Two die in mysterious shooting

Mt. Vernon spent \$352,000 more than budgeted

During the fiscal year of 1999, which ended on June 30th the city of Mt. Vernon spent 3352,000 more than they had budgeted according to local CPA foe Clontz.

Clontz presented a rough draft of the 1999 budget to the Mt. Vernon City Council on Monday night.

During the 98-99 fiscal year the city took in 3120,000 from property taxes, license and permits generated \$43,314, \$70.500 was realized from franchise feets, \$14,000 came from the state, \$35,000 in grant money came in and \$25,650 was referred from interest and other sources, when they had budget only \$45,500 in the police department when they had budgeted only \$275,500.

The city also spent \$316,000 on the fire department when they had on the fire department when they had not budgeted anything.

Clontz said the city made ends meet by berrowing \$390,000 for the park and uniting the differences be-tween the \$266,000 and \$390,000 to make their books balance in 1999. The audit also-showed the water and sewer department with a balance of \$362,000 in their unrestricted fund, which is used for debt retirement and onestations.
