NOTICE: To All Residents of the City of Brodhead

In 1995, the city of Brodhed published an ordinance adopting a system that establishes an address for all lots and parcels of land within the city limits.

Numbers were assigned to every household and are published on every water bill.

The city now gives all residents in the city limits THIRTY (30) DAYS TO COMPLY WITH THIS ORDI-NANCE OR BE FINED.

Each resident is responsible for purchasing their numbers and placing them in an appropriate position. Rental properties are the responsibility of property owners. Numbers shall be at least three (3) inches in height and legible from the street (in some instances, numbers may need to be large in order to be seen).

Fines stated in the 1995 ordinance for non-compliance with this ordinance are not less than \$25 and not more than \$500. Each failure to comply with this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense and each day that the failure to comply continues shall constitute a separate offense. A copy of this ordinance may be picked up at city hall.


