ACCEPTING SUDDEN DEATH

Sudden death is, by definition, an event for which we are unprepared. Unlike the death of someone very old, or someone with a terminal illness, it is a death which has not been anticipated and is often quite difficult to accept.

When a family is faced with a sudden accidental death, it can be very helpful if they are able to view the body. In spite of serious injuries and damage, it is very often possible to prepare the body in an acceptable

fashion so that the family can view the loved one in order to face the reality of the death.

On the other hand, if the victim of a sudden death is kept from view, it can cause a lot of psychological problems for the survivors. As clinical data has demonstrated, preventing the family from seeing the body can keep them in the stage of denial for years to come, and prevent them from accepting their loss.

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Reynolds attends prosecutors school

William D. Reynolds, Assistant Rockcastle County Attorney has been recently selected as a participant in the 4th Annual Kentucky Prosecutor's Institute Trial Advocacy Training sponsored by the Office of the Attorney General in cooperation with the University of Kentucky College of Law.

Reynolds was recommended by County Attorney Jeff Burdette, a charter participant in the Institute in 1999.

The Institute only selects a limited number of participants each year, and includes both County Attorney offices and Commonwealth Attorney offices. The participants must demonstrably both academic and trial skills, and be recommended by an elected prosecutor before being considered.

"I am very pleased that Bill was selected for this prestigious training for prosecutors. He is very capable, and has become an invaluable partner in our efforts here at the County Attorney's office," Burdette said. The Kentucky Prosecutors Institute provides specialized training in courses designed in cooperation with the National Advocacy Center. Experienced Kentucky prosecutors and national speakers work toward establishing a wide-ranging curriculum, that Reynolds is currently participating

in at the University of Kentucky campus.

Reynolds, a Rockcastle native, who was sworn in as Assistant County Attorney for Rockcastle in May, 2001, is married to Rebecca Thacker Reynolds and they have two children, Jordan, 12 and Will, 8. They make their home on Highway 150 between Mt. Vernon and Brodhead. He is a 2000 graduate of Salmon P. Chase College of Law and was previously employed at Sullivan University as an adjunct professor for paralegal studies.

He is a 1982 graduate of Rockcastle County High School and has a Bachelor's degree from Eastern Kentucky University in political science.

the Institute, and look forward to utilizing the things I learn there in the courtroom setting," Reynolds said.

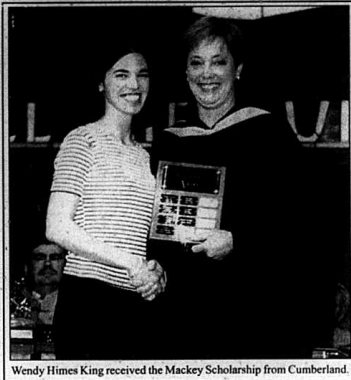

County's Finances

When our county decided to rebuild the jail, it opened a new opportunity to bring in over \$55,000 every month into our county. Rockcastle's facility was the only one used on a statewide brochure.

In addition, the Development Board has held many long meetings to assure that Rockcastle County has a comprehensive, long-range plan of development for our communities.

New Actions in Rockcastle

Among many other things, we now have a jail work release program to help with our road work, cemetery roads, litter and dump sites. This would not have been possible without the county's Fiscal Court involvement.

As your County Judge-Executive, I have made every effort to make all of our roads better—including the cemetery roads. I remember when, as a 12-year-old boy, I had to help push a hearse through mud to bury my great grandfather. This made a lasting impression upon me, which is why I have never apologized to anyone for making roads better. If re-elected, I will continue working to make all our roads better, and I know there is much more to get done.

Countywide Improvements

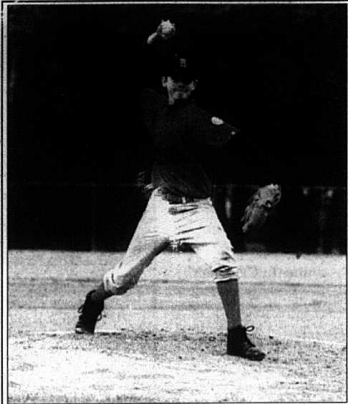

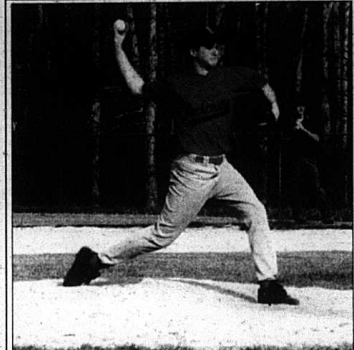

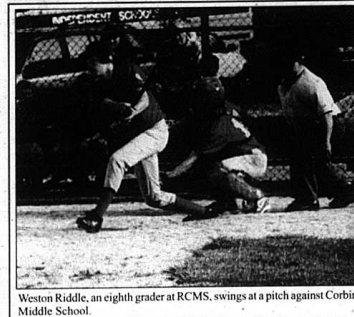

DUI suspensions changed

Governor Paul Patton has signed into law legislation that makes major changes in how long driver's license will be suspended for both drunken driving and driving on a suspended license conviction. The new law affects those convicted of a second or more DUI conviction and for those who are convicted of driving after their license has been suspended due to a DUI conviction.

The charges will allow judges to require an alcohol detection device to be placed on the person's ignition which requires the driver to blow into the device and be alcohol free before the vehicle will start. The judge can reduce the months or years of a license suspension if the driver installs the ignition interlock device on his or her vehicle.

Previous Kentucky law had the effect in many cases of suspending

the license for such long periods of time that household wage earners lost their jobs and forced the family on welfare. Adult students who could not drive to school were forced to withdraw from technical training or college. Many drivers just continued to drive without insurance and therefore became a potential problem to other drivers.

Handy and McCowan said all legislators are to be thanked for their approval of this law and in particular Representatives Kathy Stein of Lexington, Jeff Hoover of Russell Springs, Charlie Siler of Williamsburg, Barbara Colter of Manchester, Chaffie Hoffman of Georgetown, Tom McKee of Cynthia, Susan Westrom of Lexington and Senator Robert Stivers of Manchester. Steve Caswood, former Representative of Bell County, was

instrumental in the passage of this legislation.

The new law will become effective July 15 of this year and anyone

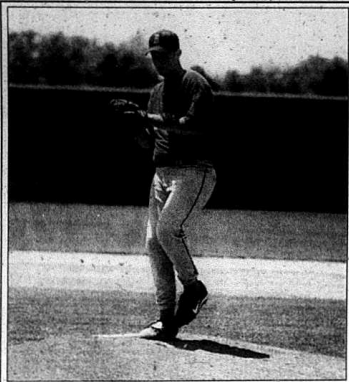

This years illusionist Roger Despard will be attempting Harry Houdini's death defying milk can escape, plus many of the exciting illusions seen on national television.

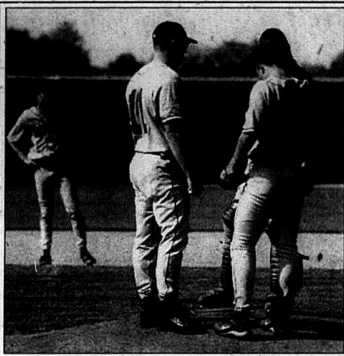

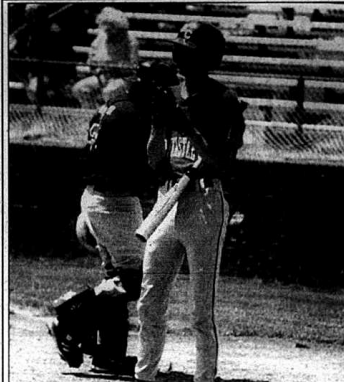

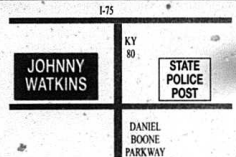

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on May 24, 2002, Kentucky Utilities Company ("KU") will file with the Kentucky Public Service Commission ("Commission") in Case No. 2002-00146, an Application pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statute 278.183 for approval of an amended compliance plan ("KU's 2002 Environmental Compliance Plan") for the purpose of recovering the capital and operation and maintenance costs associated with new pollution control facilities by way of assessment of an environmental surcharge on customers' bills beginning December 1, 2002, through KU's existing Electric Rate Schedule ES on file with and previously approved by the Commission. The total cost of these new facilities is estimated to be \$20.3 million.

Compliance with all federal, state and local environmental regulations requires KU to continually build and upgrade equipment and/or facilities required to continue to operate in an environmentally sound manner. Specifically, KU must expand the ash treatment facilities at the Cherry Power Station at Ghent, Kentucky to meet current environmental water quality standards.

The estimated impact on a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours per month is expected to be an increase of \$0.53 for KU customers in 2004.

The Application described in this Notice is proposed by KU. However, the Public Service Commission may make an order modifying or denying KU's Application. Such action may result in an environmental surcharge for consumers other than the environmental surcharge described in this Notice.

Any corporation, association, body politic or person may, by motion within thirty (30) days after publication, request leave to intervene in Case No. 2002-00146. That motion shall be submitted to the Public Service Commission, 211 Sower Blvd., P.O. 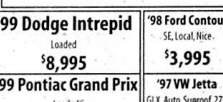

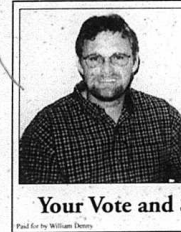

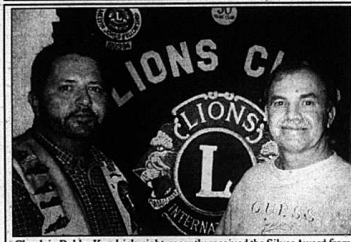

Sexton, one of 25 Kentucky artist to bring Inner Visions project to at-risk youth

The U.S. Department of Education recently awarded its first round of federal education grants specifically earmarked for arts programs for at-risk youth and children. The program began January 3 and will run through September 30, bringing over 25 artists into classrooms to engage students and teachers in music, drama, dance, visual arts, storytelling, creative writing, folk arts and traditional arts. The arts education project called Inner Visions targets students of 10 state-run children's residential or day treatment facilities in Jefferson County. Children are placed in the programs through court commitment, psychiatric hospitalization or identified need for long-term treatment of emotional or behavioral problems.

Octavia Sexton, a native of Rockcastle County, is one of the artists who has been trained and placed in two of the facilities to work with youth in storytelling and creative writing. Octavia is a full time performing artist and works in schools throughout the Eastern United States teaching creative writing and drama through storytelling.

The Inner Visions project can be replicated in all counties and act as a model for other youth at risk projects. The program content can be easily adapted to all ages and abilities. The end products produced by the students and teachers can be duplicated and used in a variety of settings along with a curriculum guide to accompany the audio, video and visual end products.

Food planning during emergency or disaster

Pre-planning and using recommended cooling and cooking practices will ensure your family has safe, nutritious meals in the event of a flood, tornado or other weather disaster.

To prepare for a crisis, collect a two-week supply of food for each family member. Consider members' needs and preferences, storage space and emergency cooking methods. Remember to collect formula or baby food for infants, as well as food for your pets.

Be sure to include water in your emergency food reserve. A person can live several days without food, but only a few days without water. So stock up on bottled water, allowing at least two quarts per day for each person in your family.

There are several alternative water sources in your home. You can melt ice cubes, use cooled water from the hot-water tank, the toilet tank (not the bowl!) and water pipes. Don't use water from the toilet tank if you've added chemical treatments to it. To use the hot-water tank, turn off the heating source to let the tank cool; then use a container to collect water from the drain valve at the bottom of the tank. To use water from water pipes, release air pressure in the plumbing system by turning on the highest faucet in the house and drain water from the lowest faucet.

The easiest way to plan a food

reserve is to increase the amount of food you normally keep on the shelf or pantry. Rotate your supply once or twice a year, or follow the use-by date.

It's best to buy pre-packaged foods such as canned goods, juices, and no-freeze dinners in vacuum-packed containers. Canned foods don't require cooking, water, or special preparation. A variety of canned foods means your family can have reasonably well-balanced meals. It might be more practical to serve more generous portions of fewer types of foods if water or power are limited.

Store canned and dry foods in a cool area away from heat and light. After opening a package, put the remaining contents in a screw-top jar or air-tight container to protect them from pests. Also put a manual can opener and disposable plates and utensils with your reserve food supply.

Periodically inspect all food containers for spoilage and discard all dented containers or those with broken seals. Remember, you can't rely on appearance or odor to determine whether a food is safe for your family to eat.

Power Outages

If the electricity goes off, first use perishable foods in the refrigerator; then, foods from the freezer.

Remember, each time you open a refrigerator or freezer door, it reduces the time food remains at a safe, non-perishable temperature.

A full, free-standing freezer will keep food at safe temperatures for up to three days. A refrigerator freezer will safely maintain foods for about two days. Frozen food with ice crystals in the storage is safe to eat if properly cooked.

Use non-perishable foods and staples last during extended periods without electricity.

You can choose from several emergency cooking methods including a fireplace, top of a kerosene heater and outside on a charcoal or gas grill or camp stove. Candles and cans of sterno also can provide heat. Chafing dishes and fondue pots make good heating utensils, as do cans of food with lids and paper labels removed.

If you need matches to start cooking equipment, store them in closed plastic bags with the equipment.

This report is to inform you about the excellent water and services that we deliver each day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water remains at the highest level and the price at the lowest level as we meet the needs of our community.

We purchase water from three different sources. We first is the City of Mt. Vernon, whose source is surface water drawn from Lake Louisville and treated at their water treatment plant located at Ruffo Valley. The second is Jackson Co. Water Assn. which uses treated surface water drawn from Beulah Lake. The last source is Livingston Water Works, which is treated water from Wood Creek Water District drawn from Wood Creek Lake.

The Rockcastle Water Association routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State regulations. The table enclosed within this report shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1, 2001 through December 31, 2001. The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include: microbial contaminants, inorganic contaminants, pesticides and herbicides, organic chemical contaminants, and radioactive contaminants. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems.

A source water assessment plan is scheduled to be completed prior to the year 2003 as required by KY Division of Water Resources. Copies of the plan will be available for inspection upon request from our office when the plan is completed.

Definitions
This report may contain many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we are providing the following definitions:
Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available technology.
Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Action Level (AL) - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
Below Detection Levels (BDL) - laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.

Treatment Technique (TT) - a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.
Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) - a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.
Parts per million (ppm) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.
Parts per billion (ppb) - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.
PicoSivier per liter (pCi/L) - a measure of the radioactivity in water.
Not Applicable (N/A) - Does not apply.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCL): MCLs are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated contaminants, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.
Water Quality Violations and Health Effects: THM's (Total Trihalomethanes): The current MCL for total trihalomethanes (TTHM) is 100 ppb but will soon change to 80 ppb. Some people who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous systems, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer. The water system has modified the flushing program and is taking steps to reduce the levels of trihalomethanes in the distribution system.

During the year 2001, initial laboratory analysis indicated positive results for five bacteriological water samples. However, all five locations tested negative on follow-up samples. The original positive results may have been due to laboratory error or improper sampling technique. Subsequent tests did not indicate a threat to our water quality.

Monitoring and Reporting Violation: In March 2001 they received a monitoring/reporting violation for Radionuclides. Although they were following a monitoring schedule provided by the Kentucky Division of Water, unfortunately, it was incorrect. A sample was collected in March of 2000 and the laboratory results were below the MCL. Corrected measures have been implemented to prevent future violations of this type.

We at Rockcastle Water Association work diligently to provide top quality water to every tap. Our water operators are highly trained, tested, and certified by the state of Kentucky. We ask that all our customers help us protect our water resources, which are the heart of our community, our way of life and our children's future.

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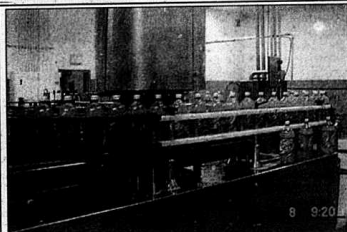

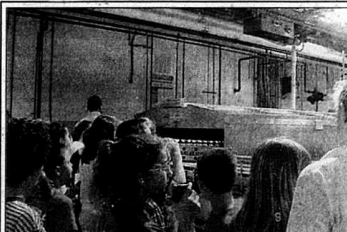

Hut Stricklin talks about his Mom
Hut Stricklin, driver of the No. 23 Hills Bros Coffee Dodge Intrepid R/T talked about his mom. Growing up in Calera, Ala., Stricklin's mother, Vivian, was known as a dare devil. She encouraged her son's love for speed and shared in it with him. She still watches her son race, mostly on TV now, and continues to give him pointers and support.

"My mom was pretty much a speed demon and dare devil herself. Her whole family had grown up around cars. They didn't race, but a lot of her family owned wrecking yards around Birmingham. My mom and dad each owned one. My mom was in Calera and my dad had one in Pelham, Ala. They were about 15 miles apart. Mom was always a hard worker. At the time, my dad worked for the railroad trying to make ends

meet, while my mom ran the wrecking yard.

Once I got up and going, where it could pay the family bills, dad quit the railroad and started working at the wrecking yard.

"I ran my first two races in 1977 (16 years old). When I was growing up, if I wanted a motorcycle, my mom was like 'yeah, get a motorcycle. That sounds like fun. I'll ride with you.' Mom was opposite of most moms. She was always behind me, encouraging me to do a lot of things. I bought a used Honda 350 from a guy. I'd never even drove a motorcycle, just a mini-bike.

The first day I got it, mom hopped on the back of it with me and we took off down the road. She was always that way. She was a Tom-boy type mom, and she always encouraged me to keep going. I was just my older sister Diane and me.

"I went home and took the mufflers off the motorcycle. I drove it like hell. It was killer loud. A cop pulled me over and gave me a warning for illegal mufflers. I came home and put the mufflers back on it. I told mom I got stopped for illegal mufflers. She said it wasn't too loud, and I said I knew that. She said 'come on, I'm going to ride it down there with you and we're going to show 'em it's not too loud. I had put the mufflers back on it. We went back

down there and you could hold it just about wide open and it wasn't too loud.' She couldn't figure out why they'd never come get us. She thought they were just sticking on me. I didn't tell her what I had done until about a year later.

"We had brought a brand new wrecker. Sometimes she'd drive it. It had an incredible low gear. I thought it was so cool. You could drop the clutch and light up both rear tires and it had dual wheels on the back. It would leave four tracks, skid marks. For three weeks, I drove it to school and light up the tires when I left school. It kept breaking axles.

Mom carried it back to the dealership and told them they had defective axles in it. She did that for three weeks straight weeks. One day, a friend of ours, a highway patrolman, was sitting at the end of the road when I left it. I was spinning the tires, and he pointed his finger at me. I was hoping he wouldn't tell mom. Sure enough the next day, he told mom. She figured out why we kept having the defective axles. She took my wrecker license away for awhile.

"My sister was more conservative. She really wasn't into the dare devil stuff. Early on, I just always liked the motorcycles and the real fast go-karts. Mom even let me get a go-kart one time that ran about 130 mph.

That thing was really fast. I had to get rid of it because I did have enough sense to know I was going to kill myself on it if I didn't. She wouldn't let me on the go-kart.

"She was always wide open when she drove a car. To this day, and she's 70 now, I'll never know how she keeps her license. She's had her share of speeding tickets. She's probably had as many as I have, without a doubt."

"There were three ways to run moonshine from Dawson County into Atlanta: down Highway 9, Highway 53, or over the mountain," said Parks. "Each route required a different car setup. So when a driver came to me, the first thing I would ask him was, which road are you taking? Then I would give him that setup."

A native of Dawsonville, Sosebec was known as "The Wild Indian."

lanita, he hit a telephone pole and was taken to the hospital. He slipped out of the hospital that night and was in Macon, Georgia, in time to start Sunday's race-which he won.

Red Byron was one of the 35 founding members of NASCAR and also the first NASCAR Champion.

Red Voght was from Washington, D.C. According to his son, he quit school in the fifth grade. But by the age 16, he was manager of a large automobile repair shop.

During the Prohibition Era, he ran illegal Canadian whiskey from the Canadian border to the White House for three different presidents, receiving \$100 per carload.

He is credited with coming up with the name, NASCAR. "Rapid" Roy Hall was a free spirit who was literally hell on wheels. Arriving in Daytona in 1946, Hall cut doughnuts in the street. When arrested, he explained he wanted to go to jail because the Daytona hotel rates were too high.

Tim Cook entered 187 races and won 40 times. In 1961, he was banned from NASCAR because of an attempt to unionize drivers for better driving and safety conditions. The ban was lifted in 1965, but he never returned.

Lloyd Seay was a legend long before television and big bucks entered racing. He once won three races over a period of nine days.

Bill Elliott began his career in 1976. He has 11 poles, 11 wins and a \$1-million bonus. With brothers, Ernie and Dan in the pits, Elliott won the Winston Cup Championship. The idea of building the 44 acre and 44,000 square foot facility on Highway 53 as a race-oriented visitor attraction 45 miles north of Atlanta was a natural one, based on the early history of stock car racing in and around Dawson County.

Dawsonville is a place where the memory of fast cars, illegal whiskey and wharfing encounters between runners and revenue officers is only a generation old.

In fact, five of the first winners at Daytona hailed from Dawsonville. Included in the museum are thousands of donated racing memorabilia:

car hoods, quarter panels, original artwork, race hero memorabilia, cars, license plates, gas station pumps, local track signs and photographs. But probably one of the most viewed acquisitions is a real whiskey still.

"Before we could set it up we had to sign documents not use it to produce anything," said Marty Williams, President of Thunder Road USA.

Does anyone remember bench-type car seats?

This past weekend I took my 1970 Lincoln Mark III to "Snapper" Clark in Irvington, Alabama. It had developed a few rust spots around one of the headlight covers, which is what will typically occur after a car sits in a garage for a few years along the humid gulf coast.

"Snapper" is a young man, who like me has had a few women problems in his life. But aside from asking me questions about how to handle women, he is a pretty good body man and mechanic.

His latest problem centers around his young wife seeming to think they should buy some property and move out of the country home and acre to his family gave him a few years back.

"Snapper" is one of those late back people who works hard, but the thought of a big mortgage scares him. He's not a stereotypical of what some northerners refer to as Bubbas because he doesn't chew tobacco, have a pipe, or drink much beer. He's just set in his ways and doesn't want to go head-over-heels into debt.

This Mark III is not the first Lincoln I've owned. There were two others. I had both of them at times in my life when I had a need for speed. Some Freudians might say I have a compulsion for large and flashy cars because of my poor southern upbringing. Growing up in the 1940s and '50s, my family was poor, but back then no one noticed. Everybody was on the same level.

My father built the house I still own. He operated a flower nursery and mother was a housewife. I factually ate better at home than many days after I was out on my own. Daddy saw to it that we had meat at every meal.

At home it was ice cream and pie for dessert. Later on in life, it became corn bread or die.

We had a 1953 green Chevrolet pickup that I was allowed to use on dates. What really stands out about this truck was its bench-type seat. Yeah, the girl could smuggle right up next to you.

Nowadays, that is as old as the dinosaurs. The bucket seats did away with intimacy and a lot of other things that went on in the front seat of a car. In 1959 I was in the Navy and stationed at Sandia Base in Albuquerque, New Mexico. My wife lived with her parents in Las Vegas. Usually I was able to get a three-day weekend pass to visit her.

One weekend while visiting her, I bought a 1953 Lincoln. It was a big green four-door monster of a car with an outside sun visor over the windshield, and recessed headlights. I spent every weekend for about six months rebuilding the big flathead V-8 in it.

Finally, the engine was finished and put back in the car. Everything had been tightened and it was time to go for a test ride.

My brother-in-law, Clayton Cockrell and I headed north from Las Vegas on the highway to St. George, Utah. It was a nice scenic ride through open desert and mountains. After about 50 miles we stopped at a gas station, filled it up with gas and headed back to Vegas.

Everything about the Lincoln was running perfect. By this time I felt as though the engine had been broken in and I put the pedal to the floor on a downhill stretch of road as we crested Eye Mountain. The engine roared to life.

Pretty soon telephone poles were going by so fast it was hard to count them. The feeling was one of weightlessness. The bumps in the road could hardly be felt. The windows were all down, and that was the closest thing to flying without an airplane I ever experienced. I looked down and the speedometer cable was way out of sight, past the 110 mph mark.

I glanced over at Clayton and he didn't look so good. The color of his face was alternating from a dull white to a funny kind of purple. Suddenly, water droplets started appearing on the windshield. There wasn't a cloud in the sky, so I knew something wasn't right in the engine department. The amount of water increased, and then the smoke started rolling out the rear end. I had blown the motor in my prized Lincoln.

We made it to the foot of Easy

Mountain and left my hotrod Lincoln on the side of the road and hitchhiked into Vegas. My brother-in-law sold my Lincoln to some kids who later cut the top off and turned it into a desert buggy. I almost cried.

The second Lincoln I owned was a black 1965 sedan with suicide doors.

Outside of three beautiful girls (my children) it was the love of my life. It was tough having to give it up. I still remember the words my ex-wife spoke in the courtroom, prior to our divorce proceedings. "Say your prayers, you're going to need them," she told me. But I never dreamed she would hit me that far below the belt. I wound up with the house and the

13 acres and a large monthly alimony payment, but I lost my Lincoln. It was painful losing that car. Unless you're a man who loves classic cars, you can probably never understand how someone could bond with a car.

I found my present love sitting in the front of James Hollingsworth's junkyard in Dog River, Alabama in 1996. It was turquoise with a white vinyl top. I bought it for \$5,600 and drove it home. After six years of personal restoration and several thousands of dollars, my new love looks awful good.

She's ready to be driven. Now, if I can just find someone who still likes to ride in a car with a bench-type leather seat my life will have gone full circle.
