Former Livingston Mayor Charlie Newcomb resigned his position late in February and was apparently hired as a part-time police officer.

However, newly appointed Mayor Curtis McHargue said that Newcomb must undergo training before he will be allowed to carry a gun and continue to work. McHargue said that he was currently trying to complete the proper paperwork for Newcomb, who will join Joe Johnson on Livingston's police force when he receives his certification. McHargue said that Newcomb would be a part-time officer.

McHargue said that he is also trying to find someone to fill the spot left vacant on the council when he took the Mayor's job. Right now, Todd Mink, Kathy Carpenter and Jason Medley serve along with McHargue.

### Mt. Vernon man sues 911

A Mt. Vernon man who was stopped by police on Halloween night of last year is making an all out effort to obtain the name or names of those who may have called the Rockcastle County 911 center to complain about him that night.

Michael Sheliga says in a suit filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court that he was unfairly singled out by Mt. Vernon police.

According to court records, Sheliga was detained by police and questioned for a lengthy time because he was over 21-years-old and not with a child who was "trick or treating." Sheliga was also carrying a bag of uncooked rice. He was not charged with a crime. Sheliga threatened legal action against the City of Mt. Vernon, but has not filed suit against them as of yet.

According to court records, Sheliga requested that he receive an audio tape of the 911 call, but his request was turned down by County Attorney Jeff Burdette. Attorney General Ben Chandler's office agreed with Burdette, and said that the county did not have to turn over the tape.

"We don't want people afraid to call in when there is an emergency because they are afraid of a lawsuit - it is just a matter of privacy for a concerned caller," he said.

The case will be heard in Circuit Judge William Cain's court. The next hearing is Friday.

### Nearly four inches of rain during the last four days

Rockcastle County residents have been lucky when it comes to the latest round of rainfall.

Fleety has fallen, but for the most part very little flooding has occurred throughout the county.

Rockcastle County weatherman Bud Cox said that 4.39 inches of rain has been recorded in the month of March.

Since last Friday 3.89 inches was recorded and for a twenty four hour period from 8 a.m. Tuesday to 8 a.m. Wednesday 1.61 inches of precipitation fell.

The recorded high temperature for the month was 74 on the 15th and the recorded low was nine on the fourth. Cox recorded a trace of snow once in March.

County road crews had to clean up Sweet Water Road on Wednesday morning after the bank's farm pond apparently broke loose, according to County Road Foreman Jack Cronner.

"We've been pretty luck here, considering all of the rain," he said.

### Ford gets \$500,000 put in House budget for walkway

Kentucky State Representative Danny Ford, of Mt. Vernon, announced this week that he has been able to include a \$500,000 project for a new crosswalk at Reno Valley, in the House of Representative's version of the state's budget.

The new crosswalk would cross over U.S. 25 and allow pedestrians to safely go from one side of the road to the other.

The crosswalk would be built at approximately the same time that a \$2.5 million road project in the same area is going on. That money was secured by U.S. Representative Harold Rogers of Somerset. It will add a lane at Reno Valley and widen the existing lanes to make it safer for motorists and pedestrians. Ford said that he hoped the project would soon make it through the state senate and be signed off on by Governor Patti Patton.

Ford has been largely responsible for the nearly \$4 million the state has pumped into the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame at Reno Valley.

### Still no arrests in shooting

Police still has made no arrests in a drive-by shooting near Broadhead last week.

Melissa Carmen Lawson, 23, was shot twice in the shooting. She was one of six people in the home on Negro Creek when the early morning shooting occurred. Police said that at least 13 shots were fired into the house.

"Nobody is saying much, which is making the investigation pretty hard," said Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Aaron Matthews.

### Rockets lose in first round of state

The Rockcastle County High School Rocket basketball team ended their historic season last Wednesday afternoon in Rupp Arena.

The Rockets fell to the Blue Tornado of Paducah Tilgham High School 58-43, in the first game of the first round of the Sweet Sixteen.

The Rockets finished the season with a mark of 25-8, which was a school record and they also claimed the school's first ever boys' basketball regional championship.

The Rockets seemed a little nervous from the outset and before it was over they would commit 26 turnovers compared to Tilgham's 13.

Tilgham also outscored the Rockets 39 to 33, 21 of those on the offensive glass.

The Blue Tornado outscored Rockcastle in every quarter on the way to the victory.

The Blue Tornado would eventually finish second in the tournament, losing to Lexington Catholic in the finals.

Freshman Aaron Cash had 15 points and five assists.

Senior Andrew Hammond had 13 points and eight rebounds.

Junior Jason Reynolds had 10 points and eight rebounds.

Junior Austin Miller had three and junior Chris Settles had two.

Juniors Aaron Anderkin and Stephen Boring, and sophomore Devin Taylor all saw extensive action, but did not score.

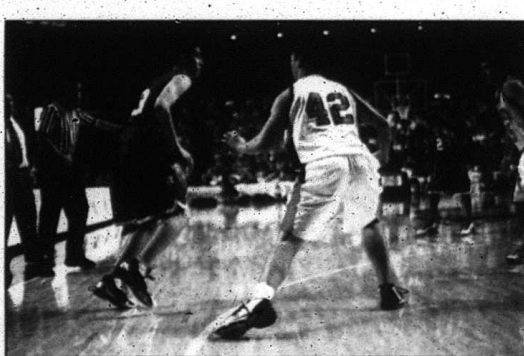
All fifteen Rockets saw action in the contest.

"We were a little tight and they had a very quick ball club - they showed how good they were by reaching the finals," said head Coach Clayton Cash.

"I am really proud of these kids, their hard work and determination paid off for them this year," he said. "I want to thank all of the fans who supported us this season, especially during the regional tournament and at Rupp," he said.

Rockcastle fans turned out in huge numbers for the boys' first appearance at the state tournament since Rockcastle County schools were consolidated.

### Fourteen indictments returned

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down indictments against 14 people during their regular session last week.

Many of the indictments were for drug related crimes.

Those indicted were:

Dewayne S. Blair, 36, of Mt. Vernon, indicted again on a charge of manufacturing methamphetamine (Mett), while in possession of a firearm. He was indicted on the same charge last year.

Johnathan H. Saylor, 28, Mt. Vernon, manufacturing meth, first offense, while in possession of a firearm.

Scotty K. Chattelle, 20, Mt. Vernon; 30, of Mt. Vernon, manufacturing meth and/ or/ Chattelle, 29, manufacturing meth.

All four were involved in an incident at Joey Chattelle's rented home on February 7th.

Tracy Phillips, 24, of Mt. Vernon was also indicted on a drug charge. Phillips is accused of having meth in her possession on June 29th of last year.

Fred N. Hampton, 42, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on three counts. He is accused of possessing meth and marijuana and of assaulting Phillips of the same day as Ms. Phillips was alleged to have meth in her possession.

David Denny, 29, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on a count of receiving stolen property. He is accused of having a stolen firearm in his possession in November of last year.

Phillip Falin, 27, also of Mt. Vernon, who is a convicted felon, was also charged with possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

Nancy Jane Jones, 31, of Livingston and Tasha Sandlin, 18, Broadhead were indicted on one count of theft by unlawful taking over \$300.

Mt. Vernon City Assn. Police Chief Eddie Delaney said the two were employees at Curry Oil Company and that they are accused of

taking money from January 1, though February 20.

### Three arrested

The Attorney General's Division of Financial Integrity Enforcement has brought charges against three Kentucky men for providing and receiving illegal television satellite services.

After a three-month investigation, Melvin Taylor, 42, of Mt. Vernon, Benjamin Croucher and Michael Gevedon of Berea, were arrested last week for theft of services; counterfeiting trademark property; possession and use and transfer of a device for theft of telecommunication services.

Good business managers can turn an office into a very lucrative source of income for an entire family. It is all within the law and if you expect to get decent people to run for public office, then that certainly is the way it should be.

Some people should understand that we try our best to stay out of county elections. One person has a much right to run for office as another.

Solicitors' incomes run high and sometimes people get the wrong idea. I think for the most part, people know who has done a good job and

or who they think would do a good job and in county elections that is really all you have to go on.

We have already encountered some politicians who want certain things, such as ads on the front page.

Most politicians know that is not going to happen. We don't run ads of any type on the front.

We also reserve the right to reject any letter to the editor and we reserve the right to edit the ones we do run.

We are not setting any policy in concrete because you, never know when you will need to change something.

The bottom line is that we will make our decisions concerning letters on a letter by letter basis.

Endorsement letters will be looked at very closely.

We have already had one elected official ask us to publish the duties of that office, along with a political ad of course. But he didn't want to pay for it.

Basically accountable has the same rights as any other peace officer.

They have county wide arrest

authority and they carry a gun.

Constable receive no salaries, but in some cases may receive a fee for serving a warrant or other legal papers.

For the life of me I don't know why anyone would want a job that doesn't pay, especially when it costs each constable quite a bit of money to be bonded to they can carry a gun.

I know some of our constables do a good job and are an asset to the county, but I think that is one office that could be done away with.

## Points East

It's rained, here in the flat lands, for most of the last ten days.

If the sun has shone, I slept through it.

And if it hasn't rained it was looking like rain and all you had to do to make it rain was get a strowel out of the gardening tools and strowel your head out the door like you meant business and it would rain again.

Ditto for catching night crawlers. Five nights in a row I've charged up my flash light with the adjustable beam that can be dimmed down to perfection so that it just barely glows and then made sure that the porch and any lights shining through the windows were out and made ready to catch a few dozen crawlers. Bigger, around and longer than new pencils, they are making a warm love atop the grass, in my front lawn this time of year.

I wear a pair of old moccasins lined with sheep shear and under ideal conditions, I can catch, within a matter of 45 minutes on any given damp evening, several dozen crawlers right on top of the ground if the conditions are right. The moccasins

are important because they enable you to sneak right up on crawlers.

But if it's raining or there's lightning in the air, catching night crawlers is an effort in futility.

And don't even think about using a bright light. Catching crawlers is a sport in and of itself. It takes a bit of practice and it's not for the squeamish. But it can yield a hundred dollars worth of bait and/or useful worms in your lawn or garden in a good evening, especially if you don't already have a colony of crawlers on your property.

Stashed in five gallon buckets about half full of good peatling soil and some coffee grounds, the worms stay healthy for months in an old refrigerator I have in the garage. As late as last November, I was using for bait, night crawlers that I had tended in the fridge that had been caught last March. Once I have them in the buckets, I dampen down a section of the daily paper about once a week and put it on top of the soil. The worms will eat it from the bottom up.

Bottom line is that you can wind up with several hundred night crawlers for a tiny fraction of what they cost commercially and they will be much larger and twice as healthy as anything you can buy for two bucks a dozen at the bait stores if you have the means to keep them chilled to

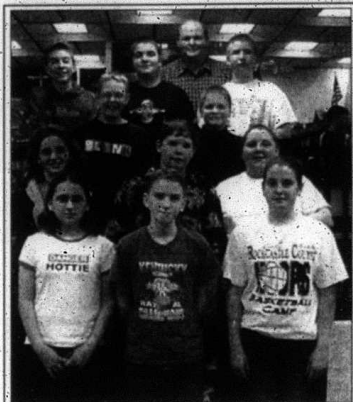

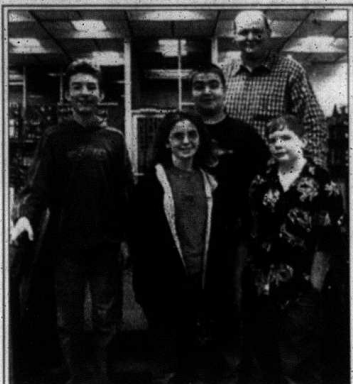

# Why bother with a Science Fair?

If you're a parent of an elementary or middle school child, you may be holding your breath. It's that time of year when schools start sending home information on science fairs. Believe it or not, there is a point to having a science fair. By encouraging your child to participate, you encourage creativity. Confidence will be gained in their own abilities. Imagine what the success and recognition will do for your child's self-esteem. A science fair also enhances and reinforces the school program, which works hard to help children meet the Kentucky Core Content Goals. A science fair helps children to discover and understand science by using the scientific method. Children get a chance to see how scientists work. This is a great opportunity for some real world application.

The hard part is allowing the child to complete the project without taking over. You don't want to hear, "We know who did that project!"

Suggest possible topics but your child should make the final decision. Help with materials and the display without taking over. Yes, this is easier said than done sometimes.

Help your child follow these steps to be successful. The first step is to get ideas from books, the Internet, or school. Your child needs to narrow the topic. For example, physical science is too broad. A narrower topic would be magnetism. The next step is to develop the hypothesis (a guess) and investigate the hypothesis. Once the child conducts the experiment, he/she will analyze the data and draw conclusions about what they did. The last step is to present the results in a display.

While a science fair project is hard work, the benefits outweigh the hassles. The increased confidence and self-esteem is hard to pass up in this day and age. So, grab your child and jump into the world of science.

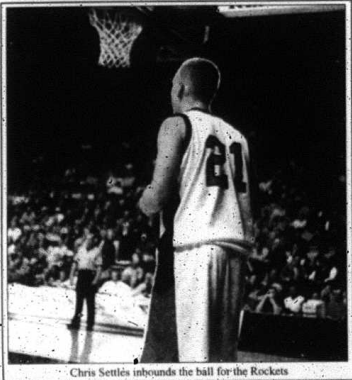

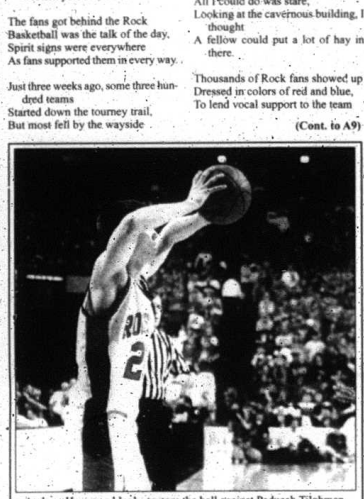

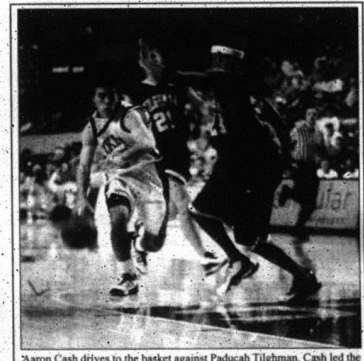

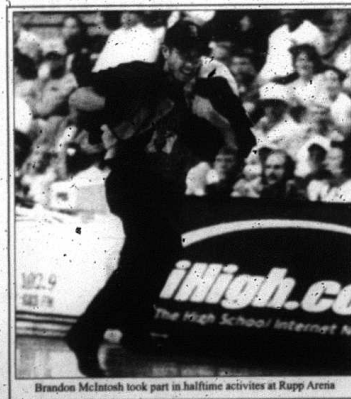

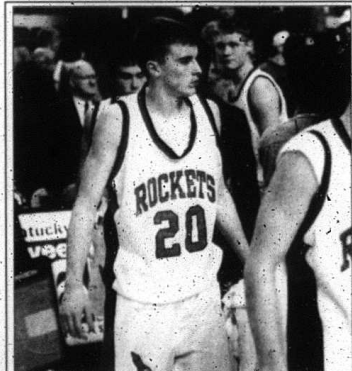

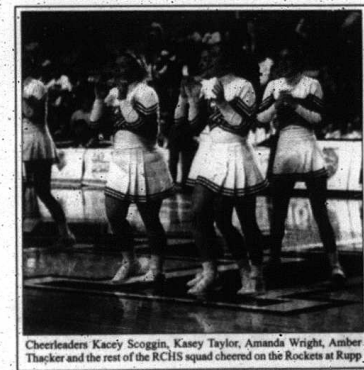

Marc Robbins, the Richmond Police Department and Kentucky State Police, according to a release from the Attorney General's office.

Attorney General Ben Chandler said, "Theft of television satellite services amounts to a one billion dollar loss each year; and consumers are ultimately the victims because they pay higher prices for equipment and services to make up for that loss."

Taylor is charged with one count of theft of services, three counts of counterfeiting trademark property, and three counts of possession, use or transfer of a device for theft of telecommunications services.

Croucher was charged with three counts of each violation, and Gevedon was charged with one count of each violation. All three men have been released on bail.

The investigation into theft of television equipment and services is continuing in other counties, the release said.

"Since its inception, our Financial Integrity unit has recovered over \$6.5 million dollars in counterfeit and illegal items," said Chandler.

Taylor is due to appear in District Court on April 29th.

around 45 degrees. Feed them coffee grounds and they are not only healthy but down right mean. Apparently, caffeine has the same effect on night crawlers as it has on me at the crack of dawn on Monday mornings.

The best time to catch night crawlers is right now. Warm spring rains bring them to the surface and chances are that your lawn has plenty. If you live in town, and you don't have crawlers, you should go to the nearest park or golf course and catch a few dozen. But don't use them for bait.

Dig maybe a foot down into the turf in your lawn and literally plant them. Put three or four to the hole.

If you are too sorry to go out and catch a start, go to the fish bait counter at Wallyworld and buy a couple dozen. Just peel back the turf on your lawn, drop in a couple of worms and repeat this process about

every three feet in rows about three feet apart. They will breed up until about the end of May and in a year or two you will have a much healthier lawn or garden because they are incredible soil aerators.

It takes about three years to get them well established, but then you can have your own fish bait factory. And if you don't fish, one morning you will look out and a fat old robin will be sitting on your lawn, reared back with half a worm in its beak and the other half in the ground.

I'll let you get away with not caring much about fishing, but if you don't like robins, please don't try to convince me that you are a real American.

This article I am quoting from says the state's horse industry poured nearly \$107,000 last month into its lobbying effort to get video slot machines legalized at racetracks. ## Family Court offers programs

A recent drug raid in this area revealed that Ecstasy was among the drugs confiscated. The Partnership for a Drug Free America reports a 71% increase in the use of Ecstasy in the past two years. The kid myth of a safe and fun drug is being sold to our youth. The drug is touted as being a builder of confidence and self-esteem. This has special appeal to youth who have problems fitting into the social schemes of the youth culture.

The main concern is that this drug is a neurotoxin that affects the brain. Immediate signs of this effect are, not remembering things recently said or done, loss of coordination, depression, confusion, sleep problems, chills or sweating, and slurred speech. Parents need to be vigilant for these signs.

More serious consequences from higher doses are: serious breathing problems, coma and even death. A serious outcome from use can be unprotected sex and subsequent diseases and pregnancy. Recreational activities, but it is almost certain, that long term effects occur. Early intervention would certainly be needed to prevent loss of physical and mental function.

The Drug Court for the 28th Judicial Circuit has a program that combines the best features of criminal justice and treatment. The program provides structure, consequences and rewards (for staying drug free) to juveniles who have problems with drug addiction or abuse. The program educates juveniles and their parents on the legal and the medical problems stemming from drug use. It can also provide parenting skills for the family and life skills for the juveniles. It gives a structured, intensive plan for youth dealing with drugs. Frequent drug testing ensures that the program participants are making progress in staying drug free.

Parents often think that staying their kids involved in the court system will leave the kids with a criminal record that will affect the kids' future. Juvenile court records are sealed when the kid becomes 18 years of age. This information can not be released to anyone. It is important that we deal with drug problems before the kids reach 18 to prevent the kids from having a record.

**Tupelo offers strategies for development in Rockcastle County**

Tupelo, Mississippi is more than 450 miles from Rockcastle County, but the experiences of that small southern city can be instructive regarding the development of Rockcastle's communities: On March 29 at the Rockcastle County High School, the Rockcastle County Development Board will host a community meeting with Dr. Vaughn Grisham, a University of Mississippi sociologist who has studied and shared Tupelo's story with thousands of citizens. Following a 6:00 p.m. reception for Rockcastle Countians, Dr. Grisham's speech will begin at 7:00 p.m.

Residents of Tupelo in the 1930's were among the poorest in the state of Mississippi. But today, the citizens enjoy life in a community that is one of the economically strongest in the state. Grisham asserts that Tupelo's success derives from the careful integration of community development with economic development.

When the city of Tupelo was leveled by a tornado in 1936, residents were faced with the challenge of rebuilding an already economically troubled town. George McLain, the owner of the local newspaper, looked past the tragedy and saw an opportunity for citizens to create a stronger community. He engaged local support and eventually founded the Community Development Foundation, which coordinated development

not only in town but in outlying areas. The idea was that shared prosperity would benefit Tupelo as well as its surrounding towns. The initial goal was to create jobs from within the community. Some fifty years later, the fact that local people have invested in the community has made Tupelo more attractive to outside businesses. In the past 15 years, Tupelo has created more than 1,000 new manufacturing jobs every year. Seventy-five percent of children in the community go to college, and the community can provide jobs for the skilled workers that result.

Tupelo's economic success began when George McLain convinced a group of local businessmen to pool their resources to purchase a champion bull from the Isle of Jersey. The procurement of that one animal led to the town's becoming a leading dairy producer in the 1940's. In the following decades, Tupelo attended to developing its human resources, local leaders, community organizations and the community itself in addition to tackling economic development. From industry to health care, workers in Tupelo were prepared to undertake whatever tasks the next stage of economic development presented. To learn more about how Rockcastle County can discover its own niche in the modern economy, attend the community meeting with Vaughn Grisham on March 29.

The program includes cost share for establishing or reestablishing stands of trees through planting or direct seeding of trees for conservation and sustainable timber production, forest improvement and to maintain or improve water quality and soil productivity on forest land to restore wetlands.

All cost share practices approved during this signing period must have final performance reported by December 31, 2002. Therefore, expiration dates cannot exceed December 31, 2002.

## FY 2002 PFC Reminder

Producers who wish to receive their 2002 PFC (Production Flexibility Contract) payments early must sign a form for what month you wish to receive your 2002 payment. The deadline to sign or revise a PFC for FY2002 is August 1, 2002. Do not expect a payment for your form if you are considering selling a portion of the entire farm. Changes in your farming operation must be reported timely in order to reflect PFC payments to the current crop year producer.

All changes reflected on the CCC-478, Application for PFC Payment, must be signed by August 1, 2002.

## Continuous CRP Sign-Up

Eligible acreage devoted to certain special conservation practices such as riparian buffers, filter strips, grassed waterways, shelter belts, living snow fences, contour grass strips, salt toleration vegetation, and shallow water areas for wildlife may be enrolled at any time under CCC's continuous CRP sign-up. These practices are not subject to competitive bidding. For more information, contact your local FSA office.

## 2002 Burley Tobacco Program

The national marketing quota for the 2002 crop is 324.2 million pounds, a decrease from the 2001 quota of 332.0 million pounds. For each farm, the 2002 basic quota will decline approximately 2.3 percent from crop year 2001.  
 The effective quota is extended to be about 344 million pounds, a decrease of 24 million pounds from crop year 2001.  
 The price support level for the 2002 crop is \$1.835 per pound, up nine cents per pound from crop year 2001.  
 The burley tobacco no-net-cost assessment will be two cents per pound of the 2002 crop burley tobacco that is marketed by direct sale or through a price support loan, USDA set the no-net-cost assessments at one cent per pound for the producer and one cent for the purchaser for crop the producer and one cent per pound for the purchaser for crop year 2002.  
 The MQ-24, Notice of Acreage Bases, Yields Allotments, and or Quotas for burley tobacco as scheduled to be mailed to producers on April 5, 2002.

## Tobacco Spot Checks

Producers who have reported unmarketed tobacco stored on the farms are subject for random spot checks. Spot checks are performed by local FSA personnel to verify the amount of tobacco reported. These spot checks will be carried out in the next few months. If you have moved tobacco from where, you first reported the storage, please contact FSA to report the new location.

## Marketing Cards

Producers who have sold the current years crop of burley tobacco are encouraged to return their marketing card to the FSA office as soon as possible. Marketing records on the cards are compared to sales recorded for accuracy. Failure to return the marketing card promptly delays correct information for the 2002 crop year date.

## Wheat Reporting

Small grains (wheat) crop reporting can now be completed at the FSA office after they are planted. Wheat crop reporting must be on file by May 31, 2002. All other crop reporting must be on file by July 15, 2002.

# Legislative Update

Budget shows emphasis on education, House works on other issues as Senate gets budget

After working over the weekend and through the early part of the week to hammer out differences and reach a compromise, the House passed the budget after a four-hour debate on Wednesday, March 13. Basically a two-year spending plan for the Commonwealth, the General Assembly is responsible for passing the budget during even-year sessions like this one. It is always a difficult task, but as a result of the economic slowdown that the entire nation is experiencing, we were particularly challenged. Our goal this year was to renew our commitments to education and to be able to provide consistent service through other state programs. The end product was a budget that continues to provide funding for Bucks for Brains, allocates 50 percent of the Tobacco Settlement monies to expanding agricultural alternatives, and places people and not concrete and steel first. For example, we cut \$7 million from a maintenance fund for state buildings. The budget, filed as HB 507, is in the House version and now goes to the Senate for consideration.

As I mentioned, education was our highest priority. Since last session, members of the Interim Committee on Education have worked to develop areas that we can address to strengthen our schools. One of the most obvious areas is providing more adequate compensation for teachers to keep our quality teachers in the classrooms and attract more qualified individuals to the profession. Last week I wrote about the proposed raise for teachers and other school employees. When the governor gave his January budget address he requested a 2.7 percent raise, however the entire burden for this raise was passed along to local school districts. Although smaller, the budget provides \$34.6 million to provide a 1.63 percent raise. If financially possible, local school districts have the option of adding to that pay increase. We addressed future teacher pay issues with the passage of a bill that would require teacher pay raises to be the same proportion as the pay raises received by state employees. This bill, HB 402, would take effect during the next budget cycle.

This year's budget also provides an additional \$5.3 million during the 2003-2004 fiscal year for family resource centers. These centers reach

out to Kentucky children throughout the state to ensure they have the support and basic resources they need to take full advantage of their educational opportunities.

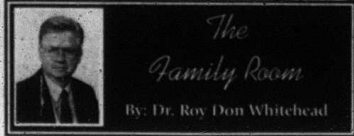
Health care was also high on the agenda. The budget includes an allocation for a program that provides medical treatment to low-income women who suffer from breast and cervical cancer. The \$1.2 million allocation will match \$4.8 million in federal funds. These two types of cancer claim thousands of lives each year and have rarely in the past received this level of attention.

Last year alone two Kentucky infants died after being abandoned. That was fresh in the mind of legislators as we passed HB 76, a bill that would allow parents to give up infants in the 72 hours after birth without criminal repercussions. The House approved the measure 100-0.

We also took action on a Senate Bill that came into consideration after September 11. The initiative, SB 70, allows the state to presume that people declared missing after a catastrophic event, like the attack on the World Trade Center and Pentagon are victims and declare them dead. If such a horrible event were to take place here, this move would provide the death certificates they need to move on with both the emotional and administrative aspects of grieving.

As of Thursday, March 14, 40 bills and 8 resolutions had been signed into law. Since I am in Frankfort during the week, I can be reached toll-free at 1-800-372-7181. ## Postpartum Depression affects New Mothers

The man called me out of concern for his wife. "She is tired all the time," he told me, "but then she can't sleep at night. She tells me she is not a good mother, but I know that she is. We haven't been out of the house for a month because she doesn't want to go anywhere. She doesn't care if she takes care of herself but she is a fanatic when it comes to taking care of the baby."

This bit of information caught my attention. "How old is the baby?" I asked. "She is almost two months old," the father replied.

"When did your wife begin showing these symptoms?" I wanted to know. "Soon after the baby was born," he answered.

"Many women experience a mild form of depression called the 'baby blues.' This usually occurs a few days to a few weeks after birth and usually goes away within a few weeks. During this time new mothers may have feelings of sadness, anger, anxiety, irritability and incompetence. Some mothers are surprised to have some negative thoughts about the new baby and may interpret this as being a 'bad' mother. It may be comforting to know that these feelings are normal."

The "baby blues" can be helped if the new mother takes good care of herself. This includes getting adequate rest, eating a nutritious diet, exercising in moderation and having a social support system. The mother will know she is not getting enough rest when little things begin to upset her more than they normally would. Obviously getting enough rest while caring for an infant is no easy task. Encouraging others to care for the baby while mom has some time for herself will help.

A more serious problem called postpartum depression occurs in approximately 10 percent of women of childbearing age. It strikes soon after the baby is born and can last for many months. Possible symptoms include all those of the "baby blues" listed above plus constant fatigue, a lack of joy in life, withdrawal from family and friends, a lack of concern

for self and baby, severe insomnia, excessive concern for the baby, loss of sexual interest, a strong sense of failure or inadequacy and severe mood swings.

There is no reason for Mom to be ashamed because she is depressed after the birth of her baby. The depression is not a sign of weakness. Most likely it is the result of hormonal changes that occur in pregnancy and after childbirth.

Treatment for postpartum depression is similar to the treatment for

other types of depression. Counseling, antidepressant medication and hormone therapy may all play a role in bringing Mom quickly out of depression.

Counseling allows the new mother to express her feelings in an accepting atmosphere. She will find that her feelings are normal and that almost all mothers have had similar feelings. Antidepressant medication and hormone therapy help to correct the chemical imbalance brought on by pregnancy and childbirth. Sometimes the family realizes Mom is depressed before she does. Since early intervention may mean a more rapid recovery, they can encourage Mom to seek help before the problem worsens. They can encourage Mom to see a doctor or a counselor so that she can begin to enjoy her new baby!

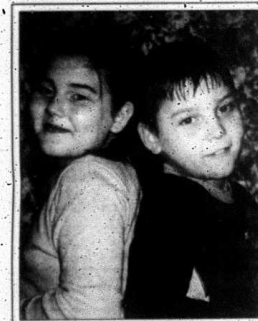

## Kentucky's New Telemarketing Law

A new telemarketing law was voted in by Kentucky legislators this month and was signed by the Governor on March 6, 2002. House bill 47 will become effective in mid July 2002.

This bill provides greater protection to consumers by stopping most telemarketing calls to Kentuckians who place their telephone numbers on a list maintained by the Attorney General's Office. The Attorney General's Office plans to make this list available to telemarketers on June 1, 2002.

Although the new law provides greater privacy protection than the existing law, it will still permit the following telemarketing calls, even to people on the list:

- 1. Calls from charitable organizations soliciting only donations. (If the telemarketer is soliciting a donation as part of a sale, the telemarketer must comply with

the law.)

- 2. Calls regarding existing debts or contracts.
- 3. Calls from businesses with whom the Kentucky consumer has a prior or existing relationship.
- 4. Calls made with the express permission of the Kentucky consumer.
- 5. Business to business calls.

At this time there are two ways for Kentuckians to sign up on the telemarketing No Call list. The sign up for the No Call list over the Internet by going to: [www.law.state.ky.us/nocall/default.htm](http://www.law.state.ky.us/nocall/default.htm)

Signing up over the Internet is the easiest and quickest way to get a telephone number on the No Call list. Kentuckians may also sign up for the No Call list by completing a signature card and returning it to the Attorney General's Office. Cards are available at the Extension Service. Call 256-2403 for more information.



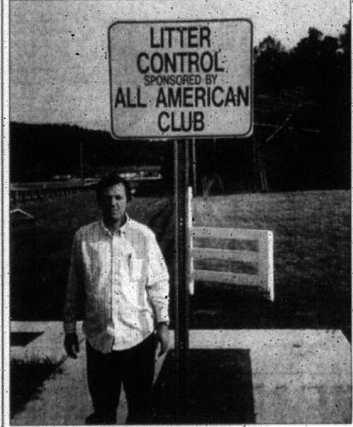

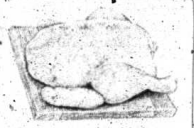

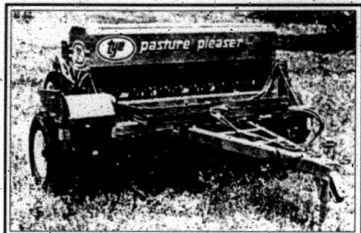

7. The successful bidder shall at their own expense carry fire and extended coverage insurance on the collateral and any improvements from the date of sale until the purchase price is fully paid.
8. The sale shall be made subject to all easements, set back lines, restrictions or covenants of record or otherwise and shall be sold as is.
