Tragic wreck claims lives of two teenagers

A tragic single vehicle accident
on Hwy. 70 Saturday claimed the
lives of two Rockcastle County High
School students.
Another student is listed in stable

condition at the University of Ken-tucky Hospital and will recover from

his injuries.

Killed as a result of the wreck were Benjamin McKibben, 16, of Quail and Chris Tolle, 16, of Mt.

Quail.
All three were sophomores at the Rockcastle County High School.
According to Kentucky State Trooper Coby Smith, the accident occurred at 3:45 p.m., near the intersection of Carl Brown Road and Hwy.

70.
According to Smith's report, Cablewas driving a 1994 Ford Mustang,
toward Ottawa when he lost control
on wet pawement.
Smith's report said that the right
rear of the Mustang hit a tree and
came to rest in the creek that runs
along Hwy. 70.
The impact from the crash threw
Tolle from the vehicle.

Cable and McKibben ren Cable and McKibben remained in the whiche after the impact, and members of the Rockessate County EMS, Mt. Vermon and Brodhead freefighters had to use the jaws of life to free McKibben from the back seat of the website.

Totale died a few minutes after being takens to the Rockessate Hospital. McKibben was flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center and Cable was taken by ambulance. McKibben midd around 11 p.m. from massive internal injuries. It is unclear at this time if Cable or Totle had their seathelt on, but McKibben was wearing his.







More and more courts are ordering abusers into anger management classes to try to deal with this part of the problem.

Carloftis Responds....

My opponent, Mr. Saylor, has name a number of comments in his recent political advertisets that require a response. I do not believe that he would knowingly make false and misleading statements. Our county's fiscal court is the local government body that is entrusted to handle public matters. My Saylor's educational training is in pharmacy; I have two degrees in government (political science).

In one of his recent ads, he said the county spends too much, while in the very next paragraph he suggested that we spend more.

Regarding finances for the county, he has publicly stated it must be changed. This is very peculiar, especially since Rockcastle County has been able to meet its obligations. For example, he mentioned the judicial annex as a 'county' debt. He is mistaken. First of all, that was built before I got into office. While it appears on the county's list, it does so because the state law requires it be listed, even though the state pays most of the obligation. Secondly, Mr. Saydor evidently fails to understand the public's budget process. The Kentucky Infrastructure Author-ity, for example, requires their funding for water projects, etc., be listed by the county in order for people to have water lines constructed. Western Rockcastle Water Association, however, pays this obligation; it is merely listed on the county's report.

A couple of the fire departments in Rockcastle County, also, in order to receive extremely low interest rates, go through the fiscal court for equipment upgrades, etc. Again, these are only listed on the county's report.

My opponent also listed the jail. He evidently fails to understand that, had we not expanded the jail to bring in over \$55,000 every month, our citizens would have had to send our money to other counties to house prisoners, and that would have been disastrous

My opponent also suggested that we spend too much on maintaining and making better roads. I know that school buses now travel on roads that were not passable by them when I first got into office. As long as I am in office, I intend to continue making roads better, and we have






