911 board hears complaints from county firefighters

A large crowd, mostly county inferfighers attended Thursday night's monthly 911 board meeting to voice their vencerns about 911.

Livingston fire chief Sanslasworth and Mr. Vermon fire chief Garry Hansel were the most vocal two in the crowd. Both men said that 911 needed two dispatchers on duty at all times, because of the number of transmissions made each day, especially during the control of the control of

sions made each day, especially dur-ing a fire or wreck.

Stallsworth even called for the firing of dispatcher Jamie Alcorn.

Stallsworth told 911 board chair-man Harry Harmon and 911 Director Bonnie Roark, that Alcorn had told a lie on fim during January 15th of the on fim during January 15th of the which Livingston was called to ad Mt. Vernon at a fire in Johnetta.

"Quite frankly I want him fired," Stallsworth said.

"He got on the ratio and said that I was still in the bod, when I had already gotten the fire truck and went-to the fire - he even said he called my house which is a hald faced lie, Stallsworth said.

Stallsworth said. Roark said Tuesday that she had Roark said Tuesday that she had istened to the tapes of that day's radio transmissions and could find nothing concerning what Stallsworth-asa talking about, but that she would continue to investigate the matter until it was resolved.

As for two dispatchers on duy at all times, Roark said that 911 was losing about \$1,000 a month at the present time and there was not enough money available to keep two dispatchers of duy.

The local 911-board receives ap-proximately \$13,000 from local resi-dents who pay a \$2,00 monthly fee on each phone line in the county.

Harmon told the crowd that ev-eryone needed to work together to make 911 work as smoothly as pos-sible.

Harmon, who has been a board member since 911 was implemented in the county is Director of the Rockcastle County Ambulañce Ser-vice.



Renovating grass hay fields with red clover

Is it cost effective to seed red clover into grass hay fields? Eor years framers have used the dark of february's moon as a time to overseed clover into fescue or orchard grass. By adding clover, through the renovation process, grass fields are improved in three ways.

grass fields are improved in three ways.

Clover will add nitrogen to the soil and benefit surrounding grass. As much as 180 pounds of nitrogen may be added. With current nitrogen cost this year, clover renovation may be worth as much as 4000 of uses, or just our \$8.500 to flower in the improved quality of feed. Clover is a higher protein feed that animals prefer over grasses such as endophyte infected fescue and orchard grass. Clover will allo so grow best during mid summer when other grass has stopped. Clover will fill in during mid summer, increasing the total yield.

The third benefit to adding clover is that fescue hay and pastures with the fescue hay and pastures.

The thurd benefit to adding clover is that fescue hay and pastures infected with the endophyte fungus has silently lowered cattle production through its derimental effects during summer months and can carry through in bay. Adding clover dilutes the amount of fescue

available and gives animals a choice.
Clover being, more abundant and

Lowering fertilizer cost, increasing yield and improving the quality of feed available to livestock makes
