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129 will lose jobs at Mt. Vernon Plastics



129 employees of Mt. Vernon Plastics have been notified that they will lose their jobs.

At a time when Rockcastle County leaders are making an all out effort to bring new jobs to the area, there is bad news this week for 129 employees at Mt. Vernon Plastics Corporation.

Last Friday, Alcon Flexible Packaging, the parent company of MVP, announced that they had sold off part of their plant operation in Mt. Vernon to Berry Plastics of Evansville, Indiana.

MVP's injection molding assets will be transferred from Mt. Vernon's plant and from MVP's plant in Sparks, KY to one of Berry's 12 plants. The most recent job losses at MVP will reduce the workforce at the 20-year-old plant from a one time high of 400 to just 120 employees.

The latest round of job cuts follows other lay-offs in the past couple of years at MVP.

An MVP spokesperson would not comment on whether or not the 129 employees would receive any type of severance package, but one employee, who had worked at the plant for 15

years said that no severance package was offered to employees.

"They told us we could work until March 25th and then we could draw unemployment - that's it," the employee said.

"They came in on Thursday and told us that if we were going to lose our jobs we would get a letter on Friday and I got mine," the employee said.

"It is really unfair in a way, they have changed around personnel and moved some of them to the other departments, who have only one or two years in at the plant and some people have as much as seventeen years and they lost their job," the employee said.

The MVP spokeswoman said that an out placement services firm has been retained to assist affected employees in seeking future employment.

"As opportunities arise, the affected employees will be called back for the food service operation based upon job requirements," she said.

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Filing for Primary concludes

A total of 61 local citizens have filed their papers for the upcoming May Primary.

The filing deadline was Tuesday. There are many races in which there will be a race, but there are also many incumbents who will be unopposed again.

There will be county-wide races for Judge-Executive, Sheriff and Jailor.

Incumbents County Clerk Norma Houk, PVA Margaret Offutt, County Attorney Jeff Burdette and Coroner Bill Dowell are all unopposed.

In the County Judge Executive's race, incumbent Buzz Carlotta will be opposed by local businessman Howard Saylor.

Carlotta will be seeking his third term in office. It is Saylor's first attempt at political office. Both men are Republicans.

Among the new filings this week were Gary Liville, 46, of Roundstone and Jack Stallworth, 45, of Mt. Vernon for Sheriff.

Liville is the minister of the House of Refuge Church at Roundstone and manager of Near Auto Center II in Berea.

In a news release Liville said, "I understand what real leadership is, qualities and virtues like integrity,

honesty, commitment and reliability," he said.

Stallworth is also a minister, who preaches at the Conway Baptist Church. Stallworth is also a bus driver for the Rockcastle County school system.

Those two men and Wayne Lear Sr., 72, John H. Kemper, Jr., 59, former deputy Sheriff Daniel Dean, 44, Billy M. Hammons, 67, and school board member Sam Stallworth, 49, will try and unseat incumbent Shirley Smith, who is seeking his fourth term in office. All are Republicans.

Ford, Rogers file for re-election

State Representative Danny Ford, 49, of Mt. Vernon has filed for re-election to the 80th District of the Kentucky House of Representatives. Ford will be seeking his eleventh term in office. Ford has served the 80th district since 1982.

He currently is unopposed, but a ruling on Tuesday by Franklin Circuit Judge William Graham extended the filing deadline for Kentucky House and Senate seats indefinitely, because the General Assembly can't agree on where the lines will be drawn.

The General Assembly is required to draw new district lines after each nationwide census.

This year, the General Assembly can't agree because in a nutshell, the Democrat controlled House of Representatives is trying to draw Senate lines for the Republican controlled Senate.

"It is pure politics," said Ford. The filing deadline has also been extended for those wishing to run for the United States House of Representatives.

Currently, incumbent Republican Harold Rogers of Somerset, Kentucky's most experienced legislator, faces a challenge from a London man.

Billy Ray Wilson, 58, is a retiree from the federal government and is seeking his first public office.

No Democrats have filed. Rogers has served in Congress

In the race for Jailor, incumbent James E. Miller, 44, faces former three time Jailor and one term Sheriff Billy Kirby, 71. Both men are Republicans.

First district magistrate John Holbrook, a Democrat, will face Larry Newcomb, another Democrat in the May Primary.

The winner of that race will face one of six Republican challengers in the November general election.

Those six are: David T. Gibbs,

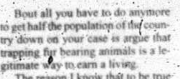

I knew that a certain crowd in New York and Maine your other favorite big city- with folks with big money- were turned off to wearing furs. They can't stand the idea that some animal had to die to accommodate their taste in attire.

But they will eat beef and pork and turkey and chicken.

Apparently they believe that the cow that surrendered that prime fillet they had for supper just laid down and died.

"Take me," the cow said to the butcher. "I am young and fat and healthy and I have been pumped full of worm medicine and penicillin and steroids and I am yours. I will hang myself upside down with a chain hooked around my hind legs, shoot myself between the eyes, and reach around and slit my throat, so that my steaks will taste of the better and be perfectly marbled. I will skin myself for make you fine shoes and jackets, and grind up my leftovers so that

you can enjoy me in a Big Mac." "Me too," said the pig. "Sausage is a small sacrifice to make sure that you have had some sausage to go with your eggs. Dear Mayor King, Council Members, Mt. Vernon Signal and Citizens of Mt. Vernon:

Kudos to our own Polly Abney for her outspoken and forthright letter to the editor which appeared in last Thursday's Signal! She dared to voice in print what we all, as cablevision subscribers, know is fact, we are being royally fleeced by Charter Communications in the guise of "upgrading the system." The truth be known is that Charter, being the only cablevision provider in the area, is unregulated, so therefore it can charge whatever rates it wants, and does.

I moved to this lovely community from Allentown, PA, seven months ago with my husband, who has lived here in Kentucky for about seven years. In PA my monthly cablevision bill was \$32.00, and this was for 99 channels, none duplicated; and all with excellent reception. Because we had more than one cable provider in my viewing area, they were regulated and thus, all subscribers benefited by reasonable rates.

Charter's rates are unreasonable and outrageous. In just seven months our own monthly cable rate has virtually DOUBLED, gradually increasing from \$42.19 to our most recent bill of \$42.39 (with the new expanded service). Bear in mind, folks, we're talking a 100% INCREASE just over a seven-month period! To add insult to injury, the reception stinks! To be paying this exorbitant monthly rate for cable service that supposedly has been "upgraded," in both quality (new fiber optic lines) and an expanded channel selection, only to have a poor quality reception on most of the channels provided, not to mention many duplicated channels, is absolutely ludicrous!

Calling Charter to complain has been a continuous exercise in futility as Polly Abney so aptly points out. Any complaints we have seem to fall on deaf ears at Charter, even though our complaints are reasonable and understandable in light of the poor quality cable we're all paying too much for. I've called so many times myself over the last seven months.

I'm sure they cringe by now when they hear my name. Aside from the not-high monthly rate, my main complaint has been the frequent interruption of service (at our house, at least

once a week, and about two weeks ago it was off for 24 hours straight). I get one excuse after another whenever I call to complain and to ask WHY the cable is off AGAIN, but yet, the rates keep going up. The cable is off for one reason or another at least once a week, never mind that we might be in the middle of videotaping a movie or a special program... is it fair for us to pay such a high rate for a cable service that is, at best, very undependable? I think not.

"WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES"

Let us notice from John 15:18-20: "If the world hate you, ye know, that it hated me before it hated you. If ye were of the world, the world would love his train: but because ye are not of the world, but I have chosen you out of the world, therefore the world hateth you. My wonder on these thoughts!

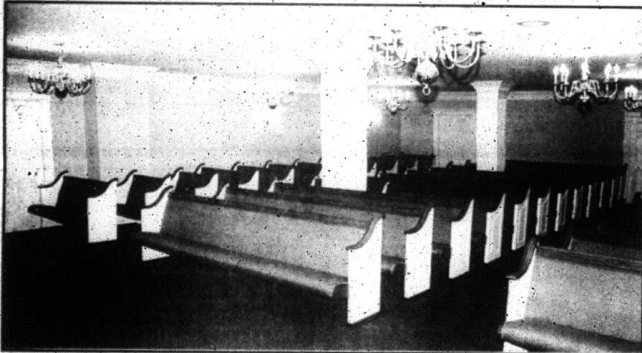
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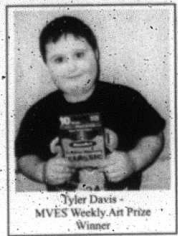

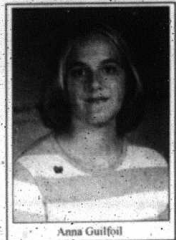

The October member of the

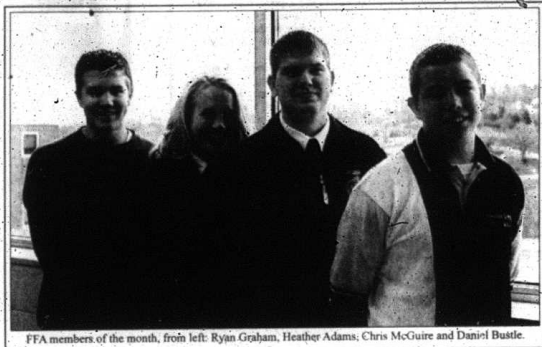

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Legislative Update

Redistricting, Medicaid and Telemarketing still top issues but share limelight with budget

On Wednesday of this week the House approved a legislative redistricting bill and sent it to the Senate for consideration. I joined 34 of my colleagues in voting against the measure because of serious problems with the constitutionality of the bill. When it reached the Senate, members of that chamber - unlike those who voted in favor of the bill in the House - honored the 200 year tradition that allows each chamber to draw its own districts. As a result, the Senate changed only the Senate portion of the bill and left the House map untouched.

Instead of concurring with the Senate amendment - and honoring tradition - the House voted to not concur with the bill. Why? Because although it contained the very same House Districts they approved two days earlier, politics is more important to them than people. As a result, the bill was sent to conference committee for consideration. As of filing this update, the conference committee was still meeting to reach a compromise on the bill.

We should have acted on redistricting last fall when we had time to dedicate to it alone, but Democrats offered excuse after excuse. Regardless of what the General Assembly does now, it appears the plan may end up in court. The Majority Party in the House would rather continue to belabor this bill than give their full attention to other issues.

I think you will agree with me that it is time to recognize that in the face of a \$533 million budget shortfall it is time to move on to other serious issues. In his biennial budget address, the governor presented a budget plan that raids nearly every fund, uses one time allocations like lawsuit settlements to provide short term solutions to long term projects, and riddled with the tax and spend mentality that got us into the current debt. By setting redistricting aside, we can focus on making the budget more accountable to the taxpayers who ultimately foot the bill.

Bringing accountability to the Medicaid program received our attention last week when we took some steps to trim the beleaguered program's spending on prescription drugs by creating an oversight mechanism to review both their effectiveness and cost-efficiency. This week the House Health and Welfare

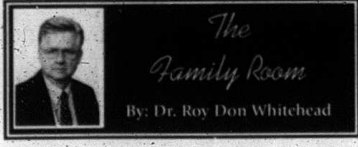
Committee passed an even more progressive measure that requires nearly all of the Medicaid program's recipients to co-pay for each prescription they fill. The co-pay is relatively small, around \$1 per medication, but will save an estimated \$8 million. Kentucky is currently only one of two states that don't require some sort of cost sharing.

The telemarketing bill I wrote about last week, which establishes a "zero-call" list for Kentuckians who want to remove their name and telephone number removed from telemarketing list, passed the full House on a vote of 92-4. The bill included exemptions for businesses, that have a continuing relationship with the customer and those who are collecting debts. While Kentuckians will have the opportunity to participate in the "zero-call" list, the list has a limited effect and I do not believe the telephone will stop ringing until telemarketing is addressed on the federal level.

The House Judiciary Committee passed a bill that would require sheriffs to notify residents in a neighborhood when a convicted sex offender moves into their area - specifically those who live on the same block. In rural areas of the state, sheriffs would be required to notify families within a quarter of a mile radius of the convicted felon. We passed a similar bill last year so I feel confident it will be approved by the full House. Although it never made it out of Senate Committee, both chambers have more time to consider legislation this year and I believe they will be able to act on it this session.

When is the Past Not the Past?

Here is a riddle: when is the past not the past? The answer: when it is also the present. If that makes no sense, consider the following scenarios: (All characters are fictitious.)
 "You have got to stop bringing up the past," John told Ellen again. "We have to put this behind us and go on. We are never going to get along if you keep bringing up old problems. What is wrong with you that you can't forgive and forget?"
 John's words made Ellen wince. If there was something wrong with her, why couldn't she let go of what had happened? John promised it would never happen again. Why couldn't she believe him?

Two weeks ago John had hit Ellen. It was the first time he had hit her but not the first time he had bothered her. Pushing, hair-pulling and holding her down on the bed were John's preferred methods of abuse. These had happened many times before. After the first year of their marriage, John had become abusive and had stopped only for brief times when Ellen threatened to leave. After two weeks of no abuse, John demanded that Ellen forget the past. The problem is that the "past," as John called it, was not over. It was still happening and would probably happen again. Two weeks of being a good boy does not mean that the past can be forgotten. John had shown before that he could reform for a few weeks, but what about over a longer period of time? Can he stop abusing Ellen for two months or two years? Ellen cannot forget a past that is still present.

Sam and Rhonda have a different problem. Sam has just discovered that Rhonda has had an affair. This is not the first time. In their ten-year marriage, Rhonda has had at least three affairs of which Sam is aware. He suspects there may have been others.

When Sam confronts Rhonda, she at first denies that anything is happening. When Sam shows her the evidence, she tearfully admits the truth and promises never to do it again. "I don't know what made me do it, Sam," Rhonda cries, "because you are the one I love. I don't want anyone else." Please forgive me and let's get on with our lives!"
 Sam tries to forget but over the next few weeks the affair still bothers him. Though he says little, Rhonda can sense that he is upset. At first she begs him to forgive her. When he can see she is still bothered, she becomes belligerent. "You have got to let go of the past, Sam. Other couples deal with affairs and go on. Why can't you? I am tired of your bringing this up. I don't want to hear it anymore."

Sam begins to feel bad that he cannot forget what has happened. "Why can't I let go of the past and go on?" he wonders to himself. The reason Sam cannot forget, the past is that it may happen again. Even though Rhonda promises never to have another affair, Sam has heard this promise before.

She said the same thing after the other affairs. Just because Rhonda

wants to be faithful to Sam does not mean that she can. To "forget the past" may mean that Sam is setting himself up to be hurt all over again. What Rhonda calls "the past" is still too present to forget.

The past is not the past when it keeps happening. Abuse, affairs, drug use and other problems cannot be easily forgotten without some proof that they are over. The only proof is time: John and Rhonda must prove to their mates that they can keep their promises. This takes time and that means more than just two weeks. They cannot reasonably expect their spouses to forget so quickly.

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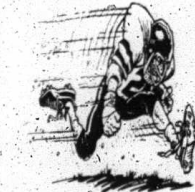

It was a decisive victory for the Lady Rockets 64-50 with Coach Christy Noble getting to clear her bench and 10 Rockets making it into the scoring column.

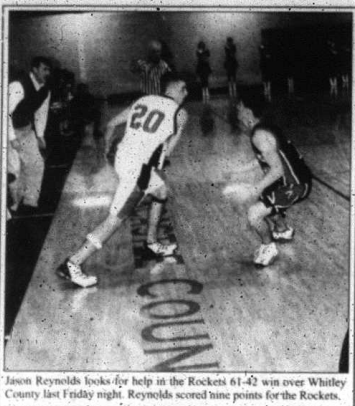

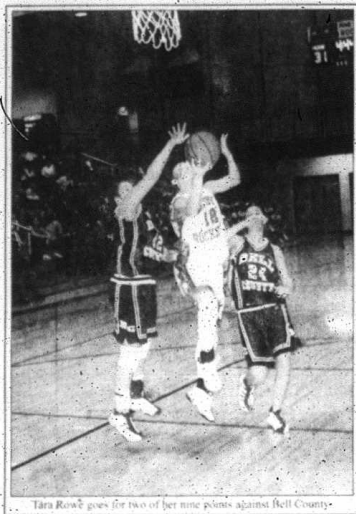

Cost Share Program

The Rockcastle County Conservation District will be accepting requests for cost share funding under the Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program beginning February 1st and extending through February 28th.

The Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program was created to help agricultural operations protect the soil and water resources of Kentucky. The 1994 Kentucky General Assembly established this financial and technical assistance program. The law establishes that annual cost share funds to the program by administered by local conservation districts and the Kentucky Soil & Water Conservation Commission, with priority given to animal waste related problems and agricultural district participants, where pollution problems have been identified. Funding for the program has been provided by the Kentucky General Assembly, Kentucky Department of Agriculture and direct appropriations from the Phase I Tobacco Settlement Funds.

Two new best management practices have been added to the sixteen

practices available for landowners to request for funding assistance under the program. The new practices are: KSW11 - Erosion Control on Pasture and Hay Land, to assist landowners in controlling soil erosion, concentrated water flow and water discharge to reduce pollution potential on pasture and hay land; KSW12 - Streambank Stabilization, to assist landowners where the natural streambank has been severely damaged by livestock access, or other activities associated with agricultural operation, to restore or protect the streambank from further damage.

Approval of applications will be done at the state level by the Soil and Water Conservation Commission at the Kentucky Division of Conservation, located in Frankfort and based on available funds. Cost share rates are a maximum of 75 percent of the actual cost not to exceed \$7,500 for agronomic practices and \$20,000 for animal waste concerns.

The Rockcastle Cattlemen's Association will be conducting their third and final Phase I Cost-Share Program, this one dealing with cattle handling facilities. Handling facilities are to help carry out best health practices such as vaccinations, dehorning, castration, etc. Two levels of cost-share are available: 1) \$1,000 on a 50/50 match for producers who attain a BQA (Beef Quality Assurance Certification) and 2) \$2,500 for producers who attain BQA status plus wear a group of calves on the CFH45 guidelines (certified

preconditioned for health). The BQA Certification meeting will be Thursday, January 31, at 6:30 pm at the Extension office. Items qualifying for the herd health program include head gates, alley ways, holding pens, corral panels, etc. Applications will be available at the January 31 meeting on a first come, first served basis. 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Quick Nutritious Meals

Making quick meals for your family doesn't mean that you have to skimp on nutrition. The Food Guide Pyramid is a good place to start when planning nutritious meals. Begin with a main dish that gives each family member one serving of protein. Add a complementary food from the bread, rice, and pasta group include a hot or cold vegetable. Then, choose a fruit or vegetable that complements the main dish. Always remember to meet the daily milk requirement.

Here are some other suggestions for cutting cooking time:

Planning:
• Keep a shopping list in the kitchen, to put down items as you need them.
• Try to plan several meals in advance.
• Plan around leftovers and plan for leftovers. Leftovers can be used to create new meals, casseroles and sandwiches.
• Fix 2 dinners at once by doubling recipes. Freeze the extra meal.

Get Organized:
• Arrange your kitchen.
• Make sure foods, utensils and equipment are conveniently arranged for fast-paced work.
• Make use of kitchen appliances that you have: crock pot, outdoor grill, etc. Some save preparation and clean-up time.
• Clean up as you go.
• Collect quick and easy menu ideas and recipes: Try at least one new quick recipe a week, or try a favorite food in a new way. When trying something new be sure to include other foods that the family likes. Then, if the new recipe isn't successful, the meal will not be a total loss. Here is a new recipe to try.

Chicken Primavera Alfredo
1 pkg. noodles & sauce - Alfredo
1 1/2 cups water
3/4 cup milk
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 cup thinly sliced zucchini or mushrooms
2 cups cut-up cooked chicken
1 medium tomato - chopped

In a large saucepan bring water, milk and butter to a boiling point, stir in noodles and sauce and vegetables. Continue boiling over medium heat, stirring occasionally, 5 minutes. Stir in remaining ingredients and cook an additional

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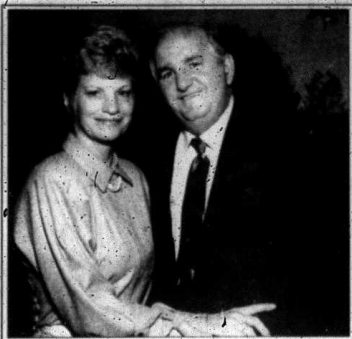
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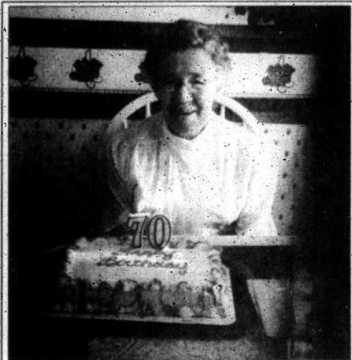

Agricultural News

By Warden Alexander, FSA Director

County Committee Monthly Meeting

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency (COC) will hold monthly meetings open to the public the first Thursday of each month beginning at 8:00 a.m. The meeting will be at the Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency located in the USDA Service Center on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon. The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, February 7th.

The COC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help FSA at the local level by deciding the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will operate. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws and applying their judgement and knowledge to make decisions.

Marketing Cards. Producers who have sold the current year crop of burley tobacco are encouraged to return their marketing card to the FSA office as soon as possible. Marketing records on the cards are compared to sales recorded for accuracy. Failure to return the marketing card promptly delays correct information for the 2002 crop year data.

Burley Designation is Open. Starting Monday, January 21 producers do not have to file an FSA

808, Designation of Burley Tobacco Sales and Request for Marketing Card, with the county office to market tobacco at a different warehouse. Any type of marketing card will be valid at any location the producer chooses for the remainder of the 2001 burley season.

Disaster Leasing of Burley Tobacco

Producers wishing to lease tobacco to their farm for the purpose of selling excess tobacco may do so across county lines under the disaster leasing eligibility provisions. Farmers leasing tobacco must have filed a FSA 378 (Crop Report), file a MQ 99 (Statement of Tobacco Production), be eligible for price support and have an approved FSA 375, Lease and Transfer. This year the producer must also file an FSA 808, Designation of Burley Tobacco Sales and Request for Marketing Card. The amount of lease in pounds is limited to 15% of the farm's effective quota as of July 1st including late leases. Disaster leasing will end February 15th.

Producers who wish to lease out tobacco quota due to a natural disaster must have:

- Prior to harvest filed a FSA 574 (Request for Disaster Credit)
- Filed a FSA 578 (Crop Report)
- Planned sufficient acreage to produce the quota

• made reasonable and customary efforts to produce the effective marketing quota

• have less than 80 percent of the farm's effective marketing quota because natural disaster

• meet all price support eligibility requirements.

• For additional information on leasing quota under the disaster leasing provisions contact your local FSA office.

Referenda on Mandatory Grading of Burley

The Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act of 2002 requires the Secretary to conduct referenda, no later than March 31, 2002, among producers of quota tobacco to determine whether producers favor mandatory grading of tobacco by USDA including burley tobacco. Burley (type 31) Mandatory Grading Referendum period is March 11-15, 2002.

If a majority of the producers voting in a referendum favors the mandatory grading of that kind of tobacco, USDA will ensure that kind of tobacco is graded at the time of sale for the 2002 and subsequent marketing years.

Applications For New Burley Tobacco Farm Quotas

Applications for new burley tobacco farm quotas are being accepted through February 15th. Before a new farm quota is recommended it must be determined that each applicant meets all eligibility requirements. Eligibility requirements include the applicant has NO burley tobacco quota, has land suitable for tobacco production, has two of the past five years marketing history of burley tobacco and 50% of all household income is received from farming.

Continuous CRP Sign-Up

Eligible acreage devoted to certain special conservation practices such as riparian buffers, filter strips, grassed waterways, shelter belts, living snow fences, contour grass strips, salt tolerance, vegetation and shallow water areas for wildlife may be enrolled at any time under CCC's continuous CRP sign-up. These practices are not subject to competitive bidding. For more information, contact your local FSA office.

Federal Crop Insurance

Producers wishing to purchase Federal Crop Insurance (FCI) must do so by the deadline of March 15th. Crops eligible for insurance in Rockcastle County are corn and tobacco. FCI insurance is only available through private companies.

FY 2002 PFC Reminder

Producers who wish to receive their 2002 PFC (Production Flexibility Contract) payments early must sign a form for what month you wish to receive your 2002 payment.

Do not request a payment for your form if you are considering selling a portion or the entire farm. Changes in your farming operation must be reported timely. The deadline to sign or revise a PFC for FY2002 is August 1, 2002.
