## Monday wreck claims life of 15-year-old

A former Rockcastle County High School student was killed Monday night in a wreck on Sweetwater Road.

Aron "Arsh" Poynter 15, was apparently the driver of a 2000 Pontiac Grand Am that ended up in a creek off Sweetwater Road.

According to Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Joe Rush, Poynter was driving a car owned by Anita Smith of Woodland Place, Mt. Vernon and traveling toward Copper Creek at a high rate of speed, when he lost control of the car.

Rush said that car overturned at least three times before coming to rest in the creek.

Poynter was trapped in the vehicle; but his passenger Michael Stanger, 14, a Rockcastle County Middle School student, was able to walk away.

After Poynter was freed from the vehicle he was taken to the Berea Hospital by members of the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service.

Poynter was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital.

Stanger was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital, where he was treated and released.

Rush said that he was still investigating the accident, but that there was no evidence of drugs or alcohol in the vehicle.

He also said that he did not know as of yet, if the vehicle was stolen or not, since Poynter was only 15 and obviously did not have a driver's license.

School officials at RCHS said Poynter had attended school three

this year for only a few days and that they had had trouble keeping up with his whereabouts.

Aron Poynter, who was preceded in death by both of his parents, Warren Poynter, Jr., and Judy Damrell Poynter, was buried at the Fairview Cemetery in Rockcastle County on Thursday, (today)

He is survived by four brothers, John D. Poynter of Berea, with whom Aron lived, Jason Poynter, Rodney Poynter, Brian Poynter, and a sister, Brandy Lamb of Mt. Vernon.

Other survivors include his paternal grandmother Nora Dees Poynter, his maternal grandfather, John Damrell both of Mt. Vernon and a host of other family members. He was also survived by a special friend and teacher, Shaun Burdette.

## Pay raises discussed

The Mt. Vernon City Council has discussed the possibility of raising the Mayor's pay.

At last month's meeting the council and Mayor Karen King discussed the possibility of giving raises to the Mayor and also a small raise to the council.

Mayor Karen King said Wednesday that a wide range of salaries for the Mayor was discussed from \$1,500 a month to \$50,000 a year.

Nothing was decided and no votes were taken.

Under state law, Kentucky City Councils cannot raise the pay of a

## CAP's GED program still strong after twenty years in Rockcastle

The Christian Appalachian Project's (CAP) Adult Education program has been a part of the educational fabric that has blanketed Rockcastle County for twenty years.

And just because there are a few changes on the way doesn't mean that the program will offer any less to its participants.

"To educate is to develop mentally, morally or aesthetically through instruction and those objectives have always been present at CAP," said full-time teacher Keith Gilbertson of Berea.

The face of education is changing in Kentucky and the state has re-vamped the GED test to make it more up to date with today's world.

With the process of change, CAP is also modifying their programs to meet the future of the 21st century and better prepare their students in the GED program, according to public relations director Karen Spivey.

CAP's spectrum of educational programs range from English basic reading skills to preparing for extensive collegiate exams, according to Bobbie Playforth, the local director of the educational programs at CAP.

"I guess the bottom line is we want everyone to understand that nothing has changed at CAP - we are still very proud of our educational programs and we are working very hard to change our curriculum to meet the needs of the people whom we serve," Playforth said.

In the past 20 years the educational programs at CAP have helped nearly 2,000 Rockcastle residents obtain their GED.

The current GED program is housed at the learning center in Renfro Valley, where it has been located for several years.

The learning center is open 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-through Friday, with evening classes also available.

Besides the programs offered at the learning center in Renfro Valley, CAP also provides a School on Wheels program where teachers actually go into the homes for instruc-

tion. Teachers have also been very involved with inmates at the Rockcastle County Detention Center, where they have helped numerous prisoners obtain their GED.

"The good thing about our program is there is really no qualifications," Playforth said.

"We are here to help people and we take a lot of pride in that," she said.

At the Detention Center, CAP's program has helped many inmates to obtain their GED.

"I can't say enough good things about CAP's program," Rockcastle County Jailor James Miller said.

"We have had a lot of people who have been able to actually improve themselves while here at the Detention Center because of CAP's efforts," Miller said.

"So many of these people think they have no help available, but if you really want to make an effort the GED program is one place to start," Miller said.

Besides going into the Detention

Center, many work release prisoners go the center in Renfro Valley for help.

"In addition to GED instruction, CAP also provides tutoring for post secondary education entrance exams, compass tests (vocational schools), ACT and SAT preparation, pre-employment tests for local industries and ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) for military vocations," Spivey said.

The Adult Education program has a number of flexible options that are available to the local community and would accommodate various needs and individual requests. The program includes one on one tutoring, on-site education, home based instruction, and on the job instruction.

An ample computer learning lab is also located at the Adult Education Center, with open access five days a week, in addition to the scheduled class time. Microsoft Office and various other software are available in both daytime and evening sessions.

"Recent updates and changes with GED have many prospective students

fearful of the upcoming transitions, when in fact the modifications are more beneficial to the program," Playforth said.

"Tax credits are available for employers which provide incentive to employees and encourage completion. For more information regarding GED benefits and qualifications, please contact Rockcastle Adult Education Center at (606)256-5307.

## Money available for new septic systems

If you are a homeowner and have a failing septic system or a "straight pipe," you may be eligible for a free septic system. The program is part of the \$9,000,000 "PRIDE Homeowner's Septic System Program." In Rockcastle County, the Cumberland Valley RC&D Council and the Rockcastle County Conservation District are jointly administering the project. The project is being funded by a grant from the Hal Rogers PRIDE program and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

To be eligible for the program the applicant must meet the HUD poverty guidelines and must own the property on which the septic system will be installed. The grant program is for existing homes and is not for new/unoccupied homes. If your home is near a municipal or county sewage line, the grant program will also pay the expenses to hook your home onto the sewage line.

This program is targeting a known 36,000 straight pipes and failing septic systems throughout the 40 county PRIDE area. Pollution from straight pipes and failing septic systems is the

main water pollution problem in eastern Kentucky. Nearly 1/2 the private drinking water wells in Kentucky are contaminated with coliform bacteria, an indication that the wells may be contaminated water. By installing adequate septic systems or hooking on to an existing sewage line we can all be a part of drastically improving the water quality of eastern Kentucky and Rockcastle County.

In Rockcastle County, applications for the "Homeowner Septic System Program" can be picked up at the Rockcastle County Conservation District office at USDA Service Center, Hwy. 150. The homeowner will complete the grant application, provide proof of income, and proof of ownership of the property on which a septic system is to be installed, along with other documentation as required in the grant administration procedures. # Points East

Randy Grady works for a private foundation in Washington, DC. He'd rather not have the name of this foundation mentioned in the paper because he already has more work than he can handle but he doesn't mind getting a little press.

Private foundations, for those readers who need some enlightenment, are pots of money established by very wealthy families and/or corporations that must be given to charity or qualified non-profit organizations. Instead of turning profits over to the government, folks with lots of money can set up foundations and have some control about where it goes.

Generally, that means the recipient has to be a qualified non-profit certified by the IRS or a school or what not. But, in effect, it allows control of vast amounts of capital—hundreds of billions of dollars, to avoid taxation as long as they are put to use for the greater human need.

And I'm all for that. As far as I'm concerned a dollar surrendered to any form of government is a dollar mispent. But that's neither here nor there and quite beside the point if I'm to be redundant.

Randy rode around with me over the holidays. His foundation does not take applications but, instead, sends emissaries about and abroad to seek out those non-profits who are doing good and avoiding evil. When he finds one that might be entertaining to the founder's Board of Directors, he calls them up and asks them to ask for money.

It's a purely, royalist, aristocratic way of distributing the wealth but it's oh-so much more efficient than dealing with half-browned bureaucrats who require so many hundreds of pages of bull manure so that they can accumulate it, store it, and carry it about to demonstrate that Daddy didn't make that big contribution to Mitch McConnell for nothing.

A foundation funding proposal is generally less than ten pages. If they like it, you get the money in a few weeks. If they don't like it, you don't get any money at all and they send you a polite little letter explaining why. Really simple.

An equally qualified proposal (name your favorite non-profit, the state or federal government) requires hundreds of pages and many hours on the phone arguing about the order of the alphabet, whether or not it really comes before 9 and the environmental consequences that might occur if one of your staff goes to Florida on vacation and uses the restroom in the ocean.

Years ago by and then one day you get a letter from your Congressman announcing that you have been awarded a government grant. Some times you read about it in the paper first because the politicians want to make sure they get the credit before you have a chance to call your favorite reporter.

But I'm off on another story and Randy Grady is actually the subject here.

So I met him at Boone Tavern in Berea at daybreak one morning in late December and he wanted to, "just ride around and talk and get a handle on what local non-profits were doing in central Appalachia" and, of course, he wanted to do it in my time. Central Appalachia, as I define it, covers all the mountain counties of Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia and the entire state of West Virginia.

"Berea really isn't a good place to start," I told him right off, "because most everybody who lives here are Appalachian wannabes who can look off in the distance and see Appalachia. Berea is about as representative of Appalachia as Disney Land is to the real world."

"Can we go to Appalachia from here in a day," he wanted to know. "Fifteen miles Southeast of town and we're in it." I told him and off we took. Down into Jackson County,

into Owsley, Lee, Wolf, Breathitt, Perry, Knott, Letcher, Wise County, Virginia, back across Pine Mountain into Harlan, Leslie, Clay-back into Jackson and 13 hours later parked again the Tavern two hours after dark. Three hundred and sixty three miles of Appalachia which included a couple of long hollers and absolutely no major roads.

I talked nonstop the entire way, pausing only to answer questions. "Is that really a cloud down there below us? Why are the coal trucks this big? Aren't you scared? Do they run school buses here? What do they do for water and sewer? Where do people work? And on and on and on!"

I talked about at least two dozen non-profits on the course of the trip. I spelled out what folks are doing for themselves and apologized, as best I could, for the disproportionate number of folks who have made public transfer payments a way of life and lambasted the idiots who throw their garbage alongside the road.

And that was the killer. Randy's

Foundation won't be doing any grants in eastern Kentucky because it is a pig sty.

"Cleanliness is next to Godliness," he told me. "I've been all over the world and this is the filthiest place I've ever seen with so few people. If you have so many people unemployed, it seems to me they would have the time and decency to clean up after themselves instead of destroying this wonderful place."

So I went home pretty red in the face. My pride of my mountains slapped in the face. I'd shown Randy Grady the best of what there is to see in eastern Kentucky and our way of life and all he saw was the litter and garbage alongside the roads and streams.

Perhaps what eastern Kentucky needs most instead of roads and infrastructure is a big load of hog feed dumped out at every wide spot in the road. If we insist on living like pigs, we might as well be treated like swine.

Randy Grady won't be back our way.

gather the information he needs. He just called me as I was writing this letter and said that the Sheriff's Office contacted him with regard to going to prosecute. Thanks Jeff you did all you could do!

I then called the State Police Post in London. I eventually ended up talking to Sgt. Williams who asked to talk to a supervisor. Sgt. Williams told me there is no law against shooting my dog; and Mr. Burdette was wrong in saying there is such a law.

I then called the Sheriff's Office again at 4:58 p.m., and requested Sheriff Smith call me back since he was not in the office. At 8:10 p.m. I called the non-emergency line to the 911 office and requested they page Sheriff Smith to call me. Still I received no call. Deputy Roark did say that the Sheriff tried to call me that night from the Deputy's house. I don't know if he did or not but I was home all except for between 8:40 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. and the answer machine was on all day as well as family members at the house while I was gone. There were no messages left. Deputy Roark said my phone rang and there was no pick up.

The next morning, being disgusted with the whole mess I went to the Richmond State Police Post and spoke to Lt. Merriman who confirmed what I already knew. There is a law against shooting animals. It is called cruelty to animals. Lt. Merriman assured me that he would contact the London Post and they would respond. I thank Lt. Merriman for his help! When I got home that afternoon there was a call from L. Pack who sent an officer to investigate. On the way home I stopped at the Sheriff's office about 12:30 p.m. and asked why they refused to gather the evidence. Sheriff Smith then said he would send someone to investigate and take pictures. Deputy Roark, another deputy and a State Police Detective finally showed up about 2:00 p.m. They took pictures of Delilah's body and the blood trail leading to the edge of the property where she was shot. However, they would not go on the property and follow the trail. They also talked to the property owner who denied knowing anything about it (naturally). This is all well and good, however, if they had investigated while the trail was still clear and saw what I saw maybe something could have been done if not in criminal court at least in civil court. Instead, they waited until the snow melted and the blood trail was nearly gone. The bottom line is that due to their lack of efficiency in dealing with this matter our family pet was murdered and the killer will go scott free.

Since our dog was shot the neighbor's (whose yard was apparently shot) dog has come on our property numerous times, one in the presence of Deputy Roark. Once he bit my sister-in-law's dog who comes here frequently from across the street (he has been shot once as well as her other dog was shot and killed) and once he became aggressive towards a family member. Today, Friday, January 11th, makes the third day I have called the Dog Warden about this matter. I have yet to hear from him although Mary, who answers the phone for him, says he told her he tried to call the first night. Mary has been very courteous and I appreciate all she has done. I just can't understand why we are getting calls all day and all night from family and friends but county officials can't seem to get

through. When I asked Mary to have County Judge Buzz Carlotta call me he had no trouble calling me and was very helpful. I assured me he would have the Dog Warden call me. This call just came as I was busy writing this letter. I must say that Judge Carlotta gave me the quickest call back I have ever had since living here. Thank you Buzz!

The one thing that keeps going through my mind is a statement made by Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette. "This is what I'm up against in this county." I can understand his frustration. It must be awful trying to prosecute a case in a county where it is so hard to get the police to respond and collect evidence in a timely and professional manner.

I would write this letter about or not there was an election coming but I have only lived here since the 15th of September, 2001 and until now had no clue of how I would cast my votes in the upcoming election. There is no one nearby in my mind. Thanks again to Jeff Burdette, Judge Carlotta and Mary in his office for serving our family and our county to the best of your ability. As for the rest of you, against us in this county, I can understand myself. I urge each citizen of Rockcastle County to vote his or her conscious in the upcoming election. I also urge that if you have a story of your own, good or bad to make it, it was raised to believe that it is the voice of the people that effects positive change in any government be it city, county, state or federal.

This all started out about a family pet, it is a shame that it ended up being about a very much more!

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## Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,

In recent times I have read letters in the Mt. Vernon Signal about the law enforcement in our community. I have to admit at the time some were hard to believe. Even though I have called for police assistance from the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and the London State Police Post two times for attempted break-ins and had any response other than a phone call either time. The reason I am writing today is that I believe that everyone should get credit for the job they do. I want to thank each individual involved for their participation in my most recent dilemma.

On Monday, January 7th, I was gone to my sisters in Indiana. I had left a medical necessity at her house after my mother's funeral and returned to pick it up. While I was gone our family pet (a beautiful red and white Flathead named Delilah) was shot and killed. She died in a neighbor's yard. She did not get a hold of me until Tuesday, January 8th. When I went to get my dog from their yard there was a blood trail leading me back to the house as I was apparently shot. The blood trail began in another neighbor's yard approximately 50-60

feet from their back door. The ground was covered with snow and the only tracks were those of my dog and the ones I made following the trail. A mountain-side, buildings and a fence bordered this area of the yard. The only place I could see possible for anyone to be close enough to shoot my dog without leaving tracks was this neighbor's back porch.

I realize that my dog was on someone else's property, however, there was no signs that she had done anything to threaten anyone as there was no evidence that she was close enough to anyone to pose a threat or even turn over a garbage receptacle. When Delilah came to live with us we kept her on a tie out. I eventually had to turn her loose because other dogs in the neighborhood would take advantage of her being tied and she was not able to defend herself. One of these dogs belongs to the neighbor whose backyard the blood trail began in.

After following the trail and getting my dog home I called the Rockcastle Sheriff's Office. I didn't get the name of the person on the other end, however later Sheriff Smith told me it was he that I had talked to at that time. It was 2:30 p.m. when I called. Sheriff Smith said that it would be about 4:00 p.m. before he could get an officer out to me. I told him I would wait. Approximately an hour later Deputy Ronnie Roark showed up. I explained that my dog had been shot and that there was a blood trail leading to the neighbor's house. Deputy Roark told me to call the prosecutor and if he would issue a warrant they would make an arrest. I asked if he would look at the blood trail at that time and he did not.

I called Jeff Burdette (Rockcastle County Attorney) who said that the police needed to come take pictures in the blood trail and interview the property owner. I called back to request this of the Sheriff's Office and they still would not come and gather the evidence needed. I then called Mr. Burdette back and he said he would call them and I should call the State Police and request they investigate. I appreciate all that Mr. Burdette has done to help. He can only prosecute if the law enforcement officials

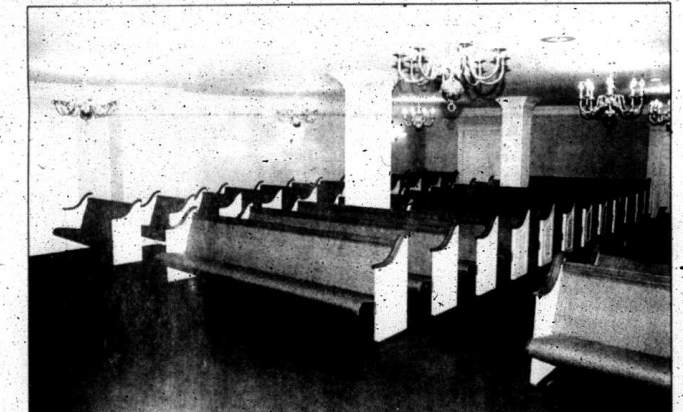
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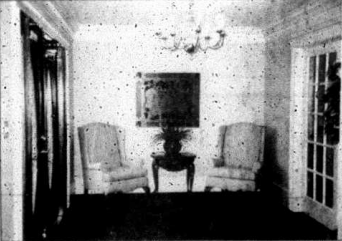

# Preventing calf scours

By: Tom Mills, County Extension Agent for Agricultural

Why is beef cow nutrition important to preventing calf scours? The majority of fetal growth occurs 30-60 days prior to calving. Since reproduction is so important to the cow, she will shift nutrition to her developing calf. If adequate nutrition is not available, this shift will occur at the expense of the cow losing body weight.

Low energy and low protein nutrient levels affect the strength of newborn calves. Weak calves do not have the ability to consume milk from first milk or colostrum within the first 6-12 hours. Since colostrum is high in protein and energy, any nutrient shortage in the cow may affect the amount and quality she produces. Colostrum is the calf's

immunity to disease. Anything that affects the quality of colostrum or the amount that calves consume soon after birth, affects its future immunity.

Research studies have looked at cows being fed low energy/low protein diets starting 100 days before calving, to see the effects from shifting to adequate nutrition 30 days prior to calving. Cows fed low energy/low protein rations for the last 100 days, before calving had: 91% calves alive at birth; 81% alive at 14 days old; 71% alive at weaning; with 19% of death loss due to scours.

For cows which were moved to adequate nutrition: 93% calves alive at birth; 93% alive at 14 days old; 81% alive at weaning; with 19% of death loss due to scours.

birth; 100% alive at 14-days; 100% alive at weaning; 0% death loss due to scours.

Low nutrition in the form of low energy and low protein feeds are very common in fescue and grass hay. Last year's Rations Balancing and Condition Scoring Workshop allowed 45 hay samples to be analyzed. All hays were adequate for dry cows. However, only 3 hays which contained some type legume could meet the cows nutrient needs 30-60 days before calving. Of the hay samples, forty two would require supplemental feed just prior to calving and even more following calving due to much higher demands.

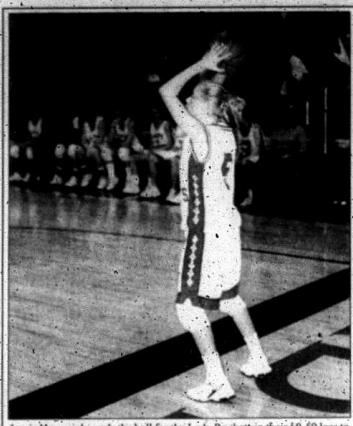

A course in world history would not be complete without a look at the lives of Christ and Buddha and a look at the Crusades and the Reformation. The growth and influence of Islam and the African religions in the last century would be an important part of any world history course.

After all, history is not just about wars, it is also about religion.

Another great service schools could offer would be a course in Comparative Religion. Here students would have the opportunity to study and compare the great religions of the world: Judaism, Buddhism, Hinduism, Christianity, Islam and others. This would prepare these students to the citizens of a world in which many religions influence the thinking of peoples everywhere.

It would also be appropriate for English teachers to offer a course in religious literature. Reading from the Bible, the Koran and the holy books of other religions would develop in the students an appreciation for different types of literature. For example, a course in the Old Testament Literature has long been offered by the University of Kentucky.

Because of the controversy surrounding the teaching of religion in schools, some have become afraid to touch the subject at all. However, religion is an integral part of life and is a natural part of many different courses from history to English to psychology. Not to teach about religion is to fail to acknowledge the tremendous role religion has played in shaping this country and the world.

While public schools should teach about religion, they should not teach religion as an article of faith. Teachers should not proselytize. Public school is not the place to attempt to convince students to become Baptist instead of Catholic or Pentecostal instead of Episcopalian. While a look at the history of these denominations would be appropriate, no

attempt should be made to convince students of the rightness or wrongness of one denomination over another.

Nor should public schools attempt to convert Jews to Christianity or Christians to Islam. Learning about these religions is different from being told to believe in the truth of one or the other. This is particularly important when people of many cultures and religions are moving into southeastern Kentucky. Their beliefs need to be respected. This courtesy is consistent with the long history of religious freedom in the United States.

Teaching about religion is different from teaching religion as a matter of faith. The former is the proper task of public schools. The latter is best reserved for homes and churches.

## Reasons not to try a low-carb diet

During the months of January and February many people attempt to lose unwanted pounds. If you are considering a low-carbohydrate, high protein diet for weight loss, here are some possible effects:

- Heart Disease Risk Increases: Risk of heart disease is increased greatly on a low carbohydrate (CHO), low fiber diet due to high animal protein, cholesterol and saturated fat. All three raise blood cholesterol, particularly LDL or "bad" cholesterol. Elimination of high-CHO, high fiber plant foods, that help lower cholesterol, compounds this problem.
- Cancer Risk Increases: Risk of many cancers is likely to increase when most fruits, vegetables, whole grains and beans are eliminated from the diet.
- Poor Long Term Weight Control: There is no metabolic magic in low-CHO diets. Those who continue to lose weight after the first week do so because they decrease calorie intake. This can occur because of decreased dietary variety. Greatly limiting the number of foods that people are allowed to eat, reduces their food and calorie intake. But a reduction in variety most often leads to boredom and cravings over the long run.
- Rising Blood Pressure With Age: Blood pressure will likely increase with age on a typical low-CHO diet. In fact, this because a high-CHO, high-fiber diet includes more fruits, vegetables, whole grains and nonfat dairy products. This diet was shown to lower blood pressure most likely due to its higher content of electrolytes such as potassium, calcium and magnesium. Also low-CHO diets do not restrict salt intake, one reason why blood pressure rises with age.
- Kidney Stones: Kidney stones are more likely to form on a high protein diet than a higher carbohydrate diet with more fruits and vegetables.
- Osteoporosis: Over time, excess protein intake, especially from animal sources, increases the loss of calcium in the urine - which may contribute to osteoporosis.

Your best bet for permanent weight loss and control, as well as good health, is twofold: 1) increase the amount of fruits, vegetables, nonfat dairy products, whole grains and beans that you eat and 2) eliminate calorie-dense foods such as cookies, sugary desserts, bagels, crackers, chips, fries, pizza, candies, etc. Research on people who have successfully lost a lot of weight and kept it off long term, shows that the vast majority succeeded by consuming a low-fat diet high in fiber coupled with regular exercise.

### Ministering for a Healthier Community

This is just one example of the kind of ministry Parish Nurses involved in the Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital Health Ministries in Caring Congregations program perform for members of their congregations.

What is Health Ministries in Caring? Congregations? Simply put, it is people of faith working together for healthier communities. The program is based on the relationship between body, mind and spirit and the idea that health is not limited only to one's physical well-being, but includes social, emotional, and spiritual dimensions as well.

Local churches involved in the LCRH Health Ministry program have one or more Parish Nurses who promote wellness among members of their congregations. How the Parish Nurse does this depends on the needs of the congregation, the church's resources, and how much time he or she is able to devote each week.

The hospital provides ongoing support for the Parish Nurses through monthly meetings, continuing education programs, a resource library and health education support materials. In addition, Parish Nurses are provided opportunities to attend the National Parish Nurse certificate program and are given necessary equipment to begin their ministry by the hospital.

Church members benefit from having access to a health professional with whom they feel comfortable discussing health concerns and, because the Parish Nurse shares the same faith background, praying

Currently 26 churches in four counties involving 39 Parish Nurses have partnered with Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital to begin a Health Ministries in Caring Congregations program.

Her dedicated efforts in recruiting and training Parish Nurses, and her ongoing support of their ministries have helped make Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital's Health Ministries/Parish Nurse Program a blessing to all those whose lives it has touched.

## Agricultural News

### What is the Farm Service Agency?

Stabilizing farm income, helping farmers conserve land and water resources, providing credit to new and disadvantaged farmers and ranchers, and helping farm operations recover from the effects of disaster are the missions of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency (FSA).

FSA was set up when the Department was reorganized in 1994, incorporating programs from several agencies, including the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (now a separate Risk Management Agency), and the Farmers Home Administration. Though its name has changed over the years, the Agency's relationship with farmers goes back to the 1930's.

At that time, Congress set up a unique system under which Federal farm programs are administered locally. Farmers, representing Rockcastle County, who are eligible to participate in these programs elect a three person county committee, which reviews county office operations and makes decisions on how to apply the programs. This grassroots approach gives farmers a much needed say in how Federal actions affect their communities and their individual operations. After more than 60 years, it remains a cornerstone of FSA's efforts to preserve and promote the American way of life.

### Changes in Tobacco Program Does Not Limit Carryover Tobacco

Jeffery S. Hall, Kentucky State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency, wishes to remind farmers that recent changes in the Burley tobacco program do NOT change the amount of physical tobacco a farm can carryover from one crop year to the next. Tobacco that was sold this season can be carried over as unmarketed tobacco and sold in the 2002-03 marketing season. "Mc Hale kind."

Ineffective with the 2002 Burley tobacco quote, the total amount of under marketings that can be "carried over" as quota additions to farms nationwide, is limited to 10 percent of the national basic quota for the preceding year. In the past three undermarketings could be brought forward and added to the next year's basic quota provided the farm did not exceed the prior year's basic quota

plus prior year's leased-in pounds. Factoring, or the limiting of individual farm under marketings may be required beginning with the 2002 crop year. "This will occur in the 2001 crop year, under marketings for the entire Burley belt exceeds 10 percent of the 2001 national basic quota." The new limit is not farm specific. If the limit is to be applied, it will be applied to the under marketings from all farms when the 2002 Effective Quota is determined.

Farmers that carry over unmarketed tobacco are required to report the pounds "carried over" to the local FSA County Office.

### Applications for New Burley Tobacco Farm Quotas

Applications for new burley tobacco farm quotas are being accepted through February 15, 2002. Before a new farm quota is recommended it must be determined that each applicant meets all eligibility requirements. Eligibility requirements include the applicant has NO burley tobacco quota, has land suitable for tobacco production, has two of the past five years marketing history of burley tobacco and 50% of all household income is received from farming.

### Marketing Cards

Rockcastle County producers who have received marketing cards are reminded to carefully check their card for complete and accurate information. Please compare the farm number, warehouse number and pounds listed on the card to the information provided on the notification letter mailed with the card. If you find an error, return the card immediately to the office for correction(s).

Remember: You are responsible for the information listed on the card. When you have finished your sales to tobacco please return the marketing card to the FSA office as soon as possible.

### 2002 Crop Disaster Program (CDP)

Farmers who suffered crop losses in the year 2000 due to natural disaster are eligible for CDP assistance. CDP covers all crops as follows: insured crops, Uninsured Crops and Noninsured crops.

Signup began January 18, 2001, and ends January 18, 2002. Further information is available at the local FSA Office.

### 2000 Quality Loss Program (QLP)

Farmers who suffered at least a 20 percent loss in the 2000 crop year due to weather-related disasters are eligible for QLP assistance. QLP covers crops which were produced and harvested in the 2000 crop year and suffered a minimum of 20 percent reduction in production.

Signup began August 13, 2001, and ends January 18, 2002. Further information is available at the local FSA Office.

### Rockcastle County Disaster Declaration

On August 16, 2001, President Bush declared a major disaster in Kentucky based on damages and losses caused by severe storms and flooding that occurred on July 27, 2001. This declaration has been amended to include Amendment #1, 2 and 3.

The Kentucky counties declared as disaster areas and eligible for Federal disaster assistance, including FSA Emergency Loan, included Rockcastle County declared as a disaster area under Amendment #3. Applications may be accepted for both physical and production losses, and applications pending on the specific date may be processed and completed when filed by the termination date of April 29, 2002.

### 2002 Crop Loan Rate Decisions on Hold

With Congress scheduled to reconvene for business after the Martin Luther King Holiday, USDA has postponed the announcement of loan rates for the 2002 crop year until after the legislature has had additional time to work on the farm bill proposal. This would suggest that if progress on the farm bill is not evident by planting time, the Secretary of Agriculture would be compelled at that point, to announce the loan rates for the 2002 crops.

Not knowing the basic value of potential crops makes it difficult to decide how much of each crop to plant for 2002. The House of Representatives proposal, HR2646, calls for reducing the soybean loan rate from the current \$52.6 per bushel, to \$4.92 per bushel. Producers might opt to plant fewer acres of beans if the soybean loan rate were adjusted downward to that degree.

Whatever the final content of the new farm bill, or the time frame of its completion, producers can be assured that some form of financial support will be available. Congressional members are aware that agriculture provides significant economic support for the nation's economy, and the economy need to be bolstered during this critical period of recovery. USDA, through the Farm Service Agency, provides fi-

financial support for the entire economy when a healthy agricultural sector is maintained.


