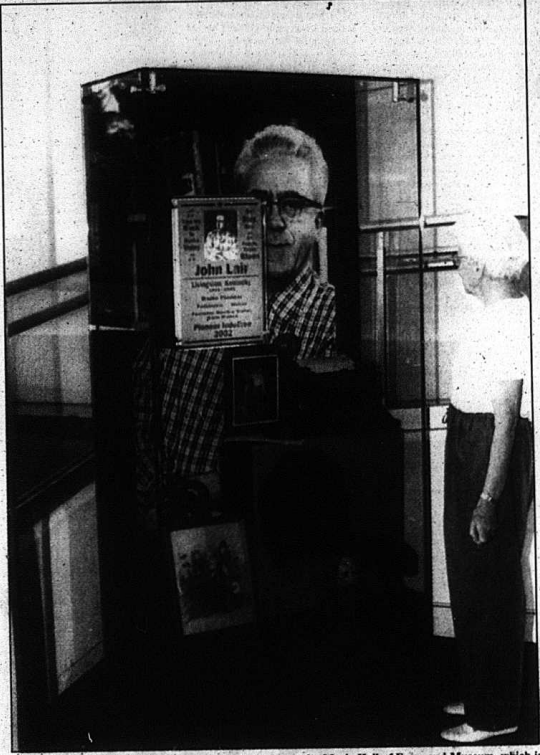

One month left to apply for assistance because of storms

Rockcastle residents and business owners who suffered losses in the severe storms, tornadoes and floods in April and May have one month left in which to register for state and federal recovery assistance.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) will accept applications through July 8 for those in the 32 disaster-designated counties. The deadline for submitting loan applications to the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) for flood-related losses to real and personal property is July 6.

"We want people to understand that these are application deadlines," said Mike Bolch of FEMA, the federal coordinating officer. "The requests of individuals who have al-

ready applied will continue to be processed. But by law we can't accept any new applications after the July 8 date."

State Coordinating Officer Cash Centers said he hoped the commonwealth and FEMA had been able to reach everyone who needs recovery assistance in this latest of Kentucky's disasters in 2002.

"We're in constant contact with the news media and community relations personnel are reaching out to people in isolated areas," he said. "But we depend a lot on friends, family and neighbors to urge people who have suffered losses and need assistance to call the FEMA number."

Bolch and Centers urge those who have not yet applied to do so as soon

as possible by calling the toll-free registration line at 1-800-621-FEMA (3362). Hearing or speech-impaired individuals may call the TTY registration number at 1-800-462-7585. Phone lines are open 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Development board looks to future of Rockcastle

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court held its regular meeting on Tuesday.

Because fiscal years end on June 30, Executive Director Bige Towery of the Rockcastle County Development Board and Chairman John Clontz of the Industrial Development Authority gave an update to the fiscal court's magistrates on the status of development potential in the county.

Clontz and Towery spoke of the work that has been conducted by several Development Board Task Forces that have been meeting on a regular basis on everything from garbage collection and beautification to education and business job creation.

Their report suggests that more activity has been generated by these working groups than perhaps ever in the past. A notable accomplishment expected to be delivered in written form to the fiscal court in October or November will be the Rockcastle County Long Range Community Comprehensive Development Plan, which has been in the works for a couple of years and will be the result of community meetings that were held at the high school, the city halls and the courthouse and that were attended by hundreds of citizens.

Meetings are still being held toward this effort. One of the major results of having such a comprehensive plan for Rockcastle County will

be the increased acceptance to all the communities' requests made to the state and federal government funding sources," according to Towery.

Another item discussed by Towery and Clontz was the work of the Kentucky Renaissance's local board in Mt. Vernon, in its effort to bring a revitalization of the Main

Harris said the plants have been sent to the Kentucky State Police lab for analysis and that no arrests have been made.

Harris said the case would be presented to the Rockcastle Grand Jury.

Points East

I just read in the paper that Jim Reed, formerly of John's Creek in Pike County, KY, had presented his ticket for that ride that takes you to Great Beyond.

The obituaries in the big state dailies become more and more popular reading once you pass the age of 50 because you commence wanting to see how many people are passing from your realm of acquaintance and how many you are out-living. Hardly a week goes by that someone I've known hasn't had funeral notice. Jimbo (his given name was James Garfield Reed but they just called

him Jim in the obits) was 89 years of age and he died in some little burg or village in southeastern Ohio where he'd spent the last 30 years doing whatever old folks do when they move in with the youngest daughter. He'd sold off the home place, a few acres of hillside with a weather-beaten, 20's vintage frame house, to a grandson who promptly let the local fire department practice on putting out fires once they'd set the old house ablaze.

Same grandson now has a Bedford Stone complex complete with a swimming pool and tennis

court on the premises and has sold off a few lots for the same sort of development but, in all fairness, he must have maintained the graveyard because that's where Jimbo's remains were planted. (At least the obit said "family cemetery" and Jimbo had one of those tombstones-for-two placed beside his wife's grave at least as early as 1968 and I assume he was buried beside her.)

James Garfield Reed was plain old Jimbo to his contemporaries. I have no idea why they called him Jim in the paper. He pulled a combat stint in the Philippines during WWII and then worked underground in the coal mines up near Williamson, West Virginia for 35 years. Black lung disease had him coughing every breath when I first met him and he was pale and frail. Retired on a disability payment from Veterans Security and a pitance from the Special Administration.

Jimbo showed up one May morning in 1968 at Camp Shawnee, which was then a Boy Scouts of America establishment on Dewey Lake in Floyd County, KY where I spent all my college summers.

We needed carpentry work on tent platforms and the lodge and we'd advertised for volunteers on the radio and in the local papers.

It must have been 5:00 in the morning when the horn blew right in front of my little cabin. I can tell you faithfully that it was still dark. I jerked on my BSA uniform shorts and looked outside and this little man was leaning on the door of his old 55 Ford pick-up.

"Anything wrong?" I wanted to know.

"Nope. I've just heard on the radio that you had some repairs that needed doing and I come to help out. You all got any coffee made? My name is James Garfield but everybody calls me Jimbo and I got time now."

"Come on in Mr. Garfield and I'll make us some coffee." I offered because he was obviously sincere and sober and besides that, Camp Shawnee was an awfully lonely place to be when I didn't see another living human for as many as ten days at a time. I had AM/FM radio, two black & white television stations and a phone. An old stray red-bone coon he was always on the job and a skitish Morris-type, orange cat, Batman, because he kept me company and kept the bats out of the attic and that was it.

Jimbo is the name I go by and

my last name is Reed. I got the whole name because my daddy was fond of dead Presidents," Jimbo chuckled.

So we scrambled some eggs and fried some sausage and made a pot of coffee and baked up some biscuits and had a meager breakfast and then Jim headed around the point where we had tent platforms: a dozen here and half a dozen somewhere else along a two mile road. He rattled off the number of timbers we would need to make the place safe and it was astounding.

The figure-price was astronomical. It was at least ten times our budget and I was as dependent as you can get until next morning. Jimbo rolled in with a bunch of workers from a government program and a Colonel from the Bluegrass Army Depot. Before I knew what was going on, truck loads of lumber in the 2X4, 2X6 and 2X12 were being unloaded in huge piles in front of the lodge. Next came portable saws and planers and half a dozen guys on some sort of work program. In short order, the entire camp was rebuilt.

The Boy Scout Executives came out from Pikeville, prepared to close the place down but what they found was class-act tent platforms, a lodge with gas ranges ready for use, and Jimbo, at their service.

Nobody ever tried to put a \$ value on what James Garfield Reed contributed to the Scouts in 1968 but he kept the place running.

Up around the first of August, when it was time to go back to school, the old Ford's horn blew at the front of the cabin early one morning. More than a thousand boys had gone through our little camp, a week at a time, and I was busy tearing down and from the huge piles in front of the lodge. The place was lonely again. I was worried about finding winter homes for Full-Time and Batman because I knew I couldn't keep them in the dorm.

"You got coffee fixed?" Jimbo bellowed from the truck.

"I got it on and she's getting hot," I yelled back.

"Catch that damned dog and that sorry yeller cat cause I'm taking them home this a.m.," he yelled back. We drank hard coffee and messed around the camp a bit and then Jimbo Reed loaded up my pets and drove away. The next Spring (69) Jimbo drove up one morning and old Full-Time was sitting fat and happy in the passenger seat like he owned the truck. Jimbo had traded up to a near new F-150.

"Batman" at the house but he didn't want to get out this early so you are gonna have to go get him if you want him back," he said. "But I brought your dog back."

I called to old Full-Time. "Here boy---come to papa," but he just whined a bit and shook his head because he was fat and happy and obviously in love with Jimbo and that new Ford Truck.

Jimbo and Late gray and biscuits and drank pot of coffee. We walked around the camp and he gave me a hug just before he left. I took one last look at my old dog and scratched him behind the ears.

I figured there was no use to go looking for my cat.

"What Saith the Scriptures"

We have been studying the past few weeks, the importance taking the scriptures in context. Let's look at another example.

In Matt 7:1 we read, "Judge not, that ye be not judged." Now this verse is misapplied many times in our world today. People will seek to say that it means we should never judge what another person is doing as wrong. I have heard it said to me when I may be pointing out the error in someone's doctrine or teaching, "Judge not, that ye be not judged." The problem with this is 3-fold. First, they have violated their own rule, for they are judged me for judging. Second, the context is teaching that we should not be making a hypocritical and hypercritical judgment about another. How can I ask about getting a speck of dirt out of my brother's eye, when there is a beam or log sticking in mine? When I have clean up my own act, then I can see clearly to help my brother with the speck of dust in his own eye, vs 3-5. Thirdly, In 7:24 teaches us also, "Judge not according to the appearance, but judge righteous judgment." So in the greater context of the scriptures, you see how Matt 7:1 is distorted, for we are to judge a righteous judgment.

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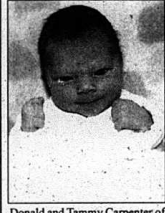

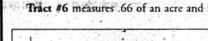

He graduated Northwestern University's Traffic Institute in 1966. During this tenure, he developed his strong desire to never see snow again after working through the many weather related problems while in Louisville. 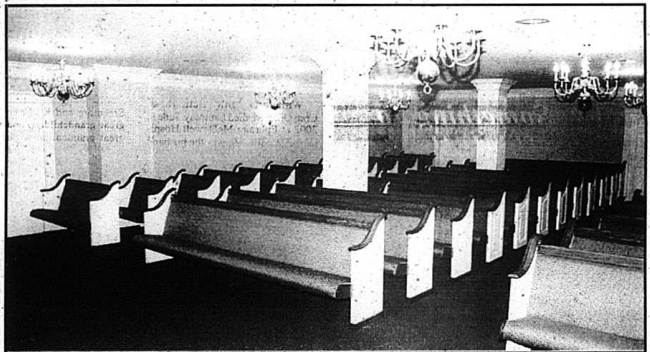

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Girls' Track Team places 4th in State Champions; Boys' 1600-Meter Relay Team places 7th

The RCHS girls' track and field team completed another great season with a tremendous performance in the Class 2A State Championships this past Friday and Saturday at the Shively Track and Field Complex located at the University of Kentucky. Coming off of their third straight regional championship performance, the girls' sought to improve upon their final regular season ranking of sixth in the state. Last season, the girls' team finished as state runner-up.

Preliminaries were held in most races on Friday. The top four competitors in each heat, plus the next fastest time overall qualified for Saturday's state finals. Rockcastle's losses rested upon the shoulders of Freshman Heather Hammond, sophomore Sheena Swainey, freshman Cheryl Embes, senior Clarissa Hubbard, and eighth grader Kayla Hayes.

Sheena competed first in the preliminaries of the 100-meter dash. She ran a blistering race and easily finished in the top four in her heat, qualifying for Saturday's finals with an awesome time of 13.62 seconds.

Clarissa competed in the discus competition, which included both preliminaries and finals on the same day. Clarissa finished 3rd in the event last season and was named all-state for her spectacular efforts. During this year's competition, Clarissa had no trouble making the finals. She established a new RCHS record for state competition in the event. She threw an amazing 115'7" and finished 3rd overall, earning a very valuable six points for RCHS.

Heather competed in the long jump competition on Friday, which was also included preliminary and finals competition. An all-state competitor in the event last season, Heather jumped extremely well and finished 5th overall with a spectacular leap of 16' 1". She scored four points for RCHS with her effort in the event.

Heather also had preliminary races in the 400-meter dash and the 300-meter hurdles, back-to-back

events separated by less than twenty minutes. In the 400, Heather had little trouble qualifying and cruised through the race with a time of 1:01.59. The 300-meter hurdles were seemingly as easy. Heather finished 1st in her heat with an amazing qualifying time of 48.92 seconds. She finished the season ranked 1st in the 300-meter hurdles with a season's best effort of 47.39 seconds. She also ranked 3rd in the 400-meter dash in the final regular season rankings.

Sheena also ran the 200-meter dash preliminaries, the final event of the day for the girls' team. She ran an awesome qualifying race and easily made the finals with a time of 27.38 seconds.

After three event finals and the first day of competition, the RCHS girls' team found themselves in a tie for third place with 10 points.

The RCHS boys' team qualified for the state championships in the 1600-meter relay for the second straight season and faced preliminary competition on Friday. Seniors Josh Hale, Cody Reams, Andrew Hammond, and sophomore Caleb Blair sought a trip to the state finals and a RCHS record in the event. The boys' would not disappoint. They executed a spectacular race and easily qualified for Saturday's finals with an impressive effort of 3:40.82, their best time of the season.

Competition on Saturday began for RCHS with Clarissa Hubbard in the shot put competition. A very talented freer of competitors left the boys' team with a difficult starting position in the event. Nevertheless, she threw as well as she has all season and finished an amazing 6th place overall. This represented the best finish ever for an RCHS female in state competition in the event. She also shattered her own RCHS state competition record with an impressive throw of 32'5" and earned three more points for the girls' team.

Cheryl Embes, this season's indoor state runner-up in the triple jump competition, hoped to jump as well

as she had during regional competition. Despite a valiant effort, she finished 12th overall with an effort of 30'5". Her indoor mark of 33'4" from earlier in the year ranks second on the all-time best list at RCHS.

Kayla Hayes competed in the individual state competition for the first time. Last season, she anchored the 3200-meter relay team to a sixth place finish at state. Having earned all-state honors in cross-country this season, Kayla has felt the pressure to perform since the beginning of the year. She qualified in both the 1600 and 3200-meter runs at state with excellent runs in the regional championships. First up for Kayla was the 1600-meter run. She ran an exceptional race and finished 12th overall with a time of 5:48.11. In the 3200-meter run, Kayla maintained 4th for several laps before eventually falling back. She finished 11th overall with an awesome effort of 13:27.24.

Sheena ran extremely well in the 100-meter dash finals. She finished a very fast race with a season's best time of 13.19 seconds and a 7th place finish overall. Sheena was only two-tenths of a second away from the top five and scored two points in the event.

Sheena's performance in the 200-meter dash was even better. An all-state competitor in the 200 last season, Sheena blazed her way to a 6th place finish with an exceptional effort. She finished with an amazing time of 27.38 seconds and scored three more points for her team.

Heather, last season's female middle school athlete of the year, was looking for a chance to add to her impressive state performances from last season. In the high jump competition, an event she was named all-state in last year, Heather tied her season's best effort with a leap of 5'0". She tied for 4th overall in the event, but was unable to attempt any further heights due to interference from her other events. She scored four and a half points in the event.

The most difficult challenge for Heather came in the 400-meter dash and 300-meter hurdles, events that are scheduled one immediately after the other. Heather could have easily skipped one of the events to better her chances in the other. In the 300-meter hurdles, she was favored by more than a second for the state title; however, Heather had no intention of only satisfying personal goals. Instead, she opted to do what was best for the team and compete in both races, regardless of the difficulty and the outcome. This was a very selfless act to say the least, especially since she was so heavily favored in the hurdles. Despite winning the 400-meter state title last season, Heather also had the daunting challenge of defeating senior and junior runners from state power Paducah Tilghman in the event. The senior runner from Paducah finished her career with twelve state championships in numerous events. In this year's state meet, the duo combined for an amazing 70 points. Heather got off to a great start in the race and ran her game plan to perfection. It

took Paducah's senior 350 meters of the 400-meter race to finally catch Heather for the win. Her teammate could not sustain the torrid pace and fell to third. Although Heather did not successfully defend her state title in the event from a year ago, she finished 2nd to the greatest 400-meter state champion Class 2A has seen in many years. Heather also established a new RCHS record in the event with an awesome time of 58.96 seconds (58.82 hand-timed). Her finish was nearly one full second better than her winning time a year ago.

Despite being absolutely worn out, Heather prepared herself for a chance at her first state title in the 300-meter hurdles. Heather was aware that the task would be nearly impossible since no runner had ever been able to be successful at both the 400 and 300-meter hurdles before due to their close proximity in terms of time. Heather ran a great race and battled closely with the second-ranked runner in the state from Lexington Catholic. The girls remained sane coming into the last hurdle when Heather began to pull away. After clearing the last hurdle, she slightly stumbled. As a result, the Lexington Catholic runner edged her at the finish by eight hundredths of a second. Heather finished as state runner-up with an amazing time of 48.29 seconds. Without her sacrifice, RCHS would have finished 8th as a team.

From both the 400 and 300-meter hurdles, Heather totaled an amazing sixteen points, giving her an unprec-

edented RCHS all-time record 24.5 points in this year's state competition. Heather's impressive individual point total would have ranked her 9th in the state as a team. Last season, as an eighth grader, Heather scored an unbelievable 21.5 points.

The girls' team finished with an impressive 38.5 points and a 4th place team finish overall, their second best finish ever. Paducah Tilghman won its third straight state crown, while Russell High School placed 2nd and Louisville's Mercy Academy finished 3rd. Out of nearly ninety schools representing Class 2A, thirty-seven scored points in state competition. Many of the RCHS girls should be named to the all-state track and field team in the upcoming weeks.

The RCHS boys' mile relay team finished an exciting day of state championship competition with an awesome performance in the 1600-meter relay finals. Caleb Blair started the race with an excellent lead leg 400-meter dash. Cody Reams continued the torrid pace with a fast-

paced lap of his own. Andrew Hammond ran an awesome third leg and finished with an excellent hand-off to anchor man Josh Hale. Josh sprinted an awesome final lap reminiscent of his RCHS record-breaking performance in the 400 in 2001. The boys placed an amazing 7th overall with an exceptional time of 4:31.33, bettering their time and place from a year ago. The team scored two points for their relay effort.

Yards to Paradise

Fragrant Flowers & Aromatherapy

Ever stroll through a modern garden and smell the roses, or tulips, or mums? If your reply is "yes," did you question all the stories about fragrant rose petals? Did you wonder if poets were exaggerating about sultry or intoxicating scents wafting from a flower garden?

The answer to such questions may lie in the desire we have had for "bigger, better and more beautiful." You know, bigger tomatoes (with little flavor), redder apples (that taste like sweetened sawdust), and bigger, longer-lasting roses or carnations (with much of the sweet scent missing).

Actually fragrance is a dimension of our five senses. Some of us have a more acute sense of smell or prefer certain aromas to others. Aromatic plants, blooms, potions, lotions, sachet, potpourri are being used by more and more people, certainly by aromatherapists. There truly is something therapeutic about being immersed in sweet smells.

Many folks are rediscovering the joys of flower gardening. The trend is toward naturalistic gardens with a stronger emphasis on fragrance when selecting plants for the home garden.

My own grandparents, both sets of them, grew flowers. Iris, zinnias, giant marigolds, spider flowers, tiger lilies, just to name a few. Hybrid bearded iris may be bigger and more colorful in modern gardens, and marigolds may bloom all summer, but they just don't smell as wonderful as I remember from childhood.

So let's explore some trees, shrubs

and flowers, each having a noticeable fragrance, of course.

Since scents add a whole different dimension to a beautiful yard or garden, consider planting some of the following shade trees. Magnolias, Incense Cedar, Catalpa, Katsura, Tulip Poplar, Basswood or Linden and the evergreen Balsam Fir.

Magnolias are well-known, though the winters of '77-'78 and '85 thinned the less hardy ones. The Balsam Fir is so hard on winter greenery, but it likes to grow in shade, in good "woody" soil, and with cool night breezes. (This rare tree is found in the Catskill and Blue Ridge Mountains... and a little one in my yard.)

Perennial flowers with exceptional smells include certain cultivated varieties (cultivars) of lavender, hyacinth, peonies, musc, narcissus, daffodils, lily of the valley, iris, and the list could go on a long.

Shrubs or small trees with exceptional scents may include: jasmine, wisteria, gardenia, honeysuckle, roses, summerweet, butterfly bush, akela, bottlebrush buckeye, white Korean Forsythia, Virginia sweetspire, daphne, mock orange and lilacs.

For more information on the best cultivars to grow for pleasant smells, visit your public library, go on-line, or visit a well established garden center and speak with the owner or a longtime employee and garden enthusiast.

Youngsters unaware of the purpose of TV ads

A new British study suggests children may not be able to grasp the point of television ads until they are at least 8 years old—countering the notion that kids as young as 4 can be shrewd advertising consumers.

In interviews with 182 children, researchers at the University of Sheffield found that none of the 6-year-olds and only a minority of 8-year-olds understood the "persuasive intent" of TV advertising. Most of the 10-year-olds got the point, realizing that the television spots were part of corporate efforts to boost sales.

The study found that even the 10-year-old's saw TV ads as information sources, but a majority

also knew the ads were trying to talk them into wanting a product. With understanding of persuasive intent comes a realization that the products in the ads might not be as wonderful as they are portrayed.

In contrast, no 6-year-old and only some 8-year-olds in the study were so skeptical. Instead, these children largely saw TV ads as information and as opportunities for breaks, for both viewers and those on television. From a practical standpoint, it may be necessary to teach young children to be skeptical consumers. Parents can watch TV with their children and explain what ads are, and teachers could help by talking about advertising when teaching literacy.

Changing Addictions Does Not Always Help

"No matter how hard I try, I seem to make a mess of things," Vera told me. (All characters are fictitious.) "Norm says I'm not a good parent and not a good wife. What can I do?"

Vera had come for counseling because her doctor recommended it. She did not know she was depressed, but she knew she did not feel well. She was waking at 2:00 a.m., unable to go back to sleep. She had also gained 20 pounds and had no energy at all. She cried almost every day and did not enjoy life anymore.

He also tries to make the two little ones sit quietly while he reads the Bible to them for an hour, and then he gets angry when they don't."

Vera reported that Norm quoted the Bible to her a lot. "Norm's been memorizing Scripture, and I guess that is good," she added. "But..."

"But what, Vera?" I asked. "Well, he always quotes Scripture to me when we are arguing," she responded. "And he knows more about it than I do, so he always wins the arguments."

I believed I knew the answer before I asked this question, but I asked it anyway. "Does Norm have some favorite Scripture passages, Vera?"

"He always quotes me that one about always giving submitting to the husbands," Vera said. "I surely am tired of hearing that one."

"Does he ever quote you the passage about husbands loving wives as Christ loved the church?" I inquired. "No," she replied, "I've never heard him use that one."

"Vera, I'm glad Norm has stopped drinking," I told her, "but it sounds to me as if he has just changed addictions." "What do you mean?" Vera wanted to know.

"Norm is now addicted to religion," I answered. "Instead of using his faith to strengthen your family, he is using religion as a weapon of control. Instead of being more loving toward you and the children, he is using his religion as justification for his continued abusive behavior."

"I thought all religion was healthy," Vera stated.

"Most of the time religion is healthy," I agreed. "Faith helps people deal better with life. Faith makes them better parents and better spouses. But sometimes religion does more harm than good. That is what is happening with your family now. Norm is using religion as a weapon rather than using it to make him a more loving, understanding husband and father."

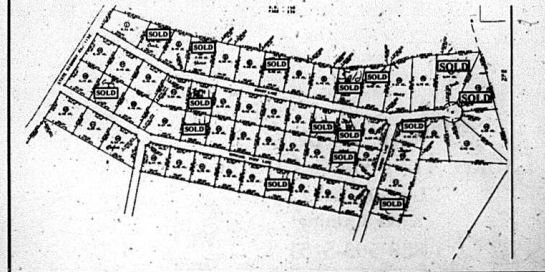

Agricultural News

By Warden Alexander, FSA Director

Crop Reports

Producers with crops such as tobacco, corn, soybeans, hay, pasture, vegetable, etc. may report the planted acres to the FSA office now through July 15, 2002.

All farms with an effective quota greater than zero (0) must file a FSA 578. Report of Crop Acreage, no later than July 1st. Reports filed after the deadline will be subject to a late file fee. Marketing cards will NOT be issued without a crop report on file.

Farms with an effective quota that will not plant or lease quota away from the farm MUST file a zero acreage report, or the farm will be subject to quota forfeiture for the applicable burley marketing quota not established for the farm, unless the State Committee and the County Committee determine that the reduction is not applicable.

We strongly urge producers to contact the office and request an appointment prior to filing the report.

You may do so by calling 256-252-5252 extension 100.

2002 Marketing Year Penalty Rates

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced the penalty rates that will be charged producers, dealers and warehouse operators for marketing excess tobacco during the 2002 marketing year.

According to James R. Little, Administrator of USDA's Farm Service Agency, the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 Section 314, as amended, provides for these penalties and sets a penalty rate of 78 percent of the average market price for that kind of tobacco for the previous market year. For the 2002 market year Burley tobacco (type 31) the rate of penalty shall be \$1.48 per pound.

Burley Tobacco Leasing Producers may lease burley tobacco quota effective immediately through July 1st. Producers may list quota for lease on the bulletin board

space by way of contacting the county office either in person or by telephone.

Warehouse Designation

As a condition of price support beginning with the 2001 crop year for tobacco, producers were required to inform FSA of the warehouse where they would market tobacco. This is acquired by completing the form FSA 808, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Initial designation will end August 1, 2003. Producers are encouraged to complete this form after all leases and transfers have been updated. After the initial designation period ends producers will be limited to designate for the farm to any one day during the following regular redesignation periods:

September 30-October 4, 2002, with card effective October 14, 2002.
October 28-November 1, 2002, with card effective November 11, 2002.

December 02-December 06, 2002, with card effective December 16, 2002.

December 27-January 3, 2003, with card effective January 13, 2003.

The warehouse will be indicated with a number on the market card. Therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the card, you must return that card to the FSA office in specific time periods to request another marketing card.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office available through March 31, 2003.

Tobacco Spot Checks

Producers who have reported unmarketed tobacco stored on the farms are subject for random spot checks. Spot checks are performed by local FSA personnel to verify the amount of tobacco reported. These spot checks will be carried out in the next few months. If you have moved tobacco from where you first reported the storage, please contact FSA to report the new location.

FY 2002 PFC Reminder

Producers with Production Flexibility contracts (PFCs) authorized under AMTIA in the 1996 farm bill must continue to follow contract requirements for the 2002 crop year. The deadline to sign or revise a PFC for FY2002 is August 1, 2002. PFC payments for the 2002 crop year will

continue to be issued, as requested, until September 30, 2002, provided all eligibility requirements have been met.

Producers who wish to receive their 2002 PFC (Production Flexibility Contract) payments early must sign a form for what month you wish to receive your 2002 payment.

Producers are encouraged not to request a payment for the farm if they are considering selling a portion or the entire farm as payment received must be refunded. Changes in your farming operations must be reported timely in order to reflect PFC payments to the current crop year program. All changes reflected on the CCC-478, Application for PFC Payment, must be signed by August 1, 2002.

New Farm Bill

On May 13, 2002 President Bush signed into law the 2002 Farm Bill, officially known as the "Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002."

FSA will be using all available means to provide you with complete and timely information the new program and provisions by way of direct mailings, new releases, fact sheets, county newsletters and public meetings. Frequently updated information will be posted on the web site at <http://www.usda.gov/pas/farmbill>.

The website will include farm bill program details, questions and answers, program applications and sign-up forms, as well as other important materials from USDA agencies on farm bill implementation. The website will also contain advanced electronic applications to help program applicants receive program benefits faster and more efficiently.

Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP) Eligibility

In accordance with the provisions of the new farm bill, FSA has previously issued LDP eligibility to commodities grown in 2001 on nonparticipating farms. In addition a special beneficial interest waiver will be available to producers who marketed 2001 commodities before applying for their LDP payment.

The ending date for applications will be announced by FSA as soon as regulations are published. Producers who previously requested LDP's, but were disapproved based on lost beneficial interest, will be able to

apply for their LDP on the 2001 production.
