You may have heard it and didn't know what it was - and then again, you may be like most Rockcastle County residents and not know that it is even there, but the Rockcastle Courthouse on Main Street in Mt. The bell was recently repaired and rings on noon every day and for several minutes on New Year's Eve and Independence Day. The bell was repaired by Leroy Moore of Disputanta. The bell was originally used in the county's first courthouse, which was constructed in 1876. When that building was replaced by the present structure in 1964, then County Judge Charles Carter and magistrates built a bell tower room in the courthouse to save the bell.

RGHS set school record for wins

The 2002 edition of the Rockcastle County Rocket basketball team has set a school record with 20 wins during the regular season, after an easy win over Monticello on Tuesday night.

The Rockets are 20-6 and the number one seed in the 49th district tournament.

They will finish regular season play on Friday night when they host McCreary Central, a team they defeated earlier in the season.

The district tournament is being held at Clay County High School.

The Rockets finished regular season district play with a five and one record, tops in the district.

On February 9th, the Clay County Rockets defeated Jackson County, at Clay, to assure Rockcastle of the number one seed.

If Jackson County had beaten Clay they would have finished district play with a five and one record and there would have been a coin toss for the number one seed.

As it stands now, the boys will play Oneida Baptist, a team they have defeated twice, in the first round.

That game is scheduled for 7:45 p.m. on February 25th.

The Genesis of Jackson County will take on Clay County in the first game at 6:00 p.m., on the 25th.

The Rockcastle varsity boys have never won the 49th district tournament.

Rockcastle's Lady Rockets, who have also had an excellent year and had a mark of 17-8, will play Clay County in the district tourney on Tuesday, February 26th at 6:00 p.m.

The Lady Rockets have lost both regular season games to the Lady Tigers this season, although both games were very close.

The Lady Rockets won the district in 1999 and won the 13th region in 1997 to advance to the state tournament.

The 13th regional tournament will be held at Rockcastle County High School for the first time ever, beginning on March 4th.

Rocket head coach Clayton Cash is in his tenth season at the school.

The Rockets were ranked third in the region this week behind Cavood and Bell County.

County's financial situation better than in other years

Many Rockcastle County residents and taxpayers seem confused about the financial situation of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

In a nutshell, the county's financial situation is better than it has been in several years, according to Rockcastle County Treasurer Joe Clontz.

Much of that is due to the passage of the county's insurance tax a few years ago and the completion of the renovation project at the county jail.

Last week, Clontz presented the monthly financial statement to the fiscal court during their regular monthly meeting, which showed a positive balance in all 13 accounts

the county has.

Some of those accounts are held by the county, but actually have nothing to do with the county.

The Renfro Valley Hall of Fame construction account is basically administered by Cumberland Valley Area Development District and the office of Justice Programs is a program through Commonwealth Attorney, Eddy Montgomery's office in Somerset.

Although the county actually has nothing to do with the money, any payments out of those accounts must be approved by the fiscal court, therefore the reason for the accounts.

The county's other eleven accounts include: general fund, road

fund, detention center, detention center debt service, economic assistance fund, forestry fund, economic development fund, federal emergency management agency fund (FEMA), 911 fund and chemical stockpile emergency preparedness program fund and the fairgrounds fund.

At the end of January, the county's general fund had a balance of \$188,800. During the month the general fund received \$102,300 and \$67,800 was spent.

The county can spend money for basically anything out of the general fund and they can transfer money from the general fund to any other

Four arrested on drug charges

Four Rockcastle County residents were arrested on Sunday afternoon, after police found what they called a working drug lab and indoor marijuana grow in a house on Hamm Road off Hwy. 1250.

According to court documents, Kentucky State Trooper Lefe Owens, Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Arton Matthews and Brodhead police officer William Harris, responded to a 911 call that two males were breaking into a house being rented by Joey L. Chatelle, around 1:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon.

After police arrived at the residence they encountered Dwayne S. Blair, 35, of Chestnut Ridge Road and Johnathan H. Saylor, 28, of Crawford Lane, Mt. Vernon.

Blair apparently told police he had permission to be in the house, because he was the brother of Joey

Chatelle, 29, who was residing at the house.

Not long after police arrived, Chatelle's estranged husband Scotty K. Chatelle, of Hwy. 150, Mt. Vernon, also arrived at the scene. Joey Chatelle also arrived later at the scene.

According to court documents, police secured the area and obtained a search warrant for the house from District Judge Walter McGuire.

According to the citations issued by officer Owens, police found materials used in making methamphetamine (meth) and an indoor marijuana grow in the basement of the house.

Also according to the citations, Scotty Chatelle was arrested and charged with manufacturing meth, first offense, cultivation of marijuana, first offense, possession of drug

paraphernalia, first offense, carrying a concealed weapon, prescription in improper container, first offense, possession of marijuana and operation of a motor vehicle while under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Needed mortgage loans available for low income

The USDA Rural Development office, formerly the Farmers Home Administration, announces funds are available for low income Rockcastle County applicants wishing to become homeowners through its Single Family Direct Loan Program.

According to Ken Arntburn, Rural Development Manager for this area, "Advantages to the homebuyer include: (a) No required down payment, (b) Loans may include closing cost, (c) 100% financing, (d) Adjusted income limits for family of four up to \$28,700, (e) Loans may be for purchase of new construction, existing housing or new manufactured housing, (f) Maximum loan of \$86,317.

The robins are back in town. When they finally departed southward last November they were so fat I never expected them to make it to the Tennessee line carrying all that body weight but they departed, pretty much all at once, and headed, presumably, for Florida.

That's where I would go if I lived on handouts from old people, lived in a tree, and wanted to stay warm and well-fed while my kin folks were freezing their buns off in the mid-west. If I were a robin I'd be trying to sell burial insurance to some of those cranky old Florida retirees from Michigan and the east coast while I was bumming a meal.

There's nothing wrong with making a little profit when the opportunity presents itself and if I couldn't sell life insurance, I'd be brokering burial plots.

But robins are not as entrepreneurial as I might be if I had wings. Basically all they do is prance around in a tree, and whatever they find put out for them, poop on the windshield of the old guy's car and fly back to Kentucky and points northward and look for opportune places to poop again.

I know a bunch of people that fit the latter less-than-entrepreneurial description and they are all members of the Kentucky State Legislature.

So, this Saturday morning I was out with my pruning shears trimming the sprouts from locusts and osage orange roots that keep coming back

He had been on the department for longer than anyone could remember and those years of service had made him into somewhat of a legend.

So what does that little saying of yours mean anyway?" With that, he merely stated, "Well, seeing as how you've said and done all that, you tell me what they taste like."

When I had no answer, he shook his head and snickered, "rookies," and walked away.

The next evening was to be the worst one to date. The night started out slow, but as the evening wore on, the calls became more frequent and dangerous. I made several small arrests and then had a real knock down drag out fight.

However, I was able to make the arrest without hurting the suspect or myself. After that, I was looking forward to just letting the shift wind down and getting home to my wife and daughter.

I immediately stopped my patrol car to see what she was doing outside her house at such an hour by herself. When I approached, there seemed to be a sigh of relief on her face.

I had to laugh to myself, thinking she sees the hero policeman come to save the day. I melted at her side and asked "what she was doing out there."

She said "My mommy and daddy just had a really big fight and now mommy won't wake up." My mind was racing. Now what do I do? I instantly called for backup and ran to the nearest window. As I looked inside I saw a man standing over a lady with his hands covered in blood, her

blood. I kicked open the door, pushed the man aside and checked for a pulse, but unable to find one. I immediately called the man and began doing CPR on the lady.

It was then I heard a small voice from behind me. "Mr. Policeman, please make my mommy wake up." I continued to perform CPR until my backup and medics arrived but they said it was too late. She was dead.

I then looked at the man. He said, "I don't know what happened. She was yelling at me to stop drinking and go get a job and I had just had enough. I just 'shoved her so she would leave me alone and she fell and her head."

As I walked the man out to the car in handcuffs, I again saw that little girl. In the five minutes that has passed, I went from hero to monster. Not only was I unable to wake up her mommy, but now I was taking daddy away too.

Before I left the scene, I thought I would talk to the little girl. To say what I don't know. Maybe just to tell her I was sorry about her mommy and daddy. But as I approached, she turned away and I knew it was useless. I would probably make it worse.

As I sat in the locker room at the station, I kept replaying the whole thing in my mind. Maybe I should have been faster or done something different, just maybe that little girl would still have her mother. And even though it may sound selfish, I would still be the hero.


It was then that I felt a large hand on my shoulder. I heard that all too familiar question again, "Well, hero, what do they taste like, mad or shout some sarcastic remark, I realized that all the past rec memories had flooded the surface and there was a steady stream of tears cascading down my face. It was at that moment that I realized what the answer to his question was. Tears.

With that, he began to walk away, but he stopped, "You know, there was nothing you could have done differently," he said. "Sometimes you can do everything right and still the outcome is the same. You may not be the hero you once thought you were, but now you ARE a police officer."

Opp Bussell, Jr.

Opp M. Bussell, Jr., 79, of 119 Tevis St., Mt. Vernon, died Wednesday, February 13, 2002 at the Hospice Care Center in Lexington. He was born July 5, 1923 in Mt. Vernon, the son of the late Opp and Mazy McClure Bussell. He was a retired educator and Historian, an instructor at Millersburg Military Institute for five years, a teacher in Rockcastle County Schools for five years, Principal of Williamson Independent Schools for two years, Principal of Falmouth Independent Schools for one year, Supervisor of Education for Anderson County Schools for seven years, head of a B.S. and M.A. degrees from EKU, past M.A. degree at EKU and UK, a member of the Retired Teachers Association, series collector of Kentuckiana History, wrote two Monographs, "Colonel James Mearns" and "Bert Mullins," a Veteran of WWII, and was a member of the First Christian Church.

During his education years, he was associated with several societies and clubs. To name a few, he was a member of 32 Mason, Phi Delta Kappa, The Rotary Club, Kentucky Historical Society and the Kentucky Civil War Round Table. While in the educational profession he received several honors and awards. He was named "Kentucky's Outstanding Teaching Award" in 1964 and "Kentucky's Safety Award" in 1962. In 1987, Governor Collins appointed him "Kentucky Ambassador of Goodwill." He was commissioned a "Kentucky Colonel" by Governor Chandler in 1959. He was also a "Kentucky Admiral," "Kentucky Commodore," "Ambassador of Kentucky Parks," "Honorary Colonel in the Kentucky State Police," "Honorary Society of Kentucky Mountain Men and a "Duke of Paducah."

Survivors are two sisters, Evelyn Mullins of Lexington and Sue Gail Pike of Jeffersonville, Indiana, several nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by a sister, Christine Grassie.

Services were Saturday, February 16, at the Cox Funeral Home Chapel with Bro. David Campbell officiating. Burial was in the Elmwood Cemetery.

Honorary pallbearers were Joe Henderson, Bill Adams, Gordon Graham, Lewis Perciful, Roy Martin and Billy Dowell.

Active pallbearers were Jim Earl Hammons, Gary Creason, Bill Gregory, Leo Hopkins, Robert Figg and William T. Noe.

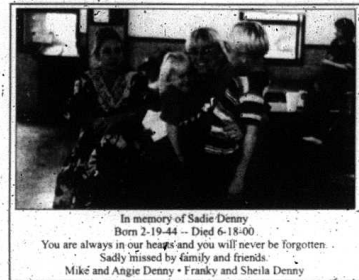

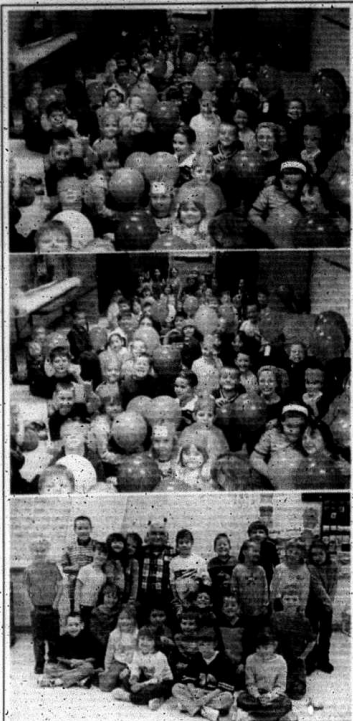

February is National Children's Dental Health Month. Daily brushing and regular visits to the dentist are important for healthy smiles. Dental sealants can also preserve those pretty smiles.

Dentists have long helped patients in the prevention of tooth decay. One of the tools in the war against decay is the dental sealant, a plastic material that the dentist applies to the chewing surfaces of the back teeth - the premolars and molars. The sealant forms a barrier that protects teeth from plaque, a sticky film of bacteria that constantly forms on teeth.

The bacteria in plaque use sugar and starch in food as a source of energy. They convert this food into harmful acids that attack teeth and may cause cavities.

Through brushing and flossing help remove food particles and plaque from smooth surfaces of the teeth: Pits and fissures, however, are

places that are extremely difficult to clean. Toothbrush bristles cannot reach all the way into the depressions and grooves to remove food and plaque. The normal flow of saliva, which helps food particles from other areas of the mouth, cannot adequately clean the pits and fissures. They become places that are especially prone to decay. Most cavities form in pits and fissure areas, and permanent molars are extremely susceptible to this form of decay.

Applying dental sealants takes only a few minutes for each tooth. Sealants hold up well under the force of normal chewing and usually last several years before a reapplication is needed. As long as the sealant remains intact, the tooth surface is protected from decay. The dentists check the condition of the sealants during the dental examination and reapples them as necessary.

Sealants-an investment in maintaining a healthy smile.

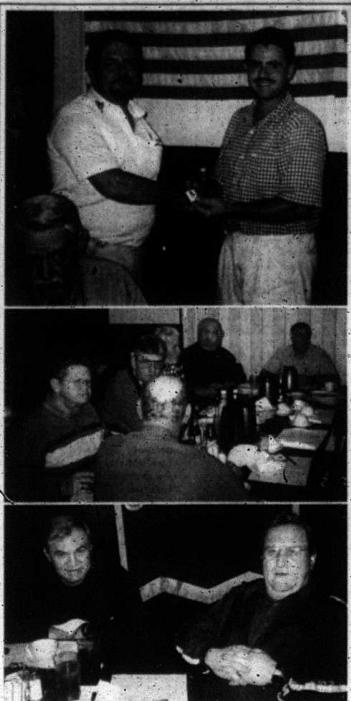

SMALL BUSINESS FOCUS

A Gold Medal Performance

As the world's eyes focus on Salt Lake City and the Winter Olympics, no one who admires the competitive nature of the human spirit can fail to be inspired by these dedicated athletes who have made untold sacrifices in their quest for a gold medal.

But the gold medal is only a tangible symbol of those victorious moments that make sports history live forever in the hearts and minds of those who cherish the games as tests of human endurance, skill and determination.

Maybe there should be a Small-Business Olympics. The categories for competition are virtually endless and if there is one group of Americans who are familiar with staunch competition, it is that indomitable group of entrepreneurs who, day in and day out, find themselves up against massive obstacles and endless tests of their endurance.

Take Barbara Williams, for example. It wasn't enough that she struggled mightily to overcome the daily business challenges to operate her Gettysburg, Pa., restaurant. No, thanks to big government, she found herself strapped unwillingly to a legal tangle named Superfund that threatened to doom her small business down a fast track to oblivion.

Sucked into the whirling vortex of federal environmental regulations that were crafted by Washington, D.C. bureaucrats and government lawyers, Williams was sued for \$750,000 for legally disposing of restaurant trash years after she had sent such "deadly" items as chicken bones and potato scraps to a local landfill. Unfortunately for her, the landfill was declared to be a contaminated site under Superfund regulations. Large industrial polluters, using the regulations in an unintended fashion, sued her and hundreds of other small firms in an effort to pass along their cleanup costs.

But Williams would have none of it. Instead of giving up in the face of nearly overwhelming odds, she did what most successful small-business owners do when faced with competition: She got mad, she got busy and she got involved in NFB's effort to protect Main Street companies like hers against unfair laws.

This was not a sprint, it was a marathon. Over more than eight years, Williams testified before congressional committees, told her story on the pages of *The Wall Street Journal* and other newspapers and was the subject of a CBS 60 Minutes segment.

The end result? Barbara Williams won the small-business sector's equivalent of a gold medal. When President Bush placed his signature on the Small Business Liability Relief and Brownfields Revitalization Act in January, he honored all who compete against unfair government intervention. The act exempts small businesses with 100 or fewer employees from liability under Superfund if the business' disposal, like Barbara Williams' Sunny Ray Restaurant, did not contribute significantly to the cleanup costs of the area.

Barbara Williams won't be getting a gold medal for her defeating big government. There are no Olympic Games for small-business owners. But millions of American entrepreneurs owe her a debt of gratitude. When faced with an overwhelming challenge, she reached down deep inside and like a great athlete, gave what it took to win.

Do-Ahead Meals

When you are having a busy day at home, working away from home, taking the children somewhere or expecting company for dinner - "do-ahead-meal" come to your rescue.

Meat and vegetable recipes that call for marinating are great for "do-aheads." Meats in sauce are also good because the sauce prevents drying out and keeps the flavor in.

Dishes that include noodles, spaghetti or macaroni, or vegetables are best if slightly undercooked during advanced preparation. The final cooking will get them well done.

For speeded-up tossed salads, chop your firm vegetables like celery, carrots, peppers early in the day. Wrap and chill.

Chopping onions? Chop some extra and keep in tightly-covered container in the freezer or refrigerator.

Yeast or quick breads freeze well. Bake several loaves and freeze the extra ones. Package in foil for easy reheating.

Prepare your fruit salad early and refrigerate. Use ascorbic acid or lemon-juice to keep peaches, pears and bananas bright.

Following are some recipes to help make your "do-ahead" meals easier.

Multipurpose Barbecued Hamburger Mix
 4 medium onions, chopped
 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
 2 cups chopped celery tops
 1/4 cup fat
 4 pounds hamburger
 4 teaspoons pepper
 4 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
 2 12-ounce bottles catsup
 Pan fry the onion, garlic and celery in a large kettle. Add the hamburger, stir and cook. Add extra pepper, Worcestershire sauce and catsup. Simmer 20 minutes. Skim surface fat. May be frozen for up to three months. Makes 10 cups. Use this mixture for this quick main dish.

Hamburger Stroganoff
 Heat 1 pint barbecued hamburger mix on a skillet until completely thawed. Add 2 cups sliced fresh mushrooms (1 six-ounce package) and a 10 1/2 ounce can of condensed cream of mushroom soup. Stir and simmer 5 minutes. Carefully spoon

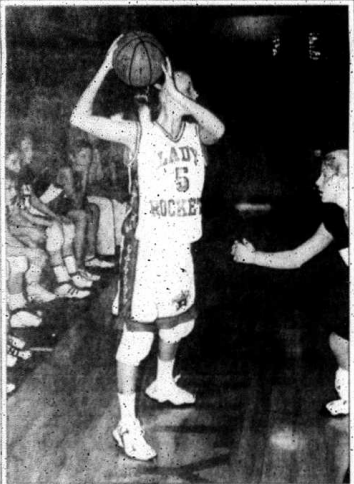

The Briarjumper, who have won 20 games this season and are ranked number two in the 12th region, led most of the game, but had no answer for the Rockets in overtime.

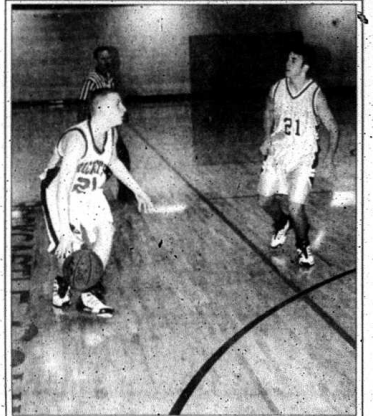
The Rockets put up eight points to one for the Briarjumper, taking a 68-61 victory.

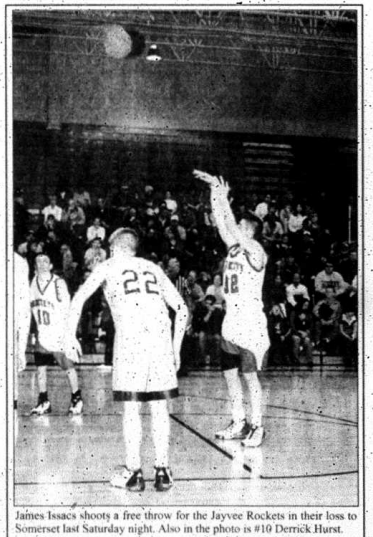
The Rockets will host McCreary Central on Friday night and head into district play on Monday night at Clay County.

Ward Burton wins 44th Daytona 500 in a Dodge

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. "I didn't know if we were going to win, but I knew we had a helluva chance," said Ward Burton in Victory Lane after winning Sunday's Daytona 500.

Burton, driver of the No. 22 Cat Dodge only led three green flag laps, and those were the ones that mattered the last three.

"I wasn't looking at the checkered flag when I went by it," continued Burton. "I didn't back off the gas until I saw the others slack up."

What set up a three-lap shootout to the finish started on a restart during lap 195 of the 200-lap race. Jeff Gordon was the leader, followed by Sterling Marlin and Burton.

Right after the leaders cleared the green flag, a multi-car pileup began in the middle of the field. Marlin, in the meantime had gotten a run on leader, Gordon, and attempted to pass underneath. Gordon came down, attempting to block Marlin's car, and the left side of Marlin's No. 40 Ford Dodge went below the yellow line.

Gordon slid down into the infield grass, while Marlin and the rest of the field continued to race back around.

"It was my fault," said Gordon. "Sterling had a run on me, and I tried to block him."

About the time Marlin and Gordon tangled, NASCAR officials showed a yellow flag because of the accident that had happened farther back in the field of cars.

Marlin was the new leader as the cars came back around, but NASCAR showed a red flag, stopping the race.

With the cars stopped on the backstretch, Marlin crawled out of his car, and went around to the right front and started pulling the fender away from the tire.

When the race resumed, NASCAR officials penalized Marlin for working on his car during the red flag, and sent him to the rear of the field.

When Sterling went to pit road, Ward Burton, the older of the two Burton Brothers took over the lead, and went on to his first Daytona win in eight tries.

During pre-season testing they talked about Chevrolet being fast, how Ford garnered the most attention; but it was Dodge that won the spoiler game.

Tony Stewart, one of the pre-race favorites lost an engine on lap two, and wound up 43rd. "Something happened to the motor. I just don't know what happened. It kind of went on the start a little bit, then as the lap went on it kind of laid even more."

"I'm glad I didn't cause a wreck trying to get off the track. The hard part was that it kind of went into the banking and there was nowhere to really go, other than around the bottom of the track. I'm glad everybody got by us clean."

Dale Earnhardt Jr., who cut a tire and was involved in two more accidents, came in 29th.

A massive accident on lap 149 in turn one claimed 17 cars, and turned the turns one and two into a scarp yard.

Ken Schrader, Michael Waltrip, and Matt Kenseth were the early race leaders. Waltrip got behind in the middle of the race because of a 22-second plus pit stop, and Schrader damaged the side of his car.

The last time a Dodge visited Victory Lane at Daytona was when Ri-

chard Petty won the 1974 Daytona 500.

Shawna Robinson takes a big step for women

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — Shawna Robinson didn't win Sunday's Daytona 500, but her debut in this year's race had a special meaning for her. According to

Robinson, Daytona is one of the most elite tracks in all of motorsports and symbolizes NASCAR racing. She has been a trailblazer before in racing and will be so again. Even though she failed to make the field for Sunday's Daytona 500 through performance in her 125-mile qualifying race, she did gain a spot based on her qualifying speed.

She was the second woman to start in the Daytona 500. Janet Guthrie was the first in 1977, finishing 12th after starting 39th. Guthrie was also the most recent, having competed in the 1980, 500.

"The guys on the team earned it," Robinson said. "We came here with a plan and a program and my job was to come here focused on what I need to do and that's drive the race and not get distracted by what other people think and other people feel."

"When I walk through this garage area, I walk with my head high."

Robinson said she was disappointed with her performance in her 125-mile qualifying race, when she was involved in an accident, but proud her team had performed well enough in qualifying to still make the field.

"There was nothing I could do on the 125, no where I could go on the track," she said. "If I had come out of here without making this race I would have still held my head high and gone on to Las Vegas."

Now that she has raced in her first Daytona 500, some of the pressure is off.

"It was the first day of the rest of my life," she said. "Making the Daytona 500 is the security blanket on my career. I am confident this BAM Racing team is ready for combat. We tested at Daytona with a logical approach. We took a car specific to NASCAR rules and specifications. We didn't want to get caught up trying to run the fastest speeds and give the team false hope. We wanted to emulate qualifying conditions and we were successful in doing so."

"I believe the components are in place to make the rest of the season a success, also," she said. "I have experience in drafting at both the Daytona and Talladega tracks in the NASCAR Busch Series and the ARCA Series. Sunday was the first time where each lap and the entire lap she relied on staying nose-to-tail with the other cars around her."

The 37-year-old mother of two has competed in the ARCA ReMax Series since 1999. Her best finish was second at Daytona in '99. A veteran of the NASCAR Busch Series from 1991-95, she was also the first female driver to qualify for the pole in Busch competition at Atlanta in 1994.

"She competed in the NASGAR, Goody's Dash Series, and GATR Truck Series."

She ran her first race at Toledo Speedway, 1980.

Scotty Chantelle was released on a reduced bond of approximately \$1,250, after a hearing in District Court on Monday.

His attorney, John Clontz, provided evidence in court, which showed that an emergency protection order had been issued against him on January 31st, which prohibited him from living at the house since that time.

Joey Chantelle was charged with cultivating marijuana and manufacturing meth.

Although the apparently had the keys to two locks on the basement door in her possession, she told police the materials for the meth lab and marijuana grow belonged to her husband.

She was released on a \$25,000 property bond and is due back in court on April 8th.

Saylor was arrested and charged with manufacturing meth. According to the citation issued by Owens, Saylor denied having anything to do

with making the meth, but admitted that he had purchased the materials needed.

His bond was set at \$25,000 cash. He is due back in court on March 4th to review his bond. He remains in the Rockcastle Detention Center.

Blair was also charged with manufacturing meth. His bond was set at \$25,000 cash as well. According to court documents, Blair was indicted in October and December of last year for manufacturing meth. Blair, who remains in jail, is due back in court on March 4th.

county fund.

The county's road fund had a balance \$41,389. During January, the county took in \$14,539 and spent \$58,900. However, there was a balance of \$85,000 in the road fund account at the beginning of January. The county can only spend money out of that fund on road expenses, such as blacktop and salaries for county road department employees.

The Rockcastle Detention Center account had a balance of \$88,300 at the end of January. \$53,000 was spent out of that account during the month.

Because the state was behind in paying claims for December the Detention Center received \$141,500 during January for state prisoners kept in the jail for the previous two months.

The detention center account is used for all expenses at the local lock-up, including salaries and food.

The detention center debt service account had a balance of \$39,000. Once a year the county makes a debt service payment of \$127,600 in November. "We set aside money each month to make sure we can make our payment on the renovation and addition project," Clontz said.

The economic assistance fund had a balance of \$17,700 at life end of

January. That account can be used for such things as law enforcement, road materials and labor.

The forestry fund had a balance of \$2,100.

The only money that can be spent from that account is for forest fire protection and on roads that lead into the national forest.

The economic development fund had a balance of \$35,000. The money in that account is used for payments on the industrial park and especially for a yearly payment of \$14,000 on the Industrial Park #2, which is located off Hwy. 150.

The FEMA account had a balance of \$664. Money in that account is always received from the federal government and spent on emergencies such as the snow storm of 1999.

The 911 account had a balance of \$67,000. \$14,800 was spent out of that account in January and only \$13,100 was taken in.

Money in that account is used for 911 expenses such as salaries and lease payments on equipment.

The chemical stockpile emergency preparedness program account had a balance of \$8,150. All of the money put into that account is from grant money and the expenses from that account are very restricted, according to Clontz.

The fairgrounds fund, which operates basically on a lease payment from the fair board had a balance of \$4,800.

"I've been doing this job for a lot of years and I would say we're in better shape than we've been for many years," Clontz said.



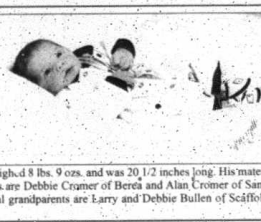
