Judge rules against 911 lawsuit

Last week Rockiestle Circuit Judge Dan venters ruled against a local nan's lawrait which he had brought against Rockeastle 911. Venters issued a livo page order concerning Michael Sheliga's appeal and request for financial recovery from 911.

Sheliga was originally denied certain 911 recordings that Rockepate County, Atomey Jeff Burdene had argued would unnecessarily reveal a caller's identity. The Kentucky Atomey General's office had earlier agreed with Burdene's position, but Sheliga appealed to the Circuit Court. Burdene had argued that revealing such information would have a 'chilling effect' on those who may otherwise, all to report suspicious behavior, or to report criminal activity.

The case involved the matter where Sheliga was engaged by police for walking about Mt. Vernori with what he alleges was a bag of white rice, on trick or treat night of last year. According to Burdette, Sheliga's behavior apparently led a caller or proport to 911 a person carrying a white substance on the streets acting senticients?

white substance on the streets acting suppcisously. Judge Venters denied Sheligas's request for costs, and indicate that it appeared Sheligas's frustration was the result of the stop and questioning by police, rather than his ability to obtain the 911 transcript.
