Education provides source of hope and purpose to female inmates

Among fhem, they are mothers, wives, homeinakers, students and for the coming months, they are also prisoners. Incarcerated for various felonies, the women are state immates and currently housed at a local county jail in the CAP service area, a facility that accommodates those convicted on state charges, in addition to individuals brought up on local offenses. Gince a week, Jamet Heinz, a CAP employee, who teaches adult education, passes through heavily secure, reinforced metal doors and proceeds to a small windowless; soon where she is equipped with a

7. Ask about each-shot or pill that is given to the patient. If the medi-cine is an unfamiliar one, ask the nurse to check before giving it.

Mistakes are made, and you need to protect the patient from being given the wrong medication.
