# County's financial situation better than in other years

Many Rockeastle County residents and suxpayers seem confused about the financial situation of the Rockeastle Fiscal Court.

In a nutshell, the county's financial situation is better than it has been in several years, according to Rockeastle County Treasurer Joe Clottz.

Rockcastle County Treasurer Joe Clontz.

Much of that is due to the passage of the county's insurance tax a few years ago and the completion of the renovation project at the county jail.

Last week, Clontz presented the monthly financial statement to the fiscal court during their regular monthly meeting, which showed a positive balance in all 13 accounts

the county has.
Some of those accounts are held by the county, but actually have nothing to do with the county.

Although the county actually has nothing to do with the money, any payments out of those accounts must be approved by the fiscal court, therefore the reason for the accounts.




