A tragic accident on Interstate 75 on Saturday claimed the life of a Lexington woman. According to state police, Barbara L. Datson, 54, died at the Rockcastle Hospital after the Lincoln Town Car she was driving hit a Ford Explorer after the vehicle became sideways. Icy road conditions were the apparent cause of the wreck, which had traffic backed up for several miles. Mrs. Datson was the fourth person to lose their life on Rockcastle roadways this year.

Deadline to file for office is next week

The filing deadline for the May Primary is less than a week away and filings for the election are starting to slow down.

The following is a run down of who has filed for what office:

For County Judge/Executive, incumbent Buzz Carlfort; and local businessman Howard Saylor have filed.

County Attorney Jeff Burdette is so far unopposed.

County Clerk Norma Houk and Property Valuation Administrator Margaret Offutt are also unopposed as is County Coroner Bill Dwyer.

In the race for Jailer, incumbent James Miller is opposed by former jailer Billy Kirby.

The most crowded race is that of Sheriff, where incumbent Shirley Smith is opposed by Darrell Doan, Sam Stallworth, Billy M. Hammons, Wayne Lear, Sr., and John H. Kemper, Jr.

Incumbent first district magistrate John Holbrook, a Democrat, has plenty of company in his race for reelection.

He is opposed by another Democrat, Larry Newcomb, Sr., a host of Republicans, one of which Holbrook or Newcomb will face in the fall.

The Republican candidates in the first district are David Gibbs, Eugene Caldwell, Paul "Buster" Rowe, Larry Loebe, Arnold McGuire and Donald W. Collins.

Incumbent magistrate Jack Bradley has only one opponent at this time, he is William Denny.

Third district magistrate Bill McKinney is currently unopposed.

In the fourth district, incumbent Fred Mullins Jr., is being challenged by Roger Racker.

In district five, Donald Bullock is being opposed by Mark Frynter, Murrel K. Brown, George Renner, Randy Stewart and William Mullins. Rockcastle and Lincoln District Judges Walter McGuire and Michael Henry have also filed for reelection.

And although the job pays nothing there is a host of candidates for constable.

In district one the candidates are: Ernest Alcorn and Randall Stevens.

In district two the candidates are: Delino McClure, Shannon Yark, Charlie Newcomb and Steve Griffin.

In district three the candidates are Ronald Dale Simpson and Stanley R. Payne.

In district four the candidates so far are Roger Pigg, Leonard Miller, Richard Dean and Donnie Cope.

In district five, Albert Wayne Carpenter and David Mason have filed.

Also to date, three people have filed for city office, although the deadline to file is in August.

All of those filings are for Mt. Vernon Mayor. They are council members Chance Kirby and Jackie Renner and Rockcastle Respiratory Care Patient Jody Adams.

The filing deadline for county offices is next Tuesday, January 29th at 4:00 p.m.



Council discusses important issues

The Mt. Vernon City Council had several items of interesting business on their agenda last week.

Those items included presenting Officer Barry Adams with a Governor's Award for his number of drunk or impaired driving arrests. It was his sixth straight year to be recognized.

The council also discussed a \$65,000 grant for Halcomb East and Maple Grove Road, which will extend water lines and a \$110,000 grant for the city's raw sewage treatment plant.

Mayor Karen King and the council also discussed recent expansions by Charter Communications, which have also raised the price of cable for local residents.

Mayor King read two letters from disgruntled customers and the council agreed to ask a Charter representative be present at the next meeting.

Mayor King also said that she would ask city attorney John Clontz

to review the county's agreement with Charter before the next meeting.

The Mayor also outlined some goals she thought the council should have and ones that should be completed in the next year or so.

They include: making the mayor's job a full-time 35 hour per week job, with that person on site.

It was also discussed raising the salary of the council members of \$100 to \$200 per month.

Daughter of former RCHS teacher dies

The daughter of a former Rockcastle County High School teacher died in a tragic accident last week.

Samantha Tilley, 6, died after being run over when she fell off the tailgate of her father's pick-up truck, according to police reports.

Her father, Gary Tilley, 31, was driving the truck and had taught at the Rockcastle County High School for approximately five years, before returning home to teach at Jackson County High School.

Samantha G. Tilley of Tyner received multiple injuries and was airlifted to the University of Kentucky Medical Center, where she was pronounced dead at 7:14 p.m. Thursday.

The incident happened at 6:05 p.m. in a driveway on Privett Road in Jackson County, where the Tilley family is building a home.

Samantha was riding on the tailgate, along with her sister, Kimberly, 9, and brother, Dakota, 4, said Blue Lalk, owner of Lakes Funeral Home in McKee, who spoke for the family.

"(Gary Tilley) was just backing his truck up to move it, and the little girl fell off the tailgate and the truck ran over her," Lalk said.

Gary Tilley had gathered scraps of wood from the home's construction.

Two found guilty in federal court

According to the U.S. Department of Justice, Troy Kirby and Johnny Lee Bullock, both of Rockcastle County, were found guilty last week by a federal jury in United States District Court in London.

The two were charged with conspiring and manufacturing, possessing and distributing methamphetamine.

Kirby was also found guilty of being a convicted felon in possession of a firearm and possessing a firearm not registered in the National Firearms Registration and Transfer Record.

The jury's verdicts of guilty were returned following a trial before United States District Judge Jennifer B. Coffman.

Kirby and Bullock are scheduled to be sentenced on April 25.

The case was investigated by the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department, the Mt. Vernon Police Department, the Laurel County Sheriff's Office, the Williamsburg Police Department, the Kentucky State Police,

Our Readers Write

Dear Mayor King, Council Members, Mt. Vernon Signal, and Citizens of Mt. Vernon,

Sometime before Christmas, our neighbor told me about her cablevision bill being over forty dollars and wanted to know if we had received one. At that time, we had not. We received our bill on December 27 for \$41.97, which was way up from our usual bill of \$27.31. All of this was done without notice of choice available.

I immediately called Charter to question the bill. (Our neighbor had done the same thing earlier and was told that she needed to program her TV to receive the additional channels.) The young lady that answered, told me that the bill was for January and the channels would be added at that time. Shows that they really didn't know what was going on. Since this is a ridiculously high rate, I asked about another option. I was told I could receive the basic service for just over \$15. When I asked what channels were on the basic service, I was told channels up to channel 24. Well, that sounded okay since we had only had channels up to channel 16 before, so I agreed for basic service.

On the following Monday, two young men from Charter came to change our service to basic, but couldn't because our area had not been upgraded. On January 16 and 17, the upgrade was made to receive the added channels. By the way, the channel order was changed and what I thought would be included in the basic is not included.

When one young man came into our home to check the reception, I asked about the service condition and the flickering lines on channels 2 & 6, and was told that these were low level

channels or something similar to that. Apparently, these channels aren't all that good. Wouldn't you know that Channel 18 and Channel 36 are located on channels 5 and 6. Therefore two of our local news channels will not always come in well. This is odd since our old service had good reception on those lower channels. And if these are known to not always come in as well as the others, why do they use them at all much less put two news channels there?

During the time of the change over, my mother called about her bad reception and she was told to program her TV (which had already been done) when she said she didn't know how, she was told to read her manual. She had to call a local repairman. It was just the bad reception with the upgrade.

CNN has now been moved from 3 to 24 and ESPN has been moved from 10 to 26, therefore they will not be on our basic service. Out of the 19 channels available on the basic service, 4 are useless to us. They are the local advertising channels: that leaves 15 channels to watch. Of these 15, two are different versions of WKYT (CBS), two are NBC channels, one is ABC and one is FOX. You talk about being had, we have been had royally by Charter Communications. Even if I elect to keep the expanded service, I will not receive all the benefits. My small TV will only receive signals up to channel 47, so many of the added channels are wasted on me unless I invest in a new TV. Hum, I wonder if they have investments in TV sales.

Now, why did you, the city council, approve Charter Communications' move on this? Since you are

the local franchising authority, are you getting a huge bonus for this? Do you realize that many of your constituents may not know they have a choice? Charter did not give one in advance of the billing. Many people in the Mt. Vernon area are on fixed incomes and cannot afford these outrageous rates. And even if a person chooses to get the basic package, it stinks. It is a shame that you have allowed this to occur, but I do believe that if you choose to represent the people of Mt. Vernon and not Charter Communications you can remedy this. Although I have not checked with nearby towns (ones that are not served by Charter), I have heard that our rates seem to be extremely high. What are you going to do? I am asking you to find us another provider, one that does not take advantage of their monopoly status.

I am also asking that all citizens voice their opinions in writing to City Hall since you are the local franchising authority. And do we have any lawyers or other interested parties out there that would be willing to investigate why such practices are allowed to occur. As citizens of this community, we should have a voice and better representation from our elected officials.

Three inmates received diplomas. A fourth graduate, William Campbell, completed his sentence earlier and made parole, but returned for graduation. William is currently employed at a local radio station.

"The brains that we have are a gift from God and we must use them to the fullest," said Buzz Carliflois, Rockcastle County Judge Executive, "addressing the courtroom of supporting friends, family and local officials. "If you live to be 100 your education should never stop," continued Carliflois to the graduating class.

The Christian Appalachian Project is an interdenominational, non-profit Christian service organization, committed to serving people in need in Appalachia by providing physical, spiritual and emotional support through education, cross intervention and community development. With more than 360 active programs and services, CAP's efforts reach people through the thirteen Appalachian states.

Through CAP

Education provides source of hope and purpose to female inmates

Among them, they are mothers, wives, homemakers, students and for the coming months, they are also prisoners. Incarcerated for various felonies, the women are state inmates and currently housed at a local county jail in the CAP service area, a facility that accommodates those convicted on state charges, in addition to individuals brought up on local offenses.

Once a week, Janet Heinz, a CAP employee, who teaches adult education, passes through heavily secured, reinforced metal doors and proceeds to a small widowless room where she is equipped with a two-way radio that communicates with the guards out front.

The women arrive to her "classroom," one by one. The "classroom" space also serves as a weight room, a church, an AA meeting room and a place for contact visits. It is sparsely furnished with a metal table and a row of barbells.

Prison is not necessarily conducive to education; however, it is a place of self-reflection, introspection and the opportunity to take inventory of what one might improve upon. With that in mind, CAP volunteers and staff like Janet Heinz offer a presence and a purpose to well-meaning individuals who are trying to better themselves and need a place to start.

"She takes time for each one of us and doesn't look down on us just because we are in here," remarked Wendy, one of the inmates.

All those Hollywood stereotypes one would expect soon dissolve, the hardened criminal, trash talking, seasoned and soured. The women Janet teaches could easily be mistaken for a group from a church bible study, or a tight knit bunch of friends swapping stories about their children over soup and salad. They are polite, soft spoken, kind to one another and their teacher. More definitive of the group is that they are easy going, somewhat shy, demure, and delightful to speak with. Each one, eager to pursue their education and make it count toward their future.

Aspirations of the class vary from nursing to architecture to elderly care. Their studies encompass reading, science, mathematics, literature, history and social studies. Each will advance at their own pace, some will finish while incarcerated, while a few may complete their testing on the "outside." It's difficult to study as everyone is on a different schedule. Some of the women provide some functional duty, or rather, hold a job within the jail, whether it is working in janitorial maintenance or preparing the meals that will be consumed by the inmates and staff. Some work well into the evening, while others keep

a more conventional eight to four regimen. Regardless, with ten to eleven women in one common living space and each inmate maintaining a somewhat different schedule, finding quiet concentration

time is very difficult. This impediment does not deter the women from continuing to pursue their studies, as they come to class prepared and eager to learn.

"For them to have a fresh start, the education piece is so important," stated Janet.

"During a typical day we will review reading assignments, do some games, some individual study, some work on math, some are testing, it goes very fast," said Janet.

"A guard that works third shift has been very helpful to them with homework, although everyone on staff is supportive of the program. They genuinely want them to succeed," Janet continued.

"We try to talk a lot about options, career choices, things available. I want them to be encouraged that there's a bright future waiting for them and this is providing a very good start," Janet concluded.

So You Are Going to Have Surgery...

In the past six months members of my immediate family have had three major surgeries in two different hospitals. I now know more about hospitals than

I ever wanted to know. In case you or a family member is facing surgery, here are some suggestions to help make the process less painful.

1. Discuss pain management with the surgeon beforehand. While pain management may not be the first thing on your mind before surgery, it will be afterwards. Trust me. There is nothing worse than watching a family member suffer and not knowing what to do. Make certain that you and your doctor have an understanding about what is to be done when the pain hits.

2. Discuss pain management with the anesthesiologist beforehand. I discovered that in some cases the anesthesiologist is in charge of pain management, not the surgeon. Of course, the family does not even meet this doctor. Find out before surgery who will be in charge and meet with that person.

3. Keep the family member "comfortable while at rest." This phrase was said to me by an anesthesiologist who cared for one of my family members.

This was his goal in pain management. While he could not promise to keep the patient pain free, he tried to keep her "comfortable while at rest." He believed that as long as she was not moving, she should be comfortable.

4. Do not accept that pain just has to be endured. Certainly some pain is inevitable, as during that first walk after surgery. However, no patient should have to endure tremendous amounts of pain. Ask for help and expect it to come quickly.

5. Be an advocate for the patient. If there is ever a time when one is helpless, it is after major surgery. The patient cannot speak up for himself, so the family must. Do not be afraid

to ask doctors, nurses and other staff for help. This may be difficult since many of us are intimidated by medical staff. This is no time to be timid. Speak up on behalf of the patient.

6. Know what medications are being given to the patient. In your discussion with the doctor before surgery, ask what will be given and how often. Make a list and take it with you to the hospital. This is also the time to tell the doctor what medications the patient takes regularly so that these can be continued at the hospital.

7. Ask about each shot or pill that is given to the patient. If the medicine is an unfamiliar one, ask the nurse to check before giving it. Mistakes are made, and you need to protect the patient from being given the wrong medication.

8. Stay with the patient until the patient can speak up for himself. In the first few days after surgery, the patient is usually very medicated and unable to ask for what he needs. Family and friends can take turns staying with him 24/7.

9. Limit visitors and phone calls. No one feels like much company after major surgery. Encourage visitors to stay "just a little while," and screen phone calls.

10. Say thank you. Hospital staff who go above and beyond the call of duty merit a special thank you. Let them know you appreciate their taking care of the patient. We found clearly staff and nurse's aides to be especially helpful.

These suggestions should make the hospital experience less painful for everyone.

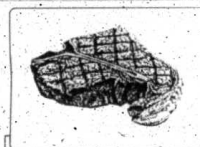

Changes in Tobacco Program Does Not Limit Carryover

Jeffery S. Hall, Kentucky State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency, wishes to remind farmers that recent changes in the Burley tobacco program do NOT change the amount of physical tobacco a farm can carryover from one crop year to the next. Tobacco that is not sold this season can be carried over as unmarketed tobacco and sold in the 2002-03 marketing season. Mr. Hall said.

Effective with the 2002 Burley tobacco quota, the total amount of under marketings that can be "carried over" by quota additions to farms nationwide, is limited to 10 percent of the national basic quota for the preceding year. In the past three undermarketings could be brought forward and added to the next year's basic quota provided the farm did not exceed the prior year's basic quota plus prior year's leased-in pounds.

Marketing Cards

Rockcastle County producers who have received marketing cards are reminded to carefully check their card for complete and accurate information. Please compare the farm number, warehouse number and pounds listed on the card to the information provided in the notification letter mailed with the card. If you find an error return the card immediately to the office for correction(s).

Remember, you are responsible for the information listed on the card. When you have finished your sales of tobacco please return the marketing card to the FSA office as soon as possible.

Rockcastle County Disaster Declaration

On August 16, 2001, President Bush declared a major disaster in Kentucky based on damages and losses caused by severe storms and flooding that occurred on July 27, 2001. This declaration has been amended to include Amendment #1, 2 and 3.

The Kentucky counties included as disaster areas and eligible for federal disaster assistance, including FSA Emergency Loan, included Rockcastle County declared as a disaster area under Amendment #3. Applications may be accepted for both physical and production losses, and applications pending on the specific date may be processed and completed when filed by the termination date of April 29, 2002.

2002 Crop Loan Rate

Decisions on field With Congress scheduled to reauthorize for business after the Martin Luther King Holiday, USDA has postponed the announcement of interest rates for the 2002 crops until after the legislative process is completed. USDA work on the farm bill proposal. This would suggest that if progress on the farm bill is not evident by planting time, the Secretary of Agriculture would be compelled at that point to announce the loan rates for the 2002 crops.

Not knowing the basic value of potential crop makes it difficult to decide how much of each crop to plant for 2002. The House of Representatives proposal, HR2646, calls for reducing the soybean loan rate from the current \$5.26 per bushel to \$4.92 per bushel. Producers might

opt to plant fewer acres of beans if the soybean loan rate were adjusted downward to that degree.

Whatever the final content of the new farm bill, or the time frame of its completion, producers can be assured that some form of financial support will be available. Congressional members are aware that agriculture provides significant economic support for the nation's economy, and the economy needs to be bolstered during this critical period of recovery. USDA, through the Farm Service Agency, provides financial support for the entire economy when a healthy agricultural sector is maintained.

Burley Disposition is Open

Producers starting Monday, January 21, do not have to file an FSA-508 with the county office to get a different marketing card. Any type of marketing card will be valid at any location the producer chooses for the remainder of the 2001 burley season.

Producers are reminded according to regulations stated in 10TB paragraph 941 pertaining to stolen tobacco a police report must be filed within 15 days of the theft and be submitted to the County FSA Office. Filing the police report according to regulations will possibly avoid a penalty, and/or a reduction of the next year's quota.

Disaster Leasing of Burley Tobacco

Producers wishing to lease tobacco to their farm for the purpose of selling excess tobacco may do so across county lines under the disaster leasing eligibility provisions. Farms leasing in pounds must have filed a FSA 578 (Crop Report), File a MQ 99 (Statement of Tobacco Production), be eligible for price support and have an approved FSA 275, Lease and Transfer. This year the producer must also file an FSA 508, Designation of Burley Tobacco Sales and Request for Marketing Card. The amount of lease in pounds is limited to 15% on the farm's effective quota as of July 1st including late leases. Disaster leasing will end February 15.

Producers who wish to lease out tobacco quota due to a natural disaster must have:

- Prior to harvest filed a FSA 574 (Request for Disaster Credit)
- Filed a FSA 573 (Crop Report)
- Planned sufficient acreage to produce the quota
- Made reasonable and customary efforts to produce the effective marketing quota
- Have less than 80 percent of the farm's effective marketing quota because of a natural disaster
- Meet all price support eligibility requirements.

For additional information on leasing quotas under the disaster leasing provisions contact your local FSA office.

Legislative Update

Medicaid, telemarketing receive legislative attention

The 2002 Session is in full swing and as of late Thursday night a total of 515 bills have been introduced for consideration, 113 in the Senate and 422 in the House.

One of the most surprising was a bill we approved Wednesday that would save an estimated \$100 million in Medicaid funds during its first year alone. The bill, HB 102, creates an advisory committee of doctors and pharmacists to review prescription drug effectiveness and cost-efficiency. Although the bill also requires that all new drugs be placed on the state's Medicaid preferred drug list, the committee can suggest that certain drugs be removed from the list. Current statute gives preference to name brand drugs that come with higher price tags.

The bill came a day after Pfizer Pharmaceuticals announced a program to help low-income senior citizens pay for life-saving medication to treat high cholesterol, diabetes, depression and other conditions. Ordinarily these prescriptions can run hundreds of dollars, yet Pfizer cardholders will pay \$15 a month. The program will begin on March 1 of this year. To qualify, seniors must receive Medicare and make less than \$18,000 a year. Senior couples who combined make less than \$24,000 are also eligible. Senior citizens without requiring enrollment fees or limits on the number of medications. To apply, call Pfizer at 1-800-717-6666.

Judiciary members also approved HB 138, legislation that would make all forms of human cloning in Kentucky a felony. Those who support human cloning argue that this is needed to ensure medical research into stem cells like cancer continues. However, an expert in the issue told committee members that human cloning would threaten surrogate mothers and that the outcomes of animal cloning regularly suffer from serious abnormalities. Committee members that cloning has a failure rate of 95 to 99 percent. According to the expert, Dr. David Prentice, stem cells taken from the blastocyst or issue of a human adult are a much more promising source for medical advances.

The House Labor and Industry Committee approved a measure aimed at preventing telemarketers from getting unauthorized access and therefore being able to place unauthorized charges on consumers' credit cards. HB 194 prohibits telemarketers from obtaining credit card numbers by contacting credit card companies directly. The bill's provisions also prevent credit card issuers from providing account numbers to telemarketers.

Committee members also sent out another telemarketing bill, HB 47. This particular bill creates a "zero-call" list for Kentuckians who wish to have their names and phone numbers removed from telemarketing lists. The current law allows citizens to put their names on a "no-call" list, which means no telemarketers may call those numbers unless they fall under an exempted category. The attorney general's office says about 111,000 people have already signed on the list. If you would like to have your name added to the "no-call" list, call toll-free 1-800-671-7701. Many legislators, myself included, have concerns about the bill because of how it might affect legitimate small businesses by preventing them from competing with businesses from other states. Because of these concerns, the issue of telemarketing is best addressed on the national level.

Before I left Frankfort on Friday I had the opportunity to join about thirty of my colleagues for a press conference to unveil our redistricting plan. As of Friday it was the only plan that met both constitutional and court requirements. The plan is well-balanced and does the best job of evenly distributing our state's population without dividing counties any more than necessary. The plan, filed as Amendment to HB 1, came about because we are ready to put redistricting behind us and begin working on issues like education and tax reform. I hope the remaining two-thirds of my House colleagues will agree with us.

Beef Cattle Winter Production Meeting

Beef and dairy producers planning to participate in the Genetic Improvement Calf Share program are required to attend a workshop on EPD's (Expected Progeny Differences). The workshop will help farmers fully understand EPD numbers for the breed of bull and type of bull they plan to buy. Hopefully this will avoid the problem where bulls are purchased and their EPD's do not qualify for Calf Share. The workshop will be held Thursday, January 24, at 6:30 pm at the Extension office.

The third and final Phase I Calf Share Program that Rockcastle Cattlemen's Association will be conducting is for cattle handling facilities. Handling facilities are to help carry out herd health practices such as vaccinations, dehorning,

castration, etc. Two levels of cost-share are available. 1) \$100 to a \$0.50 match for producers who attain a BQA (Beef Quality Assurance Certification) and 2) \$2.50 for producers who attain BQA status plus a group of calves on the PHAS guidelines (certified preconditioned for health). The BQA Certification meeting will be Thursday, January 31, at 6:30 pm at the Extension office. Items qualifying for the herd health program include head gates, alley ways, holding pens, corral panels, etc. Applications will be available at the January 31 meeting on a first come, first served basis. All applications are due by March 1, 2002. See application for complete details.





Two Aarons seal 56-55 win for Rockets over #1 in region Cawood

It was a fight to the finish Tuesday night between the Rockets and Cawood and the Rockets finished the fight 56-55 in overtime on an amazingly lucky shot by Aaron Cash with .06 on the clock to put the game into overtime and a putback by Aaron Anderkin of his own missed three point attempt to win the game. 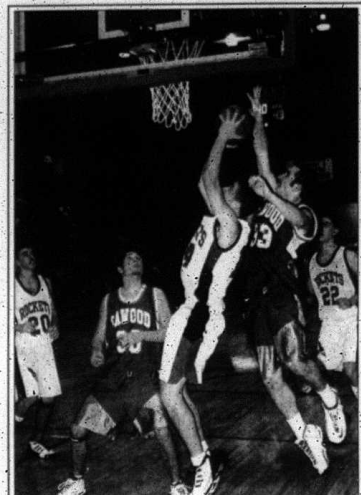

The only other offense for the Rockets in that period came from a basket by Jason Reynolds who sat much of the game because of early foul trouble and a free throw by Cash. The only good news that quarter was that the Trojans also had trouble of-

ferensively, putting only 8 points on the board for a 34-28 third quarter lead. Cash got three two point baskets and Anderkin came through with two three point shots to draw the Rockets to within one in the fourth period 41-40 and it was an Aislin Miller putback that gave the Rockets their first lead of the night 42-41 at the 2:10 mark. Cawood did some heavy-duty offensive rebounding (getting three shots at the goal) for their next basket to go back up 43-42. A free throw by Anderkin tied the score at the 1:33 mark but two free throws by the Trojans gave them the lead 45-43 with 1:01 left to play. At the 54

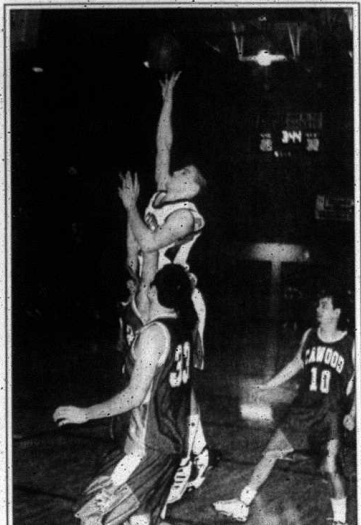
second mark, a shot by Cash missed and Cawood wound up with the ball.
