CHILD'S RIGHT TO KNOW

We tend to assume that death is beyond a child's comprehension. In a sense it is, for even adults do not understand the complete meaning of death. This does not mean that the parent should not share with the youngest the fragments of adult experience and knowledge, and that the child should not be allowed to absorb as much of the concept as he is capable of.

The other argument for not speaking of the death of a loved one to a child is to protect him. The adult may feel such intense anguish at the loss that he chooses to spare the child similar suffering. This is somewhat unfair. The child has every right to be included in that situation which seriously affects him. Silence only deprives him of the opportunity to share his grief. Besides, left alone to understand the absence of a loved one, he will often end up feeling bewildered, confused, even guilty.

ASPI celebrating 25 years Gas prices decline slightly

Appalachia-Science in the Public Interest (ASPI) is celebrating its 25th anniversary on Saturday, June 1st. This milestone will be celebrated in conjunction with the 19th Annual Rockcastle River Day. The event will be held at the Demonstration Center on the Rockcastle River just off I-75 near Livingston.

This River Day will be dedicated to Jerry Waddle, a local activist and enthusiastic promoter of the Rockcastle River who recently passed away.

The day will begin around noon by providing a vegetarian meal with refreshments, followed by tours of Appropriate Technology demonstrations, games for the kids, and a "River Jam" open to anyone who wants to bring an instrument and join in. You can also enjoy a hike on the 5+ miles of nature trails or browse through the Nature Center.

ASPI was founded in 1977 as a Kentucky nonprofit organization dedicated to research, advocacy, and education regarding issues that affect Central Appalachia. The mission was to make science and technology responsive to the needs of low-income

people in Central Appalachia. The various projects fall under three major program areas: ASPI Publications, The Appropriate Technology Demonstration Center, and The Sustainable Forest Program. Organizational highlights from the past 25 years include:

- 1977 - ASPI founded through National Science Foundation grant.
- 1979 - Built first solar house in the Daniel Boone National Forest.
- 1982 - Co-sponsor of solar home at Knoxville World's Fair.
- 1983 - Built first Cordwood Building in Southern Appalachians.
- 1984 - Construction began on the first Nature Trails.
- 1991 - Nature Center built.
- 1996 - First "Earth Healing" television show - Now the longest-running prime-time show on WOBZ-TV in London.
- 1998 - Appalachian Ginseng Foundation founded.
- 2001 - Kentucky Solar Partnership founded.

Kentucky's gas prices have declined slightly and there should not be a major jump going into the Memorial Day weekend according to AAA Blue Grass Kentucky. After the holiday an expected increase in demand could push prices into the \$1.50 range by the fourth of July and then prices should ease down again as summer ends.

The average price for a gallon of self-serve unleaded regular in Kentucky is now \$1.32 down slightly from last month. The national average is \$1.40 per gallon. Last year at this time Kentuckians were paying \$1.69 for a gallon of unleaded gas.

Average prices for key Kentucky cities: Lexington \$1.29; Louisville \$1.31; Ashland \$1.33 and Covington \$1.39.

Across the U.S. the highest average prices for a gallon of self-serve unleaded regular are in Hawaii at \$1.67, California at \$1.62, Alaska at

\$1.56, and the District of Columbia at \$1.54. The lowest average prices are in Georgia at \$1.24, Oklahoma at \$1.26, South Carolina \$1.28 and Missouri at \$1.29.

Motorists will probably face some volatility as the gas pump for the third straight summer as instability in Venezuela and the Middle East could be a factor in higher prices. AAA is keenly sensitive to the impact unstable gasoline prices have on consumers' personal finances and is concerned that the industry remain both competitive and environmentally responsible.

AAA Blue Grass Kentucky is a not-for-profit automobile club serving 120,000 members in Central and Eastern Kentucky and parts of Virginia and West Virginia. Since its founding in 1902 AAA has been a leader and advocate for the safety and security of all travelers.

Election night tally system to provide up-to-the-minute results

Kentuckians can now access up-to-the-minute election night results on the Internet in an easy-to-use format.

Kentucky Secretary of State John Y. Brown, III and the Kentucky State Board of Elections had the new system designed to replace the old Election Night Tally System, which was difficult to use because it required that a telnet emulator be downloaded and that the user navigate a main-frame application.

Now, users can simply launch their web browser, go the Kentucky State Board of Elections web site and click on "Current Election Results". The site offers a color-coded map that defines each Congressional District and allows easy access to the election results.

Statewide races can be viewed and votes summarized by county or for the entire state. In addition to candidate votes, the user can view the number of registered voters in the state or in the county, the number of counties reporting and the number of precincts reporting.


"This should make it much easier for citizens to keep up with the election returns," said Kentucky Secretary of State John Y. Brown, III.

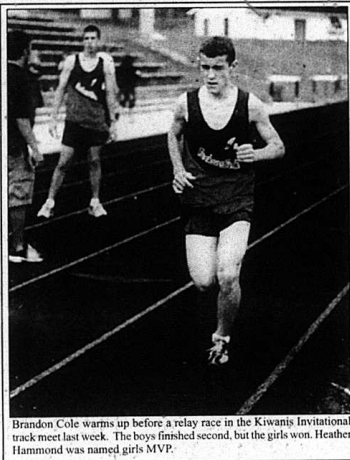

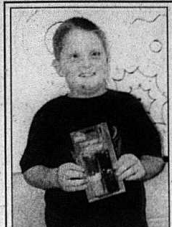

KDFWR introduces archery program

Kentucky is leading the nation in developing archery courses in 22 schools across the Commonwealth in a pilot project that partners the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and avid bow hunter. "It's a pilot project we're exploring in 22 schools in Physical Education classes in middle schools across Kentucky. It's a two week target archery course."

Archery is a burgeoning sport that is fair to all participants regardless of sex, strength or size. "You can take a kid that is five feet one inch tall and weighs maybe 80 or 90 pounds and put him on the archery line against the quarterback for the football team or against a boy who can almost dunk a basketball and you're leveling the playing fields," said Jennie

Richardson, Archery Coordinator for the KDFWR and a national tournament archer. "Everyone can compete at the same rate."

The cost of the project was \$134,000. This amount has been defrayed by as many as two dozen contributing partners including the National Field Archery Association, the International Bowhunting Organization, the National Wild Turkey Federation, the National Rifle Association and archery manufacturers such as Sims Vibration Labs, Easton Archery and Mathews Genesis.

Up to 80 percent of the student archers in the program will retain their skill and interest in adulthood through hunting or formal competition. "We believe that students who

learn the proper techniques of shooting bows and arrows and who take up the sport will go outdoors and they will enjoy the outdoors," Grimes said. "Some may become target archers. Maybe they will represent our country someday in the Olympics. Some of them will become hunters and join the ranks of sportsmen in Kentucky."

Connie Shackelford and Agnus Durbin of the Kentucky Department of Education wrote the Archery in Kentucky Schools curriculum. Kelly Ambrose, Physical Education Teacher at Model High School in Richmond, is one of the participant

teachers in the program. "I think archery combines the mental with the physical in the sense they have to concentrate and they have to focus," Ambrose said. "It helps a lot of students transfer those concentration skills they use in archery here in the classroom."

Grimes believes there is a bright future for the program. "In four or five years, I hope we're in at least half of the middle schools in Kentucky and that 50,000 kids a year are taking part in this archery course. There are three million kids who are seeking archery in schools in South Korea and they are dominating the Olympics because of it."

KHEAA mailing grant eligibility notices to students

The Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) is mailing notices to thousands of Kentucky students about their potential eligibility for College Access Program (CAP) Grants and Kentucky Tuition Grants (KTG) for the 2002-03 academic year. The notices advise students to check KHEAA's website www.kheaa.com, where they will find all of the Kentucky schools listed on their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and their CAP and KTG eligibility status.

A CAP grant may be used at an eligible Kentucky public or private college or university, public technical college, or proprietary school. The award amount for the 2002-03 academic year is \$1,260 (\$630 each semester). Eligible part-time college students will receive an amount calculated on \$53 a credit hour. Part-time amounts for CAP recipients attending quarter-hour institutions are calculated according to a schedule provided to the institutions.

KTG awards may be used at an eligible Kentucky private college. The maximum KTG award for a full-

time student is \$1,800 for the school year.

"KHEAA is pleased to offer these need-based awards to help Kentuckians pay for their college education or technical training expenses," said Dr. Joe L. McCormick, KHEAA's Executive Director. "Our goal is to make higher education more accessible for Kentuckians."

The Duty of the Parents is to Believe & Protect

When a child reports that he has been sexually abused in some way, what is the duty of the parents? The parents should believe the child and make certain that the child is protected from the abuser. Unfortunately this is not always what happens. Consider the following cases (all characters are fictitious).

Penny's grandfather had been sexually molesting her from the time Penny was six. At age nine she told her mother what was happening. "Mom freaked out," Penny remembers today. "She told me that I should be ashamed for accusing my grandfather of such things and that I was a bad girl for even thinking that."

"Mom beat me so hard that I had to stay home for a week until the bruises healed," Penny continued. "You can be certain I never said anything about it to my mother again! A year or so later I told the counselor at school. She had me talk to workers from social services and the abuse stopped at that point."

"Most of my depression and anxiety stems from the abuse and Mom's punishment of me," Penny told me. "I believed that I was a bad person for allowing such a thing to go on. Then when Mom beat me, I believed I was bad for having told. That belief in my own failure as a person has dogged me throughout my life."

Mike was not punished when he reported the abuse, but his parents did not believe him. "When I told them what my uncle had done to me, they acted as if I was crazy," Mike said. "They didn't believe that my dad's favorite brother would ever do something like that. He was a nice man and liked by everyone who knew

him. I guess they thought I was just making it up to get attention."

"Because they did not believe me, I kept quiet about it," Mike continued.

"I never told anyone until now. When I was thirteen, I told my uncle that if he didn't stop, I would hurt him, and I was big enough to do it. Only then did he quit."

"I'm sure the abuse has affected me," Mike remarked. "I don't let anyone get close to me. I don't have a close friend, and my relationship with my parents is strained. I refuse to go to their house when my uncle is there, and they act like they don't understand why. I don't think I will ever be close to my family again."

Susan had better success when she told about her abuse, but her parent's Response was still lacking in some ways. "Mom believed me when I told her about my cousin," Susan remembers, "because she came in and caught him doing some things to me. I guess she had no choice but to believe me. I told her everything that had happened. AND WE NEVER TALKED ABOUT IT AGAIN. It was never mentioned. My cousin never tried anything again, but I don't know why. What did they do? I wish I knew. I wish they had told me. I was always afraid that it would happen again. Maybe if I knew what they had done to protect me, I would not have been so scared."

Believe and protect. Believe and protect. Write these words on your forehead, parents. Children who tell about sexual abuse usually have good reason for doing so. There is truth behind most of those stories. Take them seriously and make certain that the child is protected from further harm.

Presidential Declarations

March 17-21, 2002 STORM
President Bush has declared 29 Kentucky counties as disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by severe storms and flooding that occurred from March 17 through March 21.

In addition, 18 Kentucky counties were named as a contiguous county were eligible family farmers may qualify for FSA Emergency Loan assistance pursuant to Section 321 (a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act. Rockcastle County is listed as being one of those 18 counties.

May 1-2, 2002 STORM
President Bush has declared Rockcastle County as a disaster area due to damages and losses caused by severe storms and flooding that occurred from May 1-2, 2002.

Both public and private assistance and grants are available to local residents with damage from the storms. Citizens must first apply for low interest loans that are available and then the government determines if the applicant is eligible for the grant.

Residents who need assistance should call 1-800-621-3362. Those calling must have their social security number, address, telephone number, insurance information and the household's gross income.

Inspectors will call to schedule an appointment to visit your property within a few days of applications. They will inspect the damage, verify ownership and occupancy, and make a report. There is NO FEE for the inspection.

If you are a producer who received damages from the storms during those dates please contact the FSA office at (606)256-2525 for further information.

USDA Launches Farm Bill Implementation Website

With the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has launched a new website aimed at helping farmers, ranchers and the general public learn the latest information about the new farm bill.

The website can be directly accessed from USDA's official website at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill/>

by simply clicking on the 2002 Farm Bill icon on USDA's main website at <http://www.usda.gov/>.

The new website will include farm bill program details, questions and answers, program applications and sign-up forms, as well as other important materials from USDA agencies on farm bill implementation. The website will also contain advanced electronic applications to help program applicants receive program benefits faster and more efficiently.

Barley Tobacco Leasing

Producers may lease barley tobacco quota effective immediately through July 1st. Producers may list quota for lease on the bulletin board space by way of contacting the county office either in person or by telephone.

Tobacco Spot Checks

Producers who have reported unmarketed tobacco stored on the farms are subject for random spot checks. Spot checks are performed by local FSA personnel to verify the amount of tobacco reported. These spot checks will be carried out in the next few months. If you have moved tobacco from where you first reported the storage, please contact FSA to report the new location.

Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP)

Producers who retain beneficial

interest in a commodity eligible for a loan or a loan of deficiency payment are eligible for payment if all of the following remain with the producer: control of the commodity, risk of loss, title of the commodity, crops must have been produced on contract acreage (AMTA).

FSA realizes that many farmers may begin feeding, thus, the loss of beneficial interest occurs. Anyone who has lost title, risk and control of the crop, is NOT eligible for benefits.

Final loan and LDP availability dates for the 2001 crop are: Corn, Grain, Sorghum and Soybeans—May 31, 2002.

Wheat Reporting

Small grains (wheat) crop reporting can now be completed at the FSA office after they are planted. Wheat crop reporting must be on file by May 31, 2002. All other crop reporting must be on file by July 15, 2002.

FY2002 PFC Reminder

Producers who wish to receive their 2002 PFC (Production Flexibility Contract) payments early must sign a form for what month you wish to receive your 2002 payment. The deadline to sign or revise a PFC for FY2002 is August 1, 2002.

Producers are encouraged not to request a payment for the farm if they are considering selling a portion or the entire farm as payment received must be refunded. Changes in your farming operation must be reported timely in order to reflect PFC payments to the current crop year producer.

All changes reflected on the CCC-478, Application for PFC Payment, must be signed by August 1, 2002.

For additional information on the PFC program contact the FSA office.

Farm Changes

Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with corrected ownership. Farms involving corn and/or wheat must be properly constituted by June 1, 2002 with farms involving barley tobacco being constituted by July 1, 2002.

County Committee Monthly Meeting

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Committee (COC) will hold monthly meetings open to the public the first Tuesday of each month beginning at 8:00 a.m. The meeting will be at the Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency located in the USDA Service Center on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon. The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, June 6.

The COC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help FSA at the local level by deciding the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will operate. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws and applying their judgement and knowledge to make decisions.

Folks read the above verses, and they say that we are justified by "faith only." Now the only problem with this idea, is that it is just NOT so! Notice how Paul begins and ends the book of Romans, "By whom we have received grace and apostleship, for obedience to the faith among all nations, for his name." Rom 1:5, "But now is made manifest, and by the scriptures of the prophets, according to the commandment of the everlasting God, made known to all nations for the obedience of faith." So the context shows us that the kind of faith that saves, is an obedient faith. You see how people overlook the context of a book and jump to erroneous and false ideas "Let us handle accurately the word of truth."



Health services food safety tips for a safe Memorial Day

The Kentucky Cabinet for Health Services wants this Memorial Day weekend and the rest of the cookout season to be safe and healthy for Kentucky families.

Kentuckians can make it safe by taking the appropriate precautions with the food they prepare.

During the summer months and especially during the Memorial Day weekend, a great number of families and gatherings will be cooking out and preparing foods for meals," said Guy F. Delina, manager of the Cabinet's Food Safety Branch. "Our food processors do a wonderful job packaging and protecting the foods we buy, and we don't want a little mistake during the preparation or cooking process in our homes to cause any illness or something worse."

The Food Safety Branch wants to remind Kentucky cooks of some general food safety tips in hopes of ensuring safe, healthy meals. Make sure all ground beef or hamburgers are thoroughly cooked with no pink inside, and heated to an internal temperature of the meat to at least 155-160 degrees F.

DO NOT SERVE OR EAT

UNDERCOOKED HAMBURGERS. Remember not to put the cooked burgers back on the same plate the raw burgers were on, without washing the plate properly. Be sure to keep your hands clean, don't cross contaminate hands or surfaces, **COOK** foods thoroughly, keep food contact surfaces clean, wash raw fruits and vegetables, don't let foods stay at room temperature and refrigerate foods promptly after the meal.

Delina says during potluck gatherings, we should be especially conscious of these food safety tips. A potluck is where different individuals make foods for a common event and share each other's meals. As these events sometimes feed multiple persons or families, one mistake can cause problems for many.

Each cook should follow these keys to food safety and you will help provide safe meals at your gatherings.

***WASH HANDS-** Before eating, before preparing food, after using the bathroom, handling raw meat or poultry, changing diapers, and after handling pets. Use soap, warm clean water to wash and a paper towel to dry hands.
