

## Monday is last day to register for election

Those who wish to vote in the May 28 Primary Election must register by close of business on Monday, April 29.

Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Hook will accept voter registration cards in her office until 4 p.m. that day and will accept all voter registration cards postmarked April 29. You can also register to vote at the same time that you renew your driver's license.

Over 2.6 million Kentuckians are already registered to vote," according to Secretary of State John Y. Brown, III. "But there are still nearly 400,000 Kentuckians who are eligible to vote, but who have not registered."

In addition to the numerous local races, this year's ballot will include races for the U.S. Senate, U.S. House of Representatives and the Kentucky Senate and House.

### Police search Stewart property

Agents with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency, Mt. Vernon City Police officers and a Kentucky State Trooper searched two mobile homes at Orlando, early Tuesday morning.

According to police, the search involved an investigation concerning Sammy Stewart, 26, of Rt. 1, Orlando.

Police declined to comment on the investigation, but no arrests were made. The investigation continues.

Local officers involved were Mt. Vernon Chief Bill Mink, assistant chief Eddie Delancy, officer Ed Robinson and State Trooper Jason McCowan.

"This is an important election year, with many offices on the ballot," said Brown. "I encourage those who are not yet registered to do so and to make their voice heard at the polls."

High school students who are not yet 18 years old, but will turn 18 on or before the General Election in November, are eligible to register and vote in the May Primary. Election information and voter registration cards are available at Hook's office or through the Kentucky Secretary of State's web page at [www.kyso.com](http://www.kyso.com).

Mrs. Hook said that it is too late for people to change their voter registration and vote in the May Primary

There are 13,340 Rockcastle residents currently registered to vote. 8,826 are Republicans, 2,999 are Democrats and 425 others are registered Independent or in a lesser known party.

5,582 Rockcastle men are registered to vote and 5,758 women are registered.

Mrs. Hook said that it was very unusual for more women to be registered to vote than men, because at times their have been hundreds more men than women registered to vote in Rockcastle County.

There are 15 contested races and 58 candidates on the May ballot.

## Local woman involved in Interstate 75 crash

A panic stop at highway speeds started a crash which saw the driver land underneath the car last Wednesday afternoon on Interstate 75.

Witnesses said the vehicle suddenly started overturning across the northbound lanes and ejected the driver from his Chevrolet Blazer.

"All I saw was them flipping," eyewitness Scarlet Glanton, who was driving southbound near the 27 mile marker said.

"They flipped about five times. As the truck was flipping, so was he. The Blazer landed on his head."

Glanton said she and two other motorists stopped, pulled a female passenger from the vehicle and two men lifted the Blazer and freed the driver, identified by police as 29-year-old Jackie Davidson of London.

There were no other vehicles around the Blazer when it started flipping, Glanton said.

The three witnesses and rescuers huddled together in the grass while emergency personnel and firefighters tended to the patients.

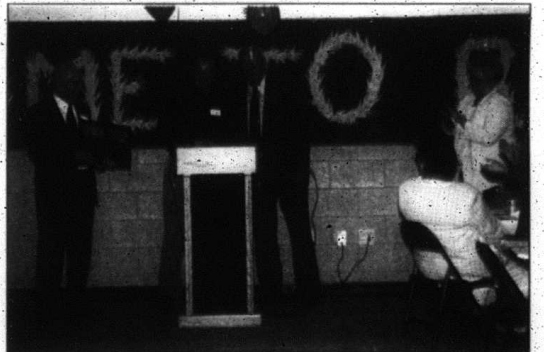
## Lambert still Chief Justice

## Open House at local landmark May 18-19

The annual Open House at Rockcastle County's Great Saltpetre Cave is set for May 18th and May 19th.

There will be free cave tours, music and food. The open house begins at 10 a.m. on the 18th and at noon on the 19th.

The cave has a great history.

In 1798, John Baker discovered a large cave opening from the hillside along Crooked Creek, in what was then still part of Madison County. The next day, he brought his wife and two children back to the cave to explore its depths by the aid of torches. What began as a lark became a terrifying experience when the torches burned out and left them stranded in the lightless depths of the earth for two days. Baker and his family finally reached safety, but the long and colorful history of Great Saltpetre Cave was just beginning.

James Kincaid of Madison County had purchased property in Rockcastle County in 1796, five years later, in 1801, he mortgaged 9,500 acres including "Kincaid's Cave" to the Lexington firm of Trotter and Scott. Meanwhile, the Madison County court issued a certificate

to George Montgomery for "two hundred acres of land lying and being in the County of Madison on Crooked Creek emptying into round stone." This land also included the same cave. During the winter of that year, the mining of saltpetre began in the cave on a small scale. Within two more years, Montgomery had sold his interest in the cave to Kincaid. Large-scale mining would soon begin.

Kincaid's early operation employed about twenty workmen (slave labor) in the cave, with furnaces and vats at both of the cave entrances. About 1,000 pounds of saltpetre were produced each week. Kincaid foresaw the potential for greatly increased production, and began to seek partners who might have the wealth to expand his operation. Among those who expressed an interest in such a partnership was Dr. Samuel Brown of Lexington.

The odds were against James Kincaid, however. Long on vision but short on cash, he remortgaged the property again to Trotter and Scott in March, 1804. Unable to meet his payments to that firm, a large piece of his property, including the cave,

was sold at a sheriff's auction in Lexington in May of that year. Alexander Scott, co-holder of the mortgages, purchased the cave and property for \$400. Later that year, acting on motion from Scott, the Madison County court issued an order to build a road from the State Road to the Great Saltpetre Cave.

Dr. Brown had not forgotten about the cave. He formed a partnership called Brown, Hart & Company and purchased the cave property, about 1,000 acres, from Scott in November, 1804. At about this time, Brown ran an advertisement in the Lexington Kentucky Gazette, stating his his company wished to hire:

15 or 20 NEGRO MEN  
To be employed at their Salt Petre Works in Madison County. For each of whom they will give 80 dollars, and they will in addition to the above, give to each negro 20 dollars at the end of the year, provided he conducts himself with propriety.

Brown intended to turn the saltpetre works into a major operation.

He promptly hired John James DuFour of Jessamine County as an engineer to construct a greatly improved and expanded operation. Over

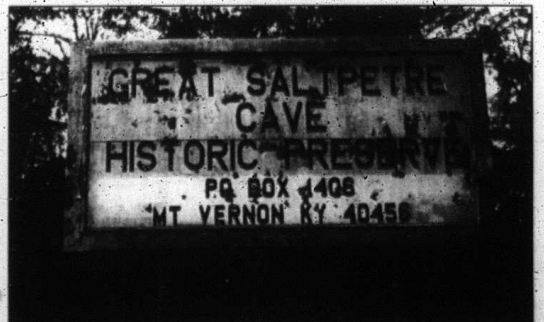
a period of a few months, DuFour made many improvements and innovations. The saltpetre mining operation later built at Mammoth Cave by

Charles Wilkins of Lexington was copied from DuFour designs.

In 1805, Brown wrote a paper on the manufacture of saltpetre and gun-

powder and sent a copy to President Thomas Jefferson. This paper describes Great Saltpetre Cave and the

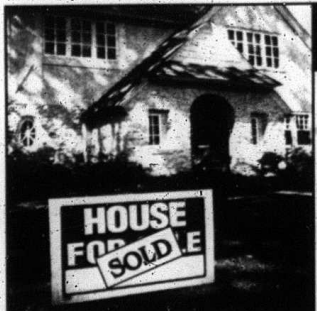

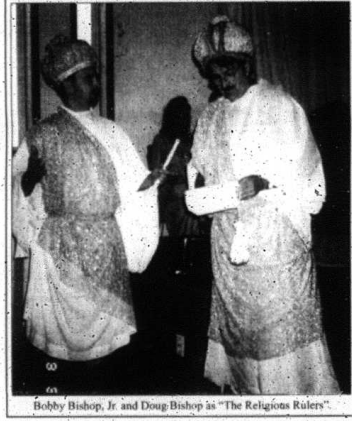

**Agricultural News**

**Clarification of Sold Quota with Regard to Carryover Tobacco**  
The Tobacco and Peanut Division has recently provided interpretation of regulations contained in 10 To Scope paragraph 615.

If the quota is sold from a farm that has physical Carryover tobacco that carryover tobacco may be sold as follows:  
1. Growing farm-if quota is leased in to the growing farm that sold the quota, the carryover may be sold on the marketing card issued for the farm.

Quota purchasing farm- any farm that purchased quota may sell the carryover.

Example: John Doe was the producer on farm number 100 in the 2001 crop year and has approximately 1,000 lbs. of physical carryover. The quota from farm number 100 was sold to farm number 200 and farm number 300 in crop year 2002. The carryover tobacco MAY be sold on either farm serial 100, 200 or 300. **NOTE: FSA is saying the carryover may be sold on either one of the farms. FSA will not determine who owns the tobacco or protect the producers right to market the carryover tobacco on any of the eligible farms.**

**Burley Tobacco Leasing**  
Producers may lease burley tobacco quota effectively immediately through July 31st.

**Tobacco Spot Checks**  
Producers who have reported unmarked tobacco stored on the farms are subject for random spot checks. Spot checks are performed by local FSA personnel to verify the amount of tobacco reported. These spot checks will be carried out in the next few months. If you have moved tobacco from where you first reported the storage, please contact FSA to report the new location.

**Stewardship Incentive Program (SIP)**  
Kentucky Farm Service Agency has determined to have a Stewardship Incentive Program (SIP) going starting immediately, and going through April 30, 2002.

To apply for SIP benefits producers must have more than 10 acres of nonindustrial forest land. The program includes cost share for establishing or reestablishing stands of trees through planting or direct seeding of trees for conservation and sustainable timber production, forest improvement and to maintain or improve water quality and soil productivity on forest land to restore wetlands.

All cost share practices approved during this sign up period must have final performance reported by December 31, 2002. Therefore, expiration dates cannot exceed December 31, 2002. For additional information contact the local FSA County Office.

**Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP)**  
Producers who retain beneficial interest in a commodity eligible for a loan or a loan deficiency payment are eligible for payment if all of the following remain with the producer: control of the commodity, risk of loss, title of the commodity, crops must have been produced on contract acreage (AMTA).

FSA realizes that many farmers may begin feeling that the loss of beneficial interest occurs, anyone who has lost title, risk and control of

the crop, is NOT eligible for benefits. Final loan and LDP availability dates for the 2001 crop are:

Burley, Oats and Wheat - March 31, 2002.  
Corn, Grain Sorghum and Soybeans - May 31, 2002.

**USDA Provides Relief to Lamb Producers**  
Sign up has begun for U.S. Department of Agriculture incentive payments to help ewe lamb producers suffering financial losses due to current poor market conditions.

The Lamb Meat Adjustment Assistance Program (LMAAP) is a 4-year program started to help stabilize the lamb market. The program will now provide \$26 million incentive payments to help producers increase the supply of domestic lamb meat. Applications for the first period (Year 3), which lasts from August 1, 2001 through July 31, 2001 are due by August 15, 2002. Applications for the second period (Year 4), which lasts from August 1, 2002 through July 31, 2003 are due by August 15, 2003.

To be eligible, producers must purchase or retain a ewe lamb to expand the sheep herd from August 1, 2001, through July 31, 2003. Producers must certify that each ewe lamb:  
• Is not older than 18 months of age.  
• Has not produced an offspring.  
• Does not possess characteristics of parrot mouth, foot rot or scapula and

• Is identified according to state identification requirements that comply with a USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service approved scrapie program for interstate movement.  
Payments will be \$18 per ewe lamb, subject to the availability of funds. If application amounts exceed the funding limit of \$26 million, USDA will prorate payments. Funds not utilized during the first application period will be carried forward to the next year.

Further information on program restrictions, eligibility requirements and other LMAAP payments is available from local USDA Service Centers, and on FSA's website at [www.fsa.usda.gov](http://www.fsa.usda.gov).

**Sign up for Apple Growers Assistance Program begins April 29th**  
The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that sign up for the 2000 Apple Market Loss Assistance Program (AMLAP-II) will begin April 29.

AMLAP-II will provide about \$75 million to eligible growers for their 2000 crop apple production. The payment will help offset economic losses, due to low prices in the U.S. apple market. Growers can receive a payment per pound for their 2000 crop apple production, and they will be paid on a maximum of 3 million pounds per separate apple operation.  
To receive cash payments, eligible apple producers must:

- Have produced and harvested apples during the 2000 crop year.
  - Not have received compensation from any other federal program, other than crop insurance, for the same market loss and
  - Apply for cash payments during the application period for each apple operation.
- The deadline for applications under the AMLAP-II program will be announced at a later date.

**Promoting well-being in a child's first year**

Caring for a child the first year of his or her life is an awesome responsibility. As a loved one, you might want to keep in mind the following suggestions for promoting optimal development during a child's first year:

- Respond quickly and tenderly to an infant's cries. If you respond this way right from the beginning, your baby will cry less later on.
- Follow your baby's schedule for

feeding and sleeping. How would you like it if someone made you wait an hour for a drink when you were thirsty?

- Talk in a pleasant, soothing voice, using simple language, but not baby talk.
- Respect the baby. Rather than constantly interrupting your child's play or imposing your ideas on the activity, give your child a chance to figure things out alone, even though it may take a little longer.

**Tent caterpillar invasion**

Seems that over the past 10 days everywhere you look tree branches are covered with white silk-like insect nests. This is the annual invasion of Eastern Tent Caterpillars. Although entomologist indicate this insect will not kill trees, most home owners cannot shake the thought of their tree being food for thousands of caterpillars.

Tent caterpillars will strip the leaves off trees. The larvae feeding period last 4 to 5 weeks or until they are about 2 inches long. As caterpillars mature to a length of 2 inches, they stop eating and start crawling in search of a rough surface to spin a cocoon in which to pupate. The adult fly moth will emerge in a few weeks but there will not be another generation of

this insect until next year. Home owners overreaction can actually damage trees more than the caterpillars. Do not burn or use petroleum products which will damage the tree bark.

For caterpillars which are still feeding, one of the safest products to use is Dipel or Bt. This is the same product home gardeners use on cabbage and broccoli. Dipel is a biological control product which is very safe for humans to apply.

When caterpillars have stopped eating and are on the move, fast acting "knock down" residual formulations of synthetic pyrethroids are best. Examples are Oriho Home Defense, Spectracide, and Bug Stop. Pyrethroids are likely to be more satisfactory than Fen, malathion or diazinon.

## Rogers announces projects for area

U.S. Representative Harold "Hal" Rogers announced last week new tourism projects to be funded through Southern and Eastern Kentucky Economic Development Board's (SEKEDA) Community Development Fund Program. The Community Development Fund Program is not a grant program, nor is it a loan. It is the institution's program that allows corridor teams the opportunity to submit tourism-related projects to SEKEDA for funding, and then, to form a partnership to jointly implement the projects. Rogers announced the first round of funding last Friday.

Rockcastle will be one of the county's that will benefit from the funding.

SEKEDA assisted corridor teams in identifying the resources needed within their communities that would boost tourism. These needs were developed into strategies for regional improvement, enhancement and promotion. Corridor teams have taken these strategies and developed work plans. The Community Development Fund Program will assist corridor teams in meeting the objectives of their work plans.

Rogers announced, "SEKEDA has been working throughout its 40-county service area in southern and eastern Kentucky to promote the Company's Coming tourism plans. \$1.5 million was set aside for the Community Development Funds by SEKEDA's Board to assist each corridor with their multi-county project." Rogers further stated, "SEKEDA has developed eight corridor teams throughout southern and eastern Kentucky. The teams are comprised of volunteers, such as

county and city officials, tourism professionals, chamber of commerce, historical societies representatives and local business people."

Rogers has supported cultural heritage and outdoor recreation projects in an effort to attract more visitors to the 40-county region and to create new tourism-related job opportunities for the region. The federal-state 'Company's Coming' partnership, unveiled in September of 2000 by Congress Rogers and Kentucky Tourism Secretary Ann Latta, identified seven district programs. One of the programs was to provide support for projects of regional importance.

"If we expect to build on region's tourism economy, we must provide funding to these important corridor teams and support the special projects they have identified in their local communities," Rogers said.

"SEKEDA is working to strengthen and to unify a diverse region by prioritizing the tourism offerings in a new and positive way."

The Southern I-75 Region Corridor includes Rockcastle, Laurel, Jackson and Whitley counties. An educational video consisting of the corridor's diverse historical, cultural and outdoor recreation attractions will be produced (\$13,775). The video will be used not only to increase visitations to tourist attractions, but will also be used to educate people working in the tourism industry as to the major points of interest available in the four-county corridor.

A half-dozen paramedics and EMTs swarmed around Davidson, starting IVs and preparing him to be flown to the University of Tennessee Medical Center. The southbound lanes of Interstate 75 were shut down for nearly an hour while Careflight's helicopter landed at the scene to pick up Davidson.

Knox County EMS Capt. John Eldridge said Davidson had a fractured femur and head trauma from the crash. Davidson was conscious the entire time, he said.

Davidson's passenger, 31-year-old Lisa Bustle of Mt. Vernon, was treated and released from Baptist Regional Medical Center with leg injuries. Kentucky State Police Trooper David Lamsier said.

Witnesses said the Blazer flipped over about five times, shattering every window inside, smashing the roof and scattering debris everywhere. The Blazer left skidmarks and several deep gouges, some up to a half-inch deep, in the asphalt.

Lamsier said it appeared the vehicle made a panic stop and started skidding and fishtailing. The driver then oversteered and started skidding sideways, he said. As it skid, the

vehicle's wheels dug into the pavement and started the vehicle flipping into the grassy shoulder.

Drugs and alcohol are not suspected as factors in the crash, Lamsier said. No other vehicles were involved.

The Chief Justice, as executive head of the statewide court system, oversees the Administrative Office of the Courts and 3300 employees of the Court of Justice, and submits a biennial budget to the Kentucky General Assembly.

On being re-elected by his colleagues, Chief Justice Lambert said, "It is truly an honor to have been elected for another four year term as Kentucky's Chief Justice. Our court system has made significant strides in the last four years in responsiveness, improvement of public trust and confidence, and better understandings of racial and ethnic differences, and I look forward to our continued work."

During Lambert's first term as Chief Justice, he oversaw the planning and construction of twenty-three new courthouse facilities and the creation and implementation of twenty-two new judgeships including four new, new family courts. In addition, Chief Justice Lambert achieved passage of the Senior Status Judges-Act which uses retired judges to fight backlog and delay in Kentucky's courts, and he created special commissions on racial fairness and the courts which empowered change to ensure fair treatment for all of Kentucky's citizens. Lambert has also overseen a rapid expansion in these of computer technology in Kentucky's courts, using the Internet and statewide networks to improve efficiency and accuracy in the work of the courts. Lambert also worked with the Kentucky General Assembly to place on the November 5, 2002, election ballot the Family Court Constitutional Amendment which will remove all legal doubts about his specialty court, designed to protect the families and children of Kentucky.

Chief Justice Lambert lives in Mt. Vernon with his wife, Debra and two sons, Joseph and John.

method of production, and mentions several other saltpeter caves in the region. His paper was read before the American Philological Society in Philadelphia in 1806, and described the cave.

The general level of the cave is about 80 feet above the creek. The average height of the arch is ten feet, though in many places it rises to fifty

or sixty. The breadth of the passage is generally about forty feet, in some places it is seventy or eighty feet. The floor has the appearance of a large public road, which has been much frequented. The ceiling is in most places smooth, with but few incrustations or stalactites. In some of the chambers however, there are appearances of Gothic rudeness and irregularity which are truly sublime. When these vast chambers are sufficiently illuminated by the torches and lamps of workmen, they present scenes so uncommon and romantic, that the most stupid beholder cannot contemplate them without expressions of the greatest astonishment.

Production at the cave went from 1,000 pounds per week to over 1,600 pounds per day.

Unfortunately, Brown was caught up in scandal; his family had been involved in Aaron Burr's plot to overthrow the United States government. Brown was forced to leave Kentucky and abandon his several enterprises, including the cave. In other hands, the cave produced saltpeter during the War of 1812, with as many as 60 to 70 workers employed in the operation. With the end of the war in January, 1815, the bottom dropped out of the saltpeter market and Great Saltpeter Cave was never again mined on large scale. During the Mexican War and later the Civil War, only small-scale mining was conducted in the cave.

About 1860, according to traditions of the Mullins family, the cave property was purchased by Callaway Mullins for \$50 and a rifle. For a long time following the Civil War, little use was made of the cave except for occasional picnics and dances. About 1939 John Lair and Dr. Walker Owens purchased the South entrance

Directions to the cave are: I-75 to exit 59 (Mt. Vernon/Livingston) East on Route 25, turn left on Route 1004, continue on 1004 till it comes to a 'T' (at tracks), turn right and continue to Great Saltpeter Cave Preserve.

# Girls' track team places third at Lake Cumberland Classic

The RCHS track and field teams competed recently in the Lake Cumberland Classic Track and Field Invitational in Somerset. Over twenty teams representing all three competitive classes were present. The RCHS girls' team, currently ranked first in Class 2A, began the meet short-handed. Team members Tara Rowe and Morgan Thacker were committed to basketball tournaments. Morgan Kincaid was competing in a speech competition and Cher' Emba did not compete due to injury. To make matters worse, sprinter Sheena Swinney sustained an injury early in the contest that kept her from competing in her last three events. Distance runner Jessica Asher was also unable to compete in her events due to physical problems. RCHS was not able to compete in any of the four relays in the meet. Despite all this, the RCHS girls that were present raised their competitive level a couple of notches resulting in an awesome third place finish. Danville, the top-ranked Class A team won the meet, with Mercer County finishing second. RCHS would have likely won the meet with all competitors present and had defeated both teams in the Patriot Games at Lincoln County a week earlier.

Freshman Heather Hammond once again led RCHS with many outstanding performances. Most notable of which occurred in the 300-meter low hurdles. Competing in only her second hurdle race ever, Heather ran a state best 48.1 seconds and easily finished 1st in the event. Heather also broke the previous RCHS record held by former RCHS great Tara Abney, now a Berea College hurdler and sprinter. In the 400-meter dash, Heather ran a season's best time of 1:01.3 and placed 1st overall, easily outdistancing the competition. Heather recorded another 1st in the high jump competition. She leaped an impressive 4'10" and did not attempt any other heights in order to conserve energy for her other events.

In the long jump competition, Heather improved to a season's best 157.25' and placed 3rd. She totaled an amazing thirty-six points in the meet and led all competitors in scoring. Even more amazing is the fact that Heather's point total would have defeated every team except for four,

meaning she would have placed 3rd in team scores by herself.

Senior Clarissa Hubbard also had an outstanding meet. She finished the meet as the second leading scorer for RCHS. In the shot put competition, Clarissa performed exceptionally well and finished 1st overall with a season's best performance of 32.25'. Clarissa also threw very well in the discus competition. She finished 2nd overall with an impressive effort of 103.67'. Freshman teammate Kelli Doan competed well in shot put and finished 19th overall with an effort of 21.9.25'. Senior Doris Bismark threw a personal best in the discus competition. She finished 7th overall with an awesome effort of 75.2'.

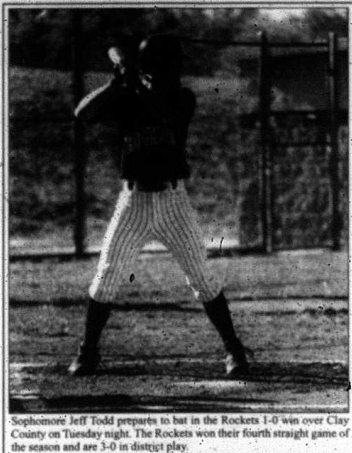
Eighth grader Kayla Hayes ran an awesome 1600-meter race. Kayla finished with a personal best time of 5:57.2 and placed 5th overall. Teammate Jessica Asher struggled through growing pains with an exceptional effort of 6:39.9. She placed 20th overall. In the 3200-meter run, Kayla also ran a great race and finished 8th in 13:27.1, despite having to endure an incredible side stitch midway through the race. Kayla also ran well in the 800-meter run and finished 8th overall with a superb time of 2:47.7.

Freshman Sarah Parsons competed in her first 100-meter high hurdle race ever. Sarah ran very well and finished 12th overall in 1:59 seconds. Sarah also competed for the first time in the 200-meter dash. She ran a great race and finished 13th in 39.2 seconds.

Sophomore Sheena Swinney ran a fast 100-meter dash before taking a terrible fall near the finish. It appeared that Sheena's tune was the fastest as she easily won the fastest heat, however; an apparent misplacement by the official timer's placed Sheena third overall with the effort of 13.6 seconds. Sheena sustained scrapes and bruises from her fall, including an injury to her foot that left her unable to finish the meet.

Danielle Arnold ran very well in the 400-meter dash, despite being called upon late in the meet to replace Sheena. Danielle finished with an excellent time of 1:10.7 and placed 14th. Danielle also ran a great 800-meter race. She finished 15th overall with

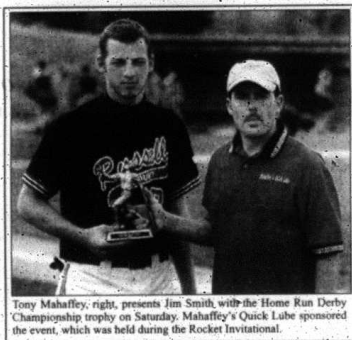

Junior Stephen Boring had a double in the game and Rockcastle left five on base.

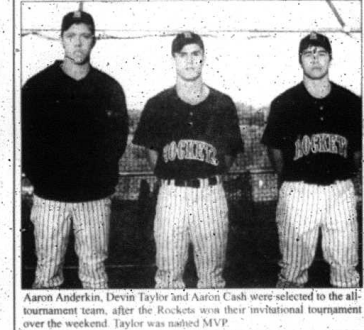
The Rockets then picked up their third win of the tournament by defeating Russell County 5-0 behind a good performance by James Michael Bussell.

"I got going straight and guys were still wrecking on the inside. The '19' car was just sliding and it ended up that I hit him after I kind of got straightened out. I believe I would

## Roush is stable and improving

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (April 20, 2002) - Roush Racing owner Jack Roush's condition has been upgraded to serious but stable, at the intensive care unit at University of Alabama-Birmingham Medical Center, after being injured in a plane crash Friday afternoon near Troy, Ala.  
Roush suffered closed head injuries but, according to his attending physician, he is "following commands." Other injuries include two leg fractures, which were set Saturday, and minor chest and internal injuries.  
Roush's twin-engine light aircraft crashed into a housing subdivision pond outside Troy.

The police log showed that both the Troy Police and Troy Fire Department responded and the first officer was on the scene at 6:08. An ambulance arrived at 6:11.  
Chief Scarborough said the first stroke of fortune for Roush, who was celebrating his birthday Friday with a group of friends that were aviation buffs, was that the crash was witnessed by Larry Hicks, 52, and his wife. The policeman said Hicks was a game warden and conservation officer for the state of Alabama.  
"He's some hero, is what he is," Scarborough said. "He is a retired U.S. Marine who at one time was on a SAR Unit - Search and Rescue - so he was familiar with this type of operation."  
Scarborough said Roush's plane ended up 30 yards offshore, upside down but not totally submerged. He

said he had "no idea" how long Roush was submerged, but that "the water under for a period of time, according to Mr. Hicks."  
Roush Racing president Geoff Smith on Saturday morning at a news conference at Talladega Super Speedway credited Hicks with extracting and resuscitating Roush prior to his being loaded in the ambulance.  
"Larry is the man that pulled Jack out of the water and resuscitated him," he said. "Without Larry and the efforts of the Troy police and emergency response team, we wouldn't be feeling as positive as we are at this moment."  
Hicks also received injuries during the rescue effort.  
Roush Racing has four drivers in Winston Cup, Matt Kenseth, Mark Martin, Jeff Burton, and Kurt Busch.

A racing legend is gone  
CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) - Buck Baker, one of NASCAR's racing legends, was laid to rest last Thursday at the age of 83.  
Baker died late Sunday night, April 14 at Carolinas Medical Center while undergoing a procedure for a new pancreatic tumor.  
Gene Tapia, another longtime racer and moonshine runner from Mobile, Alabama recalls his first experience with Baker.  
"The first time I laid eyes on him was in 1948 at a NASCAR modified race in Montgomery, Ala.," said Tapia. "Most of the tracks back then were dirt. When he took to the track for practice, he really threw a rooster-tail dirt up. He could drive it into the corners harder than any other driver. There were a lot of good drivers there that day, Gober Soosebe, Lee Petty, Tim and Fonty Flock, Curtis Turner, Frank Mundy and a bunch of other Georgia drivers, but Buck Baker became my hero."

"I'd say that over the years, he was one of the best, if not the best driver I ever raced against."  
Baker learned his driving skills while dining moonshine along the backroads of North Carolina. He was a city bus driver in Charlotte when he turned to racing full-time, competing in NASCAR's inaugural season.  
He went on to win 46 Winston Cup races - 13th on the all-time list - and 44 poles. He was the first back-to-back series champion, winning titles in 1936 and 1937.  
"Throughout the entire racing world, I don't know of anybody who would say he didn't give 100 percent from the time they dropped the green flag until the time the race was over," said his son Buddy Baker. "He was that same way in life, too."  
Buck Baker, born Elzie Wylie Baker, on March 4, 1919, in Richburg, S.C., started 631 races, seventh-most in NASCAR, and ran the most laps and miles for three consecutive years beginning in 1955. He was a three-time winner of the Southern 500 at Darlington Raceway, one of NASCAR's most storied races.  
"There was a time in the modified division that nobody could beat him," Buddy Baker said. "He won 27 in a row - once at the old Charlotte fairgrounds track, and the bad part was that we were the promoters at that track. He'd too him coming in and too him going out, but the next day everybody would be hanging around at his shop."  
Baker retired in 1976, and was inducted into the National Motorsports Press Association's Hall of Fame in 1982 and the International Motorsports Hall of Fame in 1990.

For the past 20 years, Baker had operated the Buck Baker Racing School, one of the first schools to teach the skills involved in stock car racing. The school was based at North Carolina Speedway in Rockingham and also operated at tracks in Atlanta and Bristol, Tenn.  
Baker is survived by his wife of 30 years, Susan Painter Baker; two sons, Buddy and Randy; a daughter, Susie Baker of Charlotte; a sister, two grandsons and two great granddaughters.

# Mission team from Iowa works at Christ's Outreach for the Blind

Christ's Outreach for the Blind, a Christian based camp located in Mt. Vernon, hosted its first mission team this past week. A church group from Sioux Center, Iowa. The twenty member team, ranging in age from 8-82, received their assignment from Coalition Appalachian Ministries. Each team member paid a fee to participate in the project and furnished their own building materials which they purchased from local businesses in Mt. Vernon.

The Iowa mission team's labor included sanding and sealing 400 feet of wood railing of the Outreach Center, dry walling the walls and sanding, painting and upholstering metal chairs that will be used in the camp's dining room. One team member cooked from 5 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day. A portion of the mission group also assisted a certified electrician in wiring the Outreach Center, saving Christ's Outreach for the Blind an estimated expense of \$18,000.

Another important project was completed by the Iowa mission team, an outdoor classroom made possible by a grant awarded by PRIDE. PRIDE seeks to teach the importance of maintaining our waterways, the

necessity of recycling our trash and the consequences of pollution. Eventually, there will be a dock leading from the outdoor classroom to a pond where campers can learn how weather and varying temperatures

affect the water. They will be given nets and asked to identify three layers of pond life which include bugs, fish and frogs. They will also study animal life cycles and water current cycles. In addition, they will test alkaline content of the water and study pond plant life such as cattails and various grasses.

In response to an inquiry of why members of the Mission Team left their homes and occupations in Iowa to come to Kentucky to do mission work, Dan, their 23-year-old leader replied, "to further the Kingdom of God." Then he said, "Selfish reasons, the one who walks away with a lot." When asked how the trip had changed them, one man responded, "We read in the newspaper and watch on television about bad things hap-

pening and we say, 'God where are you?' I see God's grace through these people, Mike's vision and Lon's support."

When the camp officially opens, Christ Outreach for the Blind will teach hunting, hiking, rappelling, gardening and Independent Living Skills to blind and disabled campers. Mike Gates, blinded in a blinding accident in 1989 says, "Our activities are based on everything that everybody tells the blind or disabled they can't do. 'The camp will accommodate 600 participants each year and will run April-December."

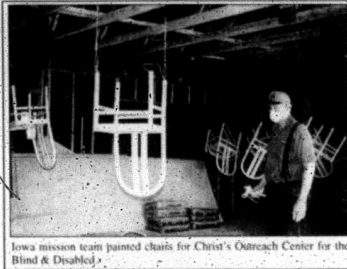

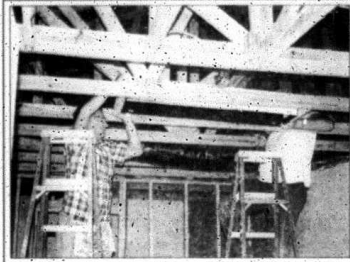

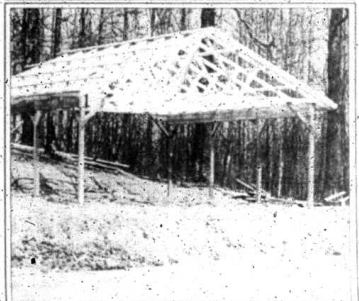
