## 14 indictments returned by Grand Jury

14 indictments were returned after a recent session of the Rockcastle County Grand Jury, with five of the indictments being brought against Wally Janie Kirby of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon.

### Second phase of low income heating program underway

The Daniel Boone Development Council is again administering the Home Energy Assistance Program for low income families, according to Mrs. Nancy Meadows. The crisis component started Monday and will continue until March 15 or until funds are expended. To meet the definition of a crisis, a past due balance or discount notice is necessary if electricity is the heat source, according to Mrs. Meadows. Less than a four day supply is necessary for all other fuel sources. Income eligibility remains the same.

Kirby, along with John L. Dooley, also of Rt. 5, and Dwayne S. Blair of the Old Chestnut Ridge Road, were all indicted for the manufacture of methamphetamine. Kirby was also charged, along with Juanita Arlene Watkins of Castle Village Drive, of the offense of manufacture of methamphetamine, first offense. Another charge of persistent felony offender was also lodged against Kirby. Comprising the third indictment against Kirby are trafficking in controlled substance, first degree; possession of a controlled substance, third degree; fleeing and evading police, first degree and reckless driving. A fourth indictment charges that on about September 14, 2001 Kirby committed the offense of complicity to manufacture methamphetamine and a persistent felony charge was also a part of that count and the fifth indictment. John Curtis York and Phillip C. Falin, both of Mt. Vernon, were indicted on a charge of burglary, second degree; Timothy L. Saylor was indicted for arson, second degree; Jeremy Holt was indicted for escape, second degree and on a persistent felony charge; Tommy Dooley was charged in an indictment with the offense of criminal possession of a forged instrument, second degree. ## 2001 will be year to remember

The biggest news of the year in Rockcastle County probably did not even happen in Rockcastle County but it impacted most every resident. On September 11th, thousands of innocent Americans were killed in terrorist attacks in New York and Washington D.C. Citizens all across the nation watched in aghast horror as a country was changed forever in a couple of hours. The attacks eventually led to a war halfway around the world in Afghanistan. It also made citizens realize that some sacrifices would have to be made to ensure our freedoms and security. There were several numerous stories in Rockcastle, some good, many bad. The year started off on a tragic note when a Flat Gap man, Johnny Baker, 70, died in a collision on U.S. 25. David Lovell, of Burr, pleaded guilty to the 1997 murder of Charles "Toddy" Baker, and the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court accepted a construction bid on the Kentucky County Music Hall of Fame at Renfro Valley for \$1.7 million dollars. The Hall is nearing completion. A controversy over a proposed one acre landfill began early in the year, after a Berea contractor made application to the state. The Rockcastle Fiscal Court and contractor David McFarland finally reached an agreement and the landfill was not constructed. The posting of the Ten Commandments was also in the news early in the year when a Laurel County man asked the Rockcastle School Board to place them in schools, as historical documents. (Cont. to A9)

The Ten Commandments were never posted. The Rockcastle County Extension Service moved into a new building on West Main Street in Mt. Vernon and the Rockcastle County Road Department got a little egg on their face when they ran out of salt for county roads. It was some time before a shipment was received. Kentucky Education Commissioner Gene Wilhoit toured Roundstone Elementary School because of their outstanding grades and the Bank of Mt. Vernon was sold to Community Trust. The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court won a major decision in Circuit Court concerning a condemnation suit over the Oscar Isaacs Road in northern Rockcastle County. The court sued several landowners in order to obtain more right-of-way. (Cont. to A9)

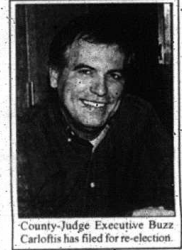


Rockcastle residents gathered on the courthouse steps for a Prayer Service, shortly after the September 11th terrorist attacks.

## Buzz Carloftis, Billy Kirby file for election

Filings for May's primary election continue this week with at least five more candidates throwing their hats into the political ring. Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis filed on Tuesday seeking his third term. Carloftis, 50, of Livingston, is a Republican and so far his only opponent is Howard Saylor. "I have felt humbled and honored to have had Rockcastle County's citizens place so much confidence and trust in me while I have been their County Judge-Executive. I am very proud of what we have accomplished, and know that we have a lot more work to get done. During my tenure in office, Rockcastle County has had the largest amount of grant funds (gifts) ever awarded to Rockcastle County in its history, a total of \$5.8 million have come to Rockcastle County for projects ranging from jail

construction to new bridges, the large amount of blight for roads ever laid in Rockcastle County," the judge said in a news release. "Other projects include PRIDE clean-up, a new technology center and many other projects. This does not include the millions of dollars for new water lines that have been laid or funds set aside in Frankfort for future use by our county," he said. "As a Republican, I am proud that I have been able to work so closely with other local, state and federal officials to get these things done. I have always placed the benefit of Rockcastle County first and, with the people's continued support, I dedicate myself to do a lot more work for them," he said. The other most notable filing this week was that of former Rockcastle County Jailer Billy Kirby. Kirby, 71, of Freedom School Road, served as Jailer for three terms, the first one '76 to '80 and the other two from '84 to '92. Kirby has also served as Sheriff one term and Deputy Sheriff one term. Kirby said that he is very proud of the fact that when he left the Jailer's office he had an excess of \$250,000 in the Jail fund and that he had managed to pay for several improvements (Cont. to A9)

## Livingston man freed on bond

A Livingston man who was arrested on December 21st and charged with rape was released on bond Monday. Rockcastle District Judge Mike Henry ruled that there was enough evidence to present the case against Jeff Howard, 34, to the Grand Jury, after he heard testimony from Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane. Howard's attorney, Jerry Fish, asked that the bond be reduced from \$25,000 to \$2,500. County Attorney Jeff Burdette said he asked that the bond stay the same because of the seriousness of the crime. The case will likely be presented to the Grand Jury in February.

## Michigan couple killed in wreck

Last Wednesday, an elderly Michigan couple was killed in a single vehicle accident on Interstate 75. The accident occurred just north of the Rockcastle River bridge, around 4:00 p.m. According to a report filed by State Trooper Coby Smith, the driver of the vehicle, 81-year-old Richard Moore lost control of the 1999 Ford Explorer as he drove North on the interstate. The Explorer crossed the median, both southbound lanes and traveled over a 35 foot embankment where it struck bottom of the ravine. Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell pronounced both victims dead at the scene. Members of the Mt. Vernon Fire and Rescue Squad assisted at the scene. Richard Moore and his 76-year-old wife, Maggie were traveling home to Detroit, Michigan. According to a news release from

I had intended to fish for those big walleye in Laurel Lake on my time off but my boat froze to the ground. I spent a couple of days cursing my luck and the weather and then decided to hole up and catch up on my reading.

And my favorite reading this time of the year has suddenly become "The Wonderful Book"

Nothing in my experience, has ever been better named. No piece of literature is more entertaining or better written.

My friend, Fred Beste, who lives in Wind Gap, Pennsylvania has been publishing an annual anthology of wonderful stories submitted by his, please note the quote, "Select Literate Friends" over the last decade.

It started out in 1993 as an open invitation to a bunch of folks in Fred's acquaintance, who might have read some books in their lives. Fred is a venture capitalist and a genuine hero among several orgs Kentucky economic development organizations to whom he introduced reality, but I'm way off the point as usual.

Fred has been wonderfully successful in his business' life and he is easily the most generous person I've ever known. He has far, far more friends who cherish his affection than anyone I know and I'm talking big numbers here.

At least 150 "kids" my age or younger (I'm 53) feel like he is an older brother. Probably as many more older folks call him something like "Junior". It's like having 300 siblings.

And outside that immediate family he has maybe a thousand best friends.

So do the math. Fred has roughly 1,300 people close to him and it simply makes sense that 250 of them can

read and write. The rest can only add and subtract, divide and multiply and have little command of the King's English if it can't be expressed in digits, but even they love him.

Over the last decade more than 250 of Fred's Literate Friends have submitted manuscripts for publication in the Wonderful Book(s). There have been books that featured reviews of favorite books, favorite places, movies, recipes, family incidents, gardening, family traditions, cars, web sites, "things that make you happy" and on and on and on. And lately, whatever is on your mind.

Fred compiles the manuscripts in alphabetical order with scant editing and publishes the entire collection in bound volumes of about 300 pages each year. And they just keep getting better and better and better. Over the years the contributors to the book have become close friends. Fred's way of letting us share with each other so much more intimately than if we showed up at a party once a year. And every year the submissions get more personal. More dear to read. More wonderful.

I've been through the 2001 Wonderful Book three times, cover to cover, since Christmas and there is not space enough in this column to begin singling out favorite contributions. I can tell you, for sure, however, that singling out the best pieces over the years, would culminate a best-seller. In the meantime we will hold the individual volumes as heirlooms.

Fred tells me that he started the whole thing to create some joy, to share life with folk he really loves, because it was more personal than Christmas Cards, to enable people to share experiences with each other, and because it was unique and creative and because he really like to write, himself. But I suspect that it was a much higher calling.

I know for sure that when I am down and out, I need only pull out a Wonderful Book. From this year or any year past and browse around and soon I will be in touch with someone I know who has written a heartfelt piece of wisdom or spun an incredible yarn and soon I feel better all over because there is comfort in being a part of Fred's Circle and here is comfort to found within it.

I take great comfort in the love my family gives me at Christmas time and throughout the year and I love the socks and shirts and fishing stuff but when all is said and done, my favorite present every year is Fred Beste's "Wonderful Book" of the year.

The two Pine Hill soldiers that he was inducted into the army with was, James and Howard Robinson, the sons of Bill and Gladie McHargue Robinson of Pine Hill. He couldn't recall their names) Howard was killed about three weeks before WWII ended. Those two brothers stayed in the same rifle company all during the war. James carried Howard's body back from the front after he was hit by a sniper. Jack and Joe Robinson, two other brothers was

in the infantry in the same area at that time. Bill and Maude had five other boys that went into the service after WWII.

I am the son of Gilbert and Mary Barnett Robinson of Orlando, Bill was my uncle. My brothers, James, Virgil and I was in WWII and bro. Gilbert, Jr. was in Navy in Korea (retired from Navy 1972).

Brother Virgil was killed in battle of Bulge on December 23, 1944. Buried in Brarfield Cemetery in Orlando. Howard is buried in McHargue Cemetery in Pine Hill.

I would like to protest the latest unwarranted increase in cost for the basic cable TV from Charter Communications.

I have been given two different justifications from Charter on this.

Typically, their rates were half to two-thirds our rates, and ours are going up AGAIN.

The Mt. Vernon City Council owes it to the taxpayers of Mt. Vernon to see what can be done to rein in this out of control cable provider, or to investigate other options with other companies.

Personally, at the next election, I intend to see how the council members fall on this matter. This will greatly influence my vote. I would urge everybody in town to look at whether or not the council members are looking after their needs and costs.

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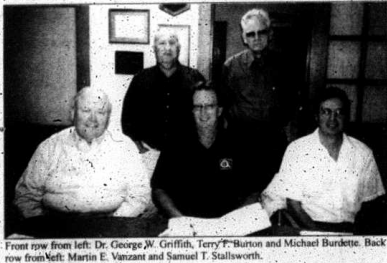

### Bristol adds 500 more spectators to pits

"It's an already overcrowded pit track. Bristol Motorsports recently announced they would stuff 500 more fans into the .053-mile track infield for future Winston Cup events.

The cost is only \$500 per person, and we're betting it will be a sellout, which will bring the speedway another quarter million dollars.

The question is, does BMS really need the extra money? Are they suffering financially? And how will this impact the drivers, who have to fight off fans constantly, even when going to and from the bathroom?

We talked with several drivers, and while all admitted allowing the fans reasonable access is an integral part of NASCAR, they didn't favor more fans around them during practice sessions.

"Don't get me wrong, the fans are what makes this sport," said Jimmy Spencer. "But sometimes we get too many around the car and garage area. Really, I'd be concerned about their safety."  
"I try never to turn down a fan's request for an autograph, but we've got to race. And getting the car ready for qualifying sometimes requires lots more concentration than roof fans realize."

"Every driver in the pits cares about their fans, because they are

what fuel our sport, but we need reasonable limits. NASCAR has done a good job in the past, we'll just have to wait and see how they handle it in the future."

Two other drivers who asked not to be identified said they felt the infield safety factor was being neglected at certain tracks.

With seating capacity of over 150,000, BMS has sellouts for all Winston Cup events, and up to 90,000 fans show up for Busch Series races.

Our guess is track owner, Bruton Smith, who has five other tracks on the NASCAR circuit is trying to make up for some of the unfilled seats at the other facilities.

Unable to increase the regular grandstand tickets prices; and packing more fans into the garage area was the next alternative. The track will reap the big bucks at the expense of drivers and teams.

Each lap sponsorship package at BMS also includes the lap sponsor's name printed in the race weekend souvenir program, the sponsor's 20-watts-or-less message in the program, and a copy of the souvenir program.

To purchase a lap sponsorship at BMS, call the ticket office at (423) 764-1161. Specific laps are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

BMS garage passes are good for race admission, and allow holders to watch the Winston Cup race from the infield. Garage pass holders may use Bristol's new Turn 3 pedestrian tun-

nel, but must have grandstand tickets to gain admission to the grandstand.

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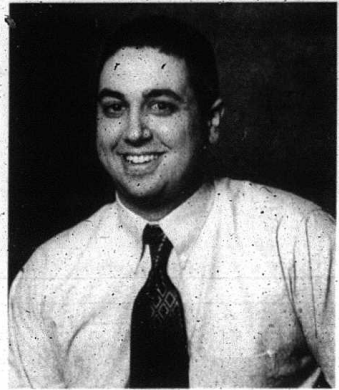

From a big tower whose remains have been discovered by archaeologists, to Egyptian tombs, to Babylonian gardens, to Greek and Roman Gardens, to gardens in castles and monasteries during the dark ages, mankind has built private paradises for pleasure and entertainment of for gardening purposes. Stones and water are ever present elements.

seasonal interests of trees and plants that bloom or exhibit just glorious fall colors.

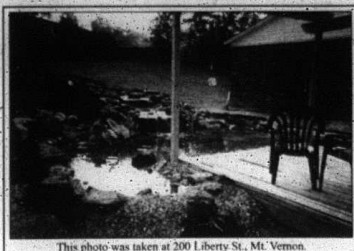
Costs of stone and skilled labor may limit stone and water use in favor of simpler landscape features; however, stone and water creations pay lasting dividends of beauty that money spent on shrubbery and other landscape items don't provide.

Formal and informal landscape design have ebbed in and out of vogue over the last three hundred years or so. But stone paths, walls, terraces, waterfalls, grottos, pools have been a part of the scene most of the time in finer landscapes. Folks of more humble means cultivated vegetables, herbs and flowers right outside their dwellings and frequently constructed low walls and walks of stone.

Today we see lots of cottage gardens. Think of a somewhat disorganized planting of favorite shrubs, a start of this perennial given by a neighbor, that one seedling, that one bought at a closeout sale at the garden center, and still another moved from where you used to live. Then add a path, maybe a shed, some birdhouses or feeders. Add a few special rocks in strategic spots to tie the random scheme together.

Also we see large formal areas created with stone work and possibly pools. Sometimes these are in view of the public, sometimes in private locations. Angles, squares and rectangles, are integral to a formal garden (as are well manicured shrubbery). Japanese style gardens are considered formal gardens.

No matter the formality or lack thereof, stonework and water features offer year-round beauty instead of

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## Drycleaning at Home

Home dry cleaning kits have been on the market now for several years. The International Fabricare Institute (IFI), premier trade association for garment care, utilized its research and testing expertise to gauge the effectiveness of home drycleaning kits, and found that in general they do not provide complete removal of all types of stains. They also cannot remove ground-in soil. These products can freshen garments by removing odors and imparting a pleasant fragrance.

In general, most of the products work well on freshening or removing odors such as smoke. Therefore, these products can be successfully used to freshen garments, for example, removing odors from sweaters after winter storage.

In terms of stain removal, IFI found that most of the products work well on water-based stains such as cola. Stains that are oil-based

(ketchup, lipstick) presented more of a challenge for home drycleaning kits. In some cases, these products caused the stain to spread, which created a bigger stain. None of the products removed ground-in soils, which consumers typically see as "ring around the collar," or dirty cuffs.

When using a home drycleaning kit, consumers should beware of the following types of damage they could induce when using the stain removal solutions: rings, chafing, broken fibers on loose weave, and/or local shrinkage on crepe or water-sensitive fabrics.

IFI's testing found that home drycleaning kits failed to completely remove stains such as ketchup, lipstick, and cuff soil, resulting in a less-than-satisfactory appearance.

March 18-21 - Mt. Vernon Elem.  
These classes will be over at 5:00 pm. You will need to provide fabric and notions for the garments. DO NOT purchase these until after the first meeting. 4-Hers will choose their pattern at the first meeting, and we will order for a cost of \$3-25.  
Parents will need to provide transportation home after classes at 5:00 pm promptly.  
During the classes, your child will learn to use a sewing machine, follow a pattern and construct a simple garment. First year students may make pants, shorts or skirt with elastic waistline. Second year

students may make a skirt with at waistband or a simple top. Third year students will make a simple complete outfit; fourth year students, a garment using knits; and fifth year students make a complete knit outfit using a challenging knit.

## Genetic improvement cost-share program

The Rockcastle County Cattlemen's Association is pleased to announce that local beef and dairy producers will be eligible to share in \$100,000 from the Phase I tobacco settlement funds. Applications for a Genetic Improvement cost-share program will be taken January 15 through February 15, 2002. Eligible funding will be for purchasing a bull or semen, meeting program guidelines. Funding shall not exceed \$1,250 per farm operation per fund. The maximum amount of actual cost. Only 1 bull per farm operation per funding cycle may be eligible for cost-share. Ownership must be maintained for a minimum of two successive breeding seasons, not in the same year.

Program guidelines require that bulls selected for this program meet specific Expected Progeny Difference's. Producers are required to attend 2 hours of production seminars to assure they understand EPD's before purchasing bulls. The University of Kentucky Guideline for Bull Purchasing Programs (Appendix A) shall be used as the guideline for minimum EPD criteria. Beef bulls fall into three categories: heifer bulls, terminal cross bulls and balanced trait bulls.

Heifer bulls are selected to breed first calf heifers. Calving ease is very important and emphasis is placed on calving ease EPD's. The minimum criteria for this trait should

be the top 25% of the breeding calving ease or birth weight EPD's. Terminal cross bulls are for second calf and older cows to maximize growth in heifers will be retained. Beginning back replacement heifers is discouraged when using these bulls. Calving ease EPD and birth weight EPD's are used to eliminate the worst 10% of British breeds and worst 15% of Continental breeds.

Balanced trait bulls are used for feeder calf production realizing that producers will be retained. EPD's for milking ability as well as calving ease, weaning weight and yearling weight, are important in selecting balanced trait bulls. Dairy bulls and semen are based on net dollar value. To help farmers, an Area Dairy Production Meeting will be held on January 15, 2002, beginning at 10:00 a.m. at Lincoln County Extension Service.

The Genetic Improvement Program, like all programs funded by the Phase I tobacco settlement program, is a matching cost-share program to assist farmers in placing their genetics in the marketplace. Please contact the application for complete details.

A producer meeting to explain qualifying EPD's for each breed will be held on Thursday, January 24<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 p.m. at the Extension office. State rules require each producer purchasing bulls of semen to attend.

Here is a Top For You

Would you like to have a job that pays \$2.00 an hour and in which you must endure unpleasant treatment and sometimes verbal abuse? You can have just such a job, you know. All you have to do is become a waitress.

Waitresses (and waiters) have my admiration. I have seen them handle unruly customers and those who were downright rude. I have seen them smile and say nothing when accused of all manner of evildoing. Waitresses put up with more unpleasant people than most of us ever encounter.

Something about restaurants seems to bring out the worst in some people. Perhaps it is because they are hungry and tired. Perhaps it is because of their squalling children who cannot be calmed by any method. Whatever the reason, some folks give waitresses a hard time.

I know that there are bad waitresses. However, many times the problem is not the fault of the waitress. If your steak is not cooked as you want it, that is not her fault. If your food arrived cold, that may not be her fault either. In most cases however, she is the one who gets the blame.

Perhaps you are surprised to discover that many waitresses are paid less than \$3.00 an hour. You thought minimum wage applied to everyone, right?

Well, it does not apply to waitresses. The government in its wisdom did not apply the minimum wage to waitresses, figuring that they would make up the difference in tips.

I learned the importance of tips in 1973. I held several different jobs while going to school in New Haven, Connecticut, and that year I drove a taxicab. I was also paid less than

minimum wage on the assumption that tips would make up the difference. I can tell you that sometimes they did and sometimes they did not.

Some people tip better than others. I was told by other cabbies that quickly learned on my own that Yankees tip better than Southerners. (As a Southerner it pains me to admit this.) When a plane arrived at New Haven Airport from a southern city, cabbies knew that the tips would not

be as good. I do not know why this was, but I hope it is no longer true.

My one claim to fame as a cabbie is that I gave county feline star Charley Pride a ride from the airport to his downtown hotel. Charley was great. He was delighted to find that I was from Kentucky and interested that I was studying for the ministry. We talked county music the whole trip, and he thanked me when we got to his hotel.

I am unable to say such nice things about the gentlemen who was with him.

The associate paid the fare and then held out a dollar bill for a tip (a big tipper!). When I reached for the tip, he pulled it away from me. He held it out again, but when I reached for it, he pulled it away and laughed. I suppose this was his idea of a joke. I was not amused.

The moral of this story is appreciate your waitress and give her a good tip. How much should you tip? Fifteen percent is about right. For a ten-dollar meal the tip would be \$1.50. It is certainly appropriate to give an even larger tip when the service has been particularly good.

Fifteen percent does not amount to a lot of money, but it may make a big difference to your waitress. If she is supporting two children on \$2.00 an hour plus tips, every tip makes a difference. She can almost certainly use the money, so be generous.

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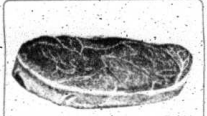


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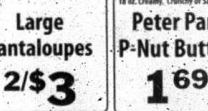
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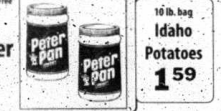
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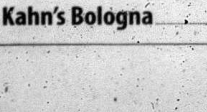

The game was tied at the end of the third period, but the Rockets fell behind by five points with 1:30 to go in the contest.

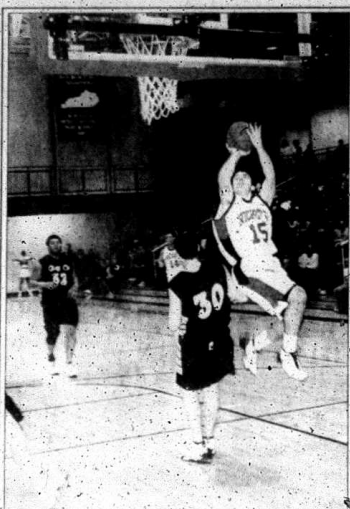
They battled back to tie the game with 22 seconds to go before they eventually lost.

The Rockets play at Williamsburg Friday night. They are currently ranked fifth in the 13th region.



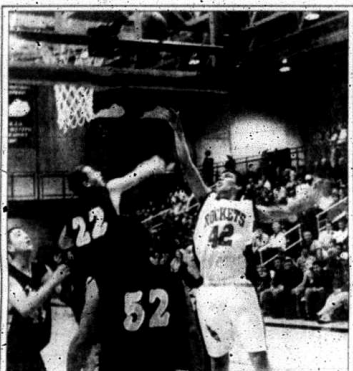

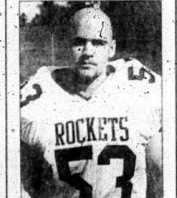

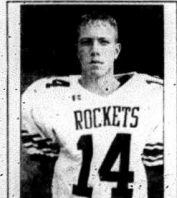

Johnna Abney, 5 and Heather Hammond, 2.

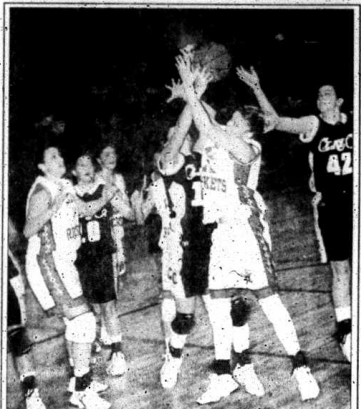
The Lady Rockets trailed the entire game. They were behind by two at the end of the first period, ten at half time and six at the end of the third period.

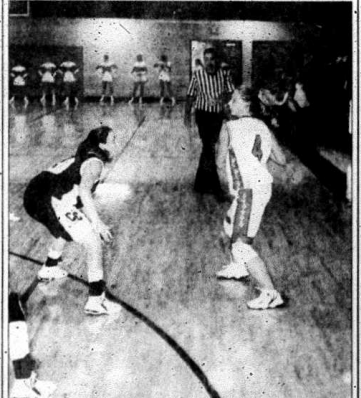
Tara Rowe goes for two points against Clay County last Friday night. Also in the photo are Amber Denney and Heather Hammond.

Representatives from the Kentucky State Department of Education conducted an audit at RCHS to determine if the school was complying with Title IX.

Title IX refers to the equality in high schools between boys and girls. The school passed the audit.

Rockcastle County civic leader and Kentucky Highlands Chairman Wayne Stewart was honored for his service to the county and the Rockcastle County Technology Center at the Rockcastle County Courthouse.

The state turned down a grant proposal for a new Animal Shelter and residents got a look at a new route from Hwy. 150 to F-75 through Crab Orchard and the Mt. Vernon City Council voted for drug testing for employees.

The Lady Rockets and Rockets were both knocked out of the district tournament in the first round and the Rockcastle County Kiwanis Club raised over \$4,000 during their radio telethon.

Former Rockcastle County magistrate Charles Holbrook was killed in an explosion and fire at Ottawa and

the Rockcastle County Board of Education approved a five percent pay increase.

Wayne Stewart died and Berea National announced they would open a branch bank in Rockcastle County.

A Somerset man was apprehended a few minutes after he held up B & L Grocery at gunpoint.

Census figures showed that the county grew by 12 percent over the past ten years and Davy Stewart of Orlando, who was eventually found guilty in federal court and who is still under indictment for murder, was released on bond.

A life-size bronze statue of legendary Renfro Valley entertainer Old Joe Clark was dedicated in April and outgoing RCHS principal Ruth Allen received the Betty Lewis Sprive award for her dedication to children.

The school got \$208,000 from the state because of their good test scores and 387 cases of abuse and neglect were reported the previous year.

RCHS officials announced they would add volleyball to the list of girls sports to comply with Title IX. The RCHS baseball team made it the state again, losing to Hazard in the first round of the sectionals and the RCHS girls track team was ranked first in the state in class 2A.

Miss Kentucky Whitney Boyles visited the county and a 14-year-old boy had his uncle to death.

Roundstone School received an award for being a Distinguished Title I School.

Parker Seal Plant in Berea closed and John Hale was chosen as principal at RCHS.

170 graduates received diplomas at RCHS and the RCHS girls track team finished second in the state in Class 2A.

Leon Davidson was chosen principal at Mt. Vernon and the Broadhead Senior Citizens Center closed.

The Mt. Vernon council approved a \$2.2 million dollar budget and the county applied for another grant for an animal shelter.

An insecticide found at Mullins Station killed several animals and a Corbin robbery ended when the accused robber and a London police officer wrecked on I-75.

A Calloway man was charged with two counts of attempted murder after he shot at Mt. Vernon police

Chief Bill Mink and officer Barry Adams.

Woody Lamb later pled guilty. A Broadhead woman was killed when an RTCC van was involved in a wreck that was another motorcycle fault and Rockcastle played host to the National Spelling Society's National Convention.

Broadhead School was not completed by August 15th when school started, so students there did not go to school until August 27th.

Dr. Kevin Rowe began his medical practice and several Broadhead businesses were damaged by a very bad flash flood.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted to offer health insurance to employees for the first time ever.

Kentucky Governor Paul Patton visited the county and I-75 Speedway at Cove Branch opened.

A three-year-old Broadhead youth died in a drowning accident. Stephen Russell Baldwin was with his parents visiting relatives when he got into a neighbor's pool.

Roundstone School had the highest CTBS test scores in the state and the fiscal court took over ownership of the former Livingston School property.

Angela Boring was crowned RCHS homecoming queen and the Rockets had a historical football season.

The Rockets won the district, region and finished runner-up in the state. They were 14-1 and had at least 5,500 fans attend their championship game in Louisville.

Two Mexican farm laborers were shot to death at Bee Lick and police arrested local residents time and time again for making and trafficking in Meth.

Solid Waste Coordinator Don Coyle was killed in an accident while riding his bike and well known resident Roy Brown died.

Ky. Farm Bureau agent William K. Bullen retired and Timmy Peyton was named Renfro Valley Jamboree Bowl Queen at RCHS.

The Rockcastle Hospital bought Sowder Nursing in Broadhead and the Rockcastle School system got some good news from the state on their test scores.

Juanita Medley was named Citizen of the Year at Livingston and a large crowd attended the Bittersweet Festival in Mt. Vernon.

A couple from India were de-

tained after a false alarm at the Mt. Vernon Water plant. They were released later that day.

The Rockcastle Kiwanis Club held a very nice ceremony for veterans, firefighters and police officers, and Kentucky Chief Justice Joseph Lambert of Mt. Vernon filed for reelection to the state's highest court.

The RCHS JROTC Rifle Team won their third State Air Rifle Championship and Jackie Renner and Larry Boring were named for Mayor of the City of Mt. Vernon.

A former Rockcastle resident Larry Stidham and his son, James, of Broadhead were arrested, in December and charged with the murder of a City County man.

The girls will play at Whitey County on Thursday night. They are currently ranked fourth in the 13th region.



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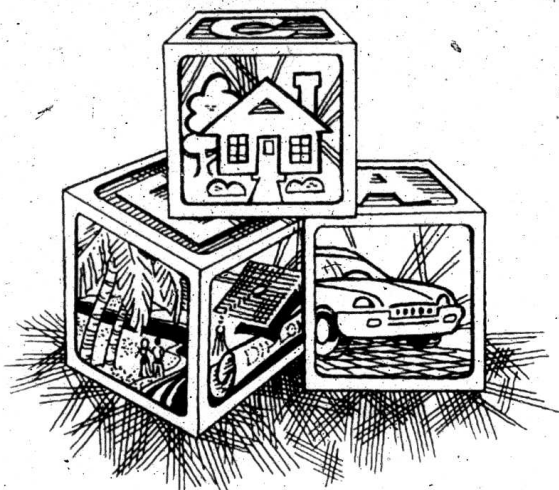

Please compare the farm number, warehouse number and possibly listed on the card to the information provided on the notification letter mailed with the card. If you find an error return the card immediately to the office for correction(s). Remember, you are responsible for the information listed on the card. When you have finished your sales of tobacco please return the marketing card to the FSA office as soon as possible.

#### Disaster Leasing of Burley Tobacco

Producers wishing to lease tobacco to their farm for the purpose of selling excess tobacco may do so across county lines under the disaster leasing eligibility provisions. Farms leasing in pounds must have filed a FSA 578 (Crop Report), file a MQ 99 (Statement of Tobacco Production), be eligible for price support and have an approved FSA 375. Lease-and Transfer. This year the producer must also file an FSA 408, Designation of Burley Tobacco Sales and Request for Marketing Card. The amount of lease in pounds is limited to 15% of the farm effective quota as of July 1st including late leases.

Producers who wish to lease out tobacco quota due to a natural disaster must have:

- Prior to harvest filed a FSA 574 (Request for Disaster Credit)
- filed a FSA 578 (Crop Report)
- planted sufficient acreage to produce the quota
- made reasonable and customary efforts to produce the effective marketing quota
- have less than 90 percent of the farm's effective marketing quota because of a natural disaster
- meet all price support eligibility requirements

For additional information on leasing quota under the disaster leasing provisions contact your local FSA office.

#### Warehouse Designation

Producers who have not designated their place of sales or those who have designated and wish to change are reminded they may do so during the next regular redesignation period of January 28 through February 1, 2002. This is the last designation for crop year 2001.

Legislation now requires all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to file a designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market tobacco by filing a form FSA 808.

#### Stolen Tobacco

Producers are reminded according to regulations stated in 107B paragraph 941 pertaining to stolen tobacco a police report must be filed within 15 days of the theft and be submitted to the County FSA Office. Filing the police report according to regulations will possibly avoid a penalty and/or a reduction of the next year's quota.

#### Office Closure

The Rockcastle County FSA Office will be closed Monday, January 21 in observance of Martin Luther King holiday. The office will reopen Tuesday, January 22, at 7:30 a.m. The USDA prohibits discrimination in all its programs and activities on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation and marital or family status.
