County gives \$1 for house and lot

Is it any wonder the federal government is in bad financial shape?

Tuesday, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court learned that their bid of \$1.00 for a house and lot on U.S. 25 south of Mt. Vernon at Calloway had been approved.

Last week, Mrs. Ruth Martin, a representative of Daniel Boone Development Council met with the court to inform them that the federal government's Housing and Urban Development agency had foreclosed on the house in Rockcastle County.

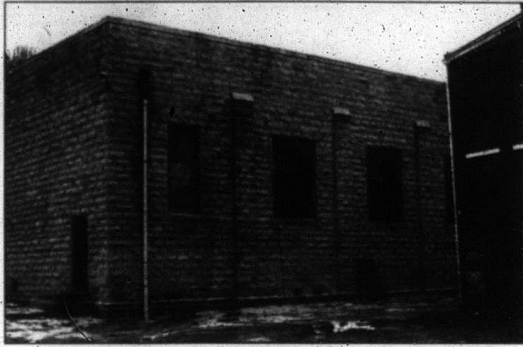
The federal government placed the house with a realtor in California and six months passed without it being sold.

Because of the fact that the house had not been sold for six months, it became eligible for a government program, in which government agencies and community action agencies such as Daniel Boone could bid on the house.

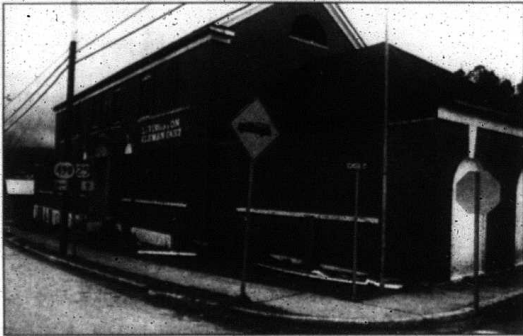
The county did so and will now turn the property over to Daniel Boone.

Local Daniel Boone Director Betty Bussell said Wednesday that Daniel Boone would renovate the property and sell it to a low income family in Rockcastle County.

The federal government's loss will be a local family's gain, she said.



The county is in the process of renovating the former Livingston School gym and will turn the facility over to the City of Livingston once completed.



There is still a lot of work to do on the former Livingston School property which is evidenced by the top photo, but once the gymnasium has been renovated it will be turned over to the city for community events.

Thanks to \$100,000 grant Work continues on Livingston School

Renovation continues of the former Livingston School property.

This week workers are in the process of putting down a new hardwood floor in the gymnasium, which will cost approximately \$17,000.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court is using a \$100,000 grant to begin renovation of the gymnasium and the former four room classroom building on the property, which will be turned over to the city of Livingston in the next few weeks.

The city of Livingston will use the classroom building as the new city hall.

The county has put a new roof on the classroom building and on the gymnasium.

"We are trying to stretch the \$100,000 as far as we can and we are using work release prisoners and every other resource that we can find," said Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis.

Besides the new roofs, the county has also replaced the windows in the classroom building, painted the interior there and are in the process of putting up new doors in that facility.

At one point the Daniel Boone Development Council owned the

property thanks to a \$40,000 state grant.

Daniel Boone was never able to secure the proper funding to renovate the property in a community center and last year the county took over ownership.

"In a perfect world we would go in there and spend whatever it took to fix the structure back to its original state, but we don't have those funds at the current time," Carlotis said.

Once the gymnasium is finished it will also be turned over to the city.

The city will be able to use the gym for whatever need arises, such as fund raisers for the fire department and community events," he said.

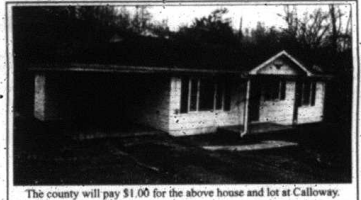
The actual school structure will be kept in a state of preservation until some other funding comes along, or until someone with money takes an interest in it, according to Carlotis.

Livingston school was closed in 1994 when the Rockcastle County School system created the middle school.

Students from Livingston were transferred to Mt. Vernon.

Livingston High School was incorporated along with Mt. Vernon and Brodhead High

3 local school administrators to retire in coming months

Three Rockcastle County school system administrators have announced their intentions

to retire. School system finance officer Richard Bray, who also handles

personnel for the school system, told the Rockcastle County Board of Education on Tuesday that Mrs. Claudinna Cash, Shelby Reynolds and Onna K. Owens had decided to retire.

Cash, who is the school system's District Assessment Coordinator and Supervisor will retire effective July 1st.

Reynolds, who is the school system's Instructional Supervisor will retire effective September 1st. Owens, one of the two assistant principals at the Rockcastle County Middle School, will also retire effective September 1st.

Superintendent Larry Hammond said Wednesday that he would post all three jobs in the near future, even though it will be sometime before all of the retirements take effect.

The board also approved the revised calendar for this school year.

Local man killed in Friday wreck

Last Friday Ronald K. Rash, 50, of Mt. Vernon died in a single car wreck on U.S. 25, four miles south of Mt. Vernon.

According to Kentucky State Police, Rash was driving a 1994 Toyota pick-up north on U.S. 25 when his vehicle dropped off the right shoulder of the roadway.

State Trooper Coby Smith said that Rash apparently overcorrected, causing him to lose control of his vehicle which crossed both lanes of travel, striking the earth embankment on the southbound shoulder and then overturned onto its top.

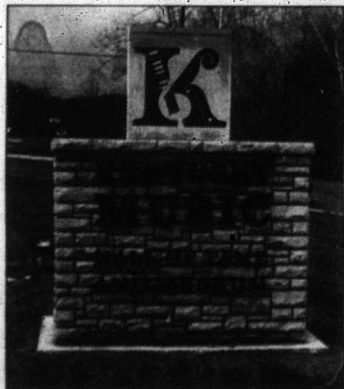
Rockcastle County EMS trans-

ported Ronald K. Rash to the Rockcastle County Hospital where he later died from the injuries.

Smith reported that seatbelts were not in use at the time of the accident. Rash was the seventh person to lose his life on Rockcastle County roadways in 2002.

Of the seven people to die, Rash and 15-year-old Aaron Poynter are the only local people to lose their lives.

An elderly Michigan couple, two college students from Ohio and a Lexington woman all died in wrecks on I-75.

Saturday, March 30th, my husband and I were traveling Big Hill Road, and we noticed that someone had built this dog a shelter from the rainy and cold weather. Someone was

even thoughtful enough to place a mat outside the entrance, and left a funnel coat inside for the dog to lie on. There is a bucket, to the right of the shelter full of water. Outside the shelter there is literally a buffet of dog food, table scraps, fast food and as I had one photo left, a man stopped on the side of the road to give the dog, Kentucky Fried Chicken.

It is amazing how many people

have shown the same concern that I have for this animal. Different people are stopping several times a day, to give this dog food and water. But the fact cannot be ignored that this dog needs a loving home. I do not know how much longer the dog will survive on the side of Big Hill with all the heavy traffic passing by each day. The other option is the animal shelter, which the dog will have about the same chances as finding a good home there.

The dog looks to be two years old, and appears to be pretty healthy. The dog is approachable, but is shy and doesn't seem to be very trusting. I hope with these photos, and information I've provided, will help to find this dog a good home, or urge the owners to take responsibility for their dog and take it home.

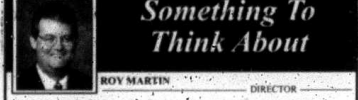

Something To Think About

IMPORTANCE OF PLANNING

Often one works for a lifetime, makes countless sacrifices, and does a great deal of planning in order to provide financial security for one's heirs. On the other hand, often too little time and thought is spent on other considerations involving one's survivors.

What should be done in the event of one's death is of primary importance. It is a difficult enough time for spouse and close relatives without having to make decisions regarding your wishes - particularly if these have

never been expressed. Discuss the subject openly and honestly, include your wishes in written form (called Letter of Instruction).

Plus ahead concerning other matters. Should the survivor stay where he or she is and live alone? Would it be better to move in with grown children, another relative, a friend, a retirement community? Unless this type of question is explored and answered, one has not fully provided for one's survivors.

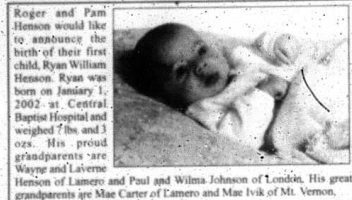

Approximately 3 million children are reported abused and neglected in this country each year. A year in the life of Kentucky's kids: 6,100 are physically abused; 14,000 suffer from neglect; 1,700 are sexually abused; 2,400 are emotionally or psychologically abused; 18 children die from maltreatment and in the 28,000 confirmed cases of child maltreatment, 23,000 of the perpetrators are one or both of the child's own parents.*

What you can do to help prevent child abuse is:

1. Be a nurturing parent.
2. Help a friend, neighbor or relative if they are having difficulties with their children.
3. Get involved - be an advocate for services to help families.
4. Volunteer at a local child abuse program.

For social service agencies, schools, churches, civic organizations, law enforcement agencies and the business community, contact The Development and Communications Department of Kentucky Baptist Homes for Children for assistance. 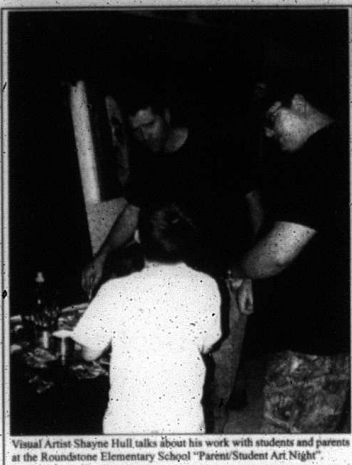

RCMS students work with NASA

RCMS students in Mr. Mattingly's science class are currently participating in two initiatives sponsored by NASA. The first involves students in ongoing climate research. Students work with NASA to study how clouds affect the Earth's energy balance. Part of a long-term satellite experiment, the NASA's Student Cloud Observations On-Line (SCOOOL) activity consists of over 1000 schools worldwide gathering data about clouds.

Students take cloud measurements when the satellite passes overhead. The satellite uses its vantage point from space to provide global data on the Earth's energy balance and how clouds affect it. RCMS and other SCOOOL students send their

data to a NASA computer. The students' observations are then compared to those from the satellite. This ground truth data helps calibrate the satellite and refine the scientists' computer models.

Sixth-grade students were trained in August on how to collect the cloud data. Since that time students have provided NASA with over 100 valuable data points. In fact, Mr.

Mattingly's classes made the top 10 observers list for August.

The second initiative involves preparing satellite mirrors to be launched into earth orbit. As participants in project Starshine, Mr. Mattingly's students received three mirrors that they needed to polish. They began by using aluminum oxide to grind the mirrors flat. Then they used two different sizes of diamond polishing paste to create a mirrored surface. These mirrors are sent back to Starshine headquarters, where they are placed on the surface of a satellite.

The satellite is scheduled for launch in January 2003. After launch, observers all over the world will be able to track the satellite based on the reflection of sunlight off its mirrors. This reflection will enable scientists to determine the height of the satellite, as well as the height of the atmosphere.

These two projects allow students at RCMS to participate in science research at a national level. Congratulations to these students as they participate in the advancement of science!

Roundstone host "Arts Night"

On Thursday, March 28, Roundstone Elementary School hosted the "Parent/Student Art Night" with over 300 participants in attendance. "Arts Night" is an annual event at Roundstone celebrating "March-Youth Art Month." This year visual artist Shayne Hull spent the day with fourth and fifth graders conducting an artist residency. In the evening Hull exhibited examples of his work and demonstrated his painting style while parents and students tested their skills in painting, drawing and clay work.

Shayne Hull lives and works in Louisville, where he is currently the Director of Education for the Kentucky Art and Craft Foundation. His paintings have been seen in group and solo exhibitions in Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Indiana, Texas and Kentucky, including the Water Tower Annual and "Genesis" at the Gallery on the Square in Frankfort and Kentucky Visions at the Governor's Mansion in Frankfort. He is the recent recipient of an Al Smith Artists Fellowship from the Kentucky Arts Council and is an instructor at Jefferson Community College.

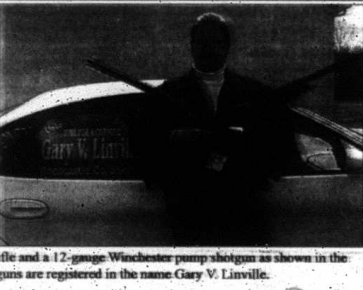

Students benefit from state financial aid

Rockcastle County students received \$827,734 in need-based state grants, merit-based Kentucky Educational Excellence scholarships (KEES), and low-interest student loans to help pay for college or technical training during the 2000-01 school year.

Of that amount, Rockcastle County students received 141 College Access Program (CAP) Grants totaling \$135,105; 63 Kentucky Tuition Grants (KTG) totaling \$67,572; 103 KEES awards totaling \$76,787; and 127 Federal Stafford Loans totaling \$528,270.

In addition to KEES, CAP, KTG and Federal Stafford Loans, the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) administers the Teacher Scholarship, Osteopathic Medicine Scholarship, KHEAA Work-Study, Kentucky Education Savings Plan Trust, Federal PLUS Loan for parents, and Federal Consolidation Loan programs.

KHEAA also provides free planning materials to students and families. KHEAA's Getting It Contains facts on admissions, costs, academic majors and major financial aid programs for Kentucky postsecondary schools. Three brochures that are particularly helpful are Student Fi-

nanacial Aid Programs, which briefly describes KHEAA's aid programs; Top 10 Student Financial Aid Tips, which can help students learn how to find and apply for financial aid; and Surf the Net, which lists the Web addresses for Kentucky colleges and universities and other sites that provide free higher education and student financial aid information.

KHEAA's website www.kheaa.com also contains a wealth of information, including links to free scholarship searches, college aid and loan repayment calculators; and Adults Returning to School. KHEAA's online higher education guide for nontraditional students.

Affordable, Higher Education, a financial aid reference book with over 2,700 sources of aid specifically for Kentucky students, can also be found on KHEAA's website, in public and school libraries, and at high school guidance offices.

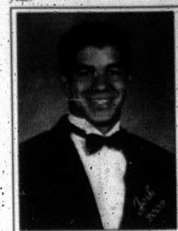
Josh Hale is recipient of Georgetown Scholarship

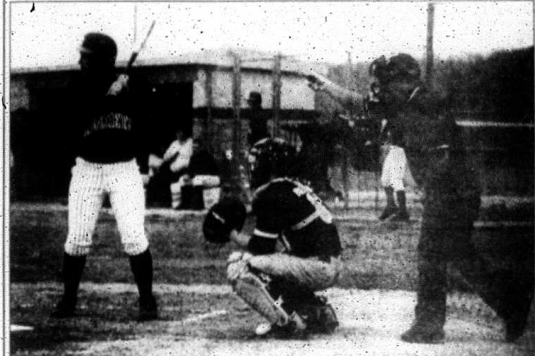

National Infant Immunization Week is April 14th - 20th

Immunization is one of the most effective ways of protecting your children against disease. Since the introduction of vaccines, the level of vaccine-preventable disease has been reduced by more than 99%.

Babies need vaccinations to protect against several dangerous diseases: Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis, Polio, Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Chickenpox, Hepatitis B and Hib Meningitis. Each year, children who are not fully protected against these diseases become sick and some die. A series of vaccines by the age of 2 can protect against these diseases. This requires multiple doses of vaccine given in about five visits to a health care provider.

National Infant Immunization Week (NIWW), April 14-20, is a good time to focus on the importance of getting your children immunized, not only to protect the individual child, but also to protect the health of the entire community. The more children who are immune to these preventable childhood illnesses, the less risk there is for those in the community who may be vulnerable to diseases from the very young to the very old - those with weakened immune systems and those without access to immunization services.

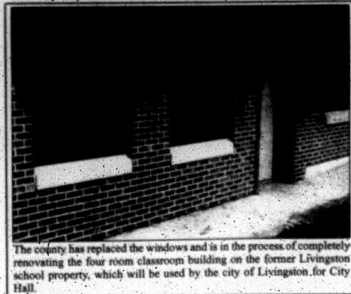

Tenant can be evicted for drugs

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette has notified local law enforcement officials of a recent United States Supreme Court Decision upholding the rights of landlords to evict persons involved with narcotics. In his letter, Burdette requests law enforcement to notify landlords if any tenants, or their tenants, or their tenants' guests are involved in a narcotic related activities.

Burdette's letter suggests that landlords may evict families if any family member or guest is involved in narcotics, according to the lease language.

"It is our duty to keep the landlords apprised of their tenants' unlawful activities, or their guests' unlawful activities, so they might take the appropriate action of eviction. Some of our public housing situation are becoming "hot beds" of criminal wrong doing, and the Supreme Court has sided with the rights of cleaning it up," Burdette's letter stated.

The Supreme Court has strengthened the landlord's right to evict by recently affirming rules that allow evictions of families from public housing when family members or their guests are involved in illegal drug activity. Congress had already enacted procedures to allow these types of evictions; however the laws had been challenged, which ultimately led the case to the Supreme Court. The court found that these aggressive eviction policies were reasonable, and upheld the laws.

Place of entertainment must have permit

Local Law Enforcement has statutory authority to close places of entertainment, if those places of business fail to have state mandated permits, according to County Attorney Jeff Burdette.

KRS 211.020 state that, "No place of entertainment shall be operated outside the corporate limits of a city unless its owner or manager has a permit, issued to them by the County Judge/Executive in the county, in which the place of entertainment is located, granting to him the privilege to operate the place of entertainment in that county."

This includes, but is not limited to, pool/billiards, music, dancing, pinball or even exercise and weightlifting, according to the County Attorney's office. "Even though these provisions have not been frequently enforced, the potential exists and law enforcement may enter those businesses, shut them down and the courts can impose stiff fines and jail sentences. It appears this is beginning to occur and business owners should now make sure their permits are up to date," Burdette said.

The permitting process is relatively simple and requires the completion of an application at the County Clerk's office, an investigation of the applicant's background, and a hearing before the County Judge who ultimately decides to grant or deny the permit. Anyone who desires to oppose the granting of a permit must do so in writing to the County Judge, and then must appear at the hearing to oppose it in person.

The County Judge must exercise his reasonable discretion, taking into consideration all relevant facts and evidence which reasonably relate to the issuing of the permit, bearing in mind that the public interest must be carefully weighed in the process. According to opinions of the Attorney General, state law prohibits that no permit shall be issued to a person who is not of a good moral character, or who will not, in the judgement of the court, obey the law of the state in carrying on the business. Finally, the County Judge shall fix reasonable hours of operation for places of entertainment throughout the county.

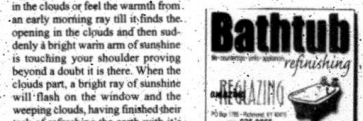

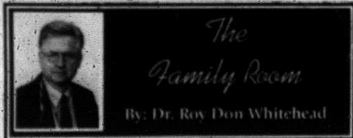

The Family Room

Would You Pay More Taxes?

I read a most interesting newspaper article which stated that "Americans do not want to pay more taxes." That would seem a fairly logical conclusion, but my contrarian mind began working almost immediately. I asked myself, "For what would I be willing to pay more taxes? Are there some things so important to me that I would be willing to see my tax bill increase?" I decided that there are a few things that are that important.

I would pay more taxes so that each American could have health insurance. It is a shame that the most powerful and prominent nation in the world does not have universal health coverage, when other countries do provide that for their citizens. Often the ones who do not have coverage are the "working poor," those who are employed but, who do not make enough to afford health insurance. "I can't afford to go to the doctor" is not a statement; I think an American should have to make, and I am willing to pay, more taxes to make that statement a relic of the past.

I would pay more taxes so that each American who chose to could attend two years of training beyond high school. This might be at a college, technical college, business college, or other technical training program. Companies move into areas that provide plenty of skilled labor. Computers and other technical innovations make it difficult to succeed in the business market without education beyond high school. More college graduates will attract more businesses to our area, thereby making more jobs available. At least some of these jobs will pay good wages so that a couple can afford to own and raise a family.

As long as I am on the kick of reforming the tax code, I recommend

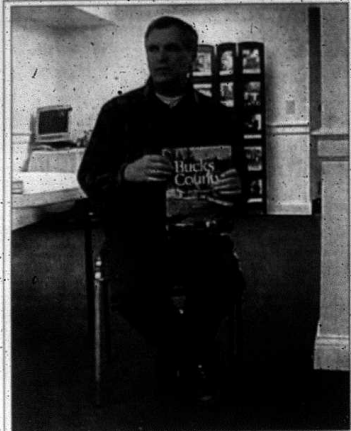
other changes that will help families. Families should be allowed to deduct all of their medical expenses, not just a portion as is currently the case. As one who has been hit hard by medical expenses in the past year, I have learned first-hand what it is and is not deductible. A family may deduct only the part of their medical expenses that exceeds 7% of their income. In other words if the family makes \$30,000, the first \$2100 of medical expenses is not deductible. Elimination of this crazy requirement will help families who find themselves overburdened by medical expenses.

Currently families can deduct the automobile mileage that they accumulate while receiving medical treatment, but only at the rate of ten cents per mile. A business-person may deduct his business mileage at the rate of 32.5 cents per mile. Does the IRS think it costs less to operate a car going to the hospital than going to a business meeting? Medical deductions should equal business deductions.

Also, a family cannot deduct expenses for meals that are eaten on the way to medical appointments. They may deduct mileage and lodging but not meals.

Again, the comparison with the business people is instructive. Business people may deduct meals when they go out of town on business. Why not let families deduct expenses for meals too? They must act just as the business person must.

Other lawmakers need to be reminded that families need help just as much as corporations do.

Burley Tobacco Leasing

The MQ-24, Notice of Acres, Bases, Yields, Allotments, and/or Quotas, for burley tobacco are scheduled to be mailed to producers on Friday, April 5, 2002.

Producers may begin leasing quota on Monday, April 8th.

Tobacco Spot Checks

Producers who have reported unmarketed tobacco stored on the farms are subject for random spot checks. Spot checks are performed by local FSA personnel to verify the amount of tobacco reported. These spot checks will be carried out in the next few months. If you have moved tobacco from where you first reported the storage, please contact FSA to report the new location.

Non-Insurable Assistance Program (NAP) Applications

Due by April 18.

Producers have until April 18, 2002, to apply for coverage for certain eligible crops under the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Noninsured Crop Disaster Program (NAP). This deadline applies to 2001

and 2002 crops for which the coverage period would normally have begun prior to March 19, 2002, or within 60 days after March 19, 2002. Along with submitting an application for coverage, producers must pay applicable service fees and provide a certification of prior crop year production for the crop by April 18, 2002.

The deadline for submitting an application for payment for 2001 crop losses is the 2002 acreage reporting date for the crop.

Producers seeking NAP coverage of eligible crops are encouraged to contact their local USDA Service Center prior to the deadline to identify applicable crops and file an application. Producers are reminded there are no late-file provisions for submitting applications for coverage after April 18, 2002.

NAP producers financial assistance to producers for eligible crop losses and prevented planting due to natural disasters. Eligible crops are those for which the Catastrophic level of Federal crop insurance is not available and include those produced for food, livestock feed, fiber, mushrooms, floriculture, honey, maple-sap, aquaculture (including ornamental fish), Christmas tree crops, gingiv, ornamental nursery and turfgrass sod.

Farm Changes

Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA of

face of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership. Farms involving corn and/or wheat must be properly constituted by June 1, 2002 with farms involving burley tobacco being constituted by July 1, 2002.

Designation by Landowner Method

Burley tobacco farm divisions may be made by owner designation beginning with the 2001 crop year. The designation by landowner method of dividing a farm as the division of contract acres, allotment, or quotas in the manner AGREED by all parent farm owner(s) and farm purchases of transferees. Sellers must have owned the farm for three years prior to the date of designation by landowner method. The County Committee may waive the three-year ownership requirement of either of the following apply:

- COA determines the sale was not primarily to keep or sell allotments, quotas or contract acres.
- Land sold will be devoted to nonagricultural, recreational, residential or industrial use.

The designation by landowner method may be used when any of the following apply:

- Part of a farm or tract is sold or ownership is transferred.
- An entire farm or tract is sold to 2 or more persons.
- Farm or tract ownership is transferred to 2 or more persons.

With the designation by landowner method the 1,000 pound rule also applies when there is a change in ownership. Thus, if a resulting farm has less than 1,000 pounds of tobacco quota the owner shall either:

- Purchase additional quota to make 1,000 pounds
- Sell the quota.
- Combine the quota with another farm to make 1,000 pounds.

An FSA-155 Request for Farm Reconstitution shall be signed by ALL sellers, buyers and if applicable, the holder or the deed of trust, lien holder, or mortgage holder.

Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP)

Producers who retain beneficial interest in a commodity eligible for a loan or a loan deficiency payment

are eligible for payment if all of the following remains with the producer: control of the commodity, risk of loss, title of the commodity, crops must have been produced on contract acreage (AMTA).

FSA realizes that many farmers may begin feeding, thus the loss of beneficial interest occurs. Anyone who has lost title, risk and control of the crop, is NOT eligible for benefits.

Final loan and LDP availability dates for the 2001 crop are:

Barley, Oats and Wheat - March 31, 2002.

Corn, Grain Sorghum and Soybeans - May 31, 2002.

Weight Reporting

Small grains (wheat) crop reporting can now be completed at the FSA office after they are planted. Wheat crops reporting must be on file by May 31, 2002. All other crop reporting must be on file by May 15, 2002.

FY 2002 PFC Reminder

Producers who wish to receive their 2002 PFC (Production Flexibility Contract) payments early must sign a form for what month you wish to receive your 2002 payment. The deadline to sign or revise a PFC for FY 2002 is August 1, 2002.

Do not request a payment for your farm if you are considering selling a portion or the entire farm. Changes in your farming operation must be reported timely in order to reflect PFC payments to the current crop year producer.

All changes reflected on the CCC-478, Application for PFC Payment, must be signed by August 1, 2002. For additional information on the PFC program contact the FSA office.
