

3 indicted by local Grand Jury

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down three indictments on Friday.

Carl Jason Caldwell, 19, of Brodhead was indicted on a charge of third degree assault.

He is accused of assaulting Mt. Vernon police officer Barry Adams on February 25th at the Bluegrass Inn.

According to police, Adams was at the apartment on another call, when he noticed Adams was hiding from him because there was an outstanding warrant against him.

Police say Caldwell was apparently "slipped up" at the time and assaulted Adams before running off.

Michael Ray Saylor, 20, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on one count of theft by unlawful taking.

He is accused of taking property belonging to Jeff and Trina Burdette of Renfro Valley on a period of about a month. Police say that Saylor had access to the Burdette's home because he was dating a niece of Trina Burdette's who was babysitting for the couple.

Rosecoe Smith, 39, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on one count of setting fire to land owned by another.

A Junction City man is being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center after he was arrested, on Tuesday night.

According to court records, Brodhead, Police Officer William Harris arrested West and charged him with possession of two pounds of processed marijuana, possession of drug paraphernalia and driving under the influence.

Harris reported that the marijuana was found in Glenn A. West's car, after he was stopped for possible drunk driving.

West, 41, is due in court on Monday and has no posted bond.

Judge rules against 911 lawsuit

Last week Rockcastle Circuit Judge Van Veners ruled against local Tom's lawsuit which he had brought against Rockcastle 911.

Veners issued a two page order concerning Michael Sheliga's appeal and request for financial recovery from 911.

Sheliga was originally denied certain 911 recordings that Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette had argued would unnecessarily reveal a caller's identity. The Kentucky Attorney General's office had earlier agreed with Burdette's position, but Sheliga appealed to the Circuit Court.

Burdette had argued that revealing such information would have a "chilling effect" on those who may otherwise call to report suspicious behavior, or to report criminal activity.

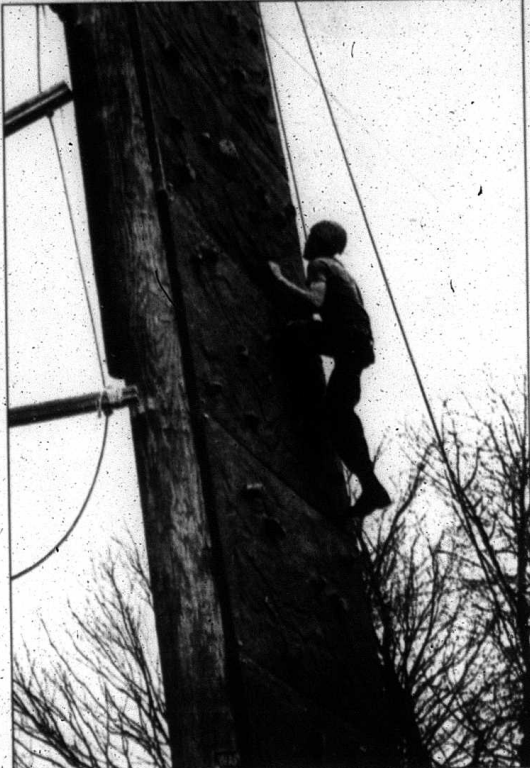
The case involved the matter where Sheliga was engaged by police for walking about Mt. Vernon with what he alleges was a bag of white rice, on trick-or-treat night of last year. According to Burdette, Sheliga's behavior apparently led a caller to report to 911 a person carrying a white substance on the streets acting suspiciously.

Judge Veners denied Sheliga's request for costs, and indicated that it appeared Sheliga's frustration was the result of the stop and questioning by police, rather than his ability to obtain the 911 transcripts.

Sheliga said Wednesday that he would file a motion asking Veners to reconsider his motion and that if that was denied he would take his case to the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

One Rockcastle family is a direct descendant of Boone

Daniel Boone is the essence of the American hero: the man of action, the pathfinder, the leader in that great adventure of his age - the westward expansion of the American frontier.

Born in Pennsylvania on what was then the western edge of civilization, Boone showed even as a boy extraordinary skill in hunting and exploration as well as an instinct for survival.

Too restless for the life of a farmer, he needed no urging to "go west" in search of adventure and better hunting. In 1769 he made his first explorations of Kentucky, bringing back tales of that hunters' paradise that stirred the imagination of many.

The rapid growth of the eastern colonies had created pressures that made westward expansion irresist-

ible. Daniel Boone was a natural leader in that movement, clearing trails and guiding settlers across the mountains, establishing forts, fighting Indians. But he was also a lover of wilderness who continually retreated before the advance of civilization that he had helped promote.

One Rockcastle County family has ties to the famous pioneer. They are the Boones of Pingo, a Rockcastle County place that the great pioneer would have surely loved.

Daniel Boone and Rebecca Boone Mays, both named for their ancestors, are two of four Boone children. Marcella Boone Lovell, Susella Boone, Rebecca and Daniel are the

children of Brent and Jean Croirer Boone. Their great grandfather, William Clifton Boone, was a sixth generation descendant of Daniel Boone. He was well known in Rockcastle County because of the fact that he carried the mail on Star Route two.

Police use tip to make arrests

Two Crab Orchard men and a Berea man were arrested last week in connection with a drive-by shooting in Rockcastle County in March. Brothers Henry Baker, 32, and Benny Baker, 35, of Crab Orchard, were charged at their residence by Rockcastle Deputy Aaron Matthews and Deputy Ronnie Roark on a charge of conspiracy to commit murder. Floyd Neeley, 30, of Berea, was also charged with attempted murder the next day.

According to Rockcastle County Sheriff Shirley Smith, information was obtained by Deputy Matthews last Thursday, that linked the three suspects to the shooting on Negro Creek on March 10.

Melissa Carmen Lawson, 23, was shot twice in the drive-by shooting, according to police. She was one of six people in the house when the shooting occurred at approximately 1:30 a.m.

Smith said that at least 13 shots were fired into the house that night. All three men are lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center. Henry Baker is being held on a \$50,000 cash bond as is Neeley. Benny Baker had a \$25,000 cash bond. All three men will appear in court on Monday.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's department assisted in the investigation and arrests.

Fall election likely to be the most interesting

This fall's General Election in Rockcastle County may prove to be more interesting than the Primary election underway now.

This fall, Rockcastle County voters will decide members of city councils, three Mayor seats and two members of the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

Republican State Representative Danny Ford will also face off against former Lincoln County Attorney Democrat J. Paul Long.

State Senator, Democrat Ed Worky, will also face former State Senator Republican Harry Metcalf.

After the state drew district lines earlier this year Rockcastle was put in with Madison County, which is currently represented in the state by Worley.

The school board races will be in districts one and three. Board chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith is the incumbent in district one and Sam Stallsworth, who is a candidate for Sheriff in the May Primary, is the incumbent in district three.

Anyone running for school board must be 24 years of age and have been a resident of Kentucky for the past three years. They must also have twenty signatures from registered voters in their district and pay \$20.00.

One local man, Matt Boyan, 27, a former Mt. Vernon police officer has filed for that city council race.

To file for Mayor or council seats in the county, a candidate must have the signature of two registered voters and pay a fee of \$20.00.

Adams is candidate

Four people have already filed for Mt. Vernon Mayor.

They are incumbent Karen King; council members Clirice Kirby and Jackie Renner and Jody Adams.

Adams, a newcomer to politics, is a resident of the Respiratory Care Unit at Rockcastle Hospital. But don't let that bother you. He knows what's going on and he knows how city governments are suppose to work.

Adams, who has been at Rockcastle Hospital for the past five years, suffers from muscular dystrophy (MD), a progressive muscle dis-

order caused by a defect in one or more genes that control muscle function.

Adams, 26, is a native of Nicholasville and believes that the City of Mt. Vernon should work harder to cooperate with other county government agencies to make Mt. Vernon a better place to live and work.

In an interview Tuesday, Adams said that he wanted to give something back to the people and it was obvious that he couldn't join the Army, so he decided to run for Mayor.

Adams said he had the time to devote to being a full time Mayor and that he had always wanted to get into politics.

"Politics go way back in my family," he said. "My great grandfather was a Tax Commissioner in the 1830's," he said.

Adams said he also had an ancestor, who was a Scottish lawyer, who

The library itself is under the direction of the Rockcastle County Library Board.

I'm ashamed to tell it, but the truth is that I hadn't seen my Aunt Oma Adams in over 20 years.

We talked on the phone once in a while the last time at Christmas last year and I kept promising that I was coming to see her. To sit on her porch near the head of Camp Branch and just visit, face-to-face instead of using the phone conversations, because neither one of us was much good on the phone where both of us asked "What?" a lot—"Whad-yay?"

I started having hearing problems when I was 40. Too much Bluegrass and Rock & Roll cranked up way too loud through headphones. Too many front-row seats at concerts between banks of speakers driven at too many thousands of watts.

Walk up to me to the mall or on the street or call me right now and my reaction will be "Whad-yay-say?" The last time I talked to her, Aunt Oma was concerned about my hearing because, at 85, she could hear much better than me. We talked about children—her great nieces and nephews and we reminisced a bit about who was where and what they were doing. Just the stuff that families do to keep up with each other.

On the last in my living room there is a nice big clock about a foot square that Aunt Oma and her daughter-in-law, Mercedes, my cousin Johnny Ray's wife, gave to Loreita and me for a wedding present.

Every time I look at that clock, I am reminded of Aunt Oma. At least a hundred times I've told visitors how we came about it.

Aunt Oma will be buried Tuesday alongside my Uncle Raymond on Camp Branch in Leitcher County. She was 86 years old and I am reminded of the old hymn that goes "When the saint's got marching in, Oh, Lord I want to be in that number one" because there is no doubt in my mind that my Aunt Oma is among the saints just now.

To make the news a bit more upbeat, Paint Lick Reflections Vol. 1, #1, is out off the press and the reviews are so complimentary that Rita has a red face. "Printed on stock so heavy that the magazine weighs a quarter pound, the premier issue is destined to be a collectors' item."

Rita stuck her neck out and printed 800 copies. About 200 are left and she will send you one for a measly \$5 bucks. Patriot Tree Project to memorialize 9/11 victims

which ran from Lane Post Office at Stagger Creek to Mt. Vernon on horseback for 15 years.

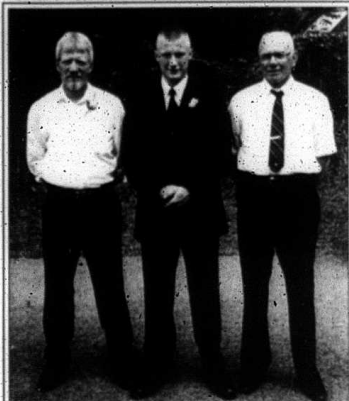
The Boone's grandfather, J.T. Boone (now deceased), was a seventh generation descendant and Brent Boone is an eighth generation descendant.

There is a continuing movement in this country to have marijuana legalized under the guise of medical treatment needs. This argument has absolutely no merit since there is a synthetic form of the drug that can be prescribed by doctors for cancer patients and others who suffer pain. This drug acts to increase appetite and provides some tranquilizing effects for anxiety.

Marijuana that was grown in the U.S. was once considered inferior because of a low concentration of THC, the chemical responsible for the effects. In 1974, the THC content was less than 1% in 1994, potency averaged 5%. Today the potency ranges up to 17%. This change is due to hybridization of the plants and the exclusive use of more potent strains (plants without seed). The marijuana is also being laced with PCP (angel dust), an extremely dangerous drug, often associated with violent behaviors and sudden death.

Marijuana contains known toxins and cancer causing chemicals, increasing the risk of lung cancer six times that of a cigarette smoker. Unfortunately, most marijuana smokers do smoke cigarettes. Other health problems include bronchitis, emphysema, asthma and suppression of the immune system with increased potential for life threatening diseases. The long term use has definite effects on personality, decreasing ambition and drive and losing the ability to concentrate. An ability that is absolutely necessary in learning

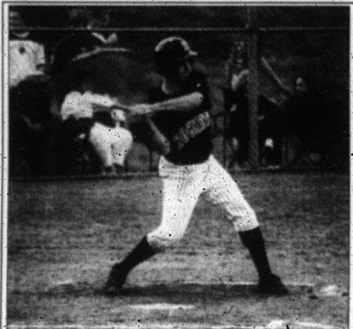

The RGHS track and field teams recently competed in the Patriot Games hosted by Lincoln County High School. Twenty teams from around the state were on-hand for the annual competition. The meet itself took over six hours to complete.

The RGHS girls' team sought their third straight Patriot Games title, after the loss of six seniors from last year's state-runner-up team.

Many of the top teams from the area were present including the second-ranked team in Class 3A - Lafayette and the top-ranked team in Class A - Danville.

The girls had many solid perfor-

mances, despite appearing a little out of shape coming back from the spring break layoff. In a tightly contested meet throughout, the girls held on to the top Lafayette by a score of 95-91 for their third straight Patriot Games title. Danville finished 3rd overall.

Freshman Heather Hammond led RGHS with many outstanding performances. Heather was the leading scorer in the entire meet, including all males and females, with 32 points. She narrowly missed winning the meet MVP award which was shared by a couple of other athletes with record-breaking meet performances. In the 400-meter dash, Heather placed 3rd overall in 1:05.1. Immediately after the 400, Heather ran her first ever 300-meter hurdle race. She finished in spectacular fashion with an awesome time of 51.9 seconds and a 2nd place finish. In the high jump competition, the easily outdistanced her competitors and placed first with a jump of 5'0". Heather also placed

2nd in the long jump competition with a leap of 15'4".

Senior Clarissa Hubbard easily had the most impressive single performance for an RGHS competitor. In the discus competition, Clarissa shattered her own RGHS record with an unbelievable effort of 122'. This was more than 7' better than her previous best. She was defeated only by last year's state champion from Casey County. Clarissa also threw well in the shot out competition. She finished 6th overall with a throw of 30' 8.5". Senior teammate Doris Bismark fared well in her first competition over. She placed 21st in shot put with a throw of 21'8.75". In the discus competition, Doris also threw very well and finished 11th with a throw of 69'.

Sophomore Sheena Swinney and freshman Johanna Abney competed in the 100 and 200-meter dashes. Both girls ran spectacular races in the 100. Sheena finished 2nd overall in 13.4 seconds, while Johanna placed 8th in 14.2 seconds. In the 200-meter dash, Sheena captured third with an exceptional time of 27.9 seconds. Johanna also ran very well and placed 10th in 29.3 seconds. Sheena also ran the 400-meter dash and placed 9th overall in 1:07.

New format and purse for The Winston

There's a record purse, with 20 additional laps added to The Winston, NASCAR's annual all-star event at Lowe's Motor Speedway in Charlotte, May 18.

The Winston will be 90 laps long and consists of three segments of 40, 30 and 20 laps. The field will be inverted (either four, six, eight or 10 positions) for the final segment as determined by fan voting.

At present, the field for The Winston will be 26 cars - 19 race winners from 2001, two race winners from 2002, one NASCAR Winston Cup champion not otherwise exempt, one previous winner of The Winston not otherwise exempt, one car owner (No. 33 - Andy Petree) not otherwise exempt, the Winston Open winner and the No. 1 Bull Sprint winner.

The first segment will be 40 laps. Teams may pit if they wish. All laps count including caution laps. If a late-segment caution occurs, every effort will be made to ensure a green-flag finish.

late-segment caution occurs, every effort will be made to ensure a green-flag finish.

The top-20 finishers from the first segment will advance to the second segment.

The winner of the first segment will earn \$50,000.

There will be a 10-minute break following the first segment, at which time teams may change tires and make chassis adjustments without losing track position.

The field will be inverted (either four, six, eight or 10 positions) as determined by fan voting.

The third and final segment will be 20 laps.

The top-10 finishers in the second segment will compete in the third and final segment with the field inverted as determined by voting by the fans.

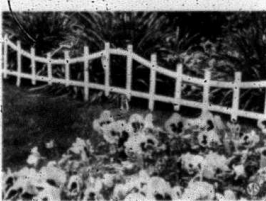

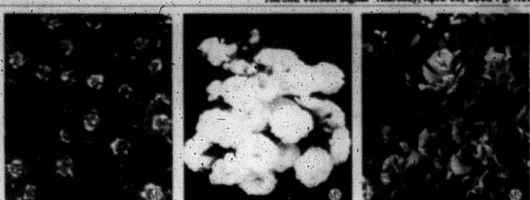

Add Peat For Better Compost This Season

(MS) — Recycling isn't just for newspapers and aluminum cans. Composting is a way to recycle your yard and kitchen waste and is a critical step in reducing the volume of garbage needlessly sent to landfills for disposal.

Nature has always recycled. Composting is what happens when leaves pile up in the fall and begin to decompose. Eventually the leaves are returned to the soil where the process continues as living roots reclaim the nutrients from the decomposed leaves. The art of composting has been around for centuries, but with the help of modern science, you can improve the quality of what biologists often refer to as "black gold."

It's easy to learn how to compost, and the benefits go beyond the nutrient-rich humus that is the final product (composting reduces yard waste, reduces yard work, preserves the environment and helps save money).

However, there are a couple of primary factors to consider. What kind of compost will meet your needs? Your garden retailer can help you decide. Bin placement is another consideration. It should be:

- Close to where it will be used and where it won't interfere with activities or offend neighbors.
- Away from drying winds.
- In partial sunlight to help heat it.

Some communities have composting guidelines, so it's important to check local authorities for these requirements. Whether you are a first-time or long-time composteer, here is a simple recipe for getting the most out of your compost.

Add 1 inch layer of peat moss to every 4 inches of composted material.

- Add water when needed (the center of the pile should be moist — not dry or soggy).
- To help cut down on odors, put a 2-inch peat moss cap on top of the pile.
- Using a garden fork, flip over the top layers of organic material every week or two and remember to cap with peat moss each time.

Follow these steps until the center of the compost pile is brown, crumbly and ready to mix into the garden.

Peat moss improves the composting process and is the secret ingredient in this recipe. When peat is used as a foundation for the compost bin, it speeds up decomposition, holds high proportions of water, controls odors, keeps a great cap and won't contribute to weed seeds or pathogens. Because it's acidic, peat will trap and save valuable nitrogen sources, which are often emitted from compost leachate in the form of ammonia.

When you mix the garden, this organic duo helps you save money by reducing the amount of water and fertilizer you need and lessens the soil allowing-site giving oxygen to reach the plant's roots. Because both peat and compost are completely natural, using these soil amendments will keep your yard and garden environmentally friendly. So go ahead and start recycling in your yard this spring.

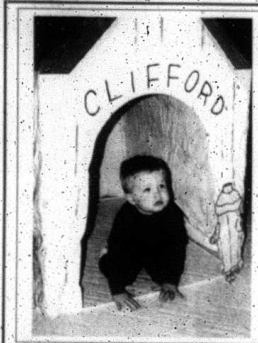

USDA Announces Final Tobacco Referenda Results

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced the final results on the referenda held during March among producers of various kinds of tobacco eligible for price support to determine whether they favored mandatory grading. A vote by a simple majority of eligible producer in favor was necessary for mandatory grading to become effective for the 2002 and subsequent marketing years.

The final referenda results indicate that 56% of flue-cured tobacco producers (types 11-14) and 75% of voted in favor of mandatory grading Producers of Kentucky-Tennessee fire-cured tobacco (types 22-23), Virginia fire-cured tobacco (type 21), Virginia sun-cured tobacco (types 37) and dark air-cured tobacco (types 35-36) all voted in favor of mandatory grading with votes in favor of 74, 77, 92 and 82% respectively.

Barley Tobacco Leasing
Producers may lease barley tobacco quota effective immediately through July 1st.

Tobacco Spot Checks
Producers who have reported unmarketed tobacco stored on the farms are subject for random spot checks. Spot checks are performed by local FSA personnel to verify the amount of tobacco reported. These spot checks will be carried out in the next few months. If you have moved tobacco from where you first reported the storage, please contact FSA to report the new location.

Non-Insurable Assistance Program (NAIP) Applications
Due by April 18

Producers have until April 18, 2002, to apply for coverage for certain eligible crops under the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Noninsured Crop Disaster Program (NAIP). This deadline applies to 2001 and 2002 crops for which the coverage period would normally have begun prior to March 19, 2002, or within 60 days after March 19, 2002. Along with submitting an application for coverage, producers must pay applicable service fees and provide a certification of prior crop year production for the crop-by April 18, 2002.

The deadline for submitting an application for payment for 2001 crop losses is the 2002 acreage reporting date for the crop.

Producers seeking NAIP coverage of eligible crops are encouraged to contact their local USDA-Service Center prior to the deadline to identify applicable crops and file an application. Producers are reminded there are no late-file provisions for submitting applications for coverage after April 18, 2002.

NAIP producers financial assistance to producers for eligible crop losses and prevented planting due to natural disasters. Eligible crops are

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those for which the catastrophic level of Federal crop insurance is not available and include those produced for food, livestock feed, fiber, mushrooms, horticulture, honey, maple sap, aquaculture (including ornamental fish), Christmas tree crops, ginseng, ornamental nursery and turfgrass sod.

Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP)

Producers of certain beneficial interest in a commodity eligible for a loan or a loan deficiency payment are eligible for payment if all of the following remain with the producers control of the commodity, risk of loss, title of the commodity, crops must have been produced on contract acreage (AMTA).

FSA realizes that many farmers may not be aware of the loss of beneficial interest occurs. Anyone who has lost title, risk and control of the crop is NOT eligible for benefits.

Final loan and LDP availability dates for the 2001 crop are:
Barley, Oats and Wheat - March 31, 2002.
Corn, Grain Sorghum and Soybeans - May 31, 2002.

Wheat Reporting
Small grains (wheat) crop reporting can now be completed at the FSA office after they are planted. Wheat crop reporting must be on file by May 31, 2002. All wheat crop reporting must be on file by July 15, 2002.

FY 2002 PFC Reminder
Producers who wish to receive their 2002 PFC (Production Flexibility Contract) payments early must sign a form for what month they wish to receive your 2002 payment. The deadline to sign or revise a PFC for FY 2002 is August 1, 2002.

Producers who request a payment for your farm if you are considering selling a portion or the entire farm. Changes in your farming operation must be reported timely in order to reflect PFC payments to the current crop year producer.
All changes reflected on the CCC-478, Application for PFC Payment, must be signed by August 1, 2002.

For additional information on the PFC program contact the FSA office.

Farm Changes

Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership. Farms involving corn and/or wheat must be properly coded, attested by June 1, 2002 with farms involving barley tobacco being constituted by July 1, 2002.

Overfilling prevention devices became mandatory on April 1

The propane industry's ongoing commitment to providing consumers with the most effective ways to safely fill propane cylinders has led to the development of the Overfilling Prevention Device (OPD). States across the country, including Kentucky, have adopted National Fire Protection Association regulations requiring all small propane cylinders (4-40 lbs.) be equipped with an OPD by April 1st.

"The Overfilling Prevention Device is another innovation from the propane industry that allows consumers to enjoy the many exceptional uses of propane in a safe, reliable manner," said Roger Parsons of Parsons Gas.

When an OPD-equipped cylinder is being filled, a valve within the cylinder closes when the designated liquid capacity of propane is reached. However, an OPD is a safety enhancement, not a primary filling device.

Propane cylinders manufactured after October 1998 already contain OPDs and are available in all 50 states. The OPD device is easily recognized by a unique triangular hand wheel that is used to open the valve on propane cylinders. If a cylinder does not contain a triangular hand wheel, it is obsolete and cannot be refilled. Obsolete propane cylinders

should never be abandoned or thrown in the trash. Local propane marketers should be contacted for proper disposal information.

"Obtaining an OPD-equipped tank or equipping your tank with an OPD device is a quick and easy process," according to Parsons. "There are a number of exchange centers or filling stations in our area that can help."

The OPD device will provide consumers additional peace of mind as they enjoy propane-fueled appliances such as gas grills. Based on a 1999 Barbecue Industry Association survey, at least three billion barbecue events take place each summer among the estimated 75-million households that own grills. Of those households, 50 percent own propane gas grills. Additional measures that consumers can take to ensure safe and enjoyable propane grill use include:

- Always follow all of the grill manufacturer's instructions and keep winter materials and manuals in a safe, accessible place.
- When not in use, make sure all grill burner controls are turned off and that the valve cylinder is closed.
- Make sure your grill is shut off and cooled before covering your grill after use.
- Always use or store cylinders outdoors with the right valve in direct contact with the vapor space, usually in an upright (vertical) position.
- When you fill or exchange your cylinder, have your supplier check for dents, damage, rust or leaks. If you exchange your cylinder, these inspections are already completed on the full cylinder.
- After filling or exchanging, take your cylinder home immediately. Keep your vehicle ventilated and keep the cylinder valve closed and plugged or capped in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- When your grill is not in use, cover disconnected hose-end fittings and burner air intakes with small plastic bags, or obtain protective fitting caps from your propane supplier to keep out dirt, insects and moisture.
- If there is an uncontrolled release of gas or a fire, call the fire department immediately and move all people and pets away from the unit.
- **Propane Grill Don'ts**
• Do not smoke while handling the propane cylinder.
• Do not allow children to tamper or play with the cylinder or grill.
• Do not use, store or transport your cylinder where it would be exposed to high temperatures. (This includes storing spare cylinders under or near the grill.)

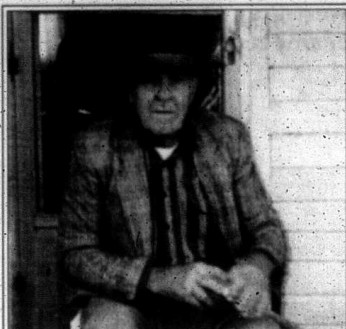

The Elderly Have a High Rate of Depression

John's family rushed him to the hospital when they found him unconscious on the living room floor. (All characters are fictitious.) John was 72 and lived alone, and one of his children checked on him every day. As they waited in the emergency room, his family speculated about what could be wrong with Dad. He had seemed in good health for a man his age.

Finally the doctor came to talk with the family. "Your father took too much of his medication," he told them, "and came very close to dying. I think he probably tried to end his life."

The family was shocked, to say the least. "Dad would never do such a thing!" his oldest son protested. "Dad's always been such a jappy-go-lucky kind of person."

John's family has run head-on into the problem of depression in the elderly. An increasing number of persons 65 and older are suffering from depression, and John is one of them.

Since their mother died two years ago, John's children had noticed that he was quieter than usual. They also recognized that he sometimes had trouble remembering things and grew agitated more easily. Occasionally there was some confusion.

His family attributed these changes in John to his advancing age.

"Everybody forgets a little as they get older," one of his daughters had

said. They even speculated that John might be developing Alzheimer's disease. (Symptoms of depression in the elderly are sometimes misdiagnosed as being caused by some type of dementia, such as Alzheimer's.)

While people over the age of 65 make up only 13% of the population, they account for 23% of all suicides. (Statistics are from the National Alliance for Research on Schizophrenia and Depression.) Each year more than 6,300 older adults take their own lives.

Much is heard about teen-age suicide, but white males over the age of 80 have the highest suicide rate of all Americans. Older people who attempt suicide succeed more often than teenagers, too. Over the age of 65, one in four suicide attempts results in death. In young people (15-24) there is one death for every 100-200 attempts.

Depression can be a fatal disease, and it nearly was to John. After his family thought about it for awhile, they began to realize that John had been depressed for some time. His physical complaints (headaches, constipation, fatigue) had been increasing over the past two years. They also realized that he had been

isolating himself, spending more time at home alone.

What caused John's depression? As with most depressions, John's had more than one cause. The death of his wife two years ago was the trigger for the depression. After being married for 33 years, John found it hard to adjust to life alone. His marriage had not always been a happy one, but John missed his wife's companionship.

There was also a chemical component to John's depression. His father and his grandchild, had suffered from depression, and John had probably inherited the chemical imbalance that makes depression possible. As his family looked back over the years, they could recognize other times when John had been depressed, even before his last episode.

Is there help for John? Certainly. The doctor prescribed an antidepressant to help John feel better and assured the family that this medication was not addictive. The family took greater pains to get John out of the house. He loved spending time with his grandchildren, so they planned activities when he could do just that. In just a few weeks they began to see an improvement in his mood.

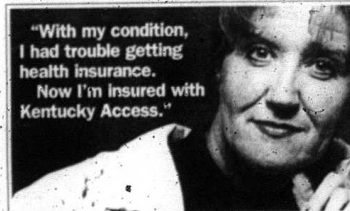
