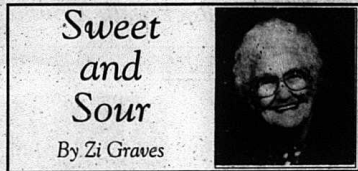
Also, thank you to the parents who make up the Project Graduation 2002 committee for all their help and to Renfro Valley Entertainment for allowing us to have our service in their facilities.

NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS OF KENTUCKY UTILITIES COMPANY RECOVERY BY ENVIRONMENTAL SURCHARGE OF KUS 2002 ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE PLAN

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on May 30, 2002, Kentucky Utilities Company ("KUC") filed with the Kentucky Public Service Board ("PSB") an Application Pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statute 278.183 for approval of an amended compliance plan ("KUS 2002 Environmental Compliance Plan") for the purpose of recovering the capital and operating and maintenance costs associated with new pollution control facilities by way of assessment of an environmental surcharge on customers' bills beginning December 1, 2002, through KUC's existing Electric Rate Schedule ("ERS") on file with and previously approved by the Commission. The total cost of these new facilities is estimated to be \$20.3 million. Compliance with all federal, state and local environmental regulations requires KUC to continually build and upgrade equipment and/or facilities required to continue to operate in an environmentally sound manner. Specifically, KUC must expand the ash treatment facilities at the Ghart Power Station at Ghart, Kentucky to meet current environmental water quality standards. The estimated impact on a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours per month is expected to be an increase of \$0.53 for KUC customers in 2004. The Application described in this Notice is proposed by KUC. However, the Public Service Commission may make an order modifying or denying KUC's Application. Such action may result in an environmental surcharge for consumers other than the environmental surcharge described in this Notice. Any corporation, association, body politic or person may, by motion, within thirty (30) days after publication, request leave to intervene in Case No. 2002-00148. That motion shall be submitted to the Public Service Commission, 211 Sower Blvd., PO Box 815, Frankfort, Kentucky, 40602, and shall set forth the grounds for such request including the status and interest of the party. Intervenor's may obtain copies of the Application and testimony by contacting Kentucky Utilities Company at 223 West Main Street, Louisville, Kentucky 40202, Attention: Michael S. Beer, Vice President, Rates and Regulatory Affairs. A copy of the Application and testimony will be available for public inspection at the KUC's offices where bills are paid.

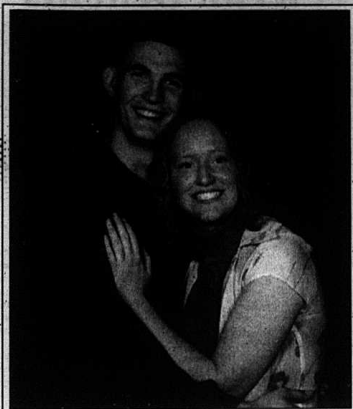

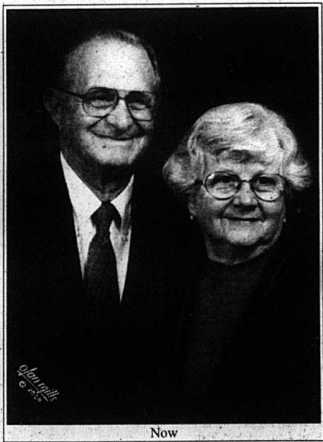

# Cunningham attends Obesity Conference

James Cunningham, M.D., whose offices are on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon, was among the more than 150 physicians and allied health personnel who attended the Western Regional Obesity Course of the American Society of Bariatric Physicians (ASBP) held recently in Denver, Colorado.

Some of the nation's leading authorities in the field of obesity described the latest techniques for the medical treatment of overweight and obesity and for maintaining weight loss.

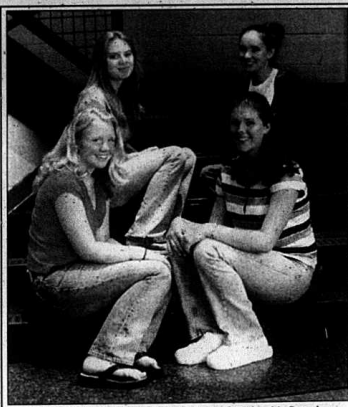
The scientific presentations dealt with treatment of insulin resistance, management of obese diabetic patients, obesity surgery, use of anti-obesity medications, long-term weight loss, geriatric obesity, childhood and adolescent obesity, new obesity drugs in clinical trials and the role of diet composition.

Established in 1950, the ASBP is a national professional medical society of physicians and other health professionals who offer their patients comprehensive medical weight loss

programs to treat overweight and obesity and their associated conditions. ASBP's Bariatric Practice Guidelines call for complete work-ups and physical examinations, counseling on diet and nutrition, exercise planning, behavior modification (lifestyle changes) and, when indicated, the use of prescription anti-obesity medications.

To ensure that ASBP members and others remain on the cutting edge of the newest technology in treating overweight and obesity, the Society offers regional conferences and an annual obesity symposium to present accredited continuing medical education (CME) programs to participants. The ASBP also encourages its members to earn a minimum of 15 hours of accredited CME in bariatric medicine in a two-year period.

ASBP's Internet site, [www.asbp.org](http://www.asbp.org), contains up-to-date information about the problems of overweight and obesity, and referral information to locate an ASBP member physician.

The UK College of Allied Health Professions, established in 1966, emerged from a small school of three

programs to a large college offering degrees in several disciplines including Athletic Training, Clinical Laboratory Sciences, Clinical Nutrition, Communication Disorders, Health Services Management, Physician Assistant Studies, Physical Therapy and Radiation Sciences. Its programs have competed nationally with the best. The Clinical Laboratory Science division was ranked No. 1 in 1999 among the top 15 programs in the United States by Clinical Laboratory Science, a national trade journal. USS Wasp supports amphibious operations using Landing Craft Air Cushions, which are specially-designed Hovercraft that travel above land and sea surfaces and deliver vehicles and equipment. The ship also has conventional landing craft and helicopters embarked, and is equipped with medical facilities staffed by Navy doctors, dentists, nurses and corpsmen.

Howard is a 1997 graduate of Rockcastle County High School of Mt. Vernon and joined the Navy in September 2001.

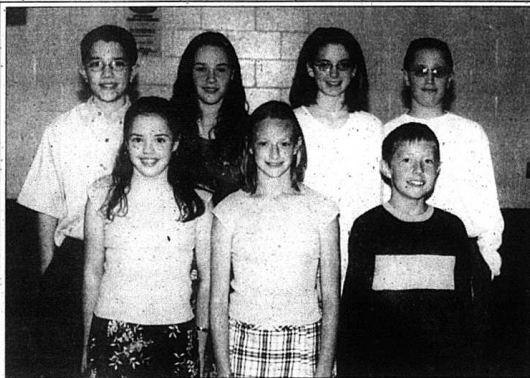

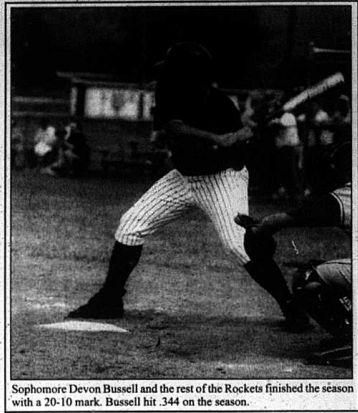

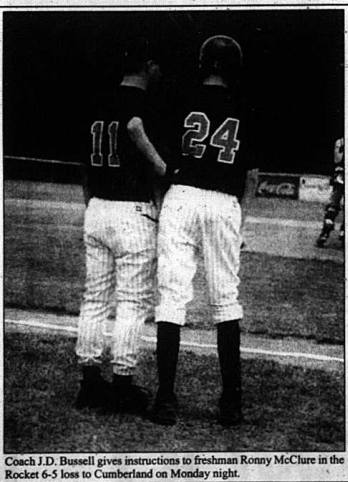

# RCHS Girls' Track Team wins 3rd straight Regional Title

The RCHS girls' track and field team made school history by capturing their third straight regional championship last Saturday at Eastern Kentucky University. The girls became the first sport since the inception of the high school to win three regional championships.

It took a total team performance to propel Rockcastle to the title. Despite having only two seniors and a sophomore, the young RCHS team defeated four of the top twelve teams in the state in Class 2A on their way to their second consecutive title defense.

The girls finished the regular season ranked 6th in the state. This year's regional competition appeared to be the most balanced it has been in the last several years. RCHS scored an amazing 114 points at region and were followed by Boyle County with 100, Mercer County (ranked 5th in Class 2A) with 99, and Lexington Catholic with 87.

Freshman Heather Hammond, last season's middle school track and field athlete of the year and a four-time all-state selection, put together perhaps the most amazing regional performances in RCHS history to lead her team to the title. She scored an unprecedented 40 points with 1st place

regional titles in the 400-meter dash, 300-meter hurdles, high jump, and long jump.

Heather won the first of her titles on Thursday in the long jump competition. Heather leaped an incredible 16'4.25", an RCHS regional record in the event. On Saturday, Heather attempted one of the most difficult "doubles" in track and field, the 400-meter dash and the 300-meter hurdles, back-to-back. Only minutes separated these two events, considered by many as the two most difficult running events. To make matters worse, high jump came in between. What seemed impossible turned out to be routine for Heather. She won her second straight 400-meter dash title with a season's best time of 59.53 seconds.

Minutes later, Heather successfully completed her attempt in the high jump rotation. Soon after, she won her first regional title in the 300-meter hurdles, an event she has little experience at since first trying it this season. She established a new RCHS record time in the event and also improved upon her state-best time with a spectacular effort of 47.39 seconds. She then proceeded to capture her second consecutive regional cham-

ionship in high jump. Matching her season's best effort of 5'0".

Heather will compete in each of her events this Friday and Saturday at the Class 2A State Championships held at the Shively Track and Field Complex at the University of Kentucky.

Senior Clarissa Hubbard had an exceptional meet in both the shot put and discus competitions, scoring an impressive 16 points overall. In the shot, Clarissa qualified for the state championships with an awesome throw of 30'4".

In the discus competition, Clarissa performed up to her usual standards. Last season, she was named all-estate in the event and finished 3rd overall in the state championships. Earlier this season, she broke the RCHS record with a mid-summering throw of 122'. At region, she finished 2nd overall to last year's state champion from Casey County.

Her best effort of 107'3" was more than nine feet better than her nearest competitor and easily good enough for the regional runner-up position and a berth at state.

Senior teammate Doris Bismarck also threw well in both competitions. In shot put, Doris finished 6th overall with an amazing effort of 27'4". She threw equally well in discus, finishing 8th overall with an effort of 80'1".

Sophomore Sheena Swimmy won her second straight regional title in the 200-meter dash. She finished with an easy victory in 27.55 seconds and also qualified for the state championships in the event for the third year in a row.

At the end of the season, Sheena was named all-state in the event. She also finished as regional runner-up in the 100-meter dash with a spectacular effort of 13.62 seconds. Her starting blocks slipped at the beginning of the race preventing her from capturing first. In the 400-meter dash, Sheena ran an awesome race and placed 4th overall with a season's best effort of 1:04.52. Sheena scored an impressive 22.5 points overall in the meet.

Eighth grader Kayla Hayes, an all-state cross-country competitor this season, had several outstanding performances in the distance events, despite the daunting challenge of running so many difficult races. Kayla met her challenges head on and performed exceptionally well. In the 1600-meter run, Kayla finished as regional runner-up with an awesome performance of 5:43.36.

In the 3200-meter run, she led for most of the race before senior cross-country champion Lauren Arnold from Lexington Catholic took the lead. Kayla finished as regional runner-up with a great time of 13:04.88. She qualified for state in both the 1600 and the 3200.

Kayla also ran well in the 800-meter run, finishing 6th overall in 2:39.2. Overall, Kayla contributed 18.5 points to the team, an amazing total for an 8th grader.

Eighth grade distance teammate Jessica Asher also ran extremely well in the 3200-meter run. Jessica has battled problems in both knees throughout the season, but has continued to be a tough competitor. Last year, she won both the 1600 and 3200-meter regional championships as only a 7th grader. Despite all that she's been through this season, she ran a great race and finished 5th overall in 13:52.47.

Freshman Chere' Embs performed well in both long jump and triple jump events. She leaped an impressive 154.5" in the long jump competition and placed 6th overall.

In triple jump, her best event, she was also very impressive. She finished 3rd overall with a season's best jump of 325.75" and qualified for the state championships when her best effort was compared to others throughout the state not qualifying in the top two spots in region. Chere' finished as state runner-up during the indoor season with a personal best effort of 33'4".

Eighth grader Danielle Arnold had

a great regional meet. In the 800-meter run, despite feeling a little ill, Danielle put forth a solid effort and finished 11th overall in 2:53.45. She also ran well in the 1600-meter run, finishing 6th overall with an awesome effort of 6:42.93. Her efforts were even more impressive considering the fact that Danielle got a late start this season due to knee problems.

Freshman Tara Rowe performed well in the high jump competition, despite limited practice time this season. She placed 7th overall with an exceptional jump of 4'4". Earlier this season, she jumped a season's best 48" at the Kiwanis Relay Meet.

Sixth grader Morgan Thacker ran very well in the 100-meter dash preliminaries. She finished with an awesome time of 15.19, barely missing qualification for Saturday's finals.

The 3200-meter relay team of Danielle Arnold, Kayla Hayes, Jessica Asher, and 7th grader Morgan Kincer ran an extremely exciting race. The group finished 3rd overall with an awesome season's best time of 10:53.06 and scored six very important points for the team.

The 1600-meter relay team of Morgan Thacker, Danielle Arnold, Morgan Kincer, and freshman Sarah Parsons ran very well and appeared to be in the top seven or eight teams,

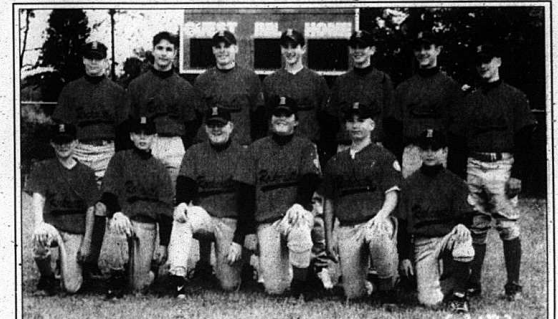
but were disqualified when the baton was dropped at the end.

The 400-meter relay team consisted of Morgan Thacker, Morgan Kincer, Chere' Embs, and Sarah Parsons. The girls ran exceptionally well and finished 9th overall in 57.95.

The 800-meter relay team of Sarah Parsons, Chere' Embs, Morgan Thacker, and Sheena Swimmy ran extremely well and finished 5th overall in 1:57.94.

The RCHS boys' team focused on attempting to qualify as many individuals for state as possible. This task was made much more difficult due to the strength of the region this

CONCORD, N.C.—Mark Martin, one of the old men of NASCAR Winston Cup racing won Sunday's 600-mile, Coca-Cola 600. Since the race was the second of five, No Bull 56, he also won an extra \$1 million.

However, Martin's No. 6 Viagra Ford failed to pass the post race inspection, incurring about an eighth of an inch below NASCAR's minimum height. But the win and points will likely stand. An official announcement as to the penalty will be announced later.

"I never drove that hard in my life to win a race," said Martin. "I thought he was gonna beat me. It's just that this Viagra team, I'm gonna share a huge portion of my winnings with them because I can't win this race with a slow car. The money doesn't matter. We're taking this trophy home to Florida and that's what I care about. I want to thank these fans for coming out here tonight and let's keep that Winston here at Charlotte."

"Fishing second was his Rough Racing teammate, Matt Kenseth in the No. 17 DeWalt Tools Ford."  
"We had an uphill battle all day," said Kenseth. "I think we broke a valve spring or something right at the end and had to let the gas a little early. I felt like we had a little bit better than Mark, but he had a good car and I'm happy to see him win. Maybe that will put him in a better mood."

Polester Jimmy Johnson, driver of the No. 48 Lowe's Chevrolet led 263 of the 400 laps, but after overshooting his pit area late in the race, and having to back up, he lost valuable time to position.  
"It's disappointing," he said. "We didn't lead that much at Charlotte and won. Here we led the most and finished seventh. A lot of times the dominant car doesn't win, the smartest does. I made a mistake in the pits and it cost us."

I mean look at who the NASCAR Winston Cup points leader is - Sterling Martin. And the Daytona 500 winner was Ward Burton."





But, hopefully we've got our bad luck away from us and we can continue from this point and focus on just finishing in the top five, leading laps and trying to put ourselves in a position to win some more races."

"The motor room is working 24 hours a day, basically, all looking to trying to make stuff more durable and make more horsepower. Here, I'm sure some teams are going to elect to bring stuff that they know has run a lot of laps in the past. I know we are. It's maybe a few horsepower off of some of the better stuff we could have. But, that extra time, it's I guess you can look at how many practice laps you've run. We had The Winston the other night and a bunch of laps there to give you some ideas. Weather conditions will kind of determine how much you run, or at least for us, as far as if the weather is a whole bunch different. That racetrack seems pretty sensitive. Air temperature and track temperature will hopefully dictate if we need to run a bunch of laps or if we can kind of take what we learned at The Winston, put it in the race car and kind of work off of that."

"Obviously, he'll be 120 percent focused here the whole race and he'll be in the car for all the practices," said Zippadelli. "In the past, he's done a great job of trying to give us 150 percent, if that's possible, when he's there doing what he can. When he gets in the car, starting from the back, he's been good and we've had success with him doing that. It's a dream of his. I've got dreams of mine and I hope that someday, if I've got an opportunity to do some things, he'll support me in the same way that we've had in the past."

"It will be good to have him here the whole week. I'm sure somebody down the road he is going to want to do it again. Hopefully, things will go as smooth as they have in the past for us. That's the only thing is you just put yourself at risk a lot of different things when you do that. Him doing it. I think it's awesome and it's great to be a part of it, to know that he finished in the top 10 both times that he did it. And honestly and truly, if things had gone a little bit better in either one, he probably could have won both of them. He wasn't that far off. Knowing you were part of that, I take some personal pride in wanting to be a part of that and helping him any way I can. If that's what he wants to do, we'll support it again."

### Can You Gauge When Tony Needs Your Coaching?

"When you work long enough with people and you understand how they think and how they react to different situations. You know when it's time to put that little bit of extra input or just trying to comfort them or just let them know what we're here as a team and we're working and not to give up."

Should racing have more weight towards winning a championship? "I don't know that there is anything wrong with what we have, and how do you change to keep people from focusing on winning? I'm preparing to go there and win. As the weekend goes on, I still prepare to win. On Sunday when we race, if we're a 15th place car, then I change my mindset and try to get us to a top 10. Then, when we're a top 10 car, I try and think of what I can do to get us to the top five. When we're in a top five position like we were at Richmond, then I work on trying to

get us in a position to win the race. I can honestly say that I go to every racetrack and I know my team does with a mindset of, 'We can win this.' When the time comes and you have those hurdles or those bumps in the road that you have to adjust to, you try to adjust the best that you can. Then, as the day goes on, you try to

That's my approach."

### How Do You Keep Yourself Focused?

"I'll sit down and script out a little bit of a game plan to give you a little bit of how things went in the past, what you've done and what you can do. But, a lot of it depends on how you start. When you start and you're running in front and you're on a high; it's a lot easier to keep yourself focused and going. If you're struggling or having problems and you're fighting some handling conditions, then it kind of turns around and you've got to work twice as hard to keep yourself motivated. It's hard because you're the cheerleader and everybody keys off my emotions and voice and things. In the back of your mind you've got to keep telling yourself that it's going to be alright. Believe it or not, a lot of people will key off of a lot of my responses, thoughts and actions."

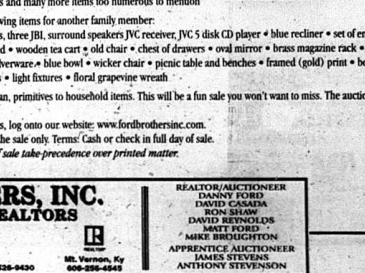
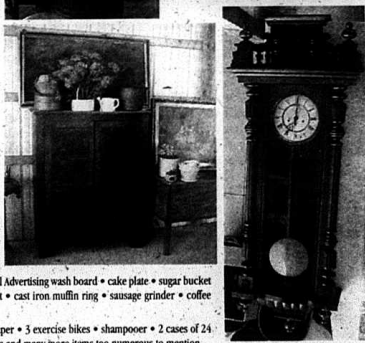

### A CHILD'S TEARS

Often, children attend the funeral of a loved one without any obvious demonstration of emotion. The child stands there stiffly, dry-eyed. The child is probably neither being brave or unfeeling; rather, the child is probably too stunned or uncomprehending to fully express his or her feelings.

Sometimes, the child gets a subtle, or not so subtle message from adults to keep a lid on emotions. Psychologists generally agree that this is wrong, that it is unhealthy for the child to bottle up

grief. The youngster who stoically represses his or her feelings may later find a release in an explosion more dangerous to psychological well-being.

Adults are advised by psychologists not to fear the allowing or even causing of tears. There is not reason to steer conversation away from the deceased for fear of starting the tears to flow. Expressing grief through crying is both normal and therapeutic. A child's tears are a fitting and tender tribute that should not be stifled.

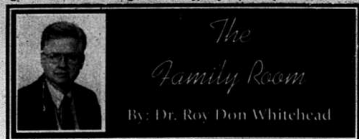

### Critters Thrive in Homemade Ecosystems

Songbirds have always been welcome in yards and gardens. People put out houses with hopes of getting some feathered tenants to move in. Now retailers carry more kinds of bird feed than dog feed it seems. Some garden centers are stocking bee boxes, butterfly houses and even bat houses.

And why wouldn't we attract butterflies, bees, spiders, ladybugs and so many more creatures? After all, as we eliminate grass and go for a more natural look, these little critters will like our yards as super places to call home and raise their families.

You don't need to necessarily put out birdhouses or toad abodes, but as you grow a more divergent number of plants and shrubs, all sorts of wildlife will be attracted to your place.

We may like birds, toads, squirrels and chipmunks. (The couple who had a chipmunk eat through the pond liner recently may not be too eager to see another chipmunk.) We may think we dislike spiders, snakes, mice and bats. But do you have any idea how many mice a snake eats? Or how many insects a frog or a spider catches? And bats have been known to eat 1,000 mosquitoes per hour while filtering around in the evening!

So if you like some birds or other "good" creatures in your yard, please realize they may need other critters to prey on in order to obtain a balanced diet. So be willing to accept a few "bad" critters if you want to attract birds and other wildlife to your yard.

And it is reassuring to know most all wild critters are "wild" and are not aggressive, but indeed are afraid of the giant people who live in the big house in their yard.

## Veteran receives high school diploma

In 1945, Cleo Brock was called to war. Called away from his Mt. Vernon home, his high school sweetheart and everything he knew, to help fight half the world. Going across an ocean to carry out orders, meet people that would see him as an enemy and maybe even risk his life, all this before receiving his high school diploma.

Now, in the year 2002, due to a new law put into action, Brock can finally receive his high school diploma.

Brock and his "high school sweetheart" wife Joy, have lived on a 172-acre farm near West Alexandria for the past 54 years. After his discharge from the Army, he moved to the area and started farming 170 acres, raising beef cattle, in addition to working second shift at General Motors.

Brock retired from GM after 30 years, and now, the grandkids take care of the farming.

"I was drafted the same month they dropped the bomb," said Brock, who was sent to the Philippines and was stationed there for three years. His battalion surveyed and photographed several surrounding islands and mapped them. Acting as supply sergeant in the Topo Battalion, it was Brock's job to keep the 1,600 men in supply of food, clothes or anything else that was needed.

The World War II Veteran is happy to finally graduate.

"As a general rule, you have three options when you leave school. You can get married, you can get a job or you can further your education. I'm already married, I was past getting a job, and I've been 57 years getting my diploma."

"I had mixed feelings at first about going through with it," said Brock, who tells the young people at his church. "Never expect something for nothing: always be willing to work for what you get."

"I didn't feel right about getting it for free," remarked the humble Veteran, "but then I thought, since I left all those years ago for my country, and then they passed this law, I felt kinda like they were giving something back to me. Like it's their way of thanking me, so in turn, I will accept it and be gracious."

Not only does Brock acquire a high school diploma, but he will also be a member of the Class of 2002 at Twin Valley South. The school gave Brock the option to walk with his class at graduation, and after a blink

of hesitation, the excited senior accepted. Brock has been fitted for his cap and gown to be worn on the big night, May 28.

It has been a TVS tradition to show the graduates' baby pictures along with their senior picture at a slide show during the graduation ceremony, and Brock will be included. He submitted a baby picture where he was wearing his "rompers," along with a military picture and a recent photograph.

"Twin Valley South has just been

so receptive, I really appreciate it," Brock said. The school invited him to the annual "senior steak out," a steak dinner for the graduating class so he will be able to meet some of his fellow classmates.

"I am really looking forward to becoming a part of that. I'll be in the yearbook! I will be one of them! I will be a part of the graduating class."

Brock's family is enthused as well. Family will be attending the ceremony and his wife is organizing an open house for her husband.

Brock has had many experiences in his 75 years, but graduating high school will definitely be a first. The diploma, the memories and the recognition will be something he can value, always, even if it is "57 years late."

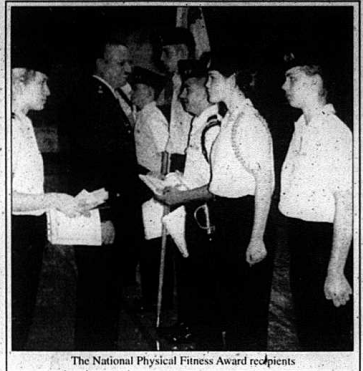

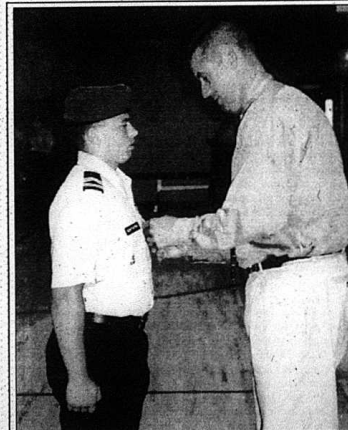
