry won a ski boat and \$100,000 in cash in one of McDonald's promotions.

The filing deadline for all county offices is January 29. Those filings must take place in the county clerk's office.

Jeff Howard, 34, is accused of raping the daughter of his ex-wife, according to Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette.

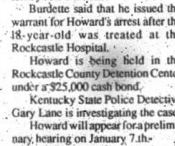
Burdette said that he issued the warrant for Howard's arrest after the 18-year-old was treated at the Rockcastle Hospital.

Actually I'm writing this column as the sun sinks low on the western horizon (in December 31, 2001). In about seven hours it will be 2002 and along about the first of April I will stop dating checks and legal agreements 2001, then erasing it, and putting in 2002.

It's cold in Paint Lick on this New Year's Eve. And the forecast calls for nothing else for at least a week. High around 30. Low around 13. It's January. For real.

NAWWWWW called for a cold December with a warming trend in January and exactly the opposite seems to be true.

**Marketing Cards**

Rockcastle County producers who have received marketing cards are reminded to carefully check their card for complete and accurate information. Please compare the farm number, warehouse number and pounds listed on the card to the information provided on the notification letter mailed with the card. If you find an error return the card immediately to the office for correction(s).

Remember: You are responsible for the information listed on the card. When you have finished your sales of tobacco please return the marketing card to the FSA office as soon as possible.

**Disaster Leasing of Burley Tobacco**

Producers wishing to lease tobacco to their farm for the purpose of selling excess tobacco may do so, across county lines under the disaster leasing provisions. Tobacco leasing in pounds must have, filed a FSA 578 (Crop Report), File MQ 99 (Statement of Tobacco Production), be eligible for price support and have an approved FSA 375, Lease and Transfer. This year the pro-

ducer must also file an FSA 808, Designation of Burley Tobacco Sales, and Request for Marketing Card. The amount of lease in pounds is limited to 15% of the farm effective quota as of July 1st including late leases.

Producers who wish to lease out tobacco quota due to a natural disaster must have:

- Prior to harvest filed a FSA 574 (Request for Disaster Credit)
- Filed a FSA 578 (Crop Report)
- planted sufficient acreage to produce the quota
- made reasonable and customary efforts to produce the effective marketing quota
- have less than 80 percent of the farm's effective marketing quota because of a natural disaster
- meet all price support eligibility requirements.

For additional information on leasing quota under the disaster leasing provisions contact your local FSA office.

**Production Flexibility Contract Payments**

The Agricultural, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2000, provides producers the option to receive Production Flexibility Contract (PFC) payments for FY 2002, as either: two 50 percent payments or one 100 percent payment prior to August 1, 2002.

Once designated, any changes to the farming operation, including but not limited to, payment shares and change of operations must be reported to FSA, and applicable forms completed by August 1, 2002. Fail-

ure to report and complete changes by August 1, 2002 may result in all producers on the farm being ineligible for payments.

Producers are reminded all PFC payment shares and necessary signatures must be obtained on the PFC and received in the county FSA office by August 1, 2002.

**Farm Changes**  
Producers who have purchased or sold land need to contact the local FSA office for proper reconstitution of farms. Remember to bring your deed and/or to notify the new owner to do so. Also notify this office of any and/or all address changes.

REMEMBER: Our records are only as current as producers inform our office.

**Meeting Scheduled**  
Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency Committee members will have their first scheduled monthly meeting at the Rockcastle County FSA Office located on Hwy. 150, in Mt. Vernon on Thursday, January 3, 2002. The meeting is open to the public and begins at 8:00 a.m.

Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. They help FSA at the local level by deciding the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will run. FSA committees operate with official regulations designed to carry out Federal Laws and applying their judgement and knowledge to make local decisions. Committees make decisions on:

- Commodity price support loans and payments
- Establishment of allotments, yields and marketing quotas
- Farmer loans
- Conservation programs
- Incentive, indemnity and disaster payments for some commodities and
- Other farm disaster assistance.

Rockcastle County FSA Committee monthly meetings, open to the public, are scheduled for the first Thursday of each month.

**Phase I Tobacco Funds**

Available for Farmers  
Rockcastle County farmers are now eligible to share in \$425,000 from the Phase I tobacco settlement funds.

Local farmers are eligible to apply for a Forage Improvement, Genetic Improvement or Cattle Handling Facilities program.

Applications for the Forage Improvement program will start January 2, 2002 and continue through January 31, 2002. The Forage Improvement program provides:

- Pasture improvement at approximately 50% cost share for certified white clover seed, lime and fertilizer according to UK soil test for up to 20 acres or \$1,500.
- Hay improvement at approximately 50% cost share for certified red clover seed, lime and fertilizer according to UK soil test for up to 20 acres or \$1,500.
- Alfalfa improvement at approximately 50% cost share for certified alfalfa seed, lime and fertilizer according to UK soil test for up to 20 acres or \$1,500.

Soil tests should be taken and results available by the January 31, 2002 deadline. Farmers who apply will be notified of approval following February 5, 2002.

Applications for the Genetic Improvement program will start January 15, 2002 and continue through February 15, 2002. The Forage Improvement program provides beef and dairy producers to purchase superior EPD bulls or semen. Cost share will be approximately 50% up to \$1,250 and requires the applicant to attend a two hour EPD meeting prior to approval.

Applications for the Cattle Handling Facilities program will start February 1, 2002 and continue through March 1, 2002. The Cattle Handling Facilities program will assist producers in improving their herd health program. This includes head gates, alley ways, crowding pens, etc. Cost share will be at two levels with

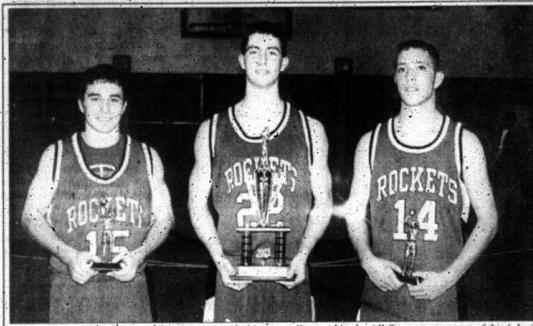

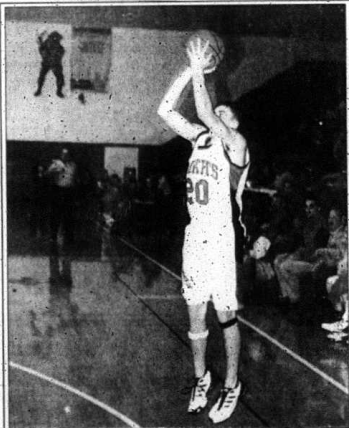
Andrew Hammond was named MVP for the tournament and Aaron Cash and Aaron Anderkin were named to the all-tournament team.

Hammond led the scoring for his team with 21 points; Cash got 19;

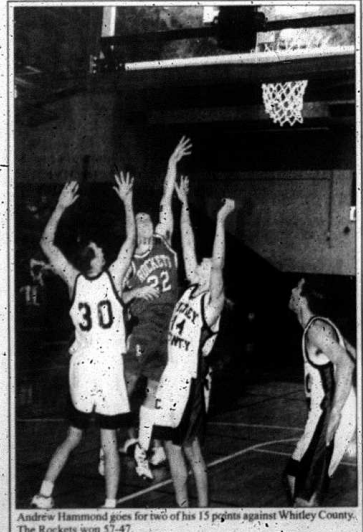

and Hayes 6 each and Stephanie Price

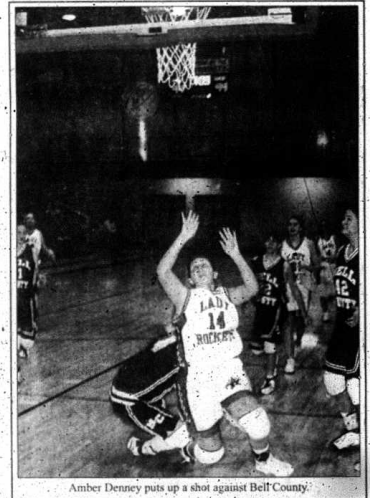

In the final game of the tournament, the Rocketeers met the Bell County Lady Bobcats and after leading 37-26 at the half, played a dismal second half to lose 58-56.

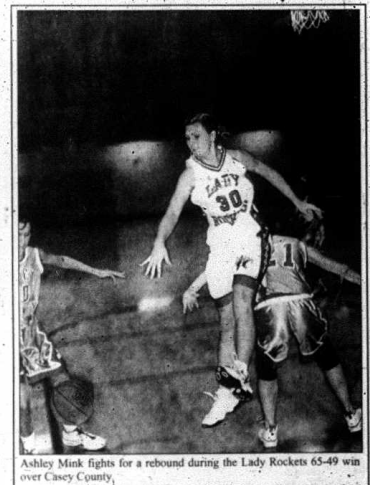

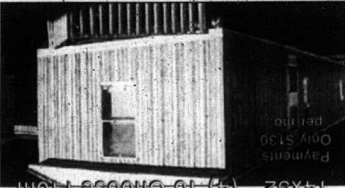

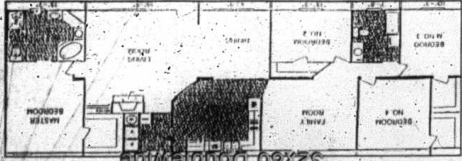
