

Hail storm causes a lot of damage

A dangerous storm swept through Rockcastle County Wednesday night, causing tremendous hail and wind damage to structures and especially vehicles.

In the southern portion of the county near the Rockcastle-Pulaski line, some residents reported baseball size hail.

Pat Craig, an insurance adjuster for Kentucky Farm Bureau in Rockcastle County, said Saturday that his office alone would work over 600 insurance claims caused by the hail and wind. Farm Bureau's local loss could exceed \$1.5 million.

Most of the heavy damage occurred in the western and southern portions of the county. The flooding was the worst in the south and the hail damage was the worst in the west.

Rockcastle County roads have also been adversely affected by that storm and other small storms this Spring.

Federal Emergency Management Administration officials were scheduled to be in the county beginning on Thursday (today) and the rest of the week to take an assessment of both public roadway damages and private property damage.

"This initial survey will determine Rockcastle County's ability to access federal funds for assistance," said Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carltoftis.

Carltoftis, road foreman Jack Cromer and local emergency management director Howell Holbrook will be with FEMA officials during the inspection of the county.

Carltoftis declared a state of emergency last Thursday, seeking both state and federal assistance to help rebuild roadways.

"I ask that people understand that we have some roads completely washed out and several contractors have been hired during this emergency to help with the damage to the roadways," he said.

Rockcastle County weatherman Bud Cox said that over four inches of rain has been recorded at the weather station during the first eight days of May and that precipitation has been recorded seven out of the first eight days.

"The ground is pretty saturated," Cox said Wednesday as more rain was coming down.

The high temperature so far for the month of May has been 77 and low 46.

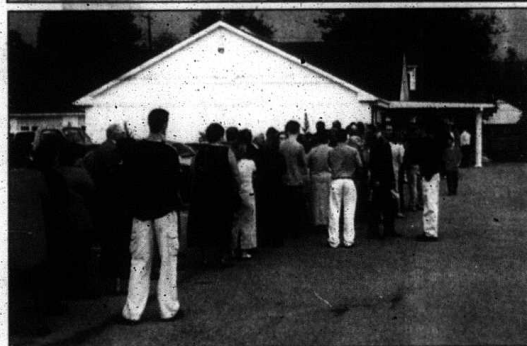
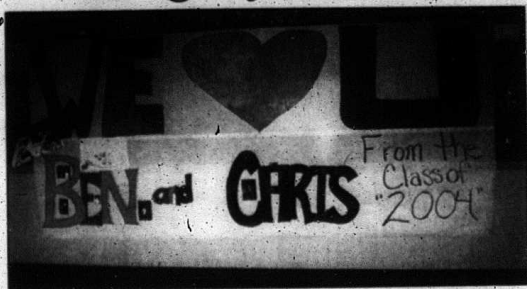
Mike Combs to perform in Renfro

Tragic wreck claims lives of two teenagers

A tragic single vehicle accident on Hwy. 70 Saturday claimed the lives of two Rockcastle County High School students.

Another student is listed in stable condition at the University of Kentucky Hospital and will recover from his injuries.

Killed as a result of the wreck were Benjamin McKibben, 16, of Quail and Chris Tolle, 16, of Mt. Vernon.

Seriously injured was the driver of the car, Jameson Cable, 16, also of Quail.

All three were sophomores at the Rockcastle County High School.

According to Kentucky State Trooper Coby Smith, the accident occurred at 3:45 p.m., near the intersection of Carl Brown Road and Hwy. 70.

According to Smith's report, Cable was driving a 1994 Ford Mustang toward Ottawa when he lost control on wet pavement.

Smith's report said that the right rear of the Mustang hit a tree and came to rest in the creek that runs along Hwy. 70.

The impact from the crash threw Tolle from the vehicle.

Cable and McKibben remained in the vehicle after the impact, and members of the Rockcastle County EMS, Mt. Vernon and Brodhead firefighters had to use the jaws of life to free McKibben from the back seat of the vehicle.

Tolle died a few minutes after being taken to the Rockcastle Hospital. McKibben was flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center and Cable was taken by ambulance.

McKibben died around 11 p.m. from massive internal injuries.

It is unclear at this time if Cable or Tolle had their seatbelts on, but McKibben was wearing his.

The news of the tragic wreck spread quickly throughout the county, which was evident by the number of people, many of them classmates, who were at U.K. on Saturday night to support the McKibbens and Cables.

Ben McKibben was the youngest of four boys and Chris Tolle was an only child.

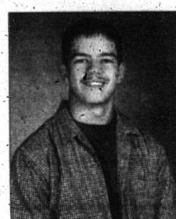
Numerous counselors and clergy were at Rockcastle County High

School on Monday morning to help students and faculty members cope with the loss.

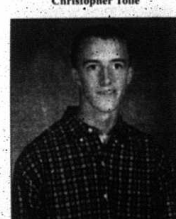

County's obligations exceed \$4 million

There have been a lot of questions about the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court's financial condition.

"The bottom line - they owe a lot of money for a lot of projects.

"We may owe a lot, but we operate a tight ship and we have always met our obligations - we are actually in very good shape," said Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carltoftis.

The county owes \$1.46 million on the courthouse annex, but Carltoftis pointed out that the state pays the

majority of the payment on that debt.

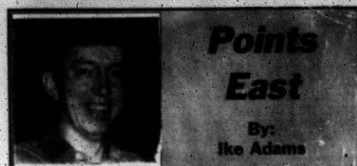
The county owes \$1.38 million on the jail renovation and expansion and an additional \$83,000 on the jail for expenses incurred while the jail was closed for renovation.

They owe \$540,000 on a road fund bond, which originally started out as a million dollars, under the former administration, additional obligations \$61,000 on the county garage, a debt that started out as \$90,000, a \$153,000 note for the

If you are a pipe smoker, and you really want to find Heaven here on earth, this is the ultimate site to visit on the Internet. You can read the rest of this column and figure out why, but I'm telling you that this is the biggest and best discovery I've ever made on the Internet is TobaccoDirect.com.

I found English, French, Italian, Scandinavian, and even American made pipes on the Internet worth hundreds of dollars each. I discovered the real pipe makers—Cormo, Duhill, Joby, Peterson, Savanelli, Sasceni, Nording, GBD, BBB, and on and on and on. I discovered that a real pipe smoking experience means having a good pipe in your mouth—along with good tobacco.

But search as I might, over the last several years, I could not find Flying Dutchman. I've called or visited the tobacco stores in all big cities nearby. I've run Internet searches and come up blank. Finally, two weeks ago I got a hit on the Internet.

Bottom line was they had Flying Dutchman and anything else I wanted.

The site is: TobaccoDirect.com. I have my Flying Dutchman, in a

10 oz can safely at home along with samples of more than two dozen other blends. I'll be saving over pipes that are priced about half what they cost in the big city stores.

I've had two shipments from TobaccoDirect.com and I am elated to find an Internet vendor that ships within hours of my order and treats me like royalty. I've more or less fallen in love with Linda who takes my calls when I need to talk to somebody on the 800 number.

Not only do they have Flying Dutchman but they have at least 60 other brands in whatever quantities you might want. At least a thousand blends and all displayed on a website that is out of this world.

The music began when Mom put the biscuits in the oven and shook down the ashes to warm the stove. The music was not the TV nor graphophone, this was years before these gadgets took the place of and disguised the beauty of a natural human voice; the music we heard was the melodious voice of my Mom, sometimes humming, sometimes singing a hymn, or more often ballad. These were our favorites. She knew them all and sang them with a clear voice that could be the envy or many of the grand old opera stars. I don't remember her singing lullabies, but I am sure she did, but I do remember the funny ones she sang as she bounced a baby on her foot or knee! Songs or "diddies," she called them, were such a "Froggie Went A Courtin'" "Bye-Bye Bunting" and "Giddy-Up Horsey." These were action songs and soothed the fretting child as well as, or maybe more so, than the ones she sang in a subdued voice with the hint of lonesomeness or heartache creeping into every word or syllable. My mom had the liquid voice that flowed from high to low without effort and the ballads she sang took on the reality of, and painted the picture of, what she was singing about. She could bring tears to the eyes of the listeners when she sang "I am a Poor Wayfarin' Pilgrim" or have them putting a foot and clapping their hands to the rhythm of "Giddy-Up Horsey." When I was a

child a good voice was judged by how far it could be heard on a clear day or evening when all was quiet in the surrounding hills of Carter County, where I was born. It has been said Mom's could be heard two miles away when she and my grandpa led the singing at the little church close by. Their voices blended perfectly and they did not need a microphone to amplify and probably distort the melody and beauty of the harmony everyone enjoyed.

So, you see, the love of music was born and bred into my bones. My dad did not inherit his father's talent, nor I my mothers, but neither was lost in the shuffle of kids and grandkids. When we have a chance to get together, whether it is two, three or half a dozen, you can bet there will be requests for favorite songs of the past and willing voices to sing them, usually accompanied by a guitar. A Gift of Joy

Cousins Joyce Durham and Dale Parsons grew up in Wildie, located in northern Rockcastle County. Consisting of one church, two grocery stores, a handful of houses and a busy railroad, Wildie is the typical small Kentucky community. But, those who live or have lived there realize that Wildie residents share a unique bond. Nothing could have better represented this than the events of April 10th.

Joy, 46, and Dale, 48, had hardly spoken to each other for the last 16 or 17 years, even though they lived within a mile from each other on Short Line Pike in Berea. They were not mad at each other and there was no reason for them not to communicate. Life just got too busy. About the only interaction they had with one another was a wave from passing cars as one of them drove a child to school or rushed to work. From one on, though, they will be forever connected. Dale is now the owner of one of Joy's kidneys.

Within the last four or five years, Dale's kidneys weakened. As his kidneys failed almost completely, he became dependent on dialysis. Doctors said that a kidney transplant was necessary and Dale would be placed on the transplant waiting list. A kidney from a cadaver was an option, but informed Dale that a living donor, preferably one from a close rela-

tive would be best. Immediate family members, including his mother and brother, volunteered. None matched.

After some time, Joy discovered that she was a match and would be able to donate her kidney to Dale. She proceeded with all the necessary tests and prepared herself for the surgery. Joy was rather quiet through the whole process. She didn't think it was a big deal and didn't want any extra attention. But it was a big deal, a huge deal to Dale.

So, early on Wednesday, April 10, Joy went in to surgery at the University of Kentucky Medical Center. Hours later, her kidney was transplanted into her lifelong friend and cousin. Almost as soon as the anesthesia wore off, Dale already felt better and the kidney was working, too. The result of Joy's amazing act of selflessness and love was immediately apparent.

The "Wildie Bond" is now closer than ever between Joy and Dale. Two kids who grew up wading creeks and tossing baseballs are joined by a force much stronger than fond childhood memories. Because of Joy's donation, they are now connected for life.

Prayer was often requested for Dale at many churches, including the Wildie Christian Church, and he was placed on prayer lists. Thanks to Joy and a gift from the Lord, those prayers have been answered.

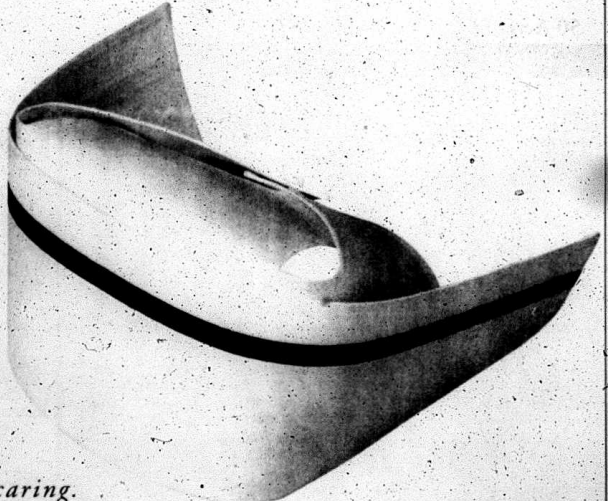

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Family Issues

What Motivates Abusers?
Norm abuses his wife. (All characters are fictitious.) He is fifty years old and holds a responsible position in his community. Most of the abuse is verbal, though he has pushed her and kicked her a couple of times in the last few years. He often calls her fat, lazy and other names that cannot be printed here. When she talks of leaving him, he threatens that he "won't give her a dime." Because she is dependent on him for money, she stays.

Sam also abuses his wife. He is worse when he is drinking or doing cocaine. Sam has not held a steady job in years but requires his wife to work. She gives him her money, and he pays the bills, sometimes. He broke her jaw last year, but she lied and told the doctor that she fell. He tells her that if she ever leaves him, he will kill her. Not surprisingly, she stays.

What motivates abusers like Norm and Sam? Why would someone deliberately hurt the woman he says he loves?

The primary motivation for most abusers is THEIR OWN INSECURITY. They feel so uncertain about themselves that they think they must hold onto their spouses to prevent them from leaving. The verbal abuse and the hitting are designed to keep the woman close by. "Keep her feeling bad enough, and she'll stay" is their motto.

Most abusers are emotionally dependent on their victims. They feel they cannot live without their women and most keep them close at all costs. When the woman leaves, an abuser may fall apart emotionally. He will visit everyone he knows, crying and telling them how much he loves her and how much he wants her back. He is devastated because the woman on whom he is emotionally dependent

has left, and he will do anything to get her back.

Another motivation for abusers is anger. Most abusers are very angry and do not know how to deal with that feeling. The anger is so strong that it will come out no matter how the victim behaves. She may feel it is something that does not provoke the anger, but that is not true. The anger is there and it will come out, usually at the person closest to the abuser. More and more courts are ordering abusers into anger management classes to try to deal with this part of the problem.

The anger of the abuser may be a symptom of depression. I have seen abusers who have become considerably less angry when treated for depression with medication and counseling. Most abusers refuse treatment except under court order. Abusers usually do not see that they have a problem, preferring to blame the abuse on the victim!

Why are these men angry? Sometimes it is because they have themselves been abused as children. Not every abuser grew up in an abusive home, but many did. When Dad beat them, they could do nothing about it. Naturally they felt hurt and anger but had no outlet for these feelings. The anger built up until as an adult they began to take it out on others. Alcohol and drugs do not cause abuse, but they can worsen the problem. Alcohol loosens his inhibitions so the abuser may demonstrate his anger more forcibly than when he is sober. Other drugs seem to intensify the anger. An angry man who drinks or does drugs is a disaster waiting to happen.

Again, the primary motivation for abusers is their own insecurity. They will do whatever they can to control their spouses and keep them at home.

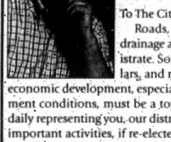

Waterfalls Becoming Common Landscape Feature

While many a nice yard may have a swimming pool or a hot tub, a growing number of yards are sporting new waterfalls and ponds filled with koi, goldfish and water lilies.

Maybe this is a fad, but I believe it reflects the need of a generation that is growing older and wanting to find its roots and to get back to nature and the wilderness. Rather than pack up and move far from the conveniences of the city, a lot of folks are "getting back to nature" by bringing those features in nature they like to their homes in or near cities. Trees, shrubs and rocks are standard in a lot of landscaped yards. Waterfalls and watergardens are highlights in the landscape of a growing number of folks.

Perhaps it's the phenomenon known as "cocooning" (staying at home and spending leisure time with family and friends) that is responsible for the trend to create and enjoy "paradise" at home instead of some crowded tourist destination. Waterfalls are a rapidly growing part of this recreating at home.

Some homeowners who desire a waterscape hesitate for fear of the upkeep. Others for the initial cost. But you can have a high-quality low-maintenance waterscape, including pond, waterfall, maybe a stream, for probably less than the cost of a pool or hot tub. And it is likely to bring longer-lasting and more frequent joy than either the tub or pool.

Considering what it costs for a family of four to enjoy a week in Myrtle Beach or Gatlinburg or Florida's Disney World, for a growing number of homeowners investing travel dollars at one's home makes real good sense. (And the enjoyment is substantial and often-not just one a year!)

A waterfall and pond are more carefree than you might think, especially if they are well-built.

Think about the time spent mowing, or tending a flowerbed. With a waterfall and pond you eliminate some yard... and the small amount of pond maintenance will be fun, com-

pared to lawn mowing.

If this sounds like something for you, think carefully before jumping headlong for one of these water features for your yard. Type, size, location need planning. Consider the lay of the land, the amount of sunlight, the view from inside the view from the deck or patio. (Improperly built too-small will lead to rebuilding later.)

There are do-it-yourself kits, but unless you have a knack or love for learning and doing new things, you'll probably want to have someone with experience create your new residential waterfeature.

Happy "pondering" in your paradise.

My opponent, Mr. Saylor, has name a number of comments in his recent political advertisements that require a response. I do not believe that he would knowingly make false and misleading statements. Our county's fiscal court is the local government body that is entrusted to handle public matters. My Saylor's educational training is in pharmacy; I have two degrees in government (political science).

In one of his recent ads, he said the county spends too much, while in the very next paragraph he suggested that we spend more.

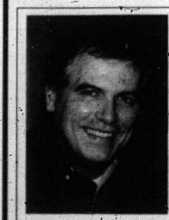
Regarding finances for the county, he has publicly stated it must be changed. This is very peculiar, especially since Rockcastle County has been able to meet its obligations. For example, he mentioned the judicial annex as a 'county' debt. He is mistaken. First of all, that was built before I got into office. While it appears on the county's list, it does so because the state law requires it be listed, even though the state pays most of the obligation. Secondly, Mr. Saylor evidently fails to understand the public's budget process. The Kentucky Infrastructure Authority, for example, requires their funding for water projects, etc., be listed by the county in order for the people to have water lines constructed. Western Rockcastle Water Association, however, pays this obligation; it is merely listed on the county's report.

A couple of the fire departments in Rockcastle County, also, in order to receive extremely low interest rates, go through the fiscal court for equipment upgrades, etc. Again, these are only listed on the county's report.

My opponent also listed the jail. He evidently fails to understand that, had we not expanded the jail to bring in over \$55,000 every month, our citizens would have had to send our money to other counties to house prisoners, and that would have been disastrous.

My opponent also suggested that we spend too much on maintaining and making better roads. I know that school buses now travel on roads that were not passable by them when I first got into office. As long as I am in office, I intend to continue making roads better, and we have much more work to do.

Rockcastle County has made great strides in infrastructure improvements. I don't think we need to stop making improvements for our citizens.

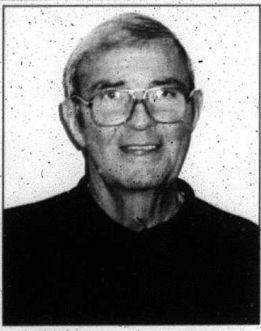

Trayliners promote folic acid for Mother's Day

The Kentucky Folic Acid Partnership is promoting the use of the vitamin folic acid to help prevent birth defects with the distribution of trayliners as restaurants across the state at Mother's Day approaches.

The message is Folic Acid...Every Woman Every Day.

More than 400,000 trayliners are being distributed to remind women of the importance of the folic acid, a B vitamin. The project is sponsored by the Department for Public Health, the March of Dimes, the Spina Bifida Association of Kentucky and the partnership, which is made up of 56 organizations across the state. The primary goal of the partnership is to help reduce by 50 percent the number of babies affected by spina bifida and anencephaly by the year 2010.

To attain this goal, the number of women who are taking folic acid every day must increase," said Dr. Steve Davis, chairman of the partnership and director of the Division of Adult and Child Health in the Department for Public Health.

Some 92,739 women have received free folic acid tablets and counseling through local health departments and regional offices of the Commission for Children with Special Health Care Needs as part of Gov. Paul Patton's Early Childhood Initiative called KIDS NOW.

Any woman who is capable of becoming pregnant could have a pregnancy affected with a neural tube defect. However, research shows that the number of neural tube defects may be reduced by as much as 70

percent with the daily consumption of 400 micrograms of the B-vitamin folic acid. It is very important that women of childbearing age take the recommended daily amount of folic acid before conception and continue taking it throughout the pregnancy. Neural tube defects occur in the first 28 days of pregnancy before the woman knows she is pregnant, and half of all pregnancies in the United States are unplanned.

The two most common types of neural tube defects are anencephaly and spina bifida. A baby with anencephaly will have a severely underdeveloped brain and skull. Babies with this condition most often result in miscarriage or stillbirth, and if born alive will only live a short time. Spina bifida occurs when the lower end of the neural tube fails to close properly. Long-term complications of spina bifida may include paralysis and learning disabilities. The initial medical costs for newborns with spina bifida can exceed \$532,000 with the cost for many children exceeding \$1 million.

Organizations across the state are distributing the trayliners from May 1 through 12, Mother's Day and locally our McDonald's of Mt. Vernon will be using the trayliners the weekend of Mother's Day.

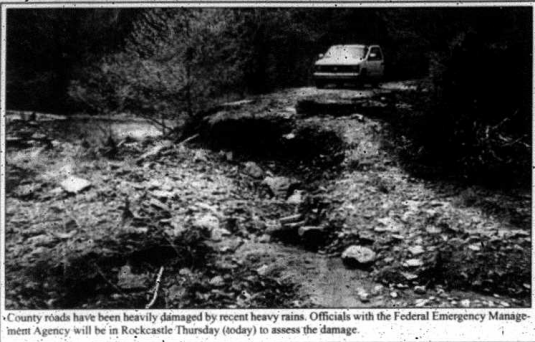

Rockcastle Tech Center wins School of Excellence Award

Rockcastle County Area Technology Center was among 13 technical schools that won Schools of Excellence awards in April.

The Department for Technical Education, an agency of the Cabinet for Workforce Development, presented the awards to honor the schools for excellence in education. The schools are recognized during a Kentucky Tech principal's meeting at the Kentucky Tech Jackson County Area Technology Center. Donna Hopkins, Principal, KY Tech-Rockcastle Area Technology Center was present to accept the award.

Cabinet for Workforce Development Secretary Allen D. Rose said that for a school to earn a Schools of Excellence distinction, everyone in that school must commit themselves to exceptional levels of dedication.

"Goals are generally not accomplished without some difficulty along the way," said Rose. "Without doubt, the Schools of Excellence that were honored faced numerous challenges

in their quest for this mark of distinction. It's difficult to achieve excellence, but in the end, it's worth it. These schools' students, faculty, staff and administrators are role models. I am proud to be affiliated with them."

Schools of Excellence are awarded to secondary technical schools whose students have at least an 80 percent completion rate and have high ratings on the employer satisfaction survey. Schools also must have a student placement rate of at least 90 percent in jobs, postsecondary education or in the military.

Schools of Excellence was formerly called Flags of Excellence. The program has been revamped since the last recognition of schools in 1998.

The Schools of Excellence program this year acknowledged schools that met the criteria for any of the past three years.

Rockcastle County ATC was recognized for meeting the criteria in 2000.

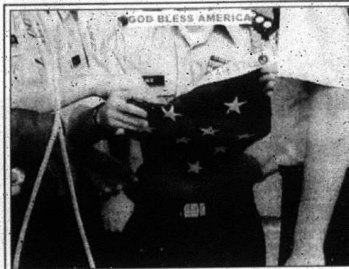

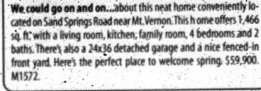

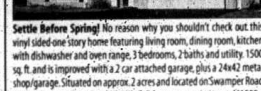

Teachers, Parents and Technology: A Cooperative Approach

Who knows more about computers, you or your six year old? As technology becomes more and more a part of our lives, it is imperative that we prepare our children to be able to thrive in this new environment. Children today are bombarded with technology everywhere they turn. Therefore, it is our duties as parents and teachers to teach them how to succeed as adults. If we all work together to accomplish this, there should be no reason why we cannot accomplish this goal. However, we each have a part to play in this lesson and if we understand our roles, together we can accomplish anything.

As a fourth grade teacher I am seeing the need for learning more about technology on a daily basis. Every year it seems that the children come to me with a broader knowledge of how to use the computers than that generation has grown up with. Therefore, I must learn how to take these students to the next level of learning by using the tools they understand more and more familiar with. Teachers of today need to understand that it isn't enough that we know how to use the computer ourselves. Certainly there are many things we can (and are) learning to do with our computers.

For example, newsletters and teacher led multimedia presentations; however, because of the knowledge level of even the youngest students (my seven-year-old knew how to shut our computer down by the age of four) we must make our own efforts to go beyond our current comfort level as teachers. We need to step out a little and start allowing our students to create their own PowerPoint presentations etc... in order to display their knowledge of core content. We need to learn how to integrate the computers into our curriculum and

not just use it as a tool. This can only be accomplished by seeking out the excellent training opportunities that are available both in our districts and on the web.

Many districts across the state are doing a great job of moving from simple "tool training" to integration training. I may have seen that teachers are now more and more comfortable with the computers themselves. They know how to use the basic programs offered and can create their own projects for their own uses, but now they need to concentrate more on integration. Integration occurs when we use the computer as a tool in our daily lessons. There are various ways to accomplish this. Teachers can check out the many free offerings available on the Internet, from online courses in integration to their own district's offerings. I may have seen that many training documents right on their web sites, available for anyone wanting to learn. I recently completed a KVHS (Kentucky Virtual High School) online course in integrating Science and Technology into the classroom. I know that I would not have found as many of the excellent sites if I did without this class. I would definitely encourage this as well.

Teachers need to check all their options out and find the ones that work best for them. Then they will be able to help their students soar into the world of learning through technology. Parents reading this article may be wondering what it has to do with them. Well, I am not only a teacher but a parent of two elementary students as well. I see the need every day for helping my children learn how to use technology to increase their knowledge base. One way parents can help is by allowing their child supervised access to computers after school. Please understand

that supervised access is the only way to go. Making sure our students have access to computers and technology should always take place in a safe environment for our children.

Some parents may say that they don't have a computer in their homes so how can they help their child grow in this area? Well, almost every public library now has free Internet access. Also, most libraries have computers set aside with educational software games on them as well. So, parents can do their part as well in this learning process by exposing their child to computers even after the school day comes to an end. This could be also be something that is a shared interest for parents and child. If you are a parent who already

knows a lot about computers and what they can do for your child, share that knowledge with them. Maybe you are a parent who is new to computers yourselves. You could look at this as something you are your child can learn together. Remember, it is never too late for any of us to learn. I am also quite certain that your son or daughter would love the experience of teaching their parents a few things as well.

Finally, I feel that as teachers, parents, and students, we can do nothing except benefit from this cooperative approach to learning more about this wonderful tool we have before us. I know that we all can both learn and teach each other many things so that we all learn and grow.

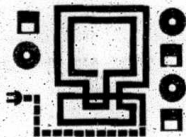

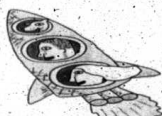

Producers may lease burley tobacco quota effectively immediately through July 1st. Producers may list quota for lease on the bulletin board space by way of contacting the county office either in person or by telephone.

Tobacco Spot Checks
Producers who have reported unmarketed tobacco stored on the farms are subject for random spot checks. Spot checks are performed by local FSA personnel to verify the amount of tobacco reported. These spot checks will be carried out in the next few months. If you have moved tobacco from where you first reported the storage, please contact FSA to report the new location.

Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP)
Producers who retain beneficial interest in a commodity eligible for a loan or a loan deficiency payment are eligible for payment if all of the following remain with the producer: control of the commodity, risk of loss, title of the commodity, crops must have been produced on contract acre (AMTA).

FSA realizes that many farmers may begin feeding, thus; the loss of beneficial interest occurs. Anyone who has lost title, risk and control of the crop is NOT eligible for benefits. Final loan and LDP availability dates for the 2001 crop are: Corn, Grain, Sorghum and Soybeans - May 31, 2002.

Wheat Reporting
Small grain (wheat) crop reporting can now be completed at the FSA office after they are planted. Wheat crop reporting must be on file by May 31, 2002. All other crop reporting must be on file by July 15, 2002.

FY 2002 PFC Reminder
Producers who wish to receive their 2002 PFC (Production Flexibility Contract) payments early must sign a form for what month you wish to receive your 2002 payment. The deadline to sign or revise a PFC for FY 2002 is August 1, 2002.

Producers are encouraged not to request a payment for the farm if they are considering selling a portion of the entire farm a payment received must be refunded. Changes to your farming operation must be reported timely in order to reflect PFC payments to the current crop year producer.

All changes reflected on the CCC-478, Application for PFC Payment, must be signed by August 1, 2002. For additional information on the PFC program contact the FSA office.

Farm Changes
Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership. Farms involving corn and/or wheat must be properly constituted by June 1, 2002, with farms involving burley tobacco being constituted by July 1, 2002.

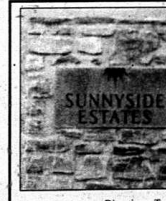

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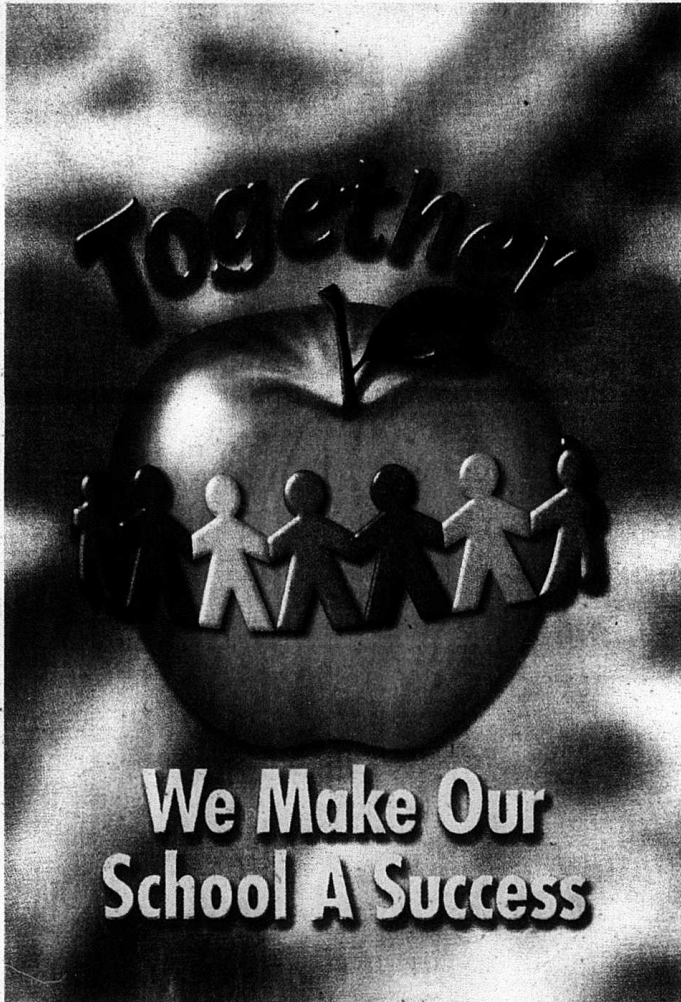
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
